Pupils Take Over New Keeney Space

The first of the additions to three town elementary schools became a functional part of the school system Monday when Keeney St. School second and third grade pupils and teachers moved in lock, stock, and pencil boxes.

It was the culmination of three months of curiosity on the part of the youngsters. Principal Edward Timbrell commented, "They have known since September what groups would be in there and have been dropping in to check on the progress," he said. He added that workmen were apologetic, at times, for stopping to answer the children's questions.

The open classroom area extends from the south end of the school's east wing. It is completely carpeted and has an acoustic ceiling to minimize noise. The green and yellow wardrobes blend harmoniously with the tones of green and blue in the carpeting.

There are no solid, load-bearing walls between classrooms and the central area. The only walls in the entire interior are non-load-bearing ones around this central area. This relatively small central section of the addition has wardrobes on both ends. The other space is taken up by a teachers' workroom, shown in the middle photo; boys' and girls' lavatories and a sink on each side, and two small conference rooms.

Folding partitions, shown at the right of the top picture, can be pulled across to form traditional classrooms or left against the wall to facilitate instruction of larger groups or permit freedom of movement.

So far, Timbrell said, teachers seem happy with the open space arrangement and have been reluctant to use the folding doors. A portion of the partitions contains chalkboards. Another portion contains display boards of a metallic material, on which children's work and visual aids can be fastened by magnets.

All furniture — and another departure in the open concept philosophy is no classroom desks or chairs for teachers — is portable, including pupils' desks and chairs, tables, book carts, and chalkboards.

The addition is currently being occupied by about 120 second and third grade children and five teachers. Three sections of third grade, taught by Mrs. Gail Hunkley, Mrs. Marion Plummer, and Mrs. Hilda Campbell, are in the east side of the addition. Miss Candy Bennett and Mrs. Ann Harding are the teachers of two second grade sections on the west side.

"We are more loosely organized in groups than Nathan Hale School," Timbrell said. "We are not locked into units, although Grades 2 and 3 work together, as do Grades 4, 5, and 6."

A visitor during a school day may be surprised by the order maintained in the open classrooms. This was also commented on by the principal. "Everything was moved in before vacation," Timbrell said. "Monday was our first day, and I was pleased with the pupils' reaction. That day, the folding doors also arrived. 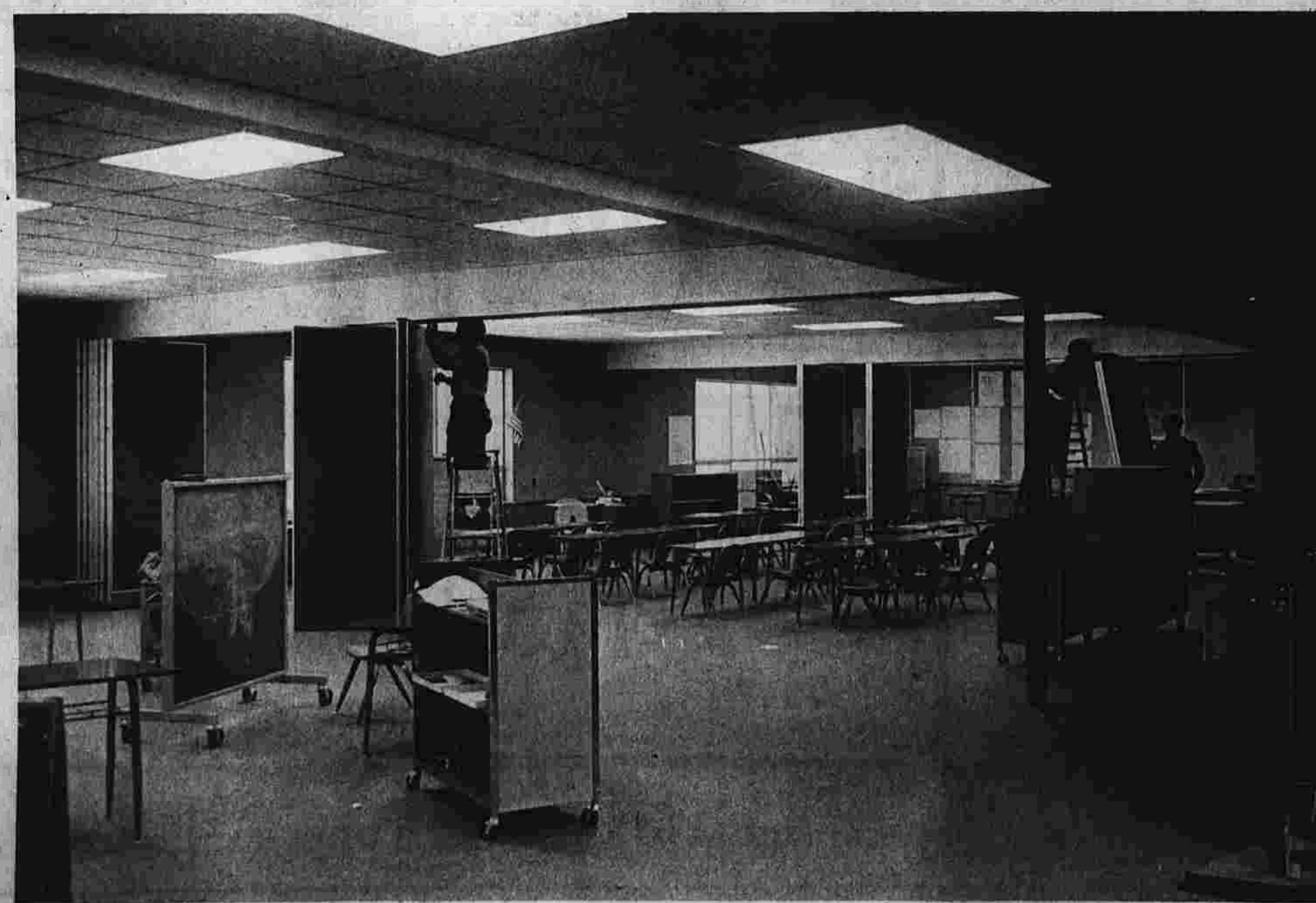

