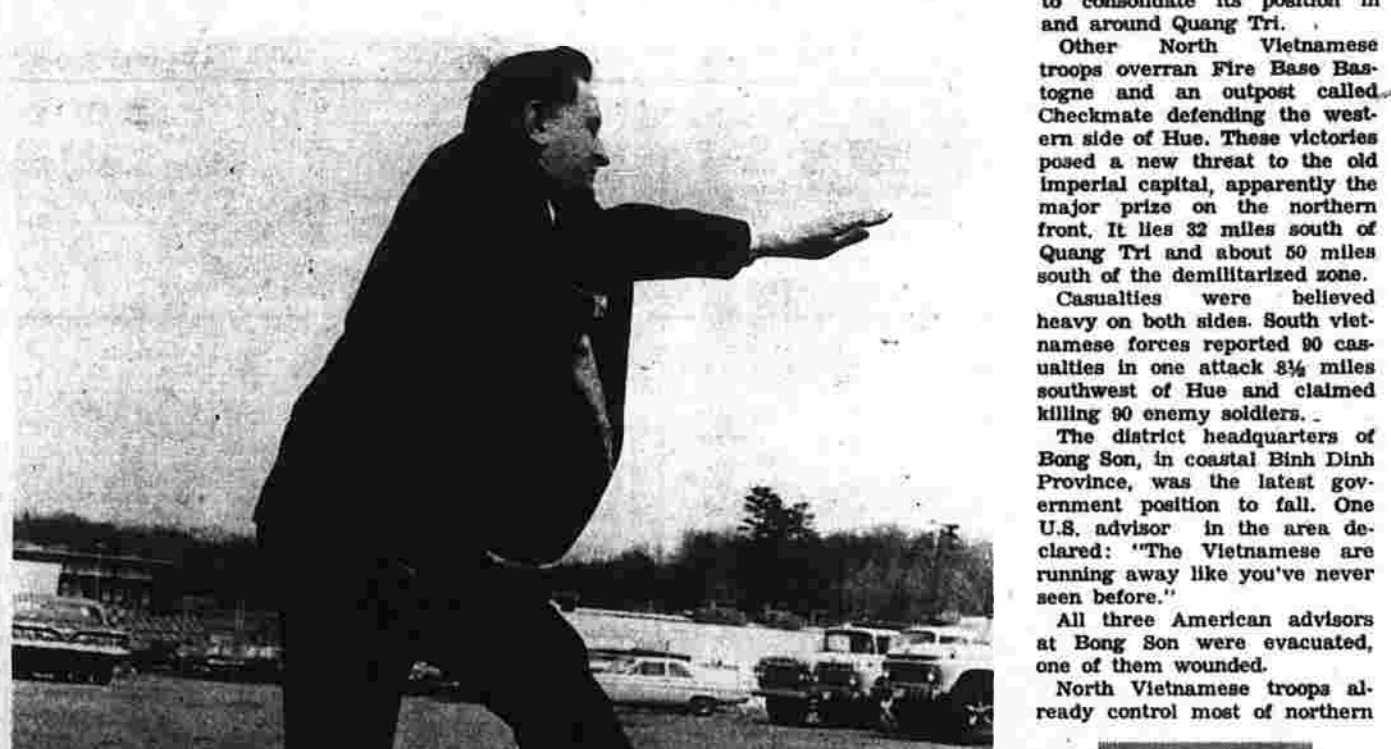

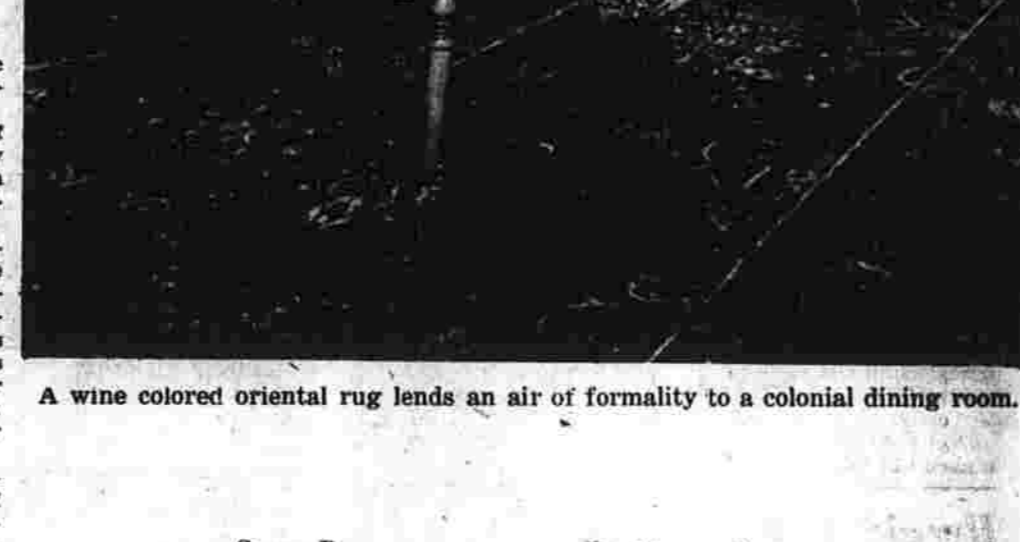

Coventry Town Told to Continue Pay Talks with Union

The State Labor Relations Board has ordered the town to continue its negotiations with the Coventry police union for the 1972-73 contract year, according to an announcement from Town Manager Dennis Moore.

Moore has received a report from the SLRB, the result of a March hearing held on charges of unfair bargaining practices leveled against the town by the police.

Heads of the charges was that the town had, in January, offered a 5.5 per cent salary increase to the police in negotiations which, at that point, had already been under way for nearly a year.

Moore said, was made in order to conform with phase II wage-price guidelines, and followed by a few months a 6.5 per cent offer from the town, made before the initiation of the Phase II guidelines.

In its report, the SLRB said the town was not in violation of the 5.5 per cent salary increase figure, but also noted that the town's refusal to negotiate that offer "did not constitute bargaining in good faith."

Commenting on the SLRB report, Moore said that he doesn't "understand the logic involved" in it was all right to make the 6.5 per cent offer, but in order to negotiate that offer, the town would have to raise it.

He said he had as yet made no decision on the matter, and will confer with the town council on what course of action to follow. No date has been set for the resumption of contract talks, which at this time involve only the salary dispute.

Moore also said there is some possibility that he would contact the federal payboard for his opinion in the case, or that there is recourse to the courts, although this latter action would prove costly to the town.

Last year's police union contract expired on June 21, 1971, and the five local patrolmen covered in it have since been working under the old contract conditions on a day-to-day basis.

Elderly Need Better Nutrition Says Geriatric Center Director

By JOY STILEY
NEW YORK (AP) — The majority of elderly Americans living alone—rich or poor—do not consume an adequate diet. That is the opinion of Dr. Herbert A. Seltzer, executive director of the Daughters of Jacob Geriatric Center here, who has conducted studies on the nutrition of the elderly and what can be done to improve it.

