Cain And Abel, 1972

Once again capital punishment is up for public reconsideration. This time through the courts, with arguments being fought out on constitutional rather than moral or religious grounds.

The Supreme Court of New Jersey has just ruled capital punishment unconstitutional, as written in the state constitution. The court found this process contrary to the Fifth Amendment which guarantees freedom from the need to incriminate oneself.

The court's action automatically executed 20 New Jersey convicts from the electric chair. Their sentences will be reduced to life imprisonment. Across the country, however, 670 other men and seven women in 34 states are awaiting a ruling by the Supreme Court of the United States.

The arguments in the highest court are being fought on grounds that the rights of the condemned man are being infringed under the 8th Amendment, which forbids "cruel and unusual punishment."

Should the court decide otherwise, then the whole issue is left wide open, and with it a host of questions. Primary among these is what action to take about the 670 condemned prisoners who now sit in death-row cells. Pending this case, there has not been an execution since June, 1967.

Inside Report Hoover's Empire Abroad

WASHINGTON — J. Edgar Hoover has quietly won an executive order from President Nixon's approval for a proposed opening new offices in six additional cities: Manila, Rio de Janeiro, Singapore, New Delhi, Canberra and Santo Domingo.

In other words, Secretary of State William Rogers, who as Attorney General under President Eisenhower in the late 1950s gave Hoover free rein at the FBI, decided not to make an issue of Hoover's worldwide expansionism.

The overseas FBI agents are called, officially and euphemistically, "legal attaches" and are assigned to U.S. embassies abroad. Legal attaches have long performed useful work in Ottawa and Mexico City, helping track down fugitives.

But Hoover has gone far beyond this. Shielded from public and Congressional scrutiny, he has quietly built an overseas network of FBI agents in 20 countries. The latest step came last year when the director proposed expansion into another dozen capitals, and showed off his legend of the director's bureaucratic juggling by going right to the top for approval.

Salary Hikes Asked For State Officials

HARTFORD (AP) — The governor, the legislators and the judges of Connecticut are not being paid nearly enough money, the Commission on Compensation said Friday.

The commission said its goal was to raise salaries to the point where they would not deter or prevent any qualified Connecticut citizen from seeking election or accepting appointment to public office or state.

It recommended boosting the governor's pay from \$35,000 a year to \$45,000, legislators' pay from \$12,750 a year to \$17,500, Supreme Court justices' pay from \$27,500 to \$37,000, Superior Court judges' pay from \$22,500 to \$32,500, Circuit Court judges' pay from \$21,500 to \$27,500, and juvenile court judges' pay from \$20,000 to \$27,500.

Although not yet a full-time job, lieutenant governor should have his pay doubled to \$20,000, and he should have his own office budget separate from the governor's office budget, the commission said.

In addition to the salary hikes listed above, the commission also recommended the following increases: —Attorney General from \$20,000 to \$30,000. —Secretary of the State, Treasurer and Comptroller from \$15,000 to \$25,000. —Senate president pro tem and speaker of the House from \$4,000 a year to \$9,000. —Senate and House majority and minority leaders from \$4,000 a year to \$8,000. —Chief justice and chief court administrator from \$33,000 to \$42,000. —Chief judge of the circuit court from \$23,000 to \$30,000. Trailing twice by as many as 14 points in the third quarter, a stubborn Manchester High five came away from Wethersfield last night owning a thrilling 66-61 victory. 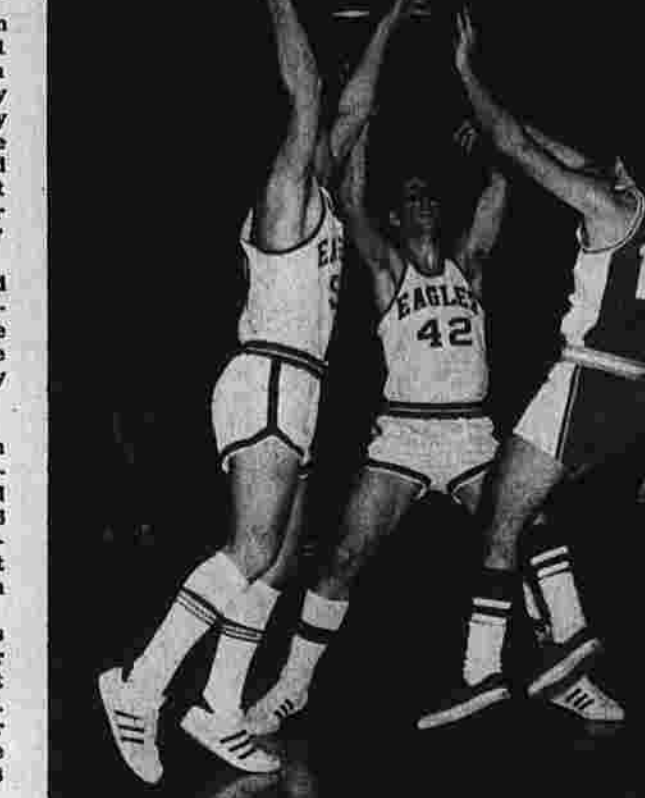

