Conservationists Suggest Buying Land

Austin Docher, co-chairman of the Conservation Commission, appeared before the selectmen to request map space, land acquisition and town takeover of glass recycling.

The commission asked for space to be provided in the lower half of the town office building to hang two maps. One is the soil map and the other, not completed, is a stream belt map including historical sites in the town.

The commission, according to Docher, discussed the possibility of acquiring the estate of Fannie Goldberg for open space, and the mill site adjacent to Hop River. The commission felt there would be historical, ecological and recreational value in these areas.

Commission members asked selectmen to have the town take over the recycling of glass when a new landfill area is acquired. The commission was given permission to share the old town clerk's office with consultants and the registrars of voters.

Selectmen agreed to allow a \$10 reduction from the \$25 fee charged the Republican Town Committee for the use of Yeomans Hall recently.

Richard Damm, chairman of the GOP committee, said the reduction was requested because kitchen facilities were not available.

Walter Kokoska was reappointed dog warden for the term April 1 to March 31, 1973.

Raymond Lyman, Rt. 66, appeared before selectmen to complain about the water running off the Landmark parking area and flooding his cellar.

He said no proper drainage was provided and added that the problem did not exist before the parking area was put in.

Lyman also asked if something could be done about the untidy appearance of the area behind the Landmark. He said he has complained about the conditions for about four years and nothing has been done.

The Landmark was supposed to plant screening in the area but this has never been done.

When contacted, Peter Beckish, the owner, said he was "surprised" to hear of the complaint.

Beckish said the zoning board, under a former chairman, had given approval of the parking area and it was done according to specifications of Columbia correspondent Virginia Carlson, tel. 232-9254.

Book Review

THE DARK SHORE. By 86 years that would lead one to see Howatch, Stela and Day. Here is a tight little mystery—one of those too good to finish—that remains a puzzle until the final chapter is read.

Jon invites the same guests, with one exception, to return with him to the scene of the crime at Clougy House, his beloved seaside hideaway in South West England.

The mystery blends beautifully with a tender love story of Jon and his innocent bride in the shadow of the unsolved murder of first wife, who vividly described Cornish setting of breaking waves and jagged rocks adding path and mood to this unusual story.

11 HARROWHOUSE. By Gerald A. Brown, Arbor House, \$6.95.

Pastoral and full of adventure, full of those exotic scenes that spice the yarns about wealthy, powerful people, this novel is solely entertainment.

There also is an extremely wealthy tycoon who doesn't mind taking on The System because it has given him a hard time.

It also is the type that leads to a film version. Browne is adept at the technique and has turned out an above average example of the genre.

By MARCO CHARNEY Associated Press Writer NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP) — The man who wrote the book on double agents says Hitler's security forces made a mistake when they uncovered England's spy network in Germany on the eve of World War II.

The mistake was to arrest them. "You can use them," Sir John Masterman says of spies. "A dead spy is of no use to anyone. A live spy can be used."

Masterman is a quiet talking, fruit looking 81-year-old scholar and administrator from Oxford, who has written matter-of-factly that he and a few other British knew about and controlled, all the spies Germany thought it had on British soil during World War II.

The claim is made in an official report Masterman wrote for his government shortly after the war, designed partly to tell the story for the record, and partly to draw lessons from it. It was published here recently by Yale University Press under the title "The Double Cross System in the War of 1939 to 1945."

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Masterman says the key to British success was the good fortune to have discovered early in the war all the agents Germany had planted in England. These agents led the British to others—who could be compromised, convinced or jailed into working for Hitler's government or, as Masterman dryly writes, executed.

Malays Seek to Save Culture

By HARI SUBRAMANIAM KUALA LUMPUR, Malaysia (AP) — The Malays—the third largest ethnic group in Asia—have begun to record their cultural heritage before much of it disappears into oblivion.

Worried over the culture's single contribution that any group of people have made in modern times to Malay culture, the ancient Malay chronicles stop far short of the present generations. Links among Malays in Southeast Asia on their mainly by Westerners who became enchanted with certain aspects of it. There never has been an organized continuous international study of Malay culture.

