Weiss Budget \$17,194,838

Suggests 52-Mill Tax Rate

Town Manager Robert Weiss is recommending to the Board of Directors a \$17,194,838 General Fund Budget and a 52-mill tax rate for the 1972-73 fiscal year, up \$854,077 and 3.34 mills from the budget and tax rate approved by the directors last May. For the Fire District Special Fund, he is recommending a \$1,161,977 budget and a 5.25 tax rate, up \$94,637 and 19 mills from last year's approved budget. The recommended General Fund Budget is up about 5.5 per cent from last year's approved budget while the fire fund budget is up roughly 10 per cent. The current General Fund tax rate is \$48.66 mills. The present Fire District tax rate is 5.06 mills. Each mill is the equivalent of \$1 in taxes for every \$1,000 in property assessment. To a property owner, whose house is worth \$24,000 and therefore assessed at about \$16,000, Weiss's proposed tax rate would mean \$56.48 more in town taxes if he lives in the Town Fire District or \$53.44 more if he lives in the Eighth Utilities District. The district levies its own fire tax of 1.25 mills. A public hearing on Weiss's budget is scheduled for Monday at 8 p.m. in the Waddell School auditorium on Broad St. Following the public hearing the Board of Directors will have until May 6 to adopt a budget and set the tax rates. If they fail to do so by that time, Weiss's budgets and tax rates become legal. For the Town Water Department, Weiss is recommending a \$606,022 budget, up \$103,223 from the budget approved last year. For the Sewer Department, Weiss is recommending a \$598,918 budget, down \$10,136 from last year's approved budget. The recommended budget for the Special Downtown Taxing District is \$320,000, down slightly from the \$357,575 budget approved by the directors last May. The recommended tax rate there, 8 mills, is the same as last year. The taxing district maintains downtown parking facilities. Weiss is requesting a \$338,000 Capital Improvement Budget and is again recommending that the town bond for some improvements to its facilities. Last year's approved Capital Improvement program was \$226,900, a cut from the \$250,000 Weiss recommended last year. In his budget message, Weiss says, "The proposed (Capital Improvement) figure is still below the 1970-71 level of ex-

Military Missile Missing

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — Military spokesmen have confirmed that investigators are looking into a reported theft of a missile weapon off a jet fighter plane. They declined Sunday night to give any details about the theft, which an Austin newspaper said took place Friday at Bergstrom Air Force Base in Austin during a big joint Army-Air Force exercise centered at Ft. Hood, near here in Central Texas. A public relations officer at the Army's Ft. Hood said an Army and Air Force team from the office of special investigation was working on the matter. Newsman Charles Garrett of Redit Station KNOW in Austin said he learned about the incident Sunday from an unidentified source at Ft. Hood described as very reliable. "The missile was apparently stolen off an F4C Phantom fighter parked on the Bergstrom flight line Friday," Garrett said. "Security was clamped down on the base that afternoon."

He added that whether the attempted theft met with success was not disclosed. The incident presumably involved one of 40 Phantom aircraft now operating from Bergstrom with the 49th Tactical Reconnaissance Wing on temporary duty here from Holloman Air Force Base at Alamogordo, N.M. Bergstrom itself has a regular wing of Phantoms but they

Army Admits It Overdid Surveillance

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Justice Department today conceded in the Supreme Court the Army was overzealous in its surveillance of civilians, but insisted neither the Constitution nor federal law was violated. "From my point of view it was poor judgment," Solicitor General Erwin N. Griswold said of the monitoring of individuals and groups by some 1,000 Army agents beginning in the summer of 1965. "It was an inappropriate use of military resources." However, the top department lawyer continued, the surveillance has stopped, the so-called "blacklist" has been destroyed except for one copy and the data banks dismantled. Speaking at a high court hearing, Griswold declared: "What was done—was unwise as it might have been—does not violate a statute or the Con-

