Cummings Leads Plaintiffs in Suit On Redistricting

By SOL R. COHEN (Herald Reporter)

Manchester Democratic Town Chairman Ted Cummings heads a list of nine plaintiffs in a suit which challenges the constitutionality of the state's new redistricting plan.

The suit, called Cummings seeking immediate implementation of the redistricting plan, was filed in Hartford Federal Court today. It seeks an injunction for halting state implementation of the plan, pending a court decision.

The attorney for the plaintiffs is Robert Satter, counsel to the legislature's majority Democrats.

The suit charges that the reapportionment plan, delivered to Secretary of the State Gloria Schaffer on Sept. 20, discriminates thousands of voters in Bristol, Enfield and Fairfield, that it calls for a split district in Derby, and that its state Senate districts are not "compact."

It charges also that the plan, judges in a 2 to 1 decision, is defective because it does not have street-by-street descriptions of where the new districts are. The suit claims also that the plan violates a condition that all districts be contiguous, since one House district in Ansonia is cut in two by another district.

Vote Backs Campaign Cost Plan

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate turned back 49 to 46 a Republican move today to kill a Democratic-backed presidential campaign financing plan which could give major party nominees \$20.4 million each in public funds next year.

The key test apparently indicated that the Democrats have the votes to write the plan into the \$26 billion tax cut bill.

But Republicans indicated they might continue to fight the proposal by offering a series of amendments to it.

The move of Sen. Charles McC Mathias, R-Md., to kill the plan was beaten with votes of 49 Democrats. It was supported by 48 Republicans and 3 Democrats.

The vote was preceded by a bitter shouting, partisan debate. Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield, a leading proponent of the plan introduced by Sen. John C. Stennis, D-Miss., declared "some form of public financing of campaigns is absolutely necessary to put an end to the day of labor's man, industry's man and whoever's man."

"Unless something is done, there is no way to prevent our national politics from becoming the exclusive preserve of the rich or of those who serve one of the economic interests of the nation."

Sen. Lowell P. Weicker Jr., R-Conn., declared that the proposal "amelia" and represents an attempt by the Democrats to legislate their way back into office.

"This is an affront to democracy," he shouted. "In effect what the Democratic Party is telling the people of this nation is that you will give. There is no consideration as to the quality of the candidates."

Mansfield interrupted to say that the income tax checkoff procedure designed to raise the money was entirely voluntary and that no one had to contribute who did not want to.

"This is not aimed at President Nixon or anyone else," he asserted. "But do you think it is fair for one man to have \$50 million and another man to have \$50 million?"

At Peace Table Allies Fail To Break Deadlock

PARIS (AP)—The United States and South Vietnam, in a hard-line tactical move, tried to pull the Vietnam peace talks out of deadlock today, but got nowhere.

Ambassadors William J. Porter and Pham Dong Lam said in effect they had nothing to say to the allied position and called on the Communist side to make a constructive reply or take positive action.

Porter limited his prepared conference speech to 23 words and Lam's talk was only two or three minutes long.

Communist delegates, leaving the brief 1968 session of the talks, repeated long-held positions. North Vietnamese Minister of State Xuan Thuy turned Porter's demand around and said he hoped the United States would give "serious consideration to our point of view."

Porter told the Communists: "There is nothing new in your statements today. You are using the same stale material I have heard since my arrival here. We have repeatedly made our position clear. We are awaiting a constructive reply and, therefore, have nothing further to say."

The conference session was set for Dec. 2, skipping the U.S. Thanksgiving Day holiday Nov. 25.

Asked if Porter's remark indicated that the United States planned to walk out of the conference unless it got a "constructive reply," a U.S. spokesman said this was not the case. He had no further comment.

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Kenney Says Labor Hikes Hospitals' Costs

Blaming skyrocketing labor demands as the main factor in increased health care costs, the administrator of Manchester Memorial Hospital today recommended state legislation which would give hospitals what he described as an even break in salary negotiations with labor unions.

Edward M. Kenney, testifying before the legislature's public health and safety committee, remarked, "You can spend a lot of time discussing group purchasing, the makeup of boards of trustees, design of hospitals, funding of depreciation, the physician's role on the board of trustees, and so on, but labor costs are the guts of the problem."

"Labor costs," he said, "represent 65 to 75 per cent of our expense dollar, and this is the dilemma we are facing. Couple this with social legislation, some of which comes right out of this very building (the State Capitol), and you find your answers."

State Representative Morris Cohen, D, of Bloomfield, who is chairman of the committee, praised Manchester Memorial Hospital as "one of the few hospitals in the state to keep costs to a minimum."

