limit its capacity to wage war down into South Vietnam.  
To speculate on the course open to the President, then, is to take attention back to the underlying reason why this is such a terrible kind of war for us. We do not have, we never have had, any clearly good options. Once we had decided to plunge ourselves into it, which most of us now consider a bad decision, we made ourselves prisoners of the war, rather than its potential masters. The only other real decision possible for us has been a decision to get out of it, which most of us now recognize as a good decision. At that point, however, our options close down again, for as events are illustrating, there is no good, guaranteed safe way of getting out. The President has tried to head in the right direction. That does not rescue him from the unenviable torments and difficulties no one and no policy had a chance of averting, once the original commitment into the war had been made.

The question is not an idle one. On its answer rests a final assessment of the results of the President's journey to China.

### Thus the Democratic Field, consisting in the main of gentlemen who are capable enough and decent enough to be highly respected members of the United States Senate, continues to cut itself up, each injuring the other in turn, and all the while, none gaining anything that could be possibly be called a leading position so far as the overall national picture is concerned.

The sum of what we have to date from the Democratic primaries, and what we seem likely to get in new tests coming up, is that the primary process is not going to choose a candidate for the Democratic party this year.

This prospect is not good news for anybody, not for the Democrats, not for the nation, not even for the Republicans. The danger for everybody lies in the possibility that the failure of the primaries to produce a choice will squeeze the Democratic National Convention toward its last remaining option. That would be to proceed to draft another member of the Senate, this one from Massachusetts, whose talents and qualifications are certainly no greater than those of any of his colleagues already in the race, but whose name and voice and emotional associations would constitute, for a desperate party, sufficient basis for an enthusiastic nomination.

President Nixon has repeatedly said that, if North Vietnam undertook military action which would threaten the security of American, withdrawal from Vietnam, he, in his capacity as commander-in-chief, would respond with appropriate retaliation.

Removes Any Doubt

WASHINGTON (AP) — The oldest recorded date in the New World can be pieced together again.

The missing fragment of a large Olmec stone monument bearing a date equated to 31 BC has been unearthed by a farmer near the small village of Tres Zapotes in Mexico's Veracruz State.

It matches perfectly the broken stone uncovered by archaeologist Matthew W. Stirling while on a National Geographic Society-Smithsonian Institution expedition at the same site in 1939.

Stirling says, "This new fragment demonstrates beyond any question that our original date reading was correct and the stone predated the Mayas. The Olmecs devised the bar and dot calendar originally credited to the Mayas."

Most of the date is on Stirling's fragment, which formed the bottom of the monument. It consists of a column of carved bars and dots. In the Olmec calendar a bar stood for five and a dot for one.

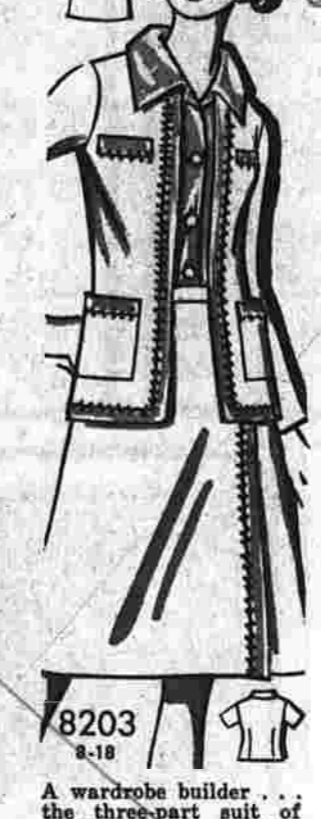

### New Zealanders Claim First Airplane Flight

 WELLINGTON, New Zealand (AP) — Almost 70 years after Orville and Wilbur Wright made their epic flight at Kitty Hawk, N.C., people here are still claiming that the first man to fly an airplane was a New Zealander named Richard Pearse—and that he beat the Wright brothers by more than a year.

Their evidence is inconclusive, and there seems no prospect of anyone producing irrefutable proof now to support the claim.

But stories from old-timers and Pearse's indisputable brilliance as an aviator still arouse some hopes that he might have been the first man in the world to pilot a heavier than air machine.

Pearse's latest champion is the executive director of Auckland's Museum of Transport and Technology, R. J. Richardson, who intends building a memorial pavilion to house the pioneer's remaining aeronautical exhibits.

To help raise funds for the project, a medal has been struck commemorating Pearse's known achievements.

Richard Pearse was labeled "Mad Pearse" by his turn of the century neighbors at Waitohu Valley, near Timaru, because of his fascination with flying and his study of aeronautics as he did his ploughing records on his parents' farm.

Sometimes between 1900 and activities.

1904 he designed and built a high-wing monoplane of steel and bamboo, with alleron and elevator controls, and powered by his own four-cylinder engine.

