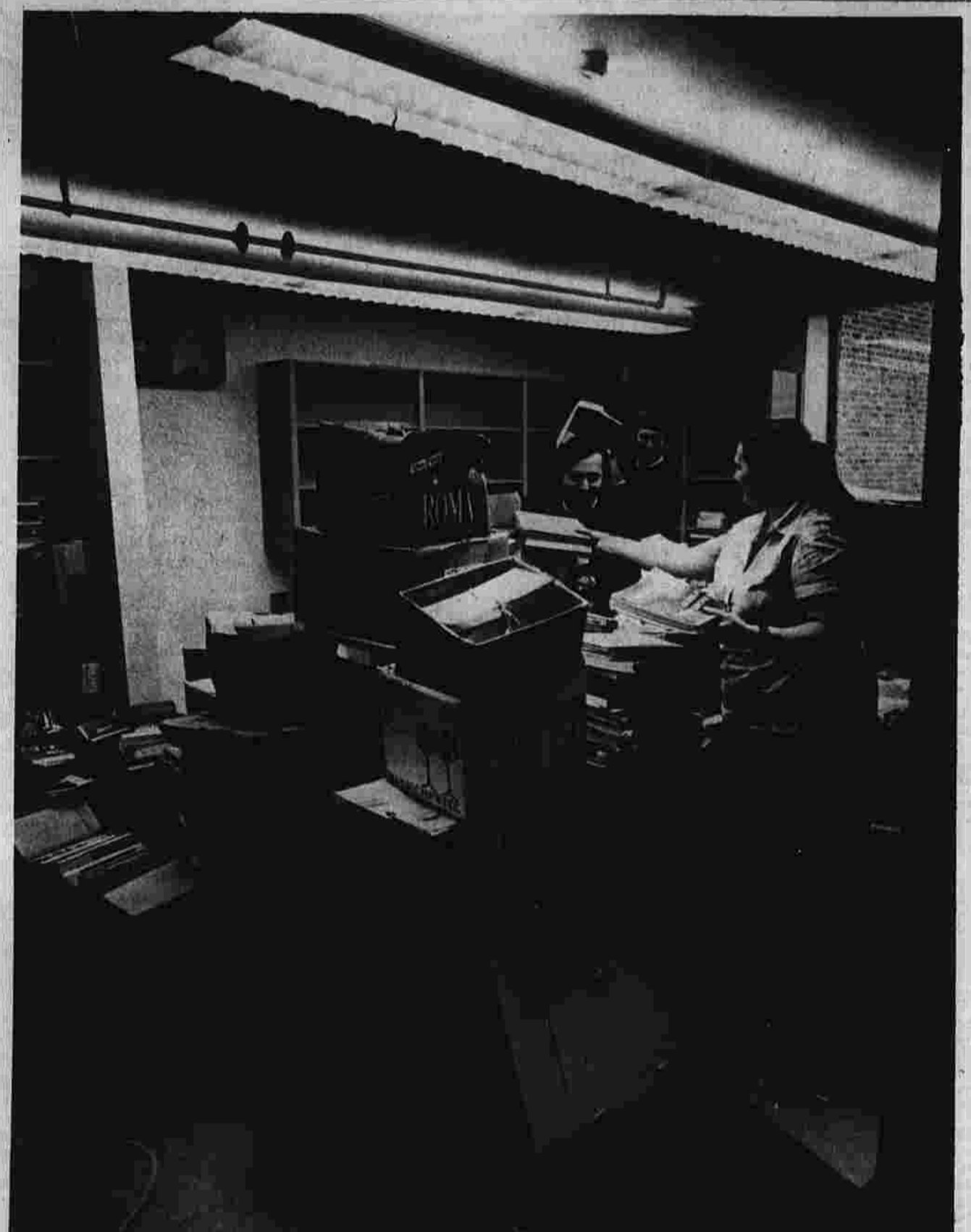

Ex-General Tells Why He Sought My Lai Probe

By HARRY F. ROSENTHAL. FT. MEAD, Md. (AP)—Former Brig. Gen. George H. Young Jr. said today he had no report of atrocities in My Lai when he ordered Col. Oran K. Henderson to investigate the March 1968 assault.

