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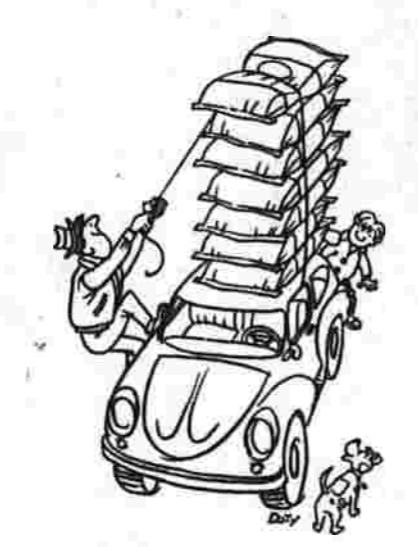

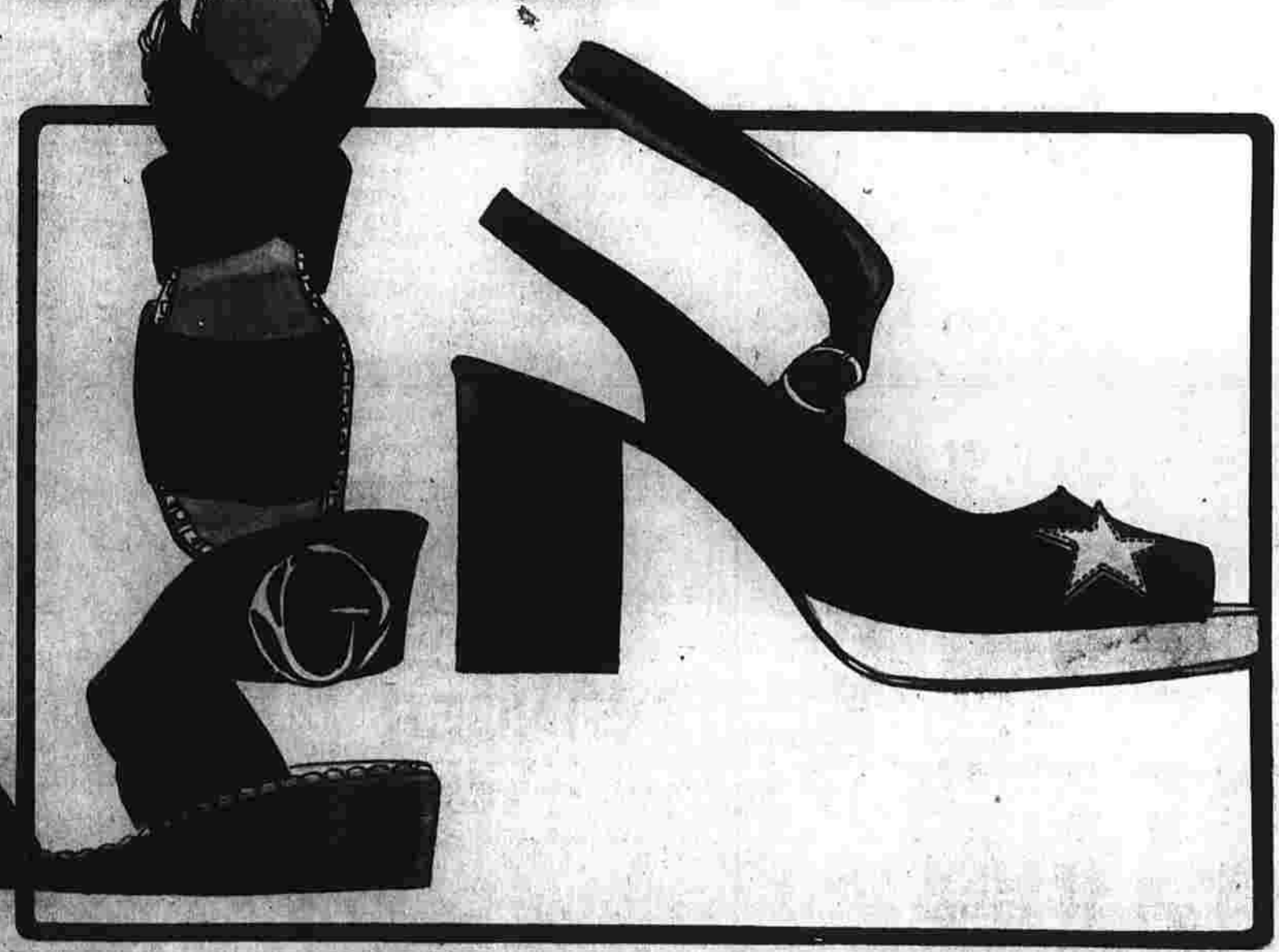
