

Report to the Community: A Manchester Success Story

This success story began 10 years ago when some farsighted men and women recognized a need for community action — and they acted. The result was the Manchester Redevelopment Agency. Its commitment: The North End Renewal Project, an ambitious undertaking to improve the physical, aesthetic and economic structure of the area.

Some key individuals in this undertaking were: Francis P. Handley, Arthur E. Smith, Everett T. Keith, Foster H. Williams, and William B. Thornton. They supplied the leadership that helped launch the project and nurtured it through its early years.

Land acquisition in the North End Renewal Project began in September, 1964. By April, 1969, the Agency had obtained title to all 47 parcels in the project. Total acquisition cost was \$1,716,146.

But before you can renew, you have to remove — remove the blight that evidenced the need for corrective action. This step required the demolition of 56 main buildings, plus 17 garages and sheds. Total cost of site clearance was \$113,559, which includes demolition of buildings, cost of utility service removals by Manchester Water Company and disconnection of sanitary sewers by the Eighth Utilities District.

With the site cleared, streets were widened, straightened and repaved. Re-building was begun, leading to the present land disposition.

First project completed was the Robertson School Addition in October, 1965. Disposition of the remaining parcels and their completion dates were:

Renewal also means relocation. By May, 1970, the Agency completed relocation as follows:

Total individuals relocated	25
Total families relocated	81
Total business concerns relocated	44

These 150 relocations required payments totaling \$206,770.

If our story ended here, it would indeed be incomplete; statistics and dollar values for brick-and-mortar, road surfacing, demolition, etc., tell only a small part of the success story of the Manchester Redevelopment Agency.

Attendance at Swanson Swimming Pool during the summer of 1971 was 25,407. Many people also took advantage of the swimming lessons which were held from Monday through Fridays, with open swimming available in the afternoons and evenings.

The 76 units of housing for the elderly include 68 efficiency units and 24 one-bedroom units. The project also includes a social hall where many activities are held including Mayfair Y Club meetings and Rosary services once a week.

Traffic flow has been greatly improved with streets widened and reconstructed and traffic control systems installed at Main, Hilliard and Hudson Streets and at the intersection of New Main and N. Main Streets.

And the renewal area is returning a significant increase in tax assessments to the town: A jump of \$200,000 over the assessments before redevelopment began.

With this report to the community, the Manchester Redevelopment Agency completes its commitment to the North End of Manchester. But the Manchester Success Story has only just begun. As long as there is a need for community action, an awareness of a job that must be done — and the will to see it through — the story will go on forever.

Other Agency members were: Jack Goldberg, William E. FitzGerald, Edward J. Sweeney, and Harlan D. Taylor. Edward J. Rybczyk is the former Executive Director.

Redevelopment is basically a story of land, buildings and people: Acquiring the land — demolishing or refurbishing and rebuilding structures — and relocating individuals, families and business concerns.

