Husein on Air Tomorrow

BEIRUT (AP)—King Hussein has reached a full peace agreement with Israel, Baghdad Radio reported today. Earlier, the royal palace in Amman announced Hussein would make a "statement of importance" Wednesday concerning the territory Israel seized from Jordan in the 1967 war. The agreement provides that the occupied territory on the West Bank of the Jordan River and the Gaza Strip which Egypt occupied before the war will become an autonomous Palestinian state federated with Jordan in a United Arab Kingdom under King Hussein's Hashemite throne.

The old Arab quarter of Jerusalem or part of it is to be the capital of the new Palestinian state, Baghdad Radio said. But Israeli leaders have said repeatedly Jerusalem is now a united city under Israeli rule and will never be divided again.

A dispatch from Amman said details of a broad new plan for the Jordan River valley aimed at breaking the deadlock between Jordan and Israel were handed to the ambassadors to the United States, the Soviet Union, Britain, France and the Arab countries Monday.

The Jordanian government newspaper Al-Dustour said the king would announce a "plan for consolidation of national unity between the two banks of Jordan on a permanent basis of decentralization."

The use of the term decentralization indicated some form of autonomy for the Palestinian population on both sides of the Jordan River.

The radio broadcast said the Israeli news agency dispatch from Amman which said the king hoped to get approval of his plan at a meeting this afternoon with members of Jordan's parliament.

The radio gave these highlights of the agreement: —Proclamation of the federal state under Hussein to be called the United Arab Kingdom.

The kingdom is to be made up of two autonomous states, Palestine and Jordan, each of which will have its own government for internal affairs.

U.S. Bombers Rip Jungle Quarters

SAIGON (AP)—U.S. B52 bombers, blasting a path for a South Vietnamese armored drive into eastern Cambodia, destroyed a major North Vietnamese jungle headquarters Monday night, military authorities reported today.

"It was one hell of a big camp," said a U.S. officer. He said the air strikes laid bare a complex of more than 100 underground bunkers filled with supplies and ammunition.

Interruption of a prisoner and aerial spotters' reports indicated at least 24 enemy soldiers were killed in the bombardment and as many as 200 others fled into the jungle to miles inside Cambodia and about 80 miles northwest of Saigon.

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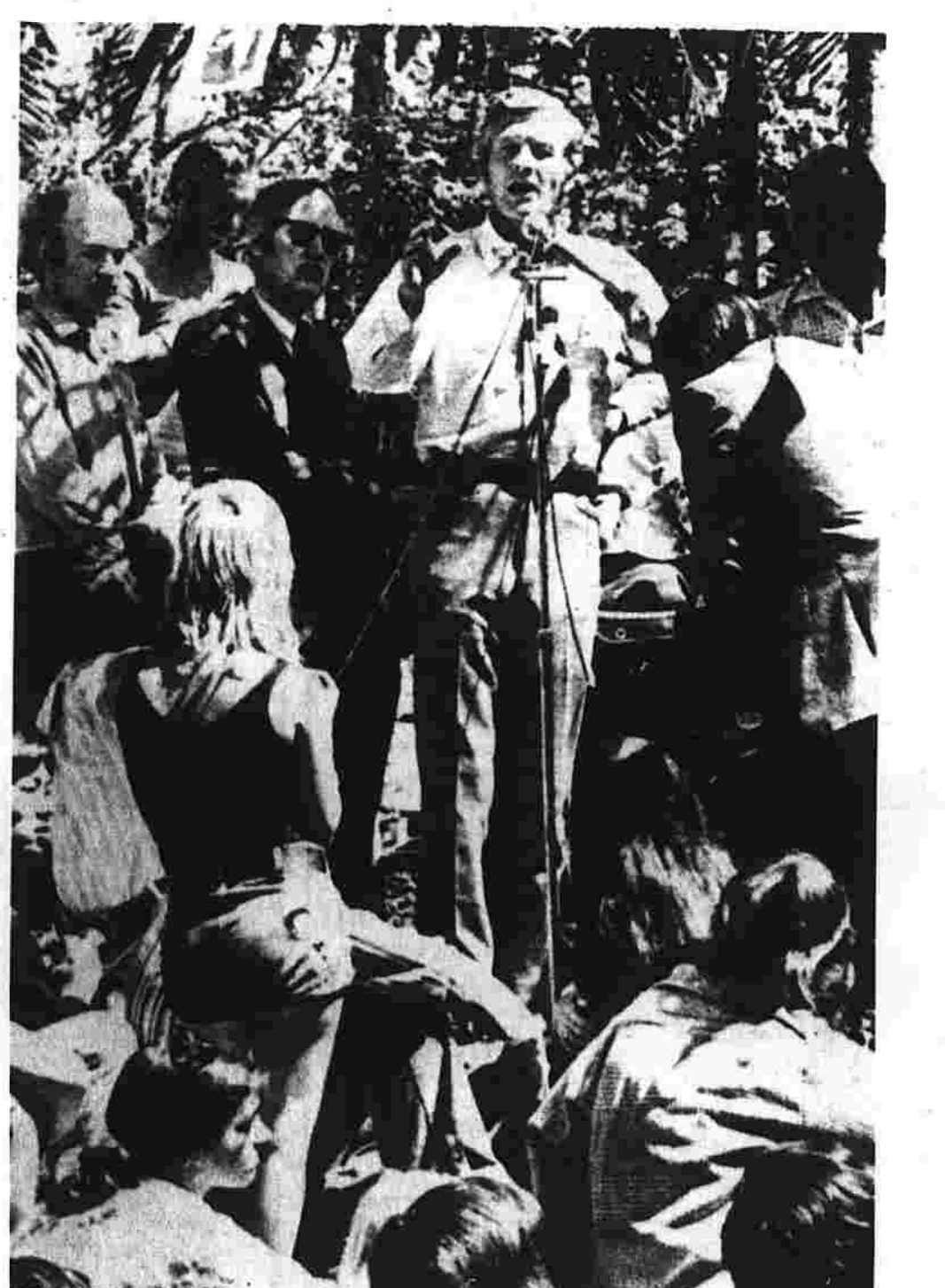

