MMH Helps Create Alcoholic Center

Manchester Memorial Hospital is among six area hospitals planning to jointly establish a detoxification center for alcoholics. A nonprofit corporation is being created by the hospitals to run the center, which will probably be set up in Hartford and be federally funded.

The incorporators, in addition to Manchester Memorial, are St. Francis, Mt. Sinai and Hartford Hospitals, the Institute of Living, and the University of Connecticut Health Center.

Edward M. Kenney, administrator at MMH, has been participating in the planning for Manchester's involvement in the program, the first cooperative effort of its type by six institutions.

MMH trustees have informally given Kenney the go-ahead to join the program and are expected to take a formal vote at their March 21 meeting. The bylaws and corporation agreement are presently being studied by legal counsel for the hospital, Kenney said.

The detoxification center idea is being proposed by the Criminal and Social Justice Coordinating Committee, formed a couple of years ago by the Greater Hartford Chamber of Commerce and Greater Hartford Community Council. The committee's executive director is Brian L. Hollander. Under his guidance, a methadone maintenance program for drug addicts has been instituted in Hartford.

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Docks Strike Looms

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A shutdown of all U.S. ports loomed as a possibility today after the Pay Board announced a wage increase won by West Coast longshoremen in ending a 14-day dock strike.

There was no immediate comment from Harry Bridges' West Coast International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's Union Thursday after the Pay Board's announcement.

Nor was there comment from Bridges' East and Gulf Coast counterpart, President Thomas W. Gleason of the AFL-CIO International Longshoremen's Union.

"We're not going to say anything right away," said Charles Nelson, administrative assistant to the West Coast stevedore boss.

But Bridges told his 13,000-member union on Feb. 24 that the ILWU and the I.L.A. had agreed that they would join in a nationwide dock strike if the Pay Board touched wages.

The joint pact provides that if the Pay Board agreed to either a 10 percent increase or a 10 percent increase in the U.S. in the ILWU contract, the I.L.A. would join in a nationwide dock strike if the Pay Board touched wages.

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In an 8,000-word special message opening up jobs and housing, Nixon recommended that and schools and opportunity to a moratorium on new busing remain in effect until July 1.

The chief executive said he was convinced the Senate and House have the constitutional power under the 14th Amendment, to call a temporary halt to further court-ordered busing.

Copter Carries 11 To River Death

SAIGON (AP) — A U.S. helicopter carrying combat reinforcements into a minor ground fight crashed and sank in the Dong Nai River 21 miles northeast of Saigon today, and all 11 Americans aboard were feared dead.

There were no casualties in the crash, but 30 bombs dropped on the area, and the helicopter was damaged.

The cause of the crash was not known but it appeared to be a mechanical failure in the engine area, according to a U.S. military spokesman.

Several Air Force and Navy fighter-bombers knocked out an enemy artillery battery in the area of the crash.

The helicopter was carrying 11 crew members and seven members of a search platoon, all of whom were rescued.

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Sheinwold on Bridge

TWO-STAGE FINESSE DEVELOPS TRICK

Most of the scientists who have studied the finest electronic microscopes declare that it has many peculiar uses. In spite of the fact that bridge players are content to take finesse as they find them. Only the scientist player is willing and able to manufacture a finesse from scratch. In today's hands South had some pretty good scratch and was able to do a good job of manufacturing.

South dealer.

North-South vulnerable.

Opening lead - King of Hearts.

South has only eight tricks in high cards. How does he develop his ninth trick?

Declarer should rule out the possibility of a 3-3 break in spades. West's most double is known to be light in strength and should therefore be strong in distribution. West should have length in both majors, but only 12 points in high cards, but only 10 in short suits.

The best chance for South is to play West for Q-5, J-x or 10-x of clubs. South therefore returns the first two heart tricks and wins the third trick with the ace. Now he is ready to go after the clubs.

Preliminary Finesse

The first step is a preliminary finesse. South leads a low club from his hand and fineszes with dummy's nine.

East wins with the ten of clubs and returns the ten of spades. West plays the Jack, and dummy must win with the ace of spades to keep West out.

Declarer now leads the king of clubs from dummy. This drops West's queen.

This completes the manufacture of the club finesse. Declarer leads the six of clubs from dummy and fineszes with the eight from his hand. When this finesse succeeds, South has nine tricks.

This type of two-stage finesse works only when declarer has the eight and the nine in separate hands as well as the ace and king. What's more, anybody who executes such a play will always tell you with a straight face that he wouldn't have bid so much if that eight had been a seven!

