Pakistani Bombers Roar Over Bombay

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS United News of India said Pakistani jets attacked Indian anti-aircraft guns and Bombay, India's largest city, coastal batteries opened fire as the Pakistani planes approached Bombay.

The dispatch, apparently filed to New Delhi while the attack was under way, gave no idea of the extent of the raid.

Air raid warnings sounded all over western India after sun-down as Indian radar picked up sightings of what appeared to be a massive air strike, New Delhi dispatches reported.

In another development, Pakistan broke diplomatic relations with India in retaliation to its recognition of Bangla Desh.

A spokesman for India's Foreign Ministry in New Delhi said earlier the Indian government had no plans to sever diplomatic ties with Pakistan.

The two countries maintained diplomatic relations in their two previous wars in 1948 and 1965.

India has supported the Bangla Desh rebels since March and has gained backing for this stand from the Soviet Union.

There was no immediate word from Moscow on whether the Soviet Union would follow India in recognizing the rebels.

Premier Alexei N. Kosygin said on Sunday in Denmark, where he was visiting, that the question of Kowalia recognition had not been considered.

The Soviet news agency Tass carried a New Delhi dispatch reporting that India had done so and noted that Prime Minister Indira Gandhi had told her Parliament that recognition signifies an important turning point in the history of national liberation movements.

The Pakistani government said recognition "exposed" India's hatred of Pakistan and its desire to destroy the country, a Pakistani broadcast said.

The Pakistani claimed their forces had made a general advance in all sectors along the border between India and West Pakistan and had crossed the Tavi River in the Jammu sector of Kashmir.

Cambodians Flee New Red Attacks

PHNOM PENH (AP) — North Vietnamese troops dealt the Cambodian Army another setback today, forcing it into retreat from a district town only 16 miles northwest of Phnom Penh. At least 50 Cambodians were killed or wounded.

About 150 troops fled from Bat Doung in the darkness before dawn after two days of fierce fighting.

About 50 of the survivors were reported to have reached safety at the nearby outpost of Phnom Baet.

Last week the Cambodian army's northeast front collapsed, sending thousands of troops and civilians fleeing north to the besieged provincial capital of Kompong Thom. The North Vietnamese were left in control of 25 miles of Highway 6.

Reports during the weekend said hundreds of the fleeing soldiers and civilians were killed during the retreat. The army abandoned three more hill positions during the weekend and withdrew the rest of its surviving force in the sector into Kompong Thom.

In Saigon, it was learned that U.S. Navy planes have nearly doubled attacks against the Ho Chi Minh trail in Laos since the dry season began. The aim of the air campaign is to reduce the movement of North Vietnamese reinforcements and war materials into Cambodia and South Vietnam.

The Pacific Fleet's two most powerful carriers, the nuclear-powered Enterprise and the Constellation, are sending more than 100 planes a day against the supply trail. Military sources anticipate an increase in North Vietnamese attacks on the aerial raiders, and more U.S. attacks on North Vietnam in retaliation.

Two such encounters were reported over the weekend. On Saturday surface-to-air missile fired on U.S. jets operating over Laos for the first time in nearly a month but missed their targets. The American jets did not return the fire.

On Friday U.S. fighter-bombers escorted B-52s on raids near the Mu Gia and Ban Ravang passes attacked three anti-aircraft radar sites on the North Vietnamese side of the border with unknown results.

During the rainy season that ended in October, the Navy kept only one carrier in the Tonkin gulf. The two now on station there have nearly 200 planes available for combat, support and reconnaissance missions over Laos and North Vietnam.

War In India

Pakistan reported earlier that it had seized 20 Indian border posts in Kashmir.

The tank battle began Saturday night when the Pakistanis sent two brigades of infantry and an armored regiment against Indian defensive positions in southern Kashmir near the West Pakistan border, an Indian spokesman in New Delhi said.

He said the battle raged throughout the weekend and that 28 Chinese-built T59 tanks were destroyed by the Indian forces. "Our losses were minor in the fighting," the spokesman added.