And he recommends that those who must eat alone make a ceremony out of it, cooking a full-course, balanced meal and eating it in the proper setting, perhaps with candles on the table and a little wine to go with the dinner if it's approved by their doctor.

The director, who holds an MA from Harvard and a Doctor of Divinity degree from the Jewish Theological Seminary of America, has headed the geriatric center for the past 32 years. A nonprofit Federation of Jewish Philanthropies agency, it has more than 500 residents ranging in age from 70 to 109.

Good eating habits are especially important to the elderly because they are conducive to better health, Seltzer points out. "If they stuff themselves with snacks they become obese and if they lose interest in food they fade away into nothing." He considers absolutely essential one hot nutritional meal a day, seven days a week. He thinks more local programs such as "Meals-on-Wheels," through which a balanced, hot meal is delivered ready to eat, would go a long way toward solving the problem.

South Windsor PZC Asked To Approve Trailer Use

As board member Emery Taylor stated, "if he (Alden) requesting a right-of-way, this is his deed to this land and is the only thing we can act on."

Drinkuth and Francis Dana said that, since zoning regulations specify a certain amount of frontage is required for building, Alden's case must be considered a financial hardship.

Zoning board chairman Harry Kirkham explained that the board never considers financial conditions as being hardship. He explained several times that the board considers each case individually, when variances are requested for rights-of-way to backlands.

Mule Marigolds Flourish

By Sheila & Allan Swenson

Yes, you can plant mules and get a colorful kick from them, too. Mules are the newest type of marigolds. They flower early, are ever-blooming and low enough for beds and borders. They display an array of shades from yellow through gold to orange.

Mules are unique. These marigolds are triploid hybrids. That means they're crosses between the large American marigold and the tiny French types. French marigolds have double the chromosomes American types do. So, like mule animals, these crosses cannot reproduce themselves.