Recommendations were presented to UNESCO for the body's advice and assistance. Governments are to receive reports of the proceedings but are not bound by them.

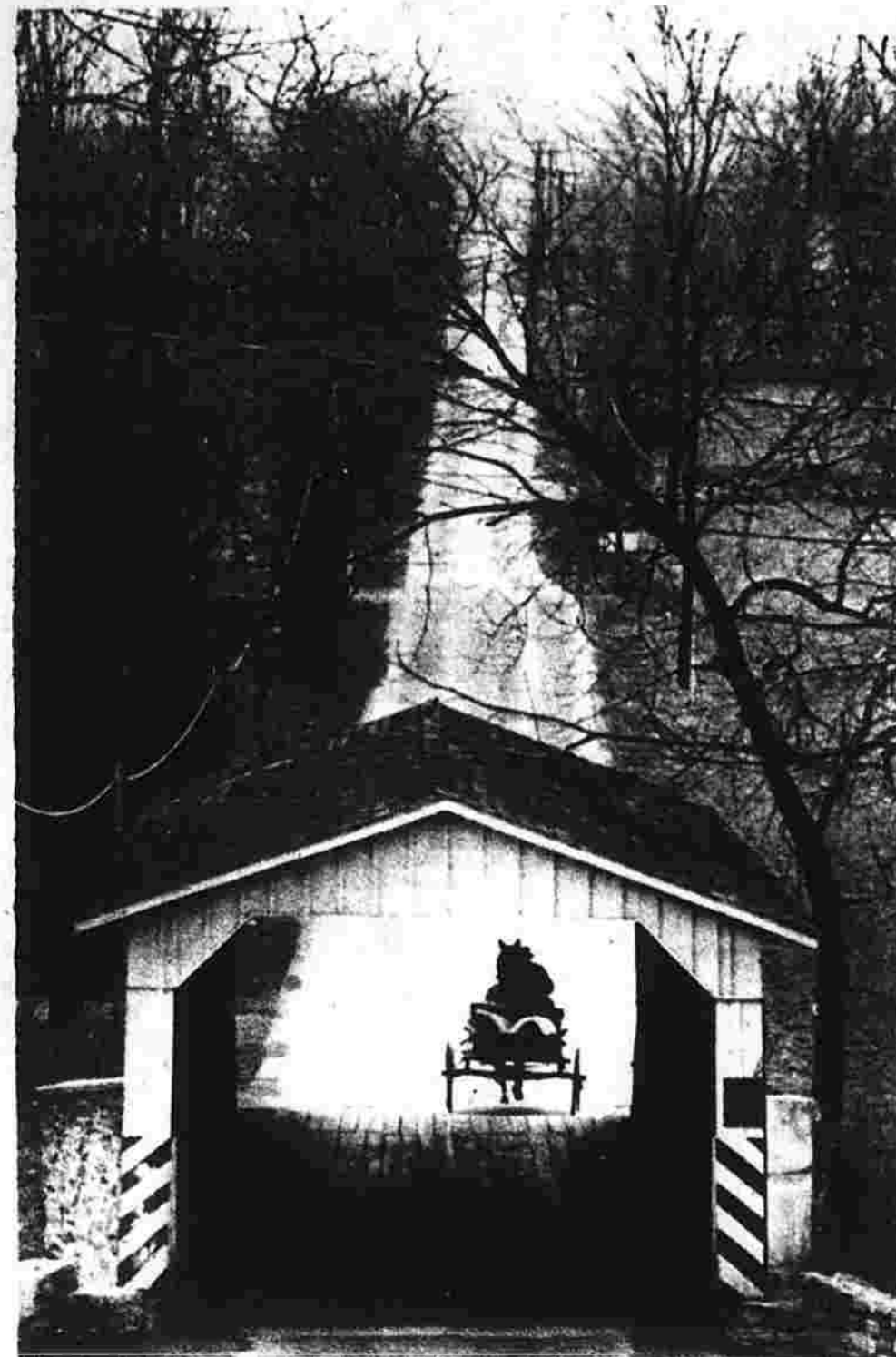

Board To Name Architect For High School Addition

The Board of Education announced last night that it has selected an architect to draw up the preliminary plans for an addition to the high school, which will be named Tuesday. Acting on the recommendation of the board, the Town Council last month appropriated \$16,000 for architectural fees for construction of a 24-classroom addition to the present building and a new and larger gymnasium which was suggested as the most