

ROME (AP) — Italy's fat pasta industry is losing weight. Nowadays fewer Italians gorge themselves on spaghetti and wine. More and more of them are counting calories and watching their weight.

Spaghetti, fettuccine, lasagne, cannelloni, ravioli and the like—the dishes that made Italian restaurants famous—are the victims of a new era when the slender get the dates and the faties go to the movies alone.

"The industry's plight is grave," Milan's daily *Il Giorno* wrote after a nationwide survey.

In the last two decades pasta production has remained at 14 million tons a year despite a steady population increase and twice as many tourists. The 14 million figure is only a half of the industry capacity.

Also in the last 20 years, 1,630 pasta plants have folded, most of them the small family-type operations in the poorer south.

Exports have been on the rise, however—400,000 tons a year in 1961 to 802,000 tons last year. Nonetheless Italian emigrants are said to consume a considerable amount in pasta consumption abroad.

Summit Reaches Arms Pact

Tank Assault Turned Back Near Kontum

SAIGON (AP) — U.S. forces firing electronically guided missiles newly introduced in Vietnam broke up a tank assault on Kontum City in the central highlands today. A dozen tanks were reported destroyed.

On the northern front, South Vietnamese marines beat back the fourth assault this week on the northeastern defense line at My Chanh, north of Hue. The Saigon command claimed 180 North Vietnamese troops were killed and said South Vietnamese losses were seven killed and six wounded.

Accord To Be Signed Tonight

MOSCOW (AP) — The United States and the Soviet Union reached "final agreement" today on a two-part agreement to limit the deployment of strategic nuclear weapons, the White House announced.

An IUD prevents a fertilized ovum from attaching itself to the wall of the uterus. Gamber noted, The Stratford Republican said Thursday that the amount to an abortion under the new law, which he called "aboggy, unconstitutional and ridiculous."

Both the old law, which was declared unconstitutional last month by a federal court, and the new one, signed into law Tuesday by Gov. Thomas J. Meskill, forbid abortions except when necessary to save the lives of pregnant women or when the fetus was found to be defective.

'Yes-No' Vote — Reprieve or Stalemate

Tolland taxpayers have rejected the adoption of the \$3,273,122 budget adopted at the May 2 annual town meeting, but failed to approve the \$100,000 cut in the amount of the fiscal year to a tie vote. The school board had already out the school budget by \$251,000.

The results of the referendum are inconclusive, but left the town without a budget for the upcoming fiscal year. The budget was rescinded by a vote of 661-602 with the "yes" vote winning. The second question calling for the \$100,000 school budget cut was tied 608-608 in effect giving the victory to the "no" vote. Last year's referendum cut of \$150,000 was approved by a vote of 1,211-689, almost a 2-1 ratio.

The voters urged by supporters of both sides had been asked to vote "no-no" or "yes-yes" depending on which side you were supporting. With the tie vote, some typical contrariness that opted instead for what amounts to a "yes-no" vote.

The finance board is now faced with the need to begin all over again in its budget deliberations, and will meet in executive session Tuesday night to attempt to analyze the results with neither side able to claim a victory. The approximately fifty people waiting in the Parkade to read off the voting machines were sitting on the edge of their seats as the votes on each machine were read. The final outcome was not conclusive until the evening machine was completed, when the tie vote became apparent and a deadlock was declared as announced throughout the Hicks Room.