"That's why we asked you here to testify," he told Kenney, "to find out how you are doing to see if the rest of the state can do better than they now are doing."

Noon Tuesday Panel Sets Vote Deadline On High Court Nominees

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate Judiciary Committee agreed today to vote not later than noon Tuesday on President Nixon's Supreme Court nominees, Lewis F. Powell Jr. and William H. Rehnquist.

A motion by Sen. Birch Bayh, D-Ind., to reopen the hearings for one day for questioning of Rehnquist, an assistant attorney general, was rejected by a vote of 10 to 2.

However, Bayh said he and some other committee members will submit a list of questions to Rehnquist relative to charges that he interfered with Negro voting in Phoenix, Ariz., that he had belonged to a right-wing organization and with respect to what Bayh called "philosophical injustices" in testimony by the Justice Department official.

Meany in Scathing Attack On New Economic Controls

MIAMI BEACH (AP)—Members have agreed to attack AFL-CIO President George Meany scathingly in a new economic control program. Meany said Secretary of Labor J. D. Hodgson had first told him that Judge Meany would be "completely out of the job" before he was named chairman of a union delegation to try to sell his program to 1,000 union delegates.

"Put on your best bib and tucker," Meany stated in an announcement, "I am scheduled to appear at 10:30 a.m. to the convention representing nearly 14 million workers in 117 unions."

The announcement came at the AFL-CIO convention in Miami, Fla., where Meany's 48-minute speech in which he accused the Nixon administration of seeking to blame labor for the nation's economic ills of inflation and high unemployment.

The White House also announced Nixon's trip to attend the AFL-CIO convention and said he will spend the weekend at his Key Biscayne home.

Nixon planned to fly to Florida Thursday evening and probably will return to Washington late Monday.

Highway System 76% Completed

WASHINGTON (AP) — More than 76 per cent of the 42,000-mile interstate highway system is open to traffic, Transportation Secretary John A. Volpe announced today.

A report prepared by the Federal Highway Administration showed 32,392 miles open, construction under way on 4,115 miles, engineering or right-of-way acquisition in progress on 4,386 miles and 1,607 miles that had not progressed beyond the talking stage as of Sept. 30.

No state has completed its full allocation of interstate highway, most of which are financed by 90 per cent federal funding and 10 per cent by the state involved.

The Highway Trust Fund, which gets its money from road-use taxes, has financed the federal government's share of the 44,000-mile system since the accelerated program began in 1964, department officials said.

"The President is going to have to take definite steps to make certain that the Federal Reserve does, indeed, carry out monetary policy in a manner consistent with an economic recovery program."

State Lifting Ban on Insurer In Overcharge

HARTFORD (AP) — The state Insurance Department lifted a sales ban Wednesday on a Philadelphia-based insurance firm accused of overcharging customers.

Insurance Commissioner Paul B. Altman said he had notified the Union Fidelity Life Insurance Co. that the state order preventing the firm from doing business in Connecticut had been lifted.

Altman issued the order last month after he had received complaints that the company was billing policyholders and insurance applicants at higher premium rates than the company advertised. The firm had had second billings to policyholders at the same incorrect rates, even after the customers made the proper corrections, according to Altman.

He noted Wednesday that the company "has cooperated with and issued corrected insurance policies to 714 Connecticut residents who received incorrect policies and premium notices. Further, all Connecticut policyholders who paid the incorrect premiums have received a check for the overcharge."

He added that the firm had explained the overcharges were a computer error.

Regular signs of the original organizers of a group called Artisans for America in an effort to find out if Rehnquist ever was a member.

Atty. Gen. John N. Mitchell denied Wednesday a report published in the St. Louis Post-Dispatch that Rehnquist had belonged to the organization. Mitchell said an FBI investigation clearly indicated this was not the case.

Eastland called the charge another desperate attempt to smear Rehnquist and said it was based on "the rankiest form of hearsay."

Bayh said he and other liberal Democrats on the committee who have raised questions about Rehnquist's civil liberties and civil liberties record, agreed to vote Tuesday because they did not want to be arbitrary or engaged in a filibuster but simply wanted the record to be complete.

Bayh said he does not believe Rehnquist adheres to the tenets of right-wing organizations like the John Birch Society or Artisans for America but thought questions that have been raised should be answered.

The charge that Rehnquist, as a lawyer in Phoenix, interfered with Negro attempts to vote in the 1964 election was made in two affidavits that the Justice Department has branded as false.

Committee approval of Rehnquist and Powell appear assured if their nominations can be brought to a vote.

Kennedy said the committee's hearings on Rehnquist should be reported, but Sen. Philip A. Hart, D-Mich., said a reporter he "can't imagine that happening."