It had a wing spread of 700 square feet and weighed 700 pounds.

Pearse controlled pitch by moving his body in conjunction with the application of an elevator mounted on the trailing edge of the wing.

Small flaps on the wing tips enabled the plane to be banked. There was no rudder, although the front wheel of the undercarriage could be steered.

With his alleron, which he patented in July 1907, Pearse was undoubtedly ahead of the Wright brothers. But did he actually get airborne before their flight on Dec. 17, 1903?

No records are able to show with any certainty that he flew any distance before March 21, 1904.

He made several flights that year, and on two occasions traveled 100 yards at a height sufficient to clear a 12-foot hedge.

Some believe he flew as early as 1902. But if Pearse deserves recognition for actually accomplishing this, he has only himself to blame for not receiving the century neighbors at Waitohu.

There would be no mystery about all if he had confided in his contemporaries, left detailed records of his progress, or been a less secretive man about his

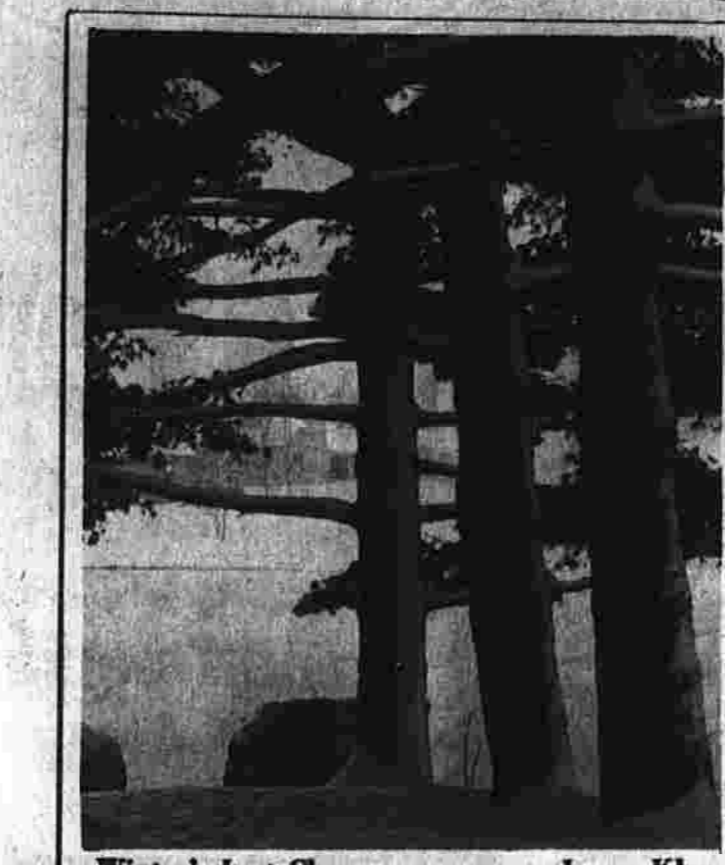

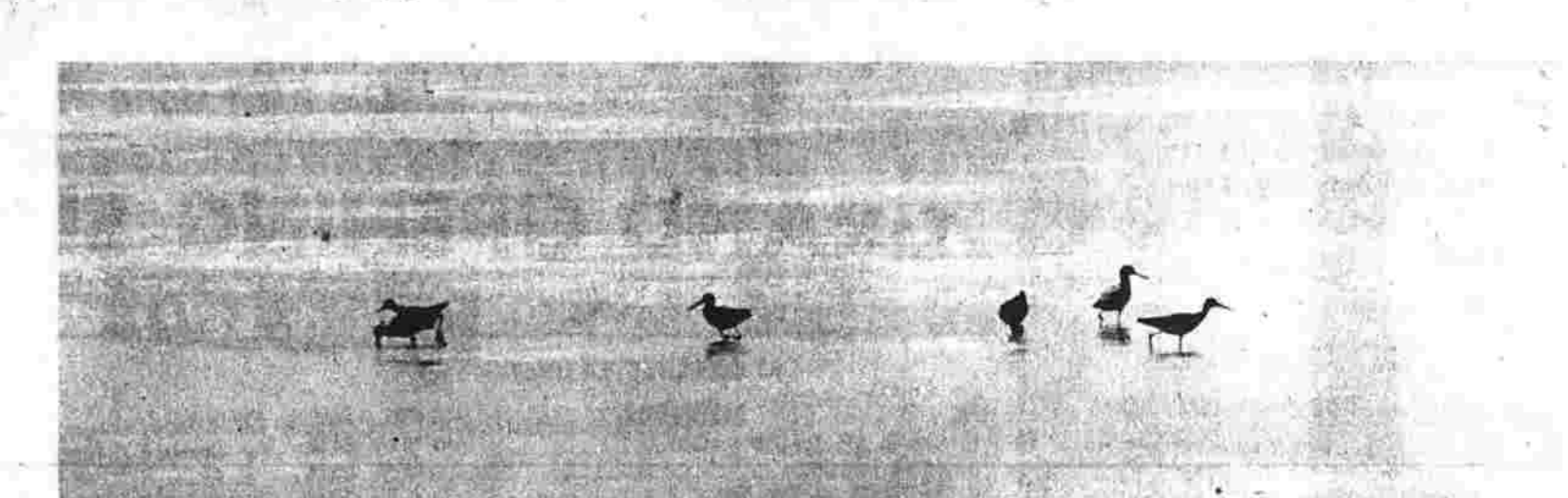

**Voter Town Boundaries Are Eased**

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) — After a long and largely partisan wrangle, the House passed Tuesday and sent to the Senate a bill allowing Connecticut residents to apply in one town to become voters in another town. Republican critics, joined by a few Democrats, said the majority party was going to make it too easy to become a voter.

Under the bill, voters who normally vote in one town but who are in another town for a week or more could vote in the town where they are now. However, Rep. Audrey Beek D-Manfield, said the bill would make it much easier for students at the University of Connecticut's main campus in Storrs to become registered voters in their hometowns throughout the state.

Whether or not to register a voter would remain in the hands of the town clerk and other election officials of the town in which the would-be elector wants to vote.

The roll call vote on the bill was 78-54, with seven Democrats and 20 Republicans in opposition and two Republicans crossing over to the Democrats.

