### 'It Isn't Necessarily So' Compromise Often Necessary In Yugoslav 'Porgy' Version

BERLINADE — "There is no Serbian word for 'It isn't necessarily so.'" So when the Yugoslav version of George Gershwin's "Porgy and Bess" opened here this week, Specter Life sang, "On nije potrebno to." "It isn't necessarily so."

It is one of the compromises American director Irving Berlin had to accept in translating the mood and idiom of Catfish Row to the Balkans. As they rehearsed, both Yugoslav and American director discovered that their attempt at cultural cross fertilization was not so easy, but both learned something from the attempt.

"They wanted an American director because they wanted a production with soul and this is what I hope they are getting," said Barnea, who is rehearsing at the National Opera.

Amazingly Endurance  
 The effort itself signifies the amazing endurance of "Porgy's" popularity. It may be too hokey for black militants and white liberals in the United States, but Europeans lap it up. "There were 16 productions in West Germany alone this year," in addition to others in Copenhagen, East Berlin and Budapest. Each year since 1965 one of the early "Porgy's," William Warfield, has starred in the role of the Volkoper in Vienna.

Barnea himself has devoted most of his life as a singer to "Porgy and Bess." He was one of three "Porgies" in the Everyman Opera Company's production that carried the "Porgy" mythos through Europe from 1962 to 1964. A few members of the new Belgrade cast remember seeing Barnea perform the role here in 1964. ### Blast at IRA Wins Praise by Faulkner

BERLINADE — Northern Ireland's countryside electrical

Irish Premier Jack Lynch's condemnation of Irish Republican Army gunmen was praised early today by Premier Brian Faulkner of Northern Ireland. But he demanded action to follow the words.

"I warmly welcome his clear condemnation," said Faulkner. "I hope it will be backed up by efficient action."

Lynch told the Dublin parliament (Dail) that an attempt to unify Ireland by IRA terrorist methods would leave the nation a "desert of rubble."

"Every bomb exploded, every bullet shot, not only by the IRA but the British—and especially, every innocent person who loses his life, puts the day of reconciliation further and further away," he said.

In 28 months of violence in Northern Ireland, 198 persons have died.

The Northern Ireland and British governments have been putting diplomatic pressure on Lynch to crack down on the IRA. Northern security forces say the outlaw army uses the republic as a haven and weapon dump for its bombing and shooting raids in Northern Ireland.

## He Is a Hard Bargainer

LONDON (AP) — A well known yachtsman who occasionally leads an orchestra will be host to President Nixon in next week's season of summitry. Edward Heath also happens to be prime minister of Britain — with the reputation of a tough bargainer.

The sessions Monday and Tuesday in Bermuda come just a week after Nixon in talks with Georges Pompidou of France agreed to work toward devaluation of the dollar as part of a reevaluation of major moneys. This may cut some of the grand from under Heath, who earlier made it clear he backed the European view that Nixon unleashed the crisis with his new economic program and it was up to the United States to make the first move toward a settlement.

### Red Fire Downs Another U.S. Jet

SALGON (AP) — A North Vietnamese surface-to-air missile downed a second American F-4 Phantom II fighter jet in a week, but the two crewmen were rescued today — the pilot after dangling nine hours from a 70-foot tree deep in enemy territory.

The officers jumped from the Phantom as it spun at 1,600 miles per hour in the vicinity of the Mu Gia Pass, about 70 miles north of the demilitarized zone.

The pilots used their pocket radios to contact a command plane flying in the region and about 20 search planes and jet bombers.

Nixon Lifts Surcharge At Bermuda

HAMILTON, Bermuda (AP) - President Nixon arrived here today for two days of summit talks with Prime Minister Edward Heath and announced he has just signed a proclamation lifting the 10 per cent surcharge on foreign imports into the United States.

The action, the President told newsmen assembled before the residence of Bermuda's Governor, Lord Martinomere, will clear the way for wider talks on international trade.

On the Heath-Nixon agenda also is a crash program of international relief for East Pakistan. Authoritative sources said the British leader was certain American aid on a multi-million-dollar scale is essential for two reasons: "With their food dwindling and their communications shattered the Bengalis need help directly."

The United States must move fast to reverse the consequences of having backed the regime of President Yahya Khan. Health is ready to pledge full participation in an emergency program, a high-ranking British source reported.

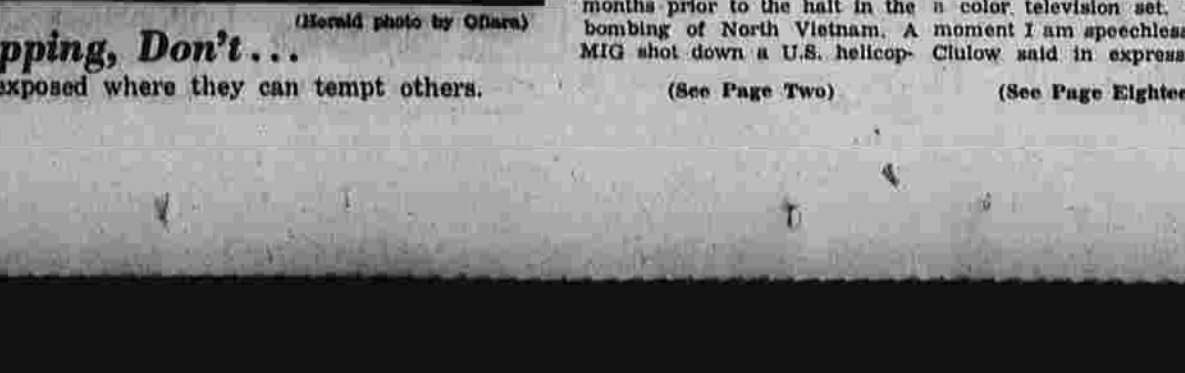
