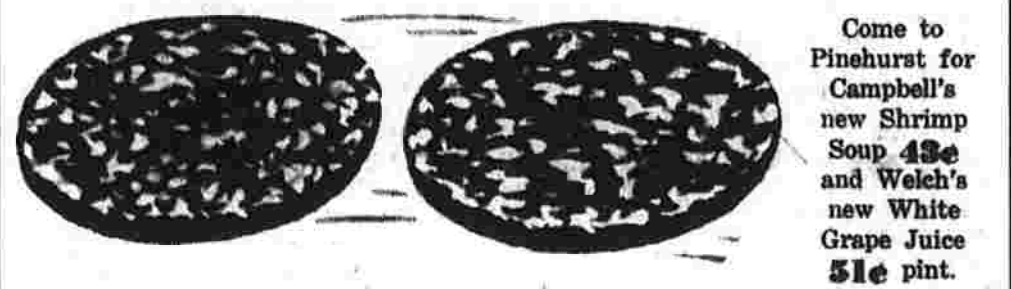

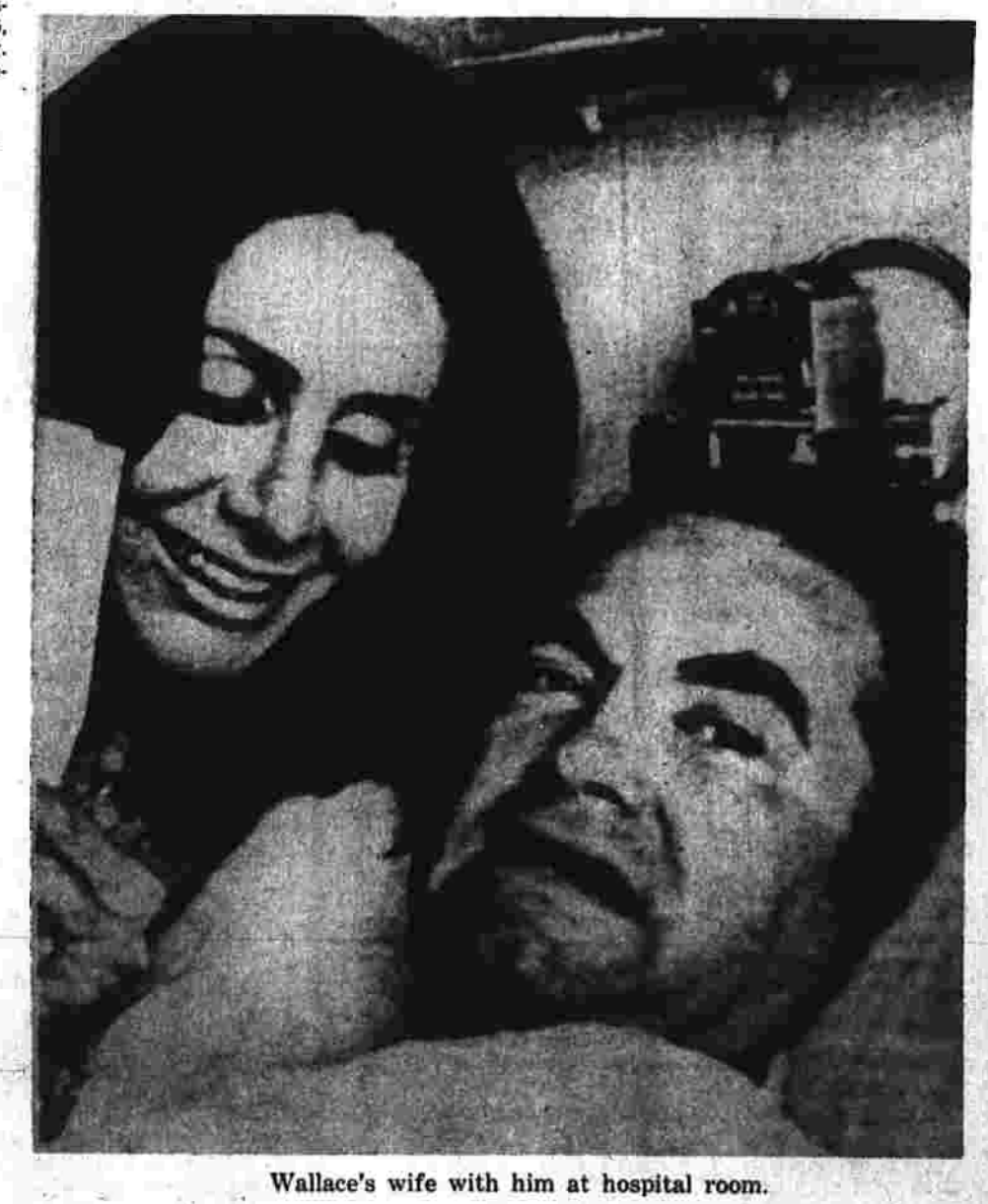

From Your Neighbor's Kitchen

Every now and then I get an urge to try something new in the kitchen department. With over 300 cookbooks, I have a pretty big choice. Since I have so many recipes, we now look for books that are unusual or apply to special ethnic cuisines.