Other bills passed by the House and sent to the Senate would:

- Authorize a study of a plan to allow students at UConn and the state colleges to defer payment of part of their tuition until after graduation.
- Allow banks to invest up to 2 per cent of their assets in "social purpose investments."
- Allow banks to invest more than that investment.
- Allow consumers buying merchandise from door-to-door salesmen to bow out of contracts within a given time even though the contracts were signed at a company's main office or district office.
- Allow shows, sports events and other entertainments on Sundays to be held as early as noon, rather than 2 p.m. This would be up to the option of local communities.
- Allow towns and cities to pass ordinances holding private property owners responsible for injuries suffered when snow, ice and other hazards on their sidewalks.
- Put control of the state's computer equipment in the office of the state comptroller, rather than in the finance and control department.
- Make it easier for foreign-trained doctors to become eligible to practice medicine in Connecticut, provided they pass a national examination.

**Getting Story on Mets Took Several Visits**



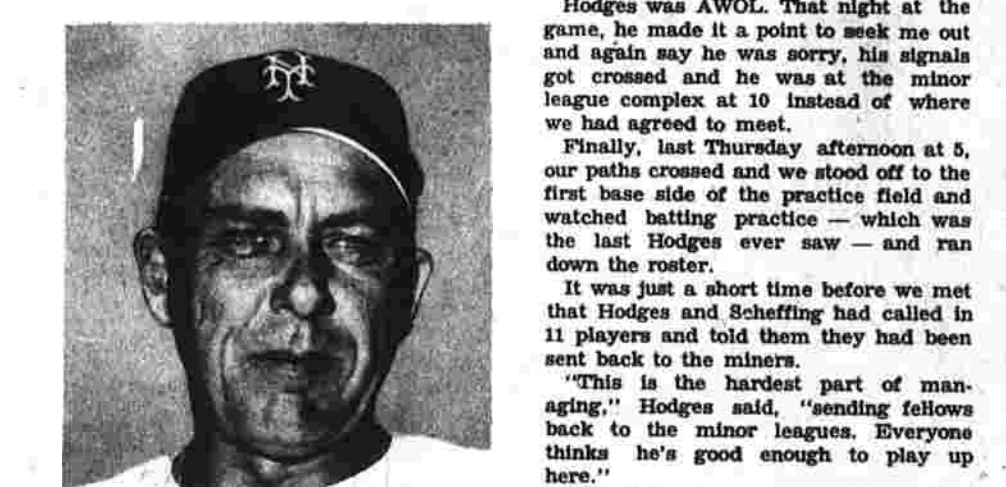
**Final Visit with Hodges**  
Baseball pennant predictions are made at least another day. They are a must for the typewriter keys of every sports editor in the country. Joe Fan would like to know how the "expert" can pick the finish in the annual American and National League scrambles.

My last visit with the late Gil Hodges will fill this space today.

Our friendship goes back many years, to his days as a smooth fielding, big first baseman with the old Brooklyn Dodgers who became famous as a team while performing at Ebbets Field.

The Mets broke camp last Thursday following a night game at Almgard Field in St. Petersburg against the Cincinnati Reds.

Before play started, I was in company with Hodges at the Mets' training quar-

It was just a short time before we met that Hodges and Schefring had been sent back to the minors.

"The Mets are in a tight spot," Hodges said, "ending fellows back to the minor leagues. Everyone thinks it's a good enough to play up here."

