## U.S. Bombers Hit Back; Red Forces in Attacks

SAIGON (AP) — Communist forces today made the third attack in less than two weeks on a U.S. air base in the Vietnam war, shot down an American helicopter, killing all four crewmen, and intensified attacks across South Vietnam to their highest level in three months.

One of the snappers was killed when he triggered a claymore mine on his way out, the 7th Air Force reported. The other escaped.

No other casualties were reported. The ammunition stores are far from personnel living quarters.

An Air Force spokesman said the Viet Cong planted two anti-aircraft missiles at another American plane Tuesday.

The Army UH helicopter was shot down Tuesday while supporting South Vietnamese operations south of the U Minh forest in the Mekong Delta, about 185 miles southwest of Saigon.

The South Vietnamese military command reported 34 enemy attacks on its military units and Vietnamese civilians during the 24 hours ending at 9 a.m. Wednesday. It was the highest number since the first week of October and included 12 rocket and mortar attacks.

The most serious attack was a Viet Cong ambush of a platoon of 30 government militiamen in the Mekong Delta about 90 miles south of Saigon. Field reports said three government soldiers were killed, 11 were missing and six were wounded.

The Viet Cong also captured one heavy weapon and 17 rifles.

There was speculation that the attacks on the U.S. air bases were in retaliation for the massive American air attacks on North Vietnam late last month. The target today was the big Bien Hoa base 15 miles northeast of Saigon, and groups urged President Nixon

## Food Stamp Fund Still 'Available'

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Agriculture Department said today it does not plan to spend an additional \$186 million available for food stamps this year but will not hesitate to do so if it is needed.

Congress allowed \$2.2 billion for food stamps in the year ending June 30. The department, however, says only a little more than \$2 billion will be required to take care of needy recipients.

Department officials, asked to comment on reports the money had been intentionally withheld from food spending, said the charges are "not correct."

"It's news to me," said Assistant Secretary of Agriculture Richard E. Lyng, who oversees the food program. "We haven't had any limit put on us for what we can spend for food stamps."

Frank B. Elliott, assistant secretary for administration, also said reports that the extra money was being held up are in error.

"The money, if it is needed," will be spent, Elliott told a reporter. "This is not impounded money. We have it available from the Office of Management and Budget anytime we need it."

But at this time, Elliott said, food stamp costs for the current fiscal year are not expected to be the full \$2.2 billion appropriated by Congress.

Instead, Elliott said, projections call for \$2,087 billion to be spent.

The exact appropriation for 1971-72 was \$2.2 billion, according to a department budget official. (See Page Two)

# Bengali Parliament Ordered by Mujibur

DACCA (AP) — Sheikh Mujibur Rahman gave up the presidency of Bangladesh today to become prime minister after ordering a parliamentary government for Asia's newest nation.

Mujib, named president by other Bangladesh leaders while he was a prisoner in West Pakistan, issued a provisional constitution Tuesday night, concentrating governmental power in the hands of the prime minister. The presidency became largely a ceremonial office.

The constitutional order provides that the parliament will be made up of persons elected a year ago to the East Pakistani state legislature and to the Pakistani National Assembly that never met. There was no indication when the new parliament would meet, but Mujib became prime minister as the unchallenged leader of the majority party.

Mujib, who is 51, took the oath of office 51 hours after his return to Dacca.

Abu Sayee Choudhury, a former judge who has been the Bangladesh movement's chief spokesman in London and New York, was sworn in as president.

"The company has reviewed its engineering organization structure and functions with a view to improving efficiency. The reduction will take place over the next several months and will involve retirements, layoffs and severances as well as reassignment of certain personnel."

# Hurricane Winds, Snows Batter West

The wind toppled six mobile homes at a mobile home park in Boulder, Colo., and blew two others off their foundations.

Schools were closed Tuesday in seven counties of southeastern Idaho as snowdrifts made roadways impassable.

More than 100 persons in the Swan Valley near the Wyoming line were cut off from other communities by drifts.

