**Nixon Juggles Budget**

KEY BRIDGEMAN, Fla. (AP) — President Nixon works with advisers today on a fiscal 1973 budget based on the concept of full employment revenues.

The President budged over the budget books for four days Friday, conferring by telephone as well with Treasury Secretary John B. Connally in Washington.

When the session was over, two of the key conferees, George Bush, director of the Office of Budget and Management, and his deputy, Caspar Weinberger, flew back to Washington.

Nixon's chief domestic adviser, John Ehrlichman, who joined in the meetings, made a comment that Nixon's return here to meet again with the President today on budget problems.

Press secretary Ronald L. Ziegler said the budget, like the one the year before, will be based on the assumption that unemployment will not exceed 4 per cent. Because of unemployment above that rate, a deficit of \$77 billion is expected for the 1973 fiscal year ending next June 30.

With unemployment now running at 4 per cent, Nixon's budget could go into the red again for the same reason—failure to collect the revenues expected.

Ziegler said he could give no indication of the size of the budget Nixon was considering.

The chief executive signed 22 bills on his first day at his Florida home Friday and asked Congress to provide a constitutional appropriation of \$86 million for the operations of Radio Free Europe and Radio Liberty. Both organizations beam programs to Iran, Cuba and other countries.

Aides said the President planned no excursions outside the key White House compound this weekend.

At a picture-taking session when he launched talks on the budget in his paneled bayonet study, the President made note of the fact that the Florida weather was a bit cloudy and rainy. But, he told reporters, "I plan to go swimming anyway."

**U.S. Jets Hit Radar Sites Above North Viet Border**

**Mariner Mission In Peril**

**Road To Saigon**

SAIGON (AP) — American fighter-bombers attacked three radar sites inside North Vietnam, one of them 90 miles north of the demilitarized zone, the U.S. Command reported today.

The U.S. fighter-bombers were flying cover for other raids Friday against war stock piles on the Laos-North Vietnam border awaiting shipment southward along the Ho Chi Minh trail.

The U.S. Command said reports of the strikes by three Air Force F-106 fighter-bombers 80 miles north of the DMZ were not known. It said there was no damage to the U.S. supersonic jet.

Friday's raids took place near the Mu Gia and Ban Hving passes in North Vietnam, where U.S. sources say there is a buildup of supplies for the North Vietnamese. The U.S. strikes raised to 85 the number of "protective reaction" raids inside North Vietnam this year.

Although the Cambodian military sources said that the town of Taing Krasang, 70 miles north of Phnom Penh, was abandoned Friday, another source said that it was not. The town of Bary and Kompong Thmar fell under a North Vietnamese counter-offensive that had beaten back a 20,000-man Cambodian task force.

**War Cries Echo in India Subcontinent Boiling**

Indian forces struck in East Pakistan today and the government claimed they were advancing rapidly in a drive to establish an independent state. The Indians acknowledged, however, that they had lost some territory in fighting along the border. West Pakistan, 1,000 miles to the west, the Indian air force launched a series of raids against eight airfields in India.

The Indian attacks included the three major West Pakistani cities of Lahore, Karachi and Rawalpindi, the seat of Pakistan's government. Indian air force reported destruction of a number of Pakistani planes on the ground in West Pakistan.

He said the Indian raiders had little opposition in their morning-long strikes, and that all of them had returned safely to their bases.

The spokesman said Indian air force planes also had been attacking military installations inside East Pakistan since early today, and that heavy fighting is going in most sections of the province. In numerous dogfights over East Pakistan and that seven Pakistani Sabre jets were shot down, four near Dacca and one near Jessore. The spokesman said no Indian planes had been downed.

Prime Minister Indira Gandhi earlier told the Indian Parliament that "this morning the government of West Pakistan declared war upon us." She did not say what form the declaration took, but United News of India quoted Pakistani radio reports as saying it was published in an extraordinary government gazette in Islamabad.

Foreign Secretary T.N. Kaul told a news conference in New Delhi that India had not declared war on Pakistan, but added: "We are going to assert our right to self defense and we shall take every appropriate action to safeguard the integrity and the sovereignty of the country."