As stated in this column last night, Hodges was highly optimistic about his team's chances in the coming race.

"If we can stay free of any serious injury, we'll be right up there at the top. I think we can win," the big native Indiana man said.

During his first career season, Hodges was a man who once stroked four home runs in one game while with the Dodgers, will never know.

**Performed Miracle**  
Four years ago the odds were 100 to 1 against the Mets to win. Hodges, with a stroke as severe as ever and had appeared a little worried, perhaps over both the possible player strike, which was declared the following day, and also with the showing of his contract.

## 'No Game Today' Signs Up

CHICAGO (AP)—Tensions in the Player Relations Committee, which had earlier turned down the players' proposal to end the strike.

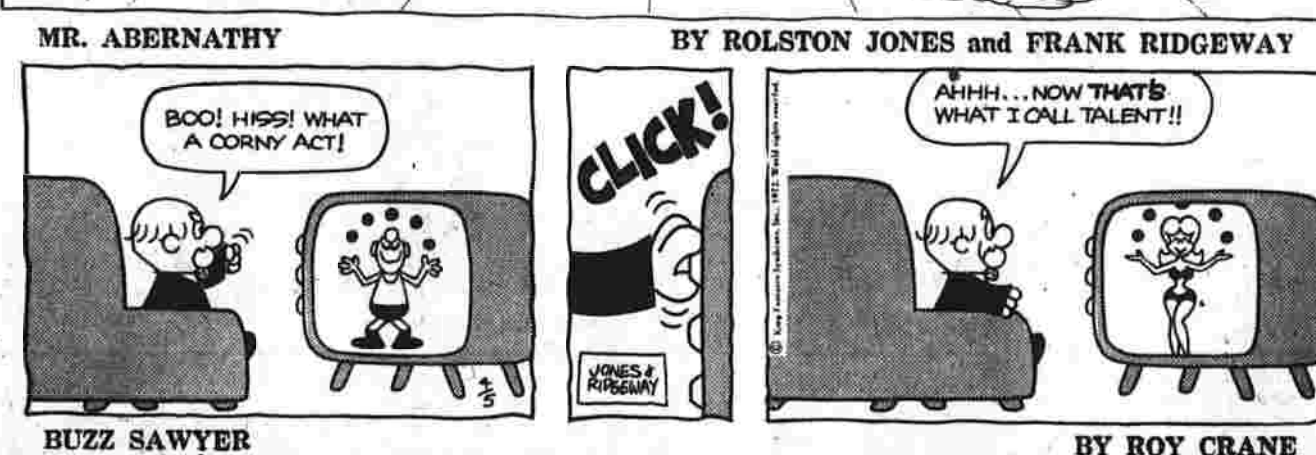

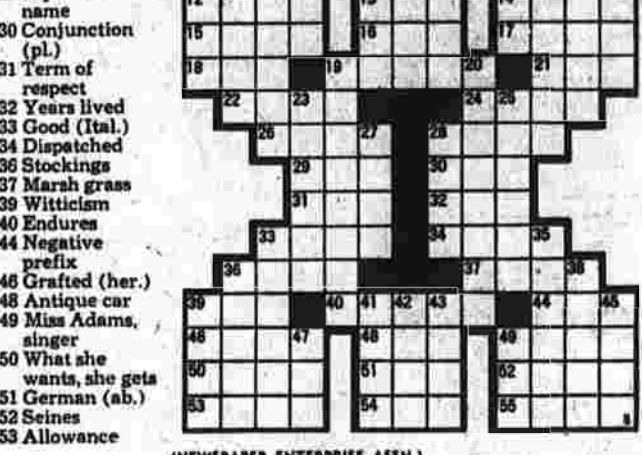

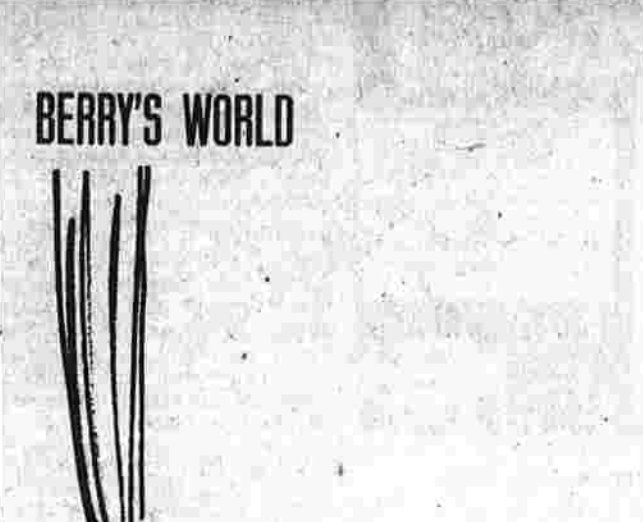
