

## Utility Raises Nearer

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Price Commission has decided strong evidence exists that electric and telephone firms must be granted large rate increases to maintain service, a staff member says.

But, he added, the commission has not ruled out other changes in utility regulations, which presently require existing regulatory agencies to grant only the lowest rate increases that will guarantee continued service.

The commission debates the politically sensitive issue this week, working against a deadline of next Friday when its 30-day freeze of utility rates is scheduled to end.

The Connecticut PUC (Public Utilities Commission) has concluded hearings on a rate-increase request by the Southern New England Telephone Co., but has still to release its decision.

Requests for rate increases by the Hartford Electric Light Co. and the Connecticut Light & Power Co. will be heard in early May, a PUC spokesman said today.

The commission last month froze all rates of privately owned utilities, including railroads, airlines and regulated truckers, as well as electric, gas, telephone and telegraph companies. It held four days of public hearings on the subject and discussed the matter in general terms last Tuesday.

"They concluded they had seen substantial evidence that large percentage increases are needed if there is to be continued service in this country," Price Commission counsel Michael Lang said in an interview. He said he referred to the "fired" utilities, meaning electric, gas, telephone and telegraph companies.

"Their conversation was that the commission wants to do something to make sure these increases are consistent with our program," he said. "But they certainly don't want to dislocate the industry, and they don't want to be responsible for bad service or bad ecology."

Lang speculated the freeze would end as scheduled, even if the commission has not drafted new regulations. The commission would have until March 26 to order rollbacks of increases that went into effect and later were found out of line with new policy.

Present regulations generally say existing government regulatory agencies retain authority over utilities, but must make sure those increases granted are the minimum required to maintain service.

The freeze was ordered because the commission decided firmer guidelines are needed for the regulatory bodies.

## Draft Call To Resume In April

WASHINGTON (AP)—Ending a five-month pause, Secretary of Defense Melvin R. Laird today announced a draft call of 15,000 to be spread over April, May and June.

Laird said 5,000 young men would be called in each of those months.

This is the first draft call since October when the Pentagon issued a call of 10,000 men for the final three months of 1971.

There were no draft calls in the first quarter of 1972. The Pentagon waited to gauge the effect of new pay raises and volunteer enlistments and the Army was reduced in size to meet Congressionally mandated cuts.

Addressing the annual convention of the Veterans of Foreign Wars today, Laird repeated a statement he made last week that only 80,000 or fewer men would be drafted in all of 1972. About half the number called last year.

The secretary said the lower calls had been made possible by the success of the Vietnamization program and the continuation of U.S. troops from the war.

## Surgeon Tells Senators ITT Witness Can Testify

WASHINGTON (AP)—Lobbyist Dita D. Beard's heart surgeon said today she could give testimony from her hospital bed to Senate investigators looking into accusations about Acting Atty. Gen. Richard G. Kleindienst.

But Dr. Victor L. Liszka said Mrs. Beard "still has signs of severe coronary heart disease," and that a doctor should be present during any questioning sessions.

A purported memo by Mrs. Beard, now in a Denver hospital, said the Justice Department dropped an antitrust suit against International Telephone and Telegraph Corp. after the firm agreed to underwrite some costs of the Republican National Convention.

Dr. Liszka said that it would be extremely hazardous for Mrs. Beard to come to Washington to give testimony to the Senate Judiciary Committee, which is holding up confirmation of Kleindienst's nomination to be attorney general until the matter is cleared up.

He told the committee she could testify better in her home, but if the committee wanted early testimony the hospital would be the best place with a physician present. He said she would be hospitalized another one or two weeks.

"The nature of the disease is that she will respond to emotional stress," he said, "and any emotional stress will jeopardize her health."

A physician could electronically monitor her heart while she gave the testimony in a hospital, he said.

The panel had been scheduled to resume taking testimony Tuesday on allegations made by columnist Jack Anderson, but committee counsel John H. Holloman III said the inquiry would resume today.

He declined Sunday to explain the reason for the change

## Maine Clobbered by Snow

PORTLAND, Maine (AP)—Maine residents began digging out today from under another snowstorm, the latest in a series of storms that dumped nearly 40 inches of snow in the last two weeks.

The two weeks of unusually bad weather began with the Feb. 19 blizzard which briefly crippled most of Maine and left

much of its coastline a declared disaster area.

Since then, there have been five other snowstorms, days of subzero weather, more snow and then two days of freezing rain which became the worst

years. The snow that fell in Maine the last two weeks more than doubled what had fallen during the entire winter this year, the

National Weather Service said.

The Feb. 19 storm was carried into the state on gale winds. It had a particularly devastating effect along the coast.

Tides estimated at 15 feet above normal and high winds tore up whole coastal communities, ripped out granite seawalls and caused damage estimated at nearly \$2 million.

## New Britain Fire Raging In Downtown

NEW BRITAIN (AP)—A general alarm fire gutted two buildings, which collapsed "like a stack of cards" before hundreds of spectators and firemen, in the heart of the business district today.

A third building was threatened as the flames continued to rage out of control more than five hours after the fire was initially reported.

