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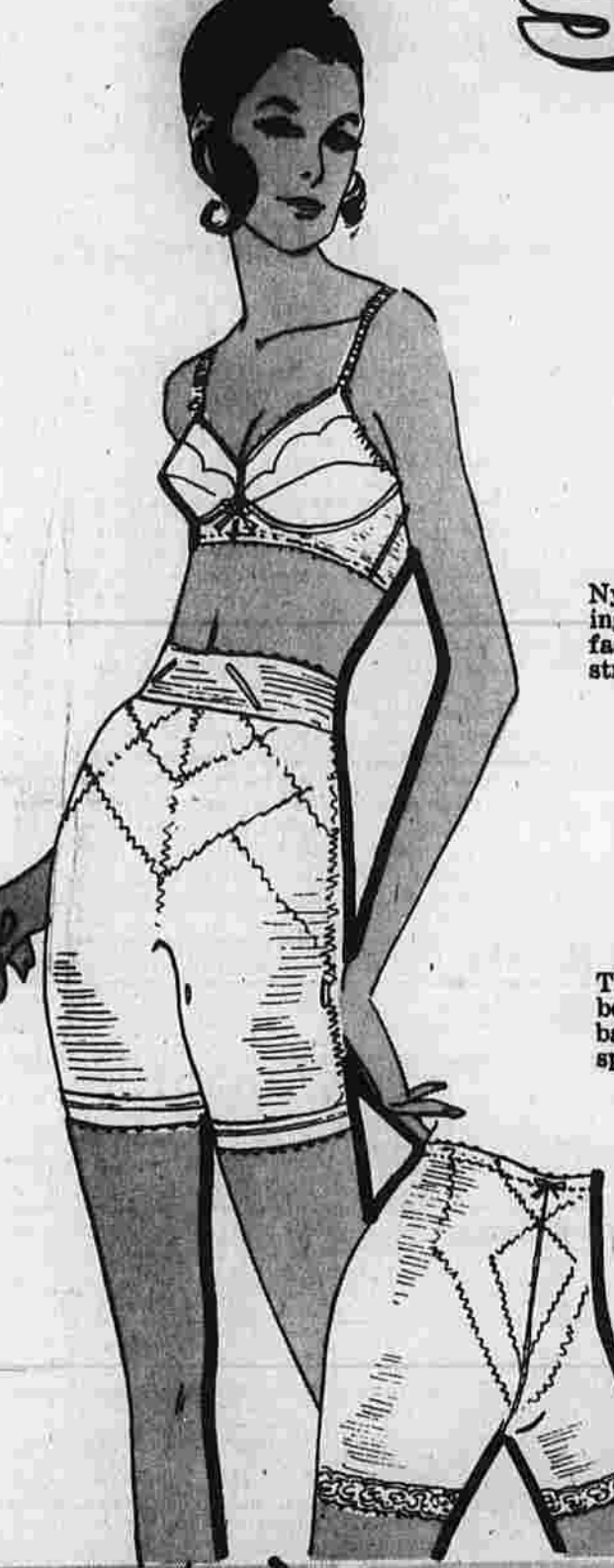

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The Release Of Hoffa

It would have made the President's conditional commutation of the sentence of James R. Hoffa a better thing, we think, if Mr. Nixon were not able to expect political gain from it.
The special relationship between the President and the Teamsters Union has not been a pretty thing to watch. Neither, for that matter, is it pleasant or reassuring to notice the knee-jerk condemnation which is all so many other unions have to offer the President of their country. But just as the union people of this country have learned to reject, and on occasion repudiate with their votes, union leadership which takes extreme and unfair stance, so they are likely also to reject the special solicitude Mr. Nixon has displayed for Mr. Hoffa, who is not only famous for his rough, tough exercise of union power, but who stands convicted for some of his actions.

The Game Nobody Can Win

All the post mortems on the power politics aspects of the latest war in Asia share a common insight and a common blindness.
Perhaps the thing which showed everybody how sharply power politics was involved was the war, as the war ended, both United States and Russian naval units were reported to be in the Bay of Bengal, drawn, as if irresistibly, toward the conflict in which each had suddenly discovered it had a new client state.

The Right Principle

All punditdom is chalking up the defeat of Pakistan as a major setback for American foreign policy, and the American denunciation of India's aggression as a major blunder. We suspect that as events work themselves out, these diplomatic losses will prove to be less important than they now seem, while the principle that has been at stake in this attitude will prove to be far more important than the pundits have grasped.

