Hussein Suggests A Free Palestine

AMMAN (AP) — King Hussein of Jordan offered today to set up a semiautonomous state of Palestine on the occupied West Bank of the Jordan River once Israeli troops withdrew from the region.

The King's Arab foes joined in rejection of the plan, communicated to the Arab governments Tuesday, before he announced it. Radio and press commentators in Egypt, Syria, Libya and Iraq charged it was the first step toward a separate peace agreement with Israel.

Palestine guerrilla leaders agreed to set up their own government-in-exile in retaliation, guerrilla sources said. A guerrilla statement termed Hussein's proposal "a plot designed to kill the commando movement and liquidate the Palestine cause forever."

There was no immediate official reaction from the Israeli government, but an Israeli Arab leader cautiously welcomed the proposal as a possible step toward peace. However, a conservative opposition leader who opposes the return of any of the occupied territories, Menachem Begin, said, "Israel's reaction should be to immediately extend Israeli law to all parts of the territories."

Hussein announced his plan to a meeting of some 500 prominent Jordanians from both sides of the river. He told them the new state would be joined with the rest of Jordan to form the United Arab Kingdom under his reign.

A government spokesman denied a report by Baghdad Radio Tuesday that Israel had agreed to the plan as part of a peace agreement. The spokesman said there had been no discussions between leaders of Israel and Jordan.

The Iraqi broadcast appeared to be an attempt to whip up Arab sentiment in advance against the king's plans by raising the specter of a separate Jordanian-Israeli peace.

Hussein proposed that Jerusalem should be the capital of the "Region of Palestine" and Amman, the present Jordanian capital, would be the capital of both the "Region of Jordan and the United Arab Kingdom."

The part of the plan involving Jerusalem was certain of rejection by Israel, which captured the Arab Old City of Jerusalem from Jordan in the 1967 war and has said repeatedly it would never give it up.

The king said the United Arab Kingdom would have a national assembly whose members would be elected by a direct and secret ballot, and membership would be divided equally between the two regions of the country.

Each of the two regional states would have their own legislative assemblies to take care of domestic affairs. The federal government in Amman would control foreign policy and defense.

Each region would elect a people's council which would choose a regional governor-general. The king said the plan had been drawn up after a series of meetings with prominent persons from the West Bank and other areas.

He criticized the Arab world for lack of coordination of policy and for the struggle to establish rival camps. And in an obvious reference to the Palestine guerrillas, he said the Arab cause had also been weakened by "the attempt by certain groups to attain power through internal strife."

Hussein's army drove the guerrillas from Jordan last summer after they refused to stop attacks on Israel that were provoking retaliatory Israeli attacks. Despite all their vocal

support for the guerrillas, no other government except Lebanon allows its territory to be used as a launching pad for attacks on Israel, and the Lebanese allow it only because their army hasn't been strong enough to stop it.

A Jordanian government spokesman charged that the Arab criticism of the king's plan was "designed to embarrass King Hussein and to further Israel's policy of fragmentation" of the Arab world. He claimed the plan actually represents a "hardening of Jordan's stand toward Israel."

"This is purely an internal affair of Jordan and does not concern other Arab countries," he said. "The Palestinian will be given self-determination in

Jetliner Crashes, Leaves 112 Dead

DUBAI, Persian Gulf (AP)—A Danish airliner with 112 persons reported aboard crashed into a rain-swept mountainside and rescuers said today they found no sign of life.

Sterling Airways of Copenhagen reported its twin-jet Caravelle vanished Tuesday night as it was preparing to land at this emirate on the Persian Gulf on a flight from Ceylon to Denmark.

The wreckage was located by helicopters and a search plane 12 miles inland from Qelba, a dependency of the Arab emirate of Sharjah.

Heavy rains prevented helicopters from landing at the crash scene, and it is almost inaccessible on foot.

"It appears there are no survivors," a Sharjah government spokesman said. The Danish airline said the plane carried 106 passengers and six crewmen.

