BELFAST (AP) — A chain of explosions ripped through a big synthetic fibres plant today, setting off a quick-spreading blaze that threatened adjoining factories.

Bus Firm Hearings Opened

HARTFORD (AP) — The state Public Utilities Commission reopened hearings today into the condition of the Connecticut Co. with a lawyer for New Haven set to testify that the bus firm's pension fund is in the red by about \$8 million.

Edward F. Becker, in an interview before the hearing reopened, said the amount the pension fund is in the red is about the same as what he says the firm "drained" from its assets during a series of asset transfers in March, 1971.

Becker and Hartford's corporation counsel, Alexander Goldfarb, have been trying to get the PUC to reverse its rulings which allowed the financial moves at the time.

The current series of PUC hearings is on ConnCo's request for a rate hike. ConnCo claims it must be subsidized or face financial disaster. The hearings adjourned a month ago to allow an actuarial study of the firm's pension fund by the Travelers Insurance Co. Becker had raised the question of what would happen to career workers, if the Connecticut Co. should fold.

ConnCo serves Hartford, New Haven and Stamford.

Major Bartholomew Guida of New Haven said today he was disappointed that the PUC last Friday denied a petition aimed

at reversing the rulings on the asset transfers. He said he and Becker are considering a court challenge with other communists cooperating.

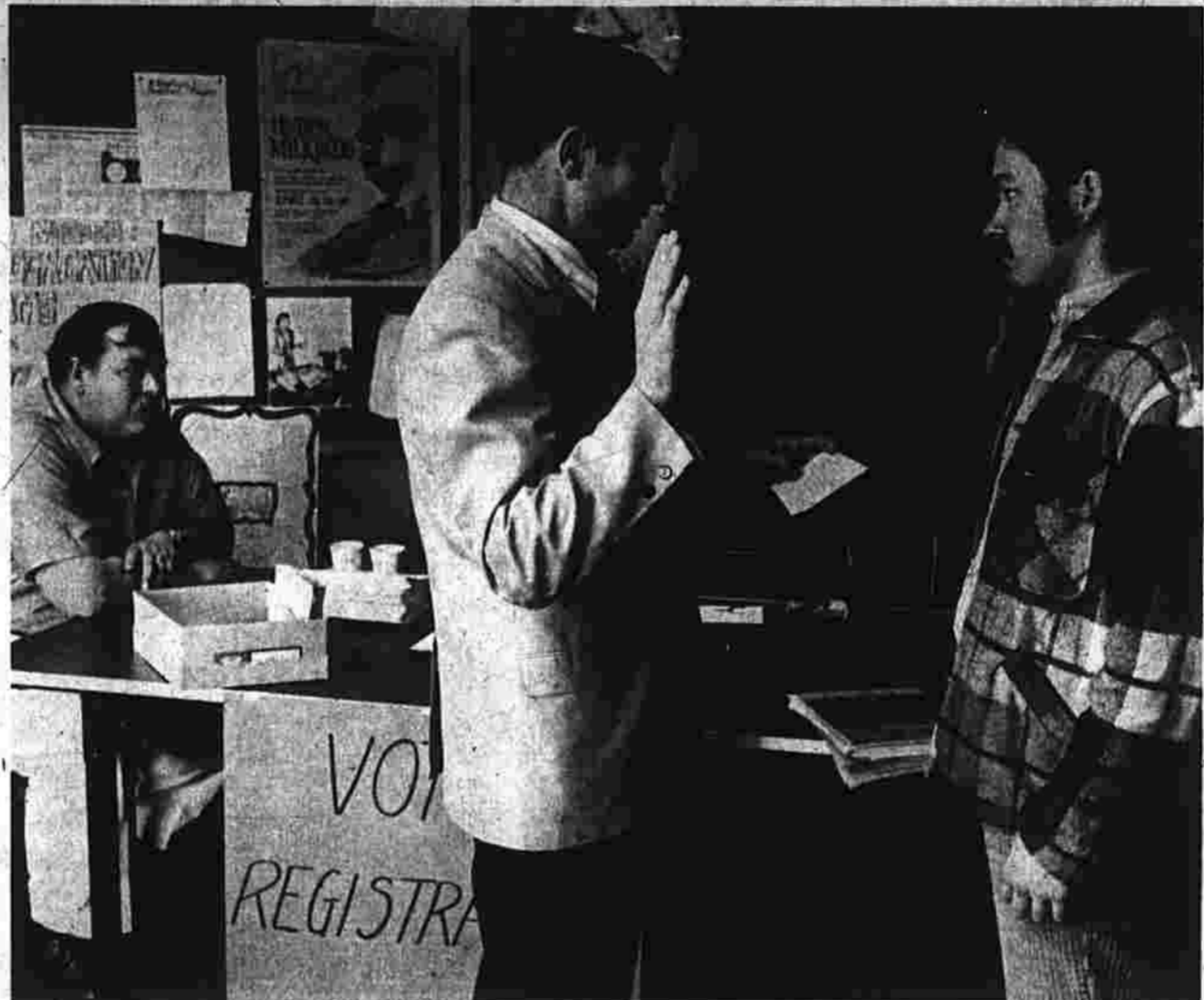
"The evidence produced by Mr. Becker for the PUC showed there were violations of the law involved and as such it will have to be decided by a court of law," Guida said.

