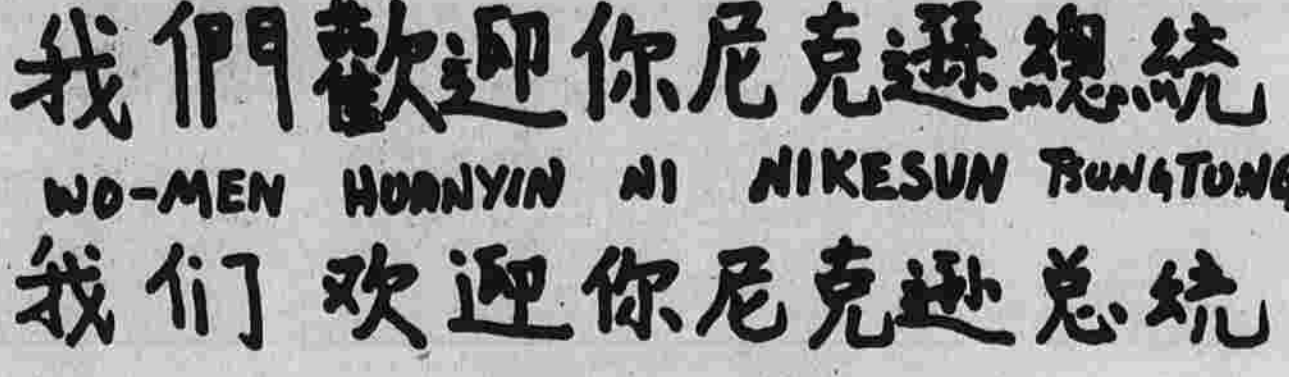

LIFE on the WATER

Life on Bangkok's waterways is lively, colorful—and crowded. The Thai capital is also the country's chief port. It's built on both banks of the Chao Phraya River, crisscrossed by numerous smaller streams and canals or "dongs" and is often referred to as the "Venice of Asia."

Thousands of its residents live on the water in boats, or in houses built over and beside the water. Waterways are the city's main thoroughfares. You can catch a water taxi; canoes peddle fruit and vegetables from house to house; sampans operate as floating snack bars, and strings of barges loaded with rice, coconuts, bananas and pineapple converge on the site of the famous floating market, or carry heavier cargoes to the port. And now the police department has assigned waterborne traffic cops to untangle the traffic jams on the canals.