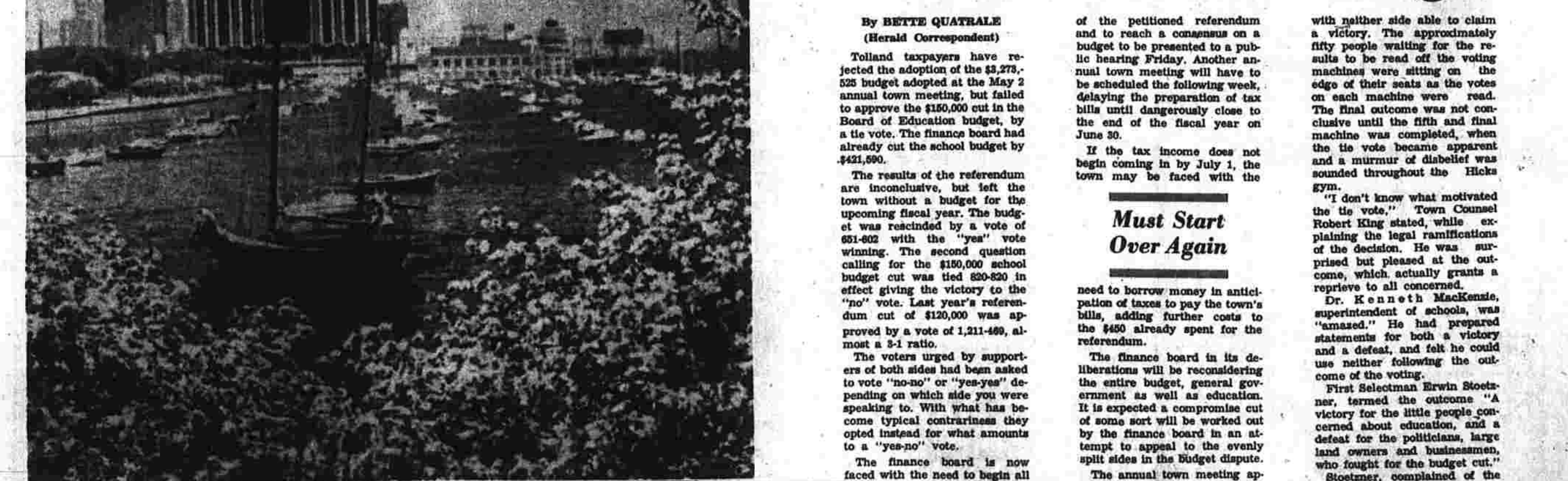
"I don't know what motivated the tie vote," Town Counsel Robert King stated, while explaining the legal ramifications of the decision. He was surprised but pleased at the outcome, which actually grants a reprieve to all concerned.

Dr. Kenneth MacKinnon, superintendent of schools, was "amused." He had prepared statements for both a victory and a defeat, and felt he could use neither following the outcome of the voting.

First Selectman Erwin Bloetner, termed the outcome "A victory for the little people concerned about education, and a defeat for the politicians, large land owners and businessmen, who fought for the budget cut."

Bloetner, complained of the expense the referendum petitioners are costing the town in. (See Page Eight)

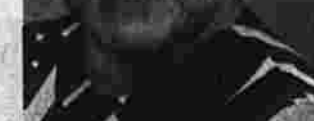

U.S.-Russia Trade Board Agreed Upon

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet Union announced today that President Nixon and Kremlin leaders have agreed to set up a joint commission to promote the development of mutually advantageous trade relations.

The commission was distributed by the official news agency Tass as Nixon met with the top three Soviet leaders. It signaled the first breakthrough on difficult trade issues which have seen intense negotiations since the American president arrived here on Monday.

The Russians also are seeking multilateral grain purchases from the United States, as well as U.S. credits to expand industrial production. But U.S. negotiators have insisted on some settlement of the Soviet World War II lend-lease debt prior to any favorable economic deals.

U.S. trade officials had said before coming to Moscow that creation of a joint commission to press forward with trade talks was likely.

Agreement on creation of the joint commission could indicate that Nixon and Soviet leaders feel it is impossible to resolve during the summit talks the complex trade questions facing the two countries, and that such a structure is needed to continue the negotiations.

The versatility of latex foam rubber has turned the once-difficult task of upholstering into a reasonably simple chore for most persons.

While there are special commercial sizes, the foam rubber the home handyman uses is available in thicknesses ranging from one quarter of an inch to 1 1/2 inches. In the smaller thicknesses — up to 1/2 inch — it comes without holes or cores and is used primarily where relatively thin padding is required, such as on the arms and backs of straight chairs or as window seat cushions. The larger sizes usually are known as pincore foam and have numerous pencil-thick holes running through them. They come flat or crowned to make thick, rounded, extra-plump cushions.

Whether it be the replacement of seat chairs and backs or the recushioning of sofas, the task has been eased considerably because the do-it-yourselfer need no longer struggle with the variables of loose stuffing. By selecting a solid sheet of latex foam rubber as the replacement material — buying it in size or cutting it himself — he bypasses what used to be the most worrisome part of the project.

Foam rubber is made from liquid latex rubber, given a chemical treatment, whipped into a froth, baked in a mold, and finally washed and dried. It is the whipping process that produces the thousands of air cells which make it soft, lightweight, durable and easy to handle.

