Apollo Crew Ready to Come Home

The astronauts trigger the command Casper's big engine at 9:18 p.m. tonight to begin the 66-hour, 240,000-mile voyage back to Earth. Splashdown is scheduled Thursday in the Pacific Ocean.

The three astronauts were reunited Sunday night after Young and Duke blasted off the moon in the cabin section of the lunar ship Orion and skillfully maneuvered it to a landing two hours later with Mattingly in the option behind controls.

"What a ride! What a ride!" Duke shouted as Orion blasted away from the mountains in a 2877 ending a 7-hour surface expedition during which the moonmen set records for the amount of rocks collected, time on the surface and speed travel.

The two ships maneuvered about 15 miles south of Tan Canh and about 10 miles north of Kontum. Other lunar bases and towns crumbled in the path of the North Vietnamese onslaught.

SARCON (AP) — Spear-headed by tanks, a North Vietnamese division smashed the northern defenses of Kontum City in the central highlands to reach and drive South Vietnamese forces as far back as 15 miles. 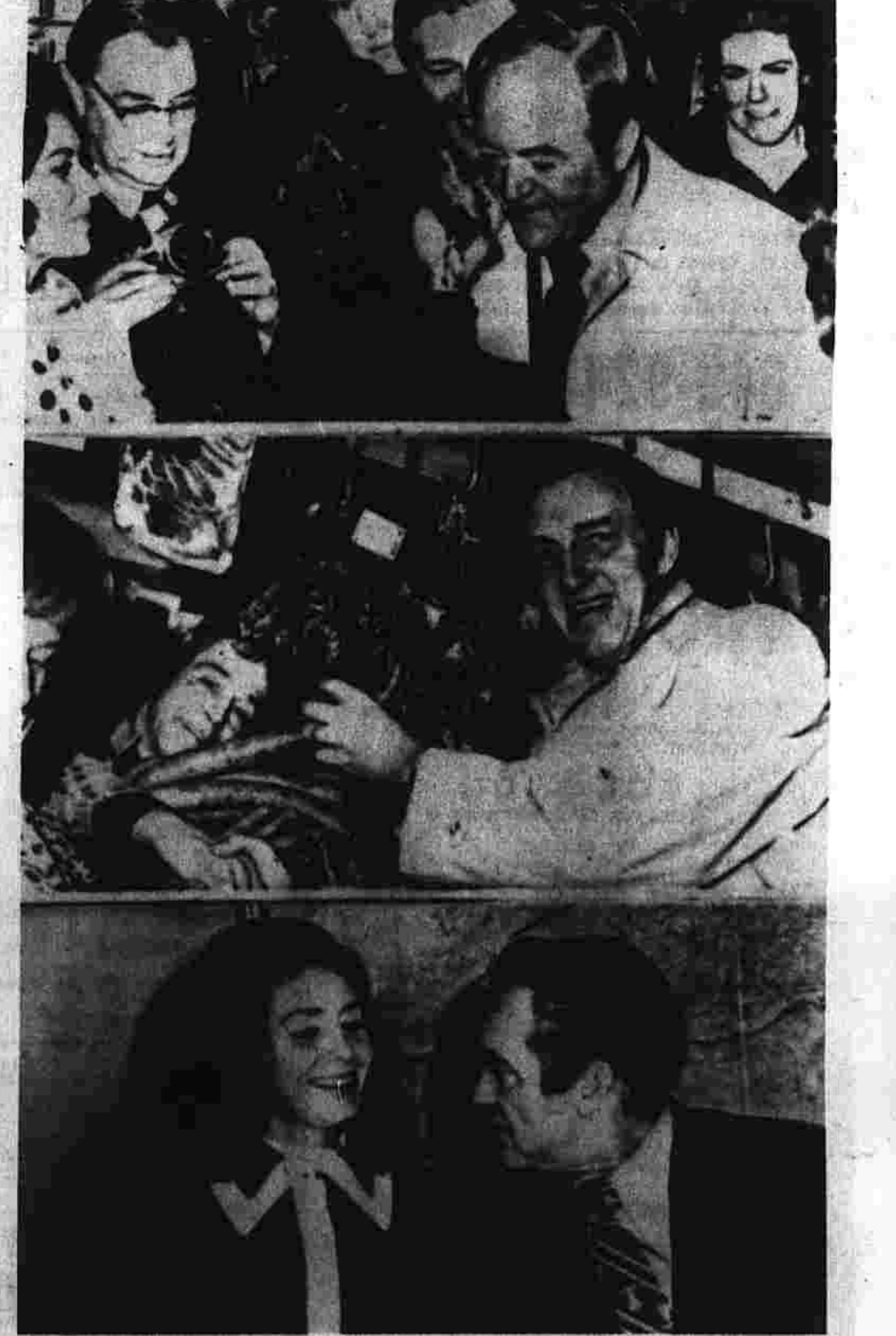