The financial transactions which Becker is seeking to reverse involved creation of a new company, Transit Inc., into which the Connecticut Co. placed its assets. Then a new Connecticut Co. was set up, taking back its equipment, but not some \$8 million in assets.

Becker says the firm's financial difficulties can be traced to the financial maneuver. Company President E. Clayton Gengras, however, has said

Manchester Girl Elected President of CCSC Class

For the first time in more than 20 years, Central Connecticut State College seniors elected a young lady as class president. And she is from Manchester.

Today, Miss Patricia A. Lessard, 20, of 169 Lyness St. assumed office. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lionel Lessard Sr. and a 1968 graduate of East Catholic High School.

Miss Lessard, a junior elementary education major and a special education minor with a psychology concentration, led all contested offices in carrying her entire Progressive Party slate into office. Of 592 votes cast, she polled 198 to her opponent's 145. Her party also captured one of four class senators.

For three years, Miss Lessard has been a Class of 1973 senator and was vice president in her sophomore and junior years. As a member of the Connecticut Intercollegiate Student Legislature, for three years she was one of 20 representatives from CCSC to the state convention at the State Capitol and was recently elected a junior delegate to the CIBL.

She was named by F. Don James, CCSC president, to the committee that selects a faculty member for a special services award. In February, Miss Lessard represented the college on

William Cotter in his office. At lunch in the House of Representatives restaurant, Miss Lessard said, they discussed a number of major issues and problems on college campuses.

As a sophomore, she was a college presidential appointee to Gov. Meskill's Committee on the Aging, was named to "Who's Who Among American College Sororities and Fraternities," attended a New York City convention of the Eastern States Teacher Education Association as a CCSC delegate, and served on the college Student Senate curriculum committee.

Miss Lessard is a member of Theta Sigma Delta sorority, was coordinator of sorority events and rush chairman last year, and is currently co-chairman of its tenth anniversary observance next weekend.

Last fall, she was a volunteer worker four hours a week with physically handicapped children at the Aitken School in West Hartford and did her student teaching in first grade at the East School in Rockville. Since January, she has been spending three hours a week in work with emotionally disturbed children at the Wells St. School in New Britain.

While a student at ECHE, Miss Lessard was a member of the Future Teachers' Association for three years and presided

Deadly Sun Defeated By Loving Care

ADELAIDE, Australia (AP)

A 7-week-old girl was pushed in her baby carriage through the scorching Nullarbor Desert for five days by her parents after the family car's gas tank leaked dry.

Railway worker Graham Greenwood, 29, and his 19-year-old wife Marian, said today they kept baby Trudy-Anne alive by feeding her on water from the car's radiator, mixed with canned milk.

The parents lived on a pack of cookies and during the chill desert nights huddled together with Rudy-Anne between them to keep warm.

The Greenwoods set out April 23 along a little-used dirt track en route to Western Australia. They started to walk back to the town of Eucla after a rock

Troops Abandon Quang Tri

SAIGON (AP) — South Vietnam's first provincial capital fell to the North Vietnamese today after five days of savage assaults in the northern sector by troops of four divisions, giving Hanoi its biggest victory of its 38-day offensive.

South Vietnamese troops abandoned Quang Tri and into enemy hands went territory stretching from the demilitarized zone 27 miles to the south.

This May Day triumph followed the enemy's seizure of full control of the population and important rice crops along the central coast; the cutting of Highway 1 in crucial points north of Da Nang, site of the big U.S. air base, and renewed enemy pressure on Kontum, another provincial capital in the central highlands.

With the fall of Quang Tri, capital of the province of the same name, a threat became imminent to the old imperial capital of Hue, now only 24 miles south of the northernmost defensive line of the South Vietnamese on Highway 1.

Field reports said some 5,000 South Vietnamese troops were trying to escape the fallen capital as best they could. All American advisers were safely evacuated by helicopter shortly before it was decided to abandon plans to defend the city. Most of the civilians had long since fled and only a very few remained.

