

Bhutto To Release Bangladesh Sheikh 'After New Talks'

President Zulfikar Ali Bhutto announced today he plans the unconditional release of Sheikh Mujibur Rahman after at least one more round of talks with him in Pakistan.

Radio Pakistan had reported earlier that the East Pakistani leader had been freed. He has been under house arrest since the end of the India-Pakistan war.

Bhutto and Sheikh Mujib conferred last Monday. The president said then more conferences would be held.

Mujib was the dominant leader of East Pakistan before his arrest and imprisonment in March. Rebels there have proclaimed him as president of Bangladesh, the new name for East Pakistan.

The earlier broadcast, which said Bhutto had announced the unconditional release of the sheikh, reported that Bhutto

spoke at a mammoth rally in Karachi. It said the crowd shouted its approval of the decision.

The release of Mujib could pave the way for a settlement between India and Pakistan following their two-week war last month.

Mujib is the leader of the Awami League, now in power in an independent Bangladesh.

Bhutto, said that "world opinion also favored Sheikh Mujib's release."

"I hope India will similarly hope world opinion and leave occupied Pakistani territory," Bhutto added, according to the radio.

The radio did not say when Mujib would leave West Pakistan or if he had already left.

Cong Shells Batter Da Nang, DMZ Areas

SAIGON (AP) — The Viet Cong, after threatening to retaliate for U.S. air attacks on North Vietnam, shelled the Da Nang air base early today for the first time in three months and made a mortar attack along the demilitarized zone.

The attack on Da Nang came less than an hour after a 72-hour Viet Cong cease-fire for New Year's ended. Four 100-pound rockets hit the base, wounding one American and damaging three support planes and some ground equipment, the U.S. Command said.

Da Nang is the headquarters of the U.S. 7th Air Force's 36th Tactical Fighter Wing which flew scores of F4 fighter-bomber strikes during the five days of raids on North Vietnam last week. But the command said none of the F4 Phantoms

where a major North Vietnamese buildup is reported. South Vietnamese Rangers backed by U.S. air strikes reported 19 enemy soldiers killed and eight weapons captured. No South Vietnamese casualties were reported.

The U.S. Command announced that American troop strength was reduced 1,300 men last week to a total of 157,000. It was the smallest weekly reduction since September, but officials said they expected to meet and probably go below the target of 130,000 which President Nixon has set for Feb. 1.

In Laos, North Vietnamese and Pathet Lao forces kept up their pressure on the CIA base at Long Cheng, firing mortar and artillery barrages at dawn

and dusk while the skies were relatively clear of American and Laotian planes, informed sources in Vientiane reported.

The informants said American jets keep enemy forces pinned down by day and gunships using flares to discourage the enemy at night. But at dusk and dawn, he said, the North Vietnamese fire their heavy artillery without fear the flashes will attract air strikes.

The U.S. Central Intelligence Agency maintained sophisticated electronic equipment at Long Cheng, 78 miles north of Vientiane, until the base was threatened, the sources said. But the equipment has been moved along with all civilians. Casualties from the shellings were described as very light with moderate damage to buildings.

Wetter, Warmer Was Year Gone By

WINDSOR LOCKS (AP) — Tired of the winter cold? Then think back to June 30, when the temperature here rose to 98 degrees—the highest of the year.

The National Weather Service, in its year-end recap of weather highlights, notes that 1971 in Connecticut was slightly warmer than most other years. The average temperature was 50.3 degrees, compared with a normal high of 49.8 degrees.

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Spring was marked by extreme weather: March 4 brought a record low barometric reading of 28.6 inches as an intense coastal storm passed over Connecticut, and May 25 had severe thunderstorms and a small tornado that uprooted trees and downed power lines in North Granby, and Agawam and Longmeadow, Mass.

When tropical storm Doria moved across the state Aug. 25, it was the first time Connecticut has been hit squarely by a tropical storm or hurricane since hurricane Donna's arrival in September 1960. Property damage was extensive, but no deaths were attributed to the storm.

The warm September and October were followed by Thanksgiving Day snowstorm that dumped more than one foot of snow on parts of the state. The last time Thanksgiving was accompanied by that much snow was in 1933.

The National Weather Service found the tag-end 1971 weather in Connecticut a bit too unusual to go unmentioned.

"Although the Thanksgiving snowstorm made winter an early reality," the weather bureau said, "the weeks that followed were not only unseasonably warm but also frustratingly green. It was our first 'green' Christmas in 15 years, and the second lightest December snowfall also in 15 years."