Last Valentine's Day, my husband came home with a book that I must confess I have not yet purchased myself. Yes, when I began to thumb through, I could see what an excellent choice he had made.

Myra Waldo has written many cookbooks and has traveled widely. My husband's gift was her "The Complete Round World Cookbook." It is a good thick book with recipes from all sorts of exotic places.

If you have an image of me staying in the kitchen every day cooking up a storm, you are mistaken. Most of the time, we eat fairly simple meals. Our meat is broiled or roasted. I fry almost nothing. We eat frozen vegetables. Since I cook my vegetables very briefly, it is no trouble to make them even if I have been out all day long.

Both my daughters, Laurie, 18, and Leigh, 15, are quite capable of putting a meal together. They are often called upon to plan, purchase and cook a dinner. I never forget my girls to do so but I always let them feel around with cake mixes or puddings when they wish to do so. My son Tom, who is 14, is pretty good at making breakfast. Mostly, it is Mom who does the preparations.

Because I am Mom who does the preparations outside of the home, I have developed many recipes that can be prepared ahead and reheated. When I get an urge to cook, I often will make two or three dishes simultaneously. Then, I will put them in the extra refrigerator for next two or three nights or I will freeze such things as homemade soup or spaghetti sauce.

On weekends, my son sometimes brings home some of his schoolmates to whom he likes to bring about his mother's cooking. This can be unfortunate if I have to rise to the occasion when I really don't feel like it. Tom and his Dad are willing to try almost anything. They are competent in their taste. With my girls, it's 60-50 so if I make something everyone likes, I am very happy.

I am extremely fond of eggplant which is one of the vegetables my husband can take or leave. When I cooked the following dish from Myra Waldo's book, he enjoyed it tremendously.

Arabian Stuffed Eggplant
2 medium-sized eggplants
2 teaspoons salt
1/4 cup vegetable oil
1/2 cup chopped onion
1/2 cup freshly ground black pepper
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 cup hot/cool rice
1/2 cup chopped parsley
2 cups beef broth
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup cider vinegar
1 teaspoon saffron or 2 cloves garlic

3 tablespoons butter

This 15-Year-Old Had 13 Operations

Dear Dr. Lamb—I am 15 years old and have had 13 operations, including a tumor above my right eye, tonsillectomy, removal of part of my bladder and my right kidney. As you can imagine, I have spent a lot of time in the hospital and have missed quite a lot of school. Because of this I developed slowly and am way behind most kids my age. My doctor prohibited me from participating in football, basketball and even physical education class. I would like to know what sports you think would be good for me. My physical condition will permit you to do something more.

If you are going to be physically limited for a long period of time, you might be able to compete with other people by developing your ability in games of skill. You don't need to be Hercules to be able to compete with other people and enjoy it. If you like cards, why not become a real card shark at bridge? It would help you socially and you could play bridge with your friends if you preferred. Dear Reader—Of course you would like to participate in some sports, but I really think you had better rely on your doctor's judgment, because he knows all the details of your problems.

Although physical activity is very good for individuals who are healthy, sometimes when one has had serious illness like you have had, they can be harmed. You might talk to your doctor about the advisability of walking and hiking, which could help build you up physically to some extent. If your over-all physical condition will permit this, and if it is allowable it might help you to feel better.

For anyone who has been in a Dutch oven, you have to have a fairly deep large skillet or electric fry pan, add the broth, cover and cook over low heat 20 minutes. Add a mixture of 1/2 sugar, vinegar and saffron or garlic; recover and cook 30 minutes longer, basting occasionally. The garlic and fry pan are in the house so I split the same. The only other recipe I have from this book is a Italian beef roll although I confess that there are many more things I would like to try. The beef roll is very rich and you don't need a large pot for it. It is delicious served with the eggplant.

Someville Meat Loaf
1 lb. round steak or chuck
2 eggs, beaten
1 onion chopped fine
1/2 cup bread crumbs
2 teaspoons salt
1/2 cup Worcestershire sauce
1/2 cup horseradish
2 teaspoons dry mustard
1/2 cup ketchup
Mix all ingredients and pack in well-greased baking dish. Bake 90 minutes at 350. If desired, pour undiluted tomato soup on top before baking.