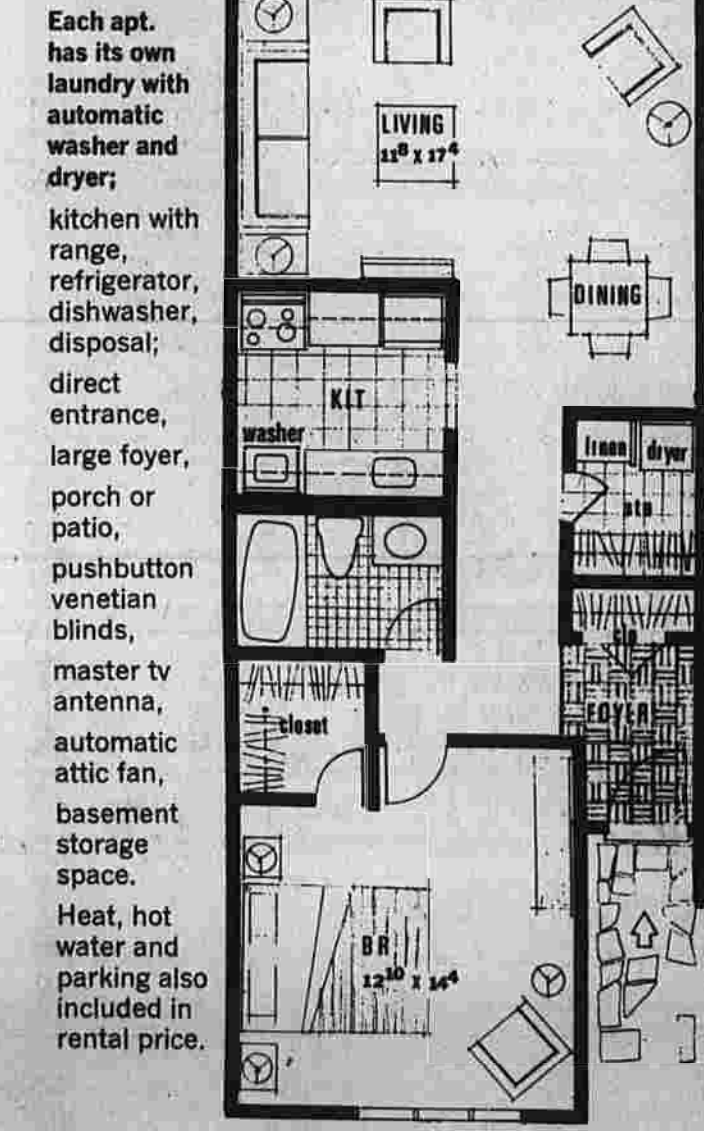

Academic Skills Taught Via Arts, Crafts Projects
The Learning Disabilities class at the Middle School revolves around an industrial arts and crafts approach as an alternative to the "failure syndrome" experienced by the students in a regular classroom situation.

The specially funded program has been developed by LD teacher John Campbell, who described the details in a special report presented recently to the Board of Education.

The class includes children between the ages of 10 and 15 "who have demonstrated a definite inability to learn in the normal classroom setting," Campbell said. "School to them has been a series of failures; an ego crushing experience."

Campbell has concentrated on developing ways to restore the student's self confidence.

Students design and construct projects which are then taken home, sold to the public or displayed in the school showcase.

While the ultimate goal sounds simple, its effects are far reaching in the benefits to the student.

Before the project can be completed the student has been instructed in basic skill areas such as math, reading, science and social studies as they relate to the project he is working on.

The student tries hard to accomplish the necessary skills since he is involved in an activity he enjoys and can become successful at. The skills are also presented in a more meaningful context for the learning disabilities child...he can see why he must conquer the immediate skill to obtain the final result.

In addition to the basic study skills, the student learns to develop motor skills, such as using tools, various types of finishing materials, painting and other activities necessary

In Ripley County, Ind., where there have been 800 cases of flu each week this month, Dr. Charles L. Barrett, a state epidemiologist, advised the schools not to close because it would prevent young people from gathering and spreading the disease.