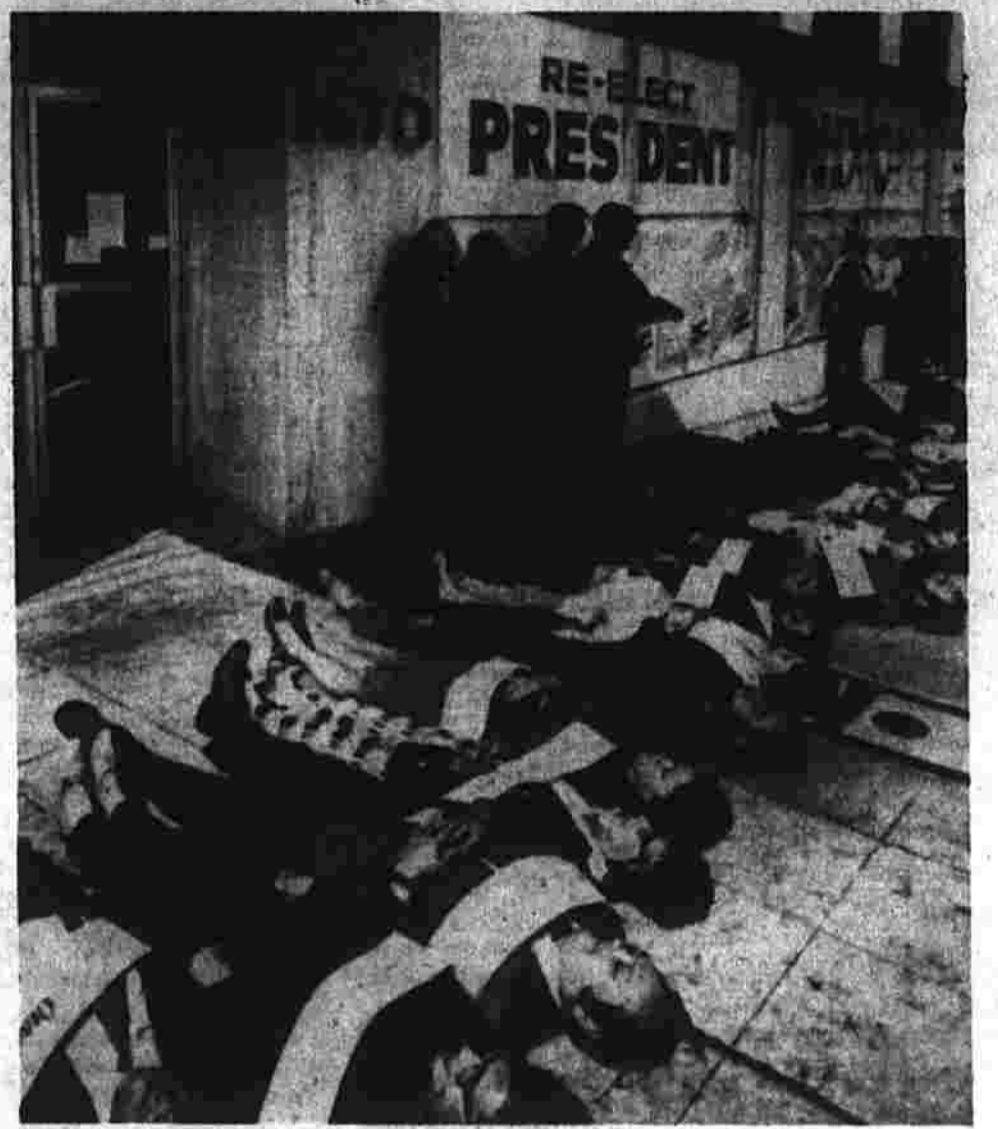

State Folk Held

Demonstrations of varying ages and backgrounds took to the streets in New Haven and Westport Tuesday as American mining of North Vietnamese ports brought a quick new round of antiviet protests in Connecticut.

In New Haven, a student-age crowd blocked an intersection near Yale, and 20 persons were arrested. In Westport, a generally older group blocked a bridge, and 21 were arrested.

In a separate incident, a man identified as a Yale Divinity School student interrupted the governor's prayer breakfast in New Haven. He too was arrested.

Police charged all of them with disorderly conduct. In Westport, police said most of the 21 arrested were adults, and their ages ranged from 14 to 61.

"I have a couple of lawyers here and everything else," a policeman said. They were arrested when they blocked traffic briefly on a bridge carrying U.S. 1 over the Saugatuck River about 9 a.m., according to a spokesman for the Westport Peace Action Committee.

The spokesman said about 60 demonstrators had gathered on the bridge, carrying antiviet placards reading "Stop the Killing" and "No World War III." Some remained on the sidelines as the others blocked traffic, he said.

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Street, Campus Alive

Growing protests erupted on city streets and college campuses as antiviet demonstrators by the thousands demonstrated President Nixon's decision to mine North Vietnamese harbors.

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Cost Delays Decision On Buying Lake Bed

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Wallace Walloped in Primary Nebraska Favors McGovern Bid

Sen. George McGovern has defeated Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey in their Nebraska primary and Humphrey wallowed in defeat.

McGovern said in Washington that Humphrey's "roadside" support during the last week were the result of what he called "severe tactical" retreats in earlier rounds weight ed heavily with votes from Omaha, where Humphrey had strong union backing.

Humphrey had staged a strong last-week drive to overcome the South Dakota senator's nine-month organizing campaign in the conservative, predominantly Republican rural state.

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McGovern 57,149—35 per cent.
Humphrey 50,237—35 per cent.
Wallace 16,489—13 per cent.

