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### Sheinwold on Bridge

DON'T CHOOSE DESERT IF LOOKING FOR RAIN

By ALFRED SHEINWOLD

During World War II, a capricious government sent me to the Sahara Desert for a few months and later to Burma, thus enormously improving my bridge game. I learned that anybody who's looking for rain will do better in Burma than in the desert. You'd be surprised to discover how many bridge players don't work out as basic a probability as this.

South dealer.

Neither side vulnerable.

Opening lead — Ten of Clubs.

South won the first trick with the ace of clubs and immediately went after the diamonds by trying a finesse with dummy's eight. East cravily won with the king of diamonds, but this fine play was not actually necessary to defeat the contract; South had already beaten himself by choosing to look for rain in the desert clubs.

East returned a club to the king, and South reached his hand with the ace of hearts. Declarer continued with a diamond, trying a finesse with dummy's eight. East won and led another club, whereupon West defeated the contract with four club tricks.

Wrong Hope

South played the hand in the hope that West had the K4 or the Q-10 of diamonds, or perhaps the doubleton K-Q. His chance of succeeding was less than one in four.

After winning the first trick with the ace of hearts, South should lead the king of hearts. This opponent is likely to play low if he has the ace, but break 5-3; but each will begin a high-low if the suit breaks 4-2 in favor of South.

When the queen or ten of hearts drops, declarer can easily make good use of her heart tricks. If only small hearts drop, South can still decide whether to switch to diamonds or go on with the hearts. The combined chance is more than twice as good as just going after the diamonds.

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### Tolland Juniors Conduct Survey Of Safety on School Buses

Concerned over the safety of children riding the local school buses, coupled with reports of discipline problems on some of the buses, prompted the safety committee of the Tolland Junior Women's Club to conduct a survey of the situation.

Members of the committee rode the buses and issued a generally favorable report which was passed on to the Board of Education.

But the women did not feel they had received the hearts of the children on the buses know what we were there and were on their best behavior."

A vote of confidence was registered in favor of the school bus drivers, most of whom are women.

The drivers are doing an excellent job of driving the bus and as good a job as possible keeping discipline, the survey report presented to the school board states.

It is almost impossible for the drivers to keep their eyes on the road and to watch the children in the back of the bus at the same time, Mrs. Pat Woods, chairman of the safety committee, explained.

"Discipline problems were found mainly on the middle school buses. These buses contained a number of students being bused, using profanity, fighting, shouting, and throwing paper and, on one bus, playing an excessively noisy tape recorder."

Few problems existed on the elementary buses. Most involved students standing in the area open, Center Springs Annex and Union Pond are closed.

Members of the committee rode nine school buses covering 18 bus runs. Three were for the high school, six for the middle school and seven for the elementary school.

Although the drivers, with one exception, did not post their operators' licenses in view, they did observe all the other policy requirements set by the school board.

The only exceptions were three bus runs on which the children did cross the street without waiting to be signaled, and on which they did not have assigned seats.

### Conservationists Seeking Landfill Planning Grant

The Conservation Commission voted Wednesday evening to apply to the Ford Foundation for a \$700 grant to partially cover the cost of a plan of development for the sanitary landfill area.

Total cost of the plan, according to an estimate submitted by the HUB Corp. upon the request of First Selectman Arden Reid, would amount to \$2,000. However, \$700 is the limit that can be requested with no matching funds necessary.

If the foundation approves the request for funds, it would then go half and half with the town on the remainder of the plan.

The town's share would amount to \$600.

County Conservation Agent Thomas Dece mentioned that the foundation was "swamped" with requests for grants, and that only the town would receive the grant this year. However, the town would receive the grant this year. However, the town would receive the grant this year.

He also stated that it would not be necessary to budget any money for the grant. John Hubbard and Reid will fill out the necessary forms for submission to the foundation.

Open Space

The commission reviewed a set of plans submitted by the Planning and Zoning Commission for possible open space areas in a proposed subdivision on Rt. 15 across from the 207.

In reviewing the plans, the commission noted that the area had some severe limitations for building. Some mentioned that at least two of the proposed six lots are in the flood plain area, according to the Tolland County Survey report.