Gas Stations Told Of Limits on Cars

Service station operators in Coventry have been warned by the state that they are in violation of a new regulation that requires all unregistered motor vehicles, such as those registered to the state, to be parked in a minimum distance from the road property as set forth in the regulation.

According to Town Manager Dennis Moore, several complaints were received in the past few days about the parking of vehicles at service stations, and the unregistered vehicles were found in compliance with the local regulations.

While the specified distance from the street line varies from street to street in the regulations, it must always be at least 10 feet.

Convention Delegates Elected by Democrats

Delegates to the Democratic and state congressional conventions to be held in June were chosen Friday at a Democratic caucus attended by approximately 50 persons.

Atty. John Mahon, town chairman, and Richard Brestow were elected delegates to the state convention to be held June 18 at the Bushnell Auditorium in Hartford. The two topped a field of six candidates.

John Connolly and Ralph Donohue were elected delegates to the district congressional convention scheduled for June 24 in Lebanon. There were four candidates vying for the two spots.

A straw vote taken to determine the presidential preference of those at the caucus indicated that at Providence College and George McGovern.

At a town committee meeting which followed the caucus, the resolutions proposed by the committee member, John A. Bullock, were adopted. The first, which deals with the proposed budget for 1972-73, states that "many town officials and employees are making raises of up to 10 per cent." It urges that the raises and salaries of all town employees be reduced to the 4.5 percent increase per individual recommended by the national wage-price board.

Conservationists lauded the Board of Directors of the Bolton Athletic Association for "taking an aggressive step forward in meeting the ecological challenge."

The final resolution urges the selection, conservation commission and health officials to take steps to preserve the purity of Bolton Lake. It urges a "drainage" program including the installation of manholes to discourage pollutants.

Mayor Mark Reardon said that a registration evening will be held Wednesday evening from 7 to 9 p.m. at Community Hall. Persons who are at least 18 years old and have lived in town for at least six months are eligible to register.

The Manchester-Bolton Bloodmobile will be at Manchester Community College on Bidwell St., Manchester, tomorrow from 10:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Students at the college as well as members of the community will be able to donate blood during the session.

bump up against the continuing loss on profit margins must, if they wish to continue making money, lower their prices.

Grayson repeated earlier statements that about 40 percent of firms filing reports have shown increases over profit-margin ceilings, and that half of those have had acceptable reasons for the increases, such as seasonal fluctuations.

The other half have been unable to justify their increased profit margins. Those that cannot will be ordered to reduce prices or make refunds.

Grayson added that a "silent majority" of companies have lowered prices voluntarily to avoid exceeding profit-margin ceilings.

These companies have put pressure on their competition to also keep prices down, Grayson said.

He noted that in past months the commission has been accused by critics of being ineffective or pro-business. "As what I've outlined here today may indicate, we are not pro-business," he said. "Nor are we anti-business, either. We're simply and emphatically anti-inflation."

Grayson also noted that public opinion polls have shown that most Americans skeptical of price controls. "Perhaps, now that the story about the nature of our policy has started to surface, we can regain their confidence that inflation can be slowed down."