Defense Secretary K. R. Lal told the same news conference that Indian forces attacked Pakistan positions in West Pakistan at midnight in retaliation for articles on at least 12 Indian airfields Friday. The attacks continued throughout the night, but India said they had been repulsed.

The Indian government radio said that Pakistani air force planes attacked Indian airfields in Kashmir, three times from 4 a.m. to 11 a.m. today, but that there was no damage. India and Pakistan have fought two bloody wars over Kashmir.

India acknowledged that at least one Pakistani raider got across the border and was killed. The Pakistani border and 100 miles south of New Delhi. **She Sells Sea Shells By the Sea**

PORTLAND, Maine (AP) — Six women have been cleaning and cleaning thousands of sea shells in Portland for almost two years. The shells, mostly from the Gulf of Maine and sea on earth, will go on sale Saturday.

The shells have been reposed for several decades in the old National History Society building after landing in Portland in the late 1800's on board galleon-trading sailing ships.

When officials of the National History and Audubon societies learned the shells would be used, they decided to ask members of the Coastal Maine Rock and Mineral Club to begin the tedious, dirty job of cleaning and sorting the shells.

The group of diligent ladies, headed by Mrs. Joseph Schell, have scraped the encrustations off shells from such diverse waters as the Arctic Ocean and the Sea of Japan. They even have discovered a few from the Gulf of Maine.

The director of the Maine Audubon Society, Richard Anderson, says the best samples from each species of shell will be set aside for future use in lectures and demonstrations.

One penny to 84 will buy any one shell, the great majority of which exhibit the colorful, abstract design of shells with a tropical origin.

The sale will be at the new, Baxter Boulevard, headquarters of the two societies.

"Our point is not so much to make money, but to unload a surplus and maybe even get people interested," Anderson says.

WASHINGTON (AP) — A construction industry stabilization committee to account for approving roughly 400 retroactive pay raises for union members on specific applications for price increases and leaves only large policy questions to the full commission.

