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Our regret is that this parental activity has led to the creation of one more set of capital letters to add to the confusion of the American scene. The parental organization involved states itself "Parents Committee of Free Our Children from the Children of God."

Can we be pardoned if we hark back to those simpler days when there was only the GOP and the WCUT? "FAAA" "People Against Abuse of Acronymy."

But we retreat from such a confusion of references. The redwing arrived yesterday. Thanks to the revolving storms of February, it was something like a hawk later than usual. Last year, the redwing appeared on the 26th day of February, and the year before that on the 22nd.

That Washington welcoming crowd was gathered through the distribution among government employees of some 12,000 tickets for the occasion, a distribution which led some 5,000 people out to the airport.

Watching it, we thought it a bit rich, although we must confess it didn't annoy us particularly, since we could sense the President's hunger for a crowd of some kind.

In fact, this was one occasion when we were almost ready to forgive the President his excessive preoccupation with pomp and uniforms and fanfares of trumpets.

Then, in the same edition of the Times which was completed, about the extravagance of the scene at Andrews Air Force Base, we read the news story about Premier Chou's return to Peking.

"With dozens of red banners fluttering in the wind," the news account related, "the Premier toured a three-sided square of soldiers, workers and Red Guards, many of them waving paper flowers and chanting quotations from Mao Tse-tung."

In China, as in the United States, it seemed a matter of high official rejoicing that the Peking meetings had ever been held and that each country was getting its own leadership back from them hale and hearty and none the worse for the fire water consumed in the process of dragon toasting dragon.

For every visit by anybody anywhere which lasts more than a week, there are two great, wonderful feelings: the one that of the visitor who finds himself safe back in his own home and all its familiar comforts, and the other that of the host who, even with the nicest guest in the world, cannot help but experience an exquisite joy of relief when the guest has finally gone and things can gradually be put back in their proper places.

Can Muskie Take It?

WASHINGTON — The damage to Sen. Edmund S. Muskie's Presidential campaign of his extraordinary speech in Manchester, N.H., Feb. 26, stems not only from the shock caused by the speech but also from the fact that Muskie, who had been campaigning for a long time, had not been in the state for a long time.

But there was no indication Muskie would mention this in his speech the next day. Nor had Muskie discussed it with Mitchell. So, it was a complete surprise when Muskie, speaking without notes but his mind full of it, said he had violated a cardinal rule that the candidate must maintain firm control over what he says.

Obviously, what the nation needs is more "moral leadership" accompanied by a great deal less hypocrisy than some of its leaders are displaying. — BLOUX CITY JOURNAL

The 12th and final recommendation of the Eberhart Report for the office of state treasurer reads as follows: "Make the position of Treasurer appointive and have it report to the new Office of Commissioner of Finance."

"Substantiation is detailed under a recommendation for the Commissioner of Finance and Control." "The 11th and final recommendation of the Eberhart Report in its discussion of the office of state comptroller reads as follows:

"Make the position of Comptroller appointive and have it report to the new Office of Commissioner of Finance." "Substantiation and savings are detailed under another recommendation."

When the Eberhart Report gets to this "substantiation" it is found beginning by the statement that, although the Commissioner of Finance and Control is empowered to give technical advice to the Governor and state agencies, the situation is that "because of similar responsibilities assigned to the Treasurer and Comptroller, these powers are not completely effective."

The Eberhart Report then proceeds to launch itself into its usual recommendation, which is to: "Combine the functions of the Comptroller, Treasurer, Commissioner of Finance and Control and Tax Commissioner into one position, to be headed by an appointed Commissioner of Finance and make all positions reporting to him appointive rather than elective."

Then comes the "substantiation" for these three recommendations, as follows: "If effective financial control over state operations is to be established, a strong agency must be created to handle the state's financial affairs. This is the direction of the post of Commissioner of Finance."

The reaction of Democratic politicians from precinct captains to Muskie's close friends in the Senate, is astonishment and dismay. The explanation certified by Muskie aides is that on Feb. 26 he was physically exhausted and psychologically frustrated, irritated by simultaneous sniping from George Wallace, George McGovern and William Loeb, who were conducting a multi-front war against Muskie's campaign.

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Muskie-Loeb Dispute Is a Campaign Issue

CONCORD, N.H. (AP) — The political feud between Sen. Edmund S. Muskie, D-Maine, and William Loeb, conservative Republican, over a state legislative mandate, as reported by the largest newspaper in the state, has become a campaign issue.