Quang Tri had a population of about 27,000.

U.S. and South Vietnamese officials had said one objective of the North Vietnamese offensive was to seize Quang Tri and Hue, capitals of the two northernmost provinces.

Hue is 35 miles south of Quang Tri.

There have been frequent reports that the North Vietnamese would attempt to annex the two northernmost provinces of Quang Tri and Thua Thien as part of a plan to give them political bargaining power.

Other objectives of the North Vietnamese offensive are to defeat the South Vietnamese army and prove that President

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Advisers Evacuated

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Plucked from Nazi Germany Henry Kissinger: A Silent Power

First in a Series WASHINGTON (AP) — War's prolog in Nazi Germany forced Henry A. Kissinger across the Atlantic to a new home.

World War II plucked him from a herd of would-be accountants and suggested a career in international politics for President Nixon's assistant for national security affairs.

The world war's continuing epilogue of small wars and threats of a major new one gave direction to that career.

Nations at war or preparing for it, or living in fear of new encounters never have been far from Kissinger's life as refugee, student, soldier, professor, author and presidential adviser.

On this particular day in Washington, there was a new crisis in the war in Vietnam, and Kissinger was in the middle of attempts to resolve it.

On this particular soft spring day, he has been on the run since early morning, bouncing in and out of the President's office, presiding at meetings of crisis committees, conferring

with top members of his National Security Council staff, talking with Cabinet officials and Vietnam specialists and continually grabbing the buzzing telephone.

Nixon wanted information on the new North Vietnamese invasion and options on what to do. How, for example, would the invasion affect plans for the presidential trip to Moscow starting May 27?

The President would make the decisions, but the fodder would come from Henry Albert

Global Emissary

Kissinger, sometimes described as the second most powerful person in the world because of his control of the nation's foreign policy machinery.

Physically, the description seems at odds with the man. Wavy brown hair tops a rather round face and a 5-foot-9, 175-pound frame. Horn-rim glasses almost hide blue-gray eyes.

Kissinger looks more the accountant he once wanted to be or the college professor he once was, less the focal point for information and options during another day of crisis in the war.

So in the late afternoon, after the President walked to his White House living quarters with his arm draped over Kissinger's shoulder, he was asked the question:

"Does Henry Kissinger like his job on days of crisis?" "Days like today are really not that bad."

He speaks in a deep voice softened by the accent of the Germany he fled as a teen-ager when Hitler rose to power in the 1930s.

"You are dealing with fundamentals. You are concerned with big issues. People think responsibility is hard to bear. It's not. I think that sometimes it is the absence of responsibility that is harder to bear. You have a great feeling of impotence."

"So days like today are really better than the ones when you spend all of your time dealing with petty bureaucratic

problems. Those are the worst days."

As he begins to talk, there is no sign of the considerable Kissinger wit, a wit usually turned inward or focused on his image as a Dr. Strangelove.

It could have been one of those days when Kissinger was edgy and irascible, when he felt burdened with the thought that any misstep, any blunder could wreck months of carefully pursued national policy.

It could have been one of those days when he tells friends he feels like he's been up on a high wire, a tight rope, without any safety net.

But a conversation in his office in the northwest corner of the White House gives few clues. What emerges is the orderly way his mind operates. A big problem is divided into smaller ones. A broad question is dissected so that the answers are specific.

Kissinger separates his job into three parts: "First, I try to place before the President the widest range of choices for action on foreign policy issues. Second, I see to it

Session Soft On Speed And Drink

We hope the members of the Connecticut Legislature will, during the week before they run for reelection and seek to return to their business making and unmaking laws at Hartford, pay some analytical attention to the factors contributing to the automobile accidents in their community and their state.

We recommend to their special attention, because they were a Legislature which refused to reinstate the once good and effective state policy of automatic suspension of licenses for all drivers convicted of speeding, all accidents in which an excess of speed was possibly a factor.

We would like to have them imagine that they themselves might have some slight share of responsibility for any loss of life which may occur on Connecticut highways as a result of drunken driving — to suggest to themselves that they might possibly have helped avert such a tragedy if they had gone along with Governor Meskill's recommendation that they enact a token, but compulsory experience in jail for anybody convicted of drunken driving on Connecticut highways.

There were, of course, those legislators who voted in favor of both measures and whom their only regret may be that they didn't fight a little harder to throw their pressure and the public spotlight on those other legislators who were, for various motivations, more dedicated to the principles of individual license than to those of collective safety.

