DR. LAWRENCE E. LAMB Epilepsy Is Just Another Disease

By Lawrence Lamb, M.D. Dear Dr. Lamb—I have had seizures since I was 11 or 12 years old, and I am now 32 and have them occasionally, but only at night after a nervous, exhausting day. My parents call them fainting spells and will not discuss this problem. My question is my husband feels I should tell our 15-year-old daughter that her children will probably have epilepsy. Can the type of seizure I have be inherited?

Dear Reader—There is no question: Unless your husband also has epilepsy, however, there isn't a real high probability that either your daughter or her children will have the problem. Actually only three to five per cent of the relatives of individuals with epilepsy also have the same problem. I am more concerned about your parents' attitude toward the problem and what it may have done to you.

Epilepsy is just another illness and is fairly frequent one at that. You certainly should be under medical supervision if you are not and a person with an infrequent episode as your letter indicates is usually easily controlled with medicine.

It is always disconcerting to see someone attack a stigma to a medical illness. Some of the most important figures in world history have also had epilepsy, which was why Julius Caesar had the "falling sickness," and Alexander the Great is also reported to have had epilepsy. The world would have been quite a different place without either of them.

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# Prices Down, Jobs Up

Meat prices in the last consumer price report for February had increased sharply following earlier wholesale rises. The unemployment report said the jobs rate for men edged up from 4.0 to 4.1 per cent with a total of 2.3 million. The rate for women rose from 3.0 to 3.4 per cent with a total of 1.0 million and the rate for teenagers declined from 1.8 to 1.7 per cent with a total of 1.2 million.

In a racial breakdown, the bureau said the jobs rate for white workers rose from 4.1 to 5.3 per cent. The unemployment rate for other races—mostly Negroes—remained unchanged at 10.5 per cent.

The report said most of the increase in employment took place in service producing industries, such as wholesale and retail trade and state and local government. Part of the rise was due to the return of 60,000 strike strikers to their public utilities industries, it added.

Manufacturing employment also increased, mainly in the metal and electrical equipment industries.

Over time work in manufacturing also viewed as a sign of increasing economic activity, rose slightly to an average of 3.3 hours per week, the highest in more than two years.

The price report said the wholesale price index rose at an annual rate of 4.7 per cent during the Phase I freeze and the Phase II period of looser price controls. Overall industrial wholesale prices rose three and one-half per cent in March, largely in metals and metal products.

There were also price increases for lumber, paper products, machinery and equipment, and other miscellaneous items and clothing.

There were price declines for some services, such as haircuts, chemicals, rubber and plastic products.

Increases for furniture, diners and home electronic equipment slightly outweighed an average decline for home appliances, the report said.

Toys and children's vehicles, photographic supplies, and watches and clocks were up in price, it said.

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# Egypt Break With Jordan Satisfies Ploy

BEIRUT (AP) — Egypt's break in diplomatic relations with Jordan is an attempt by President Anwar Sadat to divert attention from the failure to make good on his promise to get the Sinai Desert back by the end of 1971 or go to war with Israel.

The Egyptian leader told a special session of the guerrilla-dominated Palestine National Council in Cairo Thursday night that King Hussein's plan to create a Palestinian state is a betrayal of the Arab cause and Egypt had no choice but to break relations.

Sadat told the widely cheering crowd that Egypt will fight on land, sea and in the air, he declared, "from house to house, if need be, paying the price in blood for honor and freedom."

# Cousteau Calls For Revolution

Berkeley, Calif. (AP) — Jacques-Yves Cousteau, marine biologist and explorer, says the fight for survival calls for a sociological revolution.

The 59-year-old scientist was the featured speaker during ceremonies Thursday marking the 10th anniversary of the University of California at Berkeley. Cousteau told students and visitors they should aim to construct "the stable society" one that will discard the economic and political concepts used in industrialized nations.

In such a society, he said, "nationalism will make no sense."

"An uncontrolled economic growth like cancer," he said, "is not justified," he said. "There is an urgent need for international controls, at least among the 20 nations responsible for 90 per cent of the earth's pollution."

ported four and five miles southwest of Quang Tri City, the northernmost provincial capital which is believed to be a target of the North Vietnamese. Twenty-three enemy were killed, along with one South Vietnamese killed and one wounded.

The American air armada was strengthened by the arrival in the Gulf of Tonkin of the carrier Constellation, giving the U.S. Command four carriers on station there for the first time since before the bombing halt in late 1968.

About 200 of the day's 600 air strikes were against targets in North Vietnam, and official sources disclosed that current plans call for the heavy raids on the North to continue for two to three weeks unless Hanoi backs off its offensive.

Nearly 20 more U.S. fighter-bomber missions and more than 60 B-52 strikes were flown over North Vietnam and about 50 more hit the Ho Chi Minh supply trail through southern Laos.

The U.S. Command announced the first casualties in the air attack on the North were two U.S. Navy ATs were downed by surface-to-air missiles near Deng Hai, 46 miles north of the DMZ. It also reported a big rescue helicopter shot down south of the DMZ and another was damaged by surface-to-air missiles.

Six Americans were missing in the air crashes, one officer was rescued and three were in destroyer crew were injured.

North Vietnam claimed 13 American soldiers were killed, 100 were wounded and 100 were captured.

Pilots reported that the weather had improved considerably over the North, although it still was not perfect.

"The place they can make the most noise and where they'll do the most good is where they do the shopping," Pope advises the president of Pope, Evans and Robbins, a firm that specializes in municipal, state and federal waste problems.