At Lander, Wyo., where wind gusts of 88 m.p.h. were recorded, traffic was limited to emergency vehicles and rural school

buses were escorted by snow plows.

A failure in telephone microwave system blacked out communications of all sorts across much of Montana as the storm moved in Tuesday, keeping much of the state from hearing the National Weather Service's blizzard warnings. The cause of the failure was being investigated.

Damage to power lines and other buildings was reported along the eastern slopes of the Colorado Rockies.

An arctic air mass sweeping into Montana was expected to

follow the storm into the upper Mississippi Valley and Great Lakes region with bitterly cold weather.

In the Southeast, showers and thundershowers drifted across northern Florida, while balmy weather with temperatures in the 70s remained in the southern part of the state.

Rain washed portions of the Northeast, and scattered snow flurries dusted the Great Lakes.

Temperatures before dawn ranged from 10 below zero at International Falls, Minn., to 78 at Orlando, Fla.

# Cleanup Forum Founders

NEW HAVEN (AP) — A series of public forums on the state's proposed new air pollution code got off to an uncertain start Tuesday, with state officials trying to explain the ins and outs of 875 pages of rules their audience hadn't had a chance to read.

The session was billed as a "workshop" with the aim being to solicit the views of the public about the plans. Another session was held Tuesday in Stamford and the state officials are scheduled to take their forum road-show style to Willimantic, Bridgeport, New London, Torrington and Hartford in the next week.

Then a series of three formal public hearings, in Bridgeport, New London and Hartford, will follow at the end of the month before the plans are submitted to federal officials by Jan. 31.

The rules are an outline of how the state will comply with federal regulations on a schedule the federal government has set.

The problem Tuesday was

that hardly any of the 100 people in the audience at a Yale Chemistry Lecture Hall had a copy of the tome to read. And there was no summary available, only a three-page sheet listing some of the numbers that will govern standards by 1975 and 1977.

Richard Dowd, head of the state Environmental Protection Department's Air Pollution Division, said not enough copies of the book had been printed—only 500 for all the government officials, newsmen, conservationists, businessmen and others in the state.

So much of the presentation consisted of a dry technical summary of the major provisions—with Dowd, his Planning and Standards Division head, and the rules' legal architect trying to outline, explain and

answer questions about the complex provisions included in the proposed code.

When it was over, Dowd shook his head and said he would have his subordinates supply at least 25 copies of the proposed regulations for each of the next few hearings—while printers get a rush order for more copies.

One of the people who got to read the regulations—Environmental Health Director Edward DeLouise of the city government, didn't have much praise for them.

He and city Pollution Engineer Sid Bear both launched a series of attacks on the regulations, which they said had been inadequately prepared and were too hastily written.

Their main complaint, they said during an intermission, was that the new rules seem to write them out of a job.

"We have no say on it," DeLouise said. "We're not sure now if we have any authority to implement our own standards." DeLouise maintained that New Haven has been a pioneer

in air pollution control in the state, implementing a code in 1953 and a comprehensive program in 1969.

But, he said, the new rules will leave state officials with sole jurisdiction over air pollution, and the sole agency capable of getting funds from the federal government will be the state Department of Environmental Protection.

"Where does that leave us?" DeLouise asked. "I don't want to end up being a lackey, taking air samples. I want to be part of the enforcement team."

Dowd responded later that DeLouise and Bear apparently hadn't read the regulations carefully enough (which DeLouise cheerfully admitted—he said he'd only gotten the huge set late last week) and said there would indeed be a role for city agencies like New Haven.

"We are asking local agencies to do specific things like the first monitoring,"

# Says 'White Devils' Supply the Guns Black Muslim Leader Asks End to Killings

CHICAGO (AP) — The leader of the Black Muslims, an organization linked to a racial shooting in Baton Rouge, La., says his group is "faced with murderers and killers coming to them from among our own black brothers."  
Elijah Muhammad, national Black Muslim leader, charged that "white devils furnish the crazy savage black brother of the Muslims with deadly weapons with which to kill his Black Muslim brother."  
Writing in the current issue of "Muhammad Speaks," a weekly Muslim news publication, Muhammad called for black "self-haters" to stop the indulging "before it is too late." The article was written before the shooting.

