## Nixon To Fill Pay Unit Gap

### BULLETIN

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Nixon has decided how to fill a gap caused by the resignation of three AFL-CIO leaders from the Pay Board and will announce his decision later today.

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Pay Board remained in business today, determined to continue in one form or another despite the walkout of three labor members.

"I think it very likely that the Pay Board will go on, but how and in what manner remains to be seen," Chairman George H. Boldt said. "There's more than one way to skin a cat."

The board planned tentatively to continue work today on proposals to drop wage controls from small firms and to give some further relief to low-wage earners.

The absence of three labor votes decreased the likelihood that any such proposals would

be adopted. In any event they would require approval of the Cost of Living Council.

Meanwhile, the White House faced a decision on whether to allow the board to continue in its suddenly lopsided condition, or to reshape it in some way.

A number of options appear open. Balance could be restored by adding three more union or nonunion representatives of labor or by paring away three

## Popular Closing Stores

Foular Markets, Inc., Springfield, Mass.-based supermarket chain, tomorrow will close five of its stores in Greater Hartford, including its two stores in Manchester and one in South Windsor.

The stores affected in this area are in the Plaza Shopping Center at 725 E. Middle Tpke., in the Burr Corner Shopping Center, 1135 Tolland Tpke., and in the Sullivan Ave. Shopping Center, South Windsor.

Also being closed are a store in Wethersfield and one on New Britain Ave. in Hartford.

The impending closings had been rumored in town for some time and were confirmed by signs posted this week at the outlets notifying customers that Friday will be the final day of business.

The closings were also confirmed this morning by Daniel Block, owner of the chain, who was reached at the Springfield headquarters of the firm.

Block said all five businesses will be put up for sale. He said the closings "are part of our long-range planning to operate only high volume stores, in order to increase the profitability of the company."

Disposal of the stores will reduce the size of the chain by one-third, leaving it with 10 stores in Connecticut and Western Massachusetts.

Block said he was unsure of the total number of full-time employees affected by the closings, noting it was too soon to tell whether all could be permanently placed in other stores or whether some will have to be laid off.

For example, he noted, a Grand Union supermarket recently went out of business in West Hartford, and that closing should affect the volume of a Popular store in that community.

According to Clyde Conrad of Andover, manager of the Plaza store on E. Middle Tpke., all six full-time people under him have been temporarily placed at other Connecticut stores of the firm. If layoffs are necessary, they will be made on the basis of seniority rights under union rules, he pointed out.

Twelve part-time people do not have seniority rights and will probably be terminated, he said.

The stores operate as a closed shop under the Amalgamated Meatcutters and Butchers Union, AFL-CIO. All employees below management rank are required to join the union.

The 11,000 square foot Plaza store has been in operation since February 1961 and is the oldest of the area stores. The Burr Corner store is about seven years old and the one in

# Revenue Cut-Up Looms

Groceries Cost More

WASHINGTON (AP)—The biggest jump in grocery prices in 14 years last month triggered the sharpest rise in overall living costs since before President Nixon imposed economic controls, the government reported today.

The Consumer Price Index, measuring typical family living costs, rose five-tenths of one per cent in February, the largest increase in nine months, the Labor Department's Bureau of Labor Statistics said.

Grocery prices, which include a number of items that are not subject to federal price controls, soared 1.9 per cent for the greatest one-month increase since March of 1958, the report said.

The report followed the resignation of three AFL-CIO members of Nixon's Pay Board, who charged the government was rigidly holding down wages while letting prices continue to climb.

The bureau also reported that average weekly earnings of some 45 million rank-and-file workers rose 25 cents a week to \$130.27, but that purchasing power declined 24 cents because of the rise in consumer prices.

The February boost pushed the price index up to 123.8 per cent of its 1967 average. This means it cost \$12.38 last month for every \$10 worth of typical family purchases five years ago.

The February increase was the greatest since a six-tenths of one per cent rise last June, two months before Nixon imposed a 90-day wage-price freeze which was then followed by Phase 2 controls.

The bureau said that, so far in the four months of Phase 2, living costs have risen at an annual rate of 4.9 per cent, greater than the 4.1 per cent rate in the six months before Nixon's August economic freeze.

Prices had been held to an annual rate of 1.7 per cent during the rigid three-month freeze that preceded the looser Phase 2 controls.

Prices hikes in February included two-tenths of one per cent for housing, four-tenths each for clothing and medical care and one-tenth of one per cent for recreation.

Transportation costs declined six-tenths of one per cent, the report said.

A steep rise in meat prices, it said, accounted for about 70 per cent of the big rise in food prices.

Fresh fruits and vegetables also rose considerably. Dairy products rose instead of declining as usual in February, and cereal and bakery products

## Pot Parties in Private Bring a Mixed Reaction

The recommendation by a national commission to abolish criminal penalties for private use of marijuana has drawn mixed reaction among both the nation's youth and law enforcement officials.

Some officials gave qualified support to the idea, but others branded recommendations by the National Commission on Marijuana and Drug Abuse as impractical and even dangerous.

Harry J. Anslinger, U.S. commissioner of Narcotics from 1950 to 1968, said the commission's recommendations could have "very serious national repercussions" and he called the findings "terrifying."

But Walter Richter, director of the Texas Program on Drug Abuse, said the group's report was "a very sane and humane and reasonable approach" that would free law enforcers to deal with the problem of hard drugs.

"I would be the last one to recommend anyone get involved with pot, but I think this helps put it in perspective," he said.

The 13-member commission, at the end of a year's study, urged Wednesday that the government end prosecution of marijuana users but continue

in jail terms and fines for growing or selling pot.

President Nixon, who appointed nine members of the commission, received the report without comment.

## Bureaucratic Heartburn

# Gas Pains Growing

WASHINGTON (AP)—The federal government is trying to figure out who's got gas and who hasn't and the problem is causing a serious case of bureaucratic heartburn.

The gas involved is natural. In recent years it's been emerging from the ground at a steadily decreasing rate, resulting in shortages that have triggered rationing in wide areas of the country.

New gas is lying around under the ground waiting for producers to come for it, but the producers aren't looking much. They claim that erratic Federal Power Commission regulation of rates they can charge for gas doesn't provide enough profit margin to finance exploration.

The FPC is considering changing its regulatory system, but first the commission says it must find out what companies have how much gas and where. Therein lies the rub.

The FPC has never gone into the gas fields itself to inventory supplies. It has, instead, always relied on figures supplied by the American Gas Association, an industry organization which collects data on gas supplies from the producers.

But because AGA is an industry group, the charge has

been made that it helped the gas industry overrate its problems and create an artificial gas shortage to force FPC to raise gas rates. AGA says this couldn't be further from the truth.

Anyhow, the FPC decided last year to do its own survey. So it set up a series of task forces and study groups to look into the gas supply situation—and promptly staffed each panel with a majority of gas industry representatives.

This brought a howl of protest in Congress. Sen. Warren G. Magnuson, D-Wash., chairman of the Senate Commerce Committee, introduced a bill which would require the FPC to use its own staff people to do a gas survey.

In hearings on that and other bills this week, FPC Chairman John N. Nassikas told the committee that would be all but impossible.

"It would take 475 man years to make the survey," Nassikas testified. If 100 additional staff people were hired, "assuming we could even find 100 experts," the job would take nearly five years and cost 20 times what the current survey is targeted for, he said.

But the committee also heard

from Alan S. Ward of the Federal Trade Commission who is all for the Magnuson bill.

