Assembly Called On Abortion

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) — Connecticut doesn't have an abortion law—a vacuum Gov. Thomas J. Meskill hopes to fill on Thursday with a resolution of the General Assembly.

U.S. Supreme Court Justice Thurgood Marshall made the special session inevitable by denying the state's request to remain in effect until the full Supreme Court rules on its legality. Marshall has jurisdiction over the district that includes Connecticut.

Meckill immediately said he would formally issue the call for a special session Monday.

The anti-abortion law was declared unconstitutional April 18 in a split decision by a three-judge federal court in Hartford. Later, at the request of the Court of Appeals for the 2nd District, the judges issued an injunction barring the state from enforcing the law. Marshall upheld the injunction.

The state plans to take the decision arising under the statute, which forbids abortion except to save the life of the mother.

Meckill said he was "very disappointed" at Marshall's decision. He has said in the past he would push hard for a new law as strongly worded as the old one.

However, Marilyn Belcher of Hartford, the attorney for the state, said she was disappointed. "Marshall's decision for all practical purposes exhausted all avenues for a judicial appeal," she said.

SALGON (AP) — South Vietnamese marines opened a counter-offensive in Quang Tri U.S. casualties and no U.S. First reports said overall U.S. losses were about 40 killed and 25 wounded. The attack began with 168 heavy U.S. B-52 strategic bombers, 100 F-4 Phantom II fighters, and 7th Fleet destroyers firing from the sea.

14 On Bus Dead In Truck Crash

BEAN STATION, Tenn. (AP) — At least 14 persons were reported killed and 15 injured early today in the flaming wreckage of a Greyhound bus and a tractor-trailer rig, which collided near this one-time stage coach station in Upper East Tennessee.

State Trooper Harold Buck said it appeared four or five babies were among the passengers on the bus, headed for Knoxville. The bus was shattered, split in two, and the truck caught fire.

Antiwar demonstrations were reported in 17 states Friday. Demonstrators and police on the streets of San Francisco and Columbus, Ohio, and on the campus of Cornell University in Ithaca, N.Y.

Enjoy Each Warming Ray

Early in the struggle are the woodland wild flowers. They must reach for the sun's favor, or adjusting their feeting days between rising earth warmth below and the untidying of tree leaves above.

