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U.S. War Toll Soars Upward

SAIGON (AP) — The North Vietnamese offensive sent the toll of American battlefield deaths soaring to 13 last week, the heaviest toll in seven months, the U.S. Command announced today. Five other Americans were reported missing in action and 28 were wounded.

While the command gave no breakdown, most of the American casualties were men aboard aircraft lost or damaged. Thursday's casualty report covered the week ending last Saturday and did not include a helicopter crash in which 32 Americans were killed.

Two Americans were reported killed in action the previous week ending April 29, and another 19 were missing. While the 19 U.S. dead last week was far below the toll in the years when American ground troops were fighting in strength in Vietnam, it represented a significant increase due to the continuing North Vietnamese offensive.

The South Vietnamese command reported that 2,349 enemy troops were killed last week, a drop of more than 20 per cent from the 5,051 claimed the week before. The Saigon command said 603 enemy troops were killed last week, 2,028 were wounded and 787 were missing.

Sheinwold on Bridge

PREPARED DEALS

Some years ago, the annual Interscholastic Bridge Championships began with a set of prepared deals designed to test the skill of the players. The deals were often tested with the kind of hand in which it is necessary to give in order to receive. You might think that the object was to teach the collectors to act unethically, but you'd be wrong. The idea was simply to teach them to play better bridge.

Then, however, the defenders are through. South can regain the lead and can return a low trump to dummy's side. This "hidden entry" to the dummy allows declarer to cash the top spades, discarding the losing clubs from his hand.

The best college for this sort of hand is the School of Hard Knocks. Most of our top bridge players took their postgraduate work in this fine institution. Could you use a refresher course?

Daily Question
 As dealer, you hold Spades, A-K-8-8-4-4; Hearts, 10-5; Diamonds, 8-7; Clubs, 8-5-2.
 What do you see?
 Answer: Pass. (But bid two spades, if you use weak two-heart lead with the ace and king.) The hand is not quite worth a normal bid of one in a nut.

Gardening with Frank Atwood

There are two kinds of people who walk in the woods," John Larus said, "bird watchers and gardeners. The bird watchers look up and the gardeners look at their feet. I know you are gardeners so I don't expect you to step on the daffodils."

Members of the Perennial Planters Garden Club of Manchester proceeded to step over the daffodils and stoop under the branches of the flowering crab apple trees in the lovely, party-wooded garden of Mr. and Mrs. John Larus in West Hartford. They were on a Saturday afternoon outing that included a visit to the Connecticut Daffodil Show at Elizabeth Park.

They had been given leave to pick as many daffodils as they wanted to carry home, although the host suggested that they choose the flowers that had been bent over by the rain. Not even the host knew how many kinds they had to choose from, but he said that, over the years, he has planted on his grounds about 800 varieties of daffodils. As daffodils do, some have "run out" and disappeared, but new ones are added every year.

Invited to join the expedition, I stepped over the daffodils with the Perennial Planters and picked my share. "How many kinds of daffodils are there?" I asked Larus in advance. "There are about 3,000," was the answer.

Daffodil Season Ending

Another tourist recognized it as "injection bell" and it turns out to be the Guinea hen Fritillaria. It grows wild on the mountains of the West Coast.

Norman Priest loves flowers and he has many unusual plants in his garden. He is an enthusiastic member of the Rock Garden Society and some of his rare plants have been acquired in swaps with other members of the society.

His early rhododendrons were blooming this week along with his daffodils. There were primarily Johnny-jump-ups. Soon he will have old-fashioned species roses including Harrison's yellow and Stanswell's perpetual, which is a delicate pink in fragrance, and blooms all summer. There will be species peonies.

For many years this was a dairy farm but the cattle were sold and the only crop grown now on the fields is hay. There is woodland and swamp, and both Mr. and Mrs. Priest think their place would be ideal for a public park, some day.

Native on West Coast

A few years ago on a visit to the Olympic Peninsula in the State of Washington, where spring wild flowers were in bloom, Larus found a small, bell-shaped blossom in a mottled purple color. The common name of this one is Guinea hen flower and he has available in local garden centers. He planned a few of them two years ago and they have blossomed for the second time this spring. The host of the "little" spring bulb flowers to appear. Besides the mottled flowers, we have some that are creamy white.

For the show, the Laruses provided an exhibit of miniature daffodils and these are their specialty. The flowers we picked from the crab apple trees, however, were large daffodils, one single and double, yellow and white. There are no labels, but the entire area is plotted on charts back at the house and if Mr. Larus forgives a variety often, he can look it up.

The finest new varieties are coming now, he told us, from Northern Ireland, although two growers in Oregon are also getting international attention. Holland furnishes many tons of excellent daffodil bulbs but seems to have lost the leadership in developing new kinds. A daffodil that cost \$1.00 in 1960 is now \$2.00 and is new and rare and greatly in demand.

Crown Imperials

I made a call this week to see the Fritillaria Imperialis at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Nordli on Sullivan Avenue, in the Wapping section of South Windor. They grow close to the house, a mass of green flowers in yellow and white, on tall, heavy stalks. There are four or five bells in each crown.