In West Virginia, Humphrey won a 2-1 victory over Wallace, his only rival in the nonbinding preference race and said the result was especially meaningful because "the rest of the candidates ran out" of a clash with Wallace.

The Alabama governor had virtually conceded the race last Friday when he canceled his only scheduled appearance in West Virginia to concentrate on North Carolina, Michigan and Maryland.

Wallace won in North Carolina last Saturday, and he could run first in both of the other states next Tuesday.

In Michigan, the Alabama governor of 1967, Humphrey and McGovern are expected to split most of the 132 delegates being awarded on a proportional basis, while in Maryland, Wallace is favored to win a majority of the 52 delegates.

When the opponents attack your strongest suit do you tell them that your pet canary can make better opening leads? Or do you observe a polite silence and hope severity that they'll persist in their stupidity? South dealer. North-South vulnerable. Opening lead — Jack of Diamonds. West opens the jack of diamonds against your contract of three notrump. This is your strongest suit and perhaps you say something clever as you win the first trick. If so you'll only have a word or two for you. Your natural next move is to finesse with the queen of spades. East wins with the king and returns his other diamond, forcing your king. You get to dummy with a spade and lead a heart to the king. West wins with the ace and the defenders get one trick and knock out your third top contract. Now West will get in with the king of clubs in time to defeat the contract. The deft player will take two diamonds. When you then take the hearts and the two black kings. The Promised Word. We promised you a word or two and here they are: Hold up! Even though you have three sure tricks in diamonds, refuse to take the second trick. West continues, and you take 8-8. The second trick with the queen of diamonds. When you then take the spade finesse, East points in high cards you can afford to lead a diamond. This saves your best trick, despite its weakness, to reward a response. Bid the major other than one notrump.

Two-Continent Span Offers Scary Walk

ISTANBUL, Turkey (AP) — In 800 B.C. the Persian emperor Darius strung a fleet of ships across the Bosporus strait, making it possible to cross from Europe to Asia on foot.
Now you can do it again—but you'd better have the agility of a mountain goat.
The crossing can be made on either of two steel mesh catwalks slung between towers that rise 250 feet apart on the sides of the strait dividing the continents here.
The towers, 100 feet tall, support catwalks that are working platforms for "spanning" the main suspension cable of the \$30-million Bosporus Bridge, the first Europe-Asia land link.
The catwalks crossing starts and ends with a five-minute ride in a wire cage elevator climbing up the outside of one of the bridge towers.
An Associated Press reporter, standing as close to the tower side of the elevator as possible and facing in, commented it was a Russian who handles all the cables, and he looks a little nervous about heights.
"Don't worry, it's solid up there. There are handrails all around," said Jerry Gurney of Freeman Fox & Partners of London, consulting engineers for the bridge.
From the top of the tower, the equivalent of 60 stories high, with a stiff wind blowing and the handrails looking low and flimsy, the view is worth it.
A Russian freighter cruises under the catwalk on its way to the Black Sea from the Mediterranean. Ferries look like bathtub tubs, bustling between

Meskill Signs Majority Bill

HARTFORD (AP) — It was the dawning of the age of majority for 15-year-olds in Connecticut Tuesday as Gov. Thomas J. Meskill signed bills that would lower the rights of adults.
By signing legislation, Meskill was making it possible for a 15-year-old to marry without parental consent and running for municipal office as a party of his rights.
Meskill warned a crowd of 800 high school pupils invited to the signing ceremony that "this legislation is important, heavy, and totally uninteresting in his job," he alleged. "The just sits there and collects wages."
As it happened, Meskill's teacher was both capable and energetic. When she found out about the letter, she determined to see the grandfather for defamation of character.
At the trial, he was unable to produce even a shred of evidence to sustain his charges. Results: Liability. The court said teachers need not put up with malicious charges that blacken their professional reputation.
Meskill was substantially responsible for the legislation, first creating a special "Commission on the Age of Majority" by executive order last year and then endorsing its recommendations this year to extend all the rights of adults to 18-year-olds.
He urged the youngsters to "register, vote and involve yourself in the political party of your choice."
The separate bill allowing 15-year-olds to hold both elective and appointive municipal offices went into effect immediately. The major bill concerning marriage, contracts and other rights does not become effective until Oct. 1.