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good chance the United Nations has ever had of fulfilling its own supposed function — the function for which it is invited.

It is the effort of Eden, and other equally distinguished advisers on world affairs to treat the term and the concept of "free world" as if it could be converted into something other than it really is. Basically, it is a device, not a reality.

The greatest hoax of our time is the one which tries to persuade us that we can have old-fashioned regional alliances, and world-splitting regional alliances, and at the same time, give some respect and meaning to the United Nations.

We have to choose one or the other, and the sad reading of our actual behavior is that, whatever ordinary people everywhere may have felt at one time, leadership never did choose to play the one single game which had a chance of creating peace.

Now At A Most Critical Point

The war in Vietnam has reached one of its most critical points with the announcement of drastic new moves to intensify the flow of military supplies to North Vietnam. Such intensification is normal in warfare. But in this instance, there is a possibility that it may set off war among great powers, which might well involve the use of nuclear weapons.

What amounts to a sea blockade is being put in force. This is squarely aimed at Soviet shipping carrying arms to North Vietnam. Such interdiction is normal in warfare. But in this instance, there is a possibility that it may set off war among great powers, which might well involve the use of nuclear weapons.

But it is hard to believe that China would be unconcerned about our efforts to deny supplies to Hanoi. At the very least, it would have to be concerned about the impact on its prestige as the Communist world if it even appeared to abandon its Communist neighbor. This might be an important factor in the Sovietia in their contact with the People's Republic.

The impression is given that the heavy bombing of North Vietnam will not only continue but will be intensified and widened. This inevitably means greatly increased civilian casualties. Measures to this end have never yet brought the enemy down. Is there any reason to believe that they will now do so?

We can well understand the considerations which have led to the steps taken by the President this week. Hanoi has refused to negotiate on terms which he believes to be reasonable. Hanoi has launched and sustained a major offensive which is wreaking havoc on South Vietnam. There is danger to the small body of American troops which remains after the steady and all but total withdrawal of our forces. And American prisoners of war are still in the hands of the North Vietnamese.

But are the means now resorted to really calculated to change any of that? Our policy has been designed to enable the South Vietnamese to withstand the forces of the North. We have provided training, equipment in enormous quantities, and expert advisers. We have judged that, with such assistance, the South Vietnamese were at last ready to fend for themselves. Once again, this has been proved wrong, as the latest North Vietnam offensive unfolded.

The fact is that the will to fight is just not there. It is generally lacking because of the character of the South Vietnamese society. That society is one of privilege and class self-interest on the part of the few, disadvantageous for and disregard of the many, with favoritism and corruption rampant. We have tried to change that, insisting on at least a semblance of democracy, political and economic. But the ironic fact is that our participation in the Vietnam war has changed our own society far more, and for the worse, than it has changed the society of South Vietnam.

Long ago we made a mistake in Vietnam. We undertook to do something far beyond our capacity to pay. We have compounded our mistake and our costs as the years have gone by.

There was nothing dishonorable about the original mistake, although there has been much which is questionable in what we have done as we become more and more entangled in an oriental web.

There would be nothing dishonorable about our now facing the fact of an impossible commitment, getting our troops out, and securing the release of our prisoners. The inescapable lesson of the last decade is that the affairs of Vietnam are not ours to settle. — CATHOLIC TRANSCRIPT

Obituary Saul M. Silverstein Dies on World Trip

Saul M. Silverstein, 71, retired board chairman of Rogers Corp. of Manchester, Rogers and Killingly, international authority and lecturer on business management, and religious and civic leader, died Monday in Fort Kona Saregetti, Tahiti, while on his 10th trip around the world.

Word of his death was received by his family late yesterday by cable. Mr. Silverstein, who maintained a residence on Erdos Rd., Columbia, had resided on Stephen St., Manchester until last year. He was associated with Rogers Corp. for 41 years, before his mandatory retirement in 1971.

He had left the U. S. on April 3 for his 34th foreign trip. His late wife, Ruth, who died in April 1970, had accompanied him on many of his trips overseas.

The colorful, crusty, candid and tremendously capable Mr. Silverstein always involved himself deeply in Manchester public affairs, usually affairs of great public concern.

He was chairman for 22 months of the 1949 and 1950 Town Building Committee which approved a \$3 million school building program for Manchester.

Storn and disputes had swirled around him for many months in 1950, as a plan for a new Broad St. Wadsworth School first was rejected in a referendum, then was revised, and finally was passed.

