DON'T HUMP TO CONCLUSIONS IN COMPUTING PROBABILITY

By ALFRED SHEINWOLD When you have a special formation, you should expect a finesse to win about one in two attempts. It is an even chance of getting a suit to break favorably. When six cards of the suit are missing, the odds are almost 2 to 1 against a 3-3 break. In most of the hands of the suit there are three breaks in spades or hearts, but you don't have to jump to conclusions.

North dealer North-South vulnerable Opening lead - six of Clubs. You start the hand with eight clubs. How do you try for the ninth? Should you finesse with dummy's queen of diamonds, or should you play for an extra trick in spades or hearts?

As a hand stands, you can play for everything. You can find out about the hearts and spades before you need to decide about the diamonds. After winning the first trick with the ace of clubs, lead out with the ace of hearts. If the suit breaks 3-3, your last heart will be a sure winner.

When the hearts break badly, cash dummy's top spades and then lead a spade to your own queen. As it happens, the spades break 3-3. Hence dummy's last spade is a sure winner.

It would be foolish to jeopardize a sure contract. You lead a diamond to dummy's ace, refusing to finesse, and cash dummy's last spade. The contract is now home.

If the spades had broken badly, you would know about it on taking the queen of spades. Your only remaining chance would be the diamond finesse. It is quite all right to risk a finesse when everything else has already failed.

Drinking Drivers Breathe Easier

On reflection, we of the general public were taking a little too much for granted when we expected that the same Legislature which, in its last session, struck down the 16 year old Connecticut automatic suspension of licenses for drivers convicted of speeding...

Perhaps we misled ourselves by thinking that the Legislature would feel some pang of regret over their previous action when it was followed, more promptly than the worst Calamandra had prophesied, by an immediate increase in the number of fatalities on Connecticut highways.

And perhaps we were unduly encouraged by the fact that the driver driving mandatory jail sentence recommendation came from Governor Mottish who had, last year, joined in promulgating the law which eliminated automatic license suspensions, and who now did confess that he felt that to have been a mistake.

Such blind expectation on the part of the public got its rude awakening when, the other afternoon, the Legislature got through its shenanigans with the mandatory jail sentence bill. The voting on the measure may have reflected mixed motivations, all of them sincere, but when the final result was defeat of the bill that was primarily a victory for those members of the legal profession who, like so many kindly guardian angels, specialize in protecting uniformed drivers from the consequences of their own mistakes or follies or weaknesses.

It is almost as if there were written into the penal code a special provision reading that no potential client shall ever be boxed, by law, into any punishment predicament from which good and devoted and clever counsel cannot rescue him.

There was a possibility that, as a result of action by this General Assembly, legislative decision, that driving would have to worry a great deal more—perhaps enough more so they would do the same thing, and give up one or the other, or make sure that, if they continued doing both, they did them separately.

Now the potential drunken driver has been relieved of that additional worry, which releases back to those who have to share the state's roads with him.

Game Plan Perfectly Clear... We have it on the authority of President Nixon's own speech writer, Mr. William Safire, that his boss stopped saying "Let me make one thing perfectly clear" as soon as he realized it was being parroted, and that, for similar reasons, he gave up "game plan" as far back as two years ago.

One thing that has been perfectly clear to us in recent months is that the President is following a game plan in which he is avoiding direct public discussion of great controversial world situations for fear he might, without intending it, say something that would upset the final leg of his summitry, his visit to Moscow.

But until he resumes presidential freedom of speech, we won't know for sure whether he is, once again, becoming a "New Nixon" or just being careful not to drink any red herrings across his own itinerary.

Why Lowell?

WASHINGTON — Mysteries usually make politicians uneasy, and a minor mystery has been troubling some of them here. Why did Congressman Ben Lowell Weicker Jr., ostensibly a loyal Nixon Republican and a man not prominently identified with liberal causes, lash out so sharply at the President's anti-busing program?

The apparent answer may be even more unsettling. Lowell is not only a practitioner: Mr. Weicker spoke out because he deeply believed the President's plan to buse is wrong. Lowell is not only a practitioner: Mr. Weicker spoke out because he deeply believed the President's plan to buse is wrong.

A week later, even as HEW Secretary Richardson was trying to sell the program to the Senate Labor Committee, Mr. Weicker took the Senate floor to express his anger at the President's "open book" approach to busing. Lowell did not believe in busing as a good way to achieve equality of educational opportunity, he said.

Mr. Nixon already has had real impact on the Supreme Court and lower federal courts by naming many conservative judges, he argued, and that is the only way a President can move in a sound judicial direction. "It has a deep belief in the sanctity of our courts," he said to the Senate Labor Committee, "and I see that sanctity violated even in the smallest way for the shortest period of time."

As for the \$2.5 billion, Mr. Weicker went on, that is a massive expenditure of previously programmed money, not the commitment of new funds — "like having your Christmas gifts bought for you as birthday presents." Better urban education can't be achieved, he argued, without simultaneous attention to housing and other inner-city needs, and this requires a commitment at least five times that of the busing figure.

"What we cannot have," he concluded, "is the luxury of trying to do it with our prejudices and whimsical inact."

Such superfluous language would not have been particularly surprising from Ben Weicker, a Jewett or McCloskey. But Mr. Weicker had an early conservative background — supporting Barry Goldwater in 1964, for example, when that wasn't particularly popular in Connecticut, even among Republicans.

A few Senators speculated that the Wednesday Club, a group of predominantly Republican legislators, had wanted someone to voice their collective distaste for the Nixon plan and had chosen Lowell as their spokesman. Others suggested that Mr. Weicker was seeking to establish the image of a liberal Republican. Lowell's colleague Abraham Ribicoff has suggested that "Lowell simply wanted to show how he would stand on this issue."