NEW YORK (AP)—Sources close to author Clifford Irving say he is writing another book—this one about his publicly admitted role in the \$750,000 Howard Hughes autobiography hoax.

Proceeds from the sale of the book would go toward repaying the defunct publisher, McGraw-Hill, Inc., the \$200,000 it is seeking in restitution for advances and expenses it paid, the sources said. Much of the total is reported to be intact.

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Ballots Under the Palms Second Place, Primary Concern

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—The early turnout was moderate today as the first of an anticipated two million Floridians voted in a presidential primary expected to influence the prospects of three likely Democratic leaders more than those of the probable winner, Alabama Gov. George C. Wallace.

With 11 Democrats dividing the vote, Sen. Edmund S. Muskie of Maine said he thought "the pattern that emerges over several primaries" will be more significant than just the Florida returns.

Muskie is fighting with Sens. Hubert H. Humphrey of Minnesota and Henry M. Jackson of Washington for second place behind Wallace's anti-busing handwagons and for position in the multi-candidate scramble for the Democratic presidential nomination.

In the Miami area, which includes Miami Beach where 90 per cent of the population is aged over 65, the early turnout was reported to be about normal. In Leon County which includes the state capital of Tallahassee more than 470 miles to the north, an election super-

visor reported voting as "pretty steady" but "no big rush."

In Escambia County an election supervisor said the turnout in the westernmost peninsula area appeared to be "around 80 to 85 per cent," which was about average.

Officials reported that in one county, Alachua, home of the University of Florida, the turnout was "real swift" with many young people going to the polls.

For Muskie, Florida could further cloud a front-runner image that suffered when he polled 48.4 per cent of the votes in winning last week's New Hampshire primary in his native New England. Humphrey and Jackson hope for strong showings to spur their drives to overtake Muskie.

Sen. George McGovern of South Dakota, the surprisingly strong runner-up to Muskie in New Hampshire, and Mayor John V. Lindsay of New York, a former Republican in his first race as a Democrat, are the other major contenders in the Democratic field.

Irish Truce Broken

BELFAST (AP)—A three-day cease-fire declared by the outlawed Irish Republican Army ended today with the killing of at least three persons and a chain of bombings across Northern Ireland.

Patrick McFarty, an 18-year-old Roman Catholic standing on his doorstep in a mainly Protestant neighborhood of Belfast, was cut down by gunfire from a moving car shortly before the truce expired at midnight.

USE YOUR TRUMP FOR COMMUNICATION BY ALFRED SHEINWOLD

When traffic halts on a four-lane highway, it's a law of nature that the other lanes move while your lane stays glued to the road. The same law puts you in the dummy when you want to be in your hand, and vice versa. There's no way to repeat the law, but you can set around it by thinking ahead.

South dealer. East-West vulnerable. Opening lead — Three of Clubs.

West opens a small club. East plays the jack, and you win with the ace. You can afford to lead out one round of trumps with the ace, but then you should stop.

The next step is to try the heart finesse. No matter who has the king, you are pretty sure to win with dummy's ten. (If East has the K7; he will probably hold off the first heart trick just on general principles.)

This leaves you in the dummy, and you want to be in your own hand to try the heart finesse again. The simplest way to get to your hand is to lead a trump to the king.

You try a second heart finesse and succeed. The little eater when dummy's jack wins the trick. It does look as though the finesse has succeeded. You return with trump.