He said in East Pakistan Indian forces "are making significant advances and we have captured some territory northeast of Sylhet and south of Comilla." The two cities are key supply centers for Pakistan's army in the east. Sylhet is 123 miles northeast of Dacca, the provincial capital. Comilla is 50 miles southeast of Dacca.

Cancer Chasers Need \$1 Million

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Scientists say it will cost \$1 million and require skimming 7,600 gallons of fluid off growing human cancer cells to complete the next experiment with a newly discovered cancer virus.

The researchers are almost certain they've discovered human cancer virus, which would be a significant step in understanding the causes of the killer disease. But their conclusions are based largely on circumstantial evidence and they need more direct proof.

The crucial confirmation could come from a difficult, months-long procedure under way that will produce less than an ounce of material for injection in 10 guinea pigs and several rats.

"If this turns out to be conclusively a human cancer virus, if this works out the way we hope, we'll be light years ahead of where we stand now," Huebner said.

Such proof will be strong new evidence supporting a still unproven theory that each animal cell contains the seeds of cancer. Somehow, the theory proposes, genetic messages in a cell are unlocked, turn the cell cancerous and cause manufacture of cancer virus particles. These particles then infect other cells and pass along genetic information making them cancerous.

Nuisance Storm Skids into Area

Manchester skidded and tripped to work today during a nuisance storm shrouded in hazardous traffic warnings. The second storm in two weeks had more bluster than bite, leaving only three quarters of an inch of snow in its wake.

Unlike the storm of Thanksgiving Day, however, when five to six inches of snow was measured in Manchester, only about three quarters of an inch fell today, according to the National Weather Service at Bradley International Airport. A fine drizzle of rain made walking and driving an adventure, and state and local officials issued travel warnings.

What was to have been a leaf pickup day in Manchester today became instead a snow pickup day.

Weather gear, shovels and snow-blowers were the order of the day, as Manchester and Hartford area residents slid and skidded their way to and from the business of the day.

State Police at the Hartford Troop also reported numerous minor mishaps. One, caused when a truck jacked up at exit 92 in the westbound lane of the Wilbur Cross Highway, involved two other cars, and tied up traffic for a while. He Has Full Heart And Empty Wallet

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP) — Harry L. Jones is the kind of guy who'd give a stranger his last dollar. And does, frequently.

He's a policeman who, for the last 17 years on duty, has seen life at its worst. But he's not discouraged. He says he thinks people just need a little help.

Last week, for instance, Jones answered a routine report of family trouble. He said he found a woman and five ragged children—three girls and two boys, ages 10 years to 18 months—huddled in an attempt to keep warm in a freezing mist.

Inside the house, he said, was the children's father, drunk.

Earlier that day the woman had taken four of her husband's last \$11 and sent one of her children to the store for groceries. When the child returned, Jones said she told him, the man snatched the food away, stomped it to bits.

"I kicked the door open," Jones said. "Those folks were living there with just wall-to-wall floor—I mean no furniture at all, no food."

Jones said he radioed headquarters he was going to the grocery store, then spent the only money he had—\$6—on food for the family.

"None of that comes as a surprise to me," said Mrs. Jones, who has been married to the big-hearted Birmingham native for 18 of his 43 years.

"I recall one occasion he called home one night and asked if we had any money in the bank. I told him we had a little bit. He said he had found a young woman who had no place to go, so he paid her room rent at the YMCA for a week with a \$30 check.

"I had to go out and borrow the money the next day to cover the check," she said.

Recalling his experience last week, Jones says, "I was really touched by that family. I'm going to work with the man..."

Koreans Say Reds Ready For Warfare

SEOUL (AP) — The South Korean government proclaimed a state of emergency today, charging war preparations by North Korea.

President Chung Hee Park declared South Korea must "reposture" its defense arrangements in view of Communist China's admission to the United Nations and uncertainty over the level of future American support.