He had lectured and conducted management seminars sponsored by government, business and labor in almost every country of the world.

He found the time on his trips to send home 34 series of new newspaper articles, a practice he started on his first trip in 1952.

He died and reproduced by his office staff at Rogers, copies of the news letters were sent to a select mailing list. His descriptions of the places he visited and the people he met were included in his newspaper articles.

His resignation occasioned an outpouring of praise from town officials, who said he probably knew more about Manchester school problems than anyone else in town.

In 1963, he was appointed to the newly-created Human Relations Commission. He resigned in September 1966, and from the time of his resignation to devote to his business as his reason.

His straight-to-the-point observations and suggestions helped liven the commission meetings, while he was a member.

It recognized the efforts of the employees as a team, and compensated them on an equal basis with management and share-holders.

Essentially, the plan provided for profit-sharing by the employees as a group. It provided an incentive for better methods and results. In addition, it contained the provision that, even if profits fell, the employees would never receive less than their regular pay.

A request for approval of a plan of development for an apartment complex and a request for permission to fill a flood plain, will be reviewed at a public hearing to be conducted by the zoning commission tonight at 7:30 at the Administration Building.

The request has been filed by Rosewood Gardens Park, Co. headed by Long Island developer Marvin Steinman, who was turned down by the commission several weeks ago, on a request to develop a 200-unit apartment complex on Rt. 85, adjacent to the Vernon Gardens complex.

In turning down the request, the zoning commission cited concern for infringement on the flood plain and the impact of the proposed complex on the town's sewage treatment plant. These concerns were expressed by town residents at a public hearing.

Steinman has now filed a proposal for a 210-unit complex. He had previously been advised by Vernon's town attorney, Abbott Schwedel, to file for a smaller complex at least for the initial phase and perhaps add on later.

At the time of the hearing, Steinman's attorney, Preston Harding of Hartford, expressed willingness to build the 525-unit complex in three stages with the first to include units to be constructed during 1972, additional 147 units during 1973 and the balance of the units to be constructed starting 1974.

The parcel of land in question consists of 400 acres and was originally owned by Tri-Pac Development Corp. That corporation had received approval to construct a 425-unit complex on the land. This action took place in 1967, at the end of that year the developer asked for an extension of a year to start construction. The property was later purchased by Steinman. The only permitted use of the property is multi-family dwellings.

The original 525-unit complex was to be a multi-family village. The plans called for cluster-type complexes with each cluster to have a park-like court yard. The units were to be covered with rough-sawn cedar siding, designed by McHugh Associates of Farmington. That complex was expected to have an assessed value of about \$4 million.

NEW YORK (AP) — A North Vietnamese spokesman in Hanoi says that American mines are being removed from the harbor as they are dropped and that ship traffic is not blocked, the New York Times reported today.

Times reporter Anthony Lewis in Hanoi said independent sources say that at least one ship—the East German freighter Friedrichshafen—entered the harbor this week, leading support to the North Vietnamese claim.

In Washington, administration officials said categorically that no ship had entered or left the harbor since it was mined and said reconnaissance showed no minesweeping activity they said the Pentagon was in the harbor before the mining.

Lewis wrote in the Times that he visited the port area lately Wednesday and saw about a dozen ships in harbor. He said it had been hard hit by bombs.

He quoted Kim Nhan Tuy, a spokesman for the city administration, as saying that American planes had been dropping mines almost daily since May 7, "and they've been removed... we have ways of detecting them."

Lewis reported there is much evidence of extremely heavy bombing in Haiphong, with areas flattened like German cities that were subjected to strategic bombing during World War II. He said the North Vietnamese report that the worst attack came Sunday, May 18 and left 244 persons dead, 513 injured and nearly 2,000 homes destroyed.

