Professor Devises a New Method for Study

By BOB COOPER Associated Press Writer LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP) — Increasing your learning power, according to Lita Hanau, is as easy as pie. An assistant professor of study techniques at the University of Kentucky, Mrs. Hanau has proved her point nearly 1,000 times since she devised a study technique that is astonishingly simple. It all began about 10 years ago when Mrs. Hanau, wife of a physics professor at the university, was about to begin teaching at a high school. "It occurred to me that these kids had measles of the brain. They were just sitting there while a lot of facts were running around the room and they weren't absorbing them," she recalled.

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Phone Bill To Go Up

HARTFORD (AP) — Connecticut residents can expect to pay more for telephone service soon and yet more than that if they insist on making the operator handle their calls—but the rates are rising anyway. The rate increases—totaling \$9.9 million per year—were granted to the Southern New England Telephone Co. (SNET) Thursday by the state Public Utilities Commission.

The FUC ruled that SNET's proposed rate revisions were unfair and must be submitted again. SNET was unable to say immediately what the rate hike would mean to the individual customer.

The revised rates are expected to go into effect on May 1, but the rate hike could be delayed for as long as a year, SNET says.

FUC Chairman Edward S. Hauman said he expected his staff could analyze the rates and make another ruling within five days.

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Eastern Towns Defended From Poverty Area Label

By JAMES CARRIER HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) — Eastern Connecticut, once called a "poverty area," is not a depressed area, according to the planners and researchers who are watching it grow.

While there are pockets of poverty, they say a report and study by the state's planning agency showed that the area would have little effect on that poverty.

"We're not depressed, and we don't need much kind of heroic efforts to change our life because the area is growing so fast," said Robert Young, planning chief for the Windham Regional Planning Agency.

Statistics gathered from the State Labor Department, the Connecticut Development Commission, the University of Connecticut and regional planning agencies show:

—Unemployment in three out of four of the area's labor market is below the state average.

—The number of jobs in the four markets (Danbury, Willimantic, New London and Norwich) has steadily increased in the past year.

—Population is mushrooming far above the state average.

—Per capita retail sales are growing faster than the state average.

Allies Free An Loc With Aid of B52s

SAIGON (AP) — Counter-attacks of U.S. fighter-bombers were in progress Thursday, and U.S. troops were reported tonight to have recaptured virtually all of the provincial capital of An Loc.

Enemy rockets exploded in a Saigon suburb, killing 15 Vietnamese civilians and wounding 23, including three U.S. airmen.

Battlefield reports from An Loc, 60 miles north of Saigon, said government troops were reinforced with 400 paratroopers and aided by heavy U.S. B52 strikes in the counter attack that latest reports said had retaken all but two blocks of the city.

Earlier, the Vietnamese high command said the enemy had been forced back outside the city limits after losing the northern part of the provincial capital in a tanked assault Thursday.

A spokesman said under questioning, however, that some enemy troops might still be in An Loc but that street fighting had ended. Official city limits in Vietnam seldom reflect the realities of urban growth.

An unknown number of 100-pound rockets slammed into northern Saigon around Thursday night, said a U.S. official.

## Meskill Will Veto Agostinelli Bill Passed by Senate

Phase II in a test of strength between two Republican State officials was completed yesterday when the Senate, by a 20 to 15 roll call vote, approved what is known as the "Agostinelli Bill."

The test of strength is between State Comptroller Nathan Agostinelli, elected by the people to his post; and Finance Commissioner Adolf Carlson, appointed by Gov. Thomas Meskill to his post.

The bill, approved last week by an 18 to 10 roll call vote in the House, would give the comptroller the purchasing and publication responsibilities now in the hands of the finance commissioner, as well as the finance commissioner's role of issuing orders to the state governor's fiscal control.

Agostinelli for his part is not as far from the Republicans as he would like to be. He said, "I am only too aware of my pledge to issue quarterly reports on the state's financial picture." His last report was in December.

Carl Get Figures

Agostinelli said his efforts were thwarted by the inability to get the necessary figures from the state finance department in the Senate.

When Democrat Louis Gladstone of Bridgeport was state comptroller and the Democrats were in power, the Republicans continually threw barbs at them for not issuing regular reports. They claimed regular reports might have given an indication of the big deficit the state was operating under and might have helped plan its reduction.

Agostinelli is not expected to issue a quarterly accounting of state finances, ideally, they should be monthly.

He added, "I am astymied. I mean I've given the statistics I need. I've asked several times for them. Each time, I was told they weren't ready. All I can do is keep asking for them."