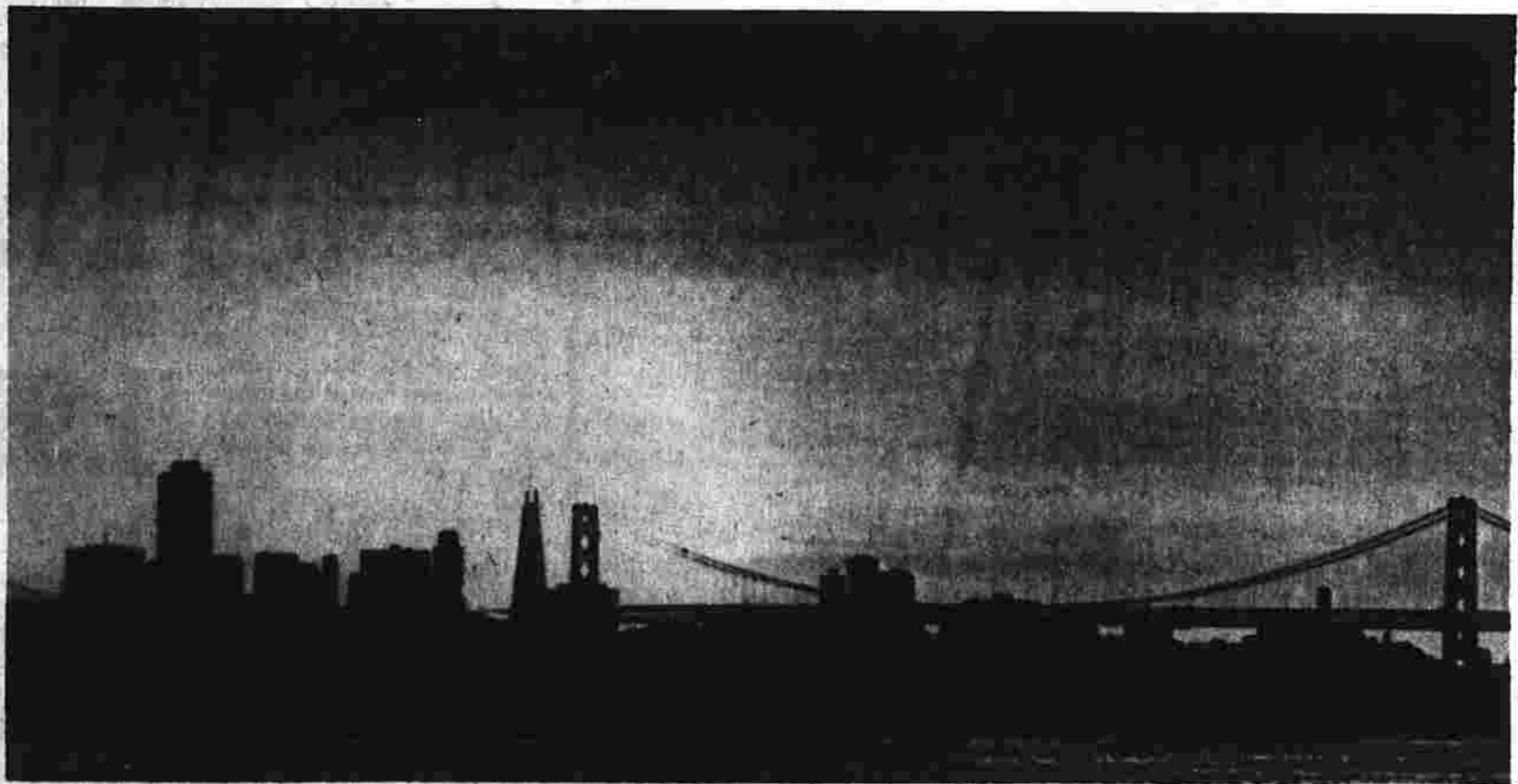
"For the industry, be it ever so honorable as it is presently constituted, its total revenues are directly dependent upon its own count of reserves," Ward said. He urged enactment of the bill to "assure an alternative source of information."

No matter how it all comes out, the consumer probably will have to pay a higher price. Nassikas is saying already that gas prices probably are going to have to go up as an incentive for producers to explore for more gas. Inevitably higher prices for producers will mean higher utility bills.

Moreover, the public may never get to see the data supporting the conclusion that higher gas rates are needed.

Both the FPC and the AGA contend that supply data from gas producers is proprietary information—trade secrets—in other words—and they can't go around telling one company how much gas another company has.

Meanwhile, both the FPC and AGA gas survey panels have competitors sitting at the same tables looking at the very information which they supposedly don't want each other to see.

San Francisco skyline is in silhouette against setting sun in photo taken from across the bay in Oakland. (AP photo)

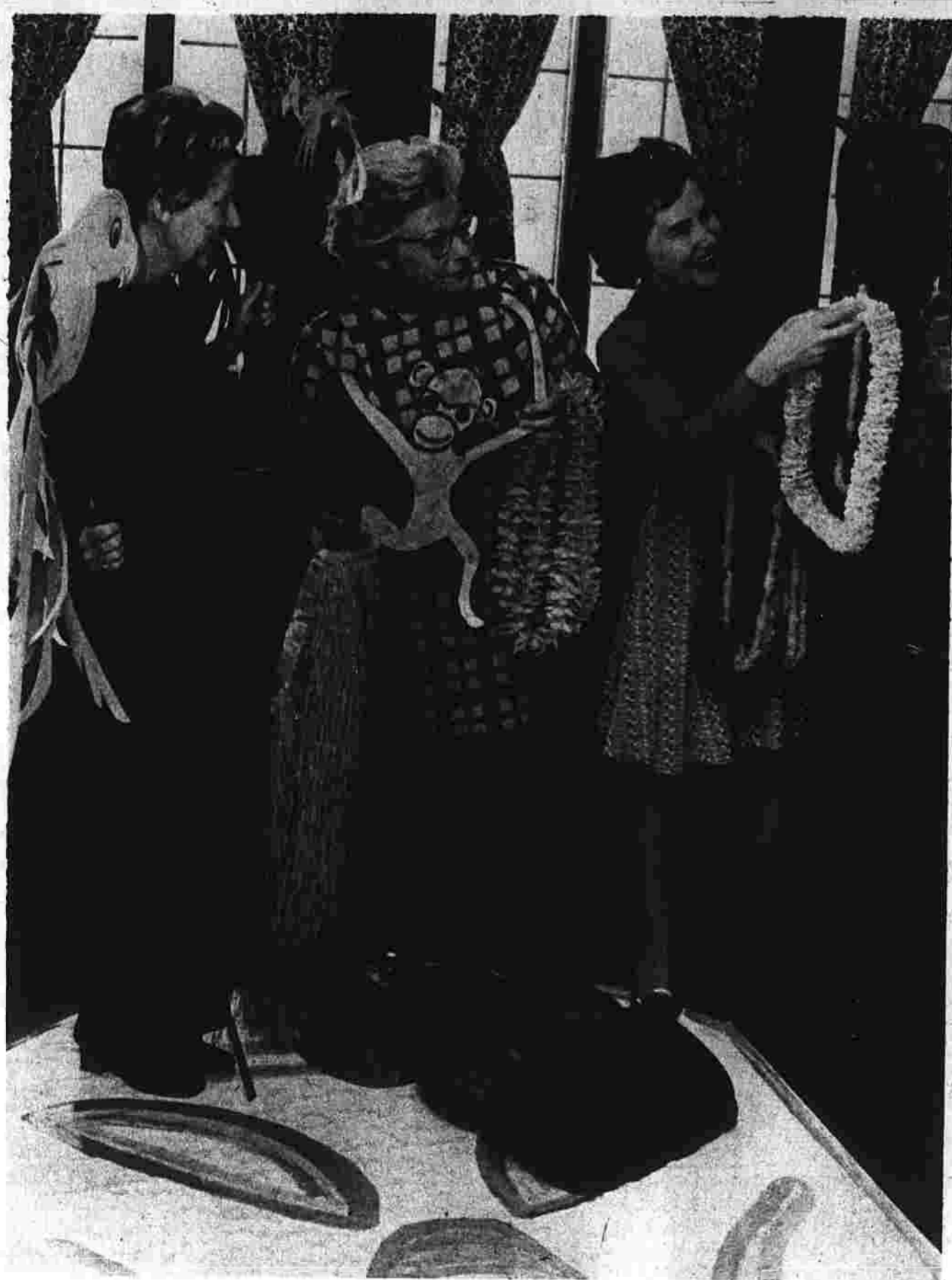

**The Open Primary**  
 The particular charms of the open primary, as contrasted with the primary in which only the registered members of a political party can vote for the candidates of the party, are now coming into exhibition in Illinois, the primary just over, and in Wisconsin, the next primary on the schedule.

Open voting was new in Illinois this year, but the Republicans, who had no particular business of their own to transact, demonstrated instant adaptation to their opportunity to cross over into the Democratic voting for pleasant purposes of their own.