A leader of liberal Democrats in the Senate, Hart declined to say how he will vote, but he said there is no question in the majority of the committee and of the Senate support both nominations.

Hart added, however, the same was true at the time the committee approved Nixon's nomination of Judge Clement F. Haynsworth Jr. of North Carolina and of G. Harold Clegg Jr. of Florida for a prior vacancy on the court. The Senate later rejected both those nominations.

Little opposition has developed to Powell, a former president of the American Bar Association, and at the committee's meeting last week Bayh moved to report his nomination favorably to the Senate.

Senators supporting both nominations were unwilling to permit a vote on Powell's nomination unless Rehnquist's was held at the same time—a strategy they have given to in other areas, no limit in sign of abandoning.

"I'd oppose separating them," said Senate Republican Leader Hugh Scott of Pennsylvania, a member of the Judiciary Committee.

Regional District 8 Board of Education Monday night was given a capsule presentation and review of the programs offered by the social studies department, she said. If the first trial works well, it is hoped to enroll up to 20 students in the dental assistant program next year. Coordinator of the dental assistant program MCC is Mrs. Lee C. Caputo, assistant professor of secretarial science at the Burgdorf Health Center.

KITCHEN TIPS FOR BAKED FRUITCAKES

- grease pan for a large cake, then line with cooking parchment or greased heavy brown paper to keep crust from becoming too dark and heavy. Non-stick pans can also be lined. Pans for smaller or muffin size cakes need greasing only.
- position cake below center of oven and regardless of shape and size, be watchful of oven time.
- a shallow pan of hot water on lowest oven shelf keeps cake moist and crust lighter during baking.
- cake is done when center remains firm or springs back while pressed lightly with fingertip. Toopstick test is not always accurate for fruits stuck to the toopstick even though butter is cooked.
- trim with additional candied fruit and California walnut halves dipped in corn syrup and held in shine. Seal in foil or plastic wrap, shaping to keep out air and moisture.
- aging fruitcake makes for neater cut slices, melds all the delicate flavors and gives the fruits time to impart their moisture into the batter. Storage depends on type; a rich-fruit cake should be aged for a month or more whereas a quick fruitcake is better after 48 hours.

Batter measures about 9-1/2 cups and weighs about 5 pounds, 4 ounces.

35-ounce juice cans were used for cakes shown in photographs. Note: May use caramel apple cake mix or spice cake mix—most any of spicy mixes. Package weight may vary slightly but product will be good. Beating cake mix with water and letting stand removes some of leavening which is not needed in fruitcakes. Top of cake may be drizzled with powdered sugar mixed with water to thick paste.

From Your Neighbor's Kitchen

Man has eaten nuts from very early times. In many parts of the world, they play an important dietary role. Rich in food value, they provide energy, essential vitamins and minerals. Because of their fat content, they are satisfying to the appetite.

Walnuts are the most popular ingredient nut with the homemaker. Last year, as many shelled walnuts were purchased as the combined total of pecans and almonds. The most popular purchase was walnuts in the shell, with the holiday season being the heaviest buying time.

Pecans are the second most popular ingredient nut. The nut can sales for last year were double those made for almonds. Unlike walnuts and pecans which sell primarily in our own market, almonds are sold most heavily in foreign markets.

Walnuts or any other nuts should not rattle in the shell. If they do, it is an indication that the kernels are dried out. Any nut in the shell should be free of cracks, scars or holes. Nuts can be frozen. Simply place the kernels in a freezer container or plastic bag. In the latter case, all the air should be squeezed out of the bag. Just one thing after thawing, the nuts must be dried out.

The hazelnut and the filbert are the same thing. The hazelnut is the wild form of the nut cultivated. Those we buy at the market are, of course, filberts. Helen Mitchell who has been food editor of McCall's and House Beautiful, claims that the filbert is best if it is nut is lightly toasted before using. Her recipe:

To Toast Filberts: Spread whole filberts in a shallow pan and bake in a 400-degree oven 10-15 minutes. Stir or shake the nuts occasionally during baking. To skin: Toast as directed, then rub nuts in a towel or between the hands to remove skins.

One of the most elegant cakes I have ever tasted is hazelnut torte. I enjoyed it at Luchow's Restaurant in New York when Leonard Jan Mitchell owned the establishment. He said of his recipe: "This is the Luchow dessert which makes the most delicious diet and is a favorite of me as well as women. It is the most delectable of all the old-time German tortes for which this restaurant has been famous..."

Hazelnut (or Filbert) Torte (German Nusskorte) Cake: 6 tablespoons butter, 1/2 pound (1 cup) granulated sugar, 9 eggs, separated, 2 cups sifted cake flour, 2 teaspoons vanilla.