Foam rubber once was difficult to purchase. Today it is sold in department stores, log and mail order houses, specialty dealers and upholstery suppliers.

There probably isn't too much call for them among do-it-yourselfers because alcohol lamp also is needed if the repair job is to be done properly. When you do find a store with shellac sticks, purchase a small alcohol lamp and a palette knife.

Loan Terms Eased For Quality Homes

By BILL NEUBERK Associated Press Writer. WASHINGTON (AP) — The government has made it possible for home buyers to purchase more-expensive homes with smaller down payments.

The Federal Home Loan Bank Board decided this week to increase maximum amounts that federal savings-and-loan associations can lend on conventional mortgages in which down payment is only 5 to 10 per cent.

For loans covering 90 per cent of the cost of the home, federal savings-and-loan associations may lend as much as \$45,000 up from the present \$38,000.

On 85-per-cent loans, home buyers may borrow \$36,000 instead of the present \$30,000. The new maximums are effective June 1.

Conventional loans, those not guaranteed by the Veterans Administration nor insured by the Federal Housing Administration, are harder to obtain, and the interest rates are higher than on FHA and VA loans.

According to bank-board officials, the impact will be greatest in major metropolitan suburbs and on young families in which the head of household is between 25 and 34 and is making over \$10,000 a year.

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Contemporary Home — Two Hundred Years Ago



A home of more than two hundred years ago was just as contemporary as the home of today, that is, the buyer or builder desired the comforts and any innovations available which would make a home attractive and desirable.

The earliest known home in Manchester, bearing a historical marker with the date 1752, had a central heating system and attractive interior decor. The house on South Main St., referred to as the Tremans Drown house and now belonging to Mrs. Henry A. Tiemann Jr., is typical of the central chimney plan used extensively in Connecticut in the late 1700s and early 1800s.

Fireplaces, framed in paneled walls, supplied heat for the rooms built around the central chimney. Decor, besides the fine paneling, was original in one of the bedrooms where the primitive hand stenciling that decorates the walls remains untouched.

The modern kitchen of that day demanded a great stone hearth to accommodate the beehive oven for baking and the cooking crane which held cast iron pots and kettles over the fire.

The 'White House', Half Hidden

There is no spacious, sweeping view from the Ray Beller home at 122 Steep Hollow Lane. The contemporary house of fieldstone and gray-green stained redwood nestles almost unnoticeably in a wooded yard of pine, hemlock and white birch trees.

But a feeling of boundless space is achieved within the house by the expanse of white uninterrupted wall space, clear glass, and lighting. Among the Bellers' friends, the house is referred to as the "white house."

The slate floored foyer, broad and wide, seems to have no ceiling. For it is

flooded with a shaft of light from a large skylight above the free standing stairway. A corner alcove introduces the color accent that is found throughout the living area. A mirror on one corner wall reflects the color of concealed grape on the adjoining wall, with an orange cushioned built-in corner seat.

A massive fieldstone fireplace column rises to the ceiling from the sunken living room floor. The various tints found in the field stone determine the colors used in the living room: an off-white thick shag carpet; two pale beige massive divans scattered with large sofa pillows in gold,

orange, brown and white with one or two plum colored ones for unusual color accent; a brown, rough textured upholstered chair.

The uninterrupted white wall space is broken only by a pair of small framed collages, one in deep pink and one in deep blue.

A low glass table on a glass pedestal gives the illusion of nothing there until you notice the side-by-side bouquets of dried purple statice and golden strawflowers standing in clear glass vases.