In some instances, the Republicans may have been seeking only an opportunity to vote their own convictions. In others, they may have been intending merely to help the Democrats split themselves. You will have a hard time convincing any Illinois Democrat, including those the Republicans may have helped to nomination Tuesday, that the Republicans who voted for them in the primary are also going to vote for them in November.

In Illinois, the Republicans are being given credit for the victory of State Attorney Edward V. Hanrahan, whom Mayor Daley tried to dump, not because Hanrahan was not his kind of man, but because he was afraid the fact he was under indictment for alleged obstructing of justice in connection with the Panther trials in Chicago would prove a liability in the November campaign. It is not likely that Mayor Daley is really shedding any tears over this particular result of Republican primary. All it did, in summary, was to force Mayor Daley to take back one of his own.

But when the Republicans also participated in the selection of a Democratic candidate for governor, helping select the independent-minded Daniel Walker over Mayor Daley's candidate, Lieutenant Governor Paul Simon—that, we suspect, was a little less pleasant for Mayor Daley, and a defeat he really minded.

Meanwhile, perhaps the biggest preliminary news out of Wisconsin is that President Nixon's political strategists have now abandoned their scheduled effort to try to summon out a large vote of confidence in the President and decided to play the Wisconsin primary cool.

The object of this strategy is said to be to leave the Republican voters of Wisconsin free, on April 4, to cross party lines and help the Democrats—or, to put it more realistically—to try to help the Republicans 1972 campaign by stirring up a maximum of trouble among the Democrats. The biggest embarrassment the Republicans of Wisconsin could cause the Democrats would be to go out on primary day and give a lot of votes to Governor Wallace.

For the party which has no particular contest of its own, the open primary offers fun and frolic. For the party which finds its opposition meddling freely in its own affairs on a one day basis, the open primary must seem merely a license for irresponsible mischief.

**Beyond Principle?**  
 In Commons the other day, a Conservative British government announced that it was dealing with Britain's twin problems of "inflation and unemployment" by an unprecedented slash in taxes designed to put so much extra money in the pockets of the British people they will go out and spend, spend, spend.

The Conservatives in Commons cheered the announcement of their government. The members of the Labor Party growled.

Normally, in Britain as in this country, it would be the liberals who would be cheering tax cuts and the conservatives who would be growling—particularly if inflation is part of the problem the nation is trying to solve.

So it would seem not quite so unusual and startling, after all, that President Nixon should, last August, suddenly resort to economic cure hitlerso fancied by the Democrats, or that the Democrats, watching him do this, should act as if they were suffering from acute political indigestion.

We are, for the moment, in an upside-down world, in which the conservatives are doing the very things they used to find intolerable when the liberals proposed them, and when the liberals, hurt and demoralized, don't quite know where to try to move.

The harshest reading of all this is also the truest one. It says that political parties have somehow got beyond operating on any right or wrong principle and have substituted the pragmatic goal of trying anything that might possibly work.

The trouble is that any policy of trying to live or govern by expediency is, in the end, the policy which is most likely of all policies to fail, with a final result of merely compounding and compounding problems, that might once have been managed by a consistency of principle, into mountains nobody can handle.

**Meskill Dawdles, State Suffers**  
 Gov. Thomas J. Meskill has displayed an almost incredible abdication of leadership coupled with political pandering of the worst order in his attitude toward meeting the critical fiscal and employment problems of our state (Our state... not just his state).  
 At the outset of his administration more than a year ago the Governor refused to put together an honest revenue package which would get Connecticut back on the course of recovery. And when the Legislature tried to put some integrity into state government by enacting a law through administrative details only to be repealed after a manufactured "taxpayers' revolt."

Now it is the second year of the Meskill Administration and the Governor's fiscal policy is even more irresponsible. In November Meskill made a great fanfare of Executive Order Number Eight in which he created the Governor's Strike Force for Full Employment.

Meskill named Sol Young to put together the Strike Force composed of energetic and knowledgeable business and labor leaders with the charge that the group explore all avenues toward keeping industry in Connecticut and creating new and diversified industry to the state.

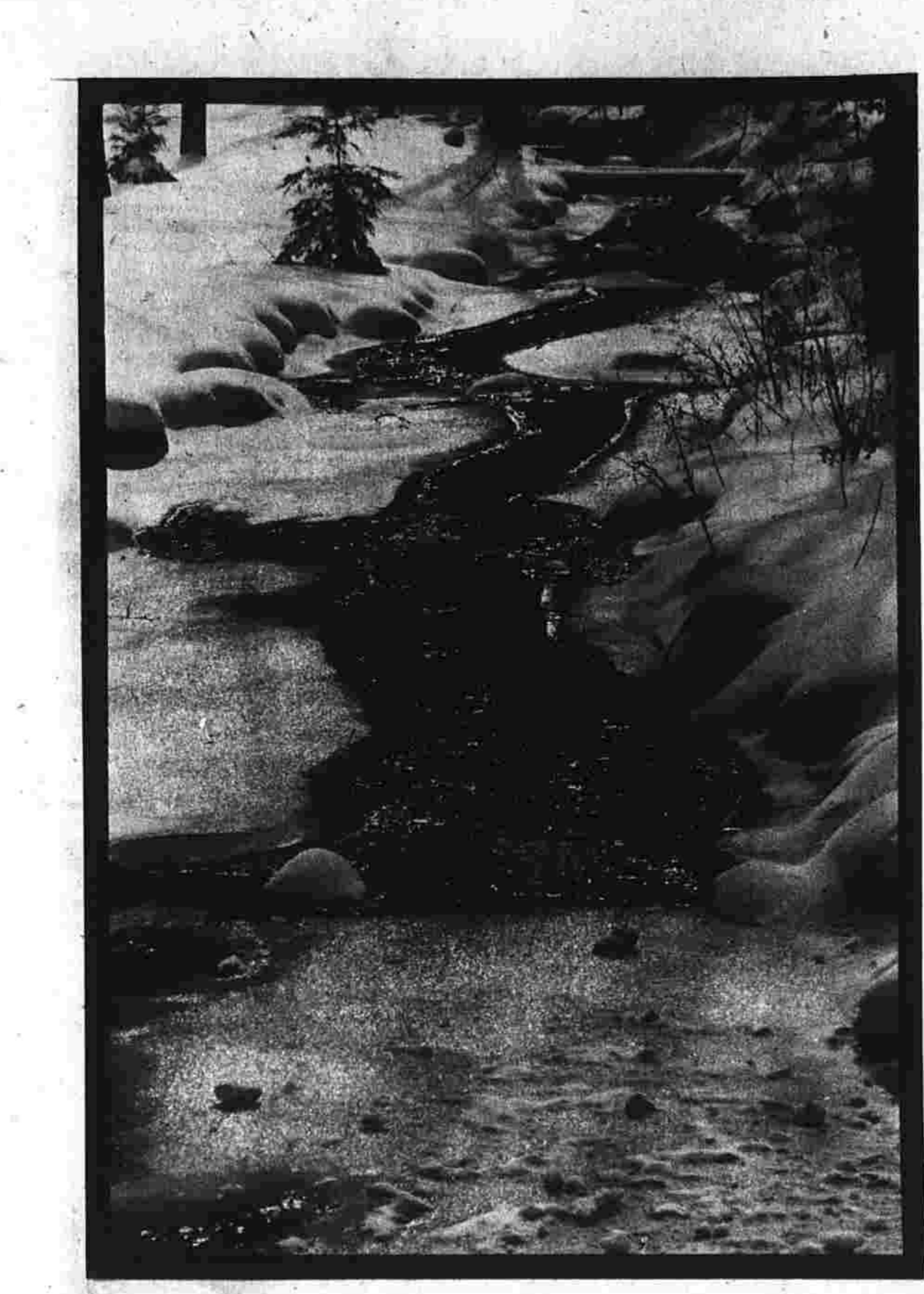
After hundreds of man hours the Strike Force came in with a series of recommendations and the most critical of these was a call for a state income tax and to raise revenue which would enable corporate taxes and other business taxes to be reduced to a point where they would be in line with the going rate in competitive states.