Inside Report

WASHINGTON—Behind North Vietnam's massive and bloody winter offensive in the Plain of Jars region of Laos is the clear intent of undermining President Nixon's February trip to Communist China.
There are, to be sure, additional explanations. But as viewed by analysts here, Hanoi wants to send another strong signal to Peking that Hanoi looks with great suspicion and some fear on the Nixon visit.
Moreover, that intent is believed to be matched in Moscow, whose ties to Hanoi are closer than generally realized by the Russians with India. The Soviets are getting yet closer to viet shipments of arms, food and transport to Hanoi are now at their highest point in several years. Experts inside the Nixon administration believe the war could have been averted only if Pakistan abruptly reversed its national policy and granted India a near-independence to East Pakistan.
The critics imply it is somehow an American responsibility that this did not happen.
Thus, the U.S. government allowed commercial outlets to sell Pakistan military spare parts even after most American aid was cut off in the wake of the bloody repression in East Pakistan. But to suppose that such last straws would in fact have persuaded Pakistan to disavow itself to base foreign policy on the suspension of disbelief.
Now, it is sensible enough to argue that in the situation even grasping at straws should have been tried and that the U.S. would look better today if it had rejected more strongly to the Pakistan brutality. To this extent, a case can be made that the American policy failed. Still, if the argument is less over how events have been tried and more over what rhetorical policy should have been chosen, the thrust of American policy was far more right than wrong.
For while Pakistan's internal policies were an affront to anyone of conscience, it was India that broke the peace among nations. Most of the commentators and the loudest senators seem to have trouble understanding that this is a matter of principle. We suggest they talk it over with the Rumanians and Yugoslavs, who perfectly well understood the principles involved when they voted against the Indo-Soviet pact at the UN.
The principles include: One settled dispute should not be interjected by a nation's internal policies; no business of its neighbor. Harsh principles, perhaps, since Pakistan's policies in India and the refugees did, in a perfect world they remain the only principles around which a peaceful international order can be built.
If India is to play savior to Pakistan threatened by their own government, why should not the U.S. play savior to Cuba threatened by their own government? (We wonder what the presidency of America's Indian policy would have said if the Marines had gone ashore to stop the bloodbath following Castro's rise to power.) Even more to the point, if India is justified in intervening to repair chaos in East Pakistan, why should not the Soviet Union intervene to repair chaos in Rumania or Yugoslavia?
Principles is not notoriously effective in deterring the Rumanians, to be sure, and eventually they might indeed invade Yugoslavia when they consider the moment ripe. Still, if the Indian affair is a matter of pick your principle—a democracy cannot be a policy of aggression against a military regime, or invading your neighbor is wrong—then the United States picked the right one — WALKER STREET JOURNAL.

Still Serious, Hospital Says Of Chevalier

PARIS (AP) — Hospital authorities said today that Maurice Chevalier was in unchanged and serious condition, but his private secretary gave a more encouraging report after visiting the 58-year-old showman.
Necker Hospital, where Chevalier has been undergoing treatment for two weeks because of a kidney ailment, said a health bulletin Sunday that "deterioration in the condition of Maurice Chevalier is continuing slowly but steadily." Hospital officials gave no explanation for the seemingly more favorable report.
Felix Faquet, Chevalier's secretary, told newsmen in a visit that he was in his armchair. He is all right. He is better. He is not in bed. His treatment is continuing."
More confusion was caused by the director of Necker Hospital, Georges Ours, who said in a television interview Sunday that no further treatment with an artificial kidney machine was planned. He said this indicated that the patient could no longer tolerate the treatment or that the treatment had become useless.
The hospital bulletin this morning contradicted this, saying that the artificial kidney treatment "which brings a marked improvement in the time it is used, will be continued when necessary."



Aegean Resort Hides A Refinery Contest

ALAIQA, Turkey (AP) — This pleasant beach resort on the sparkling Aegean Sea is the site of a test of powerful competition between the United States and the Soviet Union.
Turkey's third oil refinery—designed by Russians but built by an American contractor—is scheduled to start operations by the end of 1972. Construction is eight months behind schedule. The Turks attribute the delay to late Soviet deliveries of machinery and equipment, plus labor and financing problems. The American firm—the Badger Co. of Cambridge, Mass.—blames it on deficient Soviet construction design, lack of equipment as well as labor troubles. "It's a miracle we are so far along," said one engineer. The Russians claim the responsibility for delays and mixups lies with Turkish shippers.