Miraculously, no one apparently was hurt when a four-story building collapsed, and minutes later an adjacent two-story structure caved in. However, at least two firemen were rushed to New Britain General Hospital with injuries sustained fighting the flames.

Fireman Joseph Martin said all persons were evacuated from the two buildings before the flames spread.

After the buildings collapsed, only the store fronts and piles of rubble remained.

The buildings are located on Main Street across from the New Britain common. A five-story building was threatened, and firemen were dousing it with water in hopes of saving it.

At 1 p.m., police said the fire was still raging out of control, some five hours after it was first reported. Dark bellows of smoke enveloped the downtown area, forcing firemen to wear oxygen masks.

The fire was four buildings down the street from a variety store that was heavily damaged by flames a week ago.

A long, narrow two-story building at Main and Court streets, where firemen said today's fire started, was gutted. It housed Regal Men's Shop, Bosco Barber Shop, A. G. Olson Jewelry and Quality Press.

A four-story building, with Norwood Clothing Store on the ground floor, also was destroyed.

Threatened by flames was an adjacent building, which sustained substantial smoke damage. It includes E.C. Porter Sons, Inc., furniture store, one of the city's largest.

One Berlin fireman was injured, but the extent of his injuries was not immediately known.

Authorities said the fire apparently started in the front section of the cellar under the Regal Men's Shop. It was reported at 8:40 a.m. when a policeman was notified there was smoke coming out of the shop.

For a while the fire was confined to the cellar of the building, but later flames were visible in the front of the building. At times the smoke was so dense spectators had to take shelter in nearby buildings.

In addition to the Porter Sons furniture store, businesses threatened by the general alarm fire included U.S. Watch Hospital, Dason Shoes, New Britain Musicians Association, which of them "are separable Terra Studio Photos, Household

Finance Corp., Jay's Beauty Center and Norwooth Clothes. Six fire companies and two ladder companies helped fight the blaze.

## Secrecy Test On Calendar

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Supreme Court agreed today to rule on the government's power to classify its documents as secret.

The test case, accepted for review next term, concerns nine reports and letters prepared for President Nixon on the Cambodian underground nuclear test.

Last October, Judges Harold Leventhal and Charles Fahy of the U.S. Circuit Court here cleared the way for the possible public release of some of the documents.

At issue is the government policy of classifying all documents in a particular file as "secret" or "top secret" if one of them contains material considered sensitive.

In other actions today, the court:

—Refused 7 to 2 to pass on whether the Vietnam war is

constitutional the majority has so held in half a dozen prior cases since 1967.

—Prevented thousands of prisoners, convicted before 1970, from challenging their convictions on grounds they had no lawyer at their preliminary hearing.

—Set the stage for an early ruling on the allocation of natural gas supplies to homeowners during periods of shortages.

—Cleared the way for a ruling on whether a federal grand jury may question sides of Sen. Mike Gravel, D-Alaska, about publication of the Pentagon Papers.

Ruling in a suit brought by Rep. Patsy T. Mink, D-Hawaii, and 32 other members of Congress, Leventhal and Fahy ordered U.S. District Court Judge George Hart Jr. to examine the Cannikin papers and determine which of them "are separable from the secret remainder."

## Candidates Debate Finances

# Who Pays Campaign Fare?

NASHUA, N.H. (AP)—In the last campaign day before Tuesday's presidential primary, Sen. Edmund S. Muskie and George S. McGovern went handshaking through New Hampshire's factories today after swapping claims about who was the first to disclose campaign finance sources.

Supporters of both candidates, saw little impact on Tuesday's outcome from the first face-to-face meeting of the two, along with their three rivals, in Durham Sunday night, and a sampling of factory workers confirmed that.

As Muskie shook several hundred hands at the Doehla Reading Card factory in this industrial town, a heavy majority of workers told reporters they hadn't watched the debate. Most who had weren't swayed.

"It made me stop and think," one lady said. But she said she was Polish and had always been for Muskie.

"I don't think Muskie did well at all," another lady said. It turned out she's always been for McGovern.

Muskie told the firm's director of development he had come "to get my cards for next year—put a White House on the cover."

"Why not?" said the official, Frank Preston.

While Muskie went through plants here and in Manchester, McGovern followed a similar

pattern. The admitted underdog, he started out an hour earlier.

Asked about McGovern's charge that it was a "farce" to say he revealed his 1970 contributors but stopped when the South Dakota senator failed to

peat their campaign arguments.

They were joined in the year's first campaign debate by the three other Democrats listed on Tuesday's primary ballot—Sen. Vance Hartke of Indiana, Mayor Samuel F. Yorty of Los Angeles and anti-poverty worker Edward Coll of Hartford, Conn.

Muskie, from neighboring Maine, is favored to lead the field Tuesday, but political analysts will be watching his percentage. Early in the campaign, aides talked of 50 per cent as a minimal goal, but a poll published Sunday by the Boston Globe gave Muskie 42 per cent, McGovern 28 and other Democratic candidates a total of 12 per cent with 20 per cent of the vote undecided.

McGovern, whose optimism has been growing, said he doubted the debate he had long sought would have much impact. But the South Dakotan said, "We have an outside chance of pulling an upset here."

