Nixon Signs \$21.3 Billion Military Bill

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Nixon signed today a \$21.3-billion military procurement bill but said he would ignore one of its provisions — the Mansfield amendment urging him to set a final date for the withdrawal of all U.S. forces in Indochina.

Nixon said in a statement that the amendment "is without binding force or effect, and it does not reflect my judgment about the way the war should be brought to a conclusion."

The President charged, too, that "legislative actions such as this hinder rather than assist in the search for a negotiated settlement."

The procurement authorization bill provides for continuation of construction on the anti-ballistic missile system, as well as other research and development programs. It also includes an amendment removing the President's authority to ban chrome imports from Rhodesia.

Press secretary Ronald L. Ziegler said the Mansfield amendment, a congressional move to force resumption of the import, does not go into effect until January 1972. And, Ziegler said, Nixon will take no action nor have any comment while negotiations are underway between Britain and Rhodesia on the future of the white settler rebel government in South Africa.

State Economic Woes Eyed by Task Force

Gov. Thomas J. Meskell, in an all-out attack on the state's economic problems, has created a "strike force" for recommending ways to improve the state's business and employment climate.

The governor explained that the designation "strike force" in place of "task force" was for emphasis. He appointed Sol Cohen, a 48-year-old retired Stamford industrialist, as chairman of the "strike force."

Meskell said that most of the funds for the "strike force" will come from the federal government, through the New England Regional Commission. The rest will come from the governor's contingency fund.

Meskell said that the "strike force" will be made up of representatives of business and industry on the one hand, and labor on the other. The governor said he wants to see the groundwork for federal grants for peace-related research which he predicted will be offered to the states soon.

Commissioner Dorman said he thinks the federal funds to Connecticut would best be spent on many smaller and diversified plants, rather than concentrating state efforts on two or three of the larger industries.