Manchester Session

A 43-year-old Manchester man, Harold W. Hodgkins of 19 Locust St., was ordered yesterday to undergo mental examination to determine if he is competent to stand trial.

Hodgkins is charged with fourth-degree larceny and breach of peace in connection with a disturbance at Southern New England Telephone Co. offices at E. Center St.

Public Defender Frances Sullivan, representing Hodgkins, said Hodgkins had a long history of mental difficulties. Sullivan said he wants to see Hodgkins understand the nature of the charges against him.

Sullivan, asking for the examination, referred to Hodgkins' behavior as "bizarre." The charges now pending stem from an incident in which he allegedly threatened a phone company employee and stole a display telephone.

Judge Stanley Yeselkiewicz agreed to seek a mental examination, and the case was continued to May 18.

A Manchester man charged with allowing geese to roam a victory for his well-footed pets yesterday in Manchester's Circuit Court 12, when the charges were dismissed by Judge Stanley Yeselkiewicz.

Atty. Anthony Crye, representing defendant Robert J. Manchester Drive-In, 41, of 92 Vernon St., moved for dismissal on the grounds that the charge was based on a law which was repealed last year.

Prosecutor Joseph Paradiso, realizing that the law was repealed with the state's new Penal Code, said he would substitute a charge of disorderly conduct.

## Gardening

"First of the garden flowers to bloom in the middle of March, and since they have been covered twice by snowstorms. When the snow melted, there were again, each four-inch snowfall, some snowing, small white blossoms."

Crocuses were next, and I believe that is more reliable than this one. A few bulbs started to bloom after a few years to form a larger clump. The yellow crocus blossom first to bloom in the blue flowers, the white ones and the striped blue-and-white variety.

When I first brought home some crocus bulbs, I planted them in the lawn. It seemed like a good idea and they bloomed in the lawn, but presently the lawn had to be mowed and the lawn mower would cut the crocus leaves and they disappeared. The crocus now are in the garden where the lawn mower never goes.

An Anselm Flower

The foliage stays green until well into June and should not be cut until the end of the year. It is the signal that new bulbs have been planted in the garden where they will stay out of sight until another spring.

The foliage has been admired for centuries. They were cultivated in ancient Persia and on the island of Crete.

House Windup

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP)—Under five from some rank and file lawmakers, legislative leaders in the House yesterday moved to wrap up their business by the end of this week.

West dealer. North-South vulnerable. Opening lead — Jack of Hearts. West opens the jack of hearts, and dummy's queen loses to the king. Back comes a heart, knocking out dummy's ace. Unless you take measures you will lose two hearts and two clubs. This is a good time to lose a trick to save two.

What can you do about it? Strangely enough, your best plan is to lose a diamond trick! You don't want to lose this in addition to the other tricks. You plan to give up a diamond in stead of one of the other tricks.

Set Up a Trick

Cash the ace of diamonds and lead a trump to dummy's ace. Then lead the queen of hearts from dummy and the king of hearts from hand. The profit comes from a fact that dummy's jack of diamonds is now set up. You get back to dummy with the king of hearts and discard a club on the jack of diamonds.

Plain Instances of Inequality. There are perfectly legal practices victimizing blacks, big from which whites are in practice exempt.

In this major reorganization, the emphasis is on getting "managerial talent" instead of "social worker" talent at the top.

So much for the general nature and objective of the reorganization of welfare in New York City.

One of the New York City officials commenting on these reorganizations was one Bernard Shapiro, whose title is that of Deputy State Commissioner of Social Services for the New York City Area.

This would, of course, be the same Mr. Shapiro who, as Connecticut Commissioner of Welfare, built the State Welfare Department which Governor Meekill and Commissioner White have been reorganizing.

"The need to improve performance at the welfare-center level" had, said Mr. Shapiro, been documented by state studies made during the past year.

The suggestion for Governor Meekill and Commissioner White is obvious. If they keep running into trouble in their efforts to run a tighter state welfare department, one helpful solution might be for them to call in Bernard Shapiro as a special consultant.

Commissioner White, most Commissioner Shapiro.

Does Russia Like It? One of the things that makes life more interesting these days is the rich variety of interpretation and opinion we have available to us on such life and death questions as to just what the connection may be between Russian policy and the current North Vietnamese offensive.

First, we were pleased and reassured to read, in a Washington column we read in its dispassionate respect for reality, that Russia has absolutely nothing to do with current North Vietnamese offensive.

No sooner did we find ourselves reassured, perhaps quite illogically, by such intelligence that we came upon another very wise piece of interpretation.

