Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey formally announced his third bid for the presidency today with a call for reconciliation and rebirth and a pledge to end the war in Indochina.

Minnesota's junior senator, who lost the Democratic presidential nomination to John F. Kennedy in 1960 and the White House race to Richard Nixon in 1968, signed an affidavit that put him in Pennsylvania's April 23 presidential primary.

"Had I been elected in 1968, we would now be out of that war. I repeat that pledge."

Terrorists Mar Thai B52 Base

BANGKOK (AP) — Terrorists invaded the base in Thailand for B52 operations in the Indochina war early today and slightly damaged two of the big American bombers, the Thai government announced.

U.S. officials in Bangkok and Saigon refused to discuss the attack. But the Thai government said at least three terrorists slipped into the huge Thai-American base at Utapao, on the Gulf of Thailand 90 miles southeast of Bangkok, and put explosive charges under some of the parked bombers.

Thai personnel. More than 6,000 Americans are stationed at the big base, which is home for about 45 of the eight-jet, \$8 million stratofortresses. Utapao is also the base for a wing of KC135 aerial tankers which fuel U.S. Air Force fighter-bombers over Laos and Cambodia.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Recognizing that Americans continue to smoke despite the higher risk of cancer, heart attacks and lung disease, the U.S. surgeon general said today that new efforts must be encouraged to develop safer cigarettes.

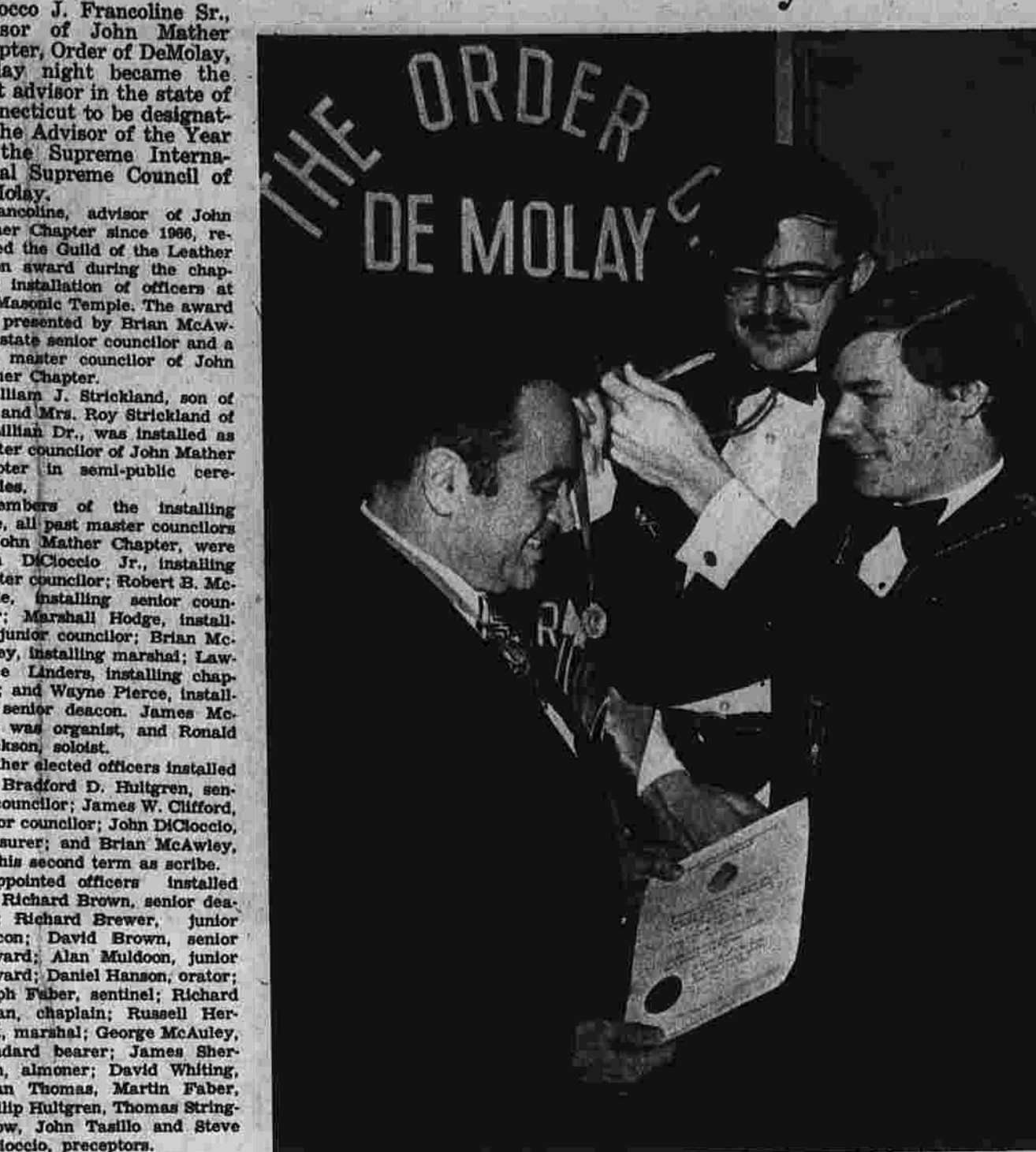

South Windsor SWHS Students Supporting Idea of Advisory Council

High school students appear to be leaning toward the formation of an advisory council to relate their needs and problems to the Board of Education following rejection last week of the request by Leonard Yonah and Donald Berghuis to include a non-voting student representative on the board.