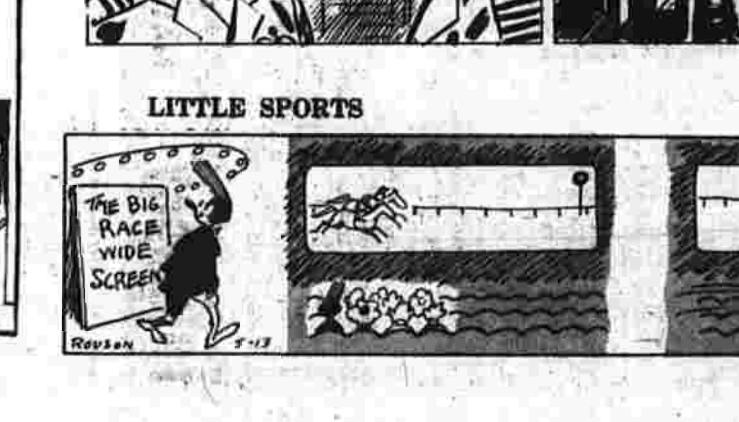

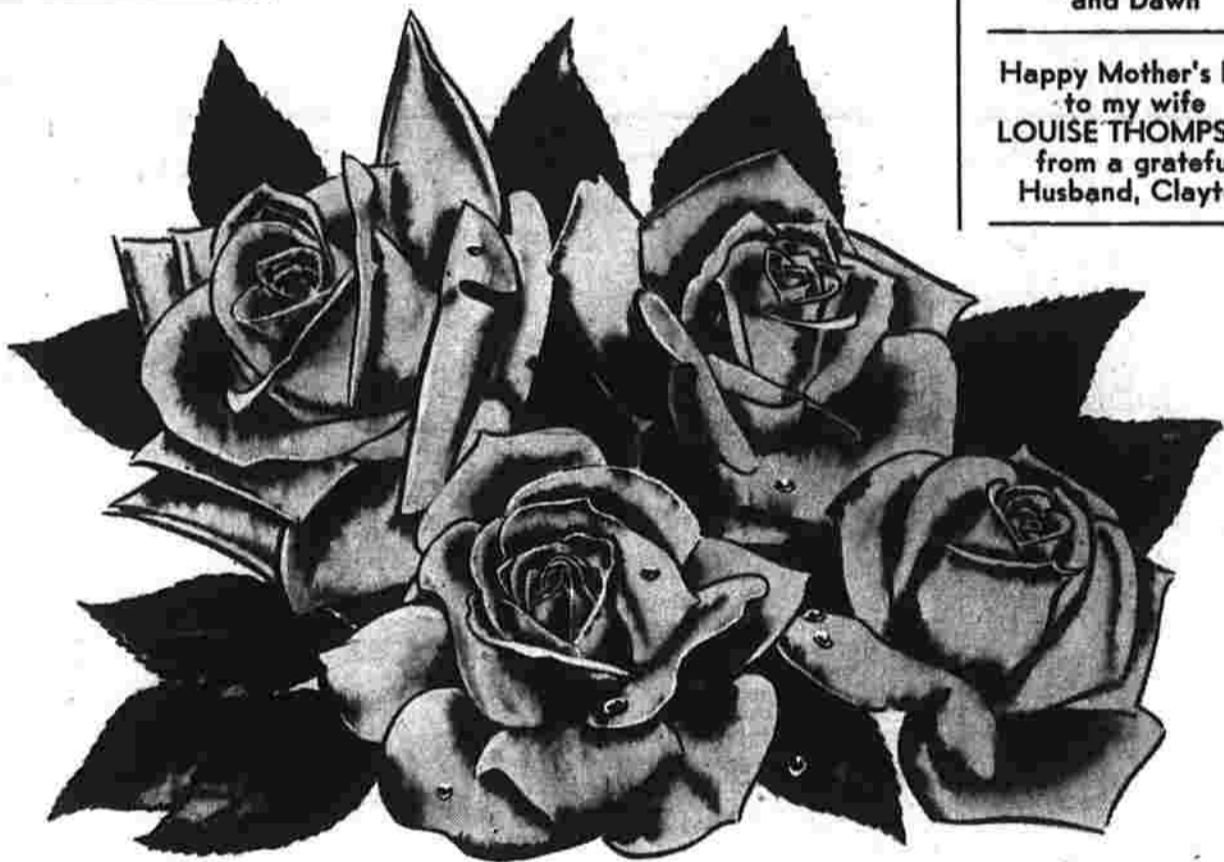

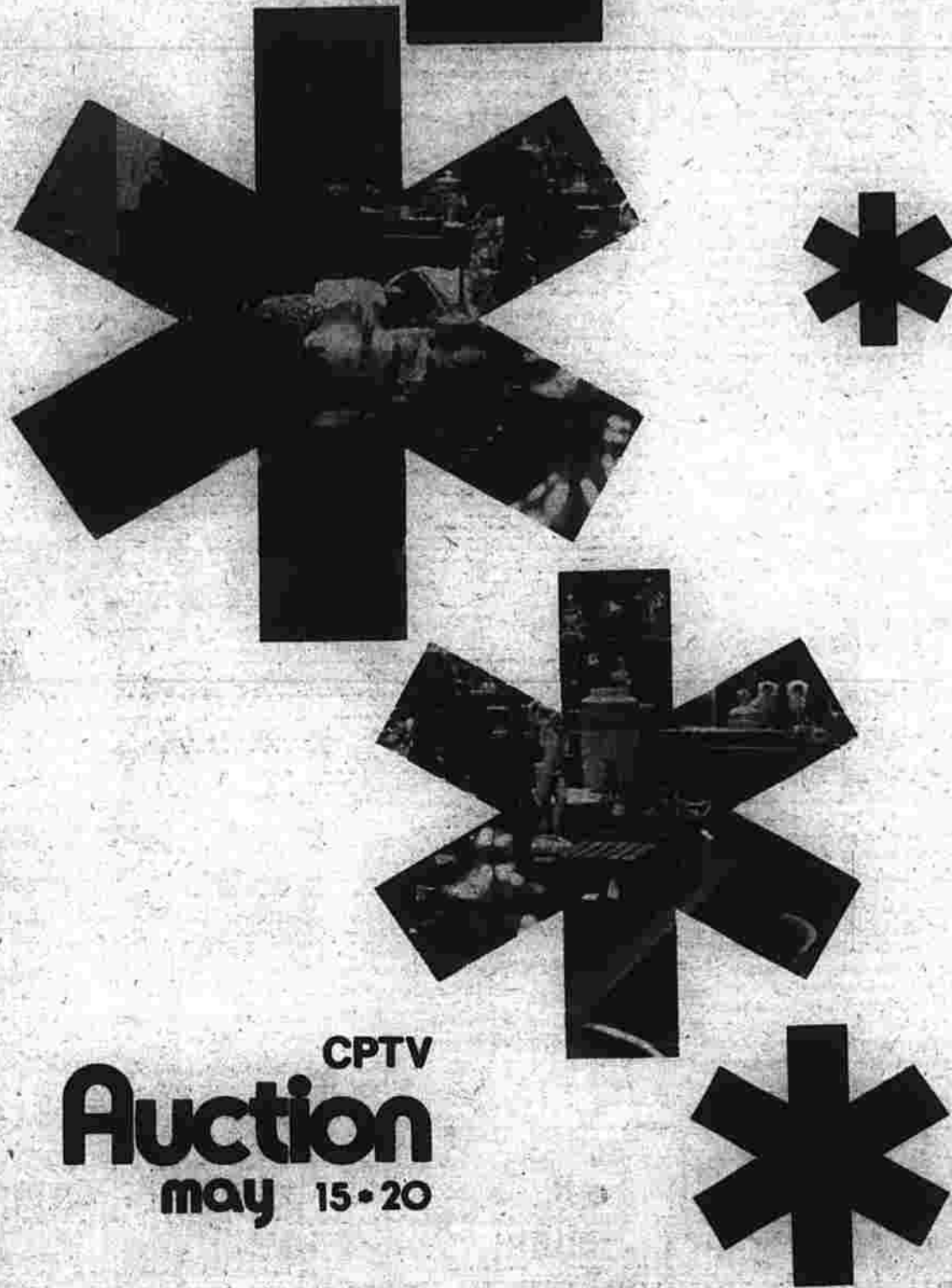

More than two thousand valuable items go on the auctioneer's block starting Monday, when the first Connecticut Public Television (CPTV) on-the-air auction gets under way.

The CPTV Auction, pre-empting all regular night programming for the week, culminates months of activity by hundreds of volunteers. Merchandise of every size, value, and description has been donated to the non-commercial TV network, and the warehouse is overflowing.

Actor Robert Montgomery and Sen. Abraham Ribicoff will be among the celebrities lending a hand during the live auction. Also appearing as auctioneers and guests will be Hartford Mayor George Athanson, former Gov. John Dempsey, and TV and radio personalities from throughout the state. Gov. Thomas Meskill is honorary chairman of the fund-raising event.

The auction has something for everyone — a mink coat, an Arizona vacation for two, furniture, antiques, art, appliances, gift certificates, pedigreed pets and livestock, and more.

Frank Atwood of Manchester, columnist for The Herald and host of WTIC Radio's "Garden Time," will auction off two calves — a Holstein and a Guernsey.

The auction will be broadcast Monday through Saturday, from 6 p.m. to midnight, on all CPTV channels — 24 in Hartford, 71 in New Haven, 53 in Norwich, and 49 in Bridgeport. A detailed camera eye-view of a bird caring for its young while sealed in the hollow of a baobab tree is a highlight of "Secrets of the African Baobab," to be colorcast on NBC Tuesday, May 16 at 8:30 p.m.

Orson Welles is off-camera narrator for the one-hour special.

The baobab, called the "upside-down tree" because its branches look like roots, thrives in the semi-arid Kenya countryside and sustains a varied cross-section of African wildlife.

The bird which uses mud to seal itself in the hollow of a baobab to care for its infants is the red-billed hornbill.

Other wildlife filmed include: Destructive elephants, Wahlberg's eagles (who prevent snakes and monkeys from climbing a baobab and attacking or disturbing its inhabitants), and insects.

