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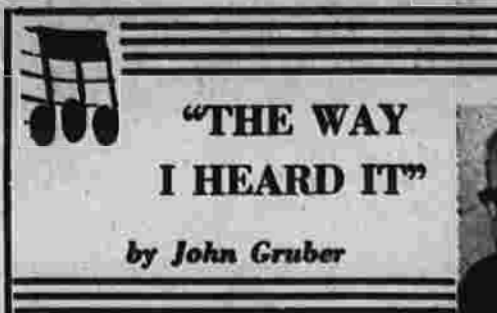

Inside Report The Ashbrook Threat

WASHINGTON — The White House is taking a surprisingly unperturbed view of the almost certain challenge to President Nixon by conservative Rep. John Ashbrook of Ohio for one major reason: Ashbrook should split the anti-Nixon protest vote with liberal Rep. Paul N. (Pete) McCloskey of California in the March 7 New Hampshire primary.

That is the prevailing consensus among the President's political operatives as Ashbrook makes a possible Dec. 27 announcement that he will enter the New Hampshire primary. With the assured backing of right-wing publisher William F. Buckley Jr., Ashbrook is expected to win.

Democrat Hubert Humphrey. If ever a Democrat merited the solid support of his party, it is Vice President Humphrey, a founder of the ADP staunch friend of union labor, a darling of the liberal intellectuals.

The general public is equally curious as to how Richard Nixon can testify. In 1960 the nation had enjoyed eight years of peace and prosperity as Vice President. Nixon had good credentials and the Republican Party had every reason to expect the voters' gratitude.

All of which needs to be remembered as you follow the winter "book" on the fortunes of the Messrs. Nixon, Muskie, Johnson, McGovern and Kennedy.

Look first at the fortunes of President Nixon. It's hard now to remember the state of the Union when he came to office three years ago. Yet the nation was as riven that day as it had not been since the Civil War.

Paradoxically, 83 per cent of the voters gave President Nixon a favorable "overall" rating, the highest he has had since October 1969. This seems to be attributable to his boldness in tackling the inflation problem.

