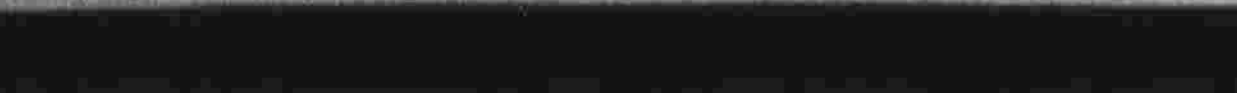

The Nixon Administration is becoming increasingly concerned about the price of food, and that is good thinking in a Presidential election year.

Food, unlike furniture, represents a nonpostponable purchase. So we should all be happy that Treasury Secretary Connally has been talking to supermarket-chain executives about what they charge for their wares.

But of course the Treasury Secretary knows that retail prices in the highly competitive food industry are directly related to changes in production, processing and transportation costs.

Owing to circumstances at home, I have been doing the marketing of late, and the experience has been educational.

My first conclusion was that beef (except for ground beef) is no longer economic. Nothing on a cow, I believe, is worth \$1.09 a pound.

The cattlemen say they are barely managing to invest. They are not sure that they can keep the cattle keep talking about bankruptcy.

If all of this is true, then perhaps beef no longer makes any economic sense. Perhaps we Americans will see some of the same scenes as we see in the supermarket.

Have you ever noticed that the milk is always the same price as the beef? This is no accident. Milk is the most important item in the supermarket.

There then is the Great Cereal Wall. One of the things I dislike about supermarket pricing is the purple ink mark that looks like this: 5-99.

It goes without saying that the produce department is no place for an ignorant husband. I always worry when housewives pick up fruits and vegetables and subject them to manual and visual examinations.

Our supermarket specializes in "education at the delicatessen counter. While I am waiting for the attendant to load a pound of compacted animal parts called luncheon meat, he hands over a slice of Hebrew salmon.

There are always two or three items on the shopping list that are beyond finding. And when they happen the clerks are also beyond finding.