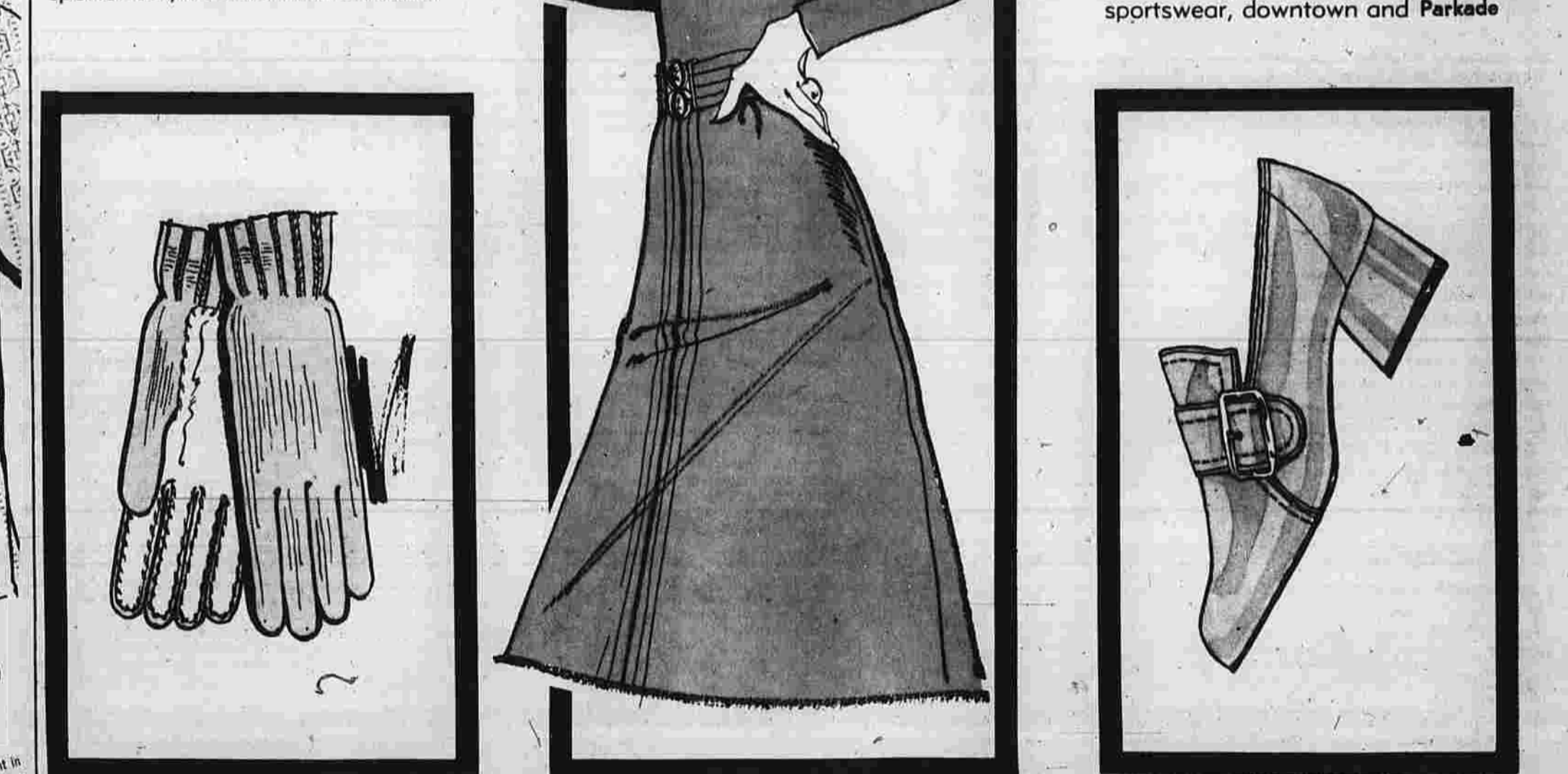

Peace Research Committee Formed at Indiana Campus

By OBYAN RICKARD
NORTH MANCHESTER Ind. (AP) - The idea of studying peace—just like you'd study mathematics or history—is spreading across American campuses and a Consortium of Peace Research, Education and Development has been formed at Manchester College here to coordinate the programs.

It was at Manchester, in 1948, that the first peace studies curriculum was developed and Dr. Allen C. Deeter, current director of peace studies at the school, is executive secretary of the 68-member consortium.

Deeter said that among the colleges now offering peace studies programs are Notre Dame University, Harvard College, St. Louis University, the University of Pennsylvania, Manhattan College and Wayne University.

Manchester's program, he explained, was founded by the late Dr. Gladys Muir. When she retired in 1969, the program flourished, but it was revived in the late 60's, Deeter said.

The subjects of the classes at Manchester, a Church of the Brethren school, vary.

One class, conducted by Deeter in a lounge, discussed the Indian leader, Mohandas K. Gandhi.

One student, Carol Antaki of Bolivia, said she believed such a nonviolent philosophy would not work in South America because "revolutions and violence" dominated politics.

Fred Lacey, Louisville, Ohio, another student, said the purpose of the Indian philosopher was to improve the character of everyone, and Jane Wagoner, Mobernon, Kan., and are International Relations, was Kristina Hellenberg of Chicago, Ind. argued whether Gandhi was a sick politician.

The class also discussed the modern world and the question

Ford Seeks Price Hike

DETROIT (AP) — Ford Motor Co. has filed a request with the Price Commission for permission to raise prices on 1972 model cars and trucks, the firm announced Tuesday.

A spokesman said only that the petition asked price boosts for "some of Ford's cars and trucks" but declined to specify the models involved or the amounts sought.

The most likely models, however, are the Ford Torino, Mercury Montego and the Lincoln Continental Mark IV.

When price controls were first announced in August, Ford indicated it would seek exemptions for the three cars because they were extensively remodeled for 1972.