"Many consumers have already started taking a firm stand at the checkout counter," he continues. "They're wiping the problem off on the store manager by leaving him all the wrappings."

"If enough people do this and say, 'Look, I don't want this, it doesn't need this,' the packaging material will back up in the store and if the store manager doesn't order less, he's going to have a large grocery chain or a big store that's going to be a big problem," he says.

# Guidelines Decision Challenged by E.K.F.

Noting that his partnership is "very perturbed" by a denial last month of a request to combine Colonial Rd. and Progress Dr. under the town's industrial guidelines, Seymour Kaplan contends there is "clear affirmative legality" for the move and has asked for an opinion on the matter from Atty. David Barry, town counsel.

Kaplan, a partner in E.K.F. Associates and president of Green Manor Estates Inc., made the request in a strongly worded letter to Town Manager Robert Wells. The matter has been referred to Barry, at the direction of the board, for Barry's consideration.

Kaplan, Neil Ellis, and Carmine Filaretto are associated under various corporations names. They are the developers of the Manchester Industrial Park which includes Progress Dr. and Colonial Rd.

Both roads were built under the industrial guidelines where the entire cost of building was paid by the developer. In the past, after seven years, additional taxes on the land opened up to the town's share, the developer is reimbursed the excess up to the developer's original contribution.

As now set up, Colonial Rd. and Progress Dr. are to be developed as separate projects. Green Manor had proposed that the two roads be considered as one project for purposes of computing reimbursement under the guidelines.

The total invested in Progress Dr. so far is just under \$60,000 and in two years some \$19,000 in taxes have been paid on the buildings built on that road. Wells has included in his report needed 187.75 Capital Improvement Budget \$22,000 which would be used to reimburse the excess up to the developer's original contribution.

"There is absolutely no reason why, and certainly none morally, why the developer should not receive his contribution at this time," Kaplan says. "By no stretch of imagination is our request a hardship." Kaplan requests that the town's share be reimbursed to the developer.

"We should like the board to take note that this road was built more at the request of the town than us," Kaplan maintains. "The road does open up the Manchester Industrial Park, as well as fulfill the long-range needs of connecting with Shelton Rd. (Parkway, Oakland connector) and closing off that portion of Parker Street which serves another industrial complex," Kaplan adds.

"The guidelines, which to our knowledge are being used only by this partnership (E.K.F.), were set up to preclude inequity to the town which developed in the past and in at least two instances, mildly ignored the industrial guidelines even though applicable. The town actually paid for the installation of roads without contribution by the individual developer," Kaplan claims.

## Building Inspector Explains Request For Budget Boost

Building Inspector Richard A. Keefe, in a letter to the selectmen, has explained his budget requests for the 1972-73 fiscal year which amount to a \$9,980 increase over the present appropriation.

Keefe has requested a salary for this position of \$10,000. The current salary is \$8,000. However, as Keefe states in his letter, "The difference between last year's salary and this request does not reflect a salary increase, but more rightly an increase due to the drastic change in the scope of the work involved."

He mentions how he feels this is a realistic figure for the building official's salary without taking into consideration the other three jobs covered by the same office of zoning agent, sanitary inspector and driveway inspector.

Keefe estimates that he spends between 30 and 35 hours per week just doing the actual work involved with these jobs. This does not include time spent in classes and seminars which are "never ending facets of these jobs."

Keefe further explained how both the State Health Department and the Planning and Zoning Commission are pressing more duties on the town's building inspector.

"The State Health Department," he said, "is continually pressing the town to take a more active role in areas such as restaurant inspections, well drilling and sanitary inspections."

As for the Planning and Zoning Commission, Keefe said it now insists on reports on all violations and now permits.

Also, each time there is a new subdivision application, the building inspector must make a detailed investigation with the results being reported back to the PZO.

"This type of activity takes hours and hours of legwork," Keefe stated. He estimated 70 new houses per year with six trips at least to each house for inspections.

Secretary Keefe is also requesting \$2,000 for a salary for a secretary. Secretarial expenses this year were included in the inspector's overall expense. He based his estimate on four hours a day, five days a week at the rate of \$2 per hour.

At present, Keefe said, he is using the town's heating secretary, but he feels that with the variety of jobs she has, the duties are too heavy.

He said that he is on the road making inspections a great deal of the time and he needs someone who can answer the many technical questions about zoning and the building code that are asked each day over the telephone.

Keefe also requested \$1,000 for the building department amounts to \$2,000 as compared to \$1,000 this year.

Broken down, Keefe estimates \$1,500 for mileage (1,000 miles per month at 10 cents a mile, \$200 for publications, \$100 for printing and supplies; \$200 for seminars; and \$300 for professional advice.

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



But Mike Riordan, who posted 21 points, led Baltimore to a most single-handedly shredded it. Blaming in a series of foul jumpers, then driving in for layups when the Knicks came out to stop him, the 6-foot-4 center who had averaged only nine points in the first three games helped the Bulls scramble back within nine points going into the final quarter. The Cougars sued and then appealed a lower court ruling which held the Cougars had "unclean hands" and lost the contract. This decision was reversed by the 4th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Richmond, Va. Unless there is an appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court, Cunningham is barred from playing with any team except the Cougars until October 1974. The ruling in the Cunningham case may be cited in the cases of Charley Scott, who jumped from the ABA Virginia Squires to the NBA Phoenix Suns and Jim McDaniel, who jumped from the Cougars to the NBA Seattle SuperSonics. Their cases now are in litigation.