220 More Troops Cut from Viet

SAIGON (AP) - The U.S. Command announced the out-back of another 1,200 troops today, the second big reduction in three days.

The command said 11 Army units have begun gassing out, including two helicopter units in the Saigon region and the Mekong Delta with a total of about 50 aircraft.

On Wednesday, 41 Army and two Air Force units totaling 8,700 men were phased out in the second biggest reduction of the war.

Total U.S. strength in Vietnam was 114,000 men on March 9. A new total will be announced Monday. President Nixon has ordered the total cut to 80,000 by May 1. Peak U.S. strength in Vietnam was 548,000 in April 1969.

Another 30,000 Air Force men are in Thailand, and another 12 points in high cards, but only 10 in short suits.

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Many Cross Borders In Communist Europe

WARSAW, Poland (AP) - For millions in Communist Europe the brain crossing border has become a reality. The walk-over ends in East Germany or Poland. The two countries opened frontiers two months ago partly to cure "cooped up" feeling ex-...
 Right now, citizens from both sides, according to local press reports, often cross for a day or even a few hours.
 Many friendships between those forming a massive free movement area with a population of 65 million.
 Some West Germans in Warsaw view the move as a long-term step toward strengthening integration in the Communist bloc.
 Tourist currency exchange facilities newly created are firm signs. And foreign demand will now make it necessary for all three nations to have corresponding prices in their retail goods.
 At present, Poles find it profitable to do a quick weekend of shopping in East Berlin or Prague recently returned to Warsaw with several pairs of Western-made jeans which they readily sold for \$27 a pair. Jeans made in Poland are of poor design and usually carry no price tag. Jeans in the United States sell from \$5-8 to \$10-11 a pair, depending on cut and styling, if any, and brand.
 It takes only a nominal identification fee for a Pole or an East German to cross the border. They stop over as many times as they like and there's no cashing up to the amount of money they can change.
 The official exchange rate is 4.78 marks to the East German mark but on top of that a 18 per cent tourist tax is added.

Dear Dr. Lamb—I have recently been told I have mitral stenosis and will most likely need surgery in time. I had rheumatic fever as a child which is what caused this condition. I have lived with it for 33 years and enjoyed a reasonably good health. Why then would I need surgery? I have a persistent cough and am very nervous. Is this related to the disease? What would be done in surgery and what kind of recovery is there?

Dear Reader—I will assume your statement is correct and that you have mitral stenosis. Now, of course, I can't tell you how severe it is just on the basis of the information in your letter. For the benefit of other readers, mitral stenosis involves the valve in the left side of the heart at the opening between the upper cavity chamber called the left atrium and the lower heart pumping chamber called the left ventricle. This valve is formed by two leaflets and when the two leaves close together it prevents the backflow of blood when the heart is pumping blood out to the rest of the body. As a complication of rheumatic fever, scars form over the two leaflets until they become bound together and can't open properly. This obstructs the opening between the upper and lower part of the heart and the result is called mitral stenosis.

Whether a person needs surgery or not depends a lot on how big the opening is. If there is very little obstruction surgery can be postponed or avoided. The question of surgery depends on the nature of the defect in the valve. Sometimes the scar tissue that changes makes the opening get smaller and smaller until finally it is so small that it begins to cause trouble in the function of the heart. Sometimes the mitral valve is so severe that the opening is as small as the end of a cigarette. This causes pressure to build up behind the obstructed valve which leads to enlargement of the lungs with blood. This can indeed cause a cough which you complain of. It can also cause shortness of breath and sometimes cause people to cough up blood if one of the enlarged blood vessels ruptures.

NEW HAVEN (AP) - Democratic Sen. Bailey Thursday filed a motion in New Haven Superior Court asking dismissal of a suit filed by Barberi against the party group brought by Democratic Town Chairman Arthur W. Barberi of New Haven.