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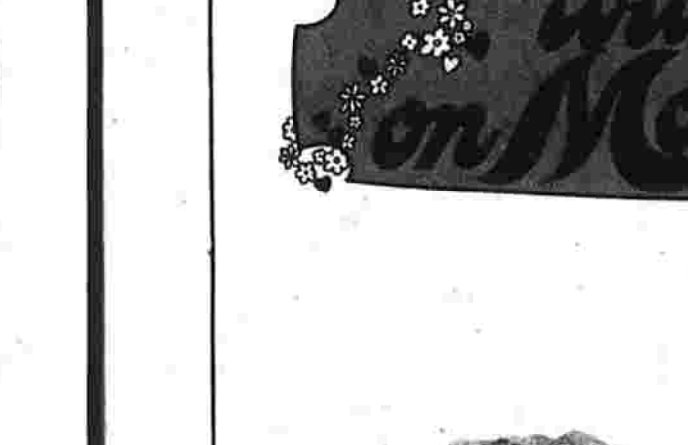

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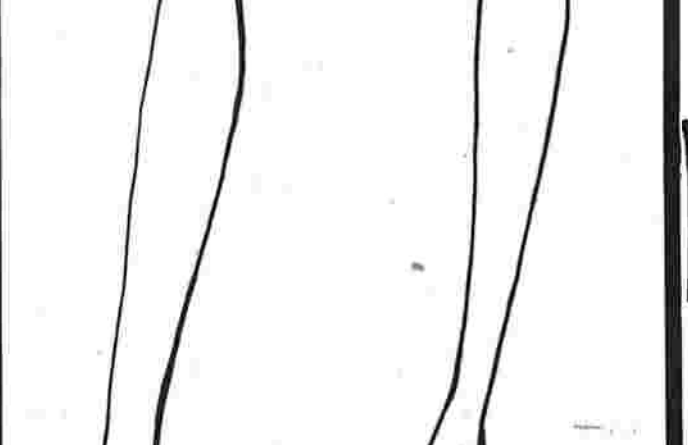

Hebron School Budget Cut Called Severe Blow

Chairman of the Board of Education William Heneghan said at Monday evening's budget meeting that the voters would "have to employ regressive means to survive" the \$20,818 cut in the town's fiscal year 1973 budget.

Heneghan, in responding to a question raised by former Board of Education chairman Marvin A. Ryan, said that the board was not going to do anything about the cut, stated that he would do his best to get the cut as low as possible.

With the cut, he added, the board will have only \$4,000 to the accomodate the new pupils and to cover increased costs of operation. "It will be a severe blow to the educational system," he stressed.

Some questions: Only two major items were questioned in the education budget. These were the \$21,000 budgeted for the superintendent's office and the \$24,812 for the teachers salaries.

Some residents were under the impression that the \$21,000 was strictly for the salary of one superintendent. Heneghan explained that this was Hebron's share of the estimated \$70,000 that will be necessary to cover full operation of the office for the four boards of education from Hebron, Andover, Marlborough and the regional district.

Teachers salaries: Teachers' salaries were proved to be a bone of contention as the \$24,812 requested in the budget is \$20,812 more than was appropriated this year.

Edward Hinchliff, a member of the board's negotiations team, explained the increase as being 4.8 per cent more in teachers salaries plus two new teachers.

He added how he "didn't think" it would be possible at this point to settle with the teachers because we are so far below the average in the state.