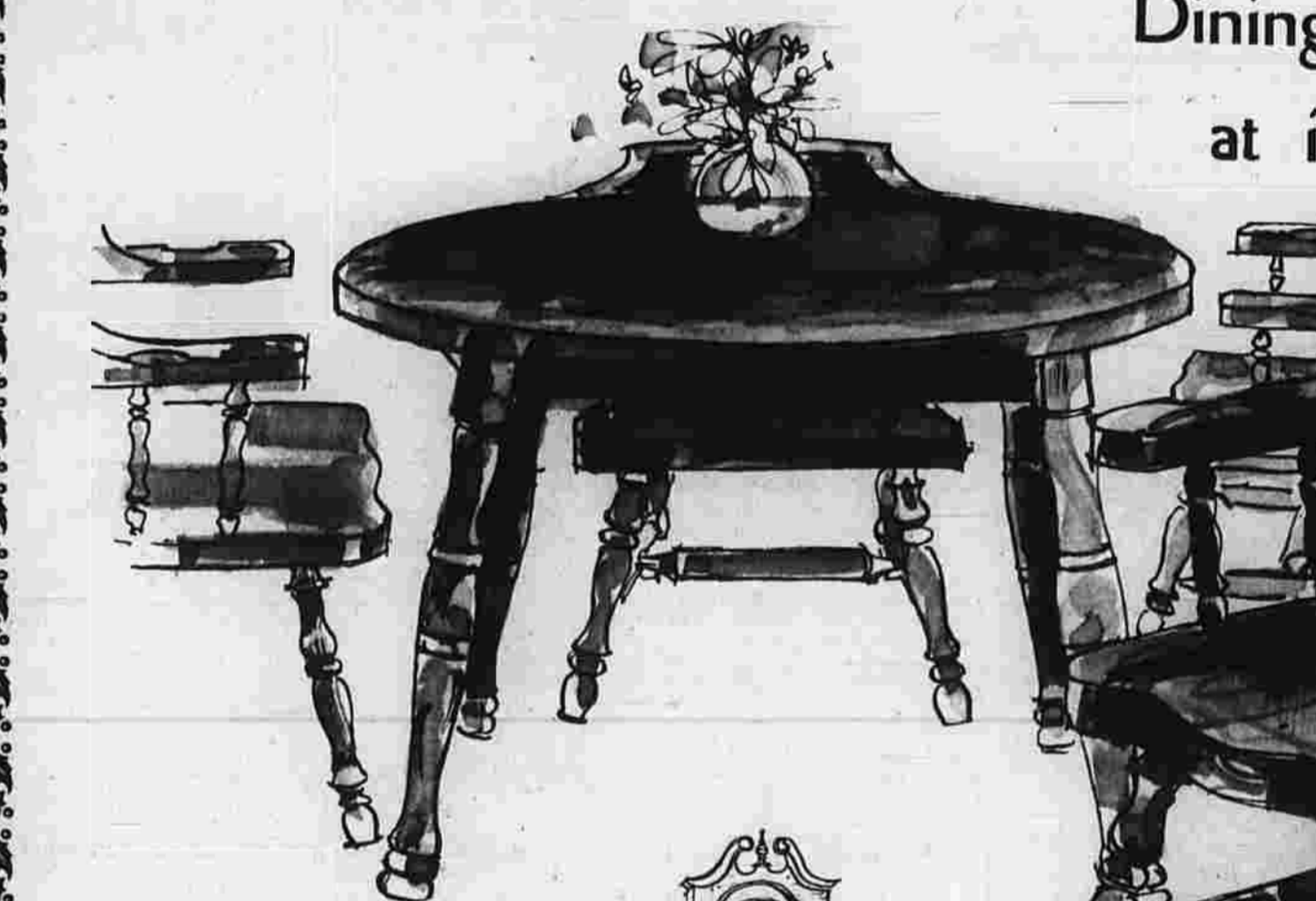

High Court Backs 'Pacts' With Accused

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court said today that bargaining between a prosecutor and an accused person in a criminal case is an essential component of the administration of justice.

In an opinion by Chief Justice Warren, the court said so-called "plea bargaining" should be encouraged if properly administered, and reversed the conviction of a man who claimed that the state reneged on a bargain.

"If every criminal charge were subjected to a full-scale trial, the states and the federal government would need to multiply by many times the number of judges and court facilities," the court said.

"Disposition of charges by plea discussion is not only an essential part of the process but a highly desirable part for many reasons."

"It leads to prompt and largely final disposition of most criminal cases; it avoids much of the corrosive impact of prison sentences that have no rehabilitative prospects; it relieves a congested prison system for those who are sentenced to long terms."

The court, in a unanimous order, granted a motion by the government for entry of a decree giving the motion to the federal government.

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Springfield Warehouse Burns Down

SPRINGFIELD, Mass. (AP) — A two-story brick warehouse owned by Railroad and Freight Salvage Corp. on Maine Street in the North End was destroyed Sunday by a smoky three-alarm fire that gave fire fighters an awkward battle.

Paint and thinner stored within the building produced thick clouds of smoke and toxic fumes.

Four firemen were treated for smoke inhalation, two at the scene and two others at a hospital. One of the latter also was treated for injuries suffered when he fell down a stairway.

The building's second floor was empty and its windows had been closed off with cinder blocks. Since the heat was so intense, firemen could not fight the fire from the roof, they were forced to break out the windows with hammers.

At the height of the blaze the roof collapsed and a billboard mounted there fell into the building.

"I'm sure it's a crime, and I know that," Patsy said.

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Pair Slain In Harlem Project

NEW YORK (AP) — "Strange people wander in here day and night and nobody stops them," says William B. Blue, a tenant in the Harlem housing project where a man and a woman were found shot to death early Sunday.

Teams of detectives today questioned tenants at the 84, 280 residents. But one was on vacation and the other was sick, an authority spokesman said.

The slayings were the fifth of the 31 projects in Manhattan and sixth in the last five months in city public housing developments.

Savagery Claims Dacca; Peace Waits at Doorway

DACCA (AP) — The jubilation had been shot in the chest, and savagery as Dacca's Bengalis throes. His arm had been severed their murdered relatives until it split, and his ankles and comrades in blood.