feasible method to correct student overcrowding in the high school. Building cost estimates for a new addition should be forthcoming from the architect and the board said that the council is preparing for a date in June to place the matter before the voters in a referendum. Expressing concern over the economic situation in the town, Robert DeRosa, a board member who felt that the board should place the matter before the voters in a referendum. He said that at the present time, with no real direction decided on, reviewing all possible alternatives, which have been explored in depth many times before, would be wasting the board's time. 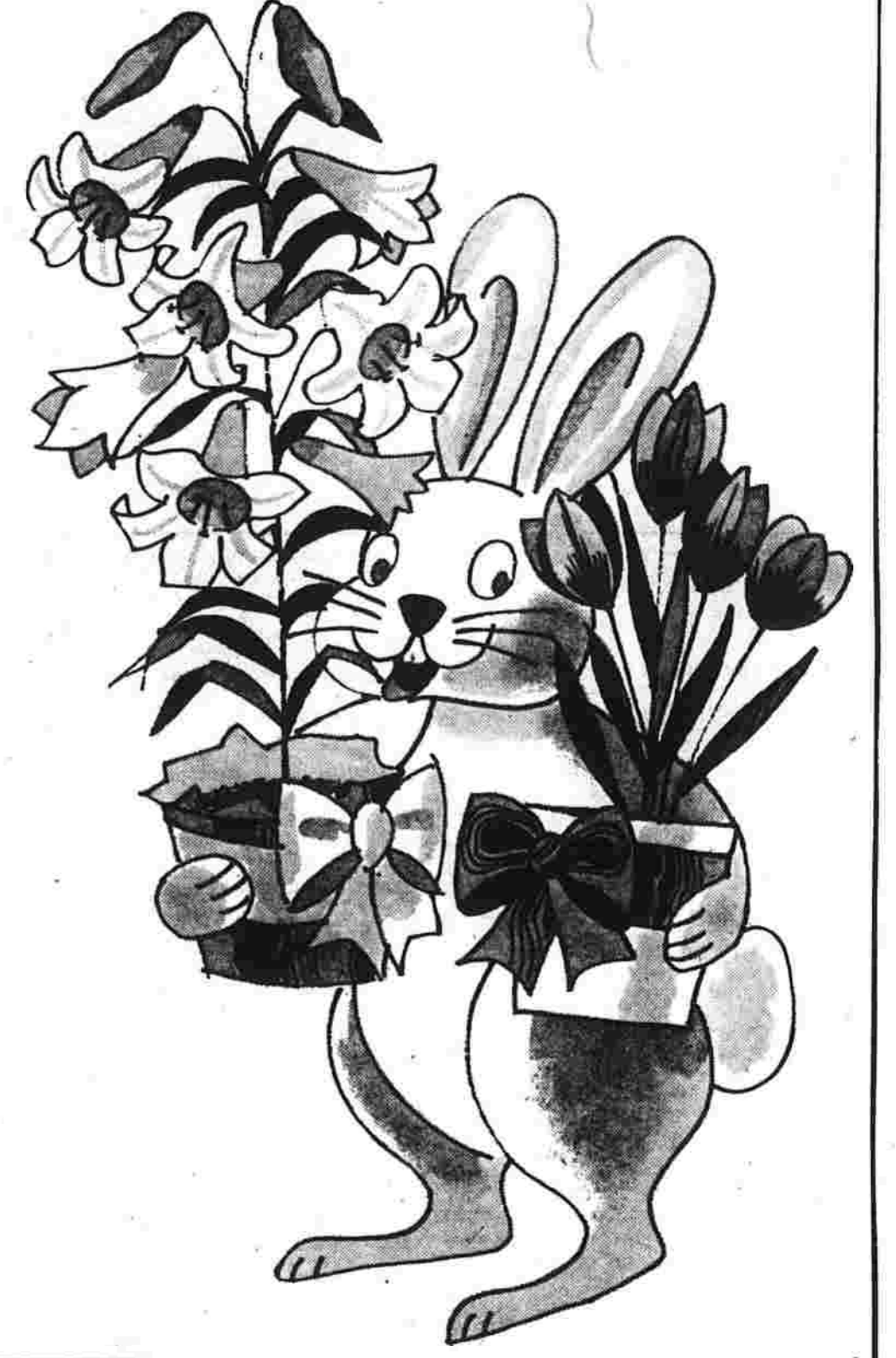