The plants are members of the lily family and reliably hard in this climate. Sometimes a plant will produce a second

Although during his life time Jules Verne's writings were considered flights of a wild imagination we have come to realize the realm of reality. But in our time they were amusing the Board of Directors in 1968. "No doubt when our several watersheds and reservoir impoundments were developed they were well engineered to utilize the normal yields which were ample for the requirements at those different times. However since the town has repeatedly outgrown those impoundments it became necessary to search for additional sources of supply. Well certainly are helping but there is a limit to the amount of subterranean water that can be extracted from an area. And it must be pumped. "Law requires that specified volumes of water must be allowed to pass dams to satisfy downstream riparian rights, and this is done. But there are times of abnormal high water when vast quantities have been observed running over the spillways even with flash boards added. It would be advantageous to have the dam gates to save this, if possible.

"There are several reasons why the capacities of the reservoirs should not be increased by adding to the height of the dams. Raising the water level would increase the pressure on the ends of the dams increasing the liability of seepage around the ends of the cores. It would increase the surface area exposed to evaporation which is a very considerable loss at all times and greatest in dry times when water is most valuable. It would increase the area of shallow water and growth of organic matter that is noxious to appearance, taste and even smell of potable water.

"The storage capacities of basins can be increased by excavating without raising the head of pressure on dams or increasing the surface area for evaporation. Excavation should be started on the lowest level that can be drained into the distribution system (never lower, except possibly a sub-basin to collect all the water and discharge it by wet dredging). This bottom level should be extended out to the present shoreline. This will

As you state, your daughter was wise to go straight to the physician and if she was treated adequately at the time of the illness, there would be no evidence whatsoever that she had gonorrhea. This can be a serious disease but if it is treated immediately, there is minimal risk of residual difficulty.

Dear Dr. Lamb—I have a thyroid deficiency and my scalp is dry and flaky. I am using an ointment and some shampoo. Can you recommend any special treatment?

Dear Reader—It is true that thyroid deficiency can cause scalp problems and even loss of hair. Of course, there are many more cases of individuals who lose hair with normal thyroids than there are with individuals with thyroid trouble. In any case, if you really have a deficient thyroid, the best treatment for your scalp and hair is to have adequate replacement of thyroid hormone.

The best approach to ointments and shampoos is to use as little as possible and use mild shampoos. In truth, harsh shampoos, many tints and rinses can actually irritate the scalp of some people. This can aggravate the problem rather than help it.

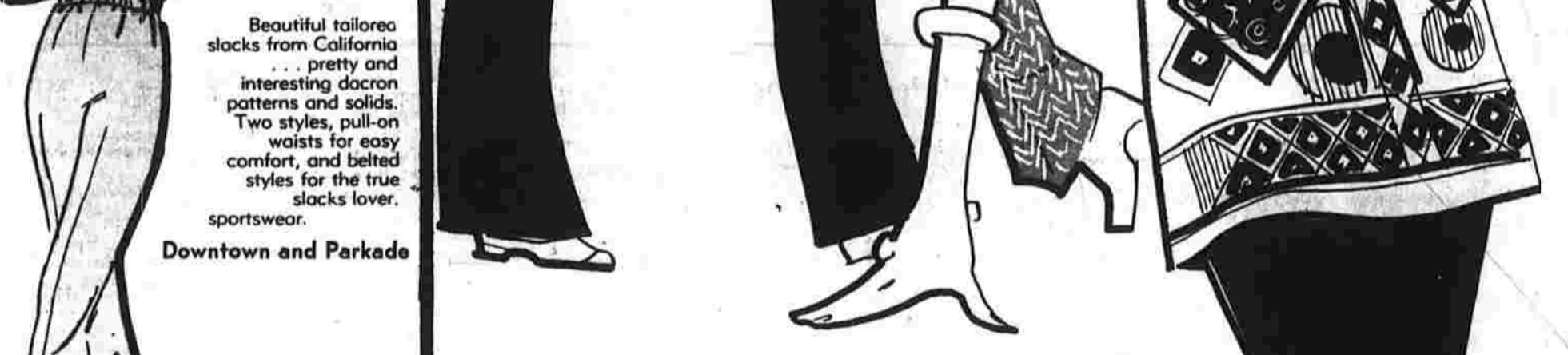

Forky (AP) — A Soviet cruiser and a missile-carrying destroyer were seen steaming southward through the Japanese Strait between Japan and the Korean peninsula, the Japanese Defense Agency reported today.

A spokesman for the agency declined to speculate whether the warships were bound for North Vietnamese waters to challenge President Nixon's attempt to cut off the delivery of Soviet war supplies to the Vietnamese Communist. 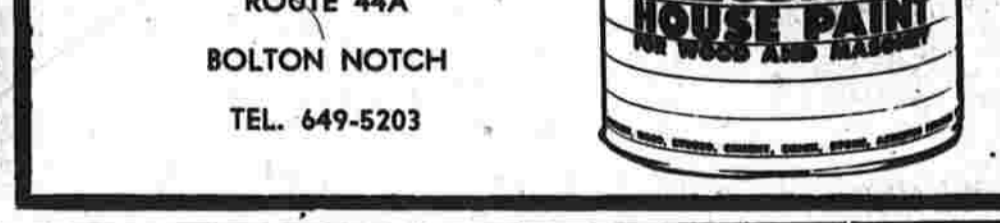

SCHOOL BOARD SEEKS BUDGET CUT AREAS

The Board of Education last night considered recommendations made by the administration regarding equipment for the board's 1972-1973 budget could be cut \$20,816 to conform with the town meeting action of last Monday.