The Planning and Zoning Commission has also requested the Recreation Commission to review the plans at its next meeting for possible recreation areas.

During World War II, a capricious government sent me to the Sahara Desert for a few months and later to Burma, thus enormously improving my bridge game. I learned that anybody who's looking for rain will do better in Burma than in the desert. You'd be surprised to discover how many bridge players don't work out as basic a probability as this.

### Tolland Hearing Scheduled April 13 On Plans for Widening I-86

Official plans for the widening of I-86 through Tolland and Willington will be presented at a public hearing April 13 at 8 p.m. in the Tolland Middle School.

A preliminary discussion of the plans was conducted yesterday by Maguire Associates, engineers, members of the state Department of Transportation, Tolland Road Superintendent Erwin Stoetner, and members of the local fire department.

The plans show the widening of I-86 to three lanes in each direction and the construction of two overpasses.

The overpasses will be located at Mt. Spring Rd. and Old Cahole Rd. and will facilitate travel across town. At present the highway completely blocks the town, forcing residents to either drive to the center of town or into Rockville to get across the highway.

The Old Cahole Rd. overpass will cut down the cost of school bus transportation to the high school.

The highway access roads at the Mt. Spring Rd.-Red Rd. intersection will be removed when the highway is widened.

Members of the fire department, concerned over the availability of the shortest possible route to a fire, feel the fire routes should remain.

One practical innovation included in the highway plans is the provision of parking areas at exits 80 and 100 for people riding in car pools.

We Can Be Patient, Temporarily. Sometimes we lose patience with some of the fellow members of our profession...

forgetting that, if we were in the same spot, we likewise would probably be fuming at the failure of the great leaders of the world to take us into their constant confidence.

But, this impatience of our top correspondents in Peking notwithstanding, the negotiations which have been going on at Peking have had every natural right to their own temporary secrecy while they were still in progress.

If who are professionally zealous to report all the news all the time would think it over, we would agree that any attempt to give a blow-by-blow, point-by-point account of the talks at Peking might well blow up the talks themselves.

When we of the media, and we the people, will have our real title to consider will be after the confrontation inside China is over. Then we fully expect to get, first from what the President himself can say, and then from what Washington officialdom will know so well how to leak to us, an eventually full and rather detailed story of what has been going on behind the scenes of those closed doors, meanwhile, however, what is going on is not primarily a plot against the media. It is, obviously, an effort to accomplish a highly extraordinary kind of mission. We owe it some temporary patience.

Which Way To The Moon? In September, 1970, after the United States had landed Armstrong on the moon in July of 1969 and Conrad on the moon in November of 1969, a Russian mooncraft settled down on the moon, scooped up some dust, kicked itself back off the surface, and returned to a safe landing in Russia.

The other day the Russians announced that a second such mission had just landed on the moon, at a pre-arranged location, picked up some rocks, blasted itself off, and was now on its way back to earth.

Such exploits, achieved without the presence of human beings on the journey, revive the old argument about whether or not our American tricks of sending men as well as machines to the surface of the moon was really worth the risk and the expense.

We doubt that any of us would really voluntarily swap the respective achievements. For one thing, no amount of scientific analysis will ever give any of us anything like the feeling of what it might be like to be there.

We got out of our moon trips, not only the first hand experiences and accounts of fellow human beings, but some of the most remarkable television that could be imagined.

For an attempt at complete honesty we should, perhaps, rearrange the prospective timetables, and assume, for purposes of consideration, that the Russians had been first on the moon, instead of launched our first manned voyage, the Russians had completed one or two successful purely mechanical missions, bringing back the first moon materials for study and analysis.

Would we, in that case, still be perched in the grand, tingling gamble of trying to make a manned voyage as fool proof as a mechanical one? Would we still have had that national drive to put a man on the moon?

The guess here is that we would. That takes nothing away from the superb accomplishment of the Russians in exploring the moon without human risk.

A Service Comes to Manchester

The news that a Manchester citizen who plans to do some traveling or vacationing abroad can now begin his preparation by applying for his passport up at the Manchester post office is very pleasant news.