Welfare Fraud Cases Cut Rolls of Suspects

By DAN HALL HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) — An on-going investigation of welfare fraud in Connecticut has brought nearly 400 convictions, and Commissioner Henry C. White says there already are signs other illegal recipients are getting off the rolls. With the investigation nearly complete in two of the state's ten welfare districts—Waterbury and Bridgeport—a total of 387 persons have been con-

victed of cheating to obtain assistance. Most of the cases involved fraud or failure to report earnings, according to a department spokesman. Although welfare fraud involving as much as \$24,000 has been uncovered, most of the cases involved sums in the hundreds of dollars, he said. "We've noticed that discontinuances have increased," White said in a recent interview. The increase in the num-

ber of people dropping off the welfare rolls probably resulted mostly from the investigation, which started last fall, he added. "From now until the end of the investigation I think you'll find the percentage (of arrests) falling off," White said. So far 1,156 cases have been referred by the Welfare Department's investigating team to the Department of Finance and Control, which decides whether or not to press charges. A number of the 1,156 suspicious cases are still being evaluated, and others involving charges are awaiting trial, a department spokesman said. The continuing investigation of the state's 47,000 welfare recipients is expected to move soon to Hartford. He noted that some of the arrests, including several in Stamford, resulted from information obtained independently of the case-by-case investigation. The department's "Post Office Box 567" campaign has brought about 1,500 letters with considerable information about possible fraud cases, he said. White said that, when he ordered the investigation, he "didn't have any idea what the results would be." He said his goal was to find recipients who

HARTFORD (AP) — Gov. Thomas J. Meskill said today he was willing to listen to complaints of dissident welfare employees, but he wouldn't show any leniency in the case of a job action. More than 200 of the state Welfare Department's 1,900 employees met Saturday to discuss their grievances and voted overwhelmingly to start a work stoppage a week from Tuesday unless Meskill hears their demands. Meskill was scheduled to receive a list of complaints from the employees today. The grievances involve claims of harassment in job assignments and unfair layoffs. "Any job action will be

Ulster Protestants Strike

BELFAST (AP) — Thousands of Protestants walked off their jobs today in an angry backlash over Britain's takeover of Northern Ireland's government. Electric power went off in the early morning. Within minutes, trade, production and traffic came to a halt. Prime Minister Brian Faulkner issued what appeared to be an order for Protestants to avoid cooperating with a British commission sent to administer the province. Before the massive Protestant strike began, Londonderry commanders of the Provisional Army announced they had ordered a four-week suspension of their guerrilla campaign

against civilians, but would continue to battle the British army. This was seen as the first positive IRA response to Britain's new deal for the Roman Catholic minority and followed Catholic pressure for an easing of violence to give the British a chance. But the Londonderry command later denied they had issued such an order. This reinforced indications that the Provisionals were split over tactics. Some observers said the Provisionals' Dublin headquarters may have ordered the Londonderry command to back-track. As if to underscore the denial of any kind of truce, three

bombs went off in parked cars in Protestant sectors of Belfast. There were no casualties. The blasts sharpened tension in Northern Ireland's capital as columns of striking workers marched to city hall for a rally staged by the Ulster Vanguard Movement, a hardline Protestant organization. Electricity was cut at breakfast time and within minutes trade, production and traffic ground to a halt throughout the province. Vanguard leader William Craig, who called the two-day strike, was cheered when he told an estimated 20,000 strikers massed outside Belfast city

Four Dead After Blaze At Putnam

PUTNAM, Conn. (AP) — Fire officials are investigating the cause of the fire which claimed the lives of four members of a Putnam family. Police say Edward Burwell, 31; his wife Florence, 33; and two of their children, Lisa, 4, and Buffy Lynn, 1, were killed when fire swept through their duplex apartment early Sunday morning. The other apartment in the building was unoccupied. All the victims were on the ground floor of the apartment. Police said four children on the second floor escaped unharmed. Burwell was found dead on the kitchen floor, Buffy Lynn died in her crib in the kitchen. Mrs. Burwell's body was found on her bed, and Lisa was found on arrival at a hospital, police said. Two of Mrs. Burwell's other children were sleeping in other homes the night of the fire, according to police. The fire was reported at 2:50 a.m., and fire officials say it was out about two hours later.