Helicopter Used To Salvage Logs

RENTON, Wash. (AP) — A yellow helicopter that once shuttled passengers between Los Angeles International Airport and downtown is being used to log the fire-scarred East Valley.
Forest Service officials said, although helicopters have been used in normal logging, harvesting the flame-charred timber will salvage much of the unburned wood, reduce the potential fire hazard and improve the reforestation effort, said East District Ranger Bob Benson.
Officials also said the aerial operation, if it proves out, will do less damage to the environment than do other methods.
The experiment is located about 25 miles northwest of here, where firemen fought for weeks to corral the flames which swept thousands of acres in 1970. East is 17 miles north of Wenatchee in the Cascade mountains.
Since tractors aren't needed to haul out the timber, there are few road scars, officials said.
The terrain also is so steep, Benson said, that without helicopters or some aerial logging method, erosion and other problems would prohibit any logging at all in much of the area.
But the program has its drawbacks, he added. There is the high cost of helicopter operation, even though the logs themselves come cheaply—fifty cents a thousand board feet compared to \$2 to \$3 by conventional methods.
Insurance on the Sikorsky 861 costs \$70,000, said its owner, Frank Carson of Carson Helicopter Co. He said the craft costs \$500,000 and burns about 100 gallons of fuel an hour.
And there are logistical problems.
"It's a stop-watch operation," Benson said.
"Dropping military cargo is standard," pilot Bob Boyd, a former military chopper pilot, said.
Not only must the pilots thread the 100-foot cable down through the trees, Boyd said, but the "hookers on the ground also must make quick decisions on each load."
If it's too heavy, the helicopter won't lift it, and if it's too light, the operation won't make money, he said.
Nevertheless, Carson said he sees a big future for helicopters in logging "when you save the cost of building a half million dollars in roads that would be required for conventional logging."
The operation marks the first helicopter logging in fire-killed timber in the United States.

Power Rate Increases Suggested By Lufkin

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) — Recommendations ranged from the granting of provisional electric-power rate increases to the curbing of home heating with electricity as the state Public Utilities Commission heard testimony Tuesday on a rate-hike request.
Environmental Protection Commissioner Dan W. Lufkin suggested the PUC grant Connecticut Light & Power Inc. of low-sulfur fuels and create more air pollution in the generating process.
Lufkin, who is best known as the state's top environmentalist, said electric heating is not only inefficient but drives up the state's supply of low-sulfur fuels and creates more air pollution in the generating process.
CL&P, which serves 505,211 electric customers and 114,646 gas customers in many parts of the state, has requested permission to increase its rates in 1970. Northeast Utilities is predicting a need to double its capacity by 1981, said the PUC that "interventions" were given the opportunity Tuesday to express their opposition before the PUC. From which the utility gains the effect of prices on the consumption of electricity.
"Due to present block rates, electric power pricing encourages the use of electric energy at the expense of alternate forms of energy that might have less environmental impact," he testified.
Lufkin urged study that would include searches for better building insulation to reduce heating demands and more efficient appliances, and investment in energy conservation programs.
He argued that electrical home heating should be outlawed because part of its cost is being absorbed by electric utility without electric heat," he argued.

How Do Babies Get Here?

By Lawrence Lamb, M.D. Dear Dr. Lamb—I am 13 years old and I have a problem which is of general interest to girls my age. Today some girls at school were talking about having babies, and I was wondering what the procedure is when you have a baby. I know that you are taken to a room and when you come back you have had a baby. But what happened in between?

Dear Reader—Now, you've really got me. Your simple, innocent question would take several columns to answer. It's important that you should be answered because it deals with one of the most normal and important personal aspects of people's lives. A lot of girls your age who need basic information aren't getting it.

I do hope that you can talk with your mother about this or perhaps you have a favorite teacher to whom you would like to talk about it. Your teacher might even show you diagrams to help you understand the problem.