Robert Actor Veteran Lowery Dead at 57

HOLLYWOOD (DAP) — Actor Robert Lowery, who played the role of a man who runs a newspaper reporter in more than 90 movies in the 1950s and 1960s, died Sunday of a heart attack at his Hollywood apartment Sunday a few hours after complaining of illness at a restaurant.
Lowery, 57, died of a heart attack. He was married and divorced from actress Barbara Farrell and Jean Parker. His son, who was believed to be Wilcox, He had a son, Robert, now 18, in Miss Parker. His mother, Leah Hanks, also survives.
Funeral services were being arranged.

Foiled Hijack Attempt Like an Instant Replay

CHICAGO (AP) — Authorities say a man who threatened to blow up a Northwest Airlines jet unless paid \$500,000 ransom may have been trying to reenact last month's successful hijacking by a skydiver.
FBI agents said Sunday that the man who threatened to blow up the plane Friday was taken, and that the pilot he allegedly held on the ground was an American. Turkish engineers must tell security officials why the hijacking was so successful. The FBI said that at least the first two bullets in the gun were blanks. Despite reports in the hijacker fired two shots. Rev. Howard H. Callahan, pastor of the Miami-Bethel Baptist Church, said he was in the plane at O'Hare International Airport in Chicago after holding the plane and 24 persons aboard hostage for 10 hours. He had allowed all but one of the passengers to leave the plane. The pilot and crew notified out a front exit door without hood and scheduled to appear in court today.
Authorities speculated that the man who threatened to blow up the plane was an attempted replay of the hijacking in Houston when a skyjacker parachuted from a jet with \$200,000 and gave himself up.

Hoffman, whose selection was announced by the association Sunday, has driven 1.8 million miles in 32 years of truck driving and has one 980 road accident on his record. The association said he also helped save the life of an auto accident victim and helped put out two fires along his route.

Tolland Board of Selectmen Moves To Administration Building

Today was moving day for the Board of Selectmen which moved into the administration building, formerly the Tolland County State Jail.

The selectmen have a two room suite on the first floor of the building. One room will be used as an office, while the second room will serve as a conference room for the holding of meetings by town boards and commissions.

It is anticipated that use of the conference room will reduce the strain on the Town Hall for meetings. No meetings will be held in the town clerk's office, now that the conference room is available.

Many nights the three room Town Hall has been the scene of two or three simultaneous meetings.

Furniture for the new offices has been donated by the Connecticut Bank and Trust Co. which purchased all new furniture when it moved into its new offices in the Rockville development area.

While the furniture is not new, it is a tremendous improvement over the battered wood desk and chair with the collapsing arm, used for many years by the town's first selectman.

The basic color scheme of the newly renovated offices is green to complement the new carpet. The Tolland Junior Women's Club has agreed to make the drapes for the offices, which have been freshly painted and sprung up.

The present selectmen's office in the Town Hall may be earmarked for use by the town's registers of voters, according to first selectman Erwin Stoetzer. The main room will continue to be used for meetings and by the Board of Assessors for office space. The Town Clerk's office will remain in its present location.

The selectmen will join the judge, Dennis road superintendent and resident state trooper, all of whom have already moved into the Administration Building.

Considerable remodeling work has been necessitated by the building's deteriorated condition at the time it was turned over to the town at no charge in August, 1969. The renovations were made by Walter Palmer, contractor.

The heating system had to be replaced, as did the roof of both the building and the barn. Insulation was installed and several structural alterations and repairs were made.

Once an 'Outcast,' Brandt Wins Status

 government's treaties with the BRONN, Germany (AP) — Only a few years ago opponents were maligning him as an "outcast" and "traitor." Now West Germany's first ambassador, Brandt says he gave up nothing that had not been given away long ago.

He faces a test of strength on the issue in May when the Bundestag, Brandt's legislative body, will vote on ratification of the treaties.

The stocky, gravel-voiced leader has used the office to lay the groundwork for a change in the political face of Europe. His stature in the 25 postwar years is likely to be rivaled only by Konrad Adenauer, West Germany's first chancellor, and Helmut Schmidt, Brandt's successor.

Brandt's election in October 1969 can claim a straight run of success in improving his country's image and its relations with neighbors, especially in the East.

