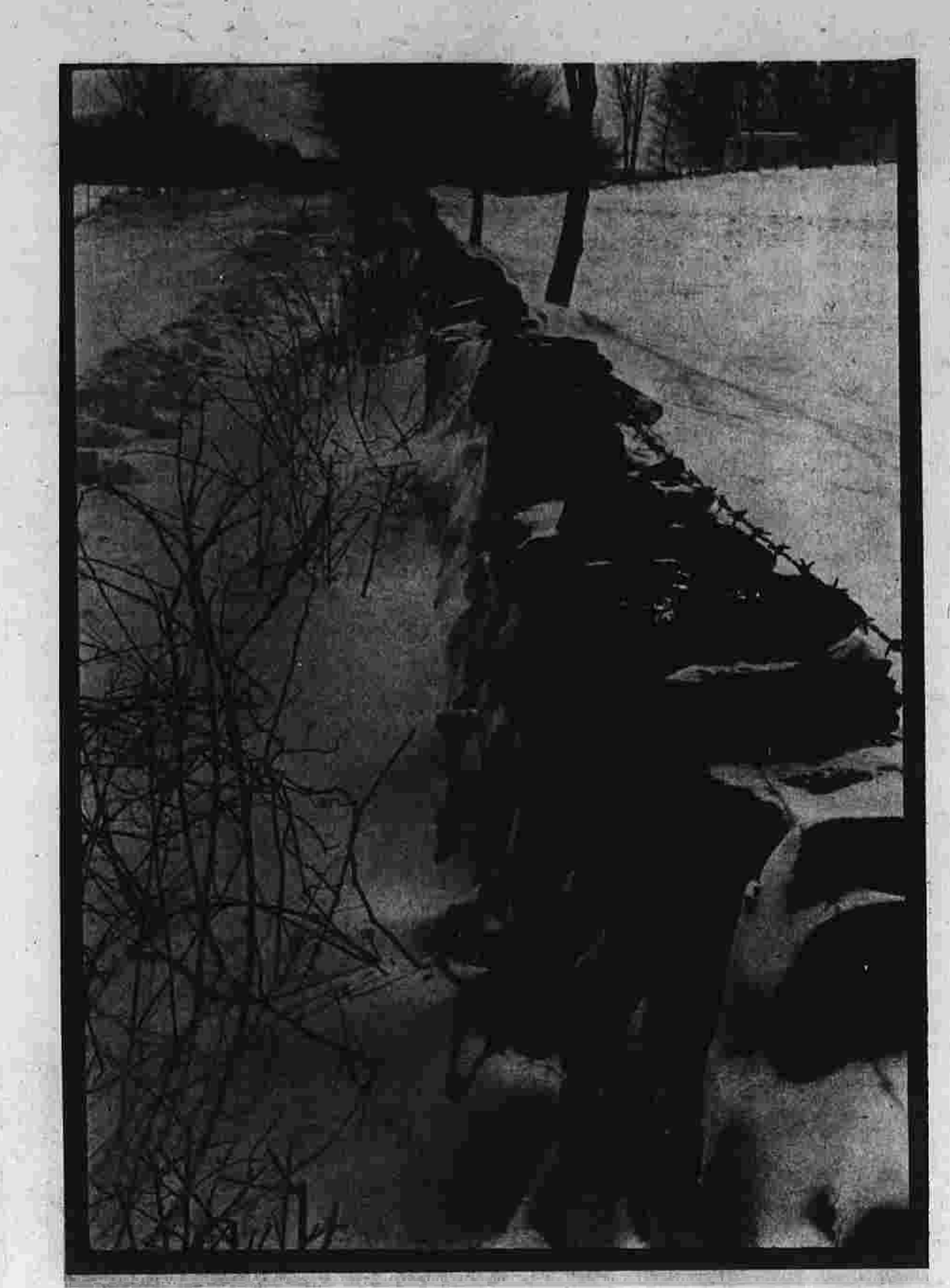

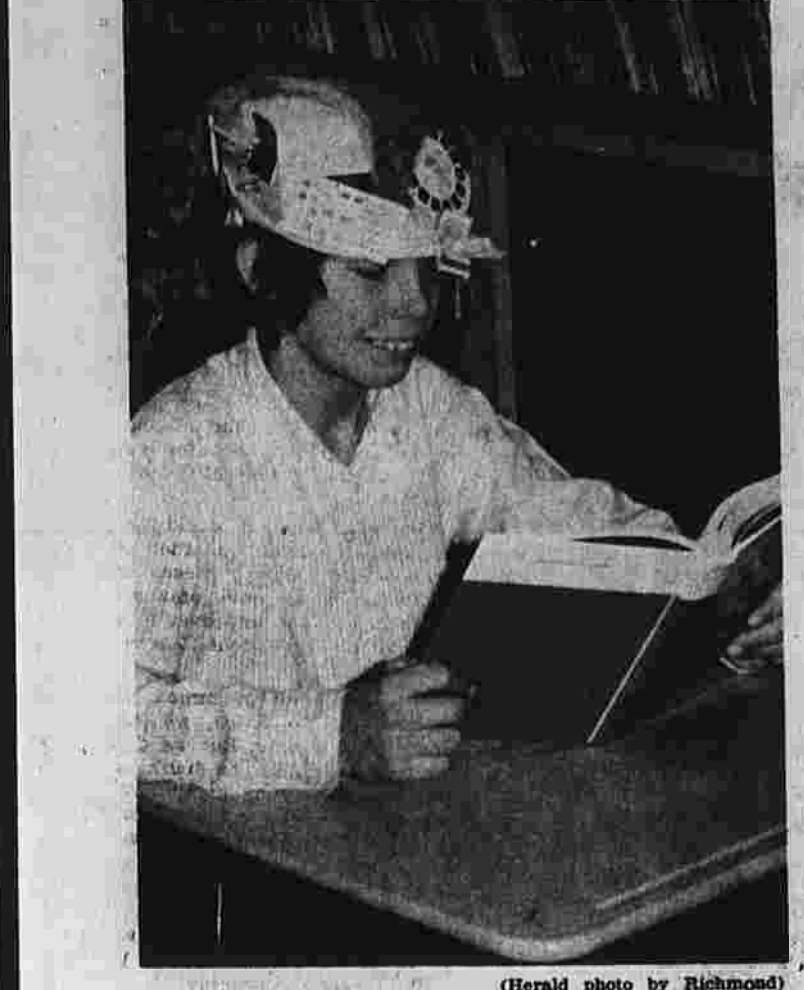

Wolfanger Resigns Finance Board Post

The Board of Finance held a special meeting last night to appoint Norman Edmonds to fill an existing vacancy on the board and to accept the resignation of its chairman, Howard Wolfanger, effective Feb. 23.

Wolfanger announced his decision to resign from the board on which he has served since its formation five years ago, explaining he was unable to attend most of the board meetings required in the budget preparation procedures.

It will not be available this time to attend the board meetings which, in his opinion, is necessary for all members in order to present a budget which is best for Tolland," Wolfanger said.

He said he hopes the budget will reflect the guidelines of wage and price controls, and warned that revamping will not result in a large amount of money, only that it will be spread on a more equitable basis.

Preparation of the new budget will require not only careful consideration on the part of those making requests, especially on the part of the Board of Finance, the chairman said, but also on the part of the town.

Expressing his appreciation to the people of Tolland for their rewarding experience of having served on this important board, Wolfanger thanked board members for their efforts to have him re-elected.

Members were strong in their pleas for reconsideration, Wolfanger explained, and they tried to reach and would not be reconsidered.

Wolfanger said he has two experienced finance board members on the six-man board which causes the new board members some concern.

Edmonds was unanimously appointed to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Wolfanger, announced William Swanback last month.

The Democrats had recommended former finance board member Kevin Cavanaugh and John Trivino for the post, which under the terms of the town charter must be filled by a person of the same political affiliation as the person resigning.

Edmonds had originally sought appointment to the finance board to serve a two-year term, but when he was elected to the post at last night's meeting, he was elected to a four-year term.