Michael Freedman, a senior and the only student attending the meeting, said he was at first disappointed with the board's action. But after having talked with teacher Lawrence Brown, a member of the South Windsor Association (SWEA) Freedman said he now feels this association's proposal for an advisory council may be the way to achieve a better rapport with the board and communication with every class.

SWEA's proposal was to set up a council of board members and the administration, five teachers and five students on a regularly scheduled work session.

Freedman said Brown discussed the idea with the board and he was asked to consider it of this proposal.

Freedman's statements were echoed by another Senior leader, Walter Booth, who originally asked Berghuis to include the matter before the board.

Booth said he came to realize that "in theory student representation on the board was a good idea, but the practicality of the idea eludes me because a number of items which students could not have any possible knowledge of, or interest in, could result in a lot of wasted effort on the part of the board to familiarize him with the matter, and a lot of wasted time on the part of the student."

Both students said they were aware that they already have the right to appear and be heard by the board, but both of them said it was not the same as having a member who would be recognized and included in discussions with the entire board.

Freedman stated some of the reasons why the student representative was suggested. During his four years at the high school, he saw that many of the changes directly affecting students came about — the change in dress codes.

Louise Sought Continuing, he said students have asked for a lounge but a "no room" answer prevails. "Some board members who were candidates for their posts in November," said they would visit the school to find the problem areas," he added, "but no one has done so," as far as I know.

He stated his reason for not having wholehearted faith in the administrator's reply, saying that there are a few classrooms used daily where approximately five students take up the space of an entire classroom at the same time and the "lack of space" answers have no merit with the students. He offered the solution of doubling-up on some of the lecture classrooms or moving the classes to smaller quarters.

One board member this week did ask to talk to him, Freedman said, and he felt that some of the communication barriers

the pursuit of military objectives," Humphrey said. "I can build the schools and the hospitals and the nurseries and the libraries necessary to enrich our lives."

In his seven-page text, the former vice president pledged to restore the equal rights for women, promised to help bring the secrecy "back into the mainstream of America's life" and to give youth "the full opportunity to help strengthen that sense of community with which we can rebuild our nation."

"America is not sick! What we lack is leadership and vision," Humphrey said. He chose Philadelphia as the site to sign the declaration of his candidacy "because it was here that our republic was born."

Gas Heater and Cigarette Blamed for Fiery Deaths

Authorities have placed the blame for a fatal fire in Georgia and its death toll on a gas heater and a cigarette.

The fire, which killed eight children on a gas heater, was caused by a cigarette, police said.

The victims were identified as Douglas Jr., 11, John, 7, Cheyenne, 6 and a sister, Kathryn, 5, all of the family.

Rham District Curriculum Topic For School Board

The Regional District 8 Board of Education will hear a presentation tonight on four areas of the Rham curriculum.

At the special meeting at 7:30 in the Rham library, presentations on the home economics, music, reading, and foreign language programs will be given to the board.

The board in recent months has been hearing various reports of the school present curricula and their effectiveness. It is expected that the board members will become more familiar with the types of subject matter being offered to students.

There are no other business matters on the agenda; however, it is expected that there will be some reports forthcoming concerning negotiations and school regionalization.

Star Trip
Mark J. Valdemir, science instructor at Rham, recently took 44 students and enthusiasts on a trip through the heavens via a very special telescope at Yale University's Bethany Observatory.

The telescope at the observatory is the largest in Connecticut and one of the largest in the northeast. It is a 40-inch Boller and Chivens telescope of the Cassegrain reflector design and is housed in a 24-foot dome.

Dr. James A. graduate astronomy student at Yale, gave the visiting group some basic information regarding the telescope, its use, and what they would be seeing.

Valdemir said that the planet Mars appeared yellow in color, with very little surface detail due to the effects of the earth's atmosphere. Saturn, however, was very impressive. Valdemir said, with three of his moons clearly visible.

The Andromeda Galaxy which is over 12 million trillion miles away (2.5 million light years), appeared as a very faint, fuzzy patch of light. The group was able to observe how the telescope was aimed at each object, how the electric drive controls were operated, and how the dome had to be rotated to allow viewing of each object.

Meteor Sightings
During the observations, at least four meteors were spotted by the students and guests. Also observed through some of the other instruments available were clear astronomical bodies including the Pleiades stars, the Orion Nebula and several double stars.

Some of the students were allowed to aim the telescope at various celestial objects and give basic information on their operation.

The group discussed with three graduate astronomy students who directed the activities theories of the formation of the universe, density of the present universe and characteristics of population of 2 stars.

Valdemir said the field excursion was invaluable in providing students access to superior and sophisticated equipment and gave them a glimpse of the wonders involved in astronomy. He said other such trips are being planned for the future.

Industrial Arts Experiment
The marks the first day of the Industrial Arts Experimental Program at Rham in cooperation with the Glend Hill elementary school in Hebron.

Arrangements have been made for a pilot program in industrial arts which will involve 30 boys in grades 5 and 6 from the Glend Hill School. The program will continue for three consecutive six-week sessions with 10 students participating in each session. The boys will be meeting to Rham on Monday, Wednesday and Friday for class meetings from 1:30 to 2:30 p.m.

Dr. Mordavsky, science instructor at Rham, is donating his free time as instructor of the program, designed to give the boys "hands-on" experience in industrial arts, according to Rham Principal J. Colin Pugh.

An evaluation of the program will be made at its conclusion.