While Connecticut did have its automatic suspension procedure for cases in which speeding convictions were involved, there were possibly some instances of individual hardship, in which suspension happened to some relatively innocent individual in his routine for earning a living. But when, in response to the long urging of its lawyer members, the General Assembly finally did put an end to the automatic suspension process, the state's traffic facilities immediately took an upward curve.

Undoubtedly it would prove something of an affront to some very respectable social drinker who just happened to get into trouble on the highways on one of the few occasions he had too many to force him to spend a pentential week-end in the degrading walls of a jail.

What was the chief contributing factor in the latest automatic fatality you have read about? Speed? Alcohol? Both together? This 1972 session of the General Assembly might have done something about both factors, and chose to do nothing.

Some Reason For Their Stance

Those terrible young people! Such is the common complaint, sounding in it as a sentimentation, and anger, and the puzzlement suggests that the attitude and conduct of the young are irascible. Why aren't they more like us? Why are they so turned off? For example, do thirty per cent of college students recently graduated prefer to live in some other country? The ingrates don't appreciate all the privileges which are theirs.

But just a minute. The young may be called and given to rushing to extremes. But have they not been through the rigors of the system? What, for example, of the spectacle presented to them during the U.S. national defense hearings involving the International Telephone and Telegraph Corporation? What does the national defense mean to them? The hearings are producing little hard information, and little to the point of which they are not already aware.

These are these people? Are they crumby little bums, or are they the best of our society? No, some are executives of a tremendous conglomerate which is in the establishment mythology of American excellence at its finest. Others are men high in one or another of our government agencies, as well as in the private sector.

As they take the witness stand one by one, and are sworn to the truth, what results is a reek of dishonesty, as well as a tremendous power of big money in affecting government which, in principle, is directed to the benefit of the interests of all alike.

WASHINGTON — A marriage of convenience between Governor George Wallace of Alabama and Rep. John Ashbrook of Ohio, the conservative Republican presidential candidate, has alarmed Indiana's Democratic party establishment over the prospect of thousands of conservative Republicans crossing over in Tuesday's Democratic presidential primary to vote for Wallace.

Wallace has been privately urged to stress the defense issue in his Indiana campaign, charging that Mr. Nixon's evidence of nuclear "astuteness" instead of "naivete" is superior to those of the Democrats.

Indiana voters have little cross-over experience, but there is solid evidence that larger numbers of conservative Republicans are now planning to vote for Wallace in the Democratic primary.

DR. LAWRENCE E. LAMB Broken Romance Is Cause Young Reader Tries Suicide

Dear Dr. Lamb—I read your article about the girl who tried to commit suicide. Well, I have had that experience. I took an overdose of aspirin, a whole bottle. Well, obviously I am still alive, but it was no fun. I sat through the whole time because I didn't want anybody to know about it, especially my mother. I did this because of my ex-boyfriend. I have thought about trying it again. I am so mixed up I don't know what to do. Could you please give me some advice? Is there any chance of ever getting over it? I went dead for a whole day because there was a ringing noise in my head?

Dear Reader—You are certainly not alone. In 1965, an authority estimated that there were 60,000 attempted suicides in young people up to age 20 each year in the United States.

The basic problem is continued repeated stress with elements in the environment that tend to cause the individual to feel isolated and alone. The precipitating factor, as in your case, can be a terminated romance. Such unsuccessful romances are particularly difficult because of the estrangement that often exists between the child and parents.

The best thing I can advise young people in your group to do is to seek medical help. Have your very own doctor. If you are in a university setting, most of the health services are reasonably familiar with the emotional strain of adolescents who have this experience and don't remarry have children with a lesser incidence of attempted suicide.

Either by mail or in person, it is unfortunate that some parents can't fill this role, but frequently they are so closely involved in the situation that they don't recognize the problem. It is much the same difficulty we see in the family that we see in the adolescent who is merely an extension of one's own being.

If you can't talk about this with your mother, perhaps you can find a mature and intelligent adult you can trust and with whom you can establish a meaningful dialogue.