To compensate for this they bloom and bloom and bloom in an attempt to set seeds. The seed firms must cross varieties each year to

produce these prolific flowering mule marigolds. The result is worth trying in your garden.

Nugget marigolds are the earliest flowering ever. They start in early June and keep going till frost. Only 12 inches tall, maturing in five weeks, these are ideal for fast color and displays in the garden, windowboxes or potted displays for portable color. An extra advantage is their strong insect and disease resistance.

The new Seven Star marigold, introduced for 1972, is the largest flowered mule marigold yet produced. These begin bearing 6 weeks from seed on compact plants that fit into mid-beds and borders. You can enjoy them right through frost. Since they don't know they can't set seed, they bear profusely in a multi-hued profusion.

On the horizon are new developments from plant breeders. As triploid hybrids are perfected and introduced a gardener's annual dream may be answered — flowers



that offer brilliant abundance throughout a longer season.

Plant a mule in your garden this year. Plant a team of them. Mules are surprisingly different.

HEW Funds TV Shorts for Kids

NEW YORK — (NEA) — Children in the U.S. watch between 30 and 50 hours of television a week, according to survey estimates.

With that much exposure, the tots to teens viewers hopefully could learn a lot of useful things from the nation's No. 1 babysitter. TV's critics, however, claim the medium falls far short of its teaching potential with most programming not educational in intent.

Public television has attacked this shortcoming with some success. Sesame Street and The Electric Company are classic examples of what can be done educationally using this most influential "member" of the family.

The latest entrant in the children's programming field is the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. HEW funded a series of 50 three-and-one-half minute segments dealing with three crucial areas of life: health, nutrition and growing up.

The segments are being shown daily for 10 weeks on CBS-TV's Captain Kangaroo show. Since April 3, children have been able to tune in the highly popular Captain and get a message from HEW as well. The segments are bright, entertaining sequences done in both animation and film. Topics include: the difference between being alone and being lonely; using food as a toothbrush; learning how to deal with making mistakes. They are far from controversial.

What has caused some controversy and concern, however, is that the federal government for the first time has funded programming for use on a commercial network. And the timing for the segments' premiere proved unfortunate since congressional hearings on the effects of TV violence on children had just concluded in Washington. It seemed to some to be a politically motivated move to gain favor on the part of CBS.

However, the facts, as Keeshan (Captain Kangaroo himself) relates them, don't bear out this charge.

"Last year," Keeshan explained, "HEW went to Sutherland Learning Associates

(a California organization that's produced educational/entertaining programs for 25 years) with a proposal for a series of segments on health, nutrition and growing up. The segments were to be shown in institutions across the country. Sutherland then came to me (Keeshan has his own production company for Captain Kangaroo) and asked me whether I'd like to incorporate the segments into our show. I would do a few-minutes' introduction to the topics and make some concluding remarks.

"I thought the idea was great and I went to CBS President Bob Wood with the

suggestion. He agreed. And here we are. It's not as if the government gave CBS money for programming. These shows would have been made anyway. We're just featuring them on our show."

Keeshan sees the segments as an extension of programming he has been doing for children for nearly 17 years. Adults will learn from them, too.

For example, one segment "Brushing Your Teeth with Food," has an animated character explain to children that certain foods—such as raw carrots, raw celery, corn on the cob—are natural "toothbrushes" that remove food particles from between teeth. Another segment deals with loneliness and being alone.

The theme song for the series sums up its basic phil-

osophy: "You Are the Most Important Person in the World—to You."

When Keeshan began his Captain Kangaroo program in 1955, he had what was then a unique approach to children's programming. As Clarabelle on the old Howdy Doody Show, he had squirted a seltzer bottle at people and thrown pies in their faces to entertain children. As the Captain, he opted for a gentle approach, a combination of entertainment and education, based on two main principles: (1) that a child is an intelligent human being who deserves respect; and (2) that a child, potentially, has good taste and it is up to children's programmers to encourage that good taste.

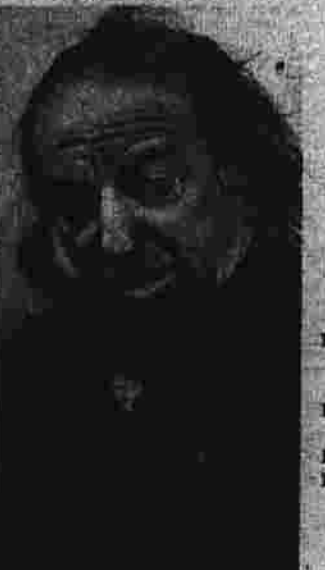
