International monetary agreement was reached, major nations have been trading hard money as if the dollar was a new ether of currency exchange rates which also included revaluation of several other currencies.

It is the first time since 1934 that the dollar has been devalued, and the action has been little noticed by Americans, unless they buy a lot of imported goods.

Devaluation has made imported goods such as Japanese cars and German cameras more expensive. And, because the dollar is worth less against other currencies, U.S. exports to foreign nations are cheaper than were before.

Consequently's decision is a matter of historic interest because of the devaluation that took place in December, 1931, when some nations have expressed concern that the United States has devalued its dollar.

Price of gold made the move to Congress from \$35 to \$38 an ounce. That bill was passed and signed into law by President Nixon on March 31.

The treasury wanted another increase for passage of an appropriations bill enabling the nation to fulfill so-called "maintenance of value" obligations in international organizations.

The Senate cleared the legislation Friday. It called for an appropriation of \$1.6 billion.

The monetary agreement reached is only an interim settlement. The major nations are expected to get together this year to begin discussing reform of the world monetary system, a job that is expected to take a year or perhaps two years.

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Sheinwold on Bridge

RUBBING YOUR CHIN MAY NOT BE ENOUGH

Part of the art of playing bridge is to discover what the unlearned cards are so that you can play the rest of the hand as though all the cards were face up on the table.

West dealer. Both sides vulnerable. Opening lead - King of Spades.

West opened the king of spades, and continued with the queen of spades.

South ruffed and drew two rounds of trumps, disappointed that the suit broke 2-1.

South began to wonder what he was going to do with his eight diamonds.

Perhaps that card didn't bother you, but it should. The hand is quite worth an opening bid despite the strength of the spades.

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Locate the King. Declarer should try to win two heart tricks in order to fulfill his contract.

East should have either four spades to the ace, without side suits, or four spades to the jack with the king of hearts (the only missing king) on the side.

When East produces the jack of spades, you know that East must have the king of hearts.

Now you lead out at all the trumps and the top diamonds. Then give East the last diamond and make him lead.

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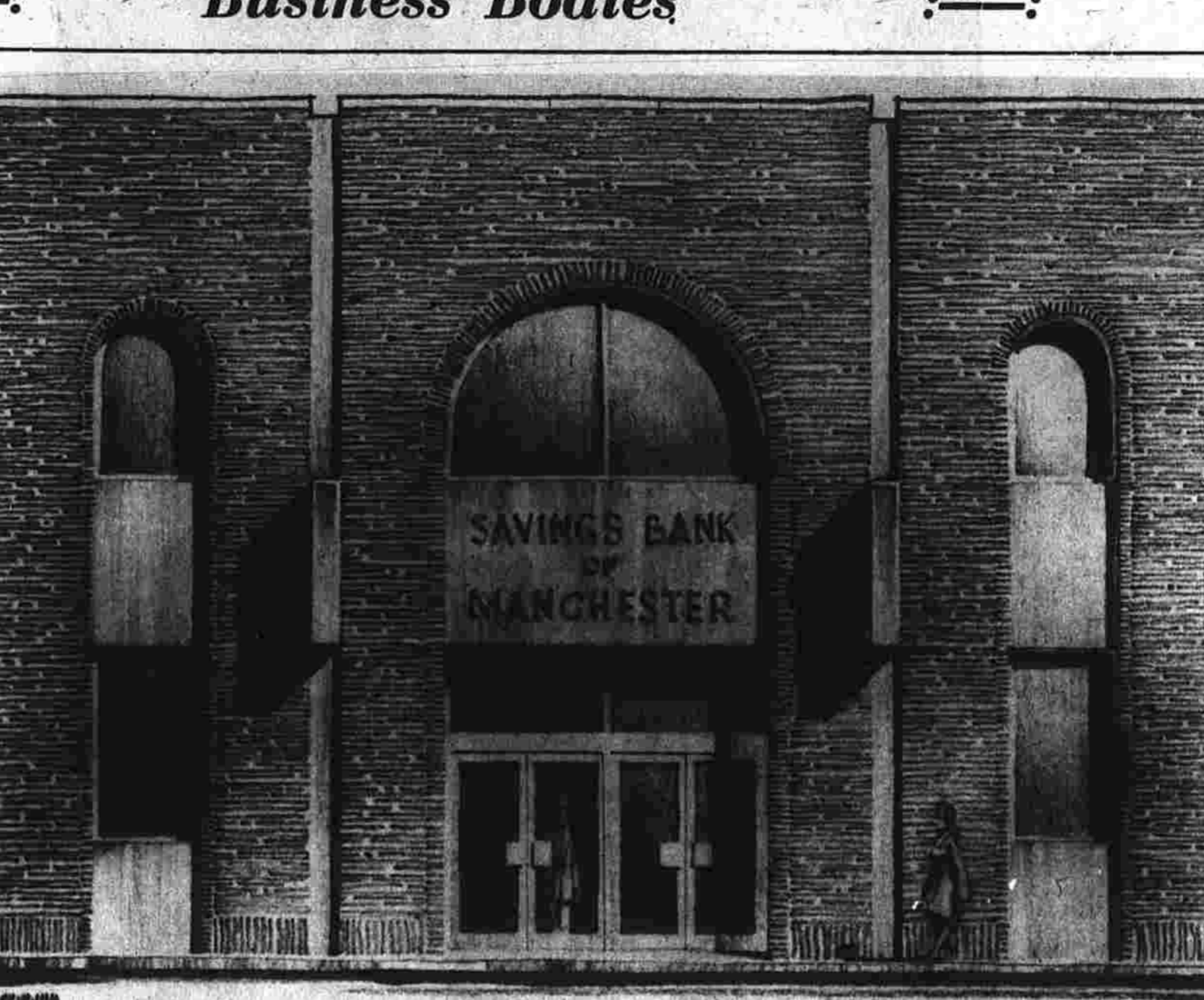