Barberi has asked Superior Court Judge George Sadeo to issue an injunction restraining Bailey from enforcing a state party rule that forbids local town committees from endorsing themselves for new terms. Easter Ways

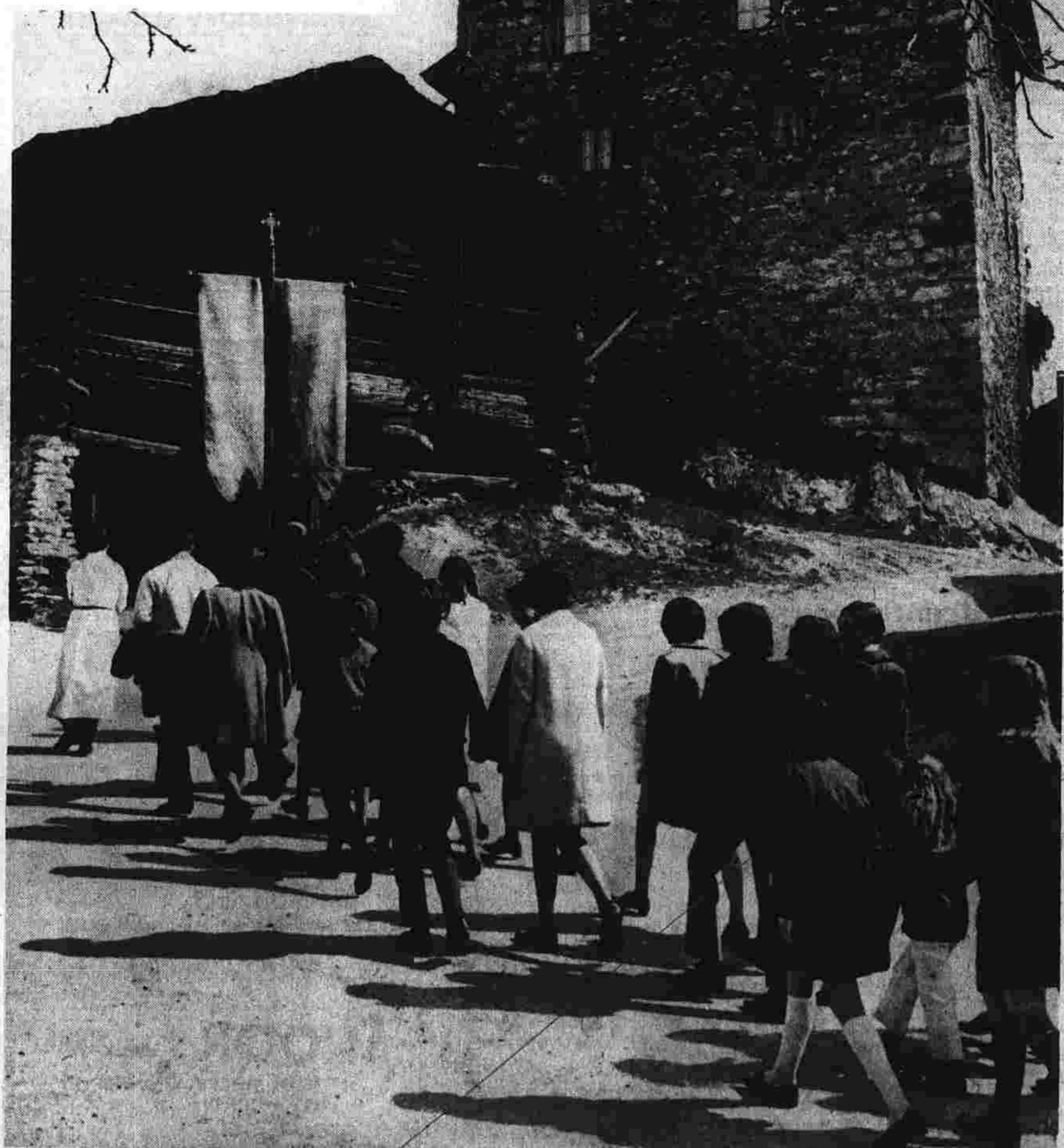

Guard Says Officials Apathetic About Prison

BOMBER (AP) — A representative of the state prison today told a legislative investigating committee that "problems at the institution resulted from administrative apathy."

"The crux of the problems at the institution didn't come up until the past few weeks," Guard Horace Santavenera told the legislators. He said it developed over several years because of "the apathy on the part of the governor, commissioner (John R.) Manson and Warden (Frederick) Adams."

Santavenera is the first line guard to testify during an inquiry into prison unrest conducted by the Corrections and Human Rights and Opportunities committees.

He told the legislators that the guard force is understaffed, that the guards are poorly trained, and that the guards are not given enough information about the prisoners. He said Adams praised the guards for their conduct before and during the recent hunger strike at the prison. That same day a newspaper story attributed quotes to Adams that "completely con-

tradict what the warden had told the guard earlier, he said. Santavenera questioned whether Adams statement exemplified a "reasonable administration."