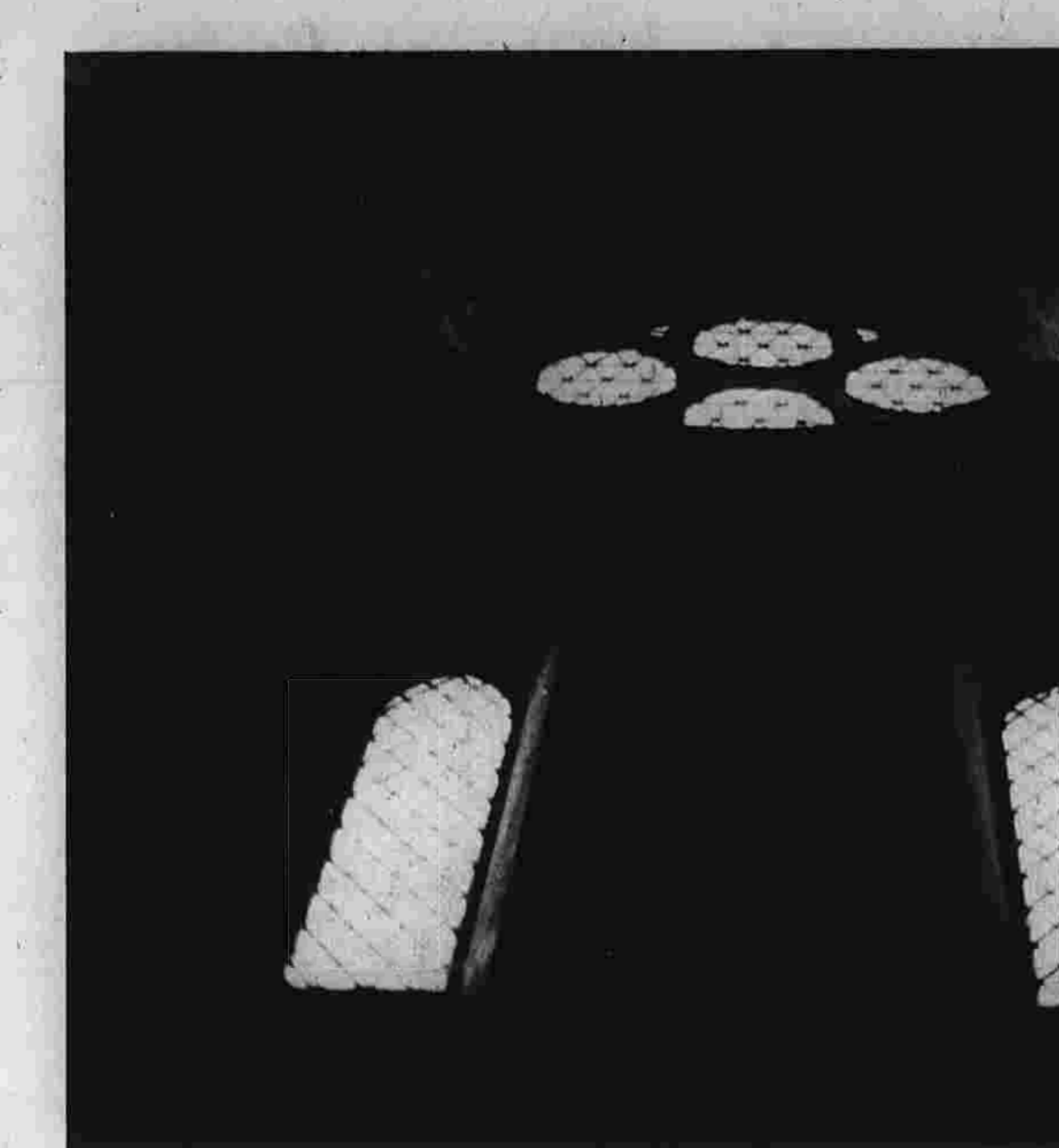

Nursing Agency Turns Down South Windsor Commitment

The Columbia-Hebron-Andover Public Health Nursing Agency (CHAPHNA) last night turned down a request from the South Windsor Public Nursing Agency for supervisory training and instruction.

The recommendation to seek the training was made by state officials who suggested that the nurse at the South Windsor Agency be given special training in the noted areas. The CHAPHNA was recommended for its strength in the area of nursing supervision.

Mrs. Phyllis Jones, supervisor of the regional agency, listed a number of reasons why the board decided to turn down the request. She cited as the prime reason, the fact that the agency had recently taken on the added responsibility of providing nursing and supervisory services to the Marlborough Public Health Nursing Agency.

It was explained by Mrs. Frances LaPine, a board member that when this additional town was taken on, the board agreed that there would be no further expansion or additional duties taken on, for at least a year.

Mrs. Jones said she talked with state public health consultants on the matter and was told if it was decided to go along with the South Windsor request, a contract would have to be signed between the two agencies and that CHAPHNA would be directly responsible for the results of the training program.

Mrs. Jones, commenting that she regretted having to turn down the South Windsor re-

quest, also cited the many reports which the agency would have to fill out for the state, if the agency became involved in the training program. A recommendation to seek help from a private public health consultant, was made to the South Windsor group. Mrs. Jones agreed, after an evaluation of the South Windsor Agency, that it was in need of clerical and supervisory help.

Other Actions Also at last night's meeting, Mrs. Jones asked the board to write to local legislators concerning a state statute controlling the sale and distribution of hypodermic syringes. The law exempts doctors, veterinarians, hospitals, clinics, embalmers and farmers. Mrs. Jones wants visiting nurse associations included in the list of exemptions.

In other action Mrs. Jones asked for an additional appropriation of \$50 to be added to \$100 already appropriated. The money will be used to purchase two filing cabinets for the agency.

Mrs. Bernice Hubbard reported on a conference she attended recently where Senator Abraham Ribicoff was the guest speaker. She said she concluded from statements made, that national health care, if not imminent, is at least not far off in the future.

She said she also felt it was indicated that "services should be designed for the patients and not for those who provide for these services (the nurses). She commented, "it is going to be even harder to provide patient care in the future."

## Pakistani Bombers Roar Over Bombay

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS United News of India said Indian antiaircraft guns and coastal batteries opened fire as the Pakistani planes approached Bombay.

The dispatch, apparently filed to New Delhi while the attack was under way, gave no idea of the extent of the raid.

Air raid warnings sounded all over western India after sun-down as Indian radar picked up sightings of what appeared to be a massive air strike, New Delhi dispatches reported.