A government proclamation informed South Koreans their constitutional freedoms may be restricted and "social unrest that risks the national security will not be tolerated."

The major opposition party, the New Democrats, took issue with Park. A party spokesman said the president's aim appeared to be the security of his government rather than the security of the nation. If the situation was serious enough to warrant emergency measures, the spokesman added, it should have been discussed in the National Assembly.

Park said North Korea has increased infiltration of armed agents to South Korea and has carried out a massive military buildup of more than 2.5 million troops, including a regular military force of 500,000 men, a militia of 1.4 million and 700,000 Red youth guards.

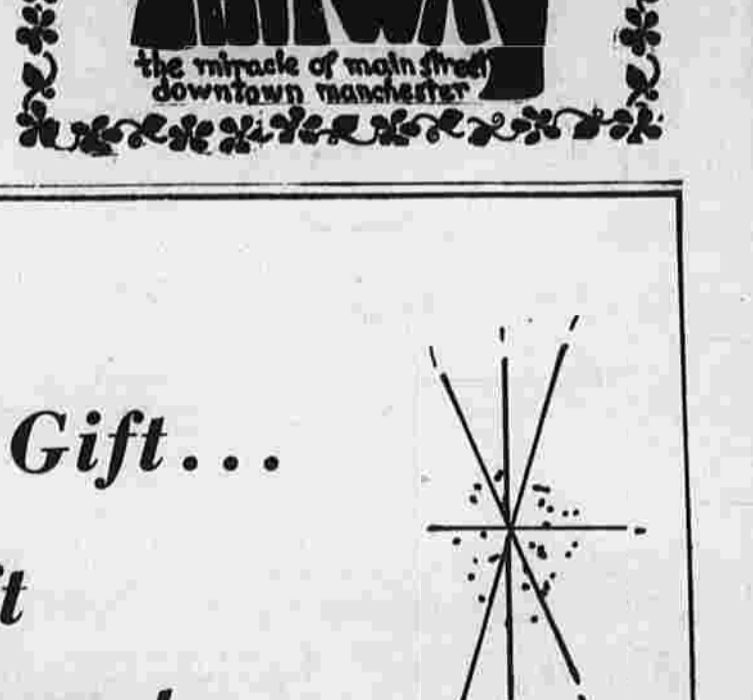

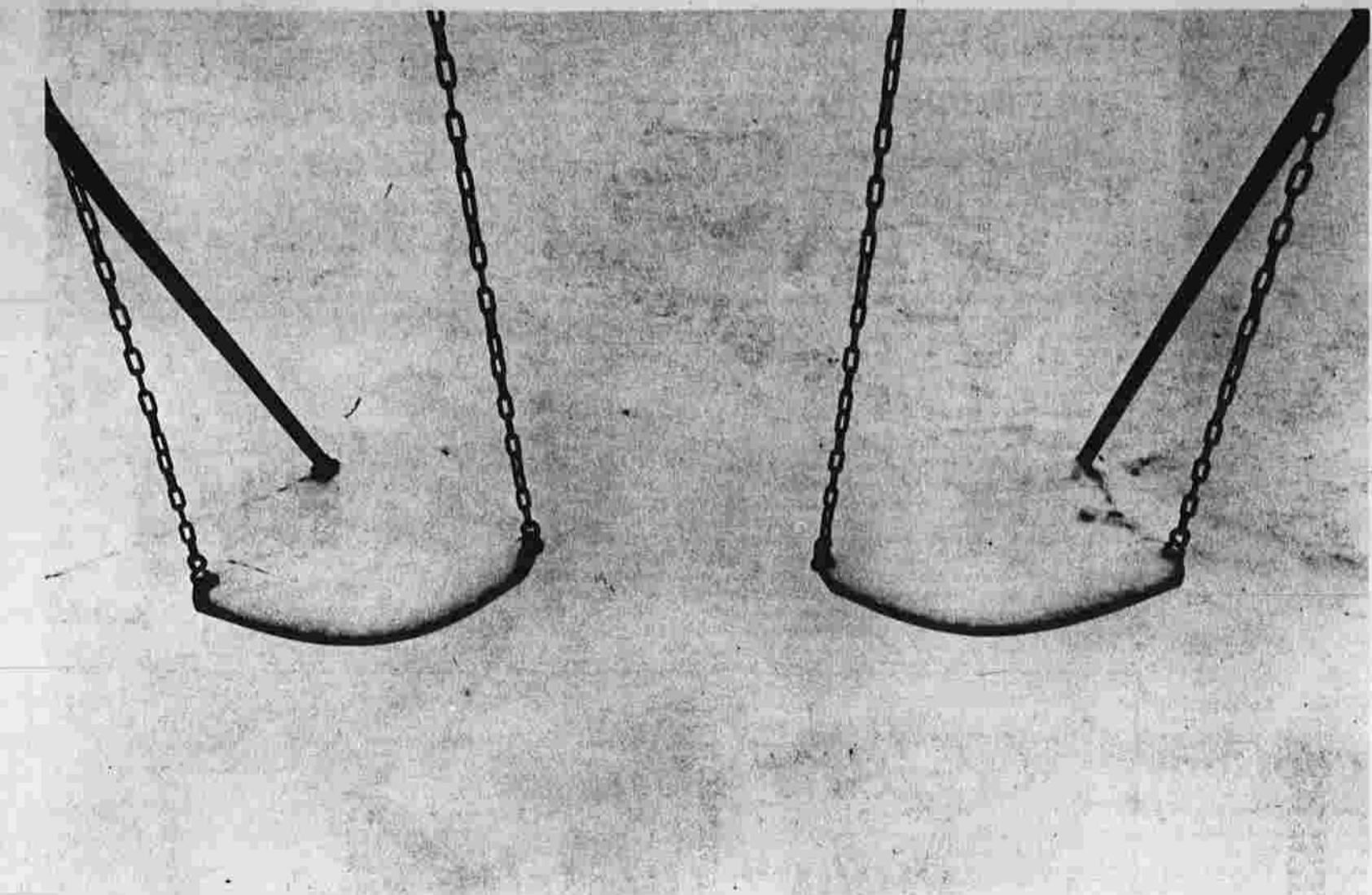

The possibility that the United Nations might become a real instrument of peace reached its peak when the United States chose to use its flag as a cover for a "police action" which did ultimately repel aggression in Korea, and when the prestige of the world organization was successfully mobilized to call off the assault on Sues in 1956.