**Warning: Violence on TV Leads to Reckless Driving**

HONOLULU (AP) — Vic Sitaram also found that the lence on television may be a bad drivers could remember cause of reckless and irresponsa- such character names as ible driving, a university of "Hawaii Five-O's" Steve Hawaii mass media researcher McGarrett and Mannix but could not recall the names of the actors playing the parts.

He says that if you watch such programs as "Hawaii Five-O," "Mannix," "The FBI" or "Cannon," you're more likely to be a careless driver than if you prefer Lawrence Walk, "The Courtship of Eddie's Father" or other nonviolent fare.

That's the conclusion of Dr. K.S. Sitaram, who says he spent two years comparing the television viewing habits of good and bad drivers.

Sitaram interviewed 293 bad drivers who had been ordered by Honolulu District Court to take a safe driving course as a result of traffic violations. He compared their video tastes with those of 54 good drivers.

"Most of the bad drivers listed such programs as "Hawaii Five-O," "Mannix," "Cannon," and "The FBI" as their favorite programs," Sitaram said in an interview. "People with safe driving habits tended not to watch such programs."

"This confirms my hypothesis that they are living in a world of fantasy," he said. "They act out the fantasies when they are driving. They probably think they are Mannix or McGarrett and are trying to imitate them."

For the study, Sitaram defined violence as "a scene in which characters use unreasonable violence to solve problems that could be solved by reasoning and that violence causes physical or psychological damages to persons or property."

Sitaram said bad drivers who had seen documentaries remembered only the violent things in them. For example, bad drivers who had seen a documentary on Mahatma Gandhi remembered only the assassination and nothing about the late Indian leader's philosophy of nonviolence.

There is a message in all this, Sitaram said.

"People learn aggression from the mass media, particularly radio and television," he said. "These are institutions of culture that tell Americans what values and beliefs to have—as the temples and churches used to do. Instead of teaching bad values, they should teach good values."