Young said the report was brought to him either the afternoon of the operation or the following day by Holliday and Maj. Frederick Watke, the commanders respectively of a helicopter battalion and company. One day later, Young said, he met with the two officers, Henderson and the late Lt. Col. Frank A. Barker, the commander of the assault troops. He said the meeting lasted only five or 10 minutes.

Young directly contradicted earlier testimony by Lt. Col. John Holliday, who said the general had been told 75 or 100 unidentifiable civilians were killed in My Lai.

"If Col. Holliday said that statement he is grossly mistaken," Young said.

Under cross-examination, Young said "to the best of my recollection the first person I had that noncombatants were killed was when I received Col. Henderson's oral report that report, Young said, did not come until five-seven days after he gave the order.

"It was conveyed to me that a report was made by a helicopter pilot who was on a rescue mission. It was that this pilot had observed Army ground troops while engaging the enemy which noncombatants caught in the crossfire," Young said.

BLACKWOOD CONVENTION GETS NUMBER OF ACES

By ALFRED SHEINWOLD

When the early bidding tells you that the partnership cards are probably good enough to produce a slam, you usually want to find out about aces and kings. If the opponents cannot take the first two tricks, you will take your chances on winning 12 tricks. The most common way of finding out about aces is the Blackwood Convention, as illustrated in today's hand.

Both sides vulnerable. Opening lead—Queen of Diamonds.

North jumps to three spades, South wants to be in a slam. If North has two or three aces, he wants to stay out of a slam. If North has only one ace, he is not interested. South will get to the king of hearts with a probability of 50 percent. The life of a bridge player is not all wine and roses.

To find out about North's aces, South jumps to four no-trump. This bid asks North to bid five clubs with no aces or with all four; five diamonds, with one ace; five hearts, with two aces; five spades, with three aces.

North obediently bids five hearts, showing two aces; and South thereupon jumps to six hearts. North does not even dream of bidding again because this series of bids indicates very strongly that an ace is missing.

Important Spot Cards

The bidding depends on aces, but the play depends on spot cards. Declarer takes the first trick with the ace of diamonds, draws three rounds of trumps and sets the king of hearts with one ace and another diamond, forcing South to ruff.

South cashes the queen and king of hearts, discovering the lead seven hearts. West follows with the ten, and dummy's last trump is used to ruff. Now South can return to his hand and cash the good six of hearts. If the six and five of hearts were exchanged, South might well go for his vulnerable slam. It would be very unlikely to find the trumps breaking 3-2; the hearts, 5-1; and the king of clubs offside.

Cambodia Offensive

SAIGON (AP) — Thousands of South Vietnamese troops under an umbrella of U.S. air power launched a major offensive today against North Vietnamese supply lines in eastern Cambodia.

No ground fighting was reported, but officers in the field claimed that air strikes killed 40 of the enemy near Chrum. The thrust north of Highway 7 about 30 miles northwest of Saigon is aimed at rear staging areas of three enemy divisions close to the border in Cambodia on the outskirts of Phnom Penh. Field commanders said they hoped to reduce the threat of attacks on South Vietnamese bases on Highway 7 and to divert North Vietnamese forces battling Cambodian troops close to Phnom Penh.

Associated Press correspondent George Esper reported from forward headquarters at Tay Ninh that a 2,000-man force of South Vietnamese rangers and armor kicked off the operation last week. The South Vietnamese and 2,000 Cambodian troops were held in reserve until the task force encountered opposition. A prime target is the headquarters of North Vietnam's 7th Division and numerous supply depots that also serve the 5th and 9th divisions. They are believed to be in a thickly jungled region known as Dam Be, 15 to 20 miles inside Cambodia.

Field commanders claimed the 5th and 7th Divisions were badly battered in heavy fighting with the South Vietnamese. "They're in bad shape and their morale is low," one officer said. "If we hit them again the 9th Division might have to come and rescue them." The 9th Division is currently battling Cambodian troops on Highway 6, 30 to 40 miles from its supply depots at Dam Be. Esper said scores of U.S. helicopters and bombers poured into Tay Ninh, 55 miles northwest of Saigon, to support the operation.

South Vietnam has had troops inside Cambodia since April 1970, when they crossed the border to attack enemy bases that had previously been immune to attack. U.S. troops went to help in May and were pulled out two months later. South Vietnamese forces have remained in eastern Cambodia ever since, sticking mostly to their base camps in the border region. They suffered a severe defeat last May when North Vietnamese regulars pushed them out of the area.