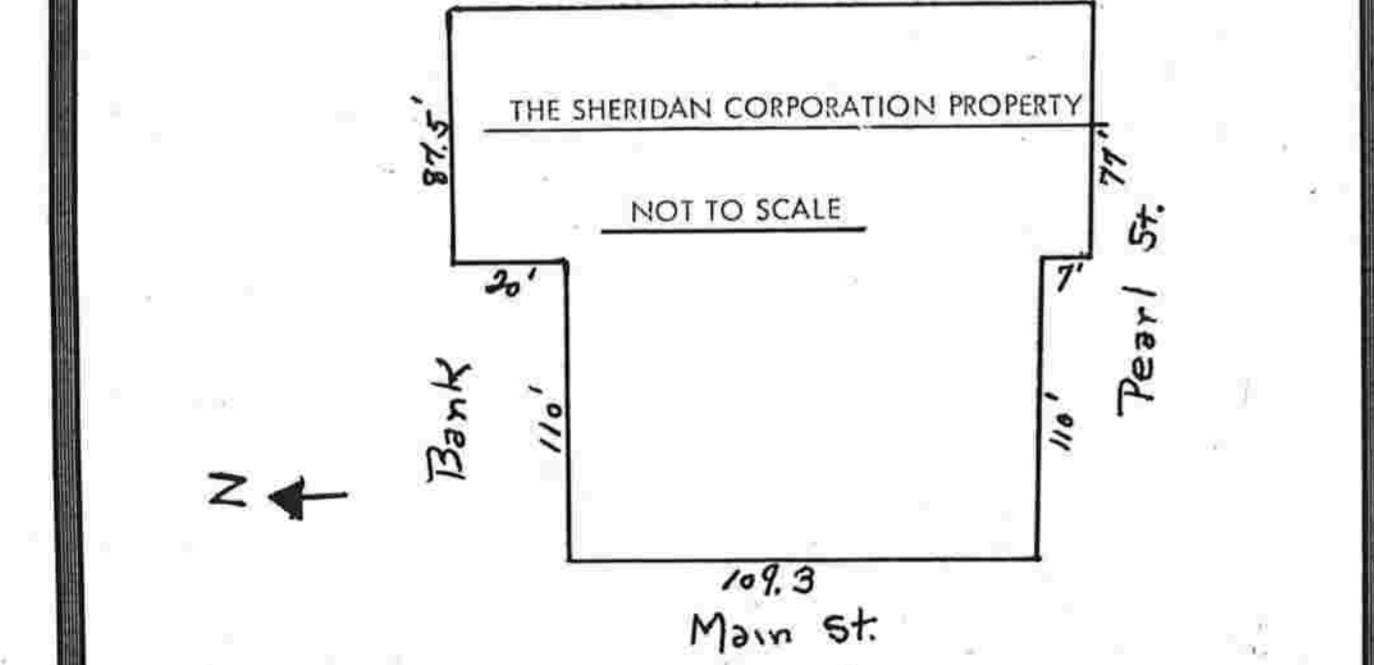

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War Deaths Increased Last Week

SAIGON (AP) — Both South Vietnamese and enemy casualties increased last week, according to the weekly summaries issued today, while the number of Americans killed or wounded in combat was less than the week before. But there were increases in U.S. casualties from nonbattle causes, apparently due to an air crash.

South Vietnamese headquarters said 760 government troops were killed last week, 2,319 were wounded and 344 were missing. For the previous week those totals were 603 killed, 2,092 wounded and 177 missing.

The South Vietnamese command listed 3,613 enemy killed last week, a sharp increase from 2,849 the week before. It said 56 enemy were captured.

The U.S. Command said 13 Americans were killed in combat last week, six less than the week before. Twenty-six Americans were wounded in combat, two less than a week earlier.