Once more you must return to your hand with a trump. This provokes the last missing trump and puts you in position to take a third heart finesse. This wins, and you cash the ace of hearts in order to discard a loser from your hand. Now the contract is done.

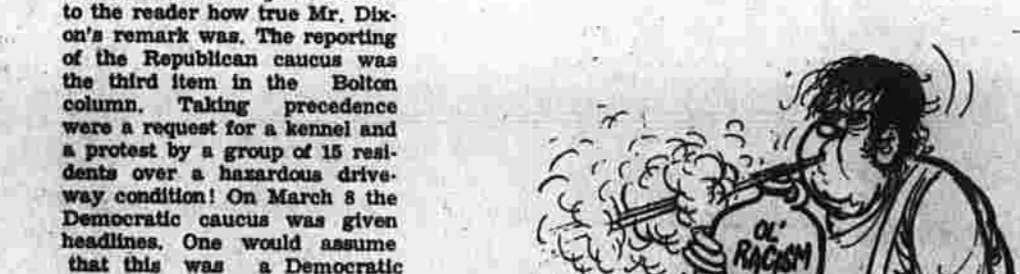

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Business Mirror Pilot School Grounded by Eerie Effects

NEW YORK (AP) — There was little surprise in the simulation industry when the Air Force decided to give more of its pilot training on the ground.

"It makes sense," was the general reaction. "It's a logical reaction. How do you teach a man to fly a plane if he doesn't leave the ground? In the same way you teach a man to be at home on the moon or to run a nuclear power plant that hasn't been built. By creating 'realities'."

This industry has now developed an eerie capacity to produce eerie environments through the use of computers and videotape. So real are they that those exposed to them are often convinced they are involved in the real thing.

A story, perhaps apocryphal, circulated in the plant of one simulation company. For example, about the young pilot being taught in a flight trainer. Weather and combat situations were produced that, because of his inadequate responses, appeared disastrous.

While the story is told in many different versions, the lesson certainly is true. Placed in artificial environments, pilots sense assaulted by realistic noises, odors, sights, gratings and tactile sensations. Most are at sea level in real situations.

Unlike in reality, however, no lives or equipment are lost, and while the real thing is often difficult to monitor, the simulation permits a variety of visual and electronic checks.

A relatively small industry until World War II, it is now reliably estimated to amount to \$50 million of business a year, worldwide. And as space vehicles and larger aircraft are built, its future seems assured.

It is not the only area where the simulation industry is growing. The most dramatic demonstration of the value of simulators was given to the world when a malfunctioning Apollo and its three occupants were brought safely to earth.

Unable to experiment with their craft because of an inability to predict results, the astronauts relied on simulators assembled at the Manned Spacecraft Center in Houston and at other points.

Every situation that was likely to confront the malfunctioning ship was worked out on the simulators. Land-based astronauts went through all the possibilities and then relayed their experiences aloft.

However, in more common situations the simulator is also playing a bigger role. At the very time complex pieces of equipment are being designed a simulator often is being assembled as well.

An exact replica of the control room of a nuclear power plant, for example, was used to train the men who would operate the real thing. The simulator was coupled to a digital computer programmed with mathematical models for nuclear thermodynamic and electrical phenomena.

The realism of the simulator was highlighted by the wit of a "turbine." So realistic was it that the student identified as the turbine revved up the system. It grew abruptly louder as somebody opened the door to the turbine room. He was the dialogue:

"My pressure's building to 100 per cent."
"Ah, that looks beautiful."
"Now I'll take the valves and you take the pumps."
"Your gots open the valves to bring the pressure down."
"I did a construction. A warning light flashes. "Turbine's overpressure."
The man begins sweating, grab for the controls. Dial needles swing reassuringly counter-clockwise. The lights go green.
"We didn't trip! We didn't trip! They about."

After two B52 strikes today, the task force was advancing to the northwest toward Pleim Cheang, a smaller rubber plantation just south of Chup. But sources in the field indicated it was doubtful that this drive would go into Chup, which is Indochina's largest plantation.

The Communist command has an estimated 10,000 North Vietnamese combat troops in the Cambodian border region, military authorities said. It, Gen. Nguyen Van Minh, commander of South Vietnam's 3rd Military Region, has 40,000 troops prepared to take part in the drive ahead of major fighting.

South Windsor Towns Agree On Sharing Sewer Lines

Action on agreements, between two towns — Manchester and Vernon — and South Windsor, for hooking into sanitary sewer lines is expected to be completed at tonight's meeting of the sewer commission at 8 p.m. in the town hall.

Vernon has agreed to take two or three South Windsor homes into its sewer system, and South Windsor residents will pay the rate of the town's sewer service to the town of Vernon. Sewer Commissioner James Throwe said by this agreement, South Windsor "gets out of an impossible and expensive position, that of building a pumping station for the small number of homes on Kelly Rd. near the Vernon line."