In Wednesday's edition of the Manchester Union Leader, Loeb said the attack on him by the candidate in next Tuesday's election was "hysterical and deceptive."

Last Saturday, Muskie called Loeb a "gutless coward" for printing a letter from a writer who charged that Muskie's aide had used the word "Canuck" derogatorily in referring to French-Americans and that Loeb had editorially attacked the senator's wife Joan.

Loeb charged that Muskie "knew darned well that he was deceiving the people of New Hampshire and the rest of the nation in claiming that he had written an editorial attacking his wife."

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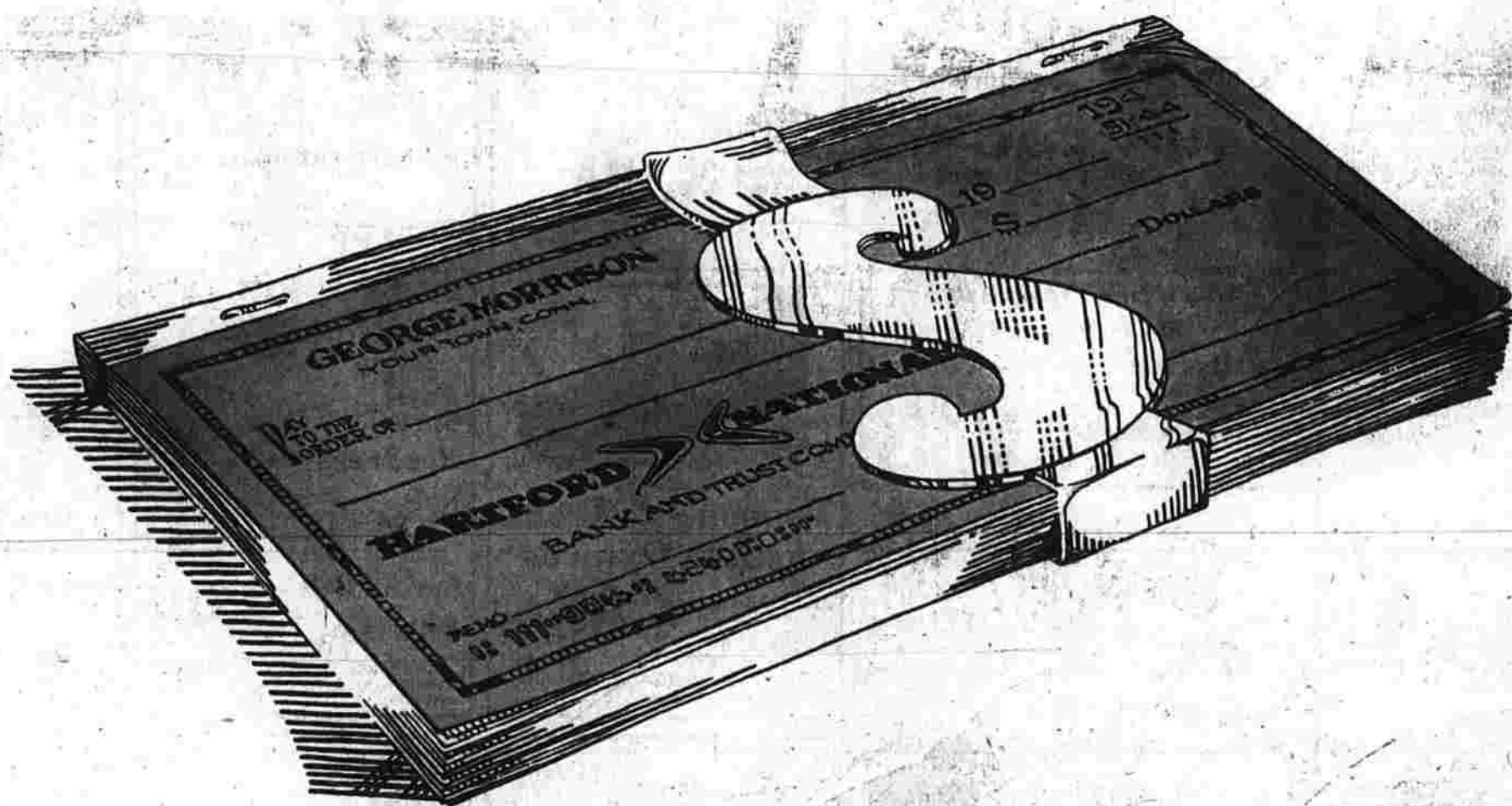

From Your Neighbor's Kitchen

By VIVIAN F. FERUGSON

During my trip to California, I planned to visit a date farm. Having stopped at several, I chose a small shop because of its owner. The lady seemed interested in her patrons, was exceptionally friendly and told interesting things about dates.