But the Governor believes that there can be no real tax reform in an election year. The legislature would not go along with it, he says. He also says we should wait until we find out if the Supreme Court is going to sustain a California ruling concerning financing of public education. We should also wait, Meskill says, to see what kind of a federal revenue sharing bill will become law. He will take a look at the situation in 1973. In the third year of his administration, the Governor says.

We say, we do not have the time to wait around for the best political moment for the Governor to act. Decisions are now being made which can affect retention of business in Bristol and the laying off of other new business here. The same is true in other communities throughout the state. The time for action is already past due.

Assemblyman George Ritter, without the staff available to the Executive Office of this state, has put together a graduated income tax package which addresses itself to the problems of raising adequate revenue at the municipal level. The Strike Force has put together in a package addressed to providing incentives for another year while Connecticut drifts further down the ranks of industrial states of this nation.

MILWAUKEE—It was nearly midnight Monday when Sen. Hubert Humphrey pranced up to the bandstand at a gaudy nightclub named "Turning Point" deep in Milwaukee's black ghetto, delivered a love-and-brotherhood sermon, then swept on to stoke another black and white radio talk show to close an 18-hour day in a campaign that seems to be going strongly his way.

With Sen. Edmund Muskie's commitments in the Illinois Presidential primary declining, the start of his Wisconsin campaign until Tuesday (March 21), Humphrey's logjams lead for the April 4 primary here has given him a momentum that is impressive.

# Connecticut Yankee

This columnist, in his personal capacity as a voter, didn't begin to attain his maximum wrath over the way the state legislative redistricting proposal pushes him around until he delved into some of the arguments presented against the plan in Attorney Robert Bitter's brief to the United States District Court.

Then what had seemed merely an extreme case of personal inconvenience found itself being translated into a grievance of high principle, which, of course, justifies higher indignation.

If the new districting plan goes into effect, this columnist and a few hundred other residents of one fringe of our town will have our voting transferred, for purposes of electing a state representative, so that we are joined with the whole population of a neighboring town.

The Satter brief, in the following passage, helps us realize what is being done to us:

"The residents of a town have a political relationship among themselves. They have learned to act together. Their coherence as follows toward things gives them political strength. They are capable of holding their elected officials accountable to them.

"Elected officials of a single town are visible and identifiable to the residents of that town. They know their constituency is organized into a political unit. As a consequence, the elected officials themselves are required to be more responsible and more responsive to the residents of their town.

"On the other hand, the residents of a district composed of portions of two or more towns have no organization among themselves, no collective identity, and little ability as constituents acting in concert to hold their representatives accountable and responsible.

"The tribunal headed by Sheriff Pat Hogan of Bristol said it had 'no alternative,' but to uphold the validity of the four town committees although declaring the method of their selection illegal.

"In order to ensure that there is no question about the legitimacy of the state convention delegations from each of those towns, the tribunal made an urgent recommendation that the delegates be chosen through open primaries, instead of being picked by the town committees.

Alexander Goldfarb, counsel to the Democratic state committee and drafter of the tribunal's five-page decision, said it is crucial that the McGovern Committee's requirements be applied to the process of picking state convention delegates because those delegates will pick the national convention delegates.

Goldfarb said today, ruling should be followed by all local Democratic organizations which used a convention system to pick town committees this year—even those in which all challenges were mounted.

There are about a dozen such towns, he said, and they should all use open primaries to pick their state convention delegates if they want to avoid the possibility of a challenge at the state convention in Hartford June 17.

It would have been all right for a local convention to pick its delegates, if all local Democrats had agreed to participate in the process of picking delegates to those conventions—the 'integrity' of the political party-managing can do just as much to violate the sanctity of the one-man one-vote principle as a wide variation in the population size of districts.

It is not a matter of size, small and insignificant, or so deprived of all political clout, as we feel under the hammer of this session of one man one vote districting.

# Party Rules Defined

HARTFORD (AP)—Every Democratic town committee which used a conventional system to pick its successors this year is going to have to change its rules, according to a special tribunal of the Democratic State Central Committee.

However, although ruling the local convention systems illegal and contrary to new national and state party rules, the three-member panel decided today to uphold the validity of the new town committees until the invalid convention rules.

The convention systems in Norwalk, Danbury, New London and Enfield had been challenged by Democrats who said the systems amounted to self-perpetuation by the party organizations—in violation of the national McGovern Commission's reforms.

Primaries for town committee members are in the works in Norwalk, Danbury and New London, but not in Enfield. Thus, if Enfield's town committee had been declared invalid, there would be no party organization in that town and no way to choose the statutory deadline for filing primary petitions has passed.

# Transit Districts Proposed For Solving Bus Problems

HARTFORD (AP)—Connecticut's new transit districts are expected to be set up by the end of the year, officials here said today.

Elimination of tokens on New Haven buses should offset an expected peak loss of \$20,000 this month, creation of transit districts was announced today.

State Transportation Commissioner A. Bart Wood said that the new transit districts would take over operations of the Hartford place old ones.

The company has applied to the state Public Utilities Commission for permission to raise rates and cut back service in Hartford and New Haven and to eliminate service altogether in Stamford.

The company cited losses in asking for the changes.

Charles Geogras, president and chairman of the company's board of trustees, declined comment on the recommendations until the firm's officials can give them more details.

In testimony before the PUC earlier this year, Geogras said he would be happy if local transit districts would take over operations of the bus divisions.

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## East Germany Watching Bonn Treaties with East


BERLIN (AP) — The opposition is committed to rejecting ratification of the Bonn or West Germany's hopes for German reunification treaties with Moscow and Warsaw and regaining territory lost in war.

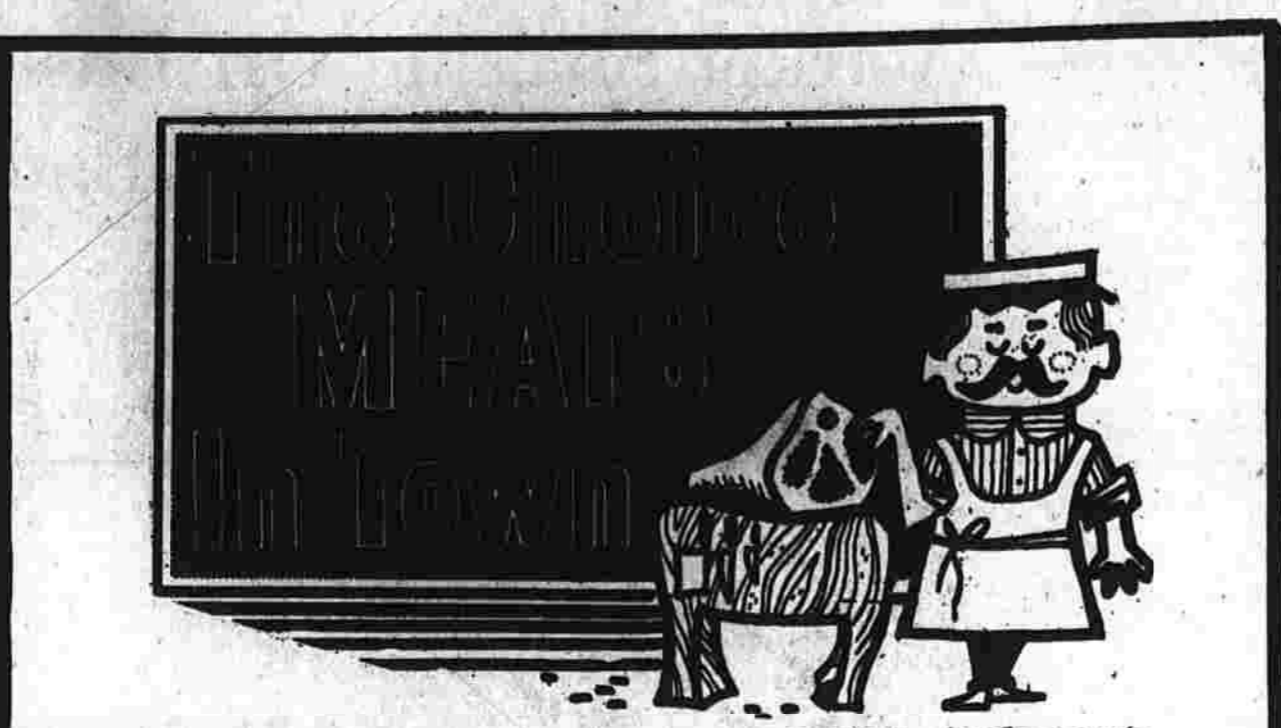

WASHINGTON — Advisors to Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey say they will enter Humphrey's name in the Indiana May 2 primary today, upping the number of Democratic contenders in that contest to three.