South Vietnamese troops returned to the border region late in September and launched a month-long offensive that resulted in heavy fighting around the Cambodian town of Kreek and several allied bases in Tay Ninh province. Although they succeeded in cutting highway 22 in South Vietnam, the North Vietnamese failed to overrun any bases and were forced to back into Cambodia from South Vietnam. Communist forces have concentrated their pressure on Phnom Penh and on support routes that have begun operating north of the capital. The U.S. Command meanwhile reported one of its deepest bombing strikes inside North Vietnam this year. A communique said four Navy AT Corsairs attacked an aircraft carrier near Vinh, a major North Vietnamese city about 145 miles north of the demilitarized zone, after they fired on an unnamed Navy reconnaissance plane. None of the planes was reported hit, and results of the strike were not known. It was the 50th "punitive reaction" raid in North Vietnam this year, said the fifth in eight days. The Laotian Defense Ministry announced in Vietnam that North Vietnamese troops with two tanks overran four government positions in the southern panhandle of Laos over the weekend. A spokesman said after repeated attempts to penetrate the Communist-held town of Muong Phlane, Laotian forces were driven back about 12 miles west of the town. He reported that 11 Laotians and 22 North Vietnamese were killed. American F-4 Phantom jets destroyed one of the two enemy tanks on the outskirts of Muong Phlane in Cambodia last month. Military observers in Vietnam said increased North Vietnamese activity in southern Laos might indicate an increase in supply traffic along the Ho Chi Minh trail. DENVER (AP) — Army Sgt. John C. Boston Jr., released by the Viet Cong last month after 26 months of imprisonment, boarded a jetliner at Stapleton International Airport today for a trip to his Warren, Mich. home.

"During the last dry season it wasn't until February that we began our first dry season operation," said one commander. "At this time last year, the North Vietnamese were attacking us in South Vietnam."

"This year the North Vietnamese 9th and 7th Divisions are in bad shape and their morale is low. We are more aggressive," said the commander. The South Vietnamese claim that the two North Vietnamese divisions were badly cut up in their offensive along Highway 22 and Highway 7 in Eastern Cambodia last month. 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### Dole Tells GOP Governors Of Nixon's San Diego Role

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Robert J. Dole, the Republican national chairman, has assured GOP governors they will have "a piece of the action" in the 1972 presidential campaign.

But he said their specific role will depend on political decisions made by President Nixon and his campaign strategists.

"It's a little different when you have an incumbent President," Dole said in an interview. "You have to consider what the President wants."

What the governors want, according to their chairman, Gov. William G. Milliken of Michigan, is "a strong voice in how the national campaign is run" next year, and two of the top jobs at the GOP national convention in San Diego.

Dole said he will discuss these requests with Milliken early next month. But he said it is too early to start assigning specific roles, in the convention or the campaign.

"We're looking for advocates for the President," he said. "You don't even have to volunteer for that."

"There's no difficulty," Dole said. "We can work things out."

Republicans will govern 20 of the 50 states next year, and Milliken said they are in an ideal position to generate cooperation of people and government to solve such problems as racism, crime and pollution.

### Canadians Feel Taken for Granted As A Superpower's Little Brother

Complexes aside, the Canadians were jolted by the U.S. surcharge. They felt they could have expected their "special relationship" to indicate special treatment for Canada.

It was a shock when they found they were about to be treated exactly the same way as other countries. It hurt all the more because, as Finance Minister E.M. Benson recently reminded Americans, "Canada was the first country to permit its currency to find its own level in the exchange markets."

This free floating was precisely what the United States would demand of other nations in its effort to right imbalances.

Government leaders express conviction the surcharge will cost Canada a billion dollars in a single year and mean 90,000 new unemployed. Taking into consideration the fact that the United States has tenfold Canada's population, the equivalent in the United States would be a cost of 800,000 jobs and \$10 billion, at a time when unemployment already was worrisome high.

The surtax applies to 25 per cent of Canada's exports to the United States, worth \$3 billion. It applies only to manufactured goods, but that is the field that generates jobs.

... Irritations seen needless

The U.S. action came at a time of rising national feeling here. The Liberal party government of Prime Minister Pierre Elliott Trudeau already was an oratorical voice in the community of nations. We have been among the United States' staunchest friends. Why separate that friendship?"

