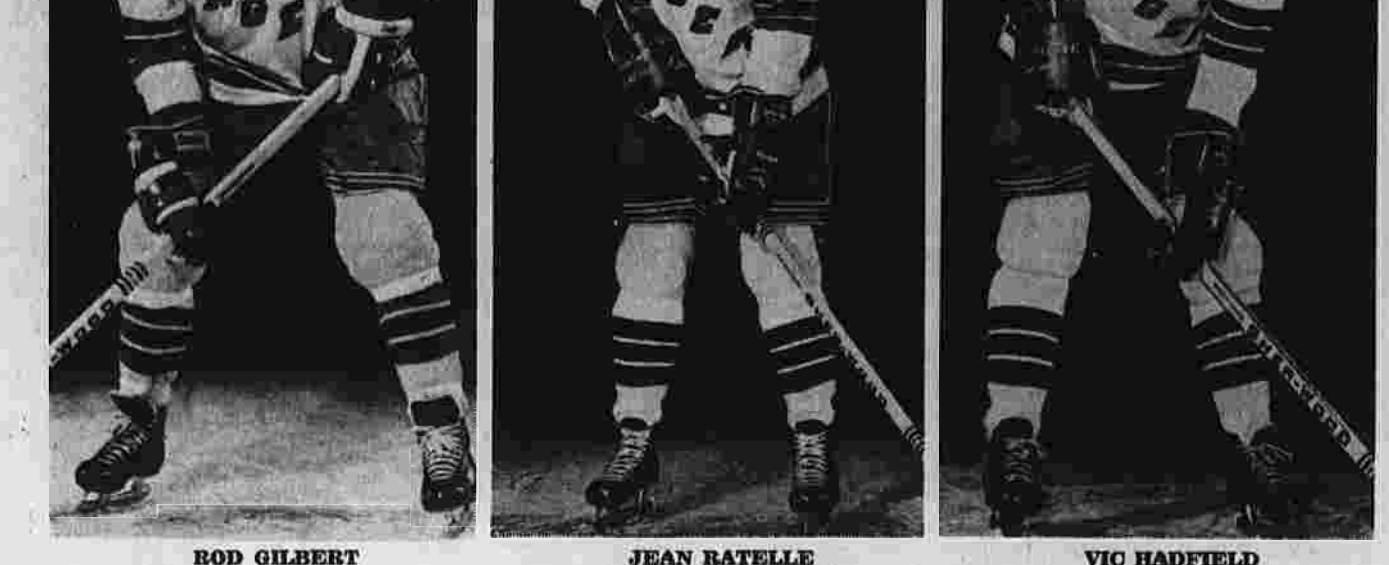

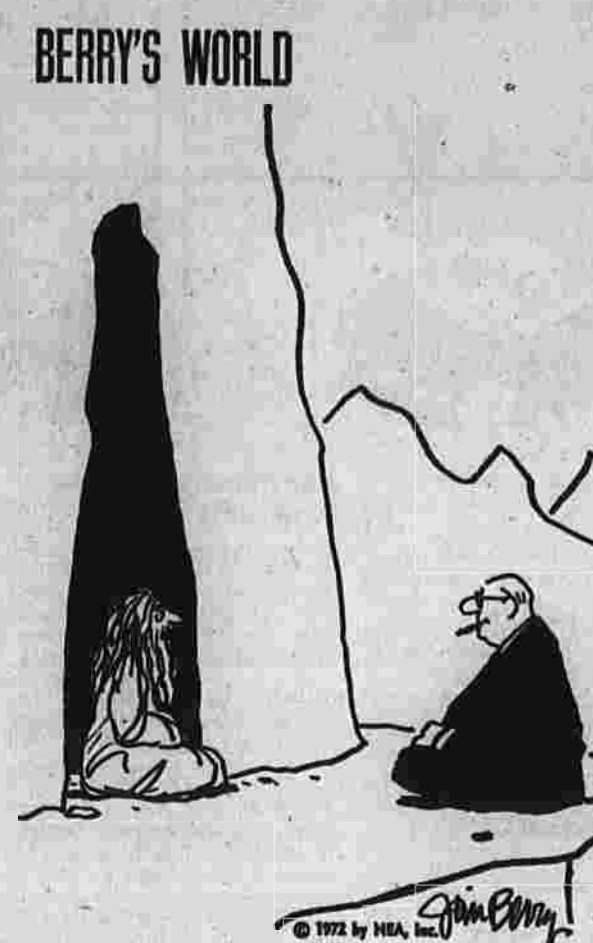

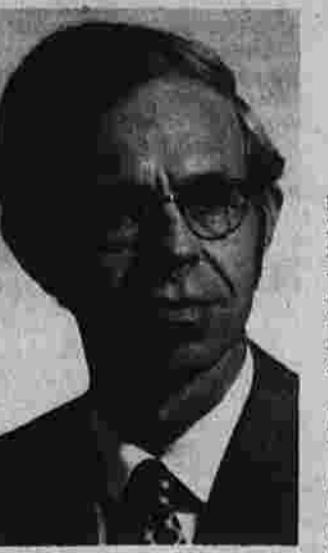

Tolland Students Take Classes On Shores of Cape Cod

Tolland High School's biology and ecology classes have left their classroom behind in search of actual experiences in locations ranging from the rocky shores of Long Island to tidepools on Cape Cod, and day long hikes through the Berkshire hills of Massachusetts.

The unusual extension of teaching experiences to the on-site natural locations was initiated by science teachers Fred Pedersen and Lance Arnold.

The purpose of the location trips is two-fold. The first is to give the students the opportunity to observe the biological phenomena on a first-hand basis.

Of at least equal importance is the opportunity to give students the chance to relate to each other and to the teacher as individuals outside the classroom walls.

On an average the trips include 12 to 15 students. The marine biology classes have participated in a trip to the rocky shores of Long Island Sound, collecting representative warm water specimens and observing tidal zonation.

Accompanied by ecology students, they have traveled to Cape Cod to observe and collect samples from a sandy tidepool area of the cold Massachusetts Bay shore.

Future trips are planned to the Boston Aquarium and to Woods Hole on the Cape. This introductory biology class, involving 18 students, recently participated in a day hike into the Berkshire Hills.

All of the subject changes, which were described as "modest" by the board's curriculum subcommittee, can be implemented without additional staff.

A second level offering will be added, beginning with chemically oriented activities evolving into a more biological approach at the end of the program.

HARTFORD (AP) — An attorney in a lawsuit has asserted Rep. William R. Cotter, D-Conn., failed to register with the secretary of the state as treasurer of the Democratic Campaign Committee of 1970, as required by the state's corrupt election practices law.