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### Process Group's Work Explained by Director

BY GLENN GAMBER (Herald Reporter)

What effect the recommendations and plans of the Greater Hartford Process Inc. will have on Manchester was not clearly explained in a discussion last night of the planning group's work by Peter Libassi, Greater Hartford president.

Libassi came to speak to the Citizens' Advisory Committee, a group of 15 members, which is a part of the process. He said a number of its members showed up to hear Libassi's remarks.

Greater Hartford Process Inc. is a privately funded planning agency which has for the past two years been formulating recommendations for Hartford and the surrounding region. It has a development arm, the Greater Hartford Development Corp., which Libassi described as "a socially conscious developer" and "a developer of last resort" which will undertake projects which are deemed too risky for profit making development.

Most of the discussion revolved around the proposed massive redevelopment of Hartford's North End, an area Libassi described as a "sore spot" for the region.

The other proposed major undertaking of the Devoe would be the construction of a new community within a town in the Hartford Region.

It would seem to be Manchester's response to this community and to other recommendations of Process that will be measured.

Libassi remarked that the recommendations of Process are designed to be "the basis for community discussions." The new community, which Libassi said would only be a "seed" where the beginning and end of the land acquisition and planning stage, Process hopes will serve, by example, to "encourage sound development practices" in the region.

"Sound development practices" which Libassi said will be incorporated in the new community include "respect for the land," preservation of open space, provision of an adequate tax base within the developed community, provision of jobs and various types of housing within the new community.

On the surface, Libassi's description of the new community sounds similar to what one might expect a development to include under the town's Comprehensive Urban Development Zone.

The new community, from implications in some of Libassi's remarks, does not seem likely to be developed in Manchester.

For one thing, Libassi implied that the new community development would occur in an area less developed than Manchester on a plot larger than 100 acres. The size of the new community will be consistent with the town it is built in so it will not disrupt that town, Libassi said. He noted that the completion of the new community will take about 10 years.

In addition, Libassi seemed unfamiliar with Manchester, and particularly the amount of land in town available for development. Process has been rather secretive in its planning for this

It is said the Soviets believe the Fidel Castro regime has agreed to expand its diplomatic contacts with the U.S. as well.