He is also credited with helping to break a stalemate on the European Community market. His relations with the United States and East-West treaty problems are two chief topics in his talks with Nixon.

The outside world has already paid tribute to Brandt by awarding him the Nobel Peace Prize for 1971. His own country will give a change of status to his next visit in a national election.

Brandt's success abroad has sometimes obscured the fact he was born as Herbert Franz in the small town of Helmstedt in the German Democratic Republic. He adopted the name Willy Brandt while in exile in Norway. He returned to Germany in 1945 as a Norwegian citizen, but became a German citizen in 1951.

He became federal minister of the interior in 1966 and later national leader of the Social Democratic Party.

In 1968, he came to Bonn, as foreign minister and vice chancellor when his party formed a coalition with the Christian Democrats in 1969.

The Social Democrats won enough votes to dominate the government in a coalition with the tiny party of Free Democrats, and Brandt was elected chancellor. The title corresponds to that of prime minister or premier in most other countries operating under the parliamentary system.

One American Among 157 Dead Seoul Hotel Fire Worst in History

SEOUL (AP) — A U.S. Embassy spokesman today identified an American among 157 people killed in a Christmas Day hotel fire in Seoul, South Korea.

The fire, which broke out at 11:30 p.m. on Dec. 25, killed 157 people and injured 100, according to a spokesman at the U.S. Embassy.

The fire broke out in the 22-story Hotel New Seoul, a luxury hotel on Christmas Eve. The fire started in a second-floor coffee shop and spread to the main floor.

The fire was the worst in the history of Seoul, surpassing the 119 killed in the Wincott Hotel fire in 1960.

At least 157 people died in the fire, including the American victim, George W. Goodwin, 49, a civilian employee at the nearby Osan Air Force Base.

Goodwin, 49, is survived by his mother, Mrs. Ruth Goodwin of Blackwell, Okla., the spokesman said. He was one of nine Americans registered at the hotel.

The hotel was built in 1960 and was the worst hotel fire in the history of Seoul, surpassing the 119 killed in the Wincott Hotel fire in 1960.

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Court Martial Dooms Five After Turkey Terrorism

ISTANBUL, Turkey (AP) — 11 Turkish provinces April 25 a martial law court handed down death sentences today to five men and three women, including a husband and wife, for their part in urban terrorism that climaxed in the kidnapping of an Israeli diplomat.

The court commuted the sentences of the three women to life imprisonment "taking into consideration their status."

The men were university students Necmi Deniz, Necmi Dede, and Necmi Dede. Among the women was Ilkay Demir, wife of Necmi Dede, and a graduate of Ankara American Robert College here.

Sentences of three other convicted terrorists were deferred because they are at large after escaping Nov. 20 from a military jail through a sewer.

Among these is Mahir Cayan, accused by the court of being the actual murderer of Ebrahim Elron, the Israeli consul general who was shot to death after being kidnaped in May.

Twelve other defendants received sentences ranging from one to 15 years. Five persons were acquitted.

The sentences continued an iron-fisted crackdown on the Turkish left which began after the imposition of martial law in 1970.

Stans Is Ready To Take New Job

WASHINGTON (AP) — Commerce Secretary Maurice H. Stans says he hasn't volunteered to raise money for President Nixon's re-election campaign but would take the job if the President offered it.

Stans made the comment when asked by newsmen about the possibility he would leave the cabinet to take on the political fund-raising post.

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Body in River Being Sought

NORWALK (AP) — State police have been unsuccessful in two attempts to find the body of a South Norwalk man who jumped off a Connecticut Tumble bridge into the Norwalk River, according to authorities at the Westport barracks.

They said Sunday, Leroy Mungo, 33, was an apparent suicide victim. They reported that Mungo jumped off the bridge Saturday after telling a friend he was dependent about family matters.

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Dual Enrollment Avoids Parochial In New Hampshire

 Concord, N.H. (AP) — Parochial and public educators in New Hampshire are giving good marks to a unique program that threads its way through church-state court decisions to extend state aid to financially beleaguered private schools.

The state and local school districts do not share their funds directly with the parochial schools—the parochial schools share their students with the public system.

Under the plan, parochial schools receive state assistance to help pay the salaries of their teachers and other personnel. The state estimates it would cost \$1.6 million if all parochial schools were to participate.

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Lawson's Beautiful Tower Hides Town's Water Works

SCHUTTLE, Mass. (AP) — Thomas W. Lawson of Boston built his mansion in Schuttle in the 1890s he wanted to get away from the ugliness of city life.

