Grim Days in Vietnam

Later on, in some happier day, we may be having it explained to us that what is really going on during the present military action in Vietnam, is the final exhaustion of North Vietnam's potential military effort.

We may be told, some day, that North Vietnam put everything it had into this current offensive, that, although it achieved instant and unmerging successes and caused near-panic in Saigon and in Washington, it was paying a heavier price than it could afford, and that in the end, it turned out on its real objective, which was the complete destruction of South Vietnam's military establishment.

We may get such a story later on, and we may be fortunate enough to have, in the continued existence of a government in Saigon, in the continued existence of a military line somewhere in South Vietnam across which the enemy has not extended his own reconnoiter of the country, some valid invitation to believe such a version of the campaign of 1972.

For the moment, the testimony from the front itself is heavily weighted toward less pleasant short range possibilities.

Once again, reports suggest that the South Vietnamese, for some reason, do not have a will to fight. The news suggests that Vietnamization, instead of working, is receding to the status of an imaginary program which never had any reality.

Once again, too, the news suggests that just about everybody connected with the American effort in Vietnam has underestimated the war-making capacity of North Vietnam and overestimated the efficiency of American bombs in blunting that capacity.

What the current news suggests, again, is that whatever we try in Vietnam, we can't win for losing, that the whole thing has been inevitably hopeless from the start, not to be healed or strengthened by the best or the most intelligent of policies, but always and forever hopeless, period.

Some American Presidents went into Vietnam with what may have seemed to them limited, but honorable, necessary objectives. President Nixon has been trying to get out of Vietnam. But he, as much as his predecessors, may still be, as they were, the tragic prisoner of the fatal original commitment. Sometimes it seems a mistake to try to rationalize the policy of Vietnam, and more appropriate, and perhaps just as practical, to look upon the whole thing as the remorseless unfolding of a Greek tragedy in which everybody is eventually going to lose much more than anything originally was worth.

On The Books

What happened when Connecticut adopted its first no-fault auto insurance system was that both the insurance industry and the legal profession dealt some hard blows to each other. The lawyers seem certain to lose some share of a particular kind of business because their services will no longer be necessary in many instances of injury. But before the bill got out of the General Assembly, they were able to fix upon the insurance companies a mandatory 10 per cent decrease in rates which was intended to be some kind of limitation on the financial gain the insurance industry could expect from the no fault system.

The public can take whatever savings result from this cross-ruffing of the two special interests involved in the business of injury on the highways.

After all, it is the public which pays them both. Whatever the interplay between the insurance industry and the legal profession, the dollars involved all come from one source — the citizen who pays the premiums.

It has been a tendency on the part of both the insurance industry and the legal

profession to collaborate in extra-generous use of that premium dollar which has led to the high cost of insurance and then to the resultant demand for some reform like the no fault system.

Both the philosophy and the opportunity involved in the great inflation of settlements and awards (the amounts may have actually been peaking out about the time the no fault movement was launched) need to be checked and controlled and toned down.

These settlements and judgments were frequently based on some kind of assumption that "nobody really paid" for them, that because the money was coming from the "fat" insurance companies, there was no reason not to be very generous. Part of the no fault reform is the recognition that there is only one place the money does come from, the citizen's pocket, and that the joyless system for redistributing it had to be brought under some kind of discipline.

Connecticut may find, after it comes into effect next Jan. 1, that this first bill represents less progress and less reform than is now being hoped. But the start has been made; once on the books, the law can be improved.

Down To Tea In Plastic Cups

In Britain, too, they have been losing their famous teas, and the other day, it was one of the most famous, the Brighton Belle, which made its ceremonial last run.

In short, had the French held out and turned the tide of that historic battle, the road to the defeat of the Communists would have been open.

Today, Hanoi's go-for-broke

The desire for continuity may well be at the heart of the matter, and other evidence suggests this: The inane babbling of a TV news anchor ("Now here's Ed Pumperdine to tell you how our local nine won today's game") ("Thank, Joe. Our boys won today's game 4 to 2. Now, back to Joe Billingsgate."); the extended use of panel formats for news anchors; the time-consuming repetition of "preview" headlines to hold audiences attention.

All this does provide TV news anchors with more continuity, but they cannot help but detract from their raison d'être, dissemination of news. It seems hard for an entertainment medium to understand that the packaging of daily TV news programs must take a back seat to news content.

TV news and bulletins have long since pre-empted the newspaper extra, and rightly so. They are faster, neater. Having vanquished the Old Guard, though, it is only fair that TV news anchors serve in its stead, which means delivering a precise, unfettered account of as much news as possible in their allotted time.

A good sampling of audience opinion might be enlightening to news-show producers. For example, it might be discovered that viewers watch the regular news programs in their entirety, and that excessive smiling and continuity gimmicks aren't really necessary. Connecticut Yankee

Some of our best friends are judges, and we think that friendship may stand strong enough to survive that slight dent of judicial ego which we usually confess to a belief that the General Assembly was primarily concerned with using, rather than rewarding, the judges of Connecticut when it adopted the recent mass pay raise.

Connecticut's esteemed and passably well cared for judges were, it turned out, the best paid insurance cover for the lean and hungry members of the Legislature of their own long premeditated and inevitable raid on the state coffer jar.

There had, at the outset of this season, been some naive souls who had thought that perhaps the supposed austerity of the times, the dark outlook for pay increases for all the regular employees of the state, and the official mood of supposedly stringent economy would all combine to cause the legislators themselves to turn shy and reticent when it came to claiming their own pay raise.

Most of us seasoned and cynical observers knew better, and we were not disappointed when the effort would be made.

All that surprised us, in the end, because it was so matter-of-factly, successful stroke, was the way in which the legislators tied their own future higher salaries into one big package which increases for other people supposedly even more desirably.

In this construction of a general package, a major role was played by the pleasant assumption that the state's judges, now being paid as low as \$21,000 on the Circuit Court and only as high as \$29,000 on the Supreme Court, deserved and needed a handsome increase.

Everybody, including Governor Meskill himself, singled out the judges as the prime example of under-compensation by the state. The judges themselves could hardly be expected to deny it; they must have found such special solicitation a pleasant, civilized experience. It may even have been that their famous judicial temperaments were slightly swayed, emotionally, almost to the point where they would have been tempted to issue a declaratory judgment that any Governor of Connecticut who refused to raise their pay, plus various other considerations, was grossly under-compensated too.

The judges were, at any rate, the key part of the package the legislature had in mind. The rest of the package was a certain distinction and dignity.

Does Full Moon Increase Murder?

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Outbreaks of murder may be triggered by the moon phase, "biological tides" inside the human body, a team of pediatric researchers said.

Dr. Arnold L. Lieber, a senior resident in psychiatry at the University of Miami's medical school, said Wednesday a two-year study had established a "scientifically sound relationship" between phases of the moon and the murder rate in Dade County.

Lieber said a chart of Miami-area homicides over the last 15 years plotted according to moon phases looks remarkably like a chart of ocean tides.

Using computer programs, Lieber and Dr. Carolyn J. Sherin of the University of Miami, analyzed nearly 1,800 murders that occurred between 1956 and 1970.

The data revealed that the county's murder rate began to rise about 24 hours before the full moon, reached a peak at mid-moon, then dropped back to normal during the waning moon phase.

During this "maximum tide" which occurs once every 14 days, Lieber said, Dade County's murder rate temporarily rose to four times its normal level.