Donald T. Kerns, legislative representative of the United Steelworkers and a Humphrey supporter, said Wednesday in Indianapolis Humphrey's name would be entered in the contest "unless he calls us and tells us not to enter his name."

The deadline for filing for the contest is noon today.

A statement released by Humphrey campaign headquarters in Washington confirmed the Minnesota senator's entry into the Indiana race.

The statement said Humphrey aides filed with state officials before the noon deadline and would announce his entry at a news conference in Indianapolis. The senator was reported campaigning in Nebraska.

Alabama Gov. George C. Wallace and the victor of Tuesday's Illinois primary, Sen. Edmund Muskie of Maine, filed Wednesday for the Indiana race.

It was not known, however, if another Democratic presidential aspirant, Sen. Vance Hartke of Indiana, would enter his home-state race.

In other political developments:

**McGOVERN:** Spokesmen for Sen. George S. McGovern of South Dakota said speaking commitments will prevent McGovern from accepting a debating challenge from New York Mayor John Lindsay. Lindsay spokesmen had said earlier McGovern agreed to debate Friday at the University of Wisconsin before Tuesday's primary in that state.

McGovern said he was willing to negotiate another date, but could not make it to the school at Madison for a student-sponsored forum.

**MCGARHTHY:** Eugene McCarthy, former Minnesota senator, said he would issue a major statement Monday in Madison on his plans for the Wisconsin primary.

**WALLACE:** The Alabama governor, at a news conference in Indianapolis, said he has "an excellent chance of winning" the Indiana race.

**YORTY:** Los Angeles Mayor San Yorty, another Democratic contender, said in Los Angeles he is still a serious candidate despite the fact he will not be campaigning in any state other than California. He said the duties of the mayor's office prevented him from further campaigning.

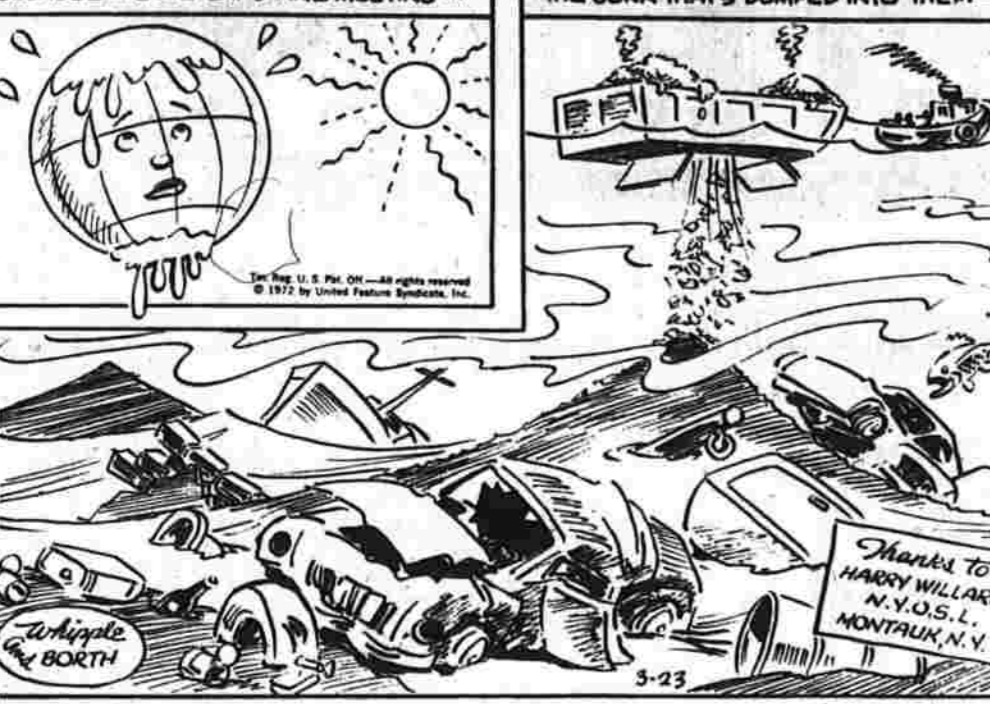

South Windsor Sprenkel Asks \$3,265,418 For General Government

Town Manager Terry Sprenkel last night presented the Town Council with a recommended \$3,265,418 town government operational budget for the 1972-73 fiscal year. This amount is in addition to a \$1.5 million request from the Board of Education for operating town schools.