The tower has a ball room at the top, reached by a staircase of 123 steps. The ten ornate bells are played by a keyboard that brought iron water tank in a music room in the tower's field about 200 yards from his base.

Lawson lost almost everything by the time he died. His 23-acre estate, with its houses, mansion and stables, was auctioned off.

"This estate was all he ever dreamed of having," Mrs. Laidlaw said. "He made all that money and then he did what he wanted to do in life. He built his dream house. Yes, he lost everything, but he had his life."

Lawson gave the tower to the town in 1902, and it still stands. 123 - feet tall, a graceful monument to a man who died almost penniless in 1925 when his knack for winning at the stock market failed him.

The tower, with its gables and turrets, covered by gray shingles, stands on a hill and, according to Mrs. Laidlaw, "the first thing you see when you come up the coast by boat toward Boston."

Schuttle is on the coast of Massachusetts Bay, about 20 miles southeast of Boston.

1837 Kindergarten First

Youths Fasting And Protesting Welfare Cuts

OVERLAND PARK, Kan. (AP) — Student high school students in this Kansas city suburb are fasting during the Christmas holidays to demonstrate their conviction that welfare reform is needed. "We feel the welfare system is very, very inadequate," said Dan Spivoy, 17. "We want the governor and the legislature to hurry up and take action before people starve." Members of the senior high youth group of the Knox Presbyterian Church began fasting at noon Saturday and planned not to eat until noon today. After that, they have agreed to live on 15 cents each per day until Friday. Spivoy said the group calculation ended at the end of 1970 and the economy grew through 1971. The rationale is interesting anyway. When the economy turns down, they explained, the public shows down. People are more about less, stay home more. In this way they protect their homes from burglary, fire and theft. And since they're not driving, they don't crash. The most momentous shock of all was the imposition of economic controls and the evaluation, both coming as it did after Washington had publicly expressed its abhorrence of both almost every week for more than a year. Accompanying the devaluation was a sudden agreement by the world's trading nations to resign their currencies, an agreement reached it seems in hours after having been dodged for years. Almost as hard to believe was the emergence of the long awaited boom in housing. It actually came, and it had all the vigor predicted for it. Perhaps even more vigorous. Housing starts were above 2 million units annually in December. This boom was fueled by the high rate of savings, which in itself was a surprise. Americans are fairly good savers, but they're equally good spenders, and after saving for 12 to 18 months they're inclined to spend heavily. That wasn't so in 1971. After saving close to 7.5 per cent or take home pay in 1970 you might have thought the rate would drop to a more normal 5.5 or 6 per cent, as it was in 1964. Instead, the rate rose to 8.1 in the first quarter, 8.2 in the next three months and 7.7 in the third quarter. People are now tending to save less than in the summer and fall, but not with any great feeling. In retrospect, one of the curiosities of the year is that so many people felt things couldn't have been worse. It cannot be denied that alarm bells rang and red lights flashed. There was a crisis a month.