Twenty-five Maryland schools have closed during the past two weeks because of flu outbreaks. But as in many cities where pupils have been ill, there has been no significant absentee rate among workers.

## Stardom Was Late For Raymond Burr

WASHINGTON—Stardom came late to Raymond Burr but it came to a man who knew how to enjoy fame and wealth. He was 40 years old when Earl Stanley Gardner chose him to play "Perry Mason." That series lasted for nine seasons on CBS-TV and continues as a top audience program in syndicated re-runs.

Burr worked in nearly every teaching and performing at the scene of about 250 episodes of Pasadena Playhouse and working in some of the worst movies series made him rich, it also left a bad taste. This was a slight, a hurt, an inconsiderate oversight that even a man of Burr's stature finds hard to forget.

When the series began, Burr was issued a wrist watch. It was not particularly expensive but Burr grew fond of it. He kept the watch in repair and paid for having it cleaned. The day the last episode was finished, the property man for the series came into Burr's dressing room and he asked for the watch.

Burr couldn't believe the man wanted the watch. He stood there thinking that his own expenses had already exceeded the cost of the watch. The property man repeated that he needed the watch to close the show's inventory and Burr slowly unstrapped it from his wrist.

He hasn't worn a watch since. No sooner had the Mason series ended than Burr began receiving offers for a new show. He was tired. He sold his beautiful oceanside home north of Malibu and bought himself an island. He paid an estimated 200,000 dollars for Naitauba in the Fiji Islands, complete with 180 residents, a copra plantation, a mine and acres of trees bearing macadamia nuts, passion fruit, mangos, and bread fruit.

What lured Raymond Burr off his island and back into television was the role of Robert T. Ironside. He liked the character of the crusty detective, but equally important was that the role would be played in a wheel chair. Burr had been on his feet for nine years as Perry Mason and the role had taken a heavy toll on his health. Along with those factors was that Burr's own business, Harbour Productions, got a piece of the show.

"Ironside" is now in its fifth season, meaning that the series has reached a level of maximum profit and that Burr will undoubtedly be enriched once more by a long re-run package. The show is being moved in January from 7:30 p.m., Tuesdays to 9 p.m., Thursdays (NBC). Burr was born, 54 years ago, in Westminster, B.C., Canada. He grew up in Vallejo in Northern California and his was not a happy childhood.

He was a fat little boy, going to military school and disliking every minute of it. He was befriended by an elderly woman who had a beautiful garden behind her home. When Burr was not in school, he was in the garden, a tender, sensitive child who found beauty in the flowers. The woman died several years ago and when the property was put up for sale, Raymond Burr bought it.

After graduation Burr went back to Canada and became an actor in repertory theater. Later, he went to England and returned to the United States to teach drama at Columbia University and work in Broadway plays. After World War II service in the U.S. Navy, Burr settled down in southern California,

hoping to land the role of prosecuting attorney Hamilton Burger. Author Gardner saw him and decided that Raymond Burr should become "Perry Mason." The role of Burger went to William Talman, now dead of lung cancer.

To play Mason, Burr went on a dangerous crash diet and lost over 50 pounds. He started the series as a slender 210 but added weight as the years went by. He is, for one thing, a superb gourmet cook and he is, for another, a man who gets tremendous pleasure from eating. He is now, by best estimates, about 275 pounds, but he carries it well on a broad-shouldered 6-foot-1 frame.

He still enjoys talking about dieting, but he's usually too busy with his many projects to concentrate on losing weight. He is interested, for example, in teaching theater in the Watts area of Los Angeles, in a college in Florida, in setting up a University of the Pacific in the Fiji Islands, in looking after hospitalized veterans of Vietnam and in stabilizing the economy of the Fijis. He has also bought a new home, a huge old estate in the Hollywood foothills. It gives him great privacy.

No problems exist on the set of "Ironside," simply because Burr is the boss and everyone knows it. He tried to talk Barbara Anderson into staying in the cast as policewoman Eve Whitfield. She had won an "Emmy" and was certain that a great future beckoned. She left and was replaced by Elizabeth Baur (policewoman Fran Belding).

Don Galloway, who plays Ed Brown, and Don Mitchell, who plays Mark Sanger, continue in the roles they began five seasons ago.

As for Burr, his future is certain and financially secure. "Ironside" will probably be the last TV series for him, and when it ends he will concentrate on his art collection, growing orchids, and making Naitauba the most beautiful island in the Pacific. That is, of course unless someone comes along with another series that Raymond Burr just cannot resist.