I will try to tell you this much. The baby, of course, grows and develops inside the mother, and it takes about nine months. During this time, the woman's body is undergoing a lot of changes, preparatory to birth. The baby is in a rounded bottle-shaped organ which many people call the womb. 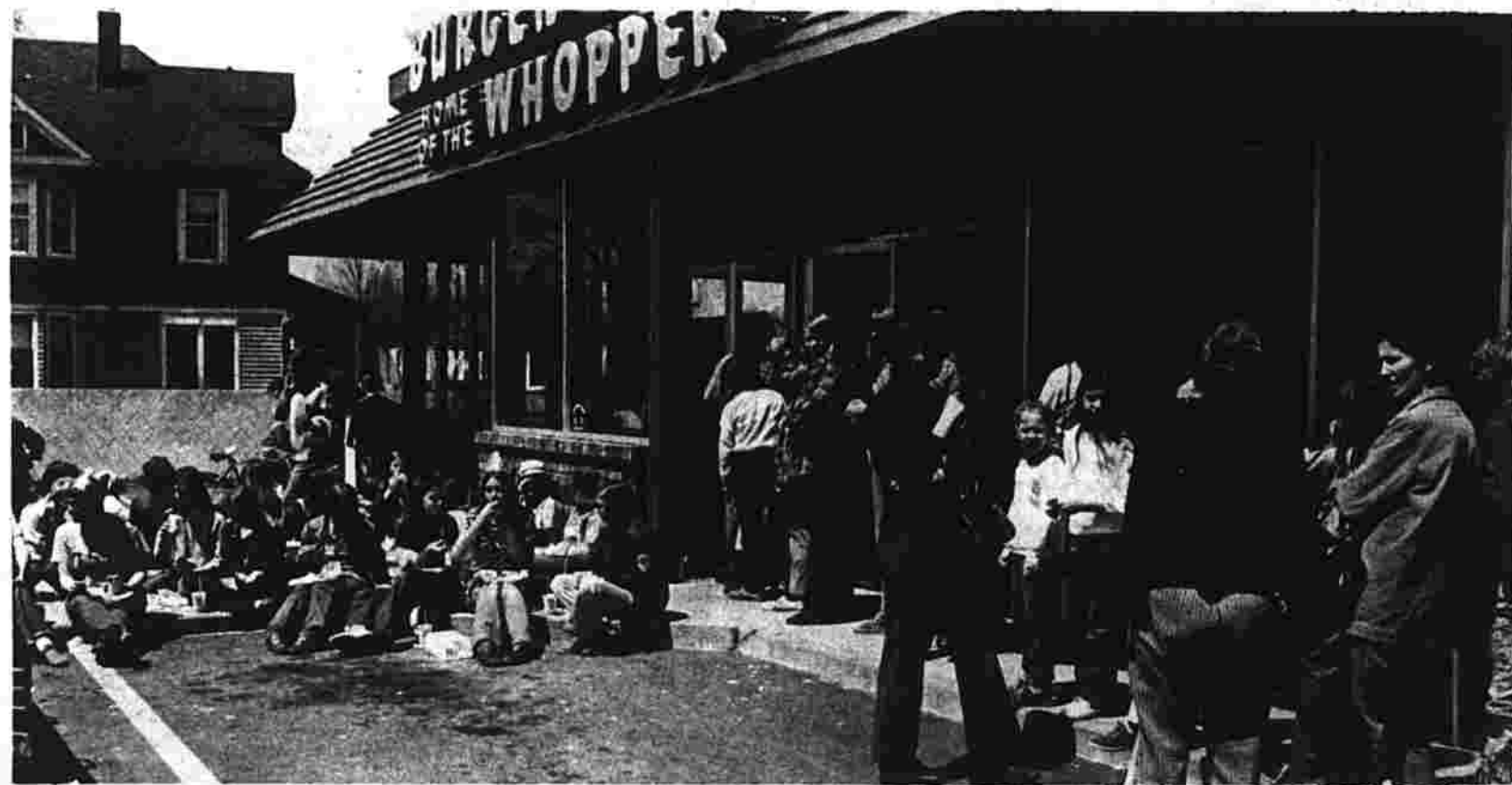

German Pact Again Falls Into Doubt

BOHN (AP) — The West German Bundestag today opened its ratification debate on Chancellor Willy Brandt's treaty with the Soviet Union and Poland. The outcome was put in doubt as Moscow withheld concurrence in a statement that the treaty does not legalize the Soviet and Polish titles to German territory seized in World War II.

A motion by the opposition Christian Democrats to postpone the debate failed, but the vote was a 209-209 tie that hobbled the treaty. It meant that all 518 members of the lower house of parliament had voted, including 22 West Berlin representatives who vote only on procedural matters. Ten of the Bundestag were believed to have voted with the opposition, including only 247 supporters for Brandt on the ratification vote, or two less than the majority he needs to carry the treaty over the veto of the upper house, which is controlled by the Christian Democrats.

Failure to ratify the pact would threaten the movement toward wider East-West detente and would block implementation of the Big Four agreement providing greater access to West Berlin. Because Brandt is not sure he can muster a majority in parliament to approve the treaty, he has been trying to get the support of the opposition Christian Democrats for treaty ratification. But opposition leader Rainer Barzel's price was Soviet approval of a West German declaration making clear the treaty did not rule out the unlikely possibility that the Big Four might someday give West Germany a peace treaty returning some of the territory. Brandt and Barzel first worked out a statement that "the treaty does not express any position on the legal basis of the present borders and do not prejudice a peace treaty regulation for Germany." Government spokesman Conrad Ahlers said Moscow indicated it would approve this draft. Then Barzel balked and forced Brandt to agree to a revision stating the treaty grants "no legal basis for present borders." Ahlers termed this a minute legalistic detail, and another side of Brandt, Horst Ehmke, demanded reports Moscow had rejected the declaration. He said the Russians had asked for additional clarification. Barzel refused an offer of further talks with Brandt, saying his party still supports the compromise reached Tuesday and that he needed more time to consider the Soviet attitude.