Baton Rouge officials have blamed indulging among Black Muslims for the shooting Monday in which two white deputy sheriffs and two young black men were killed.  
Baton Rouge Mayor W. W. Dumas said Tuesday that the shooting might have been deliberately provoked by Muslims trying to overthrow Muhammad.

THURMONT, Md. (AP) — President Nixon, after working far into the night on his State of the Union address, is spending the day in seclusion at his Camp David retreat.

Nixon flew by helicopter to the Catoctin Mountain compound Tuesday afternoon, had dinner alone and, according to aides, worked until nearly midnight in the study of the rustic Aspin cottage where a crackling fire warmed off the chilly winter night.

Aides had reported earlier that Nixon was in the third draft of the State of the Union address he is to deliver to Congress on Jan. 20—two days after the House and Senate reconvene for the second session of the 92nd Congress.

Alcoholic Given Alternatives to Jail

According to law, public intoxication is a crime punishable by a fine of up to \$50, up to 30 days in jail or both. But for the person who is an alcoholic it has been said: "Has he committed a crime?"

Two of the highest courts in the country came up with different answers in appeals which argued that it was cruel and unusual punishment to convict a man for exhibiting the symptoms of his illness in public.

Connecticut law reflects the concept which views the alcoholic as a sick man rather than a criminal. It's a sobering bit of information that alcoholics and drug dependents constitute the major portion of the inmate population in any jail or prison.

Dr. Rosenfeld said the plans which are being discussed would involve the emergency rooms of local hospitals, but with specialists in treating alcoholics and drug dependents added to the staffs.

## Stockbrokers Ignore Rules, College Student Proves

NEW YORK (AP) — Abraham H. Tref, a smooth talking college sophomore, says he persuaded six prominent brokerage houses to buy \$200,000 worth of stock in his name but kept only an average of \$400 in the accounts. He feels, he says, that the rules of the New York Stock Exchange are not always enforced and that some brokerage firms will ignore sound business practices to obtain commission revenues. Tref, who lives in Philadelphia where he attends St. Joseph's College, said the idea for the project grew out of a discussion with classmates about consumer protection. He telephoned brokerage firms listed in the Yellow Pages of the Philadelphia telephone directory. At least a dozen turned him down when he asked to enter stock orders without first appearing in person. But six firms did make purchases for him, although he never appeared in person at their offices and never signed any papers to open an account. In each case he received a printed confirmation of the purchase listing the amount he owed, but in no case did he receive physical delivery of the stock certificates. Payment for purchases is normally due five business days after the trade is executed, but Tref's confirmations indicated that in most cases his accounts were carried somewhat longer before he sold the position or the brokerage sold it for him. When his last speculative position was sold last week, he wound up with no net gain. On Monday he reported his dealings to the New York Stock Exchange. An exchange spokesman acknowledged that Tref had presented documented evidence of the transactions but also said he had been spotted earlier by "stock-watch procedures" and his name referred to the Securities and Exchange Commission for investigation. The spotting apparently occurred when Tref opened a second account with the firm of Merrill Lynch, Pierce, Fenner & Smith, Inc., after failing to pay the balance owed on an initial account with the firm. An SEC official said there was a possibility Tref had violated the securities laws, but

## Arab Guerrillas Shell Israel

TEL AVIV (AP) — Arab guerrillas in Lebanon kept up their attack on Israeli settlements today despite an Israeli strike into southern Lebanon 24 hours earlier. # They Say They're Oppressed Men's Lib on the Upswing

By MARLENE CHROSS  
(Of The Los Angeles Times)

WASHINGTON — As the momentum of the Women's Liberation Movement has grown in recent months, a second movement—not yet as strong as the first—has begun to develop. It's called Men's Liberation.