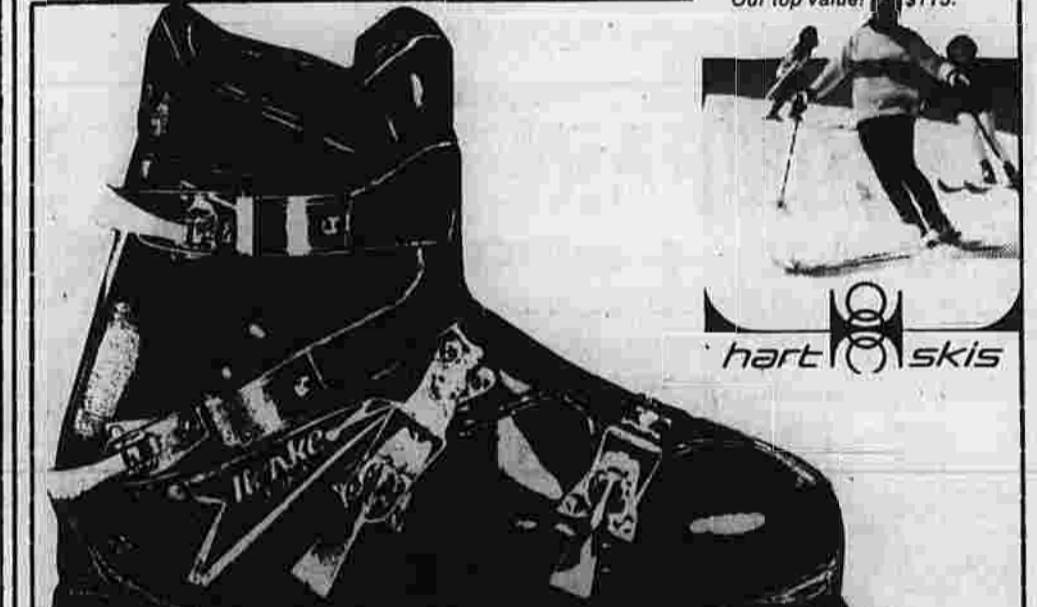

Hebron Town Offering \$40,000 For Cross-Dressman Land

An offer in the amount of \$40,000 has been made to the owners of the cross-dressman property on Reidy Hill and Greyville Rd. for the purchase of the property, according to First Selectman Aaron Reid. However, Reid stated at last week's Board of Selectmen meeting that attorneys for the owners have "indicated the offer will not be accepted" but no official word has as yet been received.

The Board of Finance, at its October meeting, voted 4 to 0 on a motion made by member Harvey Desruisseaux "to permit town meeting action on the recommendation of the purchase of the Cross-Dressman property at \$40,000."

Based on this, the selectmen called a town meeting, the legislative body, and the purchase of the property at \$40,000 was approved.

However, the Board of Finance at its November meeting, voted to appropriate only \$40,000 to purchase the property, "definitely a drastic statement of the townpeople."

In an effort to clarify the situation, Desruisseaux, who because of a previous commitment was unable to attend Saturday's meeting in an attempt to ascertain his intentions in making the motion.

He stated that "the exact intent of my motion was to allow this to go before a town meeting for the fear that it wouldn't otherwise and to seek a mandate from the townpeople."

"It is my opinion," Desruisseaux added, "that we received the mandate from the townpeople to purchase this property at \$40,000 and had I been there the November meeting, the would have made the motion to appropriate the \$40,000."

Reid reported that Richard Grant, chairman of the Board of Finance, who also attended Saturday's meeting, "has expressed his opinion that the Board's decision is not in the best interests of the town."

Grant stated that the Board has never held a meeting in December, even though it has been scheduled, and that there is no pressing business to come before the Board.

However, if Reid has received a rejection from the owners of the \$40,000 offer before the 15th, their meeting on the 16th night, they will definitely hold a meeting.

Seek Single Phone Exchange

In other action, the selectmen agreed to write a letter to the telephone company asking for what consideration it will give in making the town all on one exchange.

Resident John Silban stated that he did not "think it is conducive to the orderly development of the town" to have three different telephone exchanges, which results in some residents having to make a long distance call to other residents.

Silban reported how he and other townspeople had attempted to discuss the situation with the telephone company but it was like running into a "blank wall."