In another development, Pakistan broke diplomatic relations with India in retaliation to its recognition of Bangla Desh.

A spokesman for India's Foreign Ministry in New Delhi said earlier the Indian government had no plans to sever diplomatic ties with Pakistan.

The two countries maintained diplomatic relations in their two previous wars in 1948 and 1965.

India has supported the Bangla Desh rebels since March and has gained backing for this stand from the Soviet Union.

There was no immediate word from Moscow on whether the Soviet Union would follow India in recognizing the rebels.

Premier Alexei N. Kosygin said on Sunday in Denmark, where he was visiting, that the question of Kowalia recognition had not been considered.

The Soviet news agency Tass carried a New Delhi dispatch reporting that India had done so and noted that Prime Minister Indira Gandhi had told her Parliament that recognition signifies an important turning point in the history of national liberation movements.

The Pakistani government said recognition "exposed" India's hatred of Pakistan and its desire to destroy the country, a Pakistani broadcast said.

The Pakistani claimed their forces had made a general advance in all sectors along the border between India and West Pakistan and had crossed the Tavi River in the Jammu sector of Kashmir.

## Cambodians Flee New Red Attacks

PHNOM PENH (AP) — namee reinforcements and North Vietnamese troops dealt the Cambodian Army another setback today, forcing it into retreat from a district town only 16 miles northwest of Phnom Penh. At least 50 Cambodians were killed or wounded.

About 150 troops fled from Bat Doung in the darkness before dawn after two days of fierce fighting.

About 50 of the survivors were reported to have reached safety at the nearby outpost of Phnom Baet.

Last week the Cambodian army's northeast front collapsed, sending thousands of troops and civilians fleeing north to the besieged provincial capital of Kompong Thom. The North Vietnamese were left in control of 25 miles of Highway 6.

Reports during the weekend said hundreds of the fleeing soldiers and civilians were killed during the retreat. The army abandoned three more hill positions during the weekend and withdrew the rest of its surviving force in the sector into Kompong Thom.

In Saigon, it was learned that U.S. Navy planes have nearly doubled attacks against the Ho Chi Minh trail in Laos since the dry season began. The aim of the air campaign is to reduce the movement of North Viet-

namese reinforcements and war materials into Cambodia and South Vietnam.

The Pacific Fleet's two most powerful carriers, the nuclear-powered Enterprise and the Constellation, are sending more than 100 planes a day against the supply trail. Military sources anticipate an increase in North Vietnamese attacks on the aerial raiders, and more U.S. attacks on North Vietnam in retaliation.

Two such encounters were reported over the weekend. On sites inside North Vietnam Saturday surface-to-air missile fired on U.S. jets operating over Laos for the first time in nearly a month but missed their targets. The American jets did not return the fire.

On Friday U.S. fighter-bombers escorted B-52s on raids near the Mu Gia and Ban Ravang passes attacked three antiaircraft radar sites on the North Vietnamese side of the border with unknown results.

During the rainy season that ended in October, the Navy kept only one carrier in the Tonkin gulf. The two now on station there have nearly 200 planes available for combat, support and reconnaissance missions over Laos and North Vietnam.

### War In India

Pakistan reported earlier that it had seized 20 Indian border posts in Kashmir.

The tank battle began Saturday night when the Pakistanis sent two brigades of infantry and an armored regiment against Indian defensive positions in southern Kashmir near the West Pakistan border, an Indian spokesman in New Delhi said.

He said the battle raged throughout the weekend and that 28 Chinese-built T59 tanks were destroyed by the Indian forces. "Our losses were minor in the fighting," the spokesman added.

He said in East Pakistan Indian forces "are making significant advances and we have captured some territory northeast of Sylhet and south of Comilla." The two cities are key supply centers for Pakistan's army in the east. Sylhet is 123 miles northeast of Dacca, the provincial capital. Comilla is 50 miles southeast of Dacca.

## Cancer Chasers Need \$1 Million

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Scientists say it will cost \$1 million and require skimming 7,600 gallons of fluid off growing human cancer cells to complete the next experiment with a newly discovered cancer virus.