Often, Canadians complain, important decisions affecting their lives derive from the irascible force of U.S. economic power. However much Canada might want to hold off the U.S. embrace, she cannot live as she has been accustomed without continued close integration with the American economy.

With unconscious humor, a leader of the small, right-wing Social Credit party wound up an oration with the remark: "The Americans are our best friends, whether we like it or not."

On the other side of the political spectrum, a leader of the New Democratic party, referring to the impact of U.S. pol-

itics, summed up: "They just take us for granted. The frightening thing is that they love us."

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But there is a Canadian dilemma generating frustration. Because Canada was the United States' neighbor, she prospered and today has the second highest living standard in the world. Still, to many, Canada is too far from being her own mistress in too many ways.

Some of the complaints against the next-door neighbors sound extreme, but most are fairly moderate, voiced more in sorrow than anger. Among the more extreme views are those of Glen Frankfurter, head of a metal products firm who wrote a book called "Beneficial Domination." He feels Canada had two best mothers—France and Britain—and acquired a bad neighbor, the United States.

He contends that Canadians must recognize and correct historical inadequacies that led to their eclipse, so that they might own their own factories, sing their own songs, read their own books and see their own artists perform Canadian works.

Some Canadians laugh at that sort of thing.

"We are going in for self-psychanalysis and self-searching these days even more than the Americans," said one journalist. Because of the overwhelming presence of the U.S. economic colossus, Canada seems to some outsiders to have developed a national complex while searching for that elusive thing called identity.

One report was that not even the good Republican governor assembled at French Lick quite knew how to laugh at the crack the Vice President took at Congressman Paul McCloskey, the California Republican who originally committed the sacrilege of defeating Shirley Temple and who is now threatening to

The Agnew quip about McCloskey began humorously but didn't quite end that way. The California rebel was so low on campaign cash, Agnew said, that he had been forced to sell his Illinois collection, including "his favorite painting" — Benedict Arnold Crossing the Delaware.

If the Agnew humor was, on this occasion, somehow a little strong even for Republican governor, he had better pitch later on at Chicago, where, addressing the Illinois agricultural association, he digressed from his prepared speech to pay a choice tribute to the United Nations.

"I understand," he said, "the United Nations gave Red China a big hand when it denounced the United States the other day. That may be. But that wasn't half as big as the hand the United Nations has had in the pocket of the United States taxpayers for the last 26 years."

We are not sure whether this jibe with President Nixon's foreign policy at the moment, and we don't know, for that matter, whether Vice President Agnew is supposed to be cloaking harmony with or ostentatious dissent to the President's own tune.

All we know is that the tongue has been loosed again and that, after it was warmed up a little, it will make the news of the nation more readable again.

Connecticut Sprio

Gov. Meskill got more than he may have bargained for when he appointed Henry C. White Connecticut's welfare commissioner. For off-the-cuff remarks, White is emerging as Connecticut's Agnew.

Meskill was looking for a man to administer a welfare budget which for the first time was closed—as opposed to previous open-ended budgets that could be funded indefinitely by transfers from other state funds when the money ran low. He got a man whose primary goal, in his concern seems to be for "my budget."

He was looking for a man capable of making cuts and changes in allotment schedules—and sticking to them. He got a man who, when the welfare protests both from the poor and from his own welfare workers, immediately announced that in order to keep "his" budget in balance he might make another cut of up to 10 per cent.

The Governor wanted a man willing to root out and correct abuses or excesses existing within the system. The Commissioner has diverted most of the energies of his professional workers to these investigations. He came up with findings in Waterbury that if they held on a state-wide basis, might save Connecticut up to \$4.5 million.

It is possible that Meskill also wanted to make political hay among middle-class wage-earners by appealing to their dislike of taxes and their resentment that some of their fellow-workers are getting a living "without working for it." This Commissioner White is accomplishing with, quite literally, a vengeance. His hard-nosed approach has branded the Meskill administration clearly as anti-welfare and anti-compassion.

The Commissioner is serving as a lightning rod for the Governor, and he has thrown himself into the role recklessly. Last weekend he managed to alienate the whole organization of professional welfare people in the state, his own employees, by his observations on their competence or lack of it. Now he seems willing, by his refusal to obey a legislative subpoena, to take on the entire General Assembly.