None of these answers is correct, as Mr. Weicker has broken with the Nixon, he notes. He voted against the ADM system, led the fight against the Lockheed strike, strongly favored the private transport, has consistently criticized the administration for refusing to spend more on urban education.

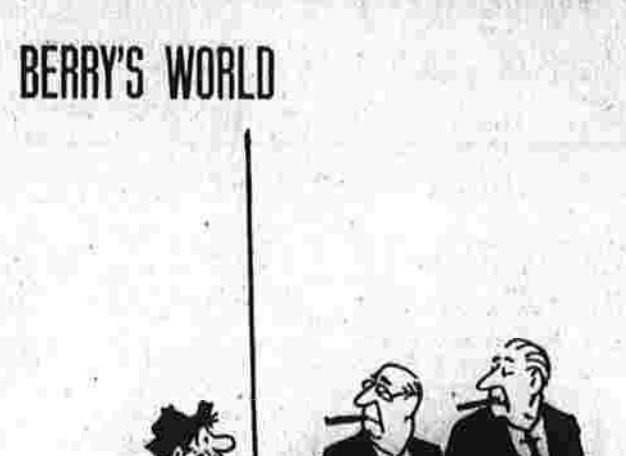

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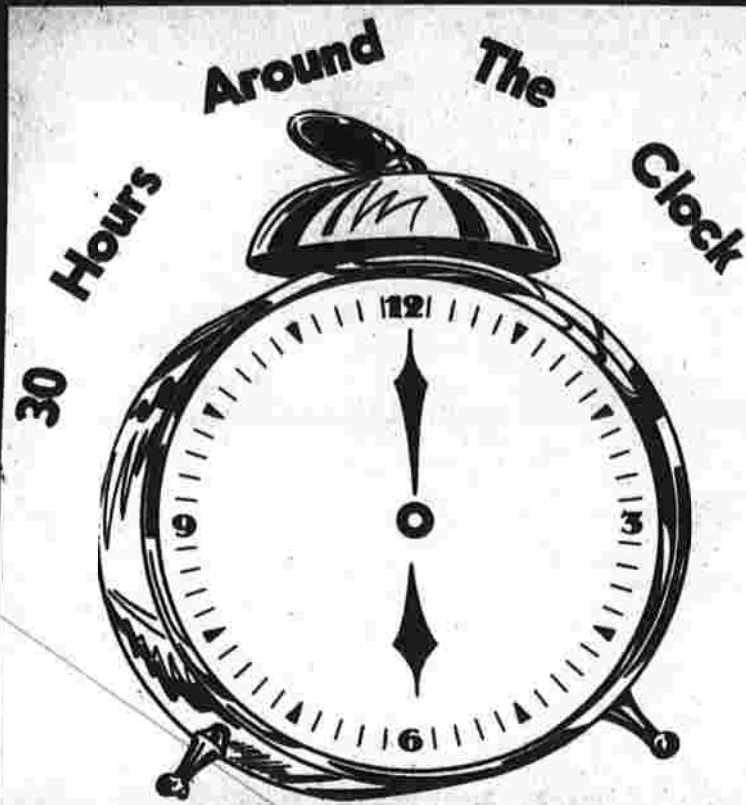

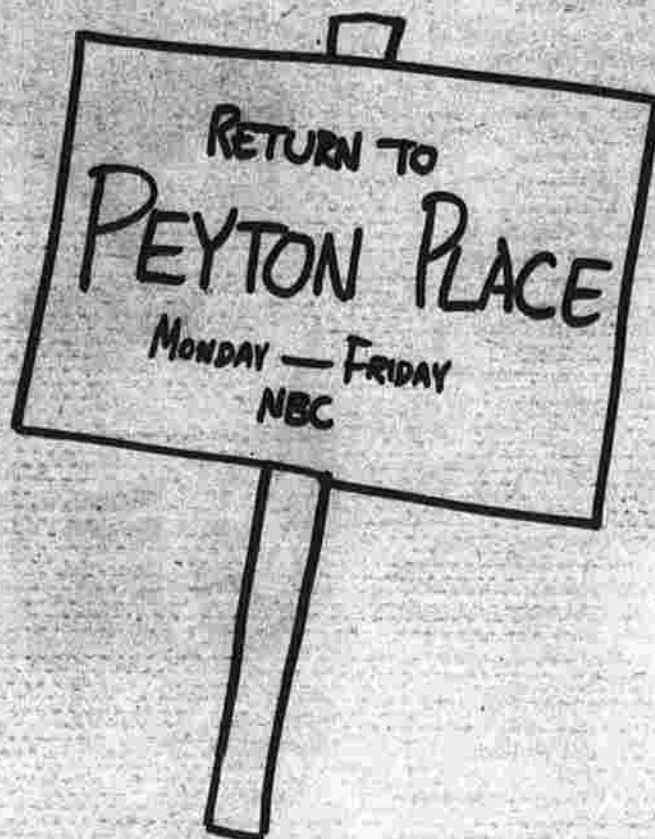

Allison MacKenzie returns to Peyton Place for the first time in three years Monday, April 17. The reunion with her parents will be colorcast on NBC's new drama series, "Return to Peyton Place" (8:30 p.m.)

On April 17, viewers will see for the first time the face of the young actress selected to portray the character which won national attention for Mia Farrow in the earlier TV version of Peyton Place. Her name is Kathy Glass.

Miss Glass has played the role of Kim Jordan in ABC's daytime drama, "The Best of Everything." Her stage credits include "Red, White and Maddox" (national company and TV production), "The Fantasticks" (touring company), and "George M" (summer stock).