It seems to us that it is the first time in a very long time that state or federal officials have actually done something to bring convenience and service to Manchester instead of taking it away.

It used to be that one might spend as much time traveling to and from arranging for a passport as one planned to spend on the impending trip abroad.

Now, at least, the first step toward travel is being made handy and convenient — the way more things — like collecting your winnings in the state lottery, to take one very current instance — ought to be.

Having the passport process that close also, we might observe, makes the outside world seem closer, too, closer than it has been since the old days when we had and exercised live title to our status as an official part of entry.

That was a designation we had not because coaling-gang ships were then coming up the Connecticut and then up the Hockanum, but because Cheney Brothers, then in the regular process of importing silk from China, had enough influence with the Customs Service to have the inspection of its imports take place after the shipments had arrived, by rail, in Manchester.

In those days, it must have seemed to many Manchester people that it was the outside world which often came to Manchester, and it may even have seemed a smaller world then, than it is now. It could at least go all out for convenience, as evidenced by the fact that the Customs Service was willing to come to Manchester to service one customer. We welcome the fact that Uncle Sam is now willing to be here in Manchester for the convenience of any one of us.

Nevertheless, Back For More. We seem to recall that one Roberto Clemente, after the World Series last fall, expressed some slight concern over the possibility that his wonderful exploits had not received every last ounce of public acclaim due them.

But his complaints, as he reported for sports writing the other day, were in the in the opposite direction. There is, he seems to say for all those who set their aim at becoming a great public hero, sometimes a price for the privilege.

"After the Series," Clemente said in Florida the other day, "I was pretty tired. After all, we had played 200 games since February 9. So I said, 'I'll go home and rest.'"

"In addition to my house, I have a place in the mountains, and I said 'I'll spend a lot of time there. I get there three times all winter.'"

"For a month and a half, my wife and I couldn't sleep. Our house was like a museum — people flocking down the street, ringing our bell day and night, walking through our room. People from the town, even tourists."

"Then I had so many things going down there, and I just couldn't say no. Every day I was doing something different. The Governor sent for me, the park administration, civic clubs. . . ."

"They took X-rays of my stomach when I got here the other day and found nothing but worms. Tenston, the doctor says. But I'm worn out. I am more tired today than I was when the Series ended."

So let that be a lesson to all, not to go out and get famous unless willing to pay the full price.