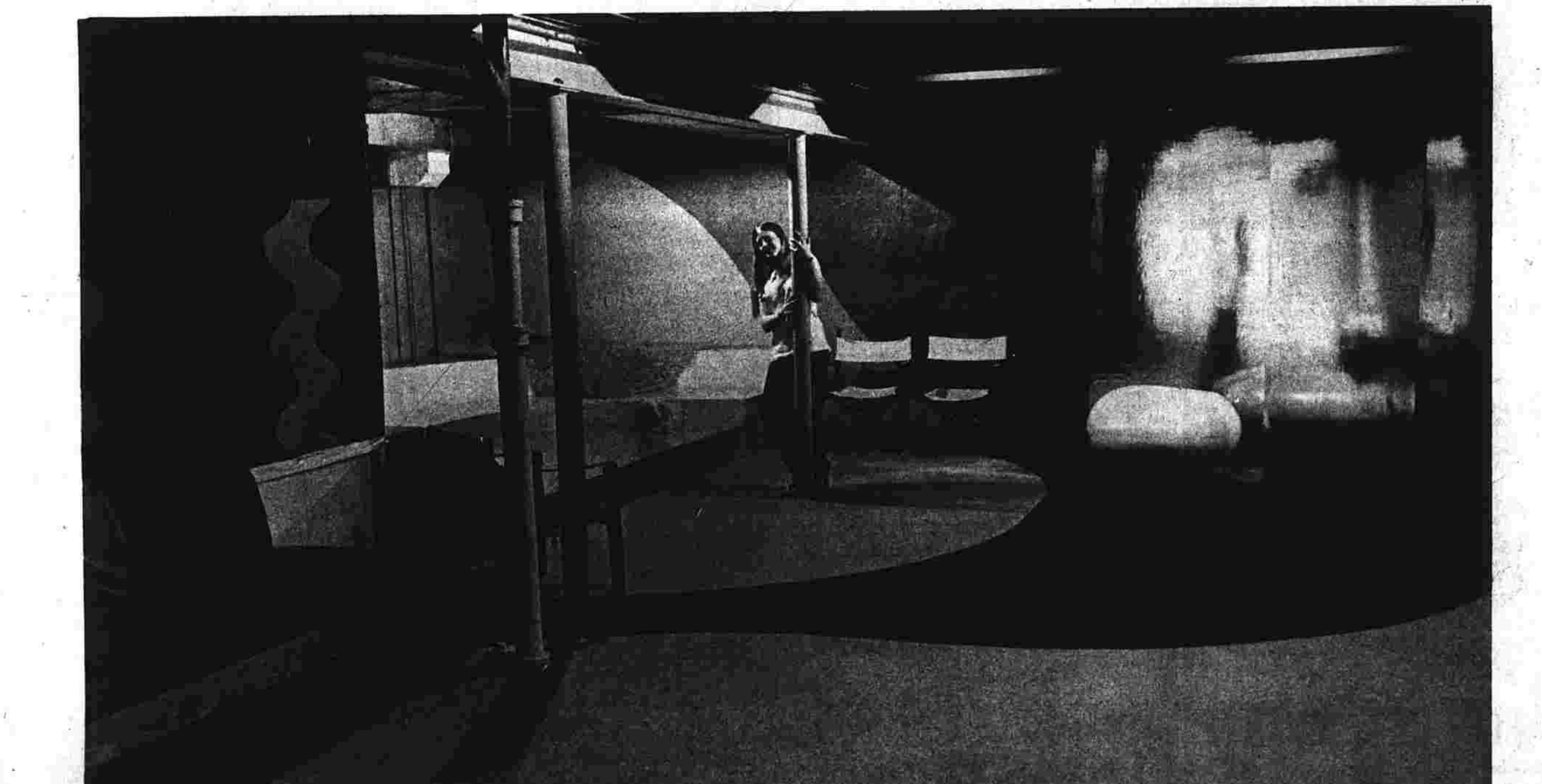

Three low white square tables, grouped casually, are versatile units which may be moved about to suit various situations. They may be used as tables for informal entertaining, or they may serve as extra seats when covered with cushions that are concealed on a very low shelf underneath each unit.

Adjustable spotlights are arranged from a ceiling track along one side of the room, and recessed ceiling lights afford area lighting from in front of the fireplace and in the adjoining dining room.

Sliding glass doors across the front of the house permit indoor-outdoor access for the living room, the dining room and the den. A stone patio surrounded with a natural tree hedge provides ideal outdoor living in the warm weather. Mrs. Beller adds color to the patio in summer with pots of various plants and flowers.

A circular table with matching contemporary bentwood chairs are the simple furnishings of the dining room. A wooden shell serves as a buffet counter for entertaining. Green foliage plants of various heights by the glass sliding doors blend the indoors with the outdoors.

The den is where the family can select a book from the shelf, watch television, study, or just relax on a built-in sofa covered in a blue coarse material which harmonizes with the oatmeal colored burly on the walls. A green goat rug, — a Fickell, lends a feeling of warmth and comfort to the room.

The kitchen is functional with all birch paneling and cabinets. Natural colored and sliding glass doors. Bright red chairs around a white table as a means of the fast area, complemented by a colorful wall poster depicting a lady reading in bed under a red bedspread with a white cat snoring on the bed.