Stanley Slenda, also known as John Richard Slenda, 39, of 419 N. Manchester's Shadow Board Again

Every new Board of Directors up at the Municipal Building has to decide sooner or later, how much of its time and business it is going to share with Manchester's traditional "shadow board."

The latter is the unofficial title for that devoted group of public questioners, researchers, and eloquent debaters who have, with periodic shifts in personnel, constituted themselves the tireless watchdogs of the public business.

Their zeal and energy is such that they have never failed to occupy whatever time and opportunity the procedural rules of the official Board of Directors might leave open to them.

The new Board of Directors, in an effort to give the "shadow board" a generous turn at bat, and still accomplish something toward improving its own opportunity to do its own real business, has scheduled each first meeting of the month to be a public hearing meeting.

On other nights, the "shadow board" had the floor for the entire meeting; the real board will meet another night to perform its own real functioning.

It is perhaps a little early to judge how well the new system is going to work—to know, for instance, whether the "shadow board," having been conceded one night of its own, is going to be gracious enough to concede the real board a chance to do its own work in orderly fashion.

We would never have the "shadow board" abolished; at the same time, it has to be admitted that, for a watch dog, it is more likely to repeat something old than discover something new, and more likely to represent its own special slant than the actual interest of the taxpayers.

It must not, this "shadow board," be allowed too much freedom in preempting the time and role of the people who go to the trouble of getting there.

When, on the other night, a whole meeting was devoted to the four "shadow board" representatives who happened to be on hand, the proceeding seemed close to trespass.

Wrong Side Because It Lost? In our scanning of the controversy over United States policy with regard to India and Pakistan, we have noticed that there is one argument which is never omitted by all those who claim that we made a wrong decision when we seemed to favor Pakistan over India.

It is true that they often lead off with other arguments—that India has been the country with which our own associations have been especially close and important—that the original barbaric suppression of the Bengali people by Pakistan should have been condemned by us and should have been kept in mind by us, when India finally reacted by moving to end Pakistan rule in Bengal.

But then, after they have paid some respect to what they advance as sound, honorable principle for United States foreign policy, these friends of India add one more argument.

We should have known and realized, they tell us, that India was bound to win this war.

We should have calculated that India had more planes, more tanks, more troops in uniform, and an infinitely superior strategic position, what with a weaker and weakening Pakistan already cut in half.