This second columnist tells us point blank that it was Moscow, not Hanoi, which gave the order for the offensive, that Moscow views this military drive as its closer association with Hanoi in its development which extends Moscow's intended entrenchment of China, and that, instead of fearing that this drive might break up President Nixon's scheduled visit to Moscow, Russia views this drive as the thing it can use to blackmail the President when he does arrive at Moscow.

So there are the two views, the one telling us that Moscow is surprised and alarmed and hurt by the North Vietnamese offensive, and the other telling us that the offensive was Moscow's own idea.

You take your choice. Or, after you have thought the situation over, do you consider it worth while to bother to take a choice between two versions of what Moscow may be thinking? Wouldn't it be problem enough, and perhaps more constructive, if we were to try to determine what we ourselves are doing and planning in Vietnam—what options we are after in a situation which may not have any?

Two such occasions came in the cumulative aftermath of de-Stalinization in the Soviet Union and the Hungarian revolution of 1956, and following the Soviet invasion of Czechoslovakia in 1968.

But today, the sweeping directives by Tran Quoc Hoan, North Vietnam's minister of public security and an alter ego of the premier, published in the March issue of Hoc Tap, the party's theoretical journal, hints strongly at the existence of grave home-front disorders.

These committed them to pay off the inflated purchase price in monthly installments over a period of years and at a high rate of interest. They were required to pay for insurance, taxes and repairs.

Sometimes soon after the black buyers moved in, a building inspector was at the door with a demolition order. The previous owners had not been made to correct, and directed the new occupants to correct, faults in the work.

But why couldn't these black buyers have secured mortgages rather than entering into such impossible arrangements? Until five years ago, blacks were effectively excluded from Federal Housing Administration mortgage backing by various restrictions in the FHA regulations to which banks, savings and loan associations, and home-owners' insurance companies adhered.

Since the urban riots of 1967, there has been a change in FHA policy. But that is of no benefit to the thousands of blacks who signed installment purchase contracts before 1967.

It is obvious that God works through those who trust Him, they show their faith in Him, they show they deserve it, especially as the responsible owners of property who keep it in property. But here the man who was to be and to do precisely that, and outrageous offences were put in their way.

Trouble In Hanoi

WASHINGTON—An astonishingly tough warning by North Vietnam's interior minister has periodically been forced into draconian measures to put down revolts, particularly among the 700,000 Catholics, the Montagnards (mountain tribes) and former small landowners dispossessed by the revolution.

Dear Dr. Lamb - In our health class we came up with a question that our teacher was not sure of, so a group of us girls thought it would be a good idea to ask you the same question.

When the ovum is not fertilized or does not embed then the extra tissue which is about two weeks or 14 days after the ovulation. This is the normal cycle of events, there are about 28 days between the onset of periods, although this varies a great deal.

When the ovum is first released, it is called ovulation and if it meets with a sperm cell a pregnancy begins. The fertilized ovum nestles down in the uterus for the next two weeks.

**School Board Reports It Will Have Surplus**

For the first time in several years, the Board of Education will not have to come to a town meeting to seek an additional appropriation to cover an operating deficit.

Superintendent of Schools Aram Damarjian, in discussing the budget statement for the month of March at last night's meeting, informed the board that it "will end up in the plus."

Damarjian pointed out, how-

ever, two items in the budget that are slightly over budget. These included teaching supplies and other expenses for instruction.

The increase in prices, he said, along with an increase in enrollment accounts for the overexpenditure of \$308.66 for teaching supplies.

As for the \$188.67 overexpenditure in other expenses for instruction, this was caused by the necessity for additional psychological testing.

Damarjian explained how both principals have been told not to issue any new requisitions and by the end of the budget period, he anticipates a surplus.

He further told the board that the boards of education pick up the reputation of "spending everything they got, I feel," he said, "if you have a surplus created by a favorable experience you don't spend it."

The board agreed that by returning the surplus to the town, an attempt could be made to show the townspeople that it is operating to the best of its ability.

No figure was mentioned as to exactly how much the surplus would amount to.

# Pre-School Screening

Three teams of examiners recently completed screening the majority of children who will be eligible to enter kindergarten in September. It is expected that makeup screening will be conducted in May and again in August for children of families who move into town in the interim.

Purposes of the pre-school, developmental screening are to detect oral or potential language, speech, vision, and hearing impediments; prevent later academic frustration and possible failure; and place each child in a kindergarten curriculum that will best suit his talents, abilities, and needs.

A fringe benefit of the screening sessions, which were held at 14 elementary schools from March 13 until Monday this week, is that they served to introduce children to the schools that they will attend. The professional teams screened about 600 youngsters, averaging 18-19 a day.