Cream butter and sugar together until thoroughly blended. Add well-beaten egg yolks; stir. Fold in flour; mix evenly. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites and vanilla. Pour into lightly greased spongecake form. Bake in slow oven (325) about 45 minutes or until cake has shrunk from sides of pan. Let cool on cake rack. Slice in three layers.

Filling: 1/2 pound shelled hazelnuts or filberts, 1 1/2 pints heavy cream, 1/2 cup granulated sugar. Spread hazelnuts in pan and place in moderate oven (325) for 15-20 minutes. Then plunge nuts into boiling water; drain; rub off skins with towel. Grind medium-fine.

Whip cream; combine with nuts and sugar. Spread between cake layers. Topping: 1/4 pound (1-1/2 cups) 4X sugar, 3 or 4 tablespoons water, 1/4 pound (1 cup) shelled hazelnuts.

Mix sugar and water together smoothly. Spread over top and sides of torte. Toast nuts, remove skins, and grind as above. Sprinkle on sides and decorate top with toasted nuts. Serves 8-10.

Nuts and dried fruits combine well as a snack or after-dinner treat. Port or madeira wine is a good accompaniment. The English are fond of walnuts with port.

Jordan almonds are popular for holidays and often at weddings. They are almonds which have been coated with hard sugar in white or pastel colors. The French call them dragées. Supposedly, they originated in Rome and were used as a token of rejoicing on the occasion of a birth or marriage among the highborn families.

We still find this custom today.



particularly among the Mediterranean, Middle Eastern and North African countries. When King Hussein of Jordan was married, guests were presented with mother-of-pearl boxes filled with Jordan almonds. No one knows how they came to be called Jordan almonds.

The English walnut isn't English at all. A native of Persia, it was brought to England by the Romans. Because English furniture makers used the wood extensively, it was later mistakenly called the English walnut.

The black walnut takes its name from the bark of the tree. There are two native species of walnut in North America, the black and the white. The Indians called the white walnut, or bitternut, "wassequat." The shell of the black walnut is unbelieveably hard.

The early American settlers used the walnuts to good advantage even in soup. The black walnut trees were especially abundant in Michigan and Pennsylvania where black walnut soup is made with the finely chopped nuts, chicken broth, cream and seasonings. The Southerners made peanut soup utilizing peanut butter, chicken broth and cream, among other ingredients.

This year's crop of pecans is critically short in supply. Early supplies are distributed in the southern states first which is why we seldom see new pecans in our stores until November or December. Pecans are grown in all southern states from North Carolina to New Mexico. From the great pecan-producing state of Georgia, here is a tea-type bread, more like dessert.

Georgia Pecan Bread: 2 cups sifted flour, 3 teaspoons baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup dark brown sugar, 1 cup coarsely chopped pecans, 1 egg, well beaten, 1/2 cup milk, 2 tablespoons melted shortening, cooled.

Sift flour and measure with sifter. Mix sugar and water together smoothly. Spread over top and sides of torte. Toast nuts, remove skins, and grind as above. Sprinkle on sides and decorate top with toasted nuts. Serves 8-10.

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Brothers In Walk For UNICEF

ISTANBUL, Turkey (AP)—Two American brothers have left this last European outpost to continue their walk around the world in support of UNICEF—the United Nations Children's Fund.

The brothers estimate the whole trip should take about three years. "If all goes well, and it will, we plan to be back home in the United States sometime in 1973," said John.