Dubai radio reported residents near the crash site said they heard a loud explosion and saw a big fire in the area about 10:10 p.m. Tuesday.

The wreckage was sighted 1,800 feet up a mountainside. The Sterling airliner on a charter flight was returning from Colombo, Ceylon, to Copenhagen with 68 Danish, 20 Swedish, 12 Norwegian, 4 Finnish and 2 West German passengers, mostly tourists, plus the six crewmen, all Danish.

It was the worst crash in Danish aviation history. An airport official at Dubai said rescuers hoped to land a helicopter on the scene as soon

Officer Killed in Ireland

BELFAST, Northern Ireland (AP) — Gunman killed a policeman in an ambush of an army-police patrol early today and maimed a father and son. All the victims were Protestants.

Machine-gun fire hit the mobile patrol at a car park at Coalisland, County Tyrone, fatally wounding the driver in the head and chest. He was the sixth policeman killed this year and the 273rd fatality in 31 months of strife in Northern Ireland.

In County Down, three gunmen burst into the home of a volunteer militiaman and held the 39-year-old man at gunpoint

in front of his wife and three children, and waited until the 19-year-old son came home.

Then, the police said, the terrorists herded the weeping wife and smaller children into a garden shed. One gunman "cold-bloodedly" shot the father through his right knee and as he "collapsed in agony, bleeding profusely," the raiders shot his son through both legs and his right arm.

The gunmen escaped and their victims were taken to a hospital.

There have been a series of such nocturnal attacks on Protestant members of the Ulster

Late-Season Snow Real Annoyance

With the advent of spring less than a week away, Connecticut was surprised and harassed by a late winter storm which dropped up to a foot of snow in parts of the state.

Manchester only got about six inches, but northern areas reported 18 to 20 inches this morning. All this was punctuated by a lone clap of thunder. Rush hour traffic ran slow and late this morning while highway department crews struggled to push away the heavy, wet snow. Driving conditions throughout the area were hazardous, but most roads were clear by midday.

Manchester police reported about 15 storm-related auto accidents in town between 1:30 yesterday afternoon and about 11 this morning. A South Windsor woman, Edna Howat of 1200 Main St., was injured slightly when her car hit a utility pole on W. Middle Tpk. yesterday afternoon.

Other accidents in Manchester were mostly of the "fender-bender" variety with minor, if any, injuries.

Area police reported a number of lesser accidents due to snow and slush-covered roads.

Traffic was delayed when a tractor-trailer ran off the Willbur Cross Highway (Rt. 15) near the Tolland-Willington boundary early this morning. Other truck accidents were reported.

Dollar Defense Mapped

WASHINGTON (AP) — Treasury Secretary John B. Connally prepared today to address himself to European uncertainties over the dollar, probably with a defense of the international monetary settlement reached in December.

Connally scheduled a major speech in New York before the Council on Foreign Relations. The meeting was closed to the public, but the Treasury said copies of Connally's remarks would be released.

Connally's aides tried to play down speculation that the secretary would center his talk on the uncertainties of the dollar, but officials said privately that a lot of work has gone into

Democrats Weigh Primary Outcome

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—The Democratic presidential campaign has been scrambled by a Florida primary in which Gov. George C. Wallace won by a landslide, Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey claimed victory in second place and Sen. Edmund S. Muskie suffered a drubbing.

Humphrey said today that Wallace is now "a formidable opponent . . . no doubt about that" but predicted the governor would never win the Democratic presidential nomination.

"I'll get it," Humphrey said in an interview on NBC's "Today" show.

Wallace, who rode to victory on his opposition to school busing and his pledges to bear down on crime and tax the wealthy, also appeared on the show and said he felt the small showing of his Democratic rivals in the primary was "a blow" to all of them.

School busing was the top issue of the campaign. The Florida voters, in a straw ballot which has no legal effect, overwhelmingly registered opposition to court-ordered school busing to achieve integration. They also voted strongly in support of quality education for all.