Democrats Oppose Drastic Cut, But Favor Shaving Police Cost

The Democratic Town Committee last night defeated a motion to cut the proposed police budget for 1972-73 to some \$60,000 from the requested \$100,000, but passed one in favor of cutting the request to \$84,000.

The first motion, favoring the more drastic cut, was introduced by the Young Democrats group, which, with its own organization, had adopted a similar stance.

In the town committee, however, it was defeated on an 11-10 vote, while the second motion passed 20-6.

In asking for the cut to \$80,000, the Young Democrats noted that the police budget "has escalated at a rate out of all proportion to either the town's ability to pay or our present needs. The town would not be able to encourage economies, but rather to think in terms of new and alternative methods of police service. One method cited might be 'a local version of the resident State Trooper concept.'"

Upon defeat of the first motion and introduction of the second, discussion centered on the fact that townships are generally unhappy with the present police setup, but, as noted by Steve Luzzini, a cut to \$84,000 would not mean elimination, but a fall of 24-hour police service. The Town Council has already shaved some \$30,000 off the \$100,000 police budget, and it is the revised figure showing this cut that will be presented at the town meeting on Monday night.

In other town committee action last night, members adopted almost unanimously a resolution introduced by Raymond

The PZC has received a letter from the Town Council asking for copies of plans for the re-granted PZC approval. A new lot has been provided for a studio-type dwelling on an eight-acre parcel for the subdivision request of Richard and Martha Upton, to conform to regulations.

DA NANG, Vietnam (AP) — Camp Hoa, which the U.S. people are reluctant to leave their priests or monks. Vietnam's great river of sorrow is a ghost town. Families are at flood tide again as hundreds of thousands of refugees stream out of their homes and villages, away from the enemy, away from the bombings and the artillery barrages, and away from the army trucks, the boats and army trucks, they are in an endless flow of misery, on foot, on motorbikes, on incredibly overloaded buses from places that are no more.

Dong Ha, Quang Tri, Quang Lo. For some, from the country, the living is easier than they have ever known. Electricity, fresh water, plumbing, housing with tin roofs, wooden floors it to the tops and the health officers visit the military camps reclaimed from the past, luring the people on how to use the toilet.

The best organized refugee center is Camp Land, a former U.S. prison stockade still ringed with watchtowers and 13-foot high concrete walls. The camp's self-government committee, meeting in what once was the war-den's office, has organized bus service into town, schooling for the children and a project of straw-making to raise money for community funds.

The biggest problem is trying to persuade refugees to move after a thunderbolt hit an Italian out of the Catholic schoolyards in church concealing 100 tons and Buddhist pagodas down in powder in 1969, killing 2, town and into the camps, for 600 people.

New Navy Mines Unlike WWII

WASHINGTON (AP) — The nation ships began loading scores of mines from the U.S. Navy's new mines, unlike WWII. The mines weigh about 1,000 pounds each and can be dropped from virtually any Air Force or Navy bomber-type aircraft.

The new mines can be triggered by a variety of means and are equipped with timing devices much like an alarm clock. They are designed to explode on contact with a ship. Since they floated on or just below the water's surface, they were often easily detected.

The mines now being used in North Vietnam waters are set to become a major part of the Navy's anti-ship warfare.

The U.S. Navy formally notified the U.S. Congress Tuesday afternoon, saying any ships sailing the affected waters "must do so at their own risk."

Once dropped into place, military officials believe the mines are difficult to detect and hard to remove. Hanoi has had four mine-sweeping vessels in the area, but they are not considered to be a significant threat.

However, the Soviet navy has over 300 minesweepers. But it was not known whether Moscow will send them to the area.

If the ships are sent it is expected that the United States would simply lay mines in the area.

Shortly after Secretary of Defense Melvin R. Laird told Congress April 12 that the administration was considering mining Hanoi Harbor, Navy ammunition ships were sent to the area.