Listen To A Very Small Person
Dear Jacqueline:
You don't know me but I'm your father. At this moment you are but 8 days old, too young by many months to realize you are the fourth of our children, and too young by many years to understand what life is like in this world you entered so reluctantly. You arrived two weeks later than expected, causing your mother an extended confinement and your father a fortnight of sustained apprehension. We must talk one of these days about your birth.

How fortunate for us that you are a girl. Your parents think they are very good at girls, mostly because of practical reasons. Four children and not a boy in the lot which causes me to wonder what the formula produced a boy might be. Having myself grown up in a house with four boys, I can testify that girls are far more civilized and substantially less taken up with violence and destruction.

By your sharing a bedroom with Amy, you will be in a room with your sister. Beyond that, you are automatically heir to several boxes of hand-made dolls. Had you been a boy, you would have required your own room, and the sewing machine would have continued to bulk large in the room. And we could not very well have dressed a boy in all those pink and frilly numbers the other girls somehow managed to outgrow before reducing to shreds.

So your girlfriend is a pain for your mother in terms, and it is a pain for your father who knows enough about the cost of children's clothes.
Having said all that, I must admit I expected you to be a boy. The law of averages says I'm probably wrong. But we didn't have a girl's name picked out for you ahead of time. Deciding on your name got to be a very difficult business.

Now you may ask why your name wasn't named for one or both of your grandmothers. The answer is simple. The grandmothers are named Quesada and Lopez and both vowed to disown us if we picked names that they had each spent a lifetime disliking.
Behind our house is a woods and in the woods is a brook that is shinningly visible all winter when foliage doesn't hide it. So how about the name Brooks? We thought of it for a long time, even with its second letter, but your sister Leslie shunned the name. One of your grandmothers, the Agnes one, also thought Brooks a poor choice. And when I mentioned to my associate Joe Westlake that Brooks was under consideration, Joe—who would not bad mouth the devil without giving a lot of thought—immediately indicated with a look how little he thought of the name.

Anytime Leslie, your Grandmother Roberts, and a copy teacher agree on something, I promise you your father pays heed.
You may wonder why you were not named for one of the miscellaneous relatives that your parents had and knew at weddings and funerals. The problem is this: Although we dearly love all those relatives, all those relatives do not necessarily love each other. To name you after one would only get you off to a bad start with some of the others, so we avoided unnecessary antagonisms by selecting all relative names. There are times in this life when wisdom dictates chickening out.

But why Jacqueline? Well, it has three syllables and the name books say that a two-syllable last name profits by a three-syllable first name. Then there is the nickname factor. Your sister Elizabeth is known to the world as Beth, which is a nice handle for a little girl and a big girl.
So, if your talents are similar to Beth's, one day the world will say, "There's Jackie Roberts, the beautiful star of basketball and tennis." If you develop more along the lines of Leslie, the cry will be, "Look at Jackie Roberts, the jumps on that shiny black Arabian!"

It is a good nickname. It has no Rs and you won't have to repeat it to be understood. It is a nickname you will be able to spell before you get to school, although if you take after your father, you will be well into high school before you can spell Jacqueline without looking it up.
But as pleased as we are with your name and with you being a girl, I hope you understand that your parents occasionally wonder how it will be possible to underwrite four wedding receptions without selling the house, the car, and the sewing machine.

I can only say that your father is working on it. When you girls are of age your fathers will be welcomed with the normal amount of paternal suspicion. Warsaw Vs. RFE

WASHINGTON — The present drive to end vital U.S. government subsidies for Radio Free Europe (RFE) is being aided by a clandestine operation of the Polish Communist party, according to a confidential report from a reliable informant inside Poland.
This informant reports that the now-defunct regime of the party boss Wladyslaw Gomulka, about two years ago became disaffected with the lack of action on RFE, the Munich-based station which bears the name of the Polish and other Eastern European Communist states. Consequently, it set up a secret device to "systematically instigate opposition toward RFE" with \$3 million funneled into Poland's Washington embassy.
In charge of the operation, according to this report, is Edward Frelak, a member of the party secretariat. Besides stirring up opposition, it was charged with responsibility for supplying helpful information to American foes of RFE.