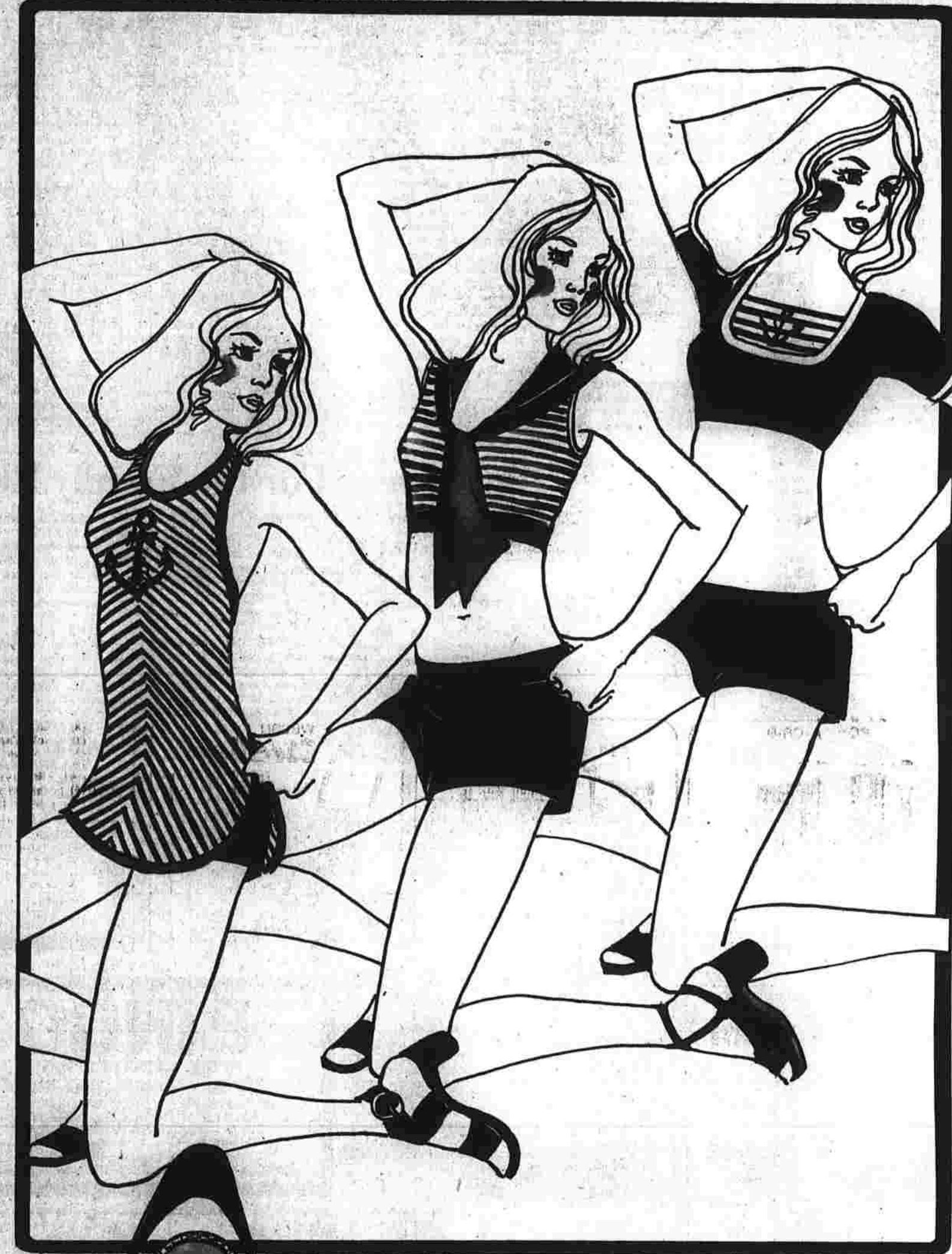

**Our Debt To Dogs**

The opinions of a British psychologist who happens to specialize in dogs are well worth considering.