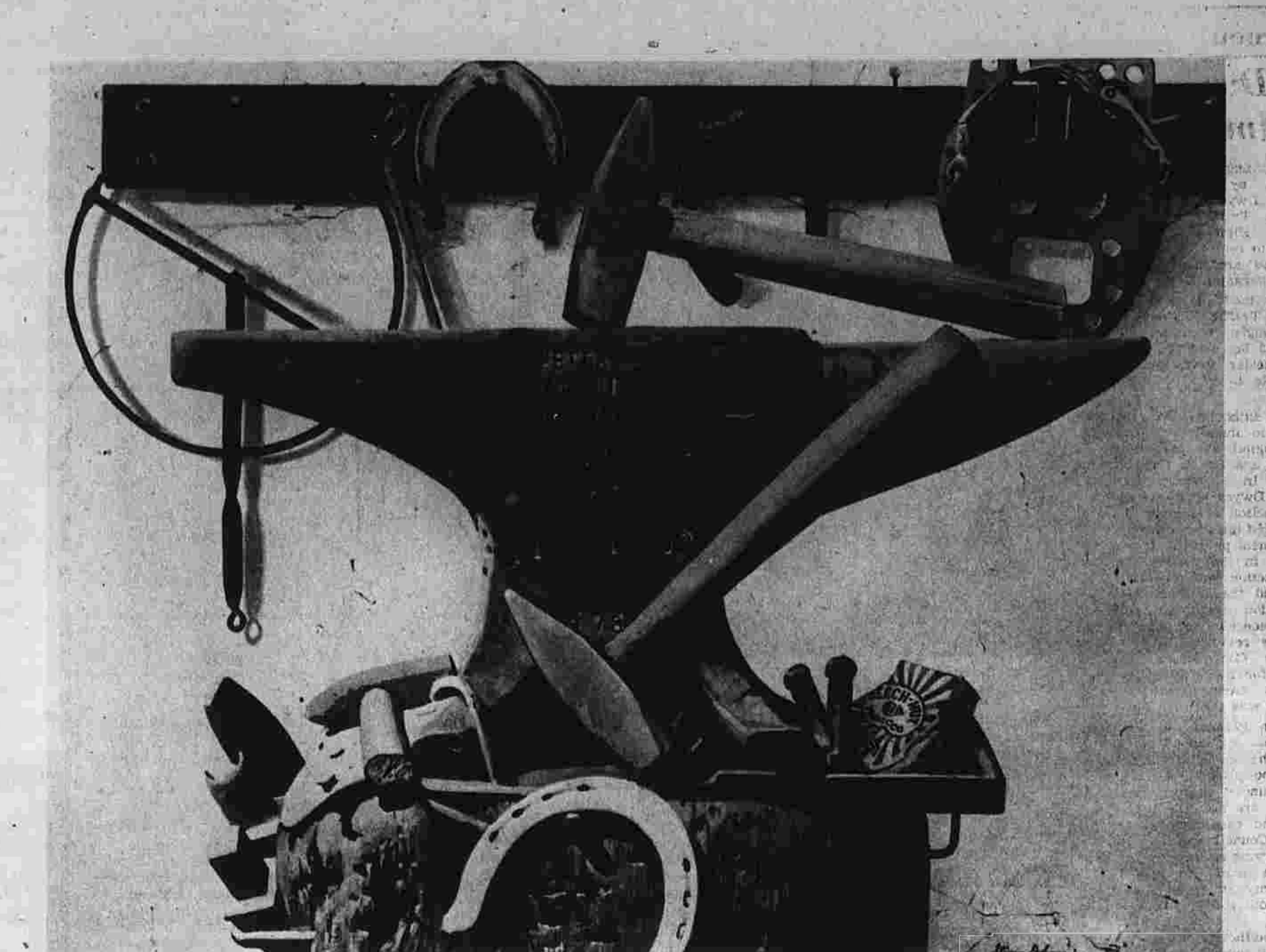

To Stop The Slaughter. We applaud Governor Meskill for his comprehensive policy of toughness in proposing steps to end the slaughter on the state's highways which last year reached an all-time high of 487 persons.

In his address to the General Assembly Wednesday, he called for a mandatory seven-day jail sentence for drunken drivers and a return to the policy of automatic suspension of driver's licenses of first-time speeding offenders. That policy was nullified by an act of the legislature.

The governor rightfully received thunderous applause when he declared in his speech that "I believe the people of Connecticut want us to put a stop to this senseless slaughter. . . . An important aspect of the recommendation is that we suggest not just a few traffic-safety points, but an entire feeling and approach to the pressing problem of deaths on the highways."

It is obvious that the state and the courts no longer can be lenient with those drivers who play a deadly game, with liquor or speed, on the roads. Getting tough on the roads should be a top priority consideration and approval by the legislature. — NEW BRITAIN HERALD.

Waiting For Tet '72

WASHINGTON — Delayed beyond President Nixon's arrival in Peking by sluggish logistical preparations and relentless U.S. bombing, the still-pending Communist winter offensive in Vietnam is now clearly aimed at one political goal: forcing U.S. acceptance of the new and suddenly escalated asking price for peace.

A largely overlooked characteristic of its latest negotiating proposals strips bare the fact that Hanoi now demands nothing less than total dismantling of South Vietnam's governmental apparatus. Scarcely by coincidence, this diplomatic escalation is accompanied by preparations for the biggest Communist offensive since the fateful Tet campaign of 1968.

This is the classic Communist technique of fight-and-talk. In the view of experts here, the Hanoi politburo would not dare demand so much in Paris if it did not anticipate gains in the field of battle. Indeed, North Vietnam hopes such military success may help elect a Democratic president who would probably be more receptive to their proposals than Mr. Nixon.

Involved here is point two in the revised seven-point peace plan submitted by Viet Cong negotiators at Paris Feb. 2. Besides requiring the immediate resignation of President Nguyen Van Thieu, point two insists that Saigon "dismant at once its machine of oppression and constraint against the people."