A fourth applicant was Robert Miller of the Veterans Board of Appeals and the general accounting experience, who voiced his interest in the post at last night's meeting.

Two Republicans were also interested and apparently will be eligible to apply for Wolfanger's vacancy, which must go to a Republican. Roger Hall, who wrote the board of his interest and Urban Luginbuhl has been contacted regarding serving on the board.

Noting the temperatures remain well below freezing at this time of year in Tolland, Meyer added "In the old days there would not have been any women allowed at the banquet. Any who were in attendance would have had to sit by themselves at a table in the sidehall."

The Maotai used as a toast by the President and Premier Chou En-lai is extremely powerful, triple distilled Chinese brandy made from grain. "They serve it in pewter mugs, since it is too strong for glass," Meyer adds. "Three of those and you go home as quickly as possible."

He particularly enjoyed the expressions on some of the faces of Communist China leaders as they shared the toast with President Nixon who had always been considered their enemy. "It was a terrific honor for some to share toasts and their expressions gave away their thoughts."

Meyer believes China would be a greater power today, if it had not fallen victim to communism. "Communism pulls all down to the lowest level," he explains. Although things may be better now than in the 1950's one should look to the Chinese accomplishments of the period between 1950 to 1972, measuring them retrospectively to the period between 1937 and 1970.

The Chinese art of handicrafts was destroyed as unnecessary by the Communists, although they are now trying to revive it.

The Chinese Communist devoted atomic power with the assistance of Chinese people who had been trained in America and who were subsequently allowed to return to China, he claims.

"The big danger now is that the United States will go overboard thinking the Communists have made great accomplishments. I don't think they are back in where they were in 1952."