Henry C. White may not be a bad administrator, nor even as inhuman as he had made himself sound. But the intemperateness of his remarks and his high-sounding attitude toward his job and responsibilities to the public mark him as incompetent in this position. White is doing much harm, as he is doing welfare clients in Connecticut, and the sooner he is removed from his post, the better. — MERIDIAN RECORD.

Specifically, the labor leaders believe it occurred, further, that Nixon operatives intervened behind the scenes to switch the votes of three of the five management members on the tripartite board (representing the balance of power between the five public members, generally taking a hard-line stance against pay increases, and the five labor members). If true, that intervention violated Mr. Nixon's written pledge to Meany that the Phase II Pay Board would be strictly autonomous.

Labor's grievance goes back to a very private session at AFL-CIO headquarters the afternoon of Nov. 5. Three of the five management members — Rocco Siciliano of TI Corp. (a Los Angeles-based holding company), Benjamin Blagoff of Southern Pacific and Virgil Day of General Electric — tentatively agreed to support retroactive pay boosts up to 8 per cent, with increases above that figure to be determined on an individual basis.

In fact, the three described themselves privately as the "liberals" of the Pay Board's management team (even though Siciliano was Mr. Nixon's Under Secretary of Commerce until recently).

The formula was quickly agreed to by AFL-CIO secretary-treasurer Lane Kirkland and later by Meany himself so there was labor jubilation in anticipation of an 8 to 7 vote the next day, Nov. 8, on retroactivity.

But the Nov. 8 session was suddenly postponed until late afternoon. Finally, the Pay Board adjourned after bitter wrangling without voting on anything. Meany is convinced the postponement was arranged to give White House agents time to work on the three management members.

Wedding Invitation Unlocks Old, Dark Secret in Israel

By MANCUS BELARSON TEL AVIV (AP) — A wedding invitation to Premier Golda Meir has unlocked one of Israel's oldest and darkest intelligence secrets—the "Lavon affair."

The bride is an Israeli jailed in Egypt 17 years ago for her role in the Lavon affair—a bungled attempt at sabotage that sent political shocks throughout Israel.

The affair named for Pinhas Lavon, the minister of defense in 1954, toppled a government, split the dominant Socialist Labor party and started Israel's founder, David Ben-Gurion, on the road to political limbo.

For years the incident was cloaked in secrecy—at least in Israel by military censorship. Some details filtered through to the Israeli public from foreign press reports.

"It was sheer frustration," recalls an Israeli journalist. "We could write about the major political results of the affair, but could not write about the affair itself. It was like trying to paint a picture leaving the center blank."

The affair might have remained secret had it not been for a remark made by Mrs. Meir earlier this month. A newsmen overheard her say she would attend the Nov. 23 wedding of Marcello Nino, 41, Miss Nino, imprisoned by the Egyptians for 15 years, was a key figure in the affair and her release and return to Israel had been secret.

Did Mrs. Meir's off-chance remark mean the story could now be told? The censor considered and finally relented. The newspaper gleefully recounted the details under big headlines.

The story of the Lavon affair went like this: In 1954, two developments in Egypt aroused grave concern in Jerusalem. Britain was preparing to leave the Suez Canal zone—a sure sign Israel ships would be barred from the waterway. And the Americans were making friendly overtures to Cairo.

In July someone—and it was the identity of this someone that caused the later uproar—ordered an Israeli espionage apparatus in Egypt into action. The 11-member team, mainly Egyptian Jews, were told to place bombs at British and American installations in Cairo and Alexandria.

The Israeli thinking: Egyptian extremists would be blamed, the Americans would be offended and the British would conclude the situation in Egypt was still too tense, requiring a continued presence in the canal zone.

The plot failed. The ring was broken. Two of the spies were executed and one committed suicide. The Lavon affair is not likely to be forgotten. If "Paul Frank"—his real name still is history—is permitted to publish the full account of the affair, it may be replayed.