They may help us human beings do a little better at keeping up our side of the bargain.

What we should realize, says Dr. Michael Fox, is that dogs experience many of the same problems for which people demand and receive all kinds of special treatment and analysis.

Like people, dogs may have emotional problems, ranging from frustration at their failure to communicate and be understood to sibling jealousy over some new addition to the family on all kinds of psychosomatic hang-ups.

For their own strength of character and self reliance, they should not be fussed too much, especially when they are young. Their ability to learn in their company should make some effort to understand the way they look and act. There are, for instance, certain expressions of happiness which dogs reserve for their association with people as contrasted with the way they display their emotions among themselves. A responsible dog owner will see that the pet gets "environmental enrichment," which might involve occasional meeting with other dogs and other people.

As for the prime reason we should pay some attention to the fact that dogs have problems of their own: the dog is a member of the family in the further fact that the possession of a pet is so helpful and sometime necessary to the mental health of human beings.

"Unlike a person," says Dr. Fox, "you don't have to live up to any expectations. A dog is always something."

That sounds something like something somebody said about a dog and its relationship to man a long time ago, before psychology had become a recognized profession.

They, by their ability to hold to their own judgment in spite of awesome pressures to do one thing or another and in spite of temptation to avoid trouble by surrendering their own responsibility...

It may be that our society has its need for an occasional Berrigan-style revolution, to disturb its conscience, and a need for its over-reacting Mitchells, to uphold its law, but in such possibilities what it needs most of all is its own capacity to produce jurors, in and out of court, who can control the ground and set the trial rules, but in the Berrigans and the Mitchells.

**Night's Sleep Wasted**

We have a few stray afterthoughts about the Wisconsin primary:

1. We suspect that Mayor Lindsay would have got just as many votes, perhaps even more, if he had not staged the campaign stunt of sleeping the night on the cot in a poor workingman's home.

2. We suspect Senator Muskie would have received more votes from Polish-Americans in Wisconsin if he hadn't paid special attention to them, or, if, in whatever attention he did pay to them, he addressed and appealed to them as just Americans.

3. We also suspect that Senator Humphrey might have run ahead of Governor Wallace, instead of behind him, if he had innate decency enough to refrain from trying to adapt Wallace's campaign innuendoes to his own purposes.

The trouble is, of course, that no one ever knows when the American voting public is going to vote its own best or its own worst side, and that, in cases of doubt, it usually seems safer to the candidate to appeal to the worst.

And even Benny South Brat, who nobody yet accuses of having much smarts upstairs, agrees that things are indeed coming to a pretty pass—WALL STREET JOURNAL.

Guya, Dolls, Nags and Baseball

**WASHINGTON**—The spectacular objective of Hanoi's attack across the neutral demilitarized zone (DMZ) against a weak, newly-formed South Vietnamese division to force President Nixon into crucial war-settlement talks, on Communist terms before his May 22 trip to Moscow.

Thus, the biggest battle in Vietnam since the 1968 Communist Tet offensive could affect not only Mr. Nixon's campaign for re-election but threaten his highly successful moves toward détente with the Soviet Union.

There are, to be sure, less dramatic Communist goals—undermining the credibility of President Thieu's Saigon regime and embarrassing Mr. Nixon by forcing the endless war on American television screens and newspaper banner headlines.

But the common high in the Nixon administration is this: The Hanoi government hopes lightning attacks in the Northern provinces of South Vietnam, in the central highlands and in the area west of Saigon, to capture and hold territory that will vastly strengthen its bargaining position for peace talks on the eve of President Nixon's historic visit to Moscow.

With the Soviet Union supplying heavy arms and equipment now being used against the Army of South Vietnam (ARVN), President Thieu would then be pushed into a ghastly diplomatic squeeze. He would either be compelled to negotiate under highly unfavorable terms, confronting an enemy in physical possession of substantial chunks of South Vietnam, or risk a major setback in his Moscow talks.

High-level analysts here see these immediate Communist battle targets: Physical possession of the capitals of three provinces—the northernmost Quang Tri, just south of the DMZ; Kontum, in the highlands; and Tay Ninh, between Saigon and the Cambodian border.