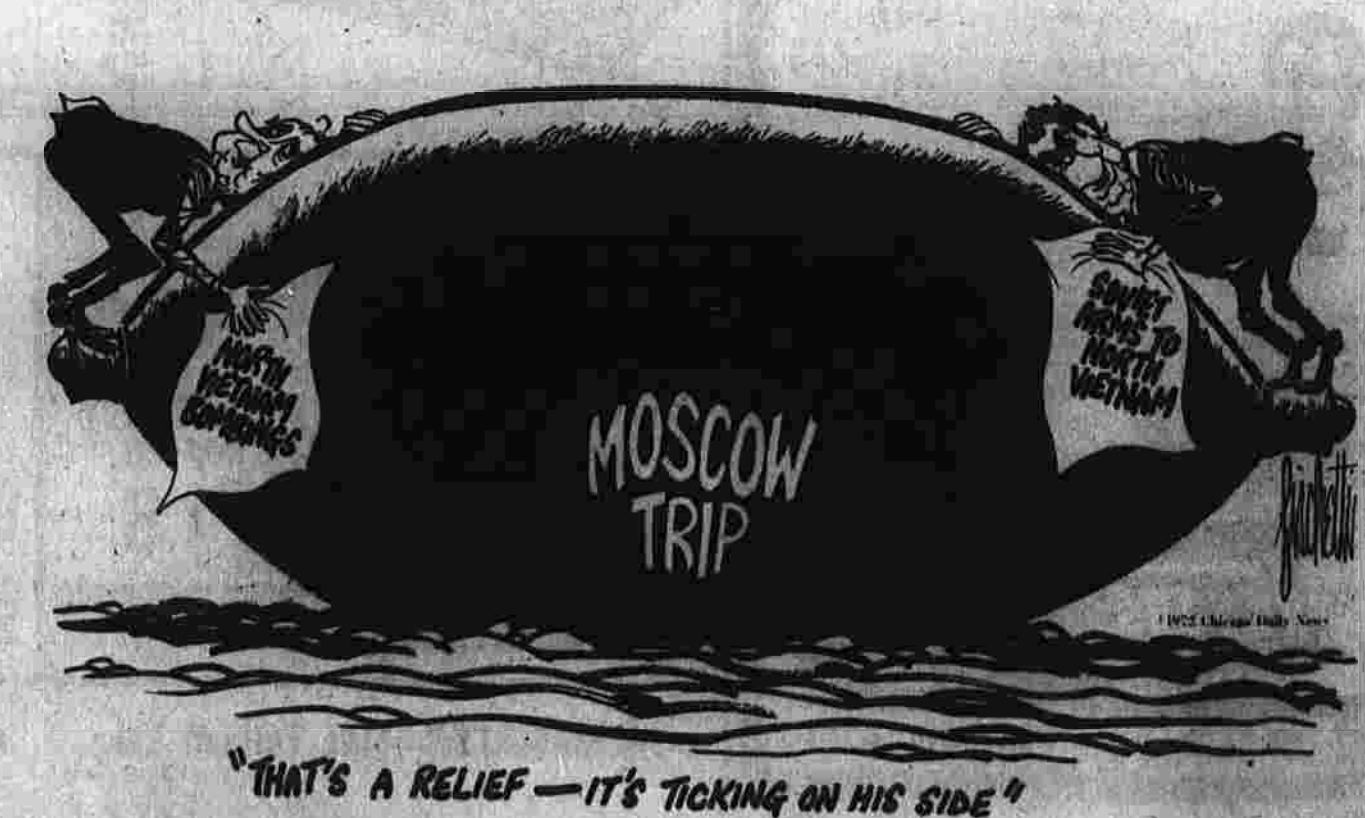

South Windsor Wage Issue May Spark Budget Hearing Debate

The most controversial issue at tonight's public hearing of the Board of Education budget is likely to be a possible salary increase for teachers and principals for which the council has set aside \$350,000.
The school board and both unions were unable to come to terms and the necessary paperwork has been completed by the board and the unions for a mediator to settle the differences.
At 10:30 Monday's council meeting, former Town Councilman Robert Sills turned the amount set aside as a condition of the hearing on the council for holding back on providing budget information available to citizens, stating that he has difficulty obtaining copies of the budget and other "public information" since he resigned from the council before the fiscal year. Sills commented that he never knew what a "vacuum" was in terms of what he would do if he were to leave as a private citizen; "I have access to nothing."

Democrat Challenges Election of Chairman

Tolland's Democratic Town Committee election last Friday was being challenged by the long candidate for party chairman, Kevin Cavanaugh, on the basis that Democratic Party rules were not followed.