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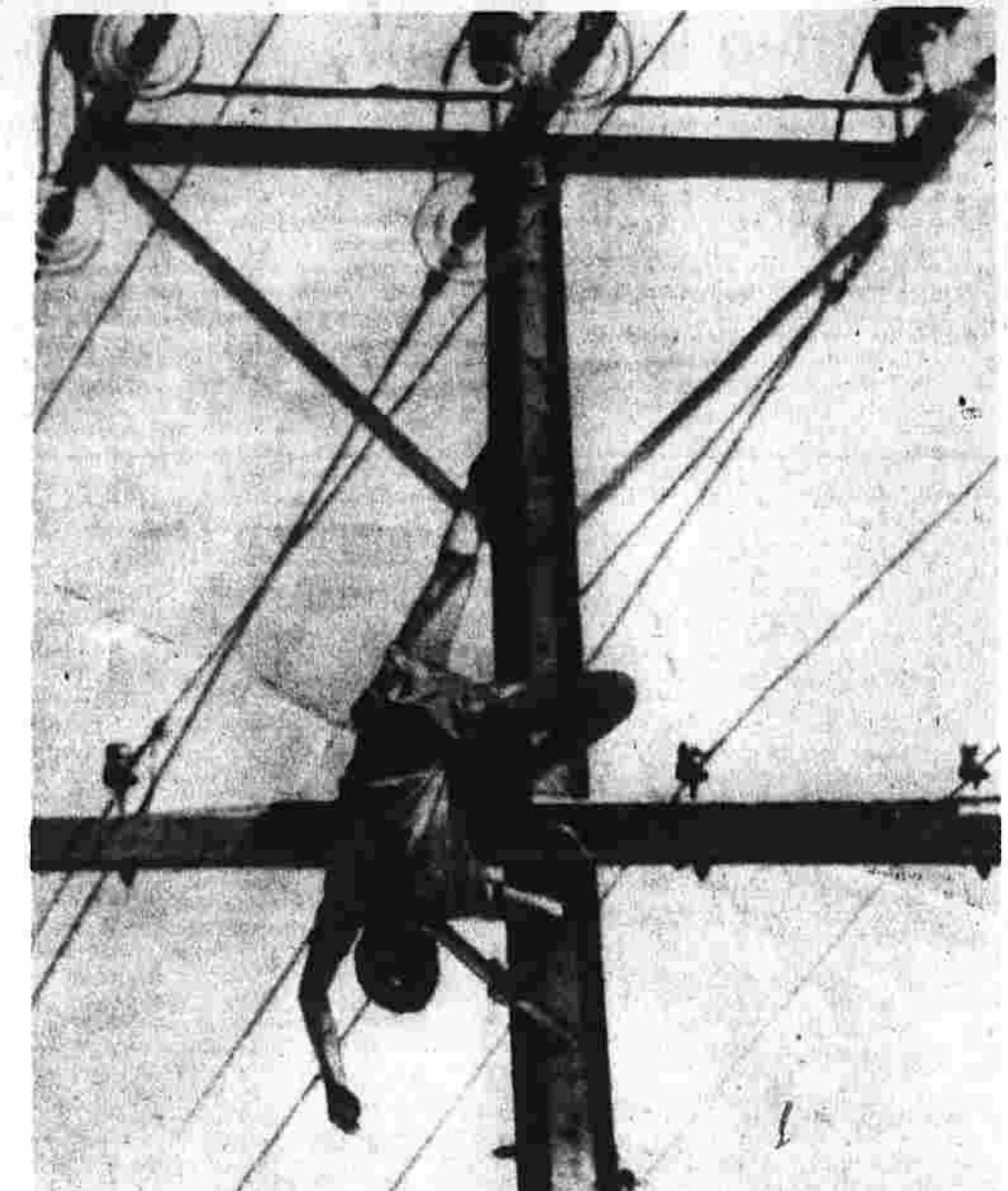