This, in turn, was clarified Feb. 3 by Nhan Dan, the authoritative Communist party daily in Hanoi. In a remarkable editorial which has received all too little attention here, Nhan Dan said: "The Saigon administration must end its bellicose policy, and the oppressive and coercive apparatus in South Vietnam must be abolished immediately."

That apparatus, according to the editorial, consists of the following: "Over a million puppet troops, civil guards, spies and other heavy U.S. air bombardment has hurt badly. . . ."

Although a few U.S. policymakers are skeptical of the consensus among those military and civilian officials is that the bombing jumbled Hanoi's military timetable. Besides this, present plans for still more bombing may mean still more delay.

But nobody in authority here doubts that, however delayed, the blow will come—probably in the central highlands. It is inconceivable that Hanoi would undertake the agonizing labor of sending such heavy reinforcements and supplies without intending to make some noise. Indeed, the Communist artillery buildup in the central highlands continues at this writing.

Militarily, the situation is not greatly different from a month ago. Barring a calamitous and wholly unexpected collapse of South Vietnamese troops, the Tet offensive cannot score strategic gains. But temporary tactical successes in the central highlands may reap great political benefits among war-weary Americans, perhaps including pressure here for acceptance of Hanoi's terms.

Dwyer Says State Plans Improvement for Rt. 83

According to information received by Police Chief Edmond Dwyer, who heads the town's Traffic Authority, the State Highway Department plans to remove the abandoned Rt. 83 railroad abutments, the Rt. 83 near Scranton Motors and to realign the highway in that area.

The Traffic Authority noted it strongly recommends that Rt. 83 be widened from the Manchester town line in Oatville to West St. in Rockville.

The authority also asked the state to install a traffic control signal at the junction of Rt. 83 and Rt. 74 (Windsorville Rd.).

In a report from the state, Dwyer was told that the intersection is scheduled to be relocated under the highway improvement program. It was also noted, in the report, that the intersection was recently studied under the warrant for sign placement which was not satisfied.

The necessity for sign placement will be reviewed by the State Traffic Commission once the plans for the redesigned intersection have been prepared, Dwyer was told.

Town Planner Joseph Platte said that correspondence to him, dated Feb. 15, from the State Department of Transportation, indicates that state-funded improvements to Rt. 83 are not imminent.

Platte recommends that the Town Council take the initiative, in carrying out some recommendations made by the Traffic Authority, in order to provide a smooth traffic flow along Rt. 83.

The authority has recommended that some of the streets of the highway should be made one-way streets or divided streets noting that this would reduce the number of turning movements from the road.

He also suggested that the council review the town's zoning map and consider zoning adjustments in the intensity of permitted uses along Rt. 83.

"There is much uncertainty regarding the additional flow of traffic which could be handled under improved roadway conditions," Platte said.

"It may be that the situation of the highway along Rt. 83 has been desired by the town," Platte said. He noted, however, that when funds have been such that the basic capacity of the road is being reached, "a change in the pattern is desired, high-intensity use should not be as freely permitted on Rt. 83, other than at inter-sections of local arterials and collectors."

### Town Considered For Express Bus

The Connecticut Department of Transportation (DOT) is considering an express bus service for Manchester area commuters bound for Hartford, and will conduct a survey to determine if there is sufficient interest to proceed with the proposal.

The service, now in its preliminary planning stages, would be similar to a 10-day experiment which is now being conducted by DOT in the Hartford area. The express buses from Manchester would probably run at the same times and fares as the regular buses. The DOT arranged for the use of 250 car parking spaces at the Connecticut State Office Building in Hartford. Ridership on the Corbin Corner buses has been encouraging, according to DOT officials, but the Commission has not yet reached the break-even point for the Connecticut Co.

The Connecticut Co. estimates that there must be 288 round-trip riders daily for the company to break even. The transportation department has utilized a massive public relations program to inform commuters of the service, advertising that the mass transit commuter buses help motorists "avoid traffic congestion and parking problems."

The buses are priced to compete with the increasing cost of running a car, the DOT says. After leaving Corbin Corner, buses make four stops in downtown Hartford, along Trumbull St., Pearl St. and Center St. Riders can transfer to other city buses at no extra cost.