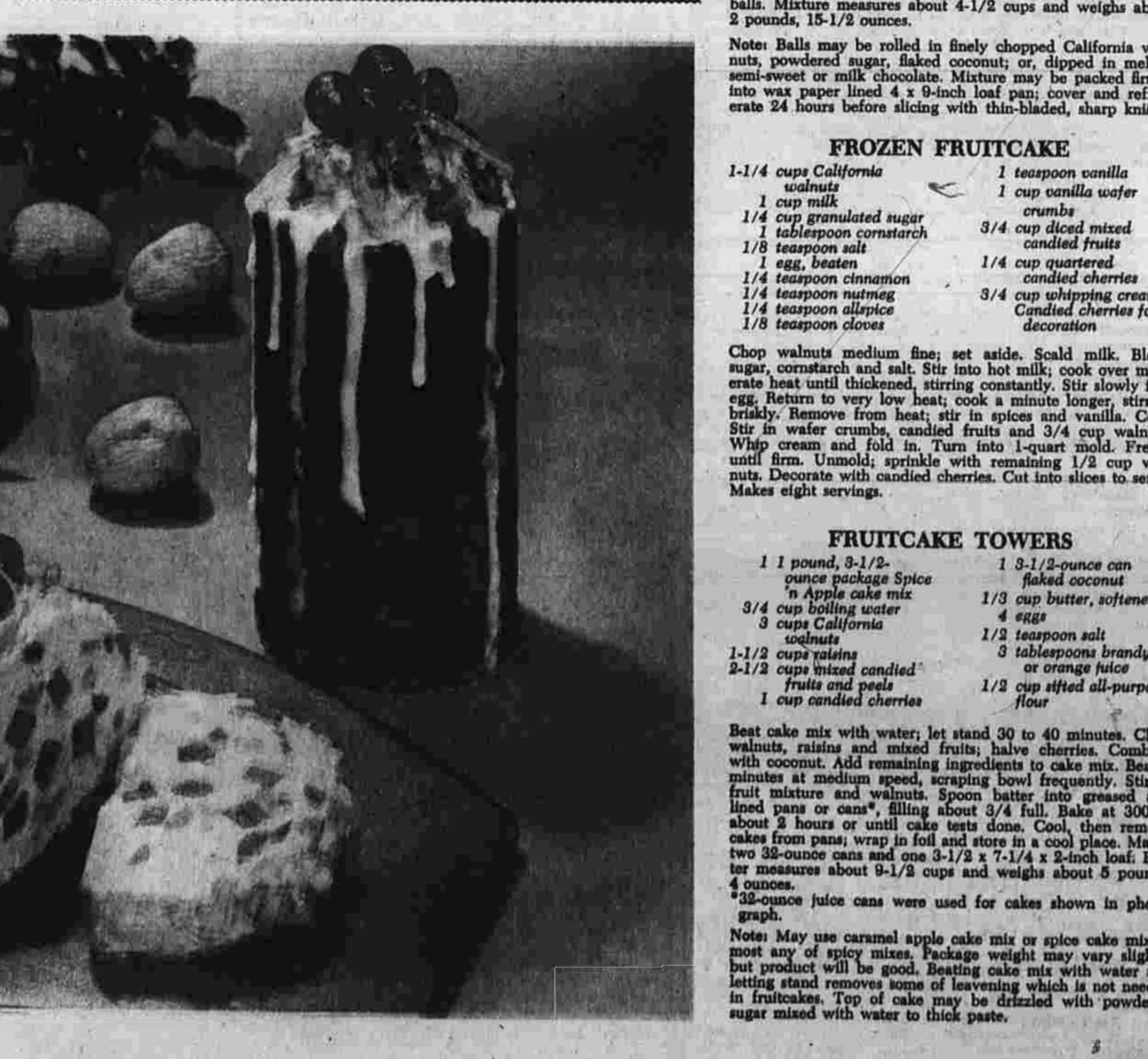

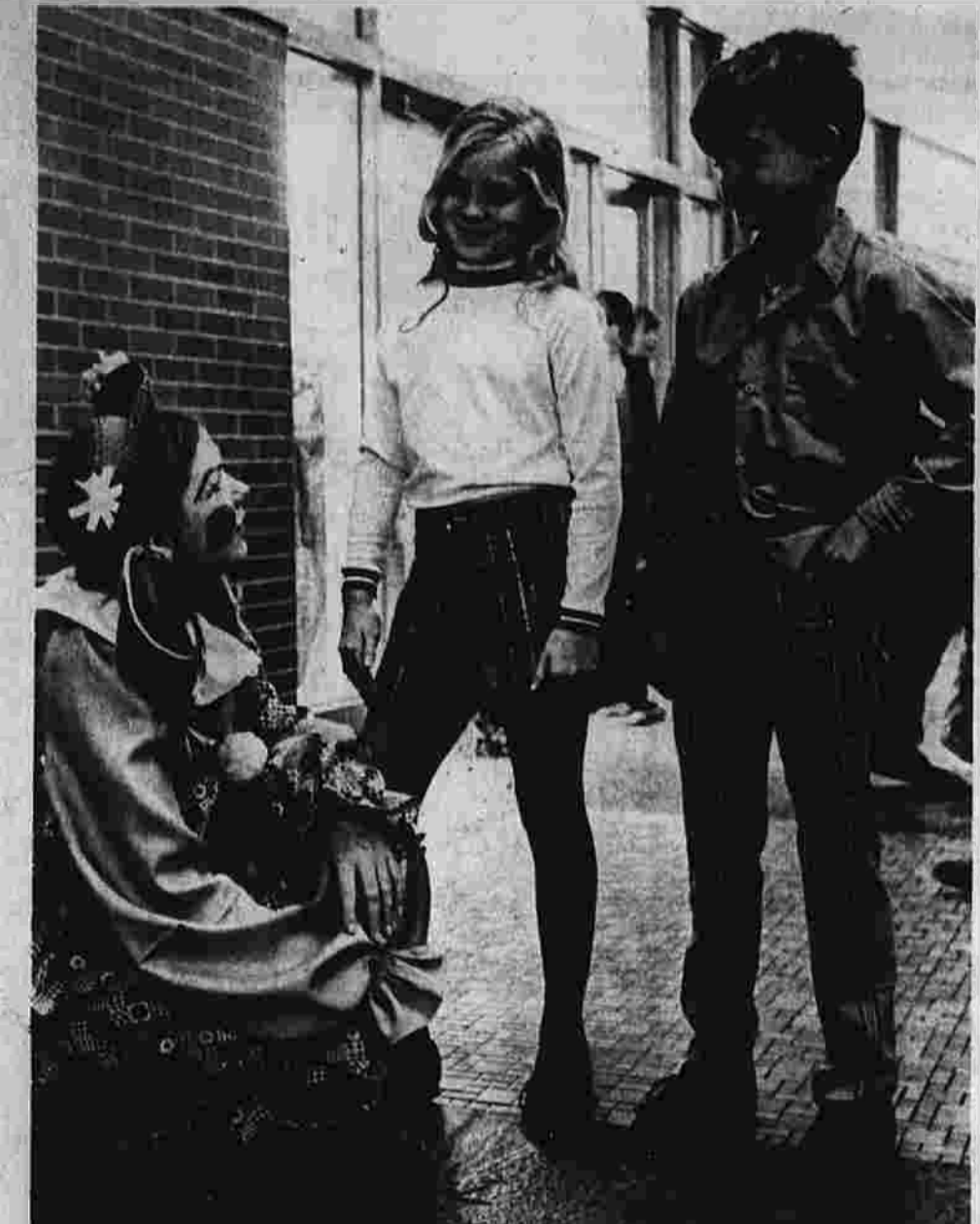

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Political Struggle Develops In Universities of Germany

BONN, Germany (AP) — A political struggle is shaping up in universities between a Marxist student organization and more conventional student associations.

The new group, called the Spartacus Marxist Students Union, has close ties to the Communist Party.

It has moved into a vacuum left by disintegration of the Socialist German Students Union or SDS.

Unlike SDS, which operated outside existing university institutions, Spartacus has set out to infiltrate them. It is named after a 1917 revolutionary committee set up by Communist leaders Karl Liebknecht and Rosa Luxemburg.

The group was founded last May. With less than 1,000 members, it has gained control of student councils at leading universities largely because of good organization and discipline.

It is facing its first challenge at Bonn University which called a convention to amend its laws governing student groups.

Spartacus disrupted two attempts to hold the public meeting. The university administration has decided to hold the meeting behind closed doors, if necessary under police protection.

The Christian Democratic Student Association complained "methods which the Nazis used to come to power in 1933."

The old SDS lost support when students tired of street and campus violence. The violence reached its climax in 1968 following an attempt to kill the most prominent leader, Rudi Dutschke, in West Berlin, 1968.

Germany Loses Another Plane

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Crackdown Anticipated On New England Bookies

BOSTON Bookies are taking bets that the heat is going to be turned on like never before. The cause of the nervousness is what some sources have indicated is a concerted federal drive against the high level bookmaking operation in the region. The FBI last weekend conducted what was described as "the largest gambling raid in the history of New England law enforcement." No arrests were made, but agents were armed with 71 federal search warrants to serve in eastern Massachusetts and southern New Hampshire. A spokesman for the Justice Department in Boston said at the time that the warrants were issued "for the purpose of seizing evidence and instrumentalities of illegal gambling." The evidence is now being analyzed and will be presented to a special organized crime grand jury which has been sitting on and off since May to investigate corruption and illegal gambling. James L. Handley, a special agent in charge of the Boston FBI office, declined to disclose the nature or quantity of evidence seized, but said the raids culminated a "lengthy investigation."