The city's Bihari community, among whom the Pakistani military regime found most of its collaborators, is the target. The Indian troops who occupied Dacca Thursday are trying to check the killings. But they cannot stop the slash in the dark and the back street reprisals.

Some 5,000 Bangla Desh guerrillas, armed with modern automatic weapons, race through the streets in crowded trucks and jeeps, disposing of the brand of justice to suspected traitors to their new nation. Two days before the Pakistani surrender, 120 local intellectuals were rounded up and tortured to death.

Their decomposing bodies, kicked over by crowds and festooned by dogs, still lie scattered among waterlogged clay pits on the outskirts of the city. Hundreds go daily to the scene, taking their children with them.

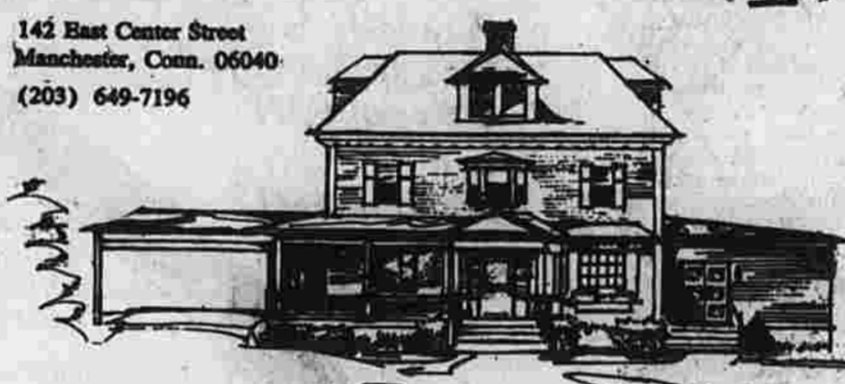

Most Withholding Payments Will Drop

IRS Officials Predict More Cash for Spenders

WASHINGTON (AP) — Outlets in federal income taxes that take effect Jan. 1 will put more cash into the pockets of most Americans. Families with just one wage earner will benefit the most, but there's good news for almost all taxpayers. Some of the decrease in federal deductions from paychecks paid with 13 per cent or \$1,600 may be offset by higher state and local taxes. There's also an increase in the income tax for the Social Security taxes, though the 0.3 per cent rate of deduction probably will remain the same. The ceiling goes from \$7,500 this year to \$9,000 in 1972, meaning deductions will continue for a longer time next year. But the changes in federal tax exemptions and allowances should boost American spending power to levels never seen before, according to Internal Revenue Service officials. A generous 52nd Congress has sped up the impact of tax-reform laws passed in 1969 and raised the standard exemption for individuals and their dependents from \$775 in 1971 to \$750 in 1972. That means the IRS will count on bigger personal exemptions next year, so it will take out a smaller chunk of each paycheck.

Deadlock Exists Over U.N. Chief

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. — Diplomats predicted that the Security Council might remain deadlocked today in its efforts to choose a new U.N. secretary-general. "Today might not be the last day," said one "it might be Tuesday." Another said the deadlock could last even longer, forcing the General Assembly to delay its plans to adjourn Tuesday. Secretary-General U Thant is retiring Dec. 31. The assembly can appoint the new secretary-general only after a recommendation from the 15-member Security Council. To get a recommendation, a candidate must receive the votes of nine council members and escape a veto. One diplomat said the five veto-holding permanent members probably would vote the same as last Friday, when one or more of them rejected all seven candidates.

General Motors Hails End To Trade Surcharge

DETROIT (AP) — A General Motors spokesman says the company has been made in the council, new economic agreement which includes devaluation of the dollar and the elimination of the import surcharge "will make our cars more competitive in price and should help slow down imports. 'It won't help exports because of various licensing costs, gasoline prices and vehicle size, which make locally built cars attractive in those foreign markets,' the spokesman said Sunday. "However, it should help us because there is more other than imports in an international monetary agreement than the surcharge, which was announced as temporary. 'Just how much it will help our automobile industry will be influenced by the future relationship of the other currencies to the dollar,' he said.