He planned to file a request for a hearing before the Democratic State Central Committee in Hartford challenging the election won by Charles Thifault, 23 to 8.
The major point of contention according to Cavanaugh, is the failure of Thifault as the former party chairman, to answer questions concerning procedure which were asked in a letter sent by William Swanbeck, a member of the State Central Committee, before the election.
Thifault acknowledged receiving the letter but according to Swanbeck there were no answers. He emphasized that he was going through proper channels in writing to Thifault and expected Thifault would get the proper replies from the Central Committee.
One of the issues in question was whether or not the town chairman could cancel a regular meeting, as he did on April 24, the meeting at which it was assumed the election of new officers would take place.
Also questioned was whether a town chairman by himself could call an executive session. This was brought up Friday and voted on in favor of the executive session 23 to 10 after the meeting began and after much discussion. Reporters and other persons not on the town committee had to wait outside.

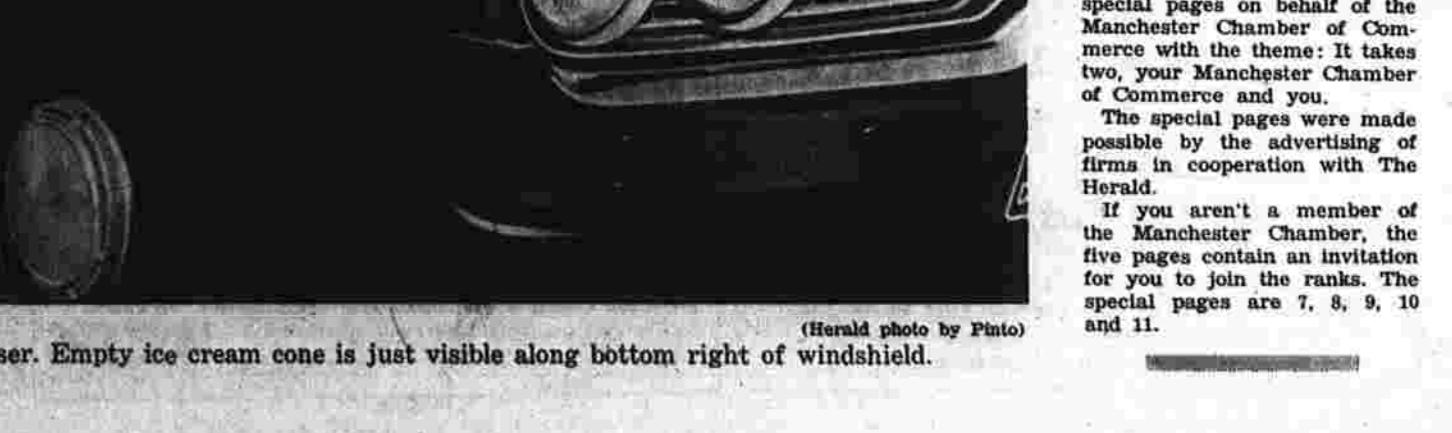