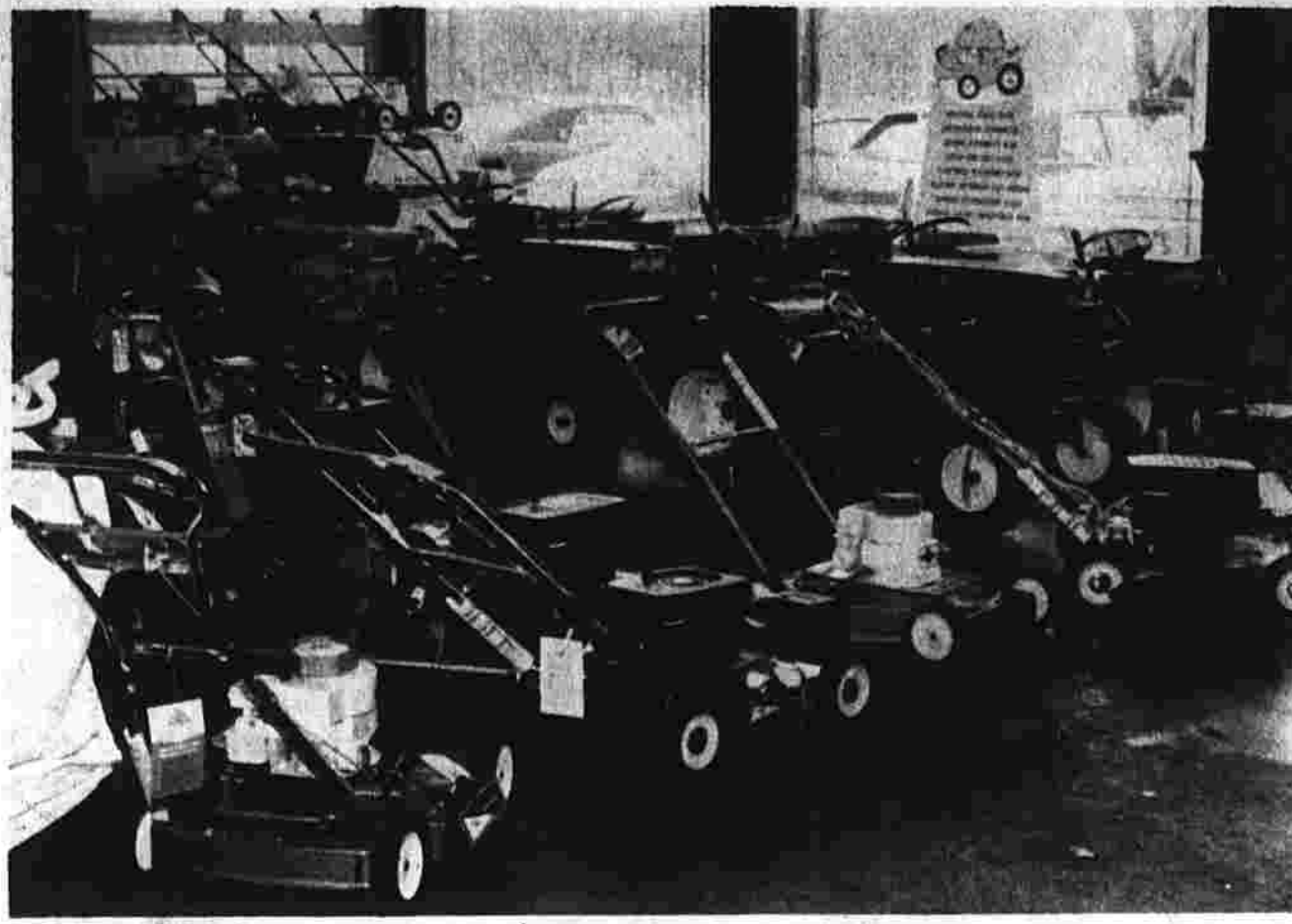

### Tolland Mandamus Seeks Removal of Sign

A writ of mandamus has been filed in Tolland County Superior Court which seeks to have town officials order the removal of the lowering Mobil Oil Co. sign located at 148 and Rt. 156. The writ was filed by Attorney Wilson, Abel and Channin of Hartford on behalf of Charles MacArthur and Mrs. Mary McNally. It orders Frederick Frey, Charles Schuta and Frank Merrill to appear in court April 4 to answer to the charges claimed in the mandamus order. All three men have served or are serving in the capacity of building inspector or zoning enforcement officer, since the sign was erected last summer. Attempts to have the town order the sign removed last fall have failed to bring any results, prompting MacArthur and Mrs. McNally to seek court action. The mandamus lists 10 specific points all of which the sign is in violation of. A permit for the erection of a Mobil gas station sign was issued during the fall of 1970, the writ claims, even though zoning regulations covering the outdoor sign zones required that signs in excess of 50 square feet, but not exceeding 600 square feet, be subject to approval of the Planning and Zoning Commission. The Mobil sign comes within these regulations for each line of the building permit issued with the approval of the PZC, the writ charges. The sign, located in a commercial zone, should not exceed three square feet for each line of building frontage, according to the charges, which claim the sign exceeds the maximum amount and no variance has been given by any authority for the violation. The gas station itself was approved in January, the writ claims, even though the sign was specifically denied, the plaintiffs claim. The continued existence of the sign is in violation of permit uses, they charge, claiming it is up to the defendants to return from Vietnam last May. ### Most School Board Members Favor Nonpartisan Election

The majority of the Tolland Board of Education members who voted that not all parties would prefer to be elected in non-partisan elections for four-year terms, according to the results of a member poll in response to the questionnaire circulated by the Charter Revision Committee. All six board members voted for the four-year term, proposed as an alternative to the present six-year term. Four members of the board opted for non-partisan election of school board candidates, while two voted to retain the present political caucus system. The school board members disagreed among themselves over the proposed size of the board, although all agreed it should be increased from the present six members. Three members voted for an eight-member board; two voted for a nine-member board and one for a ten-member school board. The results of the poll were announced during last night's board meeting. The CREC will review the reports of all boards and commissions during tonight's closed door meeting. Following review of the recommendations of the various boards and commissions the CREC will begin work on the drafting of non-controversial portions of the proposed charter. The town manager or administrator form of government proposed by the CREC during its meeting two weeks ago was supported by five of the six school board members. Unanimous support was given to the election of a shortened ballot, which in effect would place many of the presently elected positions in the appointment category. The proposal to eliminate the Board of Finance was supported by five members. Budgetary duties are assumed by a town manager for review by a town council if this is the form of government decided upon. The retention annual town budget meeting and town meeting approval of the charter changes was supported by five members of the school board. Teacher Exchange Program: A teacher exchange program between the various schools was attempted recently under the sponsorship of the faculty-administration council. A report provided to members of the Board of Education drew mixed reactions from the school board last night. Most members of the board appeared to agree with Mrs. Barbara Kline that a "great deal more thought would have to go into the program before it is tried again next year. Although the faculty-administrative council was described as enthusiastic about the program describing it as a good experience for the teachers, board members noted com-

### I-84 Foes Petition For Public Backing

The I-84 Coalition opposing further construction of the interstate highway, and composed of six conservation and environmental groups in the area, is enlisting public support through circulation of petitions.

A representative of the coalition said that residents of most of the towns and cities in the northeast have been contacted and are assisting in gathering signatures opposing the highway.

The coalition, which includes the Residents for Respectable Planning from Coventry, the Mansfield Environmental Protection Association, the Connecticut Committee for Correspondence, Ecology Action of Hampton, Connecticut Citizens Action Group and the nationwide Sierra Club, insists that further highway construction must be brought to a halt.

Because the final route corridor through the towns of Andover, Bolton and Coventry has been proposed by the state, the coalition is placing its greatest emphasis at this time on this segment of the road. It is also opposed to continuing the highway beyond the Williamite by-pass.

### Public Records Meskill Wants Stricter Laws In Oil Spills

Stricter legal safeguards against oil spills were endorsed today by Gov. Thomas J. Meskill, who said present laws are "not adequate" to cope with the problem.

"I think this has happened too frequently," the governor said in reference to Tuesday's spill in Long Island Sound off Waterford.

"It's happened involving the same companies, and the same careless practices," he said. Meskill said the oil could have been contained more quickly, but the tanker insisted on waiting for equipment that would "preserve the quality of their oil for their dollar profit and to ignore their overriding responsibility not to pollute the sound and the beaches."

He added, "We don't intend to sit by and let this happen again." Meskill said that the present \$50,000 bond required of all shippers is "not adequate," and he backed measures recommended Wednesday by State Environmental Protection Commissioner Dan W. Larkin.