Andover Selectmen Mull Feasibility Of Purchasing New Tractor

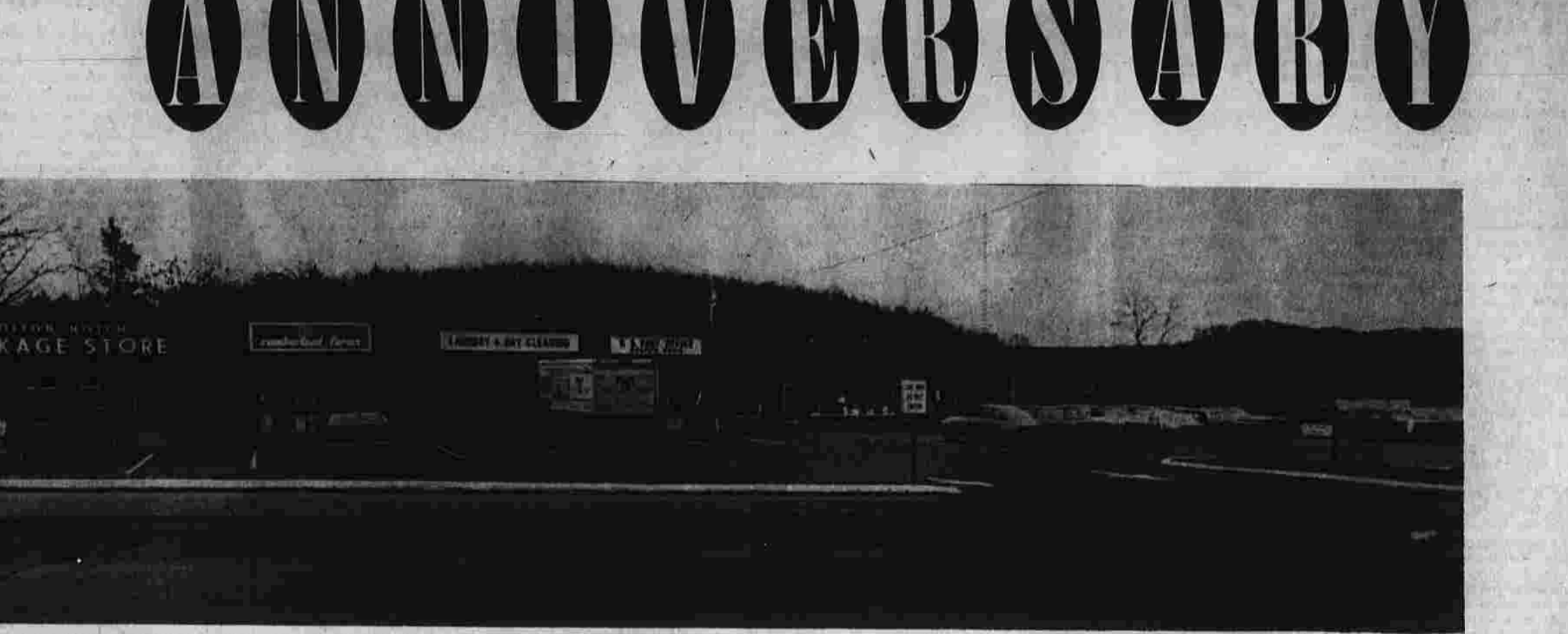

Post said that the town is presently renting tractors to perform the necessary work. One tractor is being rented from Percy B. Cook, to mow grass at the sides of the roads; the other from J. Cuyler Hutchinson to load sand, clean culverts, etc. Post said the latter tractor, an older model which cannot be used for much of the work, is being purchased. A new tractor of the type thought adequate for serving the town was estimated to cost from \$6,700 to \$18,000. Post said he feels the town's needs would be served with only a day prior with receipt of the warning; and this, he said, was addressed to "hook holder" and could easily have been discarded. The only other official notification of the meeting was on the annual report in the corner where normally a return address is listed. This, too, he said, could easily be overlooked unless one knew from experience to look there. 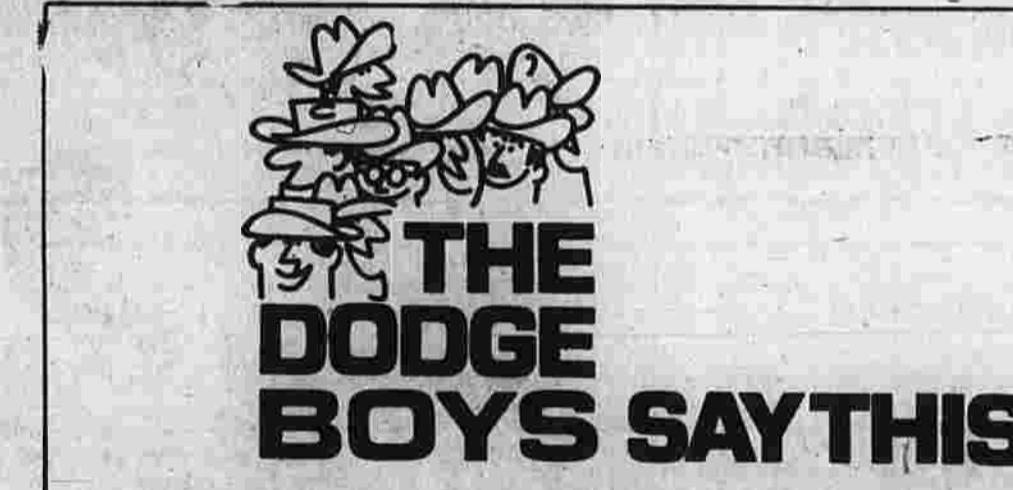