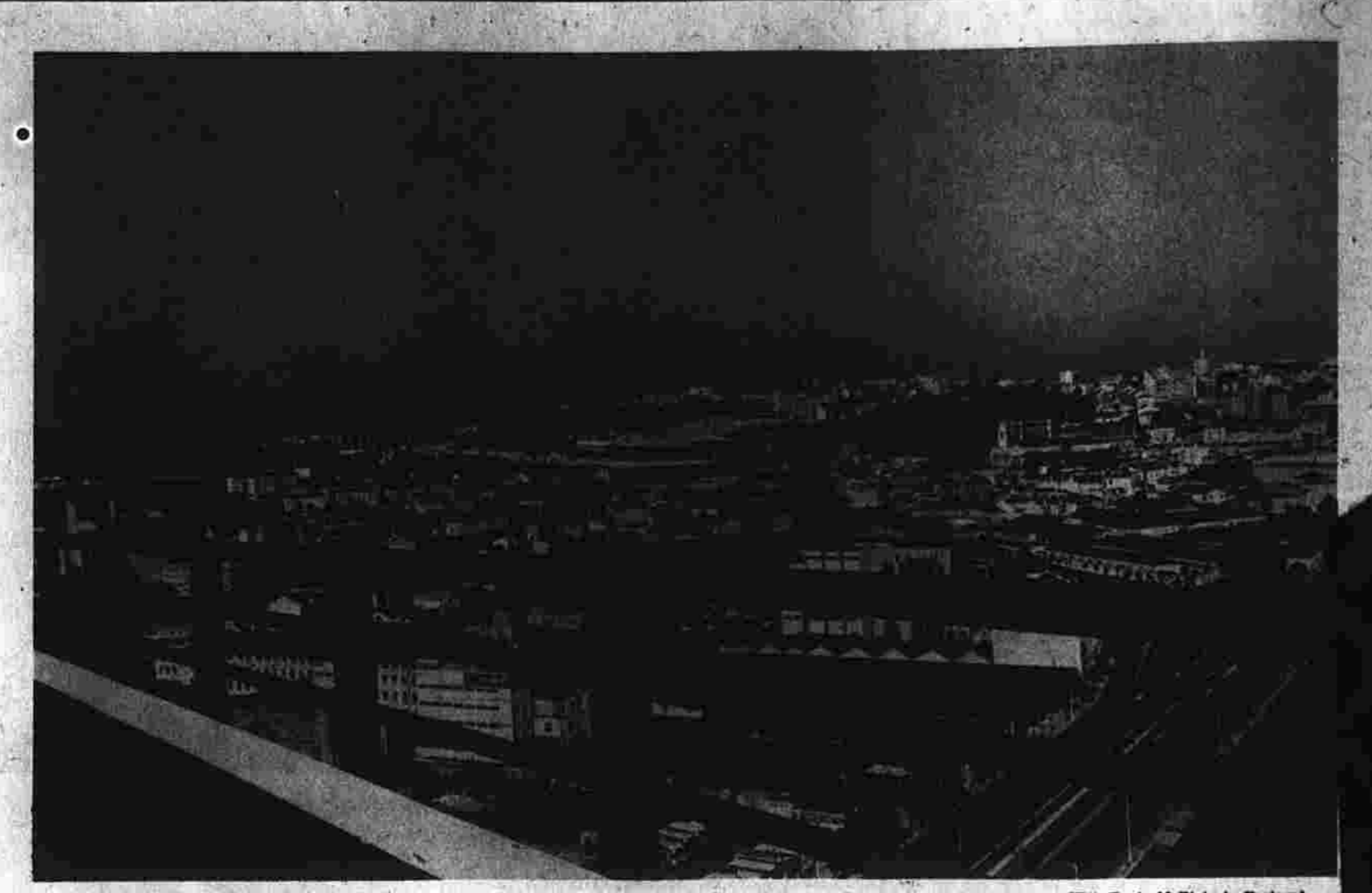

NEWCASTLE, Pa.—Sen. Edmund Muskie's surprising harsh campaign rhetoric in his uphill battle for pivotal Pennsylvania in next Tuesday's primary was the inevitable result of his fourth-place finish in Wisconsin last week.

But is Ed Muskie credible as an anti-establishment candidate? Surely, if the searing attack here had come from McGovern, the audience would have been yelling with glee.

delaying the exploration until... In announcing the change in the lunar excursion, Mission Control said Young and Duke would attempt to accomplish as much work as originally planned despite the shortened time.

The schedule was revised to include a second excursion beginning at 10:37 a.m. EST Saturday and a third at 10:28 a.m. Sunday, with blastoff from the moon at 10:23 p.m. Sunday.

Controllers said the consumable item aboard the lunar module with the least margin was water in the descent stage. "And this is three to six hours above the three-EVA margin," they said.

"The outlook at this point is good," Mission Control said. The engine drains started shortly after 2 p.m. Thursday, just 20 minutes before Young and Duke were to pull Orion out of a landing.

Orion and Chaparral had separated and were behind the moon, where Mattingly was to bring his engine to raise to their orbit. In position to open his scientific instruments, he reported that Orion came across the edge and back into contact, Young radioed.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The rise in living costs eased last month as workers' average earnings showed the largest March increase in seven years, the government said today.

The Consumer Price Index, a measuring typical family spending rose two-tenths of one percent, less than half the February increase, including a marked slowing of grocery prices from the month before.

The report said living costs were 8.8 per cent above a year ago compared with 9.4 per cent annual rate of increase in the six months before President Nixon imposed the wage-price freeze.

The March increase brought the index to 126.0 of its 1967 base of 100, meaning it took \$126 last month for every \$100 of living costs five years ago.

In other major categories, housing costs rose two-tenths of one percent; clothing, five-tenths; medical care, three-tenths; and recreation, two-tenths.

Average weekly earnings of nearly 50 million rank-and-file workers rose \$1.08 to \$21.73 per week and were \$8.08 or 6.5 per cent above a year earlier.

After allowing for the rise in living costs, the bureau said the average paycheck was seven-tenths of one cent up for the month and 2.9 per cent above a year ago.

This increase from a year ago was the largest over-the-year gain reported for any month since 1967, the report said.