Pat Embraces Liberian At Oath-Taking Ceremony

MONROVIA, Liberia (AP) — A packed hall burst into loud applause today when Pat Nixon gave William R. Tolbert Jr., grandson of an American slave, a cheek-to-cheek embrace to mark his swearing-in as Liberia's 19th president.

Mrs. Nixon stepped up to give the traditional warm greeting after Tolbert took the oath of office from his brother, State Sen. Frank Tolbert, and kissed a large, well-worn family bible.

Tolbert said in his inaugural address that Mrs. Nixon's presence as head of the U.S. delegation "bears mute testimony to the strength, solidarity and permanence" of a "special relationship" between the United States and Liberia.

He called President Nixon "our great and true friend" and announced plans to give Mrs. Nixon Liberia's highest decoration—the Order of the Cordon of the Pioneer—at a champagne reception Tuesday night.

The visiting first lady had a seat of honor near Tolbert along with the presidents of

this humid capital exactly at noon to mark the new president's official takeover.

Mrs. Nixon, wearing a long-sleeved, light-weight pink, blue and green print dress, received applause as she entered the memorial building, escorted by two ranking African presidents.

Tolbert took his oath of office wearing a dark blue French suit, a marked departure from the usual formal dress inaugurals of former Liberian presidents. It was similar to one he wore when he first became president

on the death last July of William V. S. Tubman.

On inaugural eve, capping a 12-hour first day in Liberia, Mrs. Nixon sat down Sunday night for a private talk with Tolbert that she said would be "substantive."

Aides did not disclose what they talked about during their half-hour session in the executive mansion.

Mrs. Nixon, heading the U.S. delegation to the inaugural, looked a bit wilted after a day in which she was given a 19-gun welcoming salute, waved at thousands on an hour-long motorcade from the airport into Monrovia, met Liberian officials at a champagne reception, held a coffee session with the press and went to a hot, crowded 90-minute afternoon church service that launched the inaugural activities.

Evangelist Billy Graham, a member of the U.S. delegation, was among the participants in the ecumenical service in the small, whitewashed stone First Providence Baptist church.

Nixon Talks of Campaigns, Economy and Warfare

WASHINGTON (AP) — Hinting broadly he will seek reelection with Spiro T. Agnew as his running mate, President Nixon has given Americans a glimpse at a campaign-year platform built on his moves for peace abroad and a healthier economy at home.

In an hour-long nationally televised interview Sunday night, Nixon said he will announce by Jan. 14 his decision on running for another term, and added he sees no reason at present to "break up a winning combination" by dumping Vice President Agnew.

Responding to questions of CBS correspondent Dan Rather as they sat before a crackling fire in the White House Oval Office, Nixon said:

—The rate of withdrawing U.S. troops from Vietnam will continue at present—or perhaps accelerated—levels in early 1972. But he indicated that a residual force of 25,000 to 35,000 Americans would stay until prisoners of war are freed.

—He will cut drastically the coverage of his wage-price controls this year if they continue to succeed in trimming the rate of inflation, but some controls may be needed beyond 1972 to keep the economy cool.

—As the nation moves "from war to peace in the year 1972,"

we are going to bring the unemployment rate below" the 5.8-per cent average of the non-war years in the decade of the 1960s.

—He will not allow the Communists to gain "any bargaining advantage due to my desire to affect our election campaign."

—The Soviet Union has escalated arms shipments to Egypt and "we will not allow the military balance in the Mideast to be shifted" against Israel, which is seeking more U.S. Phantom jets.

—Negotiations still are under way at various levels to free Vietnam POWs. This will be discussed when he goes to Peking and Moscow, and recent Chinese release of two Americans offers "one slightly hopeful note."

After disclosing he will make his re-election plans known by Jan. 14—in time for the New Hampshire primary—Nixon added: "Whatever my decision I will engage in no public partisan activities until after

the Republican convention. The problems of the presidency are so great that it will not be possible to take time off for partisan politics."

But later in the interview Nixon sketched the peace-and-prosperity platform he likely will use in his expected re-election bid.

Talking of credibility and broken promises, he observed: "It could perhaps well be said that if you cooled the country, and we have; if we can now see the end of our involvement in Vietnam, and we do; that we should set these particular goals as being a pretty good accomplishment, particularly when we combine it with a new economic policy which has cut the rate of inflation, and we believe it will continue to during the next year."

"When we see all of these things," he added, "I think we could well say that is a pretty good record."