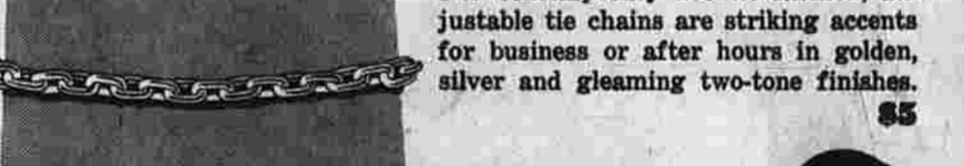

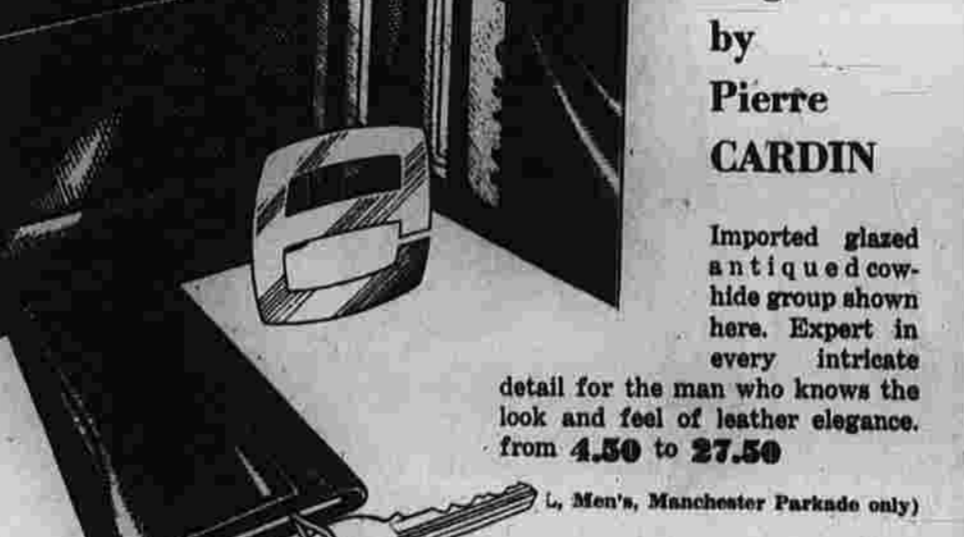

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Business Mirror Confusion Covers Fate Of New No-Fault Insurance

NEW YORK (AP) — An accident victim cannot sue for injuries under the new no-fault insurance law in New York, a federal judge ruled today.

The judge's decision is a major blow to the insurance industry, which has been fighting the law since it was passed in 1965.

The law requires drivers to carry no-fault insurance, which covers medical expenses and lost wages for accident victims.

The judge ruled that the law does not allow a victim to sue for pain and suffering, which is a common feature of traditional liability insurance.

Born in Utica, N.Y., Miss Chulow was brought to Manchester in 1918 by her parents, the late John G. and Rebecca Atkinson Chulow. Her parents also had two sons: Stanley, deceased; and S. Three Brigades Due to Remain in South Viet. SAIGON (AP) — By the end of January, the American ground combat force in Vietnam will be reduced to three independent infantry brigades—the last elements of a fighting force that once totaled more than 11 divisions. Highly placed military sources confirmed Monday that the U.S. 101st Airborne Division will be withdrawn from Vietnam by the end of January, leaving one of its three brigades behind. One brigade already has been withdrawn. The 196th Infantry Brigade, once part of the Americal Division, and the 3rd Brigade, 1st Air Cavalry Division are the only other U.S. ground combat units left in Vietnam. The 101st Airborne will be reconstituted at its long-time stateside base, Ft. Campbell, Ky., the sources said. Gen. John H. Cushman, now commander of the Delta Regional Assistance Command, will take the 101st home and will command it at Ft. Campbell, they added. Maj. Gen. T.M. Turpin, currently commander of the 101st Airborne, will take over Cushman's job as commander of the Delta Advisory Command. Turpin likely will be the last two-star general to command the Delta Regional Assistance Command, since the entire U.S. advisory effort is being cut back sharply. The remaining three brigades will total 15,000 to 20,000 men—roughly the equivalent of a division. They will provide security for American air and logistics units based in the Hue, Da Nang and Saigon areas.

