# Lufkin's Answer to Gwinn's Remarks State May Exempt P&WA From Air Quality Rules

HARTFORD (AP) — In terms of mechanical systems Pratt & Whitney Aircraft, which had complained that proposed air quality regulations seem to demand that it spend \$80 million, stands a good chance of being exempted from compliance, says State Environmental Protection Commissioner Dan W. Lufkin.

Lufkin branded claims by manufacturers that the regulations would result in companies leaving the state — and taking jobs with them — as "hogwash."

"It might be the case of greatest difficulty in the one-time usual emission," Lufkin said Tuesday in an interview.

He said P&WA, the largest division of the state's largest employer, United Aircraft, runs testing programs designed to improve engines built by the company.

Matiyar Rostropovich, probably the world's greatest performing cellist, drew a capacity house last evening at Millard Auditorium despite sleep tuckered eyes and a sore throat. MY LIFE AND TIMES. By Henry Miller. Playboy Press, \$17.95. This book is like one of those spectacular on television. That is, it is a "production," in which the star performer has to share the credits with several dozen specialists and technicians.

It is described in the preface as a "visual autobiography." True, it is highly visual. Its large format is crisscrossed with photographs, old and new; with color reproduction of Miller's watercolor; with facsimiles of manuscripts, notes and outlines in Miller's own hand.

But the main text is far from being an autobiography. It consists of a mélange of taped recordings in which the author rambles hazily, in an egotistical fashion, back and forth through his life and times. It is a grab-bag of opinions, anecdotes and recollections.

For the guidance of the reader, the end papers contain a chronology written by Miller, so that the reader is enabled to follow the dates of his "typical" and other publications; his assorted marriages, divorces, mistresses and offhand alliances; his meetings with literary and art figures and his travels.

Of course, writers will be interested in his comments on his own experience, his early tendency to use four-letter words to describe the physical aspects of sex in their tender manifestations. But Miller dispenses this theme rather briefly, devoting more space to his watercolors than he does to his writing.

On the contrary, the law has shown a special tenderness for wills made by the elderly. One judge's explanation has often been quoted: "It is one of the painful consequences of extreme old age that it ceases to excite interest, and is apt to be left solitary and neglected. The contract which the law still gives to a man over the disposal of his property is one of the most efficient means which he has, in protracted life, to command attention."

But in a close case, the law gives a will the benefit of the doubt. This is not only a matter of concern for the elderly but of preference for wills as the best way to transfer property at time of death.

For if there is no will, all sorts of unpleasant things may befall the heirs. The most common goes to the least deserving. Taxes may be needlessly high. Costs of administration may be exorbitant. Family feuds may spark family feuds.

Of course, old age may indeed be accompanied by real incompetence. In another case, the will of an 85-year-old woman was thrown out because in her declining years she had been unable even to recognize friends and relatives. The court said a will the signed while so disabled did not truly reflect her "will at all."

### Tolland County Superior Court Quash Motion Denied In Quade Couple Case

Motions to quash two of the nine counts against Dr. Albert Quade, 46, and one of nine counts against his wife, Mary Dean Quade, 42, were denied yesterday by Judge Paul J. Driscoll.

The Quades are each charged with a variety of counts in connection with an allegedly illegal marriage counseling service conducted at their home on Codfish Falls Rd., Storm.

Atty. Charles Tarpinian of Willimantic argued the motions in connection with bills of particulars. The Quades were not in court. He contended the state should not have charged Quade both with practicing medicine without a certificate of registration and practicing psychology without a license on the basis that the alleged violations of both statutes were identical except for an advertisement as a psychologist in the phone book in attempting to have the first count quashed. He stressed that the practice of medicine deals with physical, not emotional, illness.

State's Attorney Donald B. Caldwell answered that the statute on practicing medicine is not limited to treating physical ailments and doesn't use the word physical but rather "allment or disease, actual or imaginative," and while he did not claim Quade practiced surgery or gave medicine, he insisted psychiatry is a branch of medicine differentiated from the practice of psychology and said the factual situation can support the state's claim of the two different crimes.

In his attempt to quash the count of rape, Tarpinian objected to the wording in the bill of particulars defining the charge and also the dates between which it occurred, one being a typographical error, 1971 instead of 1967. He objected to its connection before the ruling on the motion; however, the judge amended the bill to correct the date.

Tarpinian attempted to have quashed the charge of risk of injury against Mrs. Quade on the grounds that it failed to allege intent, that it was during some act that "adolescents" came into the room, and that no crime of risk of injury was intended.

Caldwell said the state doesn't intend to allege intent, that all it needed was sufficient information to charge, and that question of intent is up to the jury to determine.

The defense attorney said it seems the state can provide better dates in the bill of particulars as to when the various offenses were committed, that some dates between which the alleged acts occurred spanned up to four years.

Caldwell answered that some of the alleged crimes were of a continuing nature such as the doctor's practice itself and the crime of seduction, and that people who were patients over a long period with visits sometimes two or three times a week or more would find it impossible to remember on just which date something happened. He said, "We've been as precise as possible."

One of the four additional counts against Quade was nolle prossed as the five-year statute of limitations ran out before the arrest. Quade will make his plea to the remaining three counts, on Feb. 17. The charges were not made public.

Both husband and wife pleaded guilty to the original counts Dec. 14 and her case is on the trial list now.

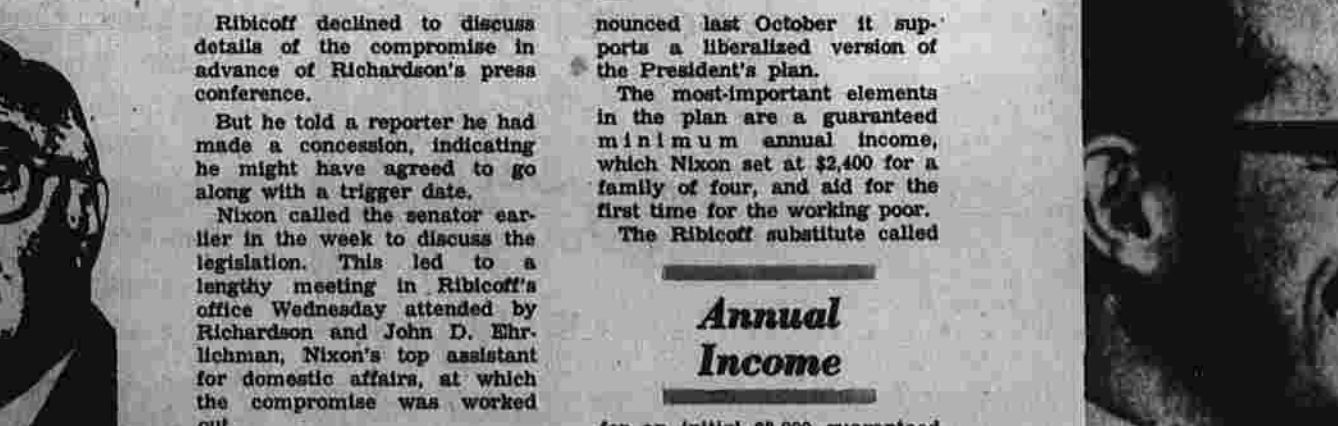