The Democratic contenders planned a busy last day of campaigning today. McGovern and Muskie concentrated on factory visits. Muskie climaxed his drive with flying visits to the north country towns of Lebanon and Berlin.

### Bengali Leader Finds Identity with Soviets



DACCA (AP) — Prime Minister Mujibur Rahman returned today to Bangladesh from a five-day visit to the Soviet Union and said both countries have passed through armed revolution, between the Bengalis and the Russians there is an identity of purpose.

While in Moscow Sheikh Mujib and Premier Alexei N. Kosygin concluded an extensive financial and technical agreement. The details were sketched out Sunday by the Soviet news agency Tass, and although the dollar worth was not revealed, some diplomats in the Soviet capital called it "substantial."

The joint declaration said the Soviets will help in the reconstruction and development of the Bangladesh merchant and fishing fleet and the nation's railway lines, which were badly damaged during the nine-month civil war preceding independence last December.

The Soviets also promised help for communication facilities with interior areas of the country.

Richard J. Cronie of Coventry, an active Democrat in that town, will announce his candidacy for the Democratic nomination for state representative from the district Friday afternoon at a press conference at the Tolland Moose Lodge on Kingsbury Ave.

Cronie may well find himself doing political battle with Charles Thibault, Tolland selectman and Democratic town assessor, who is harboring strong inclinations to seek the party nomination himself.

To date, no Willington candidate for the post have been named. Willington's Alphonse DeCicco, Democratic first selectman, is closely allied politically with Thibault.

On the Republican side, State Rep. Robert D. King of Tolland will still the end of the legislative session, about April 15, to announce whether he will seek a 7th term.

If King does seek re-election, he will have to form new political alliances in Coventry and Willington. His previous ties in Willington and Bolton, where he has served as town assessor, will no longer be of assistance. King's fellow townsman in the Coventry and Willington town line.

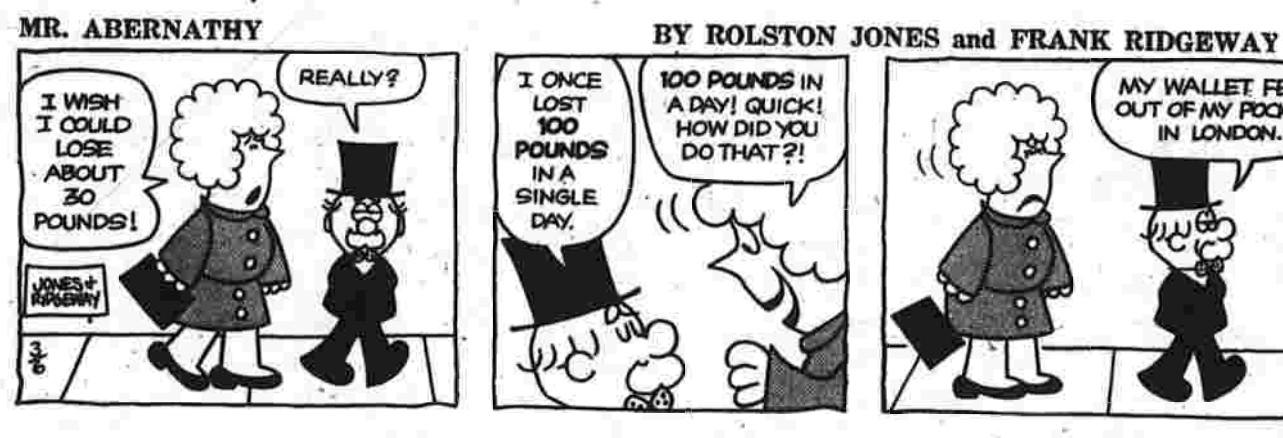

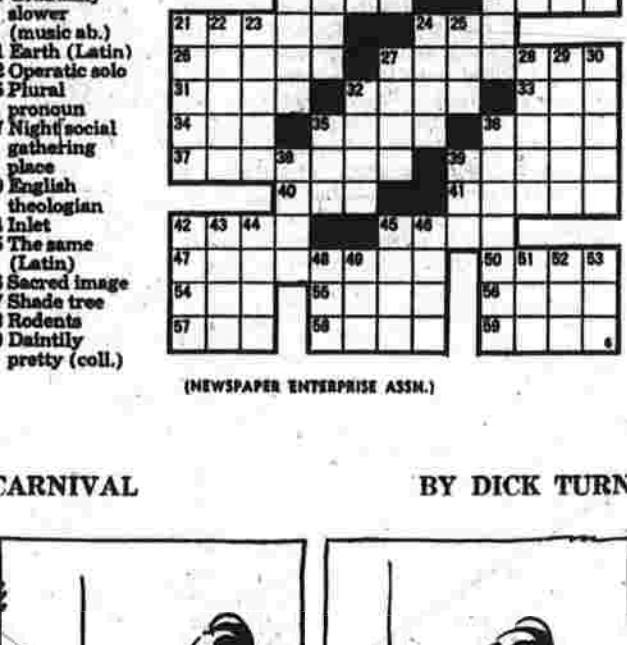