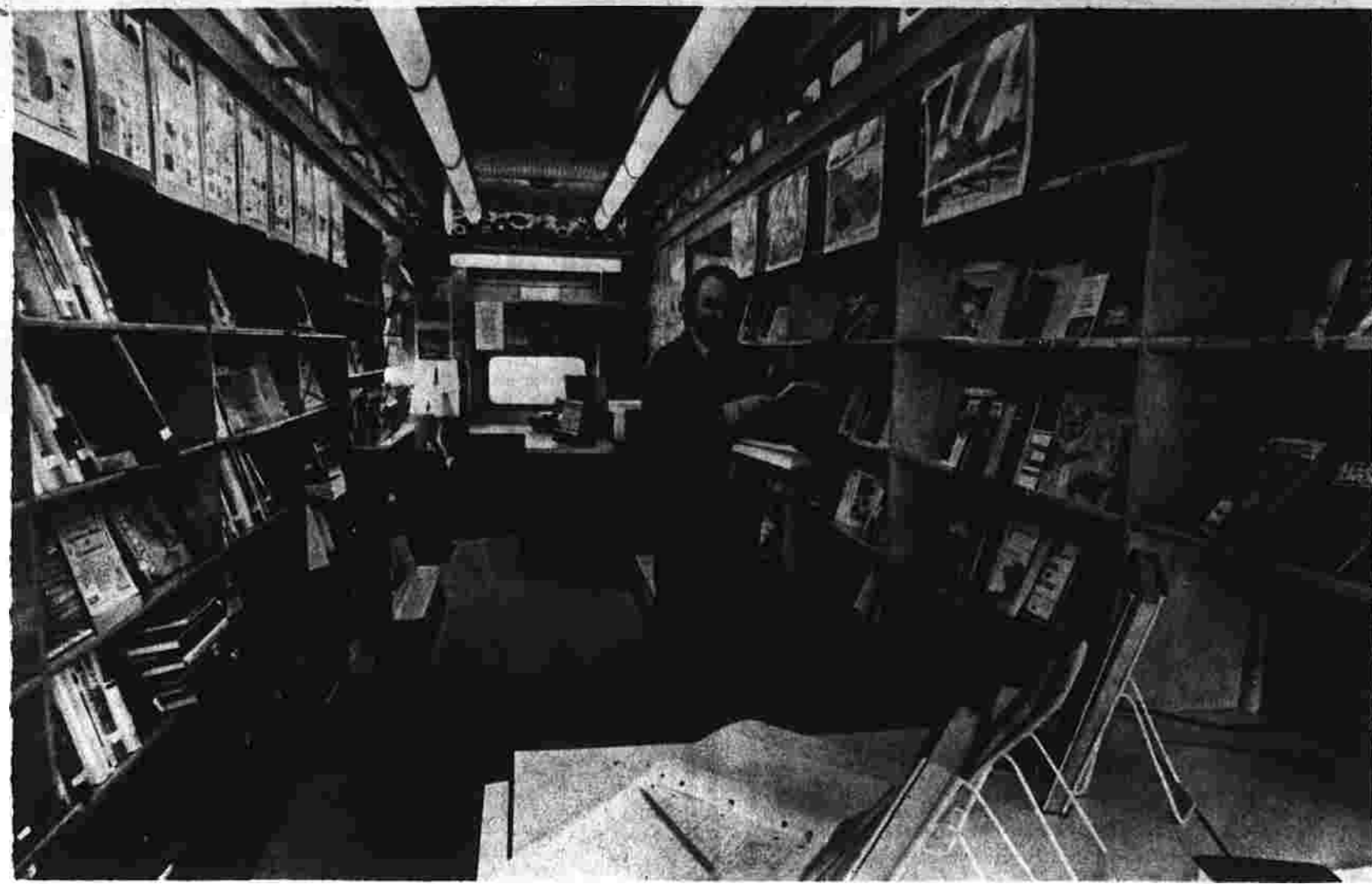

Officials began making forecasts of an enemy offensive as early as December. The obvious time was Tet, the mid-February lunar new year holiday that erupted unexpectedly into a bloodbath four years ago. If not then, they said, possibly during President Nixon's visit to Peking Feb. 21 through 28, when it would have added embarrassment value.

Gen. William C. Westmoreland, former top U.S. commander in Vietnam, Defense Secretary Melvin R. Laird and several other ranking officials issued predictions. Most predictors said North Vietnam was aiming for a propaganda coup—a dramatic illustration that the Saigon government still could not protect its territory. Against suspicions that they were overplaying the threat to justify intensifying U.S. aid and strikes, officials gave a glimpse of the reputed evidence.

After an unusually heavy dry season traffic down the Ho Chi Minh strip and infiltration network in southern Laos, the North Vietnamese were gathering in a jungle sanctuary west of Kontum Province in the central highlands. By mid-February 60,000 enemy were reported in the central highlands region, twice as many as usual for the season. Thousands of troops were said to be slipping across the demilitarized zone, including units usually held in reserve in North Vietnam. Tanks were reported to have crossed the western frontier and an engineer regiment was building roads toward Kontum.