Mao Communism Attacked By Soviet Propagandists

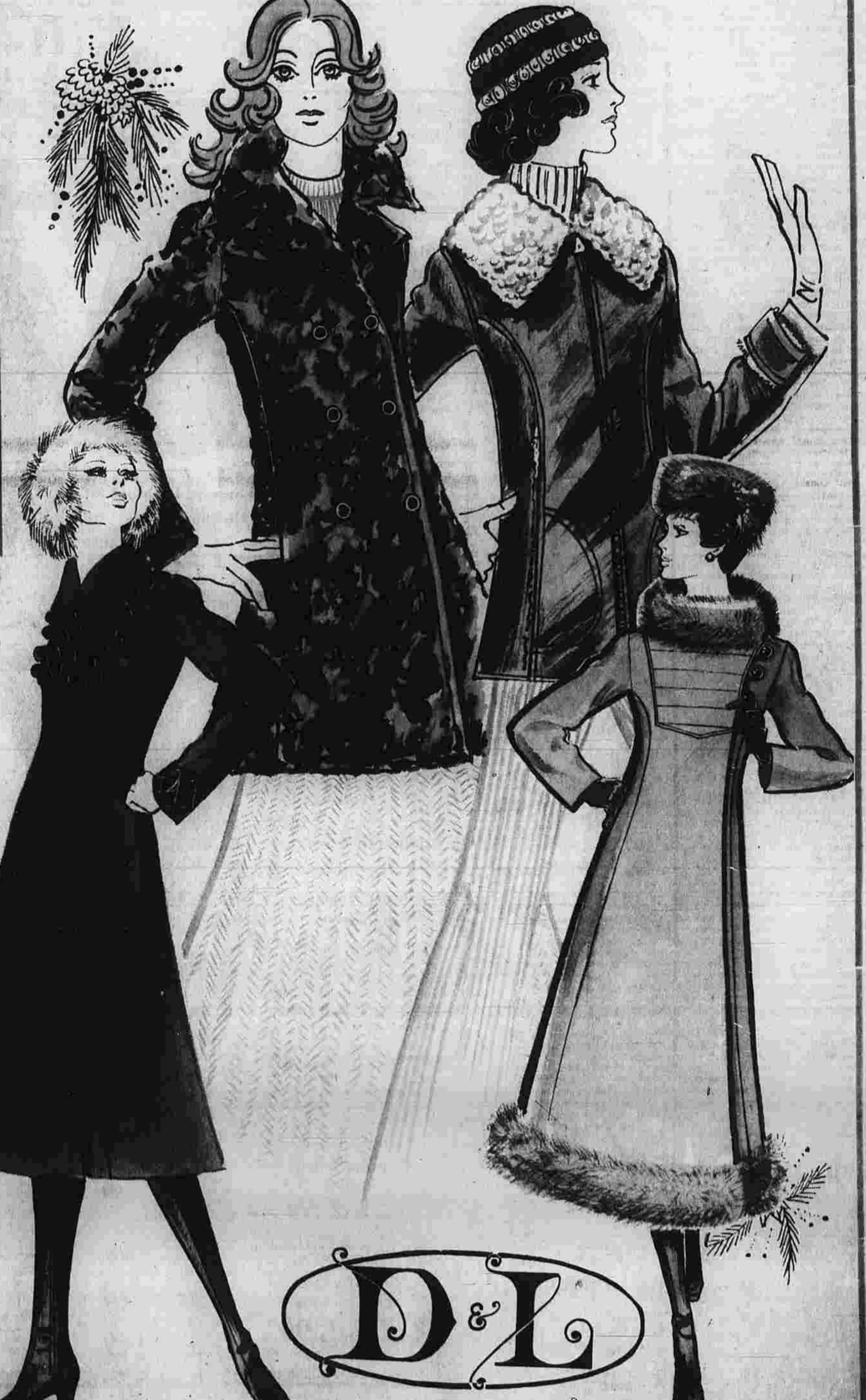

Kennedy Fears Too Many Bombs Hurt Cambodia

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Edward M. Kennedy says a new government study shows American bombing in Cambodia is causing substantial civilian casualties and driving people from their homes.

The Massachusetts Democrat said Sunday that the report, to be filed in about two weeks by Kennedy's subcommittee on refugees, details food and housing shortages among hundreds of thousands of refugees who have fled to Phnom Penh, the Cambodian capital.

The report was prepared by the General Accounting Office, at Kennedy's request and based on an on-site survey and interviews with refugees in Cambodia last August and September.

The field reports, Kennedy said in a statement, "document a situation that is deteriorating among the people of Cambodia."

"More than our government cares to admit, American military activities, especially the heavy bombing of many areas, are contributing substantially to the escalating regional crisis of the people."

FBI Probing Tests of M-16

NEW HAVEN (AP) — The FBI is investigating alleged concealment of defects in the M-16 rifles sold to the Army by Colt's Firearms Co. of Hartford, according to an agency spokesman.

The spokesman said Saturday the FBI must determine if rifles are getting through quality control tests with defects he said.