When Rather noted that polls show half of those interviewed say Nixon fails to inspire confidence and lacks personal warmth, the President said: "My strong point is not rhetoric, it isn't showmanship, it isn't big promises—those things that create the glamor and excitement that people call charisma and warmth."

"My strong point... is performance. I always do more than I say. I always produce more than I promise."

As for Agnew, Nixon said "the vice president has handled his difficult assignments with dignity, with courage. He has, at times, been a man of controversy, but when a man has done a good job in a position, when he has been part of a winning team, I believe that he should stay on the team."

"That," Nixon added, "is my thinking at this time."

Before the November election, Nixon said, "our goal is to end American involvement in Vietnam..."

He said because recent air raids on North Vietnam "have been very, very effective," he plans to announce before Feb. 1 that troop withdrawals "will continue on schedule, at least at the present rate, possibly at somewhat a larger rate."

More than 400,000 troops have been brought home since he took office. But Nixon said a residual force—he mentioned a figure of 25,000 to 35,000 men—will remain in Vietnam so long as the Communists hold POWs.

The President said if the prisoner issue remains unsolved he will raise it when he travels to Peking for "tough, hard bargaining" Feb. 21-28 with Chinese leaders.

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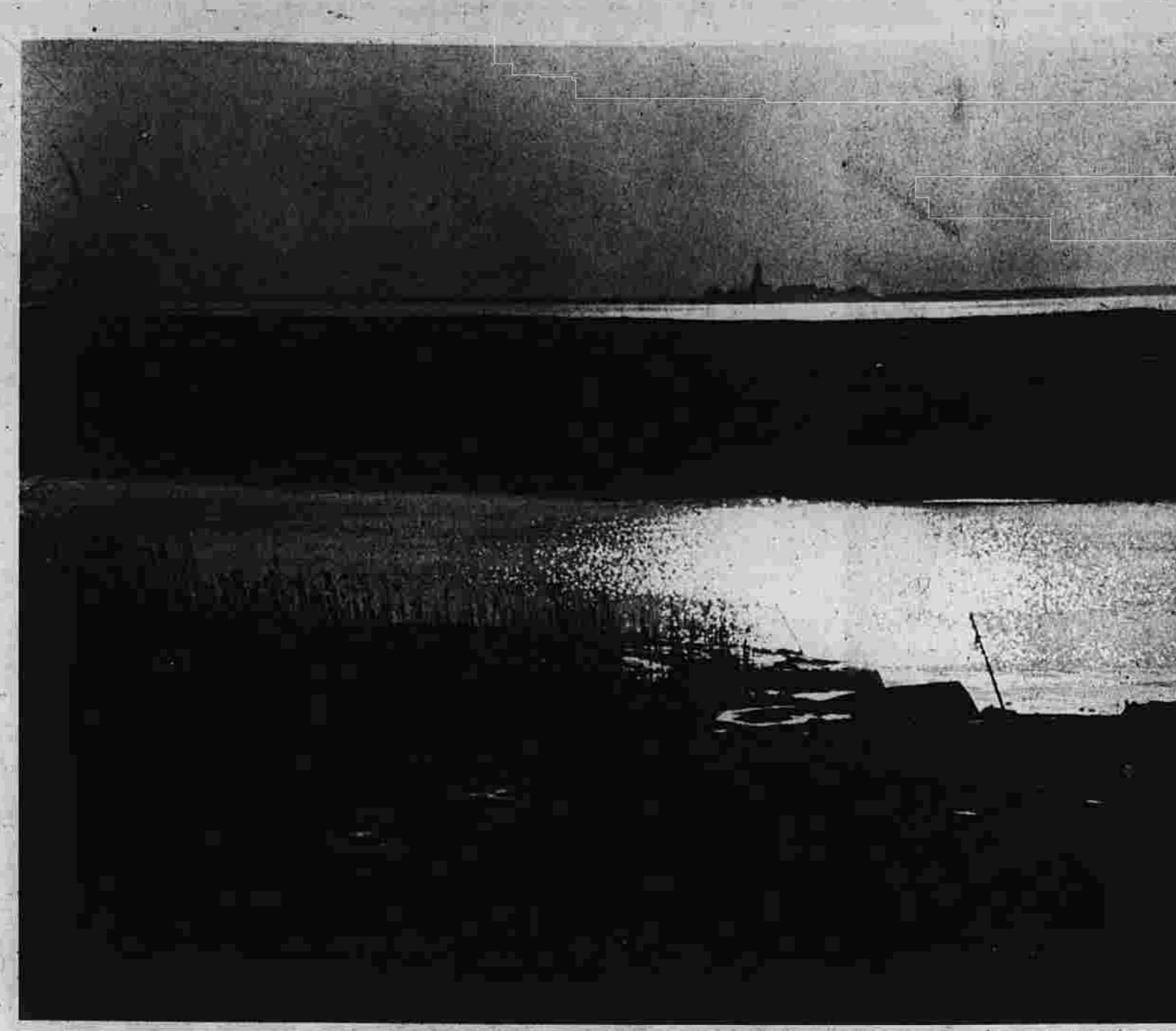