The Manchester arrangement is in reverse of the Vernon arrangements in the Chapel Rd.-Clark St. area will be piped into the South Windsor system and the town will collect the same rate of revenue as residents are paying in Manchester, which is "almost the same rate as South Windsor's service rate," Throwe said.

Also to be discussed, is the recommendation by the sewer commission to the capital goals committee for the 1972 budget. Throwe said that the major critical areas in town have already been sewered, namely the Avery St. area, Northview Dr. and schools that were expanding septic problems. He said the commission itself is "pretty well caught up with the work agreed to be undertaken under the sewer bond referendum, but the commission is awaiting the opening of construction bids for the Avery Heights interceptor line which will extend from the heights, down Oakland Rd. up Buckland Rd. to Plum Gully, down Deming St. to Clark St. and Chapel Rd. to the Rt. 5 lines already installed. The bids will be opened Thursday.

The commission has voted to approve the requests for extending sewer lines in the Avery-Sullivan proposal and the Graham Rd. to Ayers to the Wapping School. Work on these areas will be determined by what money will be left after the final bids have been approved, Throwe said.

Also on the agenda is a request for sewer service by Stanley Glasziak at 410 Bealzbub Rd. and a proposal for service by the Pioneer Parachute Co. Inc. of Manchester.

The South Windsor Planning and Zoning Commission will hold its first public hearing under a new zoning amendment to allow for additional uses in industrial zones tonight at 8 p.m. in the Town Hall.

Leukemia Drug Finder Honored

CINCINNATI, Ohio (AP) — Dr. Sidney Farber, discoverer of two drugs that can bring temporary remission of acute leukemia in children, has received the Gold Headed Cane Award from the American Association of Pathologists and Bacteriologists.
The drugs that the Harvard pathologist discovered in 1947 are credited with extending the lives of children with leukemia for up to 15 years.
Farber was a member of the Harvard medical school faculty for 41 years until he retired in 1970.
The cane award, one of the nation's earliest medical awards, is given periodically to a physician "who represents the highest ideals in pathology and medicine."

South Windsor School Board Urged to Include Hockey

More than 50 students and parents crammed into the meeting area of the high school library last night to urge the Board of Education to include the hockey program in its budget along with laying the groundwork for a new football field for next year.
At its last meeting, the board voted to lease the proposed football field, site, across from the high school on Nevers Rd., to a farmer to plant potatoes instead of beginning the preliminary ground work of seeding the field and preparing it for use for the 1972-73 school football season.

Board members Mrs. Gile Decker proposed that the board include an additional \$17,000 to the Capital Outlay Remodeling account to ready another location, between the high school and Wapping School for football in the fall as opposed to the present location, near the road on school grounds on Nevers Rd. where crowd control is almost impossible.
Mrs. Decker had almost convinced the majority of the board members that the site was a better location when high school athletic coach, Charles Sharos interjected, saying he felt the \$17,000 for the Wapping—high school land, present-

ly a baseball diamond, was a waste of money. He said he favored the developing of the proposed future stadium site across the street.
After more than an hour of deliberation, the board phoned Town Manager Terry Sprekel. Sprekel said he had a verbal commitment with the farmer for use of the field for planting a crop, but that he would see what could be worked out to avail the site for football field use.
Mrs. Decker withdrew the original motion and the board then voted to approve the account for the \$17,000 increase

pending the outcome of arrangements Sprekel has with the farmer. The only opposing member was David Cohen who felt more teachers were needed in the high school than a football field at this time.
The board also voted to increase the student travel activities fees account by \$4,170—\$2,670 to go for a hockey program with the Hockey Association subsidizing, another \$2,200 for equipment and other essentials, and another \$1,500 for transportation for an elementary music program.
The board had begun cutting from a \$5,410,474 proposed edu-

cation budget last week. Recommendations now stand at \$5,431,644 with teachers and personnel salaries yet to be determined.
The board adjourned into executive session last night to discuss salaries for the superintendent and business manager. Approval on the amounts will be made at tonight's regular meeting of the board at Pleasant Valley School at 7:30 p.m.

Taiwan Judging Rebel Suspects

TAIPEI (AP) — A military court is trying eight native Taiwanese who oppose the Nationalist regime's domination of their island, informed sources said Tuesday.
The group has been on trial since March on charges of rebellion. The maximum sentence is death, the minimum 10 years in prison.
The sources said two of the men are former associates of Prof. Peng Ming-min, an anti-government intellectual who escaped from house arrest in Taipei in 1968 and fled to the United States. The two men, Hsieh Tsung-min and Wei Ting-cho, were imprisoned with Peng for printing leaflets the government said were subversive. They were arrested again last February.