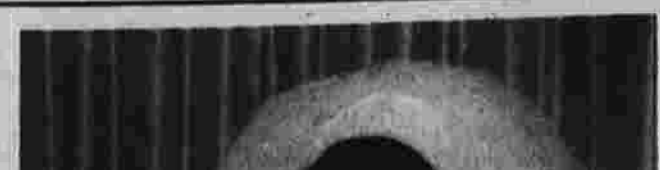

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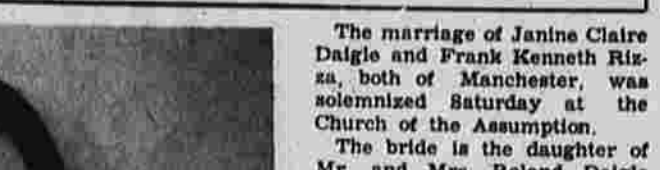

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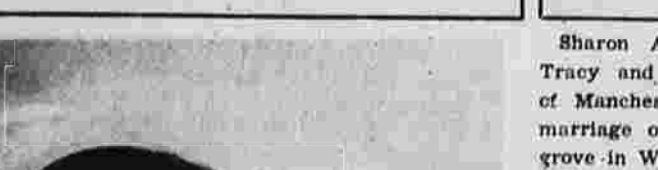

# Directors To Decide On \$55,250 in Funds

The Board of Directors will consider some \$55,249 in appropriations and allocations when it meets tomorrow night to take action on the items it heard public comments on last week.

These appropriations and allocations as well as several items of new business will be the only matters on the directors' agenda.

The board last week changed its rules of procedure so that it will now meet regularly twice a month. At the first meeting public hearings on agenda items will be held, and unfinished business will be acted on, and reports and communications will be heard.

At the second meeting, the board will act on proposed appropriations and new business, and will hear public comments on anything within the board's jurisdiction.

Last week, the board suspended these new rules so that a portion of the agenda which would have been covered this week was done at the suggestion of some who wanted to speak and were unaware of the proposed rule changes.

The proposed additional appropriations are:

- \$22,627.78 for the emergency employment program. This would bring to \$68,967.25 the amount the directors have appropriated to the program. The town has been granted a total of \$30,000 under the federal funding program.
- \$11,756.18 to the Board of Education budget for the purchase of instructional media. The appropriation would be financed by a state grant and would be split — \$8,631.18 for public schools and \$3,125.00 for non-public schools which receive money under this program.
- \$5,575 to the Board of Education budget for the renewal of the vocational education program at Manchester High School. This appropriation would be financed by a state grant.
- \$6,409.20 to the Drug Advisory Council. This appropriation would be financed by a grant under the Law Enforcement Assistance Act.
- \$5,000 to the Police Department for special services. This money would cover services provided to various people at their request. This includes such things as weddings, funerals, and directing traffic at construction sites. The party requesting the service reimburses the town.

Two proposed allocations in the Capital Improvement Reserve Fund the directors will consider include:

- \$5,400 for replacement of bowling alleys at the West Side Recreation Center. The alley beds which would be installed have been donated to the town by Alexander Jarvis.
- \$1,500 for the installation of a five-foot-high fence along the main St. border of Center Springs Park. The fence was proposed by Town Manager Robert Weis and Police Chief James Reardon as a means of discouraging youths from congregating in the area.

Other items the board will consider are:

- acceptance of the following:
  - all of Redwood Rd., about .76 miles
  - all of Ralph Rd., about .76 miles
  - all of Galaxy Dr., about .27 miles.
- acceptance of the resignation of John Tami of 40 Tavers Rd. from the Civil Defense Advisory Council and the appointment of his successor, Paul S. Tami, to the Board of Directors Nov. 2.
- the request for early retirement by Frank G. Plich. Plich has been employed by the Board of Education since September, 1969. The retirement would be effective Jan. 1.

### Automobile Chase Scenes Draw Boxoffice Crowds

NEW YORK (AP) — "Oh, I'm a good driver," film producer Philip D'Antoni remarked ruefully. "This morning I was coming out of my yard and drove into the baseball stand. Here I am making chase movies about cars and I wreck my own car."

The cars in D'Antoni's films take a beating also, but not until the viewer has been treated to some spectacular chase sequences. In his first film, "Bullitt," he chased car over and around the hills of San Francisco to a hilariously blasting ending. In his recently released second, "The French Connection," the chase involves a hijacked elevated subway train and a wildly pursuing automobile.

And the thrill of the chase apparently is what pulls them in at the box office. "Bullitt," according to D'Antoni, has taken in some \$25 million since it first flashed on the screen in 1960. "No one knows what 'The French Connection' will do," he says with a shrug, and then smiles. "But the forecasts are extremely high at the moment."

