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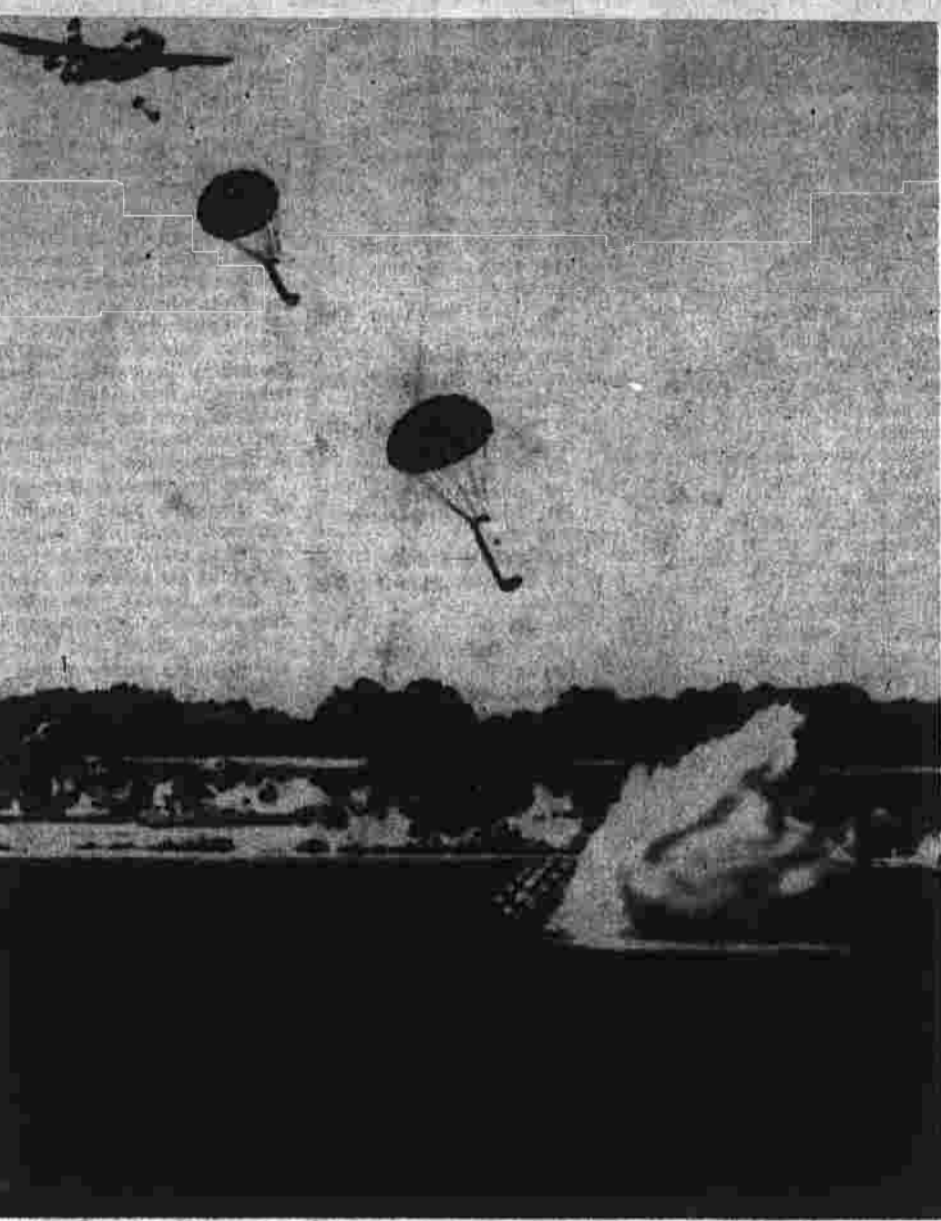

# Suicide is 'Nothing,' Says Man Once There

NEW YORK (AP) — A man who has tried to commit suicide is disappointed.

"There was nothing, just nothing," recalled Al (for Al) Alvarez, 42, who gulped down 45 sleeping pills 11 years ago and survived after doctors thought he would die.

"I thought death was going to be dramatic and fascinating like the last reel of an Alfred Hitchcock movie where everything was explained. But nothing was explained," said the British critic and author.

Alvarez, a slight, gray-haired man who accents his last name on the second syllable and shortens it to "Al," for his byline, said that the experience taught him something. He learned "that there weren't ever going to be any answers and ever going to be any answers, but it is already the beginning of happiness."

As a result, he said, "you learn that the world is a strange place, not even a dramatic place. But you have to make a life for yourself. I'm a different person. Now I expect less."

Alvarez compiled his thoughts and research on the nature of suicide in a new book, "The Savage God," which he says he wrote "to bring this taboo subject out in the open and possibly to help someone."