The researchers are almost certain they've discovered human cancer virus, which would be a significant step in understanding the causes of the killer disease. But their conclusions are based largely on circumstantial evidence and they need more direct proof.

The crucial confirmation could come from a difficult, months-long procedure under

way that will produce less than an ounce of material for injection in 10 guinea pigs and several rats.

### Price On A Killer

Dr. Robert Huebner of the National Cancer Institute in Bethesda, Md., said money is available for the procedure, largely because of a new emphasis on cancer research by the federal government.

"If this turns out to be conclusively a human cancer virus, if this works out the way we hope, we'll be light years ahead of where we stand now," Huebner said.

Such proof will be strong new evidence supporting a still unproven theory that each animal cell contains the seeds of cancer. Somehow, the theory proposes, genetic messages in a cell are unlocked, turn the cell cancerous and cause manufacture of cancer virus particles. These particles then infect other cells and pass along genetic

information making them cancerous.

The virus particles discovered here were in human cancer cells growing in a kitten, where they were implanted before the kitten was born. The work was done by Dr. Robert M. McAllister of Children's Hospital of Los Angeles and Dr. Murray B. Gardner of the University of Southern California.

The circumstantial evidence that the virus particles are of human origin comes from knowing what the particles are not. Tests have shown they are

## Nuisance Storm Skids into Area

Manchester skidded and tripped to work today during a nuisance storm shrouded in hazardous traffic warnings. The second storm in two weeks had more bluster than bite, leaving only three quarters of an inch of snow in its wake.

State Police at the Hartford Troop also reported numerous minor mishaps. One, caused when a truck jacked up at exit 92 in the westbound lane of the Wilbur Cross Highway, involved two other cars, and tied up traffic for a while. The vehicles had been cleared away by noon, however, and no serious injuries were reported.

Town highway crews, who began the day picking up leaves, started sanding town streets at about 9:30.

The Board of Education called off afternoon kindergarten sessions, but all other students were dismissed at their normal times.

## He Has Full Heart And Empty Wallet

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP) — Harry L. Jones is the kind of guy who'd give a stranger his last dollar. And does, frequently.

He's a policeman who, for the last 17 years on duty, has seen life at its worst. But he's not discouraged. He says he thinks people just need a little help.

Last week, for instance, Jones answered a routine report of family trouble. He said he found a woman and five ragged children—three girls and two boys, ages 10 years to 18 months—huddled in an attempt to keep warm in a freezing mist.

Inside the house, he said, was the children's father, drunk.

Earlier that day the woman had taken four of her husband's last \$11 and sent one of her children to the store for groceries. When the child returned, Jones said she told him, the man snatched the food away, stomped it to bits.

"I kicked the door open," Jones said. "Those folks were living there with just wall-to-wall floor—I mean no furniture at all, no food."

Jones said he radioed headquarters he was going to the grocery store, then spent the only money he had—\$6—on food for the family.

"None of that comes as a surprise to me," said Mrs. Jones, who has been married to the big-hearted Birmingham native for 18 of his 43 years.

"I recall one occasion he called home one night and asked if we had any money in the bank. I told him we had a little bit. He said he had found a young woman who had no place to go, so he paid her room rent at the YMCA for a week with a \$30 check.

"I had to go out and borrow the money the next day to cover the check," she said.

Recalling his experience last week, Jones says, "I was really touched by that family. I'm going to work with the man..."

## Koreans Say Reds Ready For Warfare

SEOUL (AP) — The South Korean government proclaimed a state of emergency today, charging war preparations by North Korea.

President Chung Hee Park declared South Korea must "reposture" its defense arrangements in view of Communist China's admission to the United Nations and uncertainty over the level of future American support.

A government proclamation informed South Koreans their constitutional freedoms may be restricted and "social unrest that risks the national security will not be tolerated."

The major opposition party, the New Democrats, took issue with Park. A party spokesman said the president's aim appeared to be the security of his government rather than the security of the nation. If the situation was serious enough to warrant emergency measures, the spokesman added, it should have been discussed in the National Assembly.

Park said North Korea has increased infiltration of armed agents to South Korea and has carried out a massive military buildup of more than 2.5 million troops, including a regular military force of 500,000 men, a militia of 1.4 million and 700,000 Red youth guards.