Initial letters on the results, Allan Cherterton, coordinator of the program, said, will go out to parents within two weeks. Most letters, he added, will indicate that the children are ready for kindergarten, but some will indicate a need for further evaluation. Target date for a composite report to the Board of Education is early June.

Lower left, his hearing is tested by Mrs. Sandra Bookwith, nurse. Lower right, part of the screening process with Mrs. Joan Manning, speech therapist, involved interpretation of a playground scene to reveal the child's imagination and length of sentence usage.

In addition to the picture interpretation, Mrs. Manning asked each child to give his first and last names, count from 1 to 10, identify basic colors, and repeat sentences after her as an indication of memorization ability.

Part of this segment was administration of the Peabody picture vocabulary test. It consisted of a rather thick volume, on each page of which are pictures of four common objects. As Mrs. Manning named one on each page, the youngster was expected to match the name with the corresponding picture by placing his finger on it. Vocabulary increased in difficulty as test progressed; for example, the word "transportation" is associated with a bus.

The dual purpose of the Peabody test, Mrs. Manning said, is

to provide insights to the child's language age and the level at which he can understand what is being said to him. Throughout all steps of the therapist's screening, she observed and recorded speech intelligibility.

The human figure on which David has started is a portion of the ABC Inventory or school readiness test, to bring out what a child knows at this point in his life and can put down with a pencil. Mrs. Pamela Smith, psychological aide, stressed that it is definitely not an intelligence test.

She also put each child through two sets of motor exercises. One, gross, consisting of balancing, hopping, heel-to-heel walk, and catching a bounced ball. In the other, fine, the youngster was asked to draw a circle, square, diamond, and plus sign.

In the vision check made by Mrs. Bookwith, she worked with a lighted chart, on which the letter 'E' appeared in various positions and sizes. At a distance of 10 feet, the child covered one eye and holding a large card-board 'E', had to turn it to the position of whatever one Mrs. Bookwith indicated on the chart. Mrs. Bookwith said that at pre-school age, a youngster normally tests 20/20 because his eyes are still developing.

Both ears were checked individually on the audiometer by

(Continued from Page One) ernment relief column which Thursday night was reported stalled by enemy fire 15 miles south of An Loc.

The aim of the biggest Communist offensive since 1968, now in its 16th day, is to raise provincial capitals and seize the business of the Viet Cong over them. So far the Communists have captured two district towns north of An Loc and a 10-mile strip of largely depopulated territory just below the demilitarized zone at the north end of the country. The capture of all of An Loc would be a major political and military gain for President Nguyen Van Thieu.

On the northern front below the DMZ, field reports said the South Vietnamese were still holding on to Fire Base Baolong, 12 miles southwest of Hue, but apparently were running short of water. The base stands in the way of long-range artillery attacks and ground thrusts against Hue. It has been surrounded and under heavy pressure for four days, and supplying it has become a major problem.

## Plane Wreckage Found, One Dead Near Simsbury

SIMSBURY, Conn. (AP) — The wreckage of a light plane was found late Thursday night on the Simsbury side of Baldock Mountain, with the lone occupant, a man, burned beyond recognition, police reported.

Police said an autopsy was planned for today in an attempt to make a positive identification.

The plane, a Cessna 182, was on a flight from Godfrey Field in Leesburg, Va., to Bradley International Airport in Windsor Locks when Bradley lost contact with it about 6:18 p.m.

Police could give no indication of what caused the crash.

Bradley immediately notified officials in surrounding areas, and a search was launched. Among those taking part were the Simsbury Avon and Bloomfield fire departments, and state police.