He listed other characters in his secret people don't want to talk about," he said. "But

there's nobody who hasn't been "Actually I did meet someone — an Australian TV personality, the only one I ever met who said he'd never been suicidal. I reckoned he was in real trouble."

In this book, which took 3 1/2 years to write — "quite a depressing time" — Alvarez punishes many of the myths about suicide. Sweden does not have the highest suicide rate; Hungary does. Young romantics are not the most likely to kill themselves at Christmas time; it's middle-aged — 45-65 — people who are suffering the pangs of death, and it reaches its peak during the summer months.

Alvarez said dentists and doctors had the consistently highest suicide rates, "largely because they have access to drugs and maybe it has something to do with having money," he suggested.

"When you're back against the wall, when you're poor, you learn that the world is a strange place. But you have to make a life for yourself. I'm a different person. Now I expect less."

Alvarez also studied suicide victims from Socrates to the friend, poet Sylvia Plath, said that today's most common factor in suicide is loneliness. If someone can get through to someone, he said, "the chances are he won't take his life."

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# Brandt Treaties Threatened

BONN, Germany (AP) — West German Chancellor Willy Brandt's treaties with the Soviet Union and Poland and East-West relaxation in Europe were threatened today by Brandt's failure to overcome differences with foes of the pact.

Only hours before the treaties were to have come before parliament, Brandt and his cabinet were to have held a meeting to discuss the pact.

The Christian Democrats demanded not only the statement on unification but a confirmation of it from the Soviet Union. The treaties, signed by Brandt during 1970 journeys to Moscow and Warsaw, renounce the use of force and recognize Germany's losses of territory as a result of World War II.

German spokesman Conrad Adenauer said it is doubtful the treaties will come before parliament as scheduled. But he said the fact talks are continuing represents progress toward success.

# Italian Voters On Shaky Ground

ROME (AP) — Returns from Italy's parliamentary election indicated more years of shaky coalitions led by the Christian Democrats and uncertain prospects for sorely needed social reforms.

The Vatican-backed Christian Democrats, who have dominated Italian politics since World War II, unexpectedly held their own against a center-right coalition with the Liberals, Republicans and the Democratic Republicans were the smaller moderate party was down.

It appeared that the Christian Democrats might have to try to rebuild the center-left coalition with the Socialists and Socialist Democrats which collapsed in last year's bitter January 1971 party again won but districts had formed Italy's governments for 10 years.

The biggest losers in the Senate were the Liberals, who dropped from 16 to 8. The Communist and the Protestant Socialist allies won a loss of vote, getting around 8 to 9 per cent, but without enough support to form a majority with the Socialists.

Who Can Accept Defeat? This is a deadly serious moment in the Vietnam war.

The President of a great country has found himself faced with a prospect he thinks both he and his nation are incapable of accepting.

He has taken desperate action to avoid that prospect. The desperate action he has taken puts before another great power a prospect which it may find itself equally incapable of accepting.

To recapitulate: President Nixon finds that none of the policies he had been depending upon...

The good example of our own progressive withdrawal of troops from the war, the thing called "Vietnamization" which was supposed to produce South Vietnam's capacity to defend itself...

The action the President has taken—the effort to use our mines and bombs to impose what has to result in, if it works, a quarantine on all kinds of supplies for North Vietnam, is desperate because there may be no guarantee that it is going to work...

The decision the President puts up to Russia is, in a way, much the same decision he has found himself faced with, and answered with his own escalation of our own role in Vietnam.

When Merrill Discusses Tuition It seems to us a strange and continuing misconception of the true opportunities and responsibilities of state education policy for Governor Merrill to keep taking the view that one of the objectives of the state's tuition system should be to eliminate what he calls competition between the state's public and private schools in the field of higher education.

"In formulating policies for public higher education," said the Governor at the University of Bridgeport Monday, "I think the state government should always do so with an eye to the effect those policies will have on the private schools."

"The public and private institutions should be complementary and not competitive. . . In higher education, I think one of our main goals should be to minimize or eliminate, if possible, non-educational considerations from the decision-making process of students choosing between public and private schools."

"This was one of the most compelling reasons for imposing tuition at the University of Connecticut and for increasing tuition at other state-run schools. Our new tuition policy eliminated a major and important difference, a non-educational difference, that separated public and private schools."

"It does not take any great insight," the Governor continued, "to realize that the free lunch is always the most popular item on the menu. Public schools that are tuition free or that can run with relatively low tuition levels have a tremendous competitive advantage over costly private schools."

"This is so because the cost of an education is a major factor in the decisions of college bound students. In a tuition free situation, it could easily be the only factor. The new tuition schedules is a small step toward rectifying this imbalance."