Flower Phone Booths

RIO DE JANEIRO (AP) — All over town, hundreds of weird constructions looking like huge orange flowers on blue stems sprouted from the sidewalks recently.

Rio designers dubbed them "astronaut helmets," but the new phone booths are public phone booths, 18 inches high.

Only the upper part of the booths protects the caller against wind and rain. People who have used them testify that their conch-like shape produces near-perfect acoustic qualities. The enclosures perch up the roof of a bus exhaust as far as 300 feet away and amplify it with high quality through the mouthpiece of the phone.

Some commentators on the receiving end almost claim they can distinguish between brands of diesel engines in buses and trucks that roar by the callers.

More practical people point out that structure of the booths keeps phone conversations down to the essentials. Even ardent lovers don't use up more than three minutes with small talk.

If the judges issue an injunction forbidding the state to enforce the old law, then state Atty. Gen. Robert K. Kellian can go to the U.S. Supreme Court and ask for a stay of the injunction while the state mounts a full-scale appeal to the high court.

The judges who held the old law unconstitutional—J. Edward Lumbard of the U.S. Circuit Court and Jon O. Newman of the U.S. District Court (T. Bennett Clark of the District Court dissented)—had previously declined to issue an injunction to break it.

They said they had no reason to believe that the old law would not obey their "mandate."

But since April 18, both Thomas J. Mehall and William J. Kilian have voiced strong support of the old law and have warned Lumbard not to break it.

On May 3, Lumbard and Newman appealed to the U.S. Supreme Court for an ultimate ruling on the issue.

"We are well on our way to the Supreme Court for an ultimate ruling on the issue," Lumbard and Newman are expected to issue the injunction which the Circuit Court struck down.

Meanwhile, with the old anti-abortion law still in effect, Mehall has made no move to call the legislature into special session. He has said he will ask for enactment of a new anti-abortion law if Connecticut finds itself without any legislation on the books.

Tuesday's action by the U.S. Circuit Court, Kilian said: "What it means, in effect, is that our abortion statutes are fully in force, as they have been for 112 years past."

He called the court's action "a most gratifying turn of events" because it gave the lower court the chance to clarify "a very gray and cloudy area."

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Offshore Platform Hunters' Home

By FERRY ESTELL, a broad grin. "This is our moon-she'll, RIG 12, Off of Mexico (AP) — An offshore oil platform is a nice place to live, but a lot of people would not want to live there.

However, some of the 1,800 platforms sprinkled off the coast of Louisiana are part-time homes for thousands of workers who make their living tapping the oil.

From here, the oil travels in Outer Continental Shelf into a huge pipe to a control platform, it comes to a vacation from every other week. If they control the oil and gas output hard work crammed into one day.

While an 84-hour work week, they leave much time for their life's pleasures, the men who live on these platforms don't even complain.

The food is good and plentiful, the beds are soft, and the living quarters are air conditioned.

On the day of a recent tour, 12 foreman, led the way down the stairs of the huge rig. "You'll find it more comfortable if you don't look down until you get used to it," he said. "The steel-gate steps, slung over the side of the platform so they hang from the rig, are designed to be safe and unshakable in any weather. They have a small motor and a short wave under way, a small crew of three or four men pull rope from a well recently completed. They stand the 90-foot-length line and in one corner of the rig. A derrickman high above uses rope to secure the top of the section to a metal grid until they are ready to be dropped into the hole.

The drilling pipe—like a wand of a vacuum cleaner—is used for a variety of things, not just drilling. Several attachments can be used at the base.

This time the pipe has pushed a device 2,000 feet into the Gulf floor and concrete was pumped down to shore up a loose well wall.

The pipe is removed and the concrete allowed to dry before the next step is taken in putting this into production.

This is what the multi-million dollar platform with its crew of 40 is all about—a six-inch hole making its way far beneath the floor of the Gulf in search of enough oil to pay for the expense of finding it and to show a profit for thousands of stockholders.

Eighteen per cent of the free world's oil supply is produced from offshore wells around the Gulf, a goodly portion of it from these platforms off the Louisiana coast.

A couple of levels below the drilling floor are a long line of yellow pipes where oil and gas from already producing wells gush through a complicated series of pipes and valves until it reaches a common pipeline headed for shore.