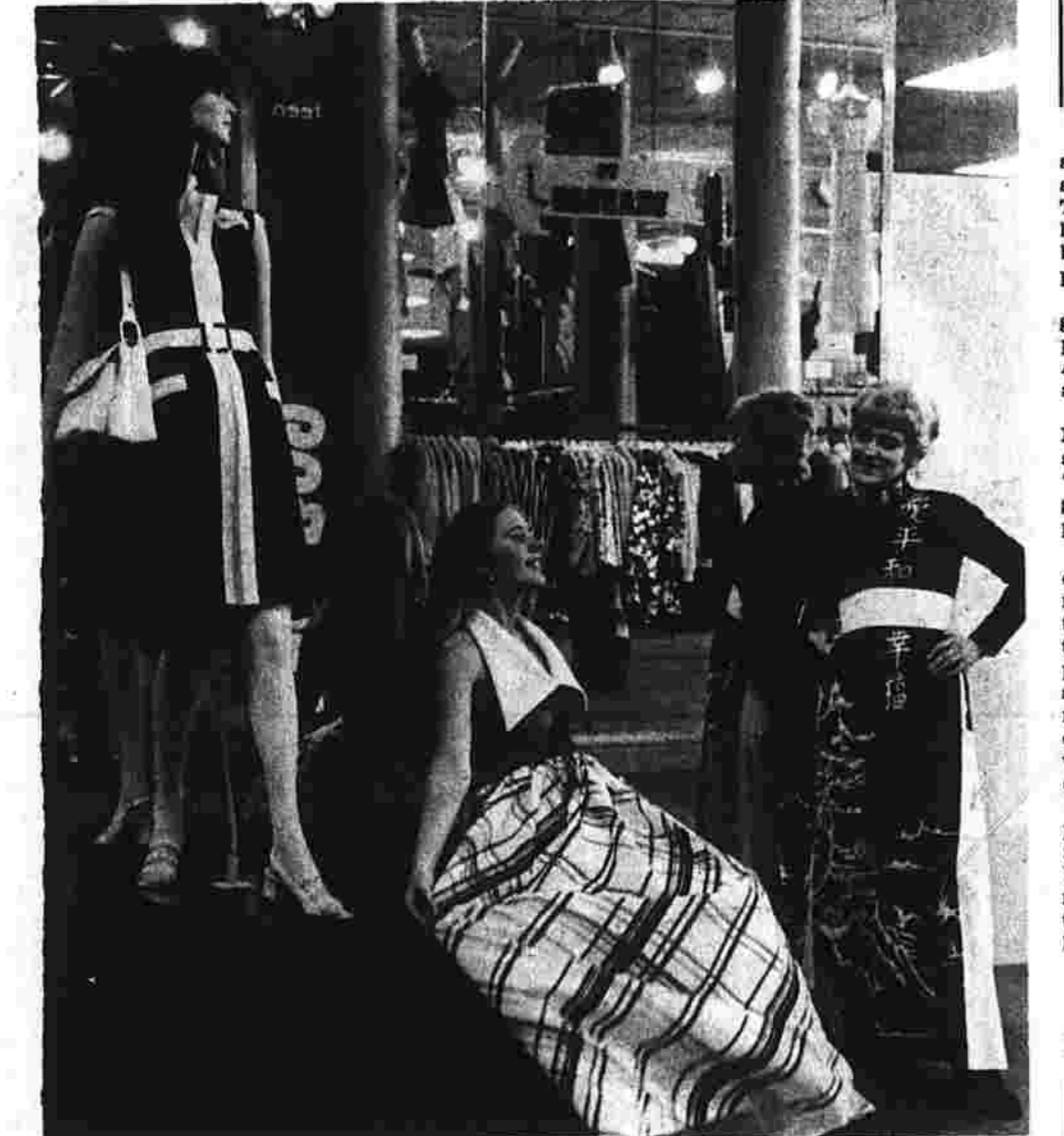

### Legislators Cool To Easing Laws On Smoking Pot

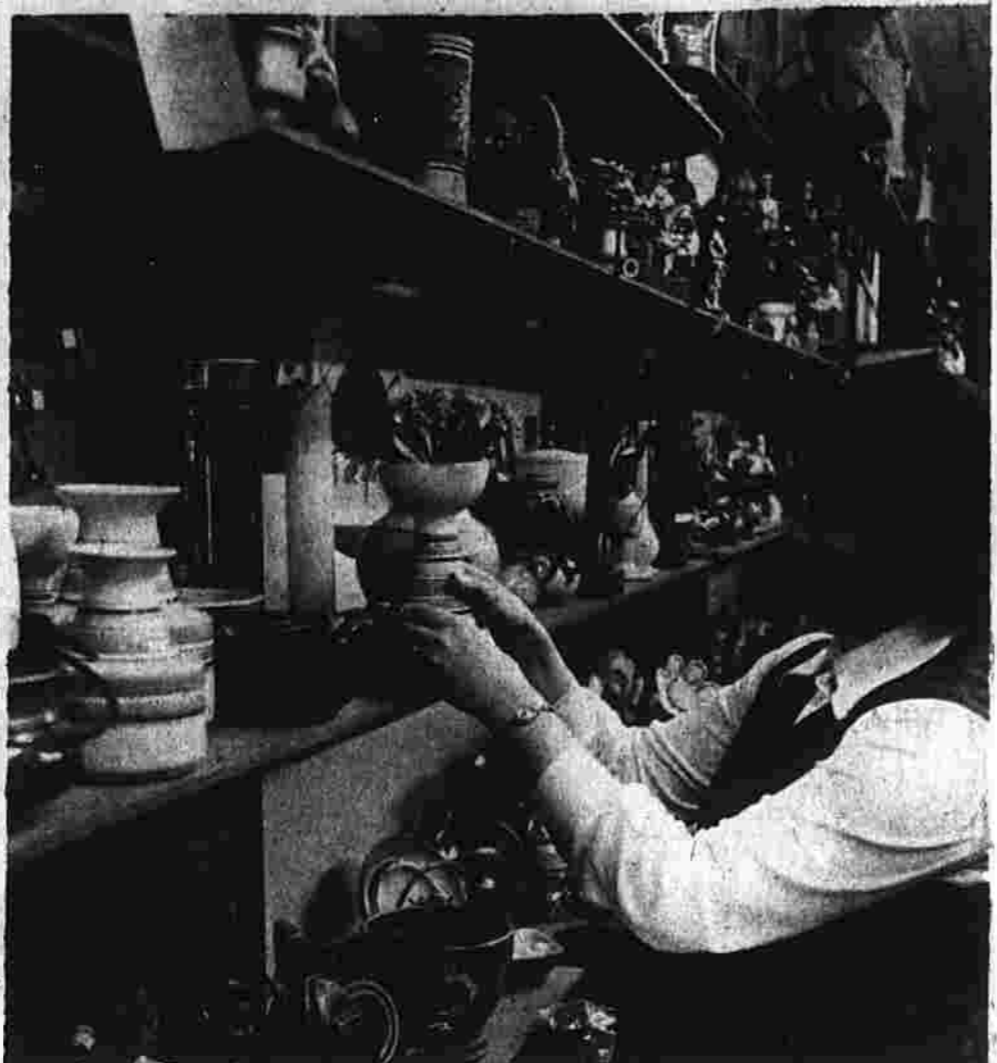
HARTFORD (AP) — A federal commissioner's proposal to remove the legal penalties for smoking marijuana received a cool response from state legislators Wednesday. The political leaders of taking a soft line on marijuana were pointed up by one lawmaker who said he would oppose any bill to remove the penalties but personally and privately agreed with the commission. "I've always had a relaxed attitude toward pot," said this legislator, who asked not to be quoted by name, "but my district thinks it's stupid. I don't believe it's any more harmful than alcohol or tobacco," he said. Speaking on the record, another legislator, House Speaker William Ratchford, said: "I'd have to be convinced it's medically safe to smoke marijuana." Ratchford said a special committee of the American Medical Association had disagreed over that question.

### Meriden Mayor Disturbed Over Late Lunches

MERIDEN (AP) — Mayor Abraham G. Grossman has a gripe over "out-to-lunch" department heads. Grossman disclosed Wednesday he called four department heads after 4 p.m., seeking help for residents who visited him on his regular weekly gripe day. He was told they were "out to lunch." "Not even their chief subordinates were around," Grossman said. In a one-line memo to all departments the mayor wrote: "As of immediately, I want all city department heads to report their lunch hours to me."

### Vernon Sewer Link Requests Referred to Advisers

A request from the town of South Windsor to tie-in three homes on Kelly Rd. in that town to the Vernon sewer system, has been referred to the Vernon Sewer Advisory Committee by the Town Council. The Town Council, meeting at the Sewer Authority, generally approved granting the request but noted there are many factors to be considered. If permission is granted the sewer lines would be charged on the same basis as Millington homeowners who are tied into the Vernon treatment plant. These users are charged \$84 a year. South Windsor, acting through its Sewer Commission would connect the line into Vernon. It will be up to South Windsor to obtain the easement where the line goes through the property of John Gulletti, on Kelly Rd. and to obtain a construction permit from the town of Vernon and meet Vernon's requirements. The proposed agreement would require South Windsor to also install house laterals so they may be used by Vernon homeowners abutting the lines. Vernon homeowners along the line will not have to pay any initial assessment unless they tie-in and then at that time South Windsor will be permitted to assess benefits according level.