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Contest Challenges Industry on Waste

All of the Devon units are fairly old and experimentation with one unit would not affect its Devon plant in Milford to meet loads in that area, according to the study.

The firm had 12 days to complete the study. At least one municipality (Newark) has expressed serious interest in delivering property prepared waste to a generating station. The Devon site is readily accessible by road and rail.

In response to a letter from Bolton Rd. residents, the Bolton Board, chairman of the Conservation Committee, which suggested deletion of the R-3 zone, the zoning board stated that it has the responsibility to permit gradations in housing.

Present zoning regulations permit multi-family dwellings in the R-2 and R-3 zones, while limiting apartment construction to the R-2 zone.

The planing firm's report reads "Bolton's existing zoning regulations permit multi-family dwellings in the R-2 and R-3 zones. Continuation of this pattern is recommended, in view of the potential sewer service area which will be located so as to tie into the public sewerage system when it is available."

The report recommends expansion of the R-2 zone to the boundary of the proposed sewer area and add "Implementation of this recommendation would necessitate the deletion of the present R-3 zone."

In a consideration of multi-unit apartments, the plan says, "It is recommended that zoning be restricted to the R-2 zone, as they are at the present time."

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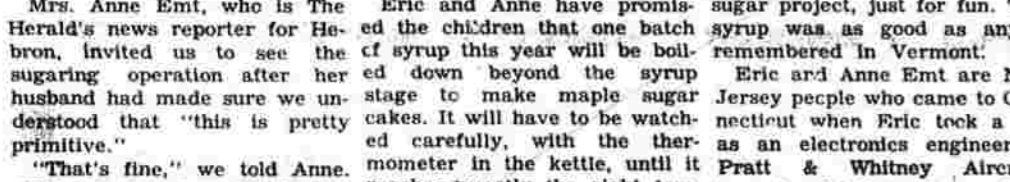

The most provocative item to show up in two days of public budget hearings is a proposal for transforming a waste tract of land into a park of many uses and significant beauty.

Mrs. Susan Looney, on behalf of the Recreation Commission, presented a budget which included funds to begin improving the tract of land owned by the town in the Burnap Brook area, part of which is now being used for the sanitary landfill operations.

The tract itself consists of approximately 30 acres of land with some 300 trees presently growing on it. The topography of the land lends itself into many different ways.

The first area consists of a roughly 12-acre tract which could be made into a professional rising plateau, the top of which would be used for a park area.

The second portion is a somewhat irregularly shaped area of approximately 12 acres. The third area provides a large area for a professional rising plateau, the top of which would be used for a park area.

The Brownies learn songs, games and cooking outdoors. They participate in weekly and monthly meetings.

The Juniors participate in hiking, outdoor cooking, and other activities.

Cadettes improve their camp skills, such as cooking, firebuilding, and pitching tents.

Girls entering Grade 4 may join a Pioneer Patrol for a four-night overnight. Girls entering Grade 7 may participate in an Aide-in-Training course.

Seniors share their skills with younger girls as Program Aides and assist the adult staff.

Timber Trails

The resident camp for the Manchester area is Timber Trails in Tolland, Mass. This camp is designed for girls entering Grades 4 through 12. There are four sessions in Timber Trails this summer from July 2 to 16, July 17 to 21, July 22 to 26, and Aug. 13 to 26.

Timber Trails is 1,600 acres of the Berkshire Hills and includes three other camping areas: West Wind and Beaver Ridge, where campers live in troop-sized units of 12 girls each and share shelter, food, and other activities.

The girls have a chance to plan and carry out unit and patrol programs such as hiking, overnights, cookouts, and other activities. Badge work will be a part of these groups.

Swimming classes are required only of non-swimmers. Red Cross instruction is available for everyone.

Special trips have been planned to Tanglewood, the Berkshire Theater and Jacobs Pillow.

Girl Scouts may apply for full or partial campership for resident and day camps. Applications for camperships must be received by April 1.

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Small-Town Morality Same as in Big City

By F. RICHARD COOKE
about 100 miles southwest of Chicago (AP) — Small towns still cherish the morality of the rural communities strung out from the hills of southern Ohio to the wheatlands of the Dakotas once served as a model of American morality—their attitudes are the same as in big cities, says a columnist who has spent a year in small towns.

Only it takes longer to get them. Changes here happen slower than in the big city but they still happen, says the Rev. Larry Eberhart of the United Church of Christ in Merrill, a community of 4,000 in northern Wisconsin.