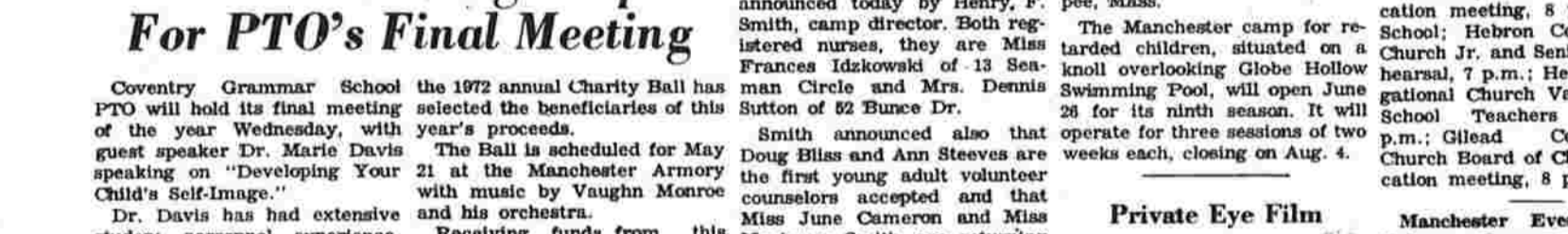

# Vernon Two-Shift High School Day Favored For Space Saving

While the Board of Education that the work experience program could be expanded in both the morning and afternoon for a classroom space it will have next September, the following fall it will have a serious space problem at the high school level. Last night the board considered several suggested plans for a temporary solution to this problem.

Following the presentation of a variety of proposals by Dr. Robert Linstone, assistant superintendent, the board was asked to reflect on the ideas and come back next month with a recommendation for the administrators.

After reviewing several plans, the administrators — Dr. Raymond Ramsdell, superintendent and Albert Kerin and Linstone, assistant superintendents — recommended to the board that an extended day plan be adopted for the 1973-74 school year as a first step. Plans for an expansion of the high school were defeated earlier this year in a special referendum.

The recommended plan would extend the school day to accommodate two shifts of students. Flexible cycles, starting with the second period through the sixth period, would be built in as needed, by the students, Dr. Linstone explained.

Plans call for the juniors and seniors to meet in the morning session, which would probably start at 7. There would be a mid-day activity period for student help, clubs and staff meetings.

Listing the advantages, the administrators said the proposed plan would offer a fairly complete program to all high school students meeting their academic needs and space would be available to develop offerings until the high school expansion is accomplished. Another advantage would be that the work experience program could be expanded in both the morning and afternoon for a classroom space it will have next September, the following fall it will have a serious space problem at the high school level.

Other plans discussed included the "48-15" plan in which students are in school nine weeks and off for three weeks. An enrollment 25 percent greater could be handled by existing facilities in hook plan, Dr. Linstone said.

# THE ORGANIC HOME GARDENER'S NOTEBOOK

It Makes Cents to Reuse Broken Items

By Sheila & Allan Swenson

Save it. Use it again. That's the motto of thrifty gardeners. It makes good cents. So many things around your home and garden can be put to helpful second use.

We're all for recycling, composting, conservation. More and more people every month join the movement. Many items you might discard can be given new life and a second chance.

The old garden hose you ran over with the mower is a choice. Either repair it with the new splices and end fittings or... cut it up to prevent any wires from cutting into the young tree.

Silt one piece the length of your pruning and log saws. The piece slips on the sharp teeth neatly and

surrounding a strawberry bed, tucked with a lath brace on the inside, keep runners in the area desired. They are also sturdy enough as a frame on which to place screens during ripening time to keep birds out.

Save the wire and hurlap from bales of peat moss or sphagnum.

Burlap is handy when you want to ball the roots of a shrub to be moved, keep soil off lawns when digging holes, protecting valuable tender new shrubs from the first winter. The wire is useful to brace new trees, tie up plants against stakes, attach fencing to posts for vines to grow on.

When you build a patio or path of brick or stones, save the old handle. It makes great stakes for lining up bricks in the garden, marking out new beds and borders or as tent pegs.