COHEN (Herald Reporter) Connecticut's entry into the lottery business came one step closer today with the announcement that a Princeton, N.J., firm will be hired to set up the state's system. Joseph B. Burns, executive secretary of the state gambling commission, said that a contract will be signed soon with Mathematics Inc., the same company that set up the lottery system in New Jersey and New Hampshire. He said that details of the contract still are to be worked out but that the cost is expected to be in excess of \$200,000. He said that four other firms were considered by the commission before today's decision. He added that the pact "will be full enough to provide for a million profit in the first year weekly or daily or any interim and already has advanced \$21 million in expenses. Thus, the "take" for the period February through June, if the lottery is operating for the whole period, will be a net profit of \$1 million, an excellent record in the field, and

The State Department of Transportation has funds to temporarily subsidize the Connecticut Co., but Gov. Thomas Meskill has stated that no state money will be given to the bus line unless municipalities served by the buses agree to pay a share.

Last week Grogan appealed to community officials to aid the company, but their reactions indicated that the cities and towns don't have the resources to subsidize public transportation.

Meanwhile, meetings of many groups continue in an effort to solve the bus crisis. This morning, negotiations between the Connecticut Co. and the transit union continued in an special meeting of the Connecticut Conference of Mayors was called in Hartford.

SANJON (AP)—The South Vietnamese command claimed today that American and South Vietnamese air strikes and ground troops killed 146 North Vietnamese in the second major battle in the central highlands this week. A spokesman, Lt. Col. Do Viet, said there were no South Vietnamese casualties. He said the action took place Thursday 15 miles east of Dak To and about 40 miles from the intersection of the border of Vietnam, Cambodia and Laos. This is close to the area of the battle last Sunday in which the South Vietnamese reported 168 North Vietnamese and 29 of their own men killed and 38 South Vietnamese wounded. Judge Suspends Sentences For Black Panthers

NEW HAVEN (AP)—Both also were sentenced to suspended sentences for charges in a murder case. Judge Otto LaScaucia pleaded guilty to charges of conspiracy to murder against the two defendants on Marjie's recommendation. Nixon quoted from AFL-CIO President George Meany's sharply critical speech Thursday in which Meany said, "If the President doesn't want our membership on the Pay Board on our terms, he knows what he can do."

Pay Unit Allows Coal Agreement To Take Effect

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Pay Board voted 10-3 today to allow the first year of the coal industry contract to go into effect without change. The board said the second and third years of the contract will be voted on as they near implementation. The board said the first-year provisions of the agreement between coal operators and United Mine Workers were "not unreasonably inconsistent with the criteria adopted by the board." According to the business members of the 15-member board, the first year of the contract provides for an 11 per cent increase in wages and a 4 per cent boost in welfare benefits.

Living Costs Rise Despite Price Freeze

WASHINGTON (AP)—The government reported today that the cost of living rose two-tenths of one per cent last month despite the price freeze. The increase was a result of higher prices for 1972 automobiles, winter and fall clothing and smelter. The increase was about half the average month-to-month increase that prevailed before the price freeze began Aug. 15. It compares with a three-tenths of one per cent increase in August and two-tenths of one per cent increase in September. The October increase puts the Consumer Price Index 2.4 per cent above a year ago, the highest since 1967. Month-to-month changes in the index have been less than half more than three and a half years. While prices crept upward despite the freeze, the Labor Department also said that average weekly earnings for private nonfarm jobs declined two pennies to \$19.11. The increase in prices for October.

Prospect Up For Halt In Bus Service

HARTFORD (AP)—The prospect of three of the state's largest cities being left without bus service Sunday has increased as a result of the breakdown of contract negotiations. Contract talks between the Connecticut Co. and the union representing bus drivers and mechanics broke off Thursday night without a settlement being reached. The Connecticut Co. serves Hartford, New Haven and Stamford and carries more than 100,000 passengers daily. A spokesman for the Amalgamated Transit Union, AFL-CIO, said the union rejected the company's latest proposal and that the company turned down the union's counter proposal. No further negotiating sessions were planned Sunday, but aides indicated they would be available for additional talks.