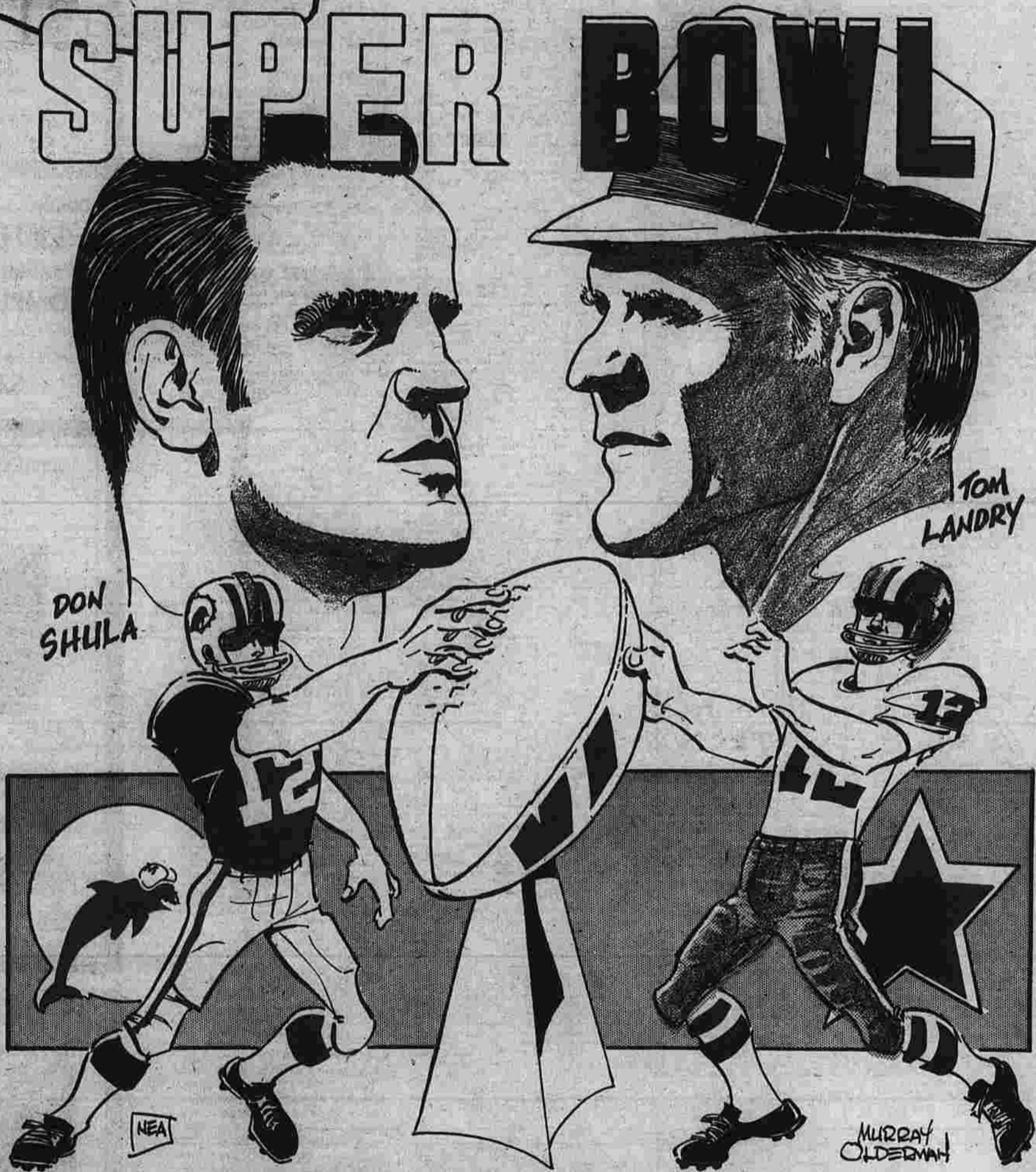

Movie Classics Presented By CPTV's 'Film Odyssey'

Connecticut Public Television (CPTV) has begun a series of 26 motion picture classics, both feature-length and short works, by some of the finest film makers in the world. The series, "Film Odyssey," is produced by Los Angeles public TV station KCET, with a grant from the Xerox Corp., and is transmitted nationally by PBS, the Public Broadcasting System.

Films selected for the series have gained recognition over the years as milestones in motion picture history, and almost none have been shown on television before. Foreign language films will be shown with subtitles. All films will be presented uncut and without interruption. The KOET staff spent considerable effort in locating rare, unabridged versions of the movies. Each program will be introduced by Charles Champlin, entertainment editor and film critic for the Los Angeles Times, who will add historical and artistic perspective to the series. When time permits, Champlin will also close the program with a segment called "Frame of Reference," in which he will discuss the classic with an appropriate guest—the director, star, or an artist influenced by the film.

Producer Mark Waxman said many of the films, originally designed as entertainment, have become historical documents of the era when they were made. Waxman calls the series a "museum of the air"—dedicated to a uniquely 20th century art form. Some of the feature films to be shown are "The Blue Angel," "Grand Illusion," Fritz Lang's "M," "The Seven Samurai," "Potemkin," "Cabinet of Dr. Caligari," and "Ivan the Terrible." The series is scheduled for Fridays at 8:30 p.m. over CPTV Channel 24.