Parkade Shuttle Bus Launched With Champagne Christening

By BILL COE (Herald Reporter) A free shuttle bus service between the Manchester Shopping Parkade and East Hartford was launched this morning with a 10 a.m. "champagne christening" by Parkade Association officials in front of the Liggett Rexall Drug Store. Michael Dworkin, head of the association and owner of Liggett's, broke a bottle of domestic champagne over the front bumper of the shuttle bus before it started its first run. Glass knicked his hand, drawing blood, but Dworkin quipped with a laugh, "See, Dworkin gives his blood for the Parkade Merchants." Dworkin said later that he was "very pleased" with the results of the first round trip, which returned to the Parkade shortly after 11 carrying 29 passengers. He said one woman making the trip with her young daughter told him she had not been able to shop during the day before because she was without transportation. The service should not only provide convenience for one-

car families and elderly persons who don't drive, but it should also help reduce traffic and thereby cut exhaust from automobiles, Dworkin pointed out. The new service will be provided by a private bus company, Datco of New Britain. The bus, with a seating capacity of 41, will operate on Mondays, Thursdays and Fridays on an experimental basis through April 21. If it proves successful in drawing shoppers to the huge Parkade complex of more than 40 stores, the service will be continued, Dworkin said. All bus runs will originate at the Parkade in front of Liggett's, making five round trips daily over a route that goes by way of W. Center St., Silver Lane, East Hartford's Main St., Burnside Ave., Center St., to the Parkade. Starting times from the Parkade are 10 a.m., 11:30 a.m., 1, 2:30 and 4:30 p.m. The bus is marked on the front and sides with yellow signs identifying it. It will make 24 scheduled stops along the route, but will also make unscheduled stops for shoppers waving it down. More than 10,000 flyers an-