Wallace denied today that his Florida success was a "protest" against busing and said the results showed that "the people want me to be the nominee of the Democratic party."

Asked about Muskie's charges that he was a "demagogue of the worst kind," Wallace said: "I'm sorry the senator feels that way . . . he is say-

Dilemma in a Depressed Area

Quiet Town Fights a Jetport

HARTFORD (AP) — Water, wildlife, woods or work.

Dilemma for economically depressed eastern Connecticut? Or a false scent, beside the point.

A jetport-industrial complex would transform the region into a thriving hub, competing with Boston and New York City, without destroying its environment, say proponents.

Nonsense, say opponents, who maintain the massive project would destroy the state's best watershed and woodlands and probably wouldn't even bring the promised economic panacea.

"People aren't for it," said Leo C. Bissonette, owner of Leo's Barber Shop in Danielson. "They feel that we got a nice, quiet little town around here and they want to keep it that way."

"Things have got to change," said Cliff Jellison, manager of Bissonette's Mobile Service in Danielson. "What the hell, if it's going to help the area . . . I would say general

opinion is for it because of the jobs it would bring."

The 75,000-acre complex was proposed for the Connecticut-Rhode Island border Monday by the Port Authority Commission, which tried to anticipate ecological opposition by saying that "substantial environmental changes" the complex would bring to the area could be dealt with through planning.

The jetport would have no residents, but would consist of an industrial park, warehouses, a pollution-abatement system and a jetport with 30 passenger terminals, 10 air-cargo terminals and a runway structure that allows dual take-offs and landings, explained commission chairman William B. Stanley.

Stanley first proposed the idea 12 years ago, and environmentalists and people who just like country life have been fighting him ever since.

Peter Tripp, retired merchant seaman and a founder of the Connecticut Committees of Correspondence, said in a telephone interview that it's not just a question of jobs or environment.

"That's a false, misleading

thing," Tripp said. "You create jobs in that particular way and in the long run you're not giving anybody anything . . . because you're undermining the base of human life here."

Tripp said the jetport would "completely change the environment. This is the biggest watershed in the state and the

biggest forested area and you'll turn it into a highly polluted area."

Tripp said the commission's projections of demand for a jetport seem to be two years old.

"I think it's a very serious question whether a jetport is needed, because airlines are in trouble," he said.

Regardless of the environmental impact a number of smaller businessmen who also have direct contact with the public favored the idea because of the jobs and business it

would bring. But several of them said opinion was running about 50-50.

"I think it's great, because it will create a lot of jobs and opportunity for people and help the area grow," said Dan Laseer, manager of Saveaway Service Center. "Opinion is both pro and con, about half and half. People object to the noise, increased traffic, the pollution . . . but I think people don't stop to realize it would help the tax situation and create jobs for the unemployed."

The commission sent copies of its report to the governors of Connecticut and Rhode Island, since the project was envisioned as a cooperative project between the two states.

Gov. Thomas J. Meskill reiterated his opposition to the jetport.

Gov. Frank Licht said no Rhode Island authorities participated in the report.

"It should be emphasized that while the report calls for joint effort between Connecticut and Rhode Island, we have

Only 8 residents, compared to the three top teams in each division being this week out at the public hearing, were present at the hearing of the Capital Improvements Committee Monday night to state their opinions for or against the recommended uses of the 2 mill tax levy for town improvements—the Capital Reserve Fund.

According to a report completed by the committee, \$32,000 of the total taxes collected each year will be placed into the fund and used for specific capital improvements.

The report stated the committee met with members of the Fire Department, Conservation Commission, Library Board, Public Works Dept. and Board of Education and decided to place the improvement priority in the area of town recreational facilities.

It recommended that \$70,000 be used for construction of an additional tennis courts and another \$10,000 be set aside this year for planning winter sports.

For the next fiscal year, it proposed \$200,000 be spent for developing the winter sports and another \$200,000 be spent for winter sports development next year after for construction of a swimming pool.