M Zone Proposal Before PZC Today

The Planning and Zoning Commission will meet tonight at 7:30 in the hearing room at the Municipal Building. It will hold public hearings on its proposed new Residential M Zone regulation, and on a zone change application for more business development off Spencer St.

The new M Zone is designed to reduce future apartment projects in Manchester and give the commission more control over them without prohibiting or reducing the number of apartments that could be constructed.

At the same time, the commission is proposing through this regulation to encourage individual home ownership by requiring proportional construction of small houses and two-family dwellings in the M Zone.

The proposal has evolved out of an increasing concern by the PZC that Manchester may soon become saturated with too many apartments unless strict controls are imposed.

The commission is proposing to repeal the provision for group dwellings in all zones which they are now allowed; Residence A, B and C and Business I, II and III.

The Residential M Zone would then become the only one in which apartments could be constructed.

The zone would exist only as a regulation and not be assigned to any specific area of town. Thus, any developer wanting to construct apartments would first have to get a change to M Zone for his tract of land.

The regulation would require a mixture of housing on any approved tract larger than 60,000 square feet.

Only one-third of the site could be developed for apartments or for two-family houses, but the entire tract could be developed for small single houses.

Only 20 per cent of the site approved for apartments could be devoted to actual floor area.

An isolated M Zone tract of less than 60,000 square feet would be exempt from the mixed housing requirement.

The proposal sets 20,000 square feet as the minimum site for apartment construction.

A developer granted the M Zone would have to submit an approved subdivision plan before he could begin construction.

Atty. Leon Podvora of Manchester is applying for a change to Spencer St. Zone for a seven parcel off the north side of Spencer St. near the East Hartford line. The land, presently zoned Residential AA and Rural Residence, was formerly tobacco acreage and is owned by the Delphine Kohn Holzman Trust.

In Next Fiscal Year CPEC Says \$200 Million Needed in New Taxation

Unless Gov. Thomas Meskall continues his cutbacks in state spending, Connecticut will end the current fiscal year about \$200 million more in the red, according to the Connecticut Public and Expenditures Council (CPEC).

The private research firm predicts also that Connecticut, at the start of the 1972-73 fiscal year next July will need \$200 million in new taxes, just to meet existing obligations.

The CPEC findings are printed in its special bulletin, "A Guide to Connecticut's 1972 Budget."

The CPEC says the state entered the current fiscal year with an estimated \$80 million gap between what the General Assembly appropriated for spending and what the CPEC estimates as revenue.

The governor already has cut \$50 million in spending and has said he will propose an additional \$2.5 million in revenue from lottery operations.

He reported also that the state's deficit, once as high as \$200 million and at just over \$244 million at last report, now down to \$262.3 million.

The CPEC, in estimating \$200 million in new taxes next year, "just to meet existing obligations," explains that \$122 million would be for paying off half of the deficit, \$14 million to offset the delayed formula about collecting inheritance taxes, \$38 million for postponed teacher salaries and \$10 million for the rest of commitments to the State Employees' Retirement Fund and to finance increased debt service.

Interest on the \$244 million deficit is costing the state \$7,200,000 in this fiscal year, the CPEC states. It recommends strongly that the deficit be paid off in two years.

Reds Land Probe On Mars' Surface

MOSCOW (AP) — An unmanned Soviet space capsule has become the first manmade vehicle to land safely on Mars. The capsule soft-landed last Thursday by parachute from the Mars 2 satellite and radioed signals to earth via the mother ship, the Soviet news agency said. It said Mars 2, launched in May, reached its destination after a flight of 185 days. Earlier probes by the Soviet Union and the United States either missed the planet, went into orbit around it, or failed to land safely.

Space Closeup

According to Tass, Mars 2 first orbited the planet. A descent craft then separated from the mother ship and entered the planet's atmosphere by parachute. It landed in the southern hemisphere of Mars, in the region with the coordinates 45 degrees latitude south and 195 degrees longitude west.