Although no action will be taken on the proposed cuts until the board's June meeting, considerable discussion was held on two of the items: The dropping of funds for an industrial arts program at the Gilead Hill school and the cutting of almost one full teacher from the staff.

The board included \$14,610 in the proposed cuts for the dropping of the industrial arts program which has been underway at three high schools with fifth and sixth grade boys from the Gilead Hill school participating.

This year, Rhain has been participating in the program with no cost to the elementary school, but that cost will be \$20,816 to the town.

Board member Edward Hinckley, who is in charge of the program, requested the administration to include the \$14,610 in the proposed cuts.

On the other hand, Charles Barrows, who opposed the program, said that East Porter and Mrs. Valory Coates, still felt that it is a terrible expense for the school board when Rhain has over one million dollars worth of equipment.

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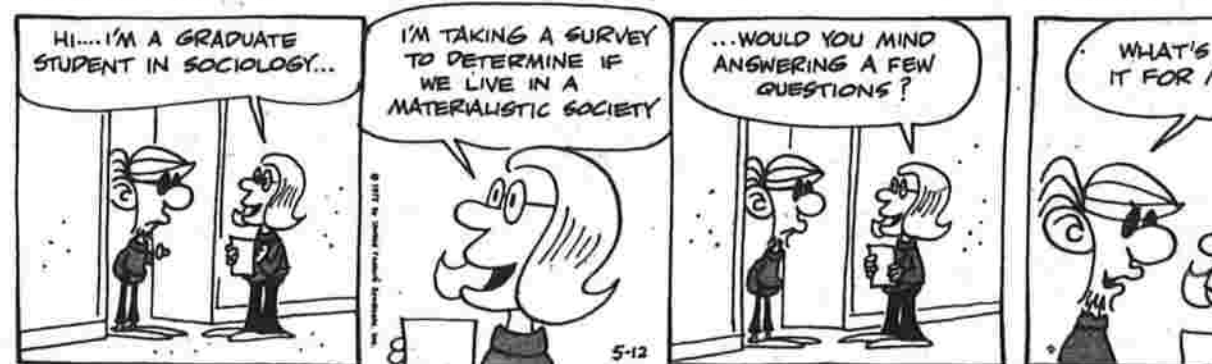
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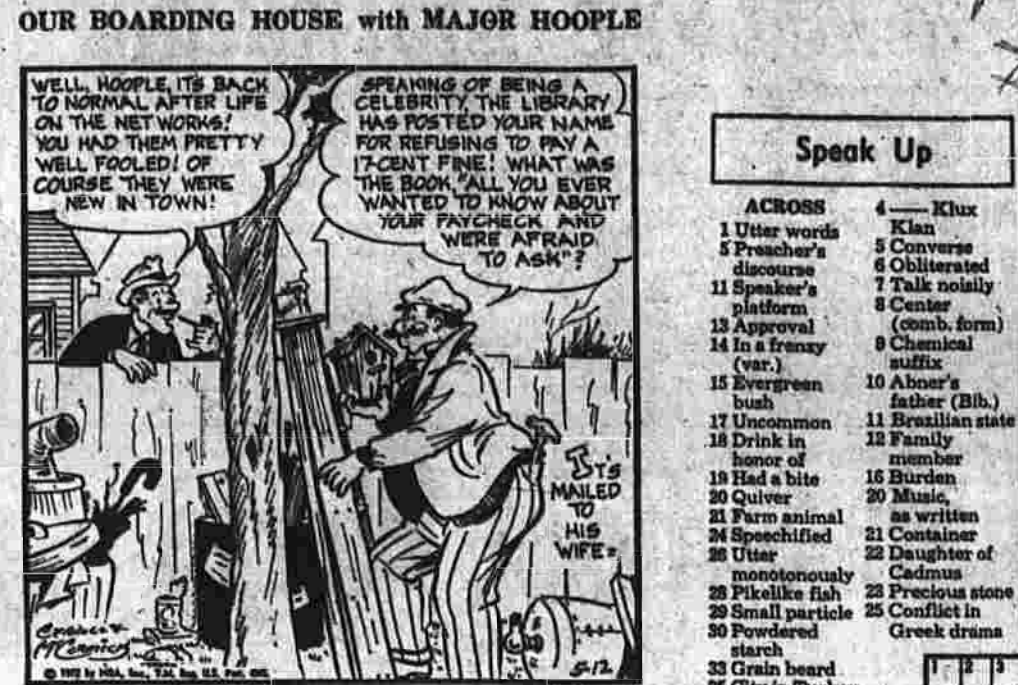