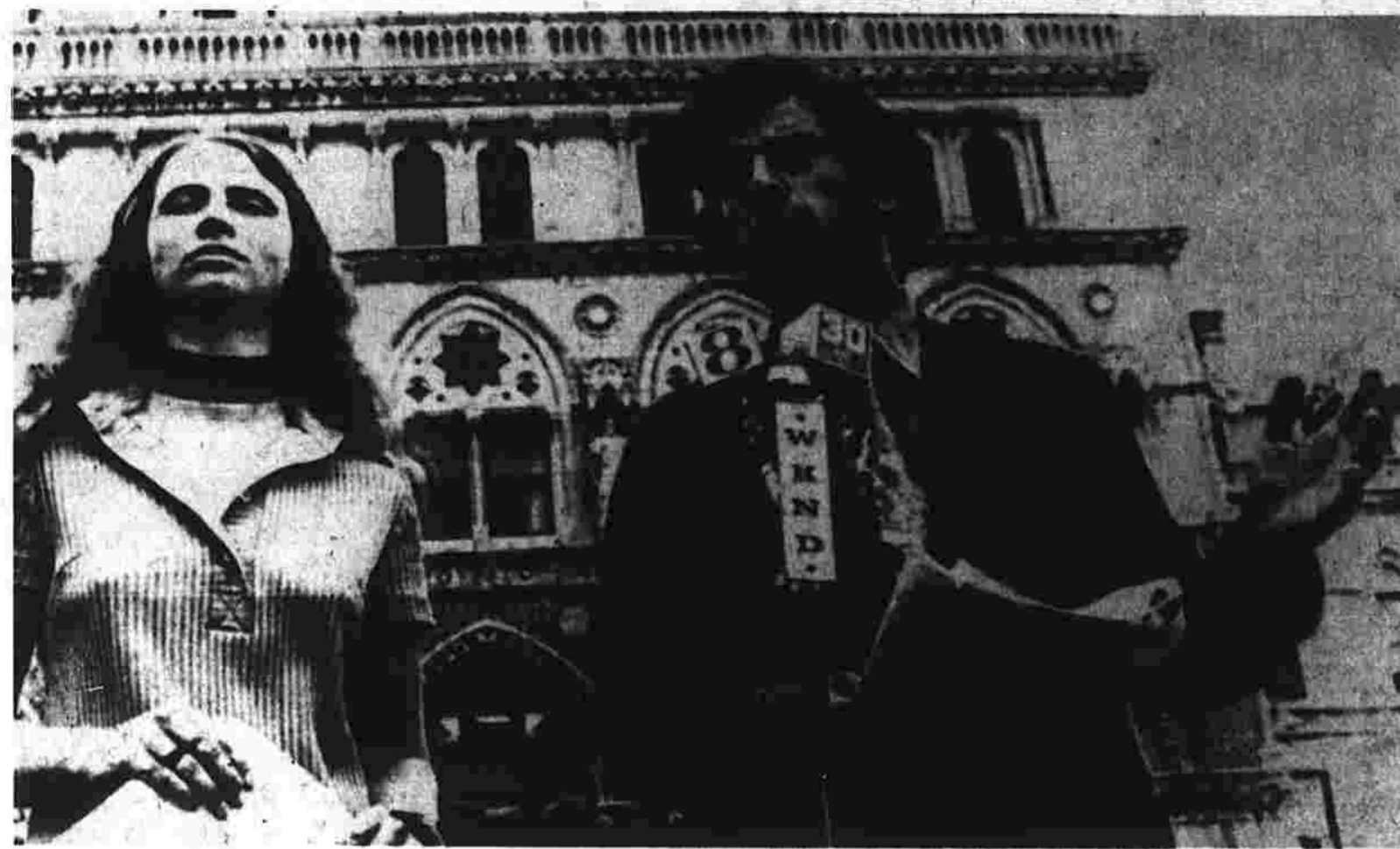
However, the casualty summary reported 18 American deaths last week from nonbattle causes, an increase of 12 over the previous week, and 18 missing from nonbattle causes. Although the command could not say 32 of them were believed lost in the crash May 10 of a big U.S. Army helicopter 20 miles north of Saigon, in such cases, men whose bodies are not recovered are usually listed as missing.

The allied commands now have reported these total casualties for the war:

American—43,747 killed in action, 32,071 wounded, 10,170 dead from nonbattle causes, 563 missing or captured.

South Vietnamese—142,711 killed in action, 383,367 wounded.

North Vietnamese and Viet Cong—31,462 killed.

Federal Authorities Blamed For Hartford Protest Arrests

HARTFORD (AP) — Hartford police officers sent to the anti-war rally Tuesday at the Federal Building arrested 15 demonstrators at the request of federal authorities, Police Chief Thomas J. Vaughan said Wednesday.

The officers originally had been given specific orders not to arrest anyone, Vaughan said.

"We had information," Vaughan said, "that a group of college-age students from Trinity College were coming to the rally to protest the war. The purpose of being arrested, we were told that they might chain themselves to either the flag pole or the doors. Our men sent to the area were instructed not to make any arrests."

However, federal authorities cut the chains tying the demonstrators to the door, Vaughan said, and then asked Hartford police to arrest them.

The federal request was made to Lt. Donald Higgins, superintendent of the demonstration, Vaughan said. Higgins responded and 15 anti-war protesters were eventually handcuffed by police. They were charged with disorderly conduct.

Vaughan blamed at least part of the problem at Tuesday's demonstration on confusion over whether federal or local authorities have jurisdiction at the Federal Building. He said he has directed the department's legal counsel, Cornelius Shea, to meet with federal prosecutors at the request of federal authorities. Police Chief Thomas J. Vaughan said Wednesday.