Miss Trudy Buckhorn, a charming middle-aged woman, was born in Germany. Her parents owned a restaurant and she grew up in the business. She spent her first 18 years in this country in Minnesota, then went to Palm Desert, California where she has a brother.

Trudy wanted to go into business. "A date shop is rather feminine," she thought. It was similar to a candy store and she liked dealing with people. She knew nothing about dates. "The customer will educate me. Also, the Coachella Valley is not big and the people are very friendly here, you can't remain a stranger for long."

Dates are mailed out of California just as oranges are shipped from Florida. The first date plants were brought to the U.S. in 1880, to California. Today, there are more than 2,000 acres of dates under cultivation.

No one knows just how many varieties of dates exist. To duplicate a variety, oftentimes they are taken. A date palm can be grown from the first pit but it might be inferior. Again, it might produce a tree entirely different than its parent. When a grower develops a different date, he guards it jealously and reveals to no one from which tree his new specialty came.

Each 60 acres of date palms contains one male to a harem of 48 female palms with only the female bearing fruit. There is a famous educational film entitled "The Sex Life of a Date." It's only come-on.

The blossom of the date palm contains no scent, thereby attracting no bees. Pollination must be accomplished by hand. Each male palm produces enough pollen to pollinate the female blossoms of 40 female palms. Each tree will produce 300-500 pounds of dates per year.

The first fruits will appear on a date palm between six to eight years. Really superior to other dates, they are made of bunches weighing 10-40 pounds. It will produce for 100 years, sometimes 200 years.

The date clusters are shielded by paper bags which serve as protection from dust, heavy rains, birds or insects as they try shipping.

The preponderant food contains sugar of the date is sugar of the date. It is easily digested. The lives of many wandering desert nomads were saved by consuming dates on their long journeys. Together with a little milk, they could survive for months. It is said that half a pound of dates and a glass of milk is a full man's daily ration.

The harvesting of dates in California begins in October and finishes the latter half of February at which time a Date Festival is held. It is like a fair with many booths and a variety of races, a gigantic Arabian

Tolland School Board Will Seek \$5 for Spring Athletics

The Board of Education has agreed to support the deficit-ridden spring athletic program at Tolland High School and the Middle School. It will go to the Board of Finance for approval of an additional \$5,000 to finance the program.

The decision, reached last night, met with the support of the athletic department of the school and several members of the newly organized Boosters Club who attended the meeting.

The motion to go ahead with the baseball and track schedule was approved by a 4-0 margin, with one abstention, cast by Barbara Kalas.

The high school is already locked into a schedule for the spring season, agreed upon between the eight schools in the North Central Connecticut Conference last year.

The town would be penalized if it dropped out of the conference, which would have unfair ramifications on the entire conference, according to Coach Barnatt, athletic director.

Many of the schools in the conference would be unable to fill at this late date, and several schools would be forced to cancel their season without sufficient games to qualify for tournament play.

The actual amount to be appropriated could be reduced by \$500 to \$4,500, depending on whether the Boosters Club can raise sufficient funds to finance the awards banquet.

The 4-0 Chairman, James Condon, warned Barnatt he may have to trim some of his budget requests for the remainder of the school year, even though the board has told him to go ahead with the athletic department program.

Asked what he did to trim his program to the amount of \$5,000, Barnatt said he did not do anything.

Describing the allocated budget as "impossible," Barnatt noted the transportation costs equaled more than the budget yet gave no rise to the entire program for the year.

Gale receipts from basketball, the department's only real source of income, amount to less than the cost of hiring officials for the games, the athletic director added.

His students involved approximately 115 students will be involved in the baseball program at the high school and the middle school as well as track at the high school.

Considerable interest has been shown among girls at the high school in a track program, but this has not been approved by the school board and no funds are available.

Speaking for the Boosters Club, Richard Deane expressed the organization's concern over the possible discontinuance of baseball and track at the schools.

He cited the school athletic activities as important to the spirit of the school and the town.

The Boosters are planning a dance to be held March 11 and a faculty-variety basketball game to be held March 8, as fund-raising activities. If these programs are successful the money raised will be used to foot the bill for the athletic banquet.

Asked by board member Charles Meyer whether the Boosters Club will be a long lasting organization, Deane cited the unusually strong spirit of dedication evidenced by its members, predicting the organization will be around a long time.