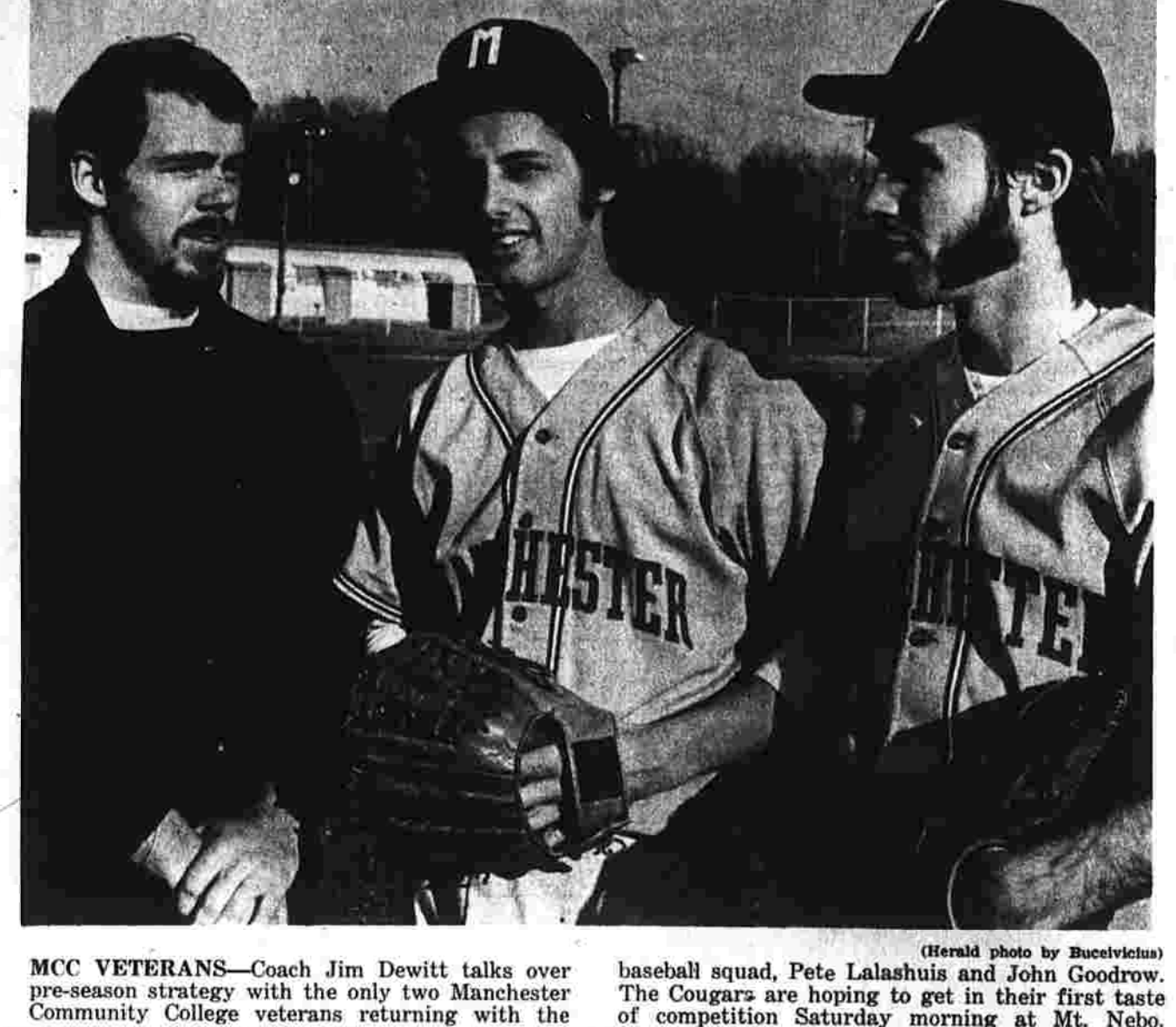

## Attitude of Ex-Dodger Changed over Years 25 Years Ago Dixie Walker Refused to Play with Blacks

**VERO BEACH, Fla.** (NEA)—Twenty-five years ago this spring, Fred (Dixie) Walker and five other Brooklyn Dodgers said no, they wouldn't play with blacks. And they went to Branch Rickey, president of the Dodgers. Rickey told them that rookie Jackie Robinson would break the big league color barrier, was going to play with the Dodgers "and that was that." Walker, a 300-hitting outfielder, stayed that season. And he and Robinson would be teammates on the 1947 National League pennant.

Now 62 years old, balding, with curly Southern manners and a mild Alabama drawl, Dixie Walker is the batting coach of the Dodgers. He sat in the stands in uniform, without cap, in the Florida sun, watched an intrasquad game and recalled the past. "My attitude has changed over the years," said Walker. "I used to be a segregationist. I feel like I've learned."

Walker and Robinson occasionally ran into each other today. "I'm as friendly with him as I am with any of the boys now. We're not on what you might call a buddy-buddy basis, to be frank about it, but we stand and talk for five or ten minutes. I've grown and Jackie knows it. And he's grown, too."

Walker says there was great pressure on him when he was home in Birmingham, Ala., not to play with Robinson. "I didn't know if they were going to let me or not. And it was so secret that I was worried about my business. I had a hardware and sporting goods store back home."

Early in the season Judge Samuel Lefkowitz of Brooklyn, playing peacemaker, asked Walker to pose with Robinson for a newspaper photo. Walker refused. He was reading letters that already called him "nigger lover."