Pets Quarantined By Rabies Scare

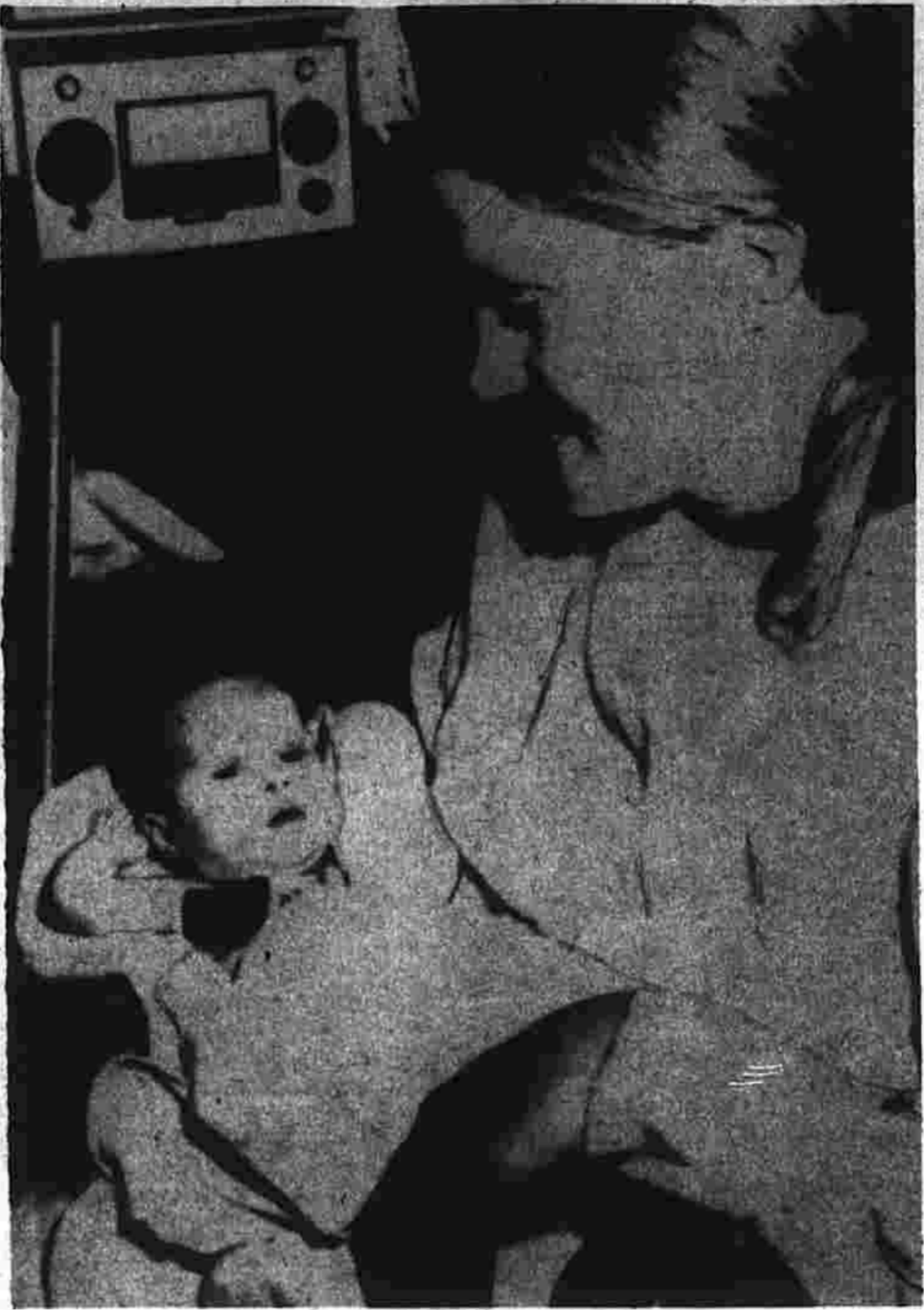

Bullet's Location Vital To Future For Wallace

SILVER SPRING, Md. (AP) — An area of the human spine known to doctors as "L-one" will be the target area for surgery planned to remove the bullet that has partially paralyzed George C. Wallace from the hips down.

The area may hold the key to Wallace's physical future. Acting like a central telephone cable, with various relay points, the cord has two main functions: To conduct and relay nerve impulses to and from the brain. The exact location is important not only for the precision of the surgery, but because it may hold the key to whether Wallace will be permanently paralyzed.

Here's why: Stretching from the base of the skull nearly to the bottom of the back within the spinal canal, runs the spinal cord, a rope-like string of nerve cells and fibers the approximate diameter of a little finger.

The spinal cord, running downward like the stem of a "T-tube," is equipped with something striking it directly—depending primarily upon the thread-like nerves that shoot off to the legs and arms, major internal organs, and other structures. The cord and the brain jointly impair the function of the central nervous system. But if the cord is only damaged, restoration of at least some function is often possible, depending primarily upon the amount of original damage to the cord, and the degree of internal paralysis.