The Communists, in short, are mounting a coordinated assault in three sparsely populated areas, the loss of which would mean little strategically to Saigon, but very much indeed to Saigon and Washington in political terms.

It would be difficult enough simply to try to divide this state into Assembly districts close enough to equality in population to satisfy constitutional and judicial standards for numbers.

It would be equally difficult to try to give the state a bi-cameral legislature with an equal number of members in each house of the Legislature after it had elected a Governor.

To try to combine the two tasks, even with the best of good will present between the two parties, even with the smartest computers on the sidelines helping out, is almost an impossibility.

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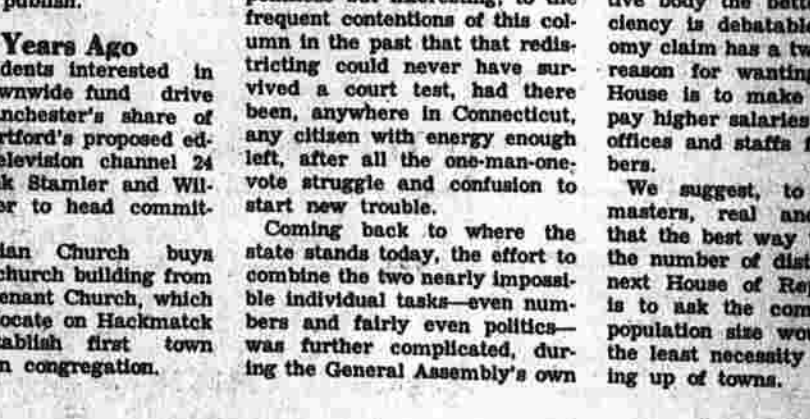

## Rham Hearing Scheduled Monday On Budget of \$1,514,576

The Regional District 8 Board of Education has called for a district meeting and hearing Monday at 8 p.m. at Rham High School when residents of Hebron, Andover and Marlborough will have the opportunity to review the 1972-1973 proposed budget and make recommendations.

After an executive session Monday evening, the board approved the budget at \$1,514,576 as opposed to this year's budget of \$1,294,706, or a \$229,871 increase.

Before the executive session, the board had approved all items except for salaries for the principal, assistant principal and guidance personnel.

After discussing these items in executive session, it approved \$10,000 for the principal, a \$500 increase over this year; \$10,000 for the assistant principal, a \$1,800 increase over this year; and \$48,969 for guidance personnel as opposed to \$38,150 appropriated this year.

The large increase in guidance personnel is due to the salary (88,000) of a replacement counselor for John Lalob who has been granted a non-faculty leave by the board with full pay.

**Teachers Salaries**

With board members Gibson Munson and Katharine Stebbin in opposition, the board approved \$742,131 for teachers salaries which includes only the normal salary increments.

This represents a \$83,921 increase over this year's budget.

Also, the board has approved \$20,000 for the construction of four tennis courts. It was reported at Monday's meeting by Aram Dananjalian, Superintendent of Schools, that 70 percent of this cost will be fully reimbursable by the state leaving the board's total cost at \$10,000.

The board felt that the request from the administration for the tennis courts should be brought before the public for its opinion. Therefore, it has included this item in the proposed budget.

Dananjalian gave an estimated figure of \$149,260 as anticipated income from such items as state reimbursements for special education tuition and transportation and equipment.

## Cable Project Will Handle Future Telephone Growth

A \$100,000 underground aerial telephone cable project is now under way in Manchester and Rockville areas. According to Lyman Hoops, Southern New England Telephone manager, this project is part of a nationwide program to handle future telephone growth in the area. Hoops said, "This cable project, scheduled for completion in May, will run between our switching offices on E. Center St. in Manchester and Elm St. in Rockville. It will run along Summit St. Rt. 88, and Windsor Ave., into Rockville along Main Ave., and onto Elm St."

"There are presently about 37,400 phones in the Manchester area and about 29,000 in Rockville. Our research people, through growth projections, estimate this will increase to 42,000 in Manchester and 27,000 in the Rockville area by 1975."

This project is part of a nationwide program which will see about 25,000 feet of cable strung on existing poles. The cable is protected from the weather by placing it in underground clay-like ducts, and on poles it's encased in heavy-duty wood.