speaking thing, of course, even to be cool to a proposition which was going to put the name and charms of San Diego in headlines all over the country and the world. But there are, curiously enough, apparently quite a few people in San Diego who like their city as it is, and who think it is already big enough and crowded enough and popular enough. Such heresy — or is it sanity? — had perhaps better be glossed over quickly, lest it prove contagious.

**Maybe The Answer Is So What?**

Dr. William Shockley is famous for two things. As an electrical engineer, he received a Nobel Prize in 1956 for his work as co-inventor of the transistor. Lately, however, he has been specializing in theories about the inheritance of intelligence, and has made himself somewhat notorious as a result. He has argued that there are, after all, inherent differences in the intelligence of various races.

Now he and these racial theories of his have been put in the national spotlight because Stanford University has made a ruling that it will not give its graduate students any credit for taking a course Dr. Shockley wanted to give — a course in his own theories about the relation between genetics and intelligence. By the prospectus advanced for the course, it would concentrate heavily on an attempted destruction of what Dr. Shockley calls the "racial quality illusion," "the theory that all mankind has certain equal qualities."

"The fact human quality illusion," said Dr. Shockley on hearing that his course had been refused, "that thwarts objective inquiry is, in my opinion, far more threatening to the future of the United States than was the flat earth illusion of the future of Italy in Galileo's day."

It is difficult, at the moment, to think of any theory which is more unpopular and more contrary to the currently dominant hopes of the American mind than Dr. Shockley's insistence that there is a genetic difference between the intelligence capacities of various races. The feeling — or fear — that many of us may have that may be something to his theory does not operate to procure him an open platform for his presentations; rather, it seems to tend to shut him up.

But why, in such a situation, does it not occur to somebody that both Dr. Shockley and those who regard his theories as unpalatable and unwelcome are really manufacturing themselves a controversy which may not make any real difference or possess any truly vital significance?

Suppose we concede to Dr. Shockley some of his theories about the genetics of intellect. Does that confirm that the IQ is all or that the only significant contribution any race can make? Are there not other proficiencies of mind and heart and feeling which mean just as much to the future of all our mingling races? Why not concede Dr. Shockley the objectivity he demands in his theories as to the genetic inheritance? Within every single human family, no matter how small it is, there is always some one individual who is smarter than the rest, that doesn't necessarily make him better, or guarantee that he will contribute more to the family life, or even, for that matter, have children who are smarter than their own cousins.

**Shad Are Back**

There is no longer any doubt about it. Spog has arrived. The shad run has started in the Connecticut River.

The shad are an infallible barometer. When the sun takes some of the chill from the icy runoff of Vermont and New Hampshire snows the shad head upstream for spawning. It is one of nature's unerring cues.