Ford already has announced price increases for its Capri and Pinto models, but these were not directly related to Phase 2 controls because the new prices had been announced before Aug. 15 and "substantial" numbers of the cars had been sold at the higher prices before the freeze.

Ford also received permission under Phase 1 rules to increase the price of the Ford Thunderbird and some Mercury models.

Rham District School Board Faced With \$13,000 Deficit

The Regional Board of Education has agreed to cover the current year school year with a \$13,000 deficit, due to an unbudgeted \$8,000 increase in insurance rates and the application of the Unemployment Compensation Act to school systems.

Appearing before the Board Monday night was Richard Grant, executive vice president of the Rham District School Board, who has been through a business transaction recently with the school system.

Grant stated that he had reviewed the school's insurance needs with the former agent and that the standard 4 per cent rate increase figured by agents was applied in giving the school an estimate of its insurance needs.

However, Grant said that insurance rates for schools went up over the previous average rates and the evaluation on the buildings themselves went from the usual 4 per cent to an unanticipated 8.5 per cent. After considerable haggling around the various insurance companies, Grant said he finally reached out to be defeated that Aetna Insurance changed their previous outlook on school insurance to the extent that they would begin doing some underwriting in rural school districts.

Although he was able to procure an insurance policy for Rham with a stable rate for the three years, Grant said, "We're in trouble by \$8,000" over and above what was submitted to the board at budget time last April.

In addition, coverage this year is for 80 per cent of the replacement cost of the facilities whereas last year it was for 90 per cent. This year's deductible clause has also risen to a high of \$250,000, although other deductible clauses have risen only from \$50,000 to \$60,000.

Grant told the board that the Rham district has no other insurance companies are returning to underwrite insurance for schools and that it is increasingly difficult to get adequate coverage at reasonable rates.

Board members discussed the \$8,000 expense with the question looming of whether the board should go to the towns now and ask for the money or whether they should wait. Member Charles Marlborough, effective Nov. 18, Phelps of Andover suggested was accepted by the board with the hope that the board could request the funds at the spring budget meeting.

Right to March

Fed up with public opinion, the city fathers in a certain community decided to strike a decisive blow for peace and quiet.

Within days, a group of dissenters went marching in defiance of the new ordinance. Hauled into court, they claimed that the ban was unconstitutional.

"Not so," replied the city. "Under our charter, we have the authority to keep the public peace as we see fit."

But the court decided that the ordinance was indeed unconstitutional, and that the paraders could not be punished. The court said:

"It has been customary from time immemorial, in all free countries, for people to parade together. These processions are among the incidental conditions of city life, and are as much to be expected as any other public meetings."

Of course, an outright ban on all parades is not common. Very common, however, is a requirement that paraders must get a permit. Is this lesser restriction constitutional?

Mainly, it depends on the grounds rules under which the permits are issued. In one city, the mayor had unlimited discretion as to who could have a permit and who could not.

This time, when a religious sect put on a parade without a permit, a court upheld the law and fined the paraders for disobeying it.

The court said the right to march, like all other rights, could be confined within reasonable limits.

"Civil liberties," added the court, "imply the exercise of an organized society maintaining public order without which liberty itself would be lost."