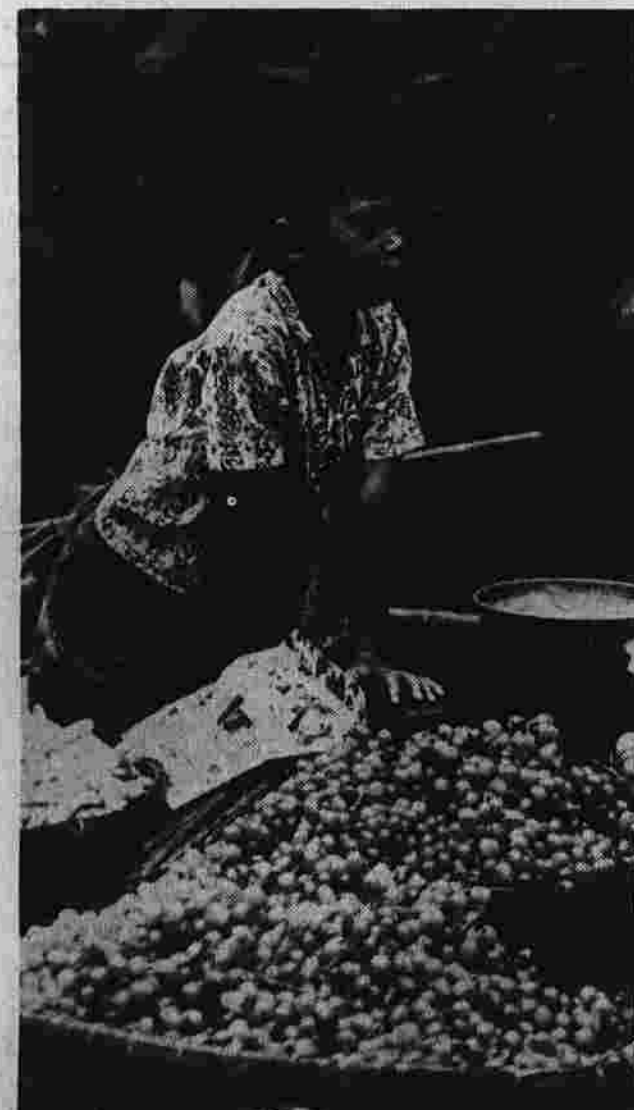

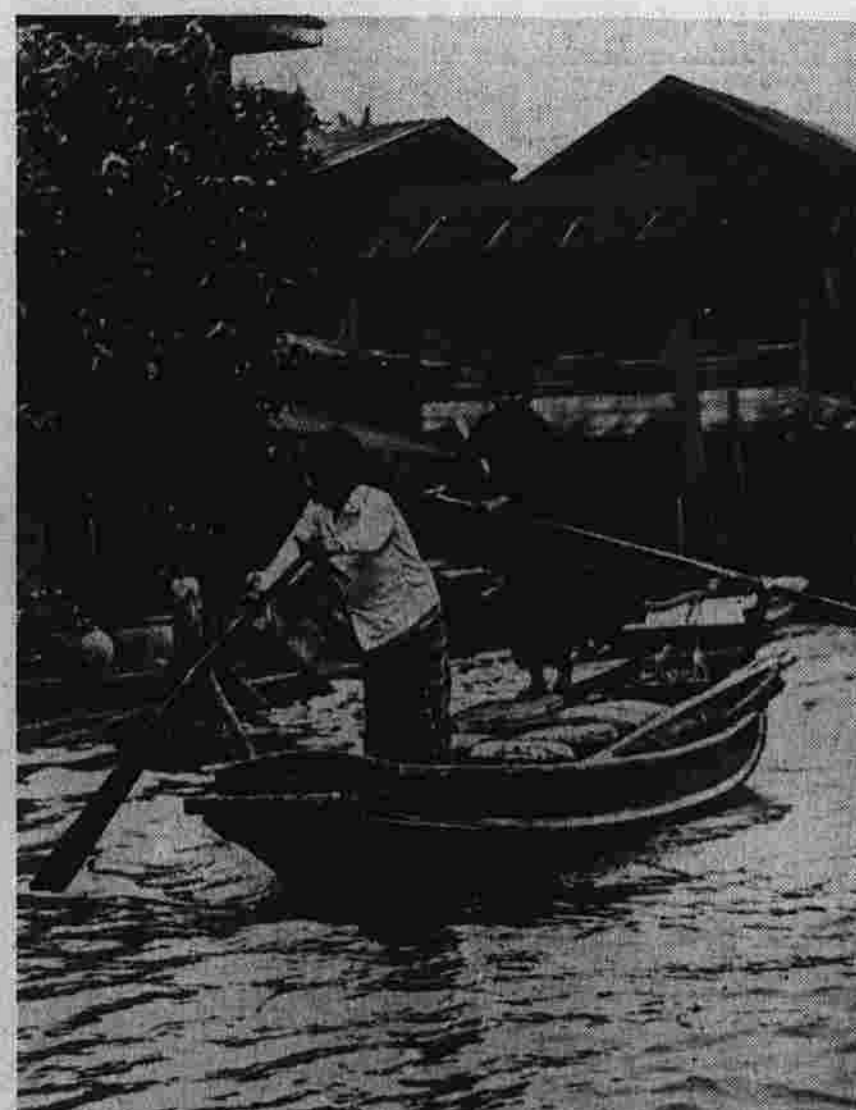

Cost of Living Increase Smaller

WASHINGTON (AP) — The summer protests in Washington cost of living climbed again in and elsewhere, was reported as January, the second full month 1.6 per cent in January. The index of Phase 2, but the rise was smaller than in December, the 1.6 per cent.

There were some decreases as well. Lower prices for meat and poultry, used cars and gas, and new cars pushing up the line.