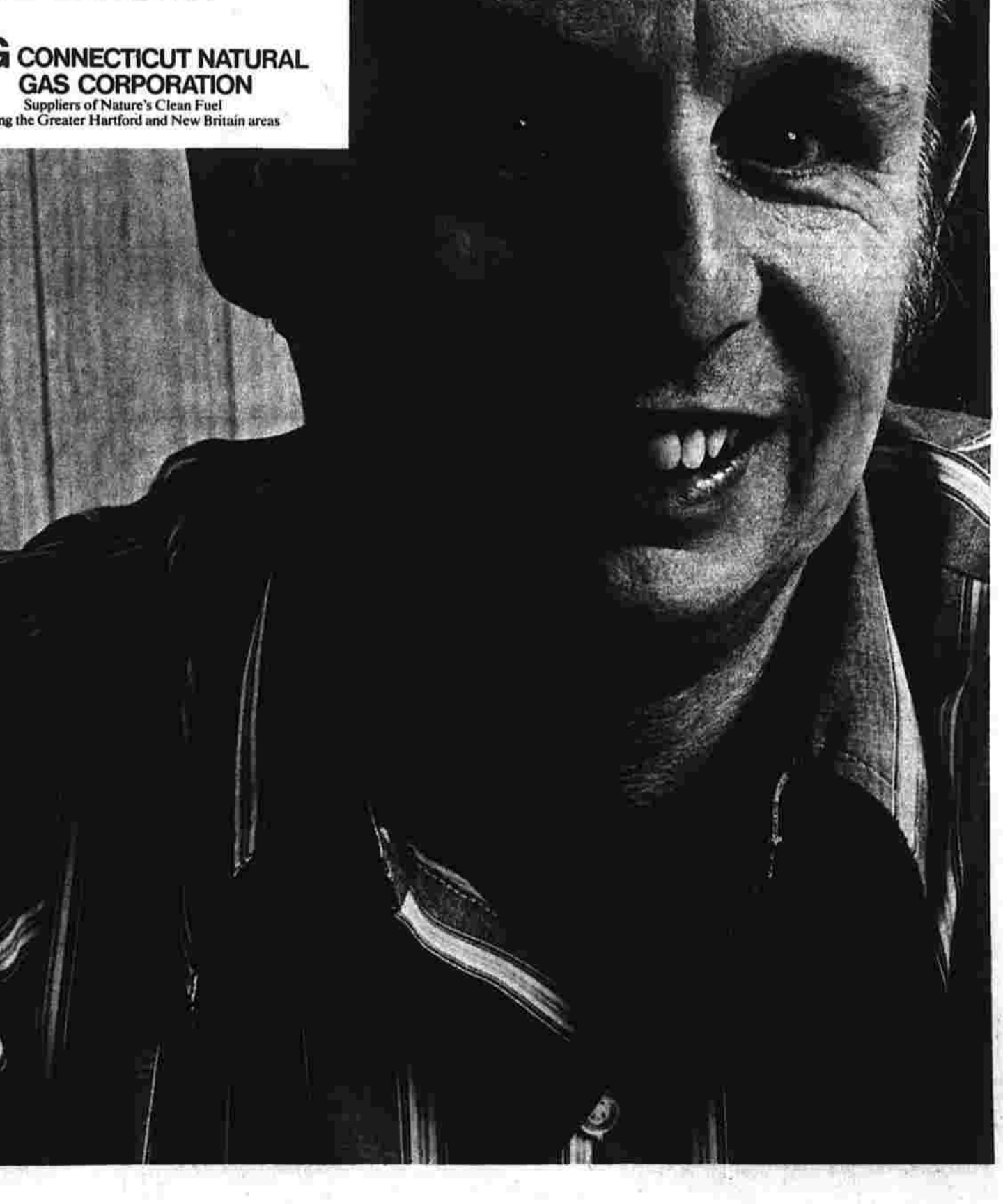

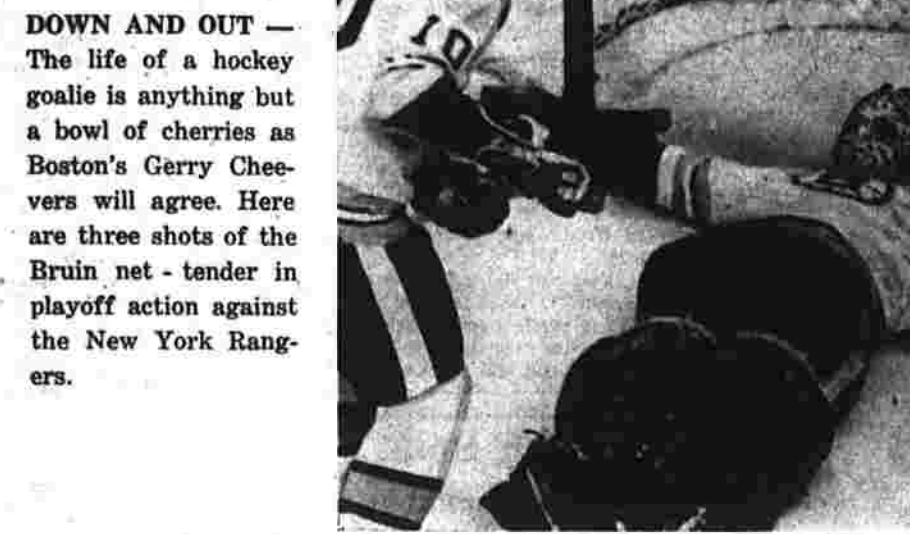