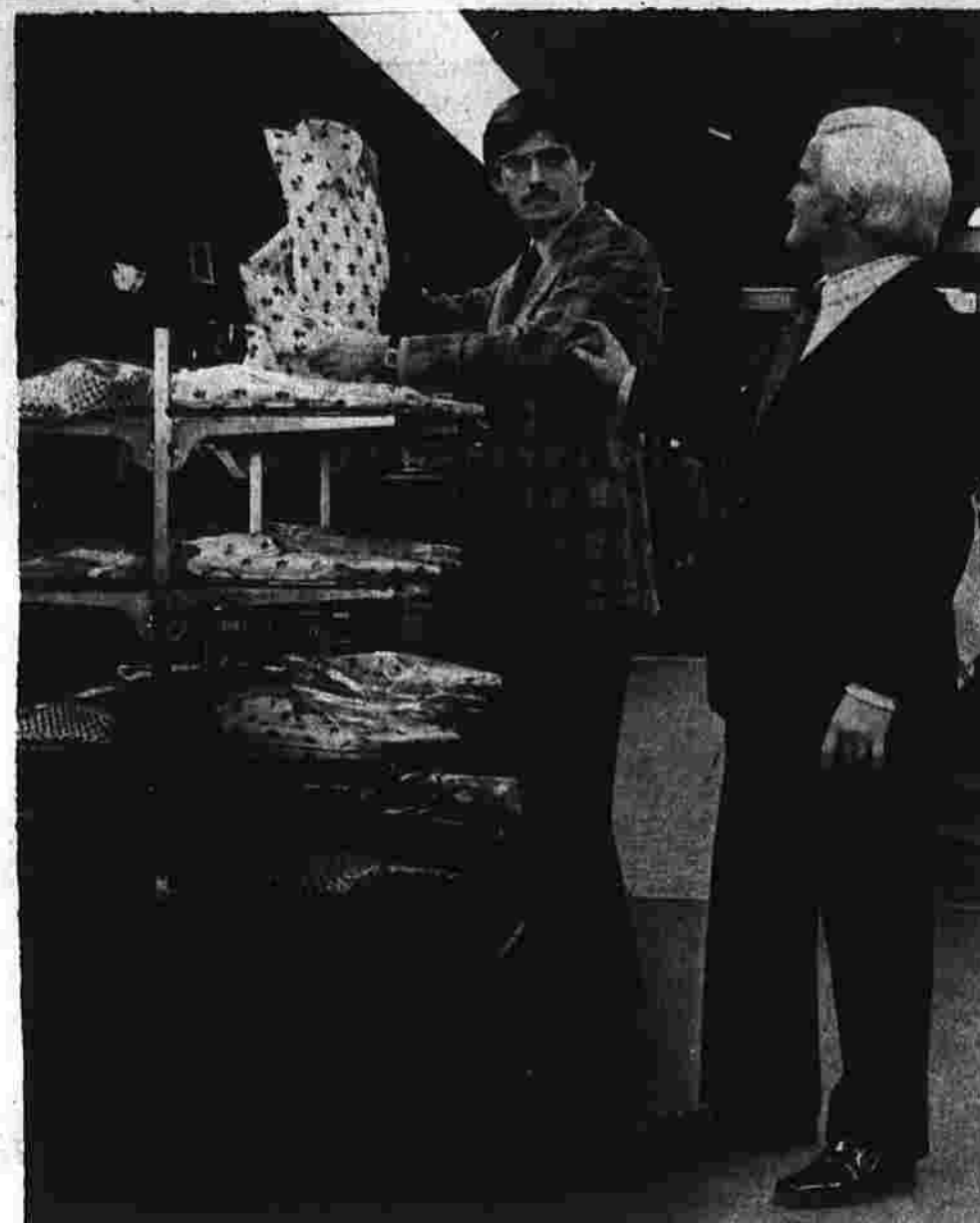

BUENOS AIRES (AP) — Former President Juan D. Peron has been cleared of 16-year-old fraud charges, removing one of the obstacles to his possible return from exile in Spain.

Judge Leopoldo Insaurralde in his ruling Wednesday removed charges that Peron misused public funds and accepted bribes. The government attorney agreed with the action and does not plan to appeal, court sources reported.

The charge of treason remains, but Peron's lawyer has asked that it also be stricken. All of the charges were placed after Peron was ousted in a bloody military coup in 1955.

Peron's followers say he will return this year for elections scheduled March 25, 1973, but the 70-year-old ex-president has not committed himself.

### Belfast and London Scan Peace Proposal

BELFAST (AP) — The cabinet in Belfast and London debated Britain's new peace proposals for Northern Ireland today amid indications that the province's Protestant premier thinks they go too far. Premier Brian Faulkner returned home with the British proposals after 9 1/2 hours of continuous talks with Prime Minister Edward Heath in London Wednesday. The length of the meeting indicated the Ulsterman put up stiff resistance to the degree of concessions to be offered Northern Ireland's Roman Catholic minority. Officials at Stormont Castle, seat of the provincial government, said the British plan was more "radical" than "mild." One London newspaper reported the situation was "moving into a state of deep crisis" and the gap between London and Belfast was enormous. Details of the plan were a closely guarded secret. Heath has already promised the province's one million Protestants that their six counties will remain British as long as they want them to. But he also must try to persuade the 500,000 Catholics that they will receive equal treatment and a genuine share in promised prosperity. There was no indication when the proposals would be published or how much longer Protestant objections might delay them. A communique issued in London Wednesday night said Heath and Faulkner "will be in touch again following meetings of their cabinets." The would-be peacemakers face two major obstacles: Ulster's Protestants say they'll fight any dilution of their power, and the guerrillas of the Irish Republican Army say they will not accept anything short of union with the Catholic Irish Republic. While the political leaders met Wednesday, Belfast's sixth major bombing in three days ripped apart a main railroad station, damaged the capital's biggest hotel and sent 70 people to the hospital with cuts. Another bomb shattered the main street of Enniskillen, on the shores of Lough Erne, badly damaging 80 stores and offices. But a telephone warning gave police and troops time to clear the area. In Londonderry early today army bomb disposal experts dismantled a time bomb packed with 70 pounds of gelatin planted outside a supermarket.

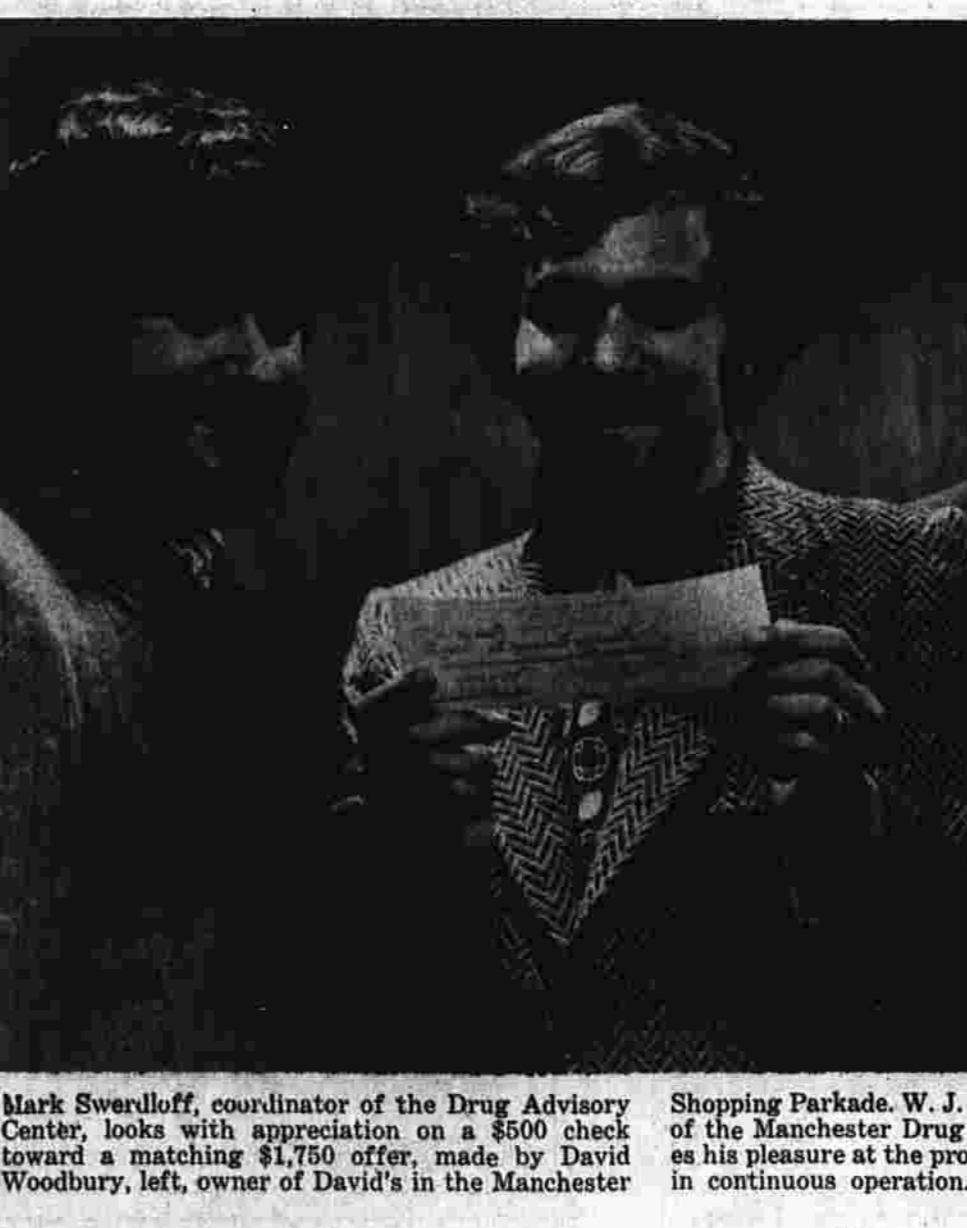