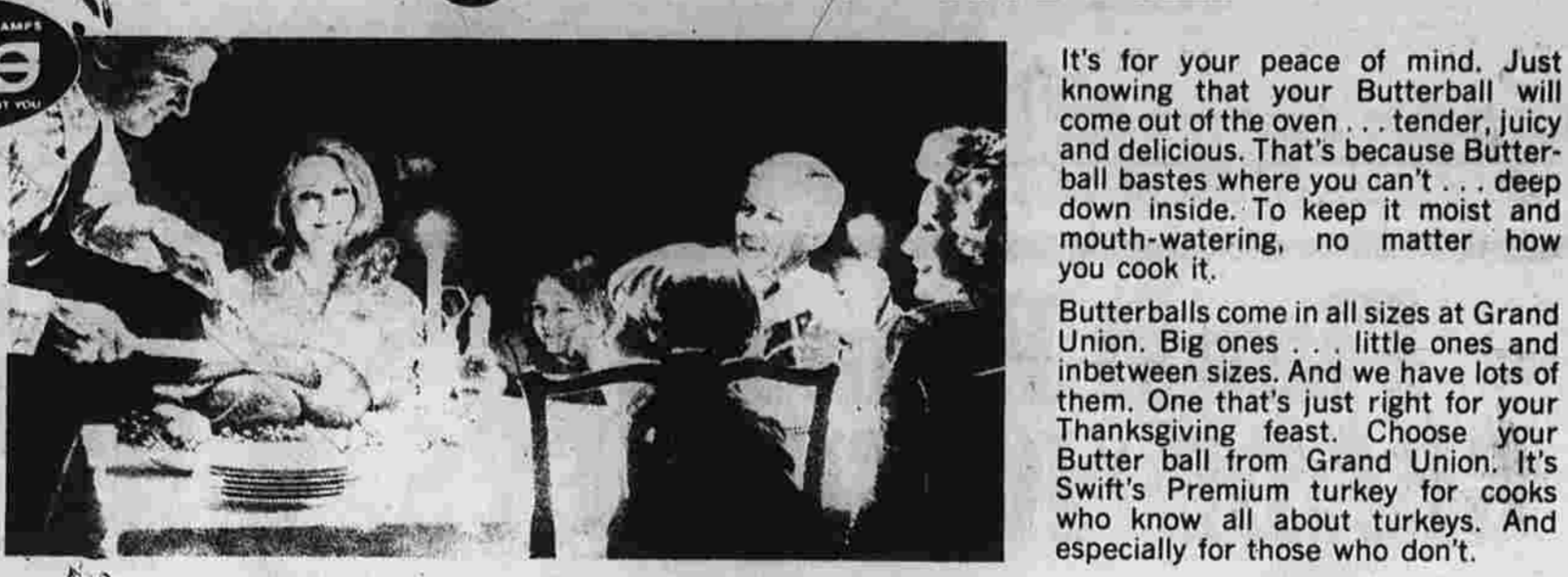

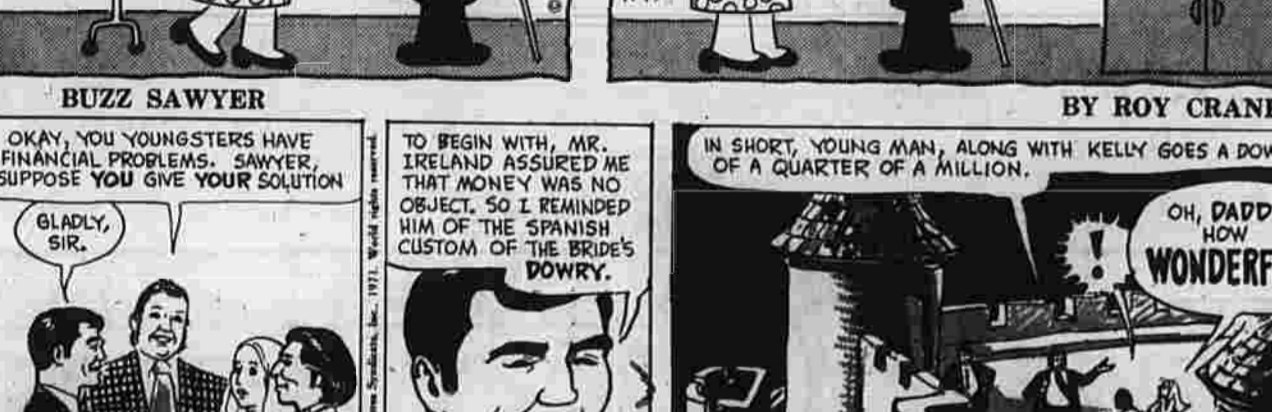

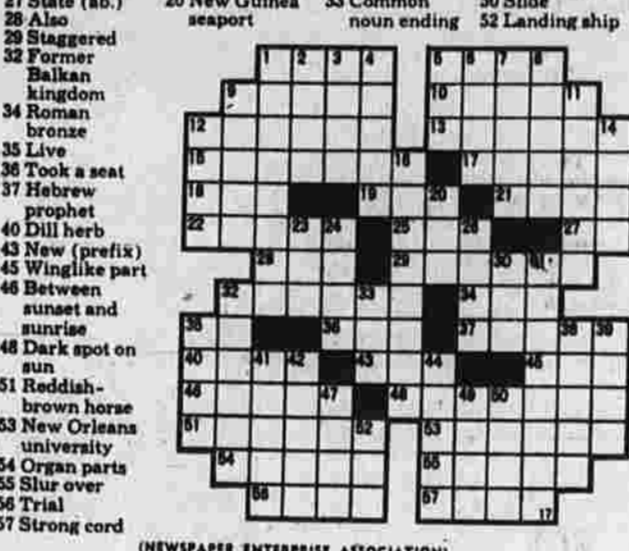

Blaming skyrocketing labor demands as the main factor in increased health care costs, the administrator of Manchester Memorial Hospital today recommended state legislation which would give hospitals what he described as an even break in salary negotiations with labor unions.
Edward M. State Representative Morris Cohen, D., of Bloomfield, who is chairman of the committee, praised Manchester Memorial Hospital as "one of the few hospitals in the state to keep costs to a minimum."
"That's why we asked you here to testify," he told Kenney, "to find out how you are doing and to see if the rest of the state can do better than they now are doing."

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate turned back 49 to 46 a Republican move today to kill a Democratic-backed presidential campaign financing plan which could give major party nominees \$20.4 million each in public funds next year.
The key test apparently indicated that the Democrats have the votes to write the plan into the \$26 billion tax cut bill.
But Republicans indicated they might continue to fight the proposal by offering a series of amendments to it.
The move of Sen. Charles McC. Mathias, R-Md., to kill the plan was beaten with votes of 49 Democrats. It was supported by 48 Republicans and 3 Democrats.
The vote was preceded by a bitter, shouting, partisan debate. Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield, a leading proponent of the plan introduced by Sen. John C. Stennis, D-Miss., declared "some form of public financing of campaigns is absolutely necessary to put an end to the day of labor's man, industry's man and whoever's man."