nouncing the service and time schedules have been mailed to families along the route, which incorporate a large number of apartment complexes. Center St. at Bluefield Dr.; Pathmark Center on Spencer St.; Applegate Lane and Silver Lane (Tudor Village); Recreation Building, Tudor Village; Arch - Tudor Village at Simmonds Rd.; Silver Lane and Main St. East Hartford Public Library; Cinema I on Main St.; Main St. and Burnside Ave. Coming back toward Manchester on Burnside Ave., stops will be at the following points: Elm St.; Incinerator Rd.; Hillside St.; Lamplight Apts.; Wind Rd.; Scotland Rd.; Town House Apts.; Bell Court Apts.; Wickham Apts.; Parkview Garden Apts. Entering Manchester, stops will be at Beacon Hill Apts., on W. Middle Tpke.; Fountain Village, W. 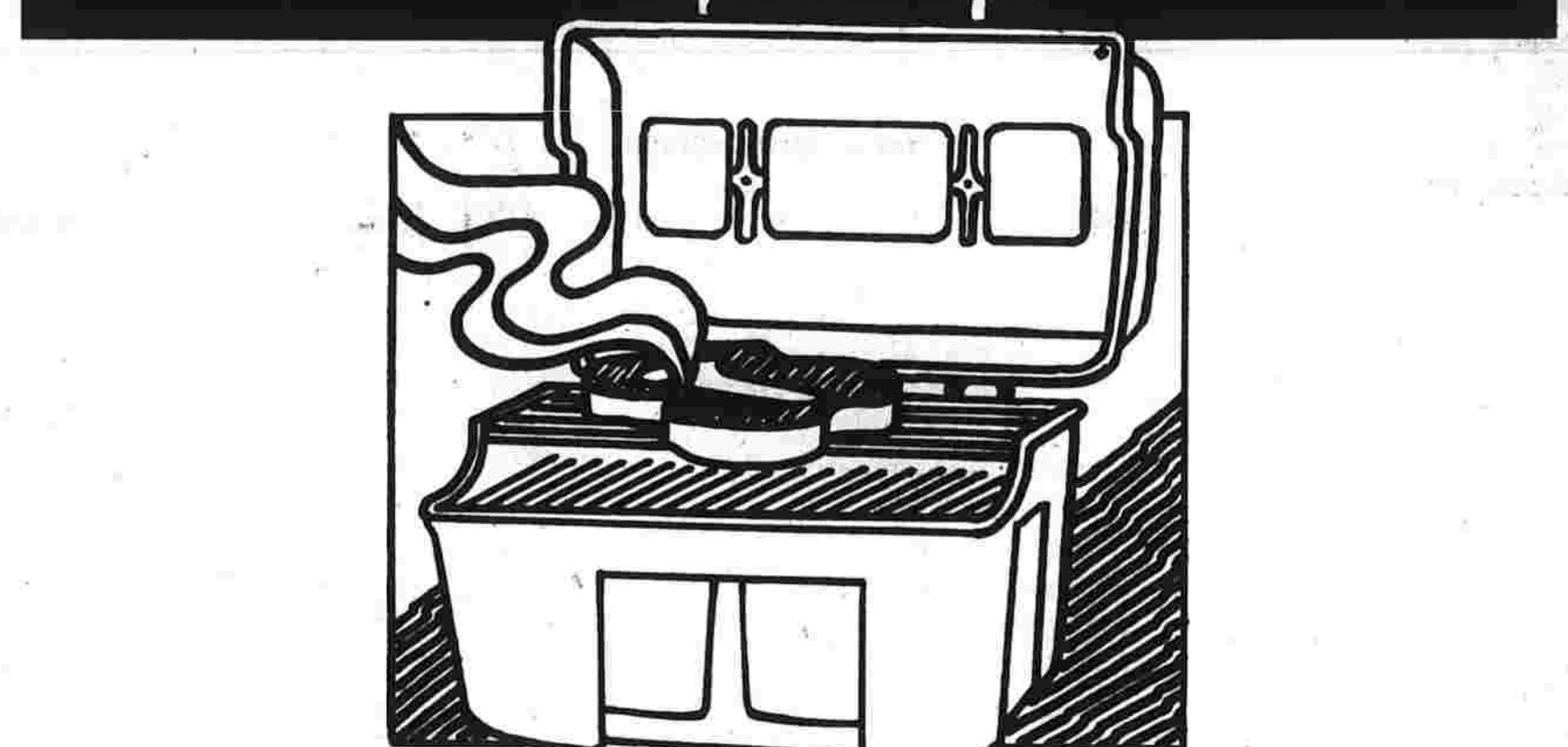

framework which might lead toward some softening of attitudes, he spoke these words to the people of Ulster, Protestant majority and Catholic minority alike:

'Now is your chance. A chance for fairness, a chance for prosperity, and above all a chance for peace. A chance at last to bring the bombings and killings to an end. Memories of the past are long-lived. In all conscience, you have suffered enough.'

Fairness - that has been something that has not yet existed from either side. Prosperity - that has been, so far, a commodity divided and shared according to economic and social divisions which have happened to coincide with religious divisions.

Peace - that has been, so far, no goal in itself, but merely something that might be left over if all other goals could be won.

Bombings and killings - these have been techniques of agitation whose effectiveness is often rated highest when their victims are innocent.

Memories - the wild and savage sting and stimulation of past injustices, past sacrificial heroisms, have always governed the dream of a sweet and fortunate island of poetry and song and gentleness among people.

By the very thoughts they summon up, the Prime Minister's words ought to have some stirring effect upon all who have their own heartstrings attached to the Irish problem.

It is to be hoped they produce some acceptance of and tolerance for and cooperation with the policy to which Prime Minister Heath has finally been driven, that of taking back to his own government powers which it will continue to hold until Northern Ireland itself finds it self ready to make one more Irish self-

Barbaric. It should have seemed totally unnecessary, before yesterday's events in a Denver Hospital, not after them, to add to whatever mistakes had already been committed by people, individually and collectively, the further cruelty of attempting to conduct an inquisitorial session with an individual already proclaimed to be suffering from a dangerous heart condition.

