





associated with such a machine. There is another rule which is not listed, and which never does get listed in any set of rules for such a labor-saving device as a snow blower, and which is, nevertheless, still the most important single rule for anyone to honor and

help prevent the obvious type of injury

This is the rule which says: "Take it easy. Don't set yourself any rigid timedistance goal. Lean on the machine once in a while."

It is people who violate such rules, on the theory that operating a labor-saving device like a snow blower is something totally different from operating a laborconsuming device like a shovel, who get themselves into the most serious physical danger in the course of dealing with a winter's snows.

Hand shovel or mechanical blower,

it is the state of the mind of the operator which is important. If, with either one, he permits himself to get into a mood in which he is determined to press on to a certain predetermined goal before he stops, he is putting that strain on himself which can prove dangerous. It is because such strain can develop himself to a snow blower goal as with someone who is determined to finish a certain amount of shoveling that we have these sad, seemingly illogical news stories, every winter, about the collapse of some individual who undoubtedly acquired a snow blower in order to avoid the danger of collapse from using a

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP) -Harry L. Jones is the kind of guy who'd give a stranger his last dollar, And does, frequently.

He's a policeman who, for the last 17 years on duty, has seen life at its worst. But he's not discouraged. He says he thinks people just need a little help. Last week, for instance, Jones answered a routine re-

port of family trouble. He said he found a woman and five ragged children-three girls and two boys, ages 10 years to 19 months-huddled in an attempt to keep warm in a freezing

Inside the house, he said, was the children's father, drunk. Earlier that day the woman had taken four of her husband's last \$11 and sent one of her children to the store for groceries. When the child returned, Jones said she told him, the man snatched the food away, stomped it to bits.

"I kicked the door open," Jones said. "Those folks were living there with just wall-to-wall floor-I mean no furniture at all, no food."" Jones said he radioed head-

quarters he was going to the grocery store, then spent the only money he had—\$6—on food for the family.
"None of that comes as a

surprise to me," said Mrs. Jones, who has been married to the big-hearted Birmingham native for 18 of his 43 years. "I recall one occasion he

called home one night and asked if we had any money in the bank. I told him we had a little bit. He said he had found a young woman who had no place to go, so he paid her room rent at the YMCA for a week with a \$30 check. 'I had to go out and borrow

the money the next day to cov-er the check," she said. Recalling his experience last week, Jones says, "I was really touched by that family. I'm going to work with the man ...

Koreans Say Reds Ready For Warfare

SEOUL (AP) - The South Korean government proclaimed a state of emergency today, charging war preparations by North Korea,

President Chung Hee Park declared South Korea must "reposture" its defense arrangemnts in view of Communist China's admission to the United Nations and uncertainty over the level of future American support.

A government proclamation informed South Koreans their constitutional freedoms may be restricted and "social unrest that risks the national security will not be tolerated."

The major opposition party, the New Democrats, took issue with Park. A party spokesman said the president's aim peared to be the security of government rather than the security of the nation. If the attuation was serious enough to warrant emergency measures, the spokesman added, it should have been discussed in the National Assembly.
Park said North Korea has

increased infiltration of armed agents to South Korea and has carried out a massive military buildup of more than 2.5 million troops, including a regular mili-tary force of 500,000 men, a mi-litia of 1.4 million and 700,000 Red youth guards.

evidence supporting a still unproven theory that each animal cell contains the seeds of can-cer. Somehow, the theory pro-poses, genetic messages in a cell are unlocked, turn the cell cancerous and cause manufacture of cancer virus particles. These particles then infect other cells and pass along genetic

The virus particles discovered here were in human cancer cells growing in a kitten, where they were implanted before the kitten was born. The work was done by Dr. Robert M. McAllister of Childrens Hospital of Los Angeles and Dr. Murray B. Gardner of the University of Southern California.

The circumstantial evidence that the virus particles are of human origin comes from knowing what the particles are not. Tests have shown they are