After months of relative lull, the level of enemy activity rose. The Saigon command reported at enemy-initiated incidents on Feb. 10—including 16 shelling—the most since the election period more than four months before. John Paul Van, senior U.S. adviser in the highlands, who had predicted the 1968 offensive, was one of those predicting a new drive. When the attacks fell off, he said on Feb. 19 that there had been a delay. From intelligence reports, he added, it was known that the enemy "had planned to initiate the preliminary phases of his offensive in late January and have it carry into Feb. Subsequent to Tet he planned to go on into the major phases."

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**Report Calls Chicago Police 'Trigger-Happy'**

CHICAGO (AP) — The Chicago Police Department is under fire for being "trigger-happy" and for having a high rate of police shootings.

The association's statement said one of the reasons for the figures was "aggressive police work" responsible for Chicago's low crime rate.

The research group, a joint project of Northwestern University's Center for Urban Affairs and a dozen community organizations, obtained comparative data from an International Association of Police Chiefs survey. It also made an independent two-year study.

The IACP survey showed that from July 1970 to March 1971 there were 32 police killings in Chicago compared with 21 in New York, 13 in Philadelphia, 8 in Los Angeles and 4 in Detroit.

On the population ratio, Chicago had three times as many slayings as New York, Detroit and Los Angeles, and 1.5 times as many as Philadelphia.

The group's private study of 1969 and 1970 showed 79 persons killed in Chicago, Patner said, and 28 of them were black.

Police Supt. James E. Conlisk said the 76-page report "implies some obvious comparisons between the Chicago police department and police departments of other cities. We have no way of knowing the validity of the figures quoted."

He added that the data for the study was obtained from the IACP, from newspaper accounts of police killings, from coroner inquest transcripts and other sources. Patner said police refuse to reveal records of their investigations into police killings.

Conlisk did not mention figures for the years covered in the study group's report.

Patner said the study team found substantial evidence of police violation of administrative standards or of criminal statutes in 28 of the 79 cases.

He said that in 10 cases policemen should have been held criminally liable.

One policeman was brought to trial and he was acquitted, the study said.

Ralph Knobushen, research director of the project, said there was no way to determine how many victims were engaged in criminal activity because charges of at least 100 deaths occurred due to an aggravated fatality.

DR. LAWRENCE E. LAMB Popping Joints May Be from Gas

By Lawrence Lamb, M.D. Dear Dr. Lamb — Every time I move a joint it pops and it stays sore and hurting all the time. I have been to several doctors, but they don't seem to help me. I am 35 years old and a builder who does all kinds of work from laying brick and block to carpentry. I also have muscle spasms which seem to get worse. Do you know of anything that will help me? I can't work or go to school. I would like to see you.

I do not take medicine when I can get by without it. If I have arthritis and muscle spasms is there anything that will do any good? Will this continue to get worse as the years go by?

Dear Reader — The noises made by that joint popping are not necessarily arthritis. Some popping of the joints apparently is related to the accumulation of free gas within the joint space. All of us have a certain amount of gas dissolved in our body fluids, including oxygen and nitrogen. These gasses are slightly soluble in blood and liquids and it is easy for some of these gasses to escape and form small bubbles. This sometimes has something to do with the popping of joints. There are

other factors too which can cause joint problems. Ordinary joint popping should not cause joint pain or pain of type you describe. It is not possible from your story to determine exactly what you have, but it is clear to me that you are not seeing a rheumatologist either call or write me to the nearest county medical society and ask them to recommend one near to you.

At your relatively young age, I think it would be very important for you to make a major effort to determine what your difficulty is. So let me urge you strongly to be certain that a rheumatologist really has been consulted. If you have rheumatoid arthritis, you may have to live with it for many years, and how well you do this depends on what type of medical supervision you really have.