"Men are beginning to sit around in seasons now and talk about how the male role oppresses them," said writer/feminist Gloria Steinem, editor of the new magazine for women, MS. "They are beginning to realize the problems they have because of their own rigidly defined sex roles. I know of some groups which have formed in New York, Chicago, and Portland, Ore. — but it hasn't really become organized yet. They don't have to organize, because they are still in the position of strength."

Organized or not, there has still been a substantial amount of consciousness raising among men. "There are a lot of groups in every big city now, as well as in tiny towns, and I get letters from many of these men," said Dr. Jack Sawyer, a psychologist with Harvard University's Department of Social Relations.

### ... a mushrooming phenomenon.

Sawyer, who has written about men's lib for several publications and has given speeches on the subject, thinks it is a mushrooming phenomenon which will grow even larger as women's groups, and by women's groups. "These men are sympathetic to the women's rights activities and feel that it's essential," he said. "They believe it's essential to the liberation of men. It's not right for women and it's good for men. As women begin to liberate themselves from defined sex roles, so will men."

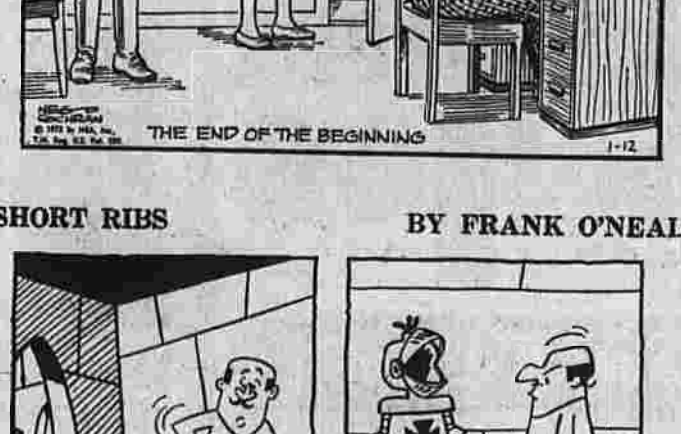

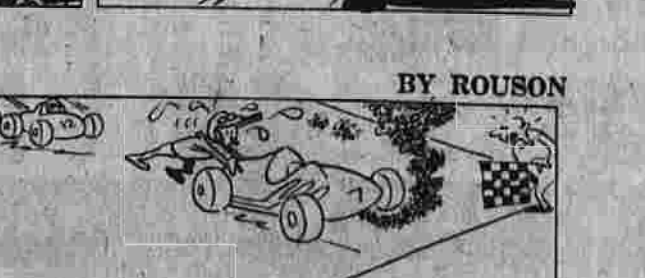

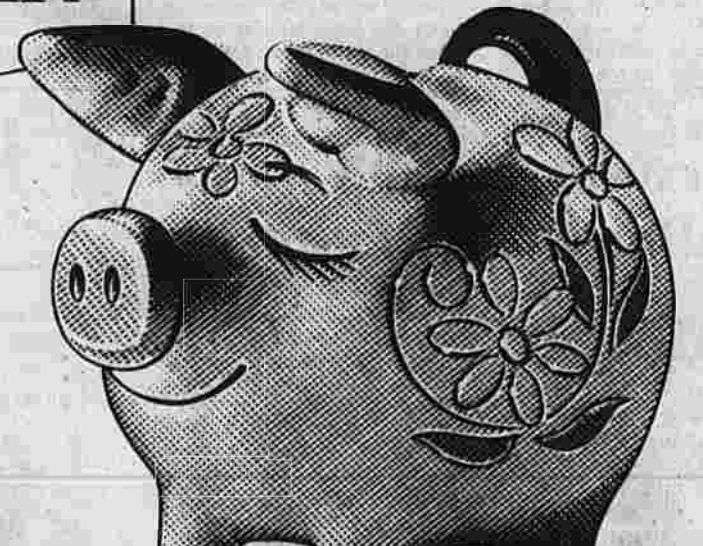