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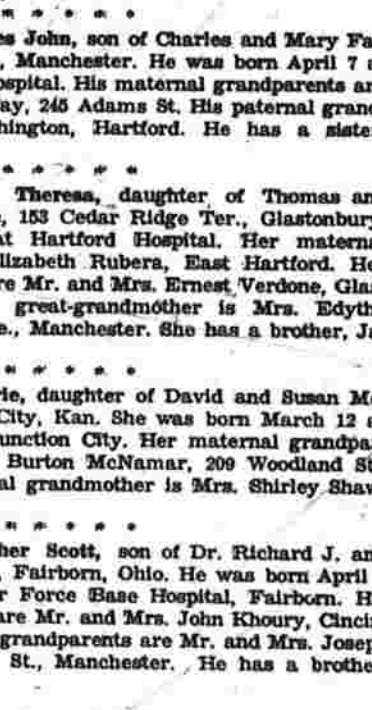
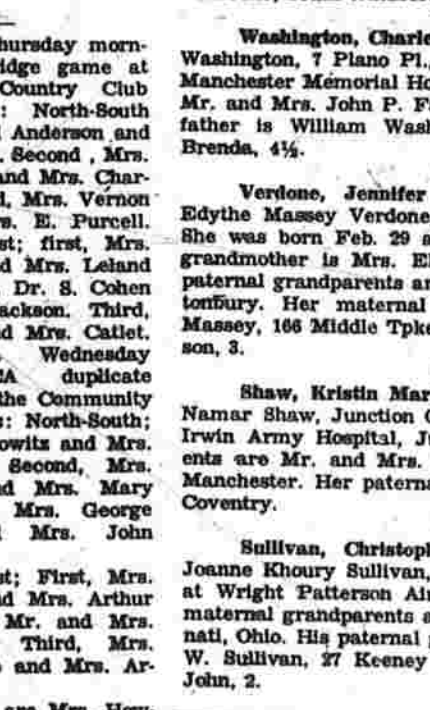
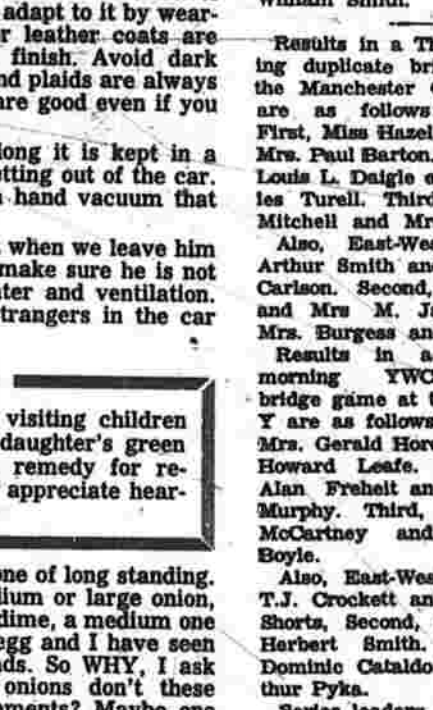

The regional Board of Education will meet tonight at 8 p.m. at the Rham Auditorium to vote on the requested \$1.5 million budget.

Andover's share of the Region No. 8 School District budget is just a little over 25% of the total, based on the average daily membership (ADM) of students attending last year. This amount comes to \$225,360 for the coming 1972-73 fiscal year.

The increase of over \$21,000 to the Town of Andover means a \$4-million increase in the tax rate.

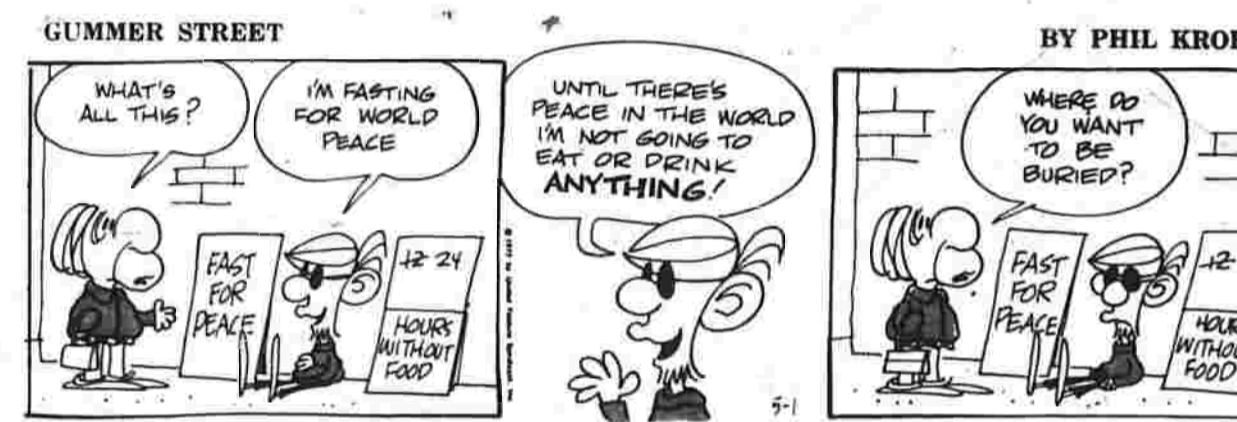