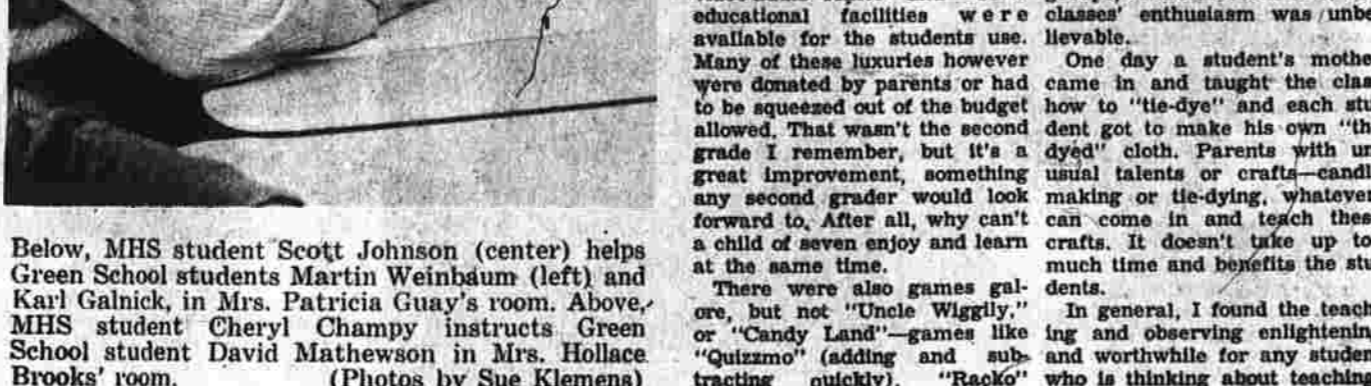
MHS Students Gain Teaching Experience

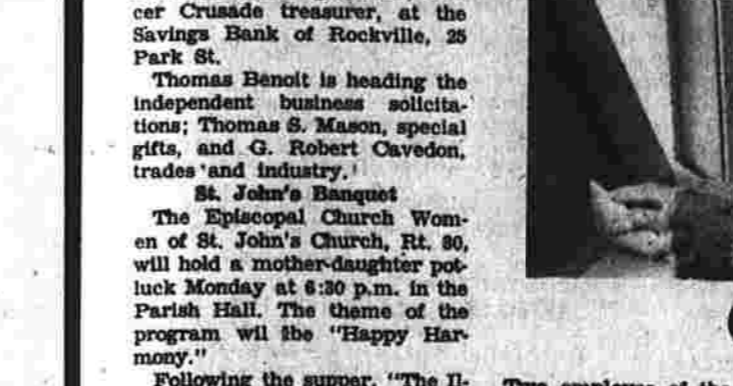

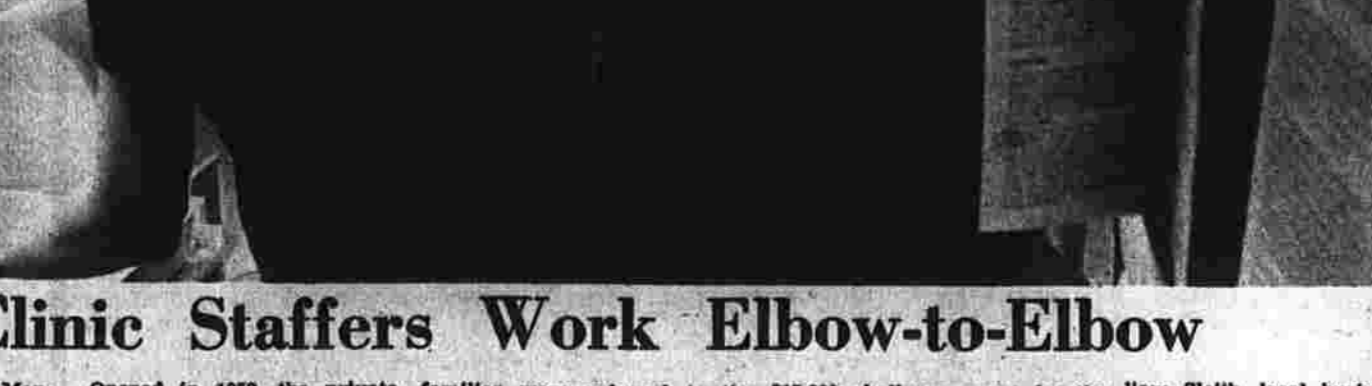

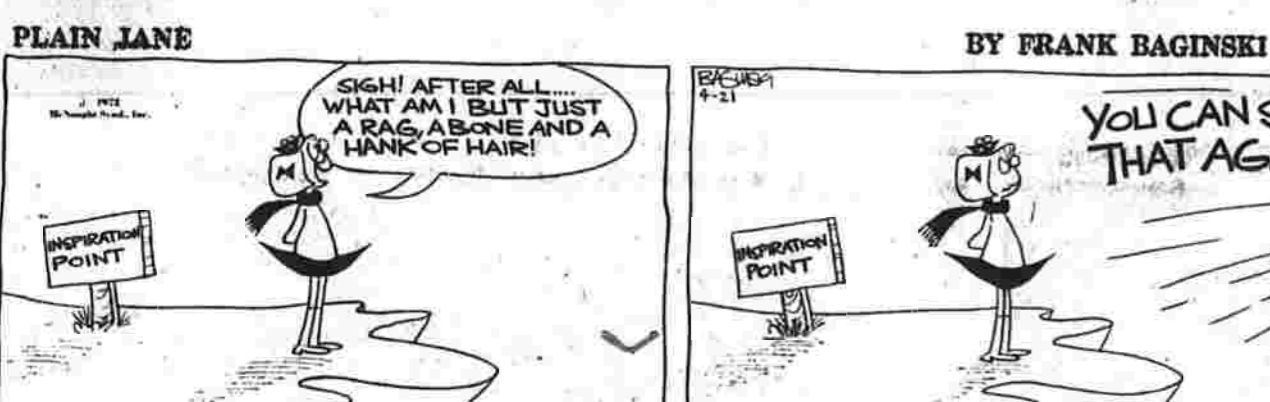