D'Antoni, an independent film producer whose pictures are distributed by the major film studios, describes his films as "action-adventure," and thinks his chase sequences are popular because:

"It gives you a specific rooting element—you immediately pick the bad guy from the good guy. And, if the chase is done with realism, you have an emotional involvement. It's a Walter Mitty sort of thing, in a way, with the viewer putting himself in place of the guy who's doing the chasing, the good guy."

"It's a vicarious thing. I'll bet there isn't a man around who wouldn't like to be driving that car in 'The French Connection' through the traffic lights, going at terrific speed, and just forcing other cars out of the way."

D'Antoni, a deep-voiced man who emphasizes his points with his hands and body says "The French Connection" was based on a real case in which a giant drug smuggling caper was smashed in New York City.

Most of the film is "real," he says. The notable exception—the chase, "it never happened," admits he really happened." admits he really happened."

### New England Energy Policy Unit Formed

PROVIDENCE (AP) — The need has grown with the creation of the New England Energy Policy Unit to deal with a projected fourfold increase in the region's power demands over the next 20 years was announced today by the New England Regional Commission.

Paul Shore, a regional engineer for the Federal Power Commission in New York, was named executive director.

"New England is at the end of the line with respect to energy and the cost of electricity, gas, coal and oil have always been high in this region," Shore said. "The new program is designed to provide technical assistance and advice to the states."

Chester M. Wiggin Jr., federal co-chairman of the commission, told a news conference that the program will help states meet their energy needs.

"The present stand-by policy is not what we need," he said. "We need a program that will allow us to meet our energy needs at a reasonable cost."

### Snow Patrol Sets Deadline On Stand-By Pay Issue

NEWINGTON (AP) — The snow patrol says they may not wait around for it to come.

The men have repeatedly requested stand-by pay for being on 24-hour call in case of snow from November through April. The state has repeatedly said no.

Now the highway maintainers say they will refuse to answer overtime calls for snow removal unless the state comes up with an acceptable proposal by 3:30 p.m. Wednesday, according to Michael Ferrucci Jr., president of Council 16, American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees, AFL-CIO.

More than 300 members of Council 16 voted unanimously Sunday to reiterate their demands for stand-by pay in a letter to Transportation Commissioner A. Earl Wood. Wood was unavailable for comment Sunday night.

But State Personnel Commissioner Edward H. Simpson, who was sent a copy of the letter, said the current stand-by arrangement is being reviewed, along with other proposals which would affect the highway maintenance men.

Simpson said Sunday night he had not yet received a copy of the union letter, which also was sent to Gov. Thomas J. Meskill.

Simpson did say, however, that he sees no need for a meeting until a final plan is proposed for stand-by pay. He said he will come from Wood's office.

The personnel commissioner pointed out that the union has asked for a minimum of \$18 per double our cost for snow removal," he said. "It don't look like that can be done in light of the current tight budget situation in the state."

Union lawyers contend that the present stand-by policy is all weeks ago and unanimously around us but a group of state employees on the highway snow patrol say they may not wait around for it to come.

### Fund-Raiser Nightmare Heats Up Brown Phones

Over the course of eight nights, 228 volunteers manning phones in Providence put through 2,940 calls. They received another \$54 pledges of unspecified amounts. There were 1,064 refusals.

The phonathons were begun by Brown last year in five cities. This year's Providence phonathon is one of 16 being conducted throughout the country for the university's Annual Fund.

Some of the calls made Tuesday night did not produce the hoped-for results.

Chastman Anthony, class of '76, made his pitch, and heard no response.

"He hung up and dialed again. 'This is the same person. Somewhere in our conversation I guess we got cut off.'"

"You know what she said? She said: 'Oh, no, we didn't get cut off. And she dialed it again,'" he said.

Brown's public information office offers one possible explanation for such alumni behavior.

"In recent years, the combination of a slumping economy and alumni estrangement over increased student activities has resulted in a fund-raiser's nightmare. A return to the 'old days' looks during the last year from the United States and fostered a general lull on campus, but some alumni have long memories. And money re- maining tight," it said.

### Blizzards Sweep Europe, Wild Seas Imperial Ships

LONDON (AP) — Blizzards were being "towed to harbor" and gales swept Western Europe for the third successive day today, as winter settled over the continent.