Charles Van der Sanden, juvenile court worker in Merrill, says "It's hard to believe that really in if they can do what kids in big cities are doing, like drugs for example. Free love is much more common."

In Shell Lake, Wis., a community of 1,000 about 75 miles south of Duluth, Minn., the Rev. William Horne, pastor of the Lutheran church, feels most kids still are busy on the farm. "Perhaps they are more interested about some things... marriage, sex, premarital relations."

"In our classes," he adds, "some kids have been asking questions in those areas I've never heard from high school students. There is some drug use here and most of that comes from Duluth."

L. Gene Wilson, principal of the high school in Jefferson, a 4,000-resident town in southern Wisconsin, says, "Those kids want to learn about things that have meaning, right now. I don't think they're too interested in the past."

"We have the same drug problems, liquor problems and alcohol problems as anywhere else," says Pam Thompson, 16, a junior at the high school. Pam says only a small percentage of the high school people know where to get them."

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Proper Phasing Moves Investors

NEW YORK (AP) — An apocalyptic view that stagflation is the new normalcy in the stock market where weak companies go public, brokers peddle junk, and mutual funds watch the tape, mutual funds talk of performance.

Nothing unusual about such a phase; it's as predictable as the moon and the tides and the seasons. You know it's that time again when your friend favors you with a hot tip. And asks for a price higher than charged by the Post Office.

The company should be well managed.

The smaller the company, the more crucial it is that it have good management. The smaller the company the more you should know about its management.

You might buy IBM without personally knowing its management, but you should not buy stock in a tiny electronics firm or its equivalent without having done your homework.

Mutual funds might be able to stock big gains over the long ago only because their record then was so abysmally poor.

Both of them—the Edie Special Institutional Fund and the Edie Special Institutional Fund—are managed by Richard Carney, who offers uncommon sense approach for spotting growth stocks.

The approach, he insists, is as simple as the smallest investor as it is for the biggest institution. And it applies during any market phase.

1. The company must have consistent and superior growth in earnings.

This growth, says Carney, should be at least a per cent a year. He would prefer the company should be able to maintain this record year after year, even in times of adverse business conditions.

"Does the company look good only when it is outperforming with the tide? Or can it prove itself a strong swimmer when the tide turns?"

2. The company should have a consistent market. The demand for its products should be strong year in and year out.

An example of such a market is that for razor blades or paper napkins. Many companies selling disposable products qualify here, but building supplies companies and other businesses can't be overlooked.

3. The company should dominate its market or at least be a leader in a fast growing field.

Carney says he would prefer to have the stock of the leading company breeding tropical fish.

Commission Recommends Abortion

WASHINGTON AP — In a report certain to stir bitter debate, a presidential commission recommends abortion on request and contraceptive services to minors as ways to halt America's population growth.

The commission, which set out the need for stabilizing growth in the first of a three-part report issued last week, said public and private health services should assume all costs connected with fertility.

It would mean an outlay of up to \$8.1 billion a year, the commission said, to pay for contraceptives; for prenatal

delivery and first-year pediatric care; for voluntary sterilization, abortion and medical treatment of infertility. All but \$1 billion of this cost is now borne by public and private agencies, the commission said.

Criticism of the report came quickly, particularly its recommendation that "women should be free to determine their own fertility, that the matter of abortion should be left to the conscience of the individual concerned, in consultation with her physician and that states should be encouraged to enact affirmative statutes creating a clear and positive framework

for the practice of abortion on request."

Magr. James T. McHugh of the United States Catholic Conference said the "preoccupation with finding an effective way to eliminate the unwanted child has led the commission... into an ideological valley of death."

The four Catholic members of the 24-member commission and Sen. Alan Cranston, D-Calif., dissented from the section on abortion.

The commission was established by Congress two years ago on request of President Nixon to study "Population and

the American Future." Its chairman, John D. Rockefeller III, said "the commission recognizes and would stress that many of its recommendations seek to achieve social goals desirable and important in their own right—for example, greater opportunities for women and children and freedom of choice in reproduction."

The report placed emphasis on "creating social conditions wherein the desired values of individuals, families and communities can be realized."

Among the recommendations:

—States should adopt laws which will permit minors to receive contraceptive and prophylactic information and services in appropriate settings sensitive to their needs and concerns.

—All restrictions on access to voluntary contraceptive sterilization be eliminated.

—Federal, state and local governments should make funds available to support abortion services in states with liberalized statutes and "that abortion be specifically included in comprehensive health insurance benefits, both public and private."