Next it approved \$5,000 for preliminary plans for a modern fire headquarters building with adequate fire insurance present levels of fire protection.

Another \$21,000 would be used in two years in planning the headquarters, and \$20,000 in 1975-76 for building the headquarters.

Fairly Free Private Enterprise

Curbside flower vendors became a nuisance in a certain community this week as the regular florists began to complain about the competition. Finally, the city council passed a zoning law aimed at knocking the street vendors out of business.

But when the new law was tested in court, it was held null and void. The court said the city simply had no power to regulate a business as harmless as selling flowers.

Private enterprise, while not wholly free, still has considerable vitality. A city's "red tape power" does not include blanket authority over all kinds of business activities just because they happen to be within the city limits.

On the other hand, a city may indeed impose restraints on a business that has a real potential for harm.

Consider the case of a man who started a telephone answering service. According to a city ordinance, he and his employees were supposed to submit to photographing and fingerprinting. Challenging the ordinance, the man said it was unfair to "single me out."

But a court saw two ways in which a telephone answering service could be harmful: 1) by the disclosure of confidential information about subscribers; and 2) by the encouragement of immoral activities.

Upholding the city's requirements, the court said: "There is a reasonable basis for distinguishing this type of business from others that are not regulated."

Another ordinance, covering private detectives, went still further. Under its terms, they had to put up a special bond and get a character clearance from the police department.

But again, a court decided there were enough possibilities for mischief in this line of work to justify the city in taking precautions. As one judge put it: "A statute to promote the public safety is valid, although it may interfere with individual freedom. Individual freedom must yield to the public good."