North End Redevelopment's Final Job. North End Redevelopment is beginning to look good - very good. Its new street, its new and thriving business community and shopping center, its new apartments, its expanded school, its new Norman style building, the beginning of landscaping in the park - all present a pleasant and busy contrast to the kind of slow decay which ruled the entire scene until just a few short planning and doing years ago.

It is to face the Community Y building toward its new North Main St. This will have to involve a change in landscaping, the paving of new approaches, and some structural adaptations for the building itself.

By the terms of the agreement between the Board of Trustees of the Community Y and town officials when North End Redevelopment was being launched, the responsibility for making these changes belongs to the town.

There was no other way in which the Trustees could justify their cooperation with North End Redevelopment, which consisted of ceding to the town, out of the institution's property, the right of way the town needed in order to build the new North Main St.

At present, with every other phase of North End Redevelopment, coming into shape and design, and with the general prospect becoming more and more pleasing, the one big remaining gap in the achievement lies in the fact that a fine building like the Community Y presents only its back side to the public view.

Now would be the right time for the town to begin to fulfill its share of the bargain by which the town and the Trustees agreed on the relocation of North Main St.

Civilization's Debt To Ireland. To remember, from the history books, that there was a period, between the decline of the Roman Empire and the rise of the European nation-states, when it was in Ireland that the lamp of learning and culture was kept lit while the rest of the western world slipped into brutality and darkness - to remember this from the past is to realize that it is about time to repay that debt by reviving the civilization that has survived turn about and help lift medieval-style violence out of the living of Ireland.

Inside Report

WASHINGTON - An expose of alleged corruption at Washington's highest levels written by a shadowy figure describing himself as a reformer political fixer may set off multiple denials, accusation and litigation. 'The Washington Payoff: A Lobbyist's Own Story of Corruption in Government' is to be published next month by Lytle Stuart, Inc., with a first printing of 50,000. Page proofs, their existence until now unknown in political circles, have raised questions of authenticity in the New York publishing world. Thus, another mystery book has arrived. Winter-Berger's most lurid charge is that President Lyndon B. Johnson in 1961 asked him to relay to Johnson's beleaguered ex- lieutenant, Bobby G. Baker (now in Federal prison), an offer of \$1 million 'if he takes this rap' without implicating anybody. Winter-Berger also dispenses charges involving former House Speaker John McCormack of Massachusetts, and on a considerably less sensational level, House Republican leader Gerald Ford of Michigan, as well as other top political figures. Many of these figures contacted by us professed no recollection whatever of Winter-Berger or claimed only infrequent contact with him, denying the intimacy alleged in his book. Specific incidents described by Winter-Berger drew specific denials. Accordingly, the book's authenticity boils down to the veracity of his telling the truth. The public record indicates Winter-Berger was a fringe figure in Washington, uninvolved with great affairs of state. In the mid-1960s, he was registered as a lobbyist for the now defunct World Calendar Assn. (later renamed the Calendar Reform Management), listing payment to him of \$1,000 a month. No other clients were registered. By Winter-Berger's own account, however, his principal lobbying was to intervene with Speaker McCormack or Rep. Ford in behalf of clients having government troubles - in short, what was done about them. The authenticity of such material hinges on whether Winter-Berger is what he claims. Although he writes he and McCormack 'bunched together about twice a week for almost five years,' the former speaker's closest associates claim no recollection of him. McCormack himself passed word to us that Winter-Berger's name 'rings no bells.' Whereas Winter-Berger writes of a close relationship with Rep. Ford, the minority leader told us the lobbyist would drop by every three or four months in behalf of clients. Specific allegations in the book were described to us by Ford as 'a lot of baloney,' 'a lot of hogwash' and 'ridiculous.' How did this self-described fixer get in touch with widely respected Gerry Ford? Winter-Berger claims he paid a friend of Ford \$1,000 for the introduction. Telling us that Winter-Berger 'did not pay me one penny,' the friend intends to sue for libel. That may be the last lawsuit generated by the strangest Washington book in many years.