An unseasonal blizzard blanketed most of Denmark and southern Sweden, isolating many farms and villages, stranding thousands of motorists and closing several provincial airports.

Danish children got an unexpected holiday when their schools were turned into emergency shelters for stranded motorists.

Ferry services to West Germany and Poland were almost at a standstill.

The German coaster Neckar with six men aboard radioed for immediate assistance in the stormy Kattegat sea.

Off the Dutch coast, a lifeboat took six crewmen from the battered Danish coaster Olets.

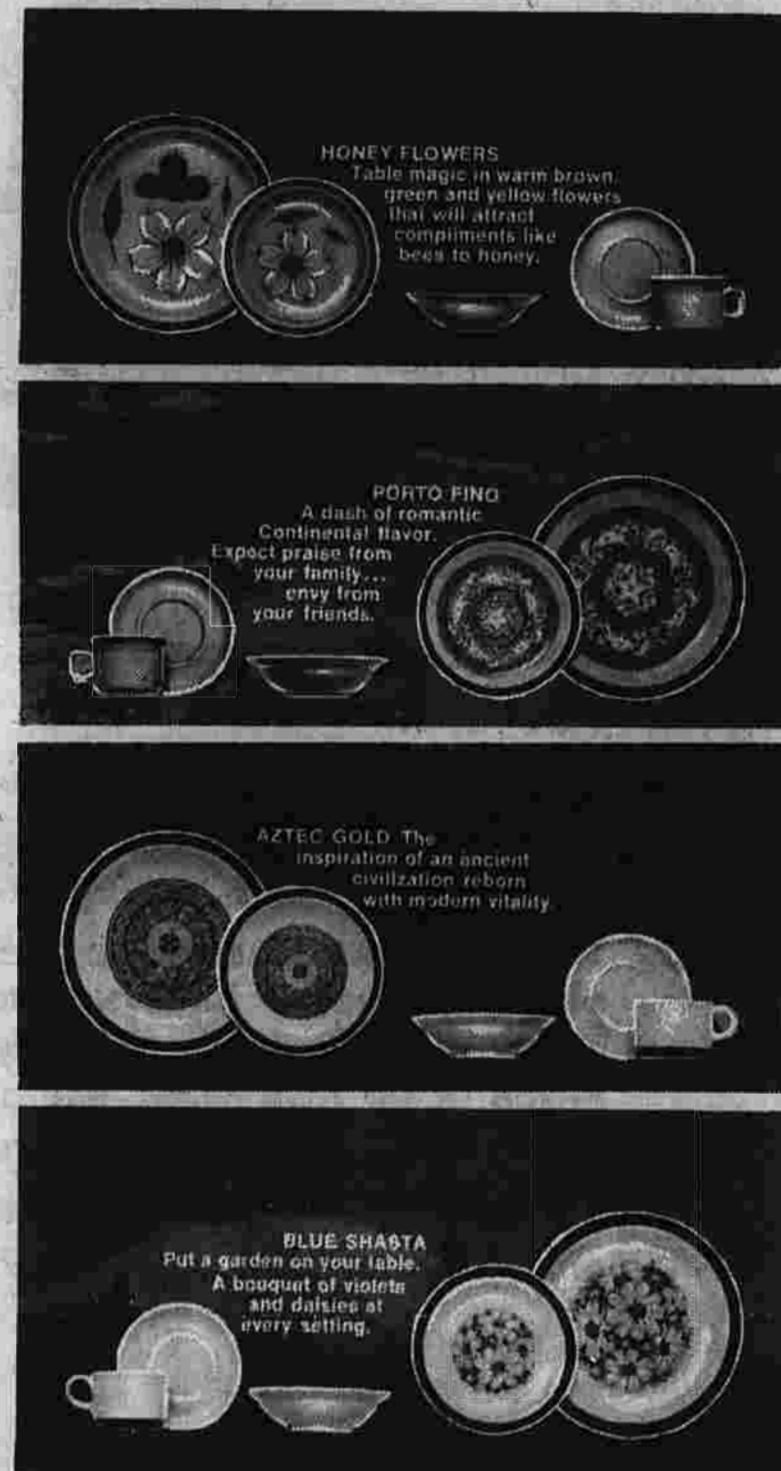