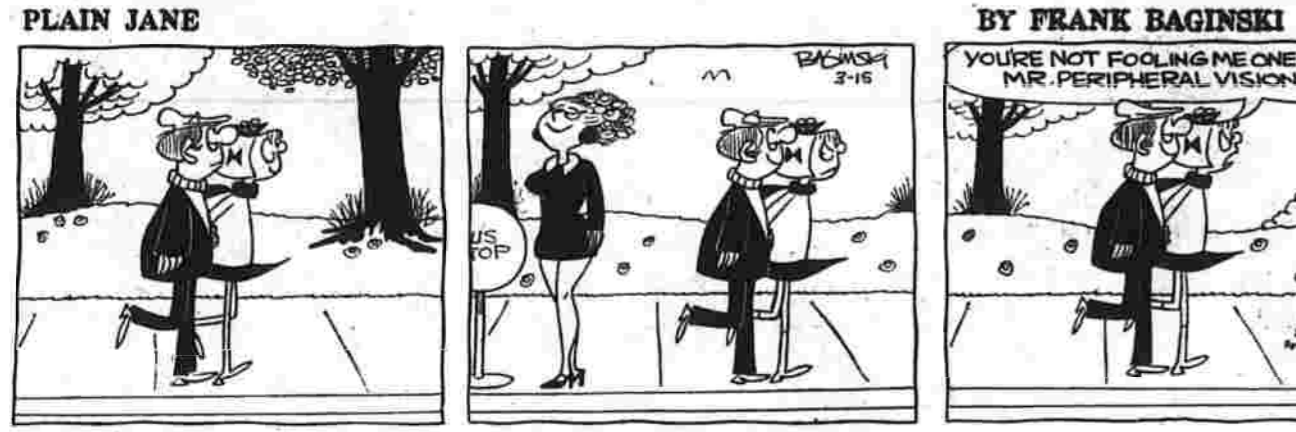

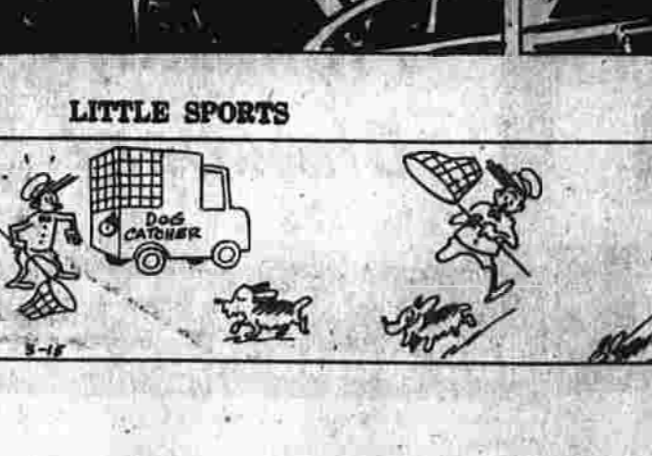

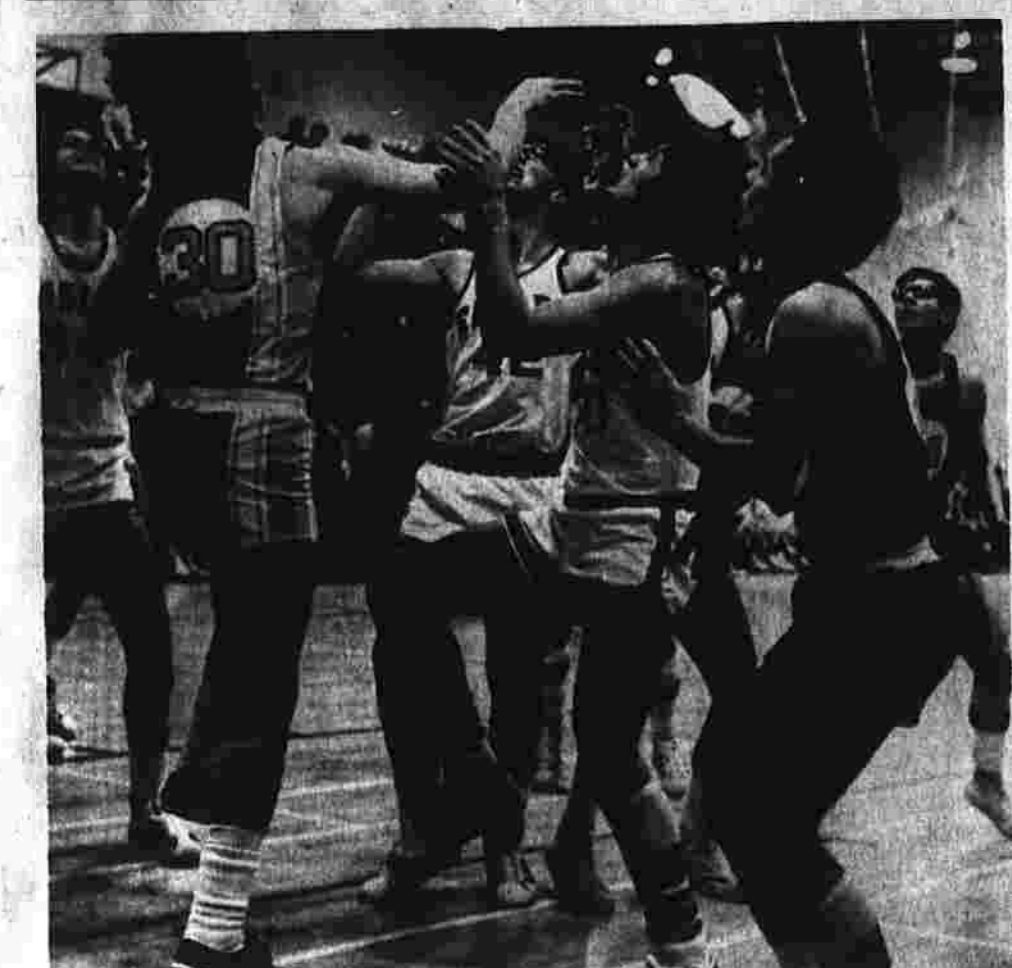