Arabs at Polls; Defy Guerrillas

JERUSALEM, Israel-occupied Jordan (AP) - Arab voters defied guerrilla threats and voted in the first elections held in Israeli-occupied territory since the 1967 war. The elections, a test of Arab-Israeli coexistence in West Jordan and a weathering of how life is returning to normal behind the cease-fire line, are to choose new municipal councils in 10 Arab towns and regions. In the Biblical town of Jericho, hundreds of voters converged on curbed polling booths in a school and candidates toured the streets in cars with loudspeakers. Arab guerrilla organizations have vowed to wreck the elections with violence and the Al Fatah guerrilla radio station in Cairo has told candidates they face death for collaborating with the Israelis. The guerrillas claim the elections are an Israeli scheme to set up a puppet leadership on the West Bank. King Hussein of Jordan has proposed that the area be a new Palestine entity in a united Arab kingdom if the Israeli withdrawal. The guerrillas, other Arab governments and Israel have rejected Hussein's proposal. The king denounced the elections as illegal, saying "there is no basis in law giving an occupying power the right to conduct elections." The Israeli military government opposes the voting in part of returning life to normal, and as such does not violate the Geneva conventions.

Suharto Plans Business Buy-Up

JAKARTA (AP) - President Suharto has announced a plan to buy up 50 to 60 per cent of Chinese-owned businesses in Indonesia and sell shares in them to Indonesians. Suharto said the plan was to help Indonesian businessmen because they lack the capital and skill to compete against the Chinese. The president disclosed his plan Monday at a meeting with academicians at the State Palace, but he did not say when or how the government would carry it out.

Blanes Government CHARLESTON, Ill. (AP) - Georgia's Lt. Gov. Lester Maddox, speaking at Eastern Illinois University, said "government is to blame for ghettoes and slums, not the private enterprise system." Maddox said when he was elected governor of his state in 1966 he "found too much hypocrisy high in government, sometimes high in the church, sometimes high in the news field." The governor said he found "people who had been on the state payroll for 8 to 12 years and had never reported for work."

To sensation-seekers at the courthouse, this was the big day. A local politician was on trial for seduction, and the victim a 16-year-old schoolgirl...

Courts generally agree that a judge may exclude spectators if the modesty of a witness makes that necessary. But suppose the witness is not to protect the public. May a judge exclude spectators because he thinks the testimony might corrupt their morals?

Unless local law authorizes it, judges ordinarily do not have that power—no matter how lurid the testimony may be. Thus...

A judgment of conviction, where the defendant has been refused a public trial, cannot stand," said the court. "Even against the meanness of the defendant himself...

But the court ruled that he had no right to that much privacy. "A crime is a public wrong," said the court.

"The community is deeply interested in the administration of justice, and the presence of its members at a trial is as basic as (the presence) of a defendant. The people have the right to know what is being done in their courts."

Smokes Make A Big Puff

POTTSVILLE, Pa. (AP) — It was a pretty big puff, more than \$200 worth of cigarettes and cigars going up in smoke. Carmen DiCello, a pharmacist, did the burning recently on the sidewalk in front of his store, to dramatize that he wouldn't sell tobacco products any more.

DiCello said he was giving up that part of his business "for the health of the community" and urged other storekeepers to follow suit. "The pharmacist said his 12-year-old son was the impetus for banning tobacco sales."

"He asked me why I sold them when I considered them dangerous to the health," DiCello said.

Last summer at the annual convention of the Pennsylvania Pharmaceutical Association, DiCello sponsored a resolution asking drug store owners to ban tobacco sales. It was adopted, but no one implemented it.

DiCello decided to take the first step, to perhaps start a ban on smoking.

It was something he wanted to do five years ago but the profit motive stalled him.

Now he has burned his license to sell tobacco products.

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State Savings Forecast

HARTFORD (AP) — Cost-cutting recommendations of the Etherington Commission are likely to be implemented in 14 areas of state government.

In addition, 23 bills awaiting legislative action will save the state about \$2.5 million and bring in \$3.8 million in income, said Thomas E. Coates, director of administrative implementation for the governor.

Coates' figures, which are the latest in a series of claims and counterclaims over the validity of the commission report, dispute the prediction of co-chairman Julius C. Michelson, D-Providence, who engineered the bill on the floor today.

Gov. Thomas J. Meskill early this year that changes proposed by the commission that already had gone into effect would save \$2 million a year.

Last week, however, Sen. Robert D. Endersby, Vermont Democrat who is appropriations chairman, said: "We have already agreed at the conclusion that the Etherington report will have little if any impact on the state budget."