Supreme Court Rules

Speedy Trial Applies After Person Accused

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court ruled today that the constitutional guarantee of a speedy trial applies only after a person has been accused of a crime and not to delays by the government in seeking an indictment.

The court overturned a U.S. District Court ruling which had dismissed charges against two Maryland men because the government had delayed almost three years in seeking an indictment against them charging fraud.

William R. Martin and Samuel C. Crutch, who operated a firm in North Brentwood, Md., which installed home intercom, fire control, burglar and other electronic systems, said the delay made it difficult for them to present an adequate defense.

"In our view, however, the Sixth Amendment speedy trial provision has no application until a putative defendant in some way becomes an accused, an event which occurred in this case only when the appellees were indicted," the court opinion delivered by Justice Byron R. White said.

The Sixth Amendment provides that "in all criminal prosecutions the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial..." White said. "On its face, the protection of the amendment is activated only when a criminal prosecution has begun and extends only to those persons who have been 'accused' in the course of that prosecution."

The court said that statutes of limitation provide adequate safeguards against prejudice to defendants resulting from pre-indictment delay, and it said Martin and Crutch were "not aggrieved."

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Ban on Exemptions Affirmed by Court

WASHINGTON (AP) — The aided efforts to skirt Supreme Court affirmed today a decision banning federal tax-exempt status for private white schools set up to avoid public school desegregation.

The court made no comment in refusing to review a decision by a three-judge panel of the U.S. District Court here issued last June 30 and affirmed the lower court's decision.

The tax-exempt status was taken away initially by a preliminary injunction granted Jan. 30, 1970 to Negro public school children in Mississippi and their parents who charged exempting the private schools.

The government at first merely asked schools whether they discriminated against Negroes, but later asked whether they discriminated against Negroes.

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State Calls Off Watchdogs In Out-of-State Purchases

HARTFORD (AP) — Vermont called off its agents today from Vermont and New Hampshire where they had been scouting for Connecticut residents making large purchases of liquor.

Work-Study Program
Reported Doing Well**

Tolland High School's Co-operative Work-Study Program is reported to be doing well. The program is for expansion of the program to include additional students.

A total of 45 students, mostly high school seniors, is currently enrolled in the program. Frank Lucette, work-study program co-ordinator, told the Board of Education recently that this is considered to be the maximum load one teacher can handle, while still providing classroom instruction, placement and on-the-job supervision.

The students are employed in a wide variety of jobs in the Tolland, Vernon, Ellington area, ranging from retail, to hospital and printing jobs in addition to other semi-skilled employment.

The students do not take jobs away from adults, nor has the current economic slump had appreciable effect on the availability of the jobs.

The students are placed, based on their abilities, needs, interests and vocational plans as well as their academic standing. A large dose of guidance counseling and screening is involved in the placement process by Lucette, the high school guidance department and the classroom teachers. Once a student is placed on the job, the local job retention ratio is excellent. Only a few instances have occurred where the student has not worked out, sometimes because he has not been allowed to advance further than his original limited job.

In far more instances the student's job has increased along with his experience and capabilities.

The work experience student is also the best salesman, and is creating other jobs for additional students. In several area industries the success of a work-study student has led to the provision of additional jobs.

Student Experience

During the board meeting four students explained their experiences in the program.

Richie Malchow has been employed by a woodworking company, after completing several years of workshopping and related training at the high school. Although he is limited by his age to only using certain tools, his job responsibilities have increased considerably and he is looking forward to working at the same place after graduation with an advance position.

Karen Salata was employed by the Journal Publishing Company originally as a typist, but her on the job experiences have expanded to include learning how to spot, layout and paste up advertising copy and to running a computer. She puts in a five-hour, five-day a week employment schedule in addition to her classroom work.

Kevin Dalrymple is employed as a stock room clerk at Rockville General Hospital with inventory control responsibilities, and looks forward to completion of his driver education course. He also works in an active membership with the Tolland Volunteer Fire Department as do several of the high school students.

Tina Selby, an art major at the high school, is an unlikely candidate for the work-study program. She holds a highly technical job at FPGC silk silk screen printing, and is "teaching me things I could learn in college."

The work study program "is a very organized way to go to school," she told the school board members, enthusiastic in her support of the program. In addition to working she takes English, Physics, Art and Band.