The food price index actually fell 0.2 per cent in January, after allowing for seasonal factors; it had risen 0.7 per cent in each of the two preceding months. The index for food purchased in grocery stores was unchanged at 0.1 per cent. This was largely due to a sharp drop in the prices of eggs and fresh vegetables—both exempt from price control.

Prices of dairy products, fresh fruits, and processed fruits and vegetables increased, but the cost of restaurant meals and snacks went up 0.2 per cent.

The price index for non-food commodities declined 0.2 per cent in January. This was smaller than the usual drop in the season of 0.3 per cent. The index for the average city prices of apparel and textiles of pergonographic material was set in a raid Tuesday afternoon.

Gasoline prices were lower in January, but the cost of tires and auto parts rose 0.3 per cent. The rise in meat prices, dropped for the third month in a row. The increase in new car

Laird Sees Air Force Sharing Navy Carriers

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of Defense Melvin Laird, moving to shake up traditional service roles, foresees the day when Air Force planes will fly from Navy aircraft carriers.

This is one of Laird's long-range ideas for giving the Air Force a share in control of the Navy mission.

Laird said he was offering the idea to get the service to think about closer cooperation as the U.S. armed forces are being reduced to their lowest strength in more than 20 years.

Among other things, Laird said, the Air Force's F111 fighters are going to become "tailhookers." Tailhookers are the aircraft carriers that use the hook on their landing gear to land on the deck of an aircraft carrier.

Laird said he has developed a plan to use the Air Force's F111 fighters on the carriers. The plan would require that the Air Force develop and test new tactics and training manuals for ship decks.

"The Air Force has developed tactics and has updated training manuals for ship decks," Laird said.

He did not mention it, but he has also proposed that they handle sea-control patrol missions from strategically located mine-laying work at sea.

"Additional tests of the effectiveness of guided weapons against surface vessels are in progress," Laird said.

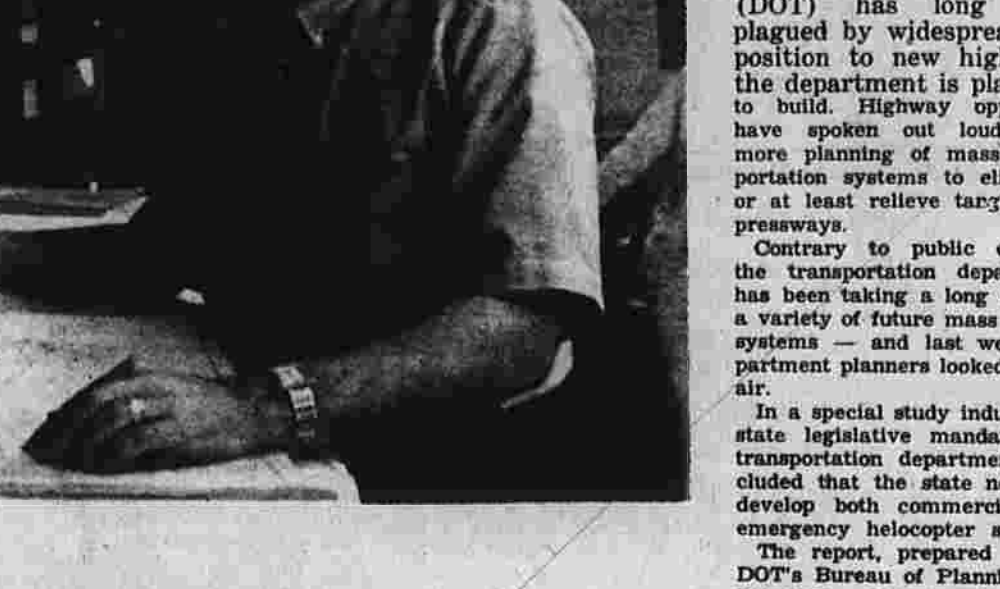

Ever since the end of World War II, the South Pacific Commission has been an influential factor in helping the economy of many countries in the vast ocean area of that part of the world.

To honor the 25th anniversary of the official establishment of the commission, Papua-New Guinea has issued a set of new stamps and combined the set with a simultaneous commemoration of its constitutional development.

Two 7-cent values pay tribute to the 1972 elections. One stamp bears two nations' flags and the other shows the Papua-New Guinea crest and the Australian Coat of Arms.