Starting Monday the express bus service will be expanded to include a new route specifically for State Police officers and other employees. The bus will leave Corbin Corner at 8 a.m. and will leave Interstate 84 at the State Capitol exit, taking a route around the Capitol before returning to the normal route to downtown Hartford.

The DOT, with help of the Greater Hartford Chamber of Commerce, wants to use a computer to match up neighbors with neighbor to simplify neighborhood methods now used by commuters to find a compatible car partner.

The DOT says an average of only 15 percent travel to work in each vehicle in the Hartford area, meaning most cars carry only one person.

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### Waves of Israeli Militants Blasted Palestinian Guerrilla Bases in Southeast Lebanon Today for the Second Day as the U.N. Security Council was Called into Session in New York to Debate the Earlier Israeli Air, Ground and Armored Attack.

Witnesses reported Israeli Mirage and Skyhawk fighter-bombers came over in formations of six to hit guerrilla bases outside Lebanese villages. One car roared into the Lebanese army garrison town of Marjayoun carrying a dying guerrilla.

There are many more wounded, but we can't get them out, the driver said. The witness said while the planes attacked, Israeli artillery shells rained down on the shelled main roads to prevent the escape of the guerrillas.

Israel launched the attack Friday in retaliation for raids by Palestinian guerrillas based in Lebanon who killed a young Israeli couple and an Israeli soldier earlier this week.

A Saturday session was scheduled for the Security Council in New York. A spokesman for Al Fatah, the largest of the Palestinian guerrilla organizations, said in Beirut that Israeli artillery today shelled commando strongholds in the southern Lebanese border village of Hachaya.

The spokesman said the Israelis began shelling the village at dawn, but quit 40 minutes later when the guerrillas returned fire. He added that several Israeli reconnaissance planes swooped overhead, but that there were no casualties on the Palestinian side and it was not known whether the Israelis suffered any.

Israel said its armored forces blew up 21 houses Friday in Lebanese villages it claims harbor guerrillas and that its jet-bombed guerrilla tent camps on the slopes of Mt. Hermon. It said "no single artillery shell was fired" and that its ground forces attacked only one village.

The Israelis said at least five guerrillas were killed. The Palestinians said at least seven guerrillas and two Lebanese villagers were killed and many others wounded.

The Israeli attack was the largest flare-up of violence in the Middle East in more than a year and followed a series of guerrilla raids into upper Golan Heights in which four Israelis were killed. The Israelis promised to strike again unless the raids stop.

The Security Council session was requested Friday night by Lebanon's ambassador to the United Nations, Edouard Ghora. He called the assault "a large-scale air and ground attack."

Year Arafat, the chief guerrilla leader, said 10 of his fighters were killed in the raid Friday and it wounded.

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## Electric Firms In Hike Bid

Electric Light Co. said it was asking for new rates which would increase revenues from sale of electricity by \$10 million, or 8.6 per cent.

The CLAP, which serves electric customers in 100 cities and towns and gas customers in 37 communities, said the effect of the increase on individual customers would vary depending on the amount and type of services used.

CLAP said residential electric customers using 100 kilowatt hours monthly would pay 70 cents per month more, 300 kilowatt hours \$1.25 and 500 kilowatt hours \$2.04, under the proposed increase.

Residential gas customers using 47 cents more per month. These using gas for cooking and water heating would pay an additional 90 cents monthly and customers using gas for central heating, cooking and water heating would pay \$2 more per month. It said the proposed immediate interim rates would total one-half of the proposed increase, pending review of the company's full request.

The PUC would impose conditions designed to insure that the amounts collected on an interim basis would be refunded if it was ultimately decided that such increases were not warranted. CLAP said.

The utility said it feels the requested rates conform to the guidelines issued by the Federal Price Commission Jan. 13.

CLAP said the federal guidelines require "any increase to be cost based, the minimum required to assure continued, adequate and safe service and achieve the minimum rates of return needed to attract capital at reasonable costs."

However, the utility noted, that "no decision on utility company rate increase applications will be effective until a current freeze is lifted" on March 10.