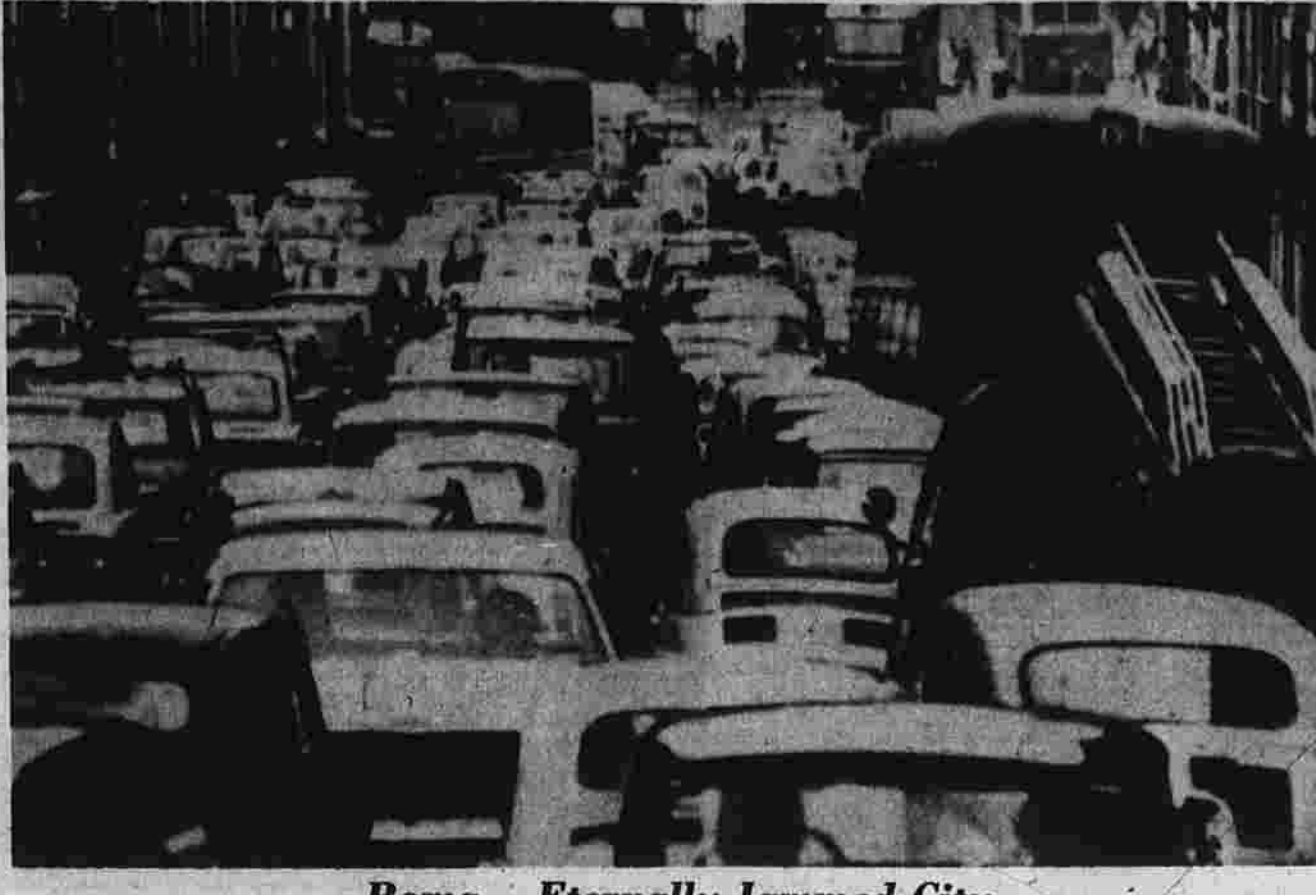