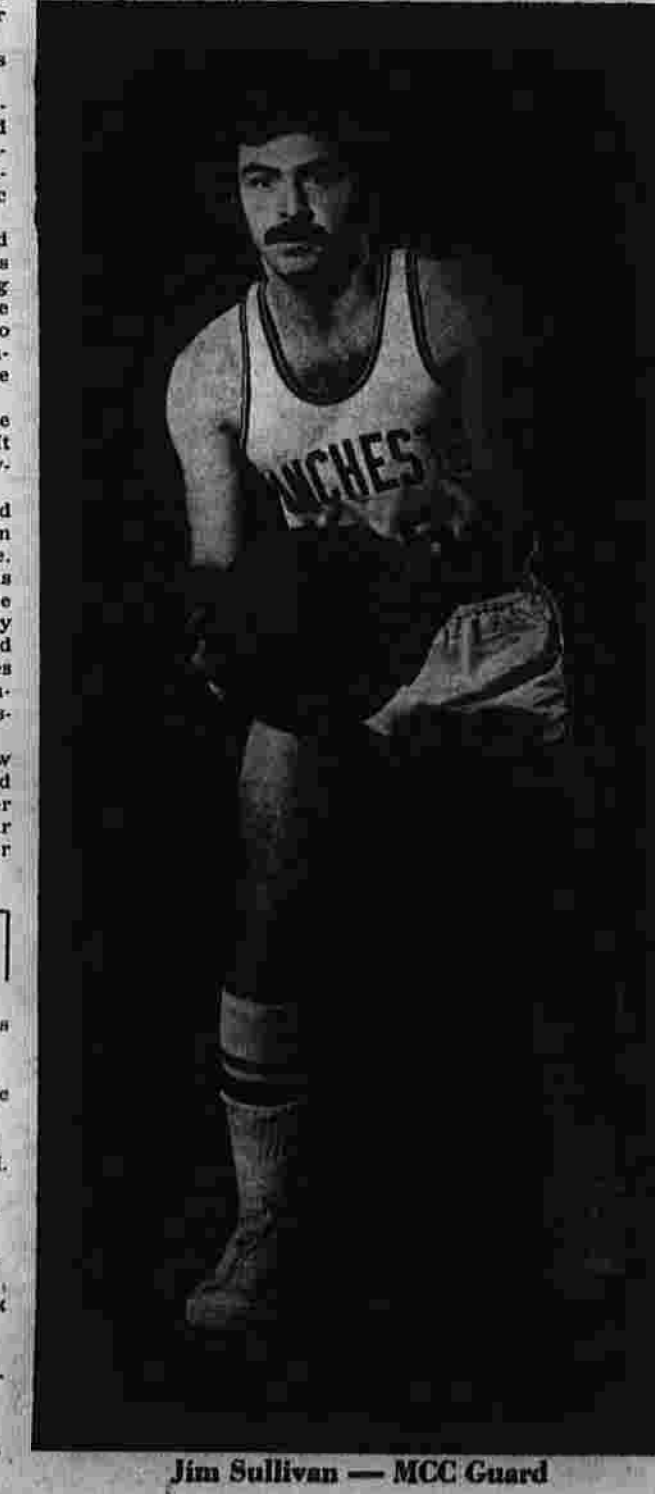

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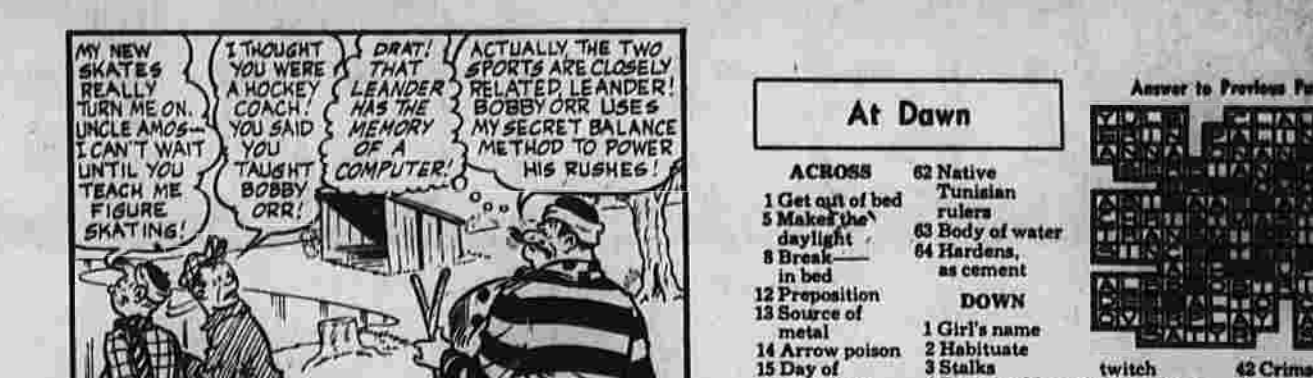

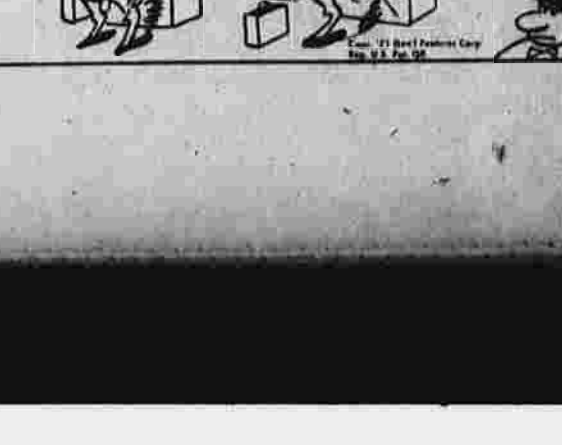