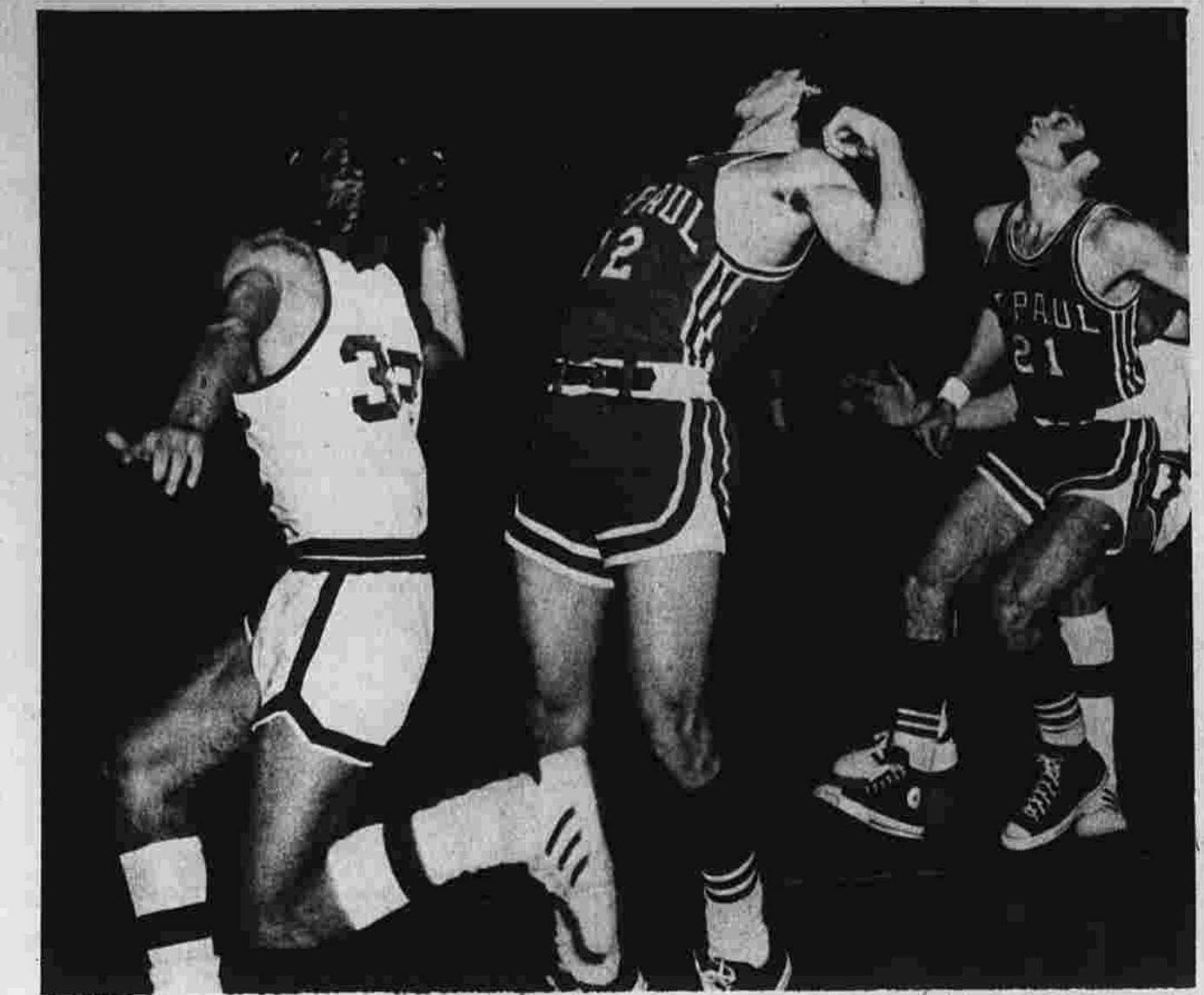

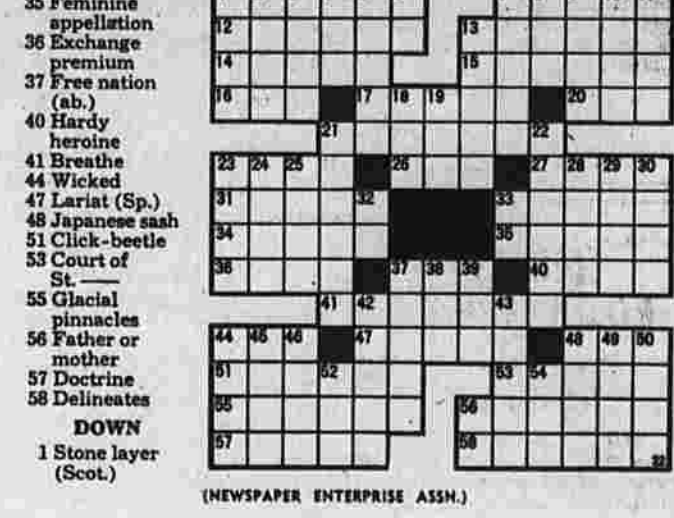