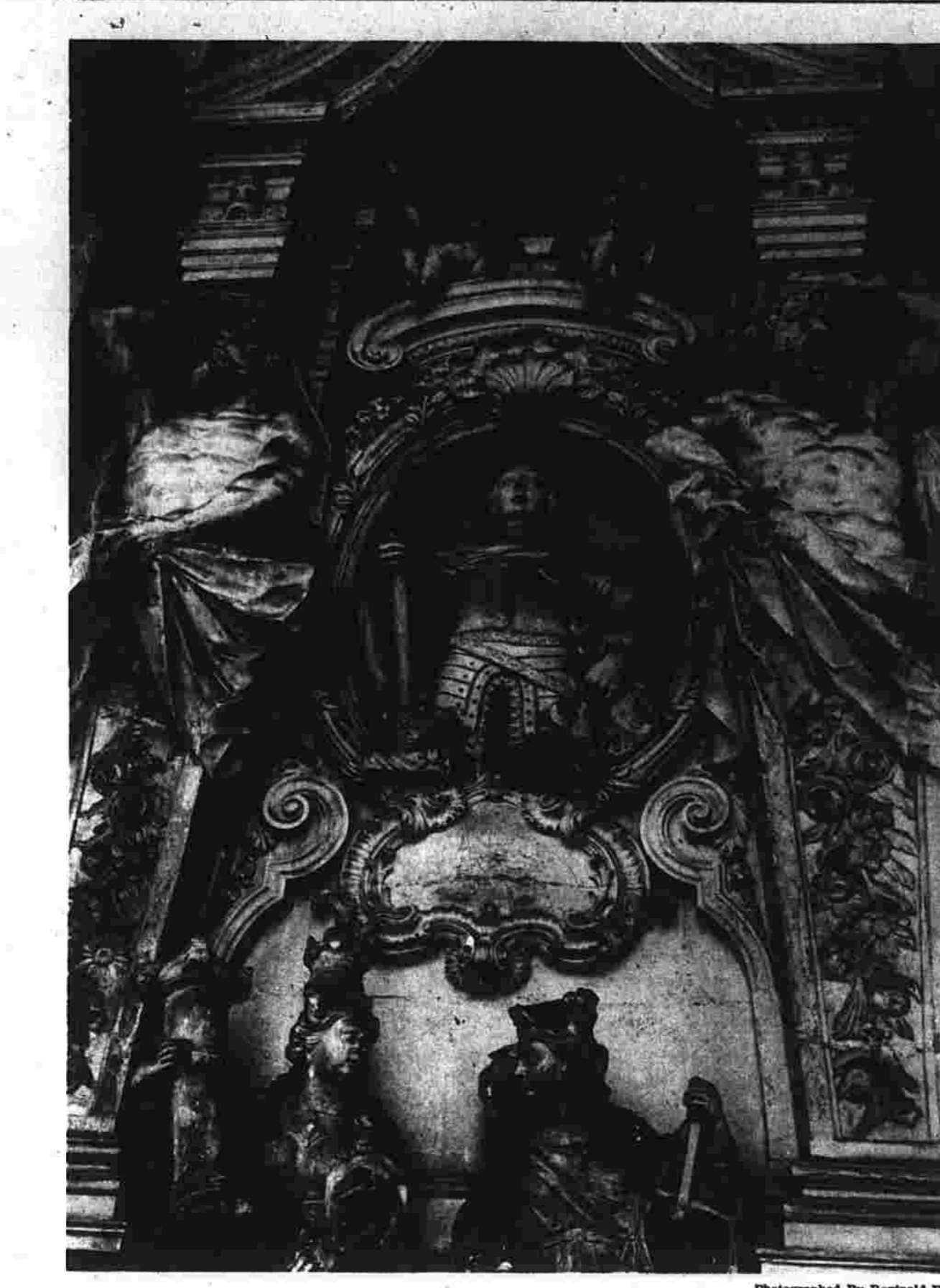
Hubert Spencer, who has been catching and wholesaling shad for 50 years, says the run this year should be heavy and the fish more succulent because of improved quality of the water. Spencer said the river is no longer an "open cesspool." The campaign against industrial and municipal pollution of the river must be showing results.

On the first big catch day seven fishermen brought Spencer \$700 pounds and the lake is expected to increase before the shad return to the sea in mid-June. The early wholesale price is high — 40 cents a pound for a female with roe and 15 cents for a male.

By the time the shad are boned the retail price may be as high as 90 cents a pound. Boned shad are in demand but it is increasingly difficult to get skilled help to do the job. Shad are just too bonny for most people. They like the tender flesh but won't struggle with those countless fine bones.

Shad migrate great distances. The season starts at the rivers emptying into Chesapeake Bay and moves north to the Delaware, Hudson and Connecticut. Each season an estimated 50,000 are "lifted" over a power company dam at Holyoke. Shad have been caught as far north as northern Vermont near the Connecticut Lakes source of the river.

### Humphrey's Problem

WASHINGTON—Two months ago, Howard M. Metzbaum, a leading aspirant for the 1974 Democratic Senatorial nomination in Ohio, pointedly sought out Frank King, Ohio's AFL-CIO chief, to say that although he "loved" Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey, he would have to stay scrupulously neutral in the Ohio Presidential primary election.

This King was not only stunned but furious when Metzbaum broke that pledge and gave Sen. George McGovern a ringing endorsement last Sunday at a United Jewish Appeal dinner in Cleveland. Adding insult to injury, Humphrey himself went on the speakers platform to avoid affronting the regular Democratic organization, committed almost wholly to the non-active candidacy of Sen. Edmund Muskie (who polled just over 10 per cent of the county's total vote).

McGovern, under no such restraints with his anti-establishment crusade, had youthful workers in every precinct and

The town will spray Camp Merrywood, a girl scout camp in the south end of town, as recommended by the Conservation Commission in an effort to prevent defoliation there by gypsy moths.

A survey by the health department shows that flu vaccinations do have an effect in reducing flu cases and their severity.

Britain Falls To Germany In the War?

LONDON (AP) — The British Broadcasting Corp. is going ahead with a controversial documentary on what might have happened if Britain had fallen to Nazi Germany in World War II.

The decision to make the program — "If Britain Fell" — was taken by the BBC's chairman, Lord Hill, despite protests that it would be derogatory to Britain.

Replying to published protest letters, Lord Hill said the program would include a great deal of new material and was "certainly a legitimate subject for study and public discussion."