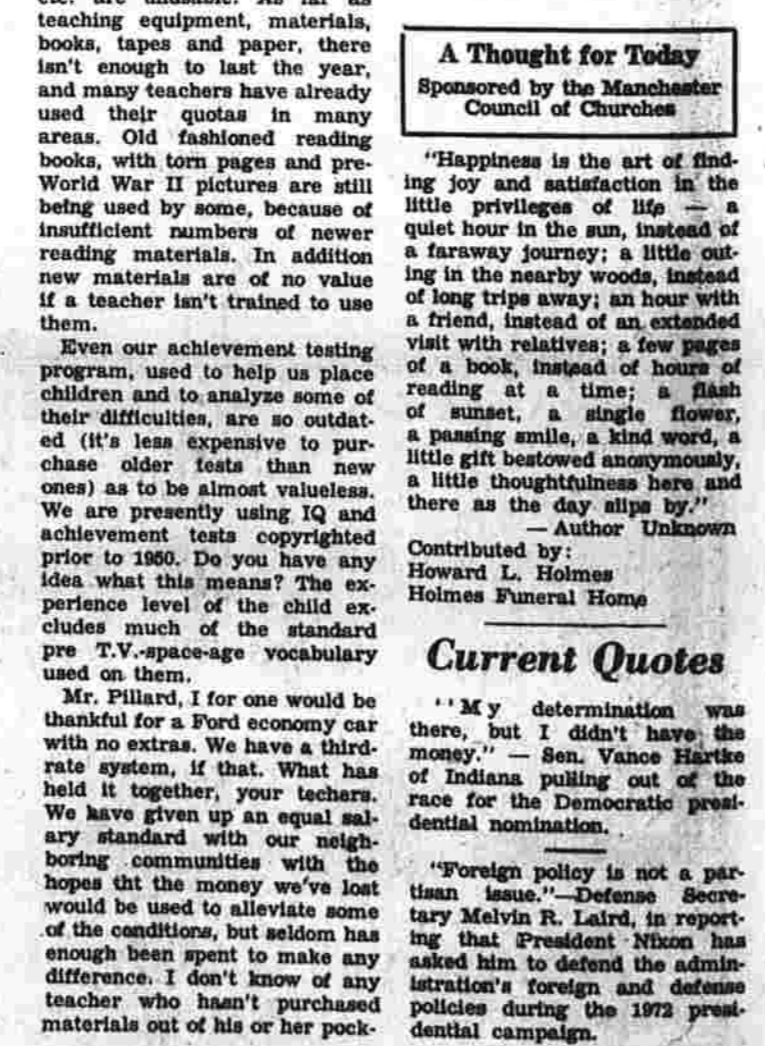
Another Mystery Book

'A Third-Rate System' - As a teacher in Manchester's school system I totally agree with Mr. Charles Pillard's closing paragraph in his letter last Friday. We would all like a Cadillac but if we can't have one a Ford will do nicely. Unfortunately for the last several years we have not even financed a Ford in our school. (Busbody) maintenance alone is non-existent. The building was last painted almost 20 years ago when it was built. The terraces were eradicated from my room three or four years ago, but the heating holes still remain. The roof leaks in several places. Large cracks have developed so that light from one room can be seen in another. Playground equipment installed less than three years stands in such disrepair that seesaws, swings, etc. are unusable. As far as teaching equipment, materials, books, tapes and paper, there isn't enough to last the year, and many teachers have already used their quotas in many areas. Old fashioned reading books, with long pages and still being used by some, because of inefficient numbers of never reading materials. In addition new materials are of no value if a teacher isn't trained to use them. Even our achievement testing program, used to help us place children and to analyze some of their difficulties, are so outdated (it's less expensive to purchase older tests than new ones) as to be almost worthless. We are presently using IQ and achievement tests copied from prior to 1960. Do you have any idea what this means? The expense level of the child excludes much of the standard per T.V.-space-age vocabulary used on them. Mr. Pillard, I for one would be thankful for a Ford economy car with no extras. We have a third-rate system, if that. What has held it together, your teachers. We have given up an equal salary standard with our neighboring communities with the hopes that the money we've just enough been spent to make any difference. I don't know of any teacher who hasn't purchased materials out of his or her pocket.