The commission was established as a regional consultative and advisory body to participating governments. Joint projects include those of problems of transport, tourism, fisheries and agriculture.

Membership of the commission comprises Australia, France, New Zealand, United Kingdom and the United States.

The Southern California Show will be held in Anaheim April 14-16. The Northern segment will take place in San Francisco Dec. 1-3.

The Philatelic Gallery will continue its practice of exhibiting by invitation only to medal-winning collectors. The bourse will be limited to 25 selected dealers.

Ghana's latest set is a tribute to the 25th anniversary of UNICEF. There are four colorful commemorative in the group with the denominations reflecting the recently introduced higher postal rates there.

One stamp depicts a new born baby being weighed on a scale provided by UNICEF in Ghana. Another adhesive shows a nurse with a UNICEF logo.

The fourth highlights Day Care Schooling since UNICEF is actively involved in training a staff for such centers in Ghana.

"Nobody's Child"

Right now, roughly one American baby in 10 is being born out of wedlock. Together, these children form yet another "minority" group in our society—the illegitimate. Do they too have constitutional rights? Does the Constitution guarantee them equal treatment? Do they too have racial and religious minorities? The common law had a scornful name for anyone born to an unwed woman: filius nullius—"nobody's child." For centuries, such children labored under severe legal handicaps.

However, a recent decision by the United States Supreme Court has taken a giant step toward equalizing their status.

The case arose when five illegitimate children sought damages for the wrongful death of their mother in a hospital. Under state law, illegitimate children had no right to make this kind of a claim.

But the Court disregarded the state law and ruled that the children's claim must be allowed. The Court said it was unfair to penalize them for a characteristic over which they had no control.

In its decision, the Court recalled the anguish of an illegitimate son in King Lear. "Why bastard, wherefore base?"

Does this ruling mean that from now on, illegitimate children will have exactly the same rights as legitimate children? Not necessarily. In one case, the question was whether an illegitimate son had the right to be supported by his father. The court said yes, because to rule otherwise would be to "cast the burden upon the innocent child."

But in another case the question was whether an illegitimate child was automatically entitled to the same inheritance rights as a legitimate child.

This time, the answer was no. The court said that, just as inheritance laws could favor sons over grandsons or first cousins over second cousins, they could favor legitimate children over illegitimate children.

Discrimination in law if it has some reasonable purpose, said the court, and discouraging illegitimacy is a reasonable purpose.