Wallace's surgeons and other doctors say they won't know how much damage has been done to the cord until they operate to remove the bullet.

The extent of impairment depends upon the damage to the spinal cord. If the cord is severed, however temporary, the area of the body below the point of severance loses all sensation and movement. The National Maritime Fisheries Service, making the announcement Wednesday, said the area will remain closed until June 1.

Russell T. Norris, Northeast regional director of the service, said the closing was necessary because catches of flounder in the area already had exceeded quotas for the first and second quarters of 1972. The yearly quota in the area is 11,000 tons.

New Bedford fishermen were expected to be hardest hit by the closing. The largest concentration of flounder fishermen is in that port, a Maritime Fisheries Service spokesman said.

Charles Philbrook of the fisheries service said he expected vessels out of New Bedford either to continue to fish for flounder beyond the 60-degree limit or switch to haddock or cod inside the restricted area.

Philbrook said any vessel which went to sea before Wednesday's closing order will be allowed to fish for flounder for the next five days without restriction.

Vessels departing after Wednesday will be allowed to take an incidental flounder catch of up to 5,000 pounds in the restricted area, or 10 per cent by weight of all fish caught.

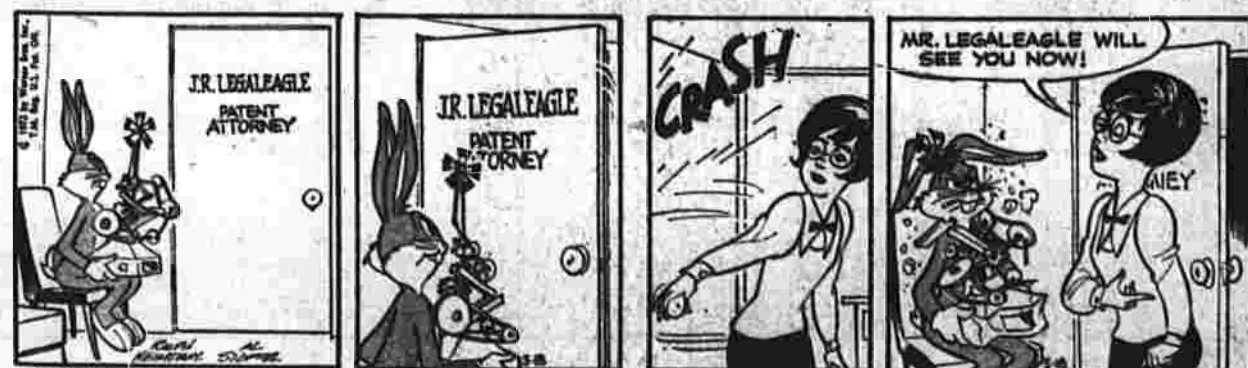

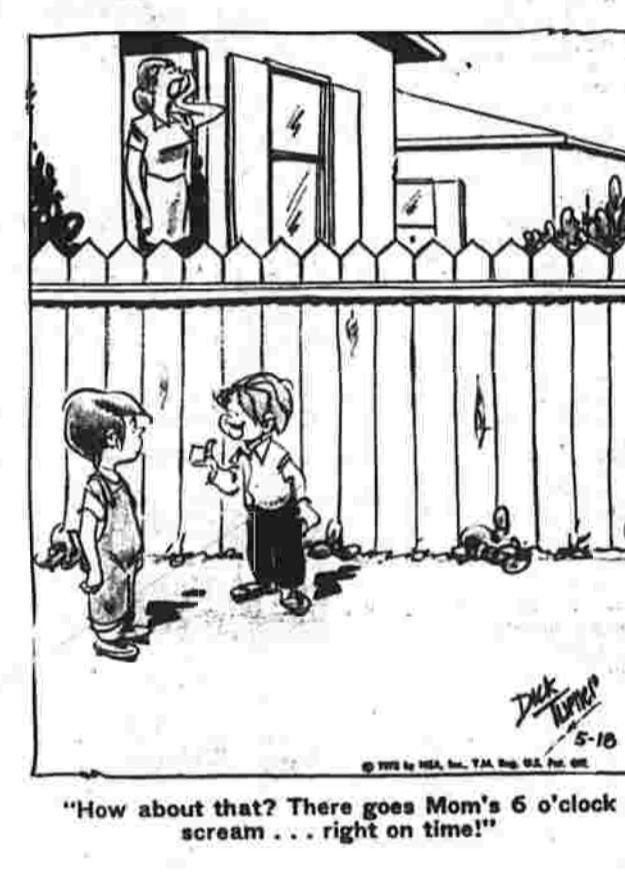