An open area in the hall near the top of the stairway resembles a small library.

Bright clown faces are the first things one sees beyond the head of the stairs, — clown hats that make up the print used for the bathroom window shade. Candy stripe linen covered walls complement the colorful clown.

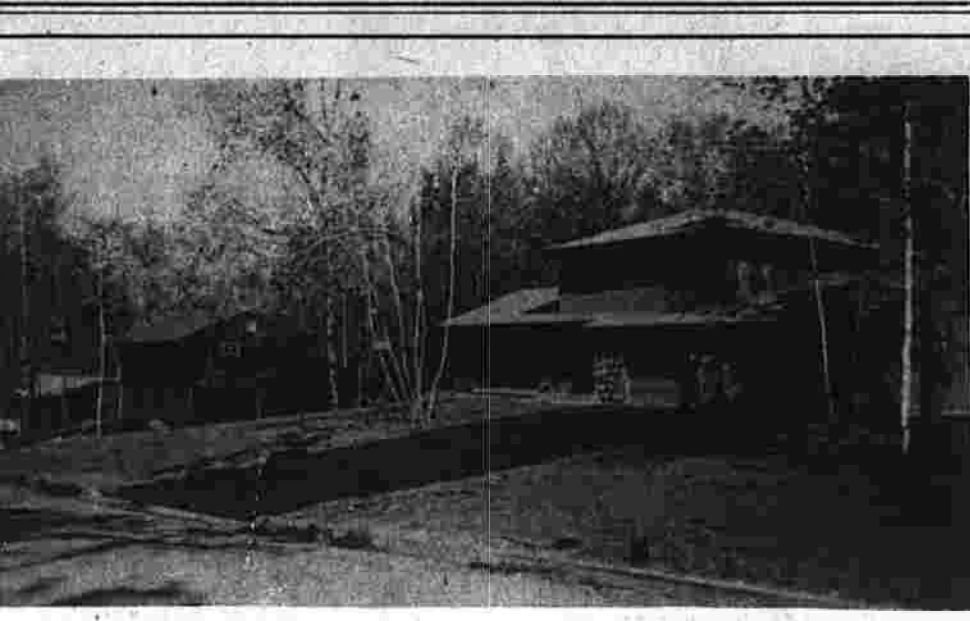

(Continued from Page 18) government undertakes any new big program. Ehrlichman said he read that to mean a tax increase is inevitable no matter who is elected president. He said the Brookings report failed to focus enough on cutting federal spending to achieve economy and "we don't think that alternative can so easily be laid aside."

But he said Congress would have to cooperate in bringing about the economies, including enacting the ceiling on federal spending that the President proposed in January. Federal spending could be reduced by eliminating such programs as Model Cities and by enacting the President's special revenue-sharing bill, which calls for making down some of special welfare pro-

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Educating Process Needs Revamping

Our school's basic educating process needs revamping and reorganization. The students at MHS are being overworked as human beings and are instead being molded by a sometimes detrimental learning process.

The average student (if there is one) has already been loaded around by our success-fail system by the time he hits high school. Students work to earn the grades that teachers pay them; any student who refuses has his salary out, or is "laid off."

What most of our educators fail to see is that every student is different; each student has an interest, a learning method, knowledge in some area. Yet each student's interest is not taken into account as he is put through the standard educational mill.

In too many classes, there is no teacher-student exchange. The teachers in these classes are taken over by the myth of education: "The myth of the ONE best way and the myth of which some teachers present is not varied nor up to date with modern times."

There is too much uniformity in some classes. The teacher starts a routine at the beginning of the year and hardly ever changes his routine (even if he tries something different).

He uses the lecture learning process, where he recites facts to the human retaining machines who sit in front of him, dutifully copying down facts in their notebooks.

Facts! FACTS are important: We must know what year Teddy Roosevelt ran for the Presidency! But facts do not teach us to solve modern problems. Usually the students are not interested in the facts. There are no innovations or interesting projects which will excite the student; each line on more irrelevant. There must be deviations from the rote learning.