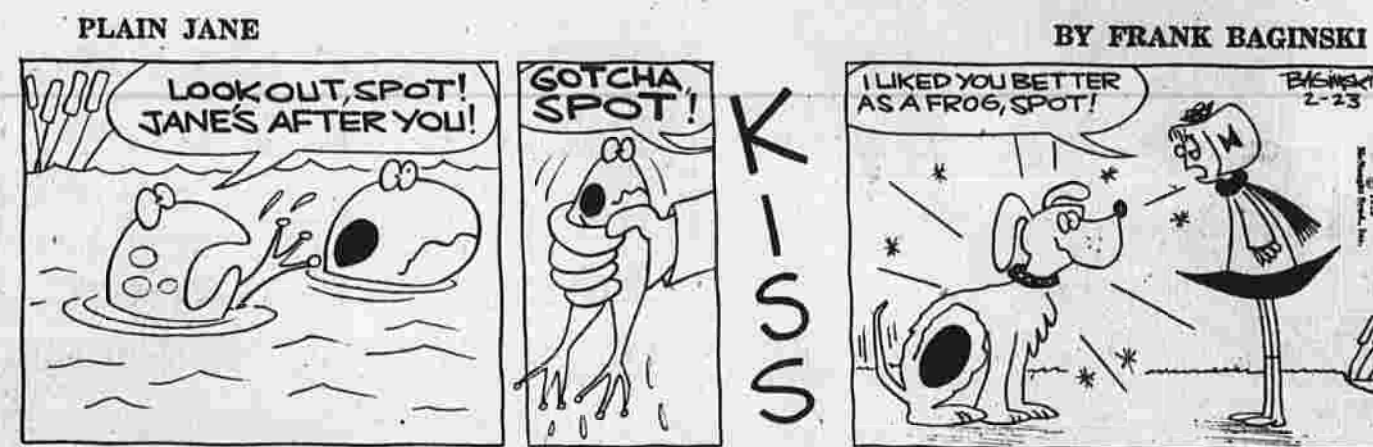

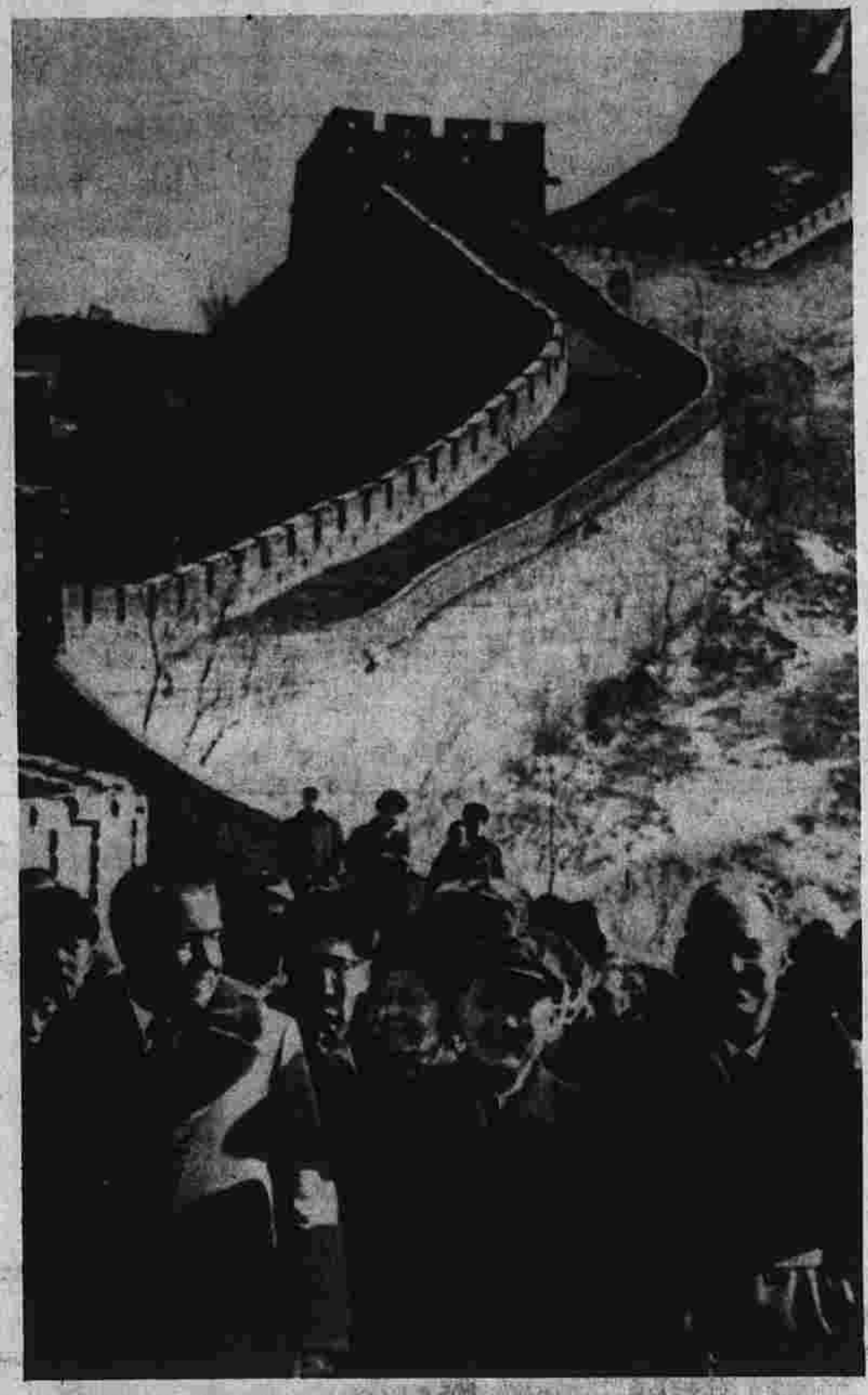