"Unless something is done, there is no way to prevent our national politics from becoming the exclusive preserve of the rich or of those who serve one of the economic interests of the nation."
Sen. Lowell P. Weicker Jr., R-Conn., declared that the proposal "amelia" and represents an attempt by the Democrats to legislate their way back into office.
"This is an affront to democracy," he shouted. "In effect what the Democratic Party is telling the people of this nation is that you will give. There is no consideration as to the quality of the candidates."
Mansfield interrupted to say that the income tax checkoff procedure designed to raise the money was entirely voluntary and that no one had to contribute who did not want to.
"This is not aimed at President Nixon or anyone else," he asserted. "But do you think it is fair for one man to have \$50 million and another man to have \$50 million?"

Senate Unit Vote Rejects Move To Check Viet Funds

Noon Tuesday Panel Sets Vote Deadline On High Court Nominees

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate Judiciary Committee agreed today to vote no later than noon Tuesday on President Nixon's Supreme Court nominees, Lewis F. Powell Jr. and William H. Rehnquist.
A motion by Sen. Birch Bayh, D-Ind., to reopen the hearings for one day for questioning of Rehnquist, an assistant attorney general, was rejected by a vote of 10 to 2.
However, Bayh said he and some other committee members will submit a list of questions to Rehnquist relative to charges that he interfered with Negro voting in Phoenix, Ariz., that he had belonged to a right-wing organization and with respect to what Bayh called "philosophical injustices" in testimony by the Justice Department official.