We are not saying the problem is our stifling classrooms or the stagnant knowledge are entirely the teacher's mis-

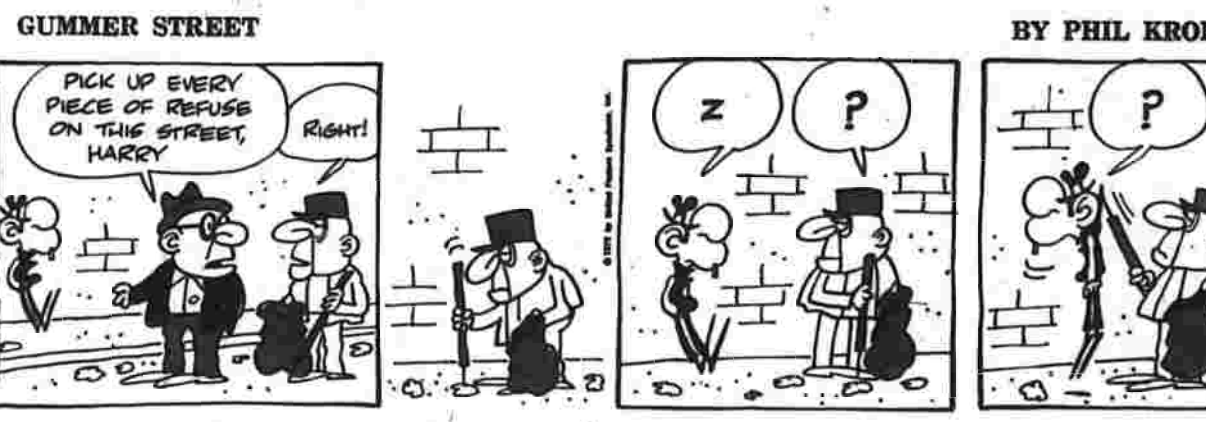

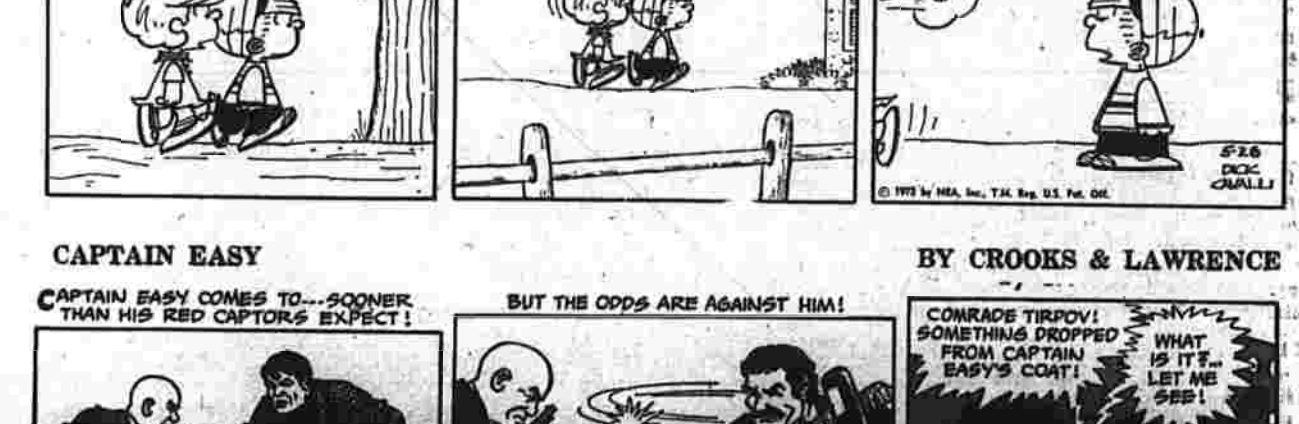

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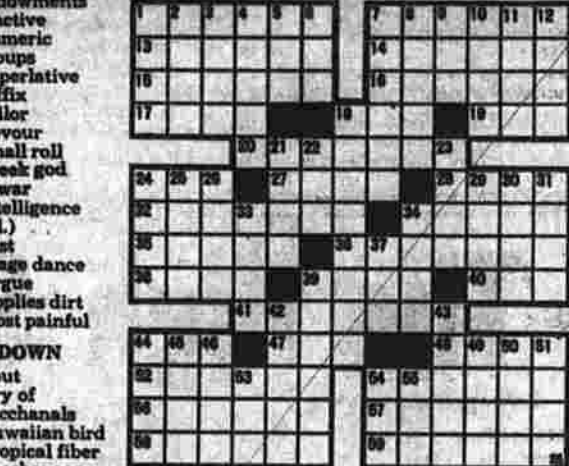
