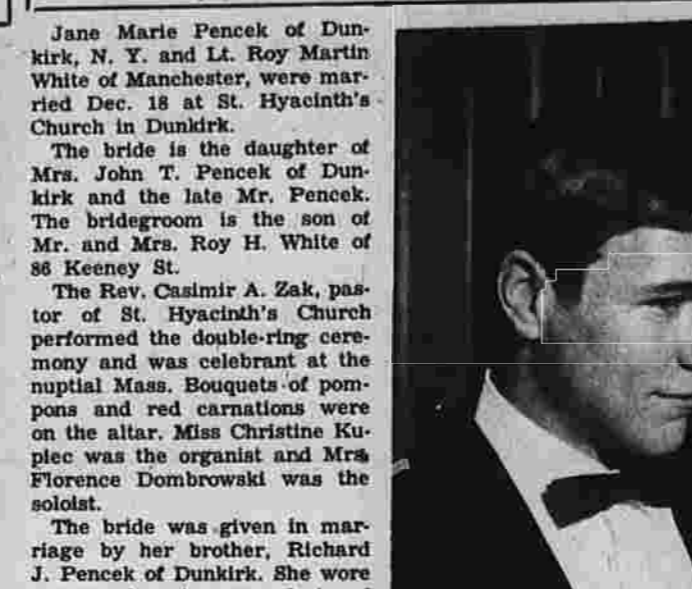

monwealth of Nations, "is more important than pounds, shillings and pence." This unexceptionable sentiment is one that can be echoed, no doubt, by those people who are currently engaged in calling themselves the new nation of Bangladesh, which used to be East Pakistan.

And it was, to complete the circle, President Bhutto's knowledge that Australia and New Zealand and Britain itself, all members of the Commonwealth, were about to extend official recognition to Bangladesh as a sovereignly independent state that made it doubly clear that he was not alone in his own "national honor" ahead of any other values which led him, President Bhutto, to withdraw from the Commonwealth, with his brave and noble sentiment about national honor.

For President Bhutto, then, it is essential to the national honor of Pakistan that the Bangladeshis should not be allowed to satisfy itself. What he considers necessary and sacred for one group of people he considers himself obligated to deny to another group of people.

Such a principle — or lack of it — might, on prolonged analysis, or on some computerized summary of human history, prove to be a very dangerous and costly way to run the world.

But such a system has not come into existence because villains planned it, or seekers after power designed it, but mainly because it has proved to be human habit for people to organize themselves into social, economic, ethnic, cultural, political and geographic units that feel good to belong to.

Somewhere ahead in human destiny, it has to be believed, the nationalistic form of existence will have to evolve itself, with all nations conceding to all other nations the same rights they claim for themselves, and all people considering themselves citizens of the world as well as citizens of their own nations.

One of the confusing features of the voting, for those who would like to draw deductions from it, was that the actual number of people going to the polls with the intention of voting for a certain national candidate didn't necessarily show up in the final result.

If a national candidate's strategy was to nominate a candidate for every delegate's post, that might split his strength while another national candidate, by concentrating his voting strength on a smaller number of delegate candidates, might win more delegates with fewer votes.

In one Arizona district, for instance, Senator Muskie, filing 12 candidates for 12 delegate posts, drew a total of 4,079 votes but elected only four delegates while Senator McGovern, filing only five candidates, was able to elect all five delegates.

Even those who conceded in advance that the system of voting would lead to weird results were not prepared, however, for the Arizona outcome. That showed Senator Muskie, with the favorite, coming out ahead, but only with 189 of the 500 delegates.

But the big surprise was that Mayor Lindsay of New York, only a few weeks a Democrat, in label at least, came in second with 118 delegates.

Nobody would have called it in advance, either, that Senator McGovern would have come in third, with 102 of the 500, or that various groups interested in elected uncommitted delegates — such groups including the Humphrey supporters, the Senator Jackson supporters, and the forces of organized labor, would come out with only 85 of the 500 delegates.

The way these confusing and admittedly warped results have to be read is this: That Senator Muskie, the acknowledged front runner who had, in Arizona, the open, formal support of the state's prominent party leaders, didn't run very convincingly far out front, and that, while Muskie almost stalled, Mayor Lindsay, in his first actual test outside his new party, suddenly shot forward into a spot of real contention.

So, against all logic, or at least against the opinion of most political experts, Mayor Lindsay has already made more of a success of his switch than seemed possible. Whether this is tribute to qualities in him which Arizona can discern while New York City can't, or a result of the lack of real life in the rest of the Democratic field, remains unclear. But it seems to increase the possibility that the Democratic National Convention could assemble with some work still left to do.

But contrary to the facts, Humphrey is perceived in Florida as well as Muskie's left, and more worthy may not erase that misimpression. State Rep. Tom Alvaraz, a right-wing Democrat from Jacksonville who admits his admiration for Wallace, was unimpressed by Humphrey's speech there. To Alvaraz, Muskie and Humphrey are identical liberal twits, catering to the 15 per cent black Democratic vote while ignoring the 85 per cent white vote.

Finally, both Muskie and Humphrey leaders have abandoned hope that Sen. Henry M. Jackson can cut into the Wallace vote. Jackson's overt attacks against Wallace have brought boos from low-income white audiences. If his aggressive campaigning produces any gains, they are apt to come not from Wallace's farmers and laborers but from middle-class suburbs, drawing average 15 per cent negative donors.

CIRCUIT COURT 11 Manchester Section

Philip Labrie, 37, of Manchester, was given indeterminate sentences in Circuit Court Judge Charles J. House. 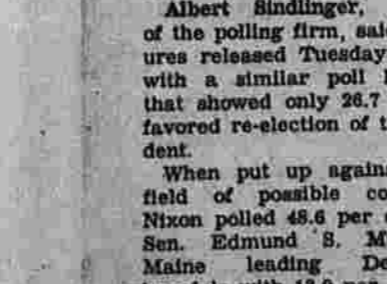