They have not been telling us, these

friends of India, that might make right. Their real reasons have been of a more elevated kind. But, in case the idealistic argument didn't capture us, in case we happened to be the kind of people who would choose, other things being equal,

to play with the winner instead of the loser, they made sure the other consideration was offered to us. It was assumed, we suppose, that the Nixon Administration itself would be impervious to criticism located entirely on the idealistic plane, but that it would be very sensitive indeed to charges that it had neglected an opportunity to align itself with the nation which was inevitably going to make itself number one on the subcontinent.

But picking a wrong side might, these liberal idealists could not refrain from emphasizing, be even worse than picking a wrong side.

The purpose of this comment is not to pretend to be able to choose between Pakistan and India on a plane of high principle. Perhaps we should have involved ourselves a lot more deeply, a lot earlier, or have refrained from showing any preference at all.

What we are aiming at, at the moment, is the way those who will generally agree against the game of power politics will, in their post-mortems on the situation in India, reach for the argument that we should have played a smarter game of power politics, paying more attention to who was certain to win a war nobody was going to stop. There are some of us who value India more because we hope it may once again lead its way in demonstration of the virtues of democracy and of peace than because we can see a temporary winner in the kind of game everybody loses eventually.

Unequivocal Call For Peace

The most insistent and forceful statement of the Vietnam war by any American Catholic authority is contained in the Christmas message of the Most Reverend Carroll T. Dodier, Bishop of Memphis.

The pastoral is lengthy, and approaches the question of the Vietnam war gradually. It discusses the Christian message of peace, and the Christian's role in its realization—war. If the Christian has a responsibility to see to the elimination of war and the suffering of people, how is it that Christendom and the Church have so long sanctioned war?

The history of the Vietnam war is reviewed, and the theory of the just war is explained. In particular, the background accounting of the war is given, and the author states that "here in the United States our bishops until recently gave almost complete support to the public authorities in their war."

The enormities of World War II led to some of the most important family separations, the bishop observes. The consequent revolution against war and the arms race was the result of the Second Vatican Council. "We must now squarely face the fact that the arms race is a constant reminder of the evil of war," Bishop Dodier asserts. "We must speak out loud and clearly, and respectfully, as an instrument of peace."

The atrocities in Vietnam, he declares, "have been brought to our living rooms each evening on television, and into our hearts by young men returning from Vietnam. They have shown us how dehumanizing war actually is. I believe the Holy Spirit is speaking to us in all these situations, showing us how to respond in a new way to Christ's message of peace."

The practical response which the pastoral advocates is twofold; the immediate action in Vietnam, and an end to the process known as Vietnamization.

As to the first, "the present American military action in Vietnam is not justified, whether we judge it by the standards of the Just War Theory, or by the need to bring peace and justice to all men. The only morally acceptable act on our part is to withdraw all our armed forces and begin to repair the damage we have done to that country."

As to Vietnamization, "this program is a dehumanizing instrument of slaughter into the hands of the South Vietnamese military. It is a program not for ending the war, but for continuing it with undiminished intensity. Nor must we be misled by assurances that the war is winding down. All that is happening is that fewer American soldiers are being killed. Vietnamese deaths are continuing at their usual pace, and more intensive bombings by our warplanes."

The pastoral concludes that Bishop Dodier is taking certain steps in Memphis to implement a drive for peace. These include his personal support of conscientious objectors, the inauguration of a diocesan draft counseling service, the reaching in every church of sermons setting out guidelines for peace, and the establishment of an information center on peace. Furthermore, the bishop calls on all educators to make their schools instruments for peace, and on all his people to express to their elected leaders a demand that the Vietnam war be concluded forthwith.

This pastoral is unequivocal. It takes no evasive, noncommittal, or self-justifyingly reaches unadvised conclusions, and pledges a concrete program. It is characterized throughout by clarity and courage. It will be criticized, even condemned. But any attempted rebuttal based on the usual terms of moral concern, my gradual interference as he helped others. "Keep on practicing what I showed you," she told him. I too, become impatient for further instruction and guidance from the Holy Spirit. WASHINGTON—When President Nixon went on CBS television last Sunday night to be interviewed, his long-burning desire to publicly embrace Spiro T. Agnew coincided with pressure from right-wing Republican activists in a way that may permanently haunt the politics of 1972.