Both Miss Selby and Dalrymple announced their plans to go on to college.

Problems and Assets

Transportation of the students is the number one problem, according to Lucette. No bus is available for the program and she is badly needed which could accommodate 12 to 14 pupils. Another problem is the need for more scheduling flexibility

Jan. 4 Town Meeting
To Vote on Purchase**

The Board of Selectmen Saturday morning set Tuesday, Jan. 4, 4 p.m. at the Hebron Elementary School as the date for the town meeting to vote on the \$500,000 appropriation approved by the Board of Finance for buying the Gross-Dressman property on Ruddy Hill and Greyville Rd.

After almost a year of negotiations with the owners, informal meetings and even a town meeting to act on the purchase—which proved to be unnecessary because the finance board had not appropriated any money—the question of whether or not the town should purchase the property will be finalized at the upcoming meeting.

Listed on the warning for the meeting, if the purchase is approved, will be approval of the method of financing. The Board of Finance is recommending that \$20,000 be appropriated from the reserve fund for future land acquisition and development with the balance to be financed over three years on short term notes.

Also, on the recommendation of the Board of Finance, residents will be asked to vote as to whether the town should request the use of federal and/or state funds to assist in the purchase of the property.

Both the Recreation and Conservation Commission have recommended that these funds not be requested as the property would have to be opened to the public and could not be used for Hebron residents only.

Committee Suggested

Also on the warning for the town meeting will be a request for authorization to set up a purchasing committee for fire equipment.

This committee would consist of the first selectman, the Board of Finance chairman, the fire chief, and possibly a member-at-large. Its function would be basically to draw up specifications for new equipment, money for which has been put aside in reserve funds over the past several years.

The selectmen agreed that a committee should be set up to handle the method of increasing fees for driveway permits, sanitary permits and other building permits, as necessary.

Residents will be asked for authorization to appoint a committee to consist of the first selectman, chairman of the Planning and Zoning Commission and the chairman of the Board of Finance.

There is a possibility that one other item, a request from the Registrar of Voters to establish two seats for election officers, other than the moderator, will be included on the warning.

First Selectman Aaron Reid reported that he has received notification from Republican registrar James Drury that this request is forthcoming but no official notification has been received.

Derby also mentioned the possibility of increasing the membership of the registrar and the town clerk from two years to four years. Reid suggested that any selection notify both the Republican and Democratic Town Committee, request the committee before taking any action.

Complain About Cyclists

Second Selectman Robert Dixon mentioned that he had received several complaints, including his own complaint, concerning the motorcycle rally held throughout town on Dec. 4.

About two hundred machines participated in the rally and Dixon stated that several drivers almost caused serious accidents by cutting across sidewalks and other roads. Also, at one spot, the motorcycle club set up one of its members to direct traffic.

Reid suggested that the selectmen write a letter to the club "making a recommendation that in the future consideration be given so that they (the selectmen) don't have to ban them from town and that extreme caution be taken to avert accidents."

Reid also mentioned the possibility that constables could be assigned to direct traffic at the next rally.

Requests for a snowmobile ordinance in town have been received by the selectmen. Reid felt that if the state regulations on snowmobiles were published, this would be sufficient.

The major problem, he said, seemed to be the "late hours" the snowmobiles are operated. Dixon requested that sign directing traffic to Hebron be installed at the Bolton exit off of Rt. 64. There are signs to Bolton and to Colchester but none to Hebron. The selectmen will ask the state to install a sign at this intersection.

In other matters, the selectmen voted to award flowers to the family of Mrs. Burton Hill, who died last Friday. Mrs. Hill was Hebron's town clerk for fifteen years.

Cambodian Refugees Crowding Capital

PHNOM PENH, Cambodia (AP) — Cambodia now has 300,000 war refugees and two-thirds of them are crowding the capital to escape fighting the three sides of Phnom Penh.

Phnom Penh is a city of 1,500,000 people. The United States spends millions on military aid to Cambodia but no money for refugees.

Refugees in provincial towns and villages, estimated to total 100,000, are worse off. Communist forces control most of the highway so the displaced persons depend on air transport for relief supplies.
