ing them, the more satisfying, to the in-  
 munity, the slight of their blood.  
 There is in the business of comment,  
 no post greater than that of trying  
 to take a limited number of specific hap-  
 penings and use them to formulate some  
 sweeping general conclusion. So we do  
 not conclude. We merely ask. Does  
 anybody else begin to suspect that civi-  
 lization may be evolving in the wrong di-  
 rection? Are we going to look back, soon,  
 with nostalgia and envious regret, at  
 those comparatively civilized days when,  
 if we killed, we at least had some kind  
 of reason for attacking some particu-  
 lar life? When the same kind of thing  
 starts happening in all parts of the world  
 at the same time, is it merely coinci-  
 dence, or is it part of some trend only  
 the movie makers know anything about?

**Epilogue**

"The King listened until he was bored  
 to the study of men of the realm who  
 told him he could never make the  
 woman of his choice his Queen and then  
 decided that he would go on a thing called  
 radio and announce to his nation and  
 the world that he was abdicating because  
 he could not contemplate bearing the  
 burdens of rule without the compani-  
 onship and assistance of the woman  
 I love."

"The King did so, and surrendered the  
 cares of state to his brother, and never  
 again possessed the authority or majesty  
 of a ruler, nor did he ever become or  
 regret the loss of the power and station  
 that once had been his.  
 "Instead, he and his lady lived happily  
 ever after, tender and considerate of one  
 another, strong and unquestioning in  
 their choice and their union, until the end  
 of his days. And after that, they became  
 a legend, of two who gave up everything  
 for love, and did not lose. And little chil-  
 dren of future royal families, young  
 princes and young future queens, were  
 told, in future years, the story of the  
 king who escaped as if it were the most  
 fascinating and enviable of all the fairy  
 tales."

We suggest some news for the news-  
 men. The unpleasant news — unpleasant  
 not only for them, but also perhaps for  
 the entire nation — is that the voters of  
 California and the nation may very well  
 know all about Senator McGovern, and  
 that they don't care if he is far-out and  
 unsafe by normal political standards.

We even suggest that all the "eco-

 crowded passenger terminal and then  
 proceeded to turn the terminal into a  
 bloody slaughterhouse. The gunmen  
 were Japanese. What brought them into  
 the Near East, on such a mission, may  
 be discovered, if the one who is still alive  
 corroborates the claim of Arab es-  
 tablishment that they arranged the  
 slaughter.

For the insanity which designs and  
 carries out such events the important  
 crowning touch is, we suppose, the com-  
 plete innocence and non-involvement of  
 the victims.  
 The more senseless the killings, the  
 more artistic a movie they make, or imi-  
 tate.

 victims, the less possible reason for kill-

 participate immediately in all  
 party privileges.  
 In Connecticut the independ-  
 ent or unaffiliated voter is in  
 reality a very dependent voter.  
 He depends on party members  
 to select candidates for him at  
 the grass roots level. He de-  
 pends on party members to vote  
 in caucuses and conventions that  
 choose candidates and adopt  
 party platforms. He depends on  
 party members to challenge par-  
 ty leaders in primaries because  
 he cannot vote in a primary or  
 party caucus.  
 The League of Women Voters  
 of Connecticut urges the unaf-  
 filiated voter to join a political  
 party now so that he can help  
 nominate the candidates he  
 thinks are best qualified, can  
 help challenge the candidates  
 he thinks are not qualified, can

Behind Closed Doors  
 The Christian Church today is  
 by far and large similar to the  
 Church of Jesus Christ that ex-  
 isted between Easter and Pentecost.  
 It may have more beautiful

 but it is similar just the same.  
 Like that Church, the Church  
 of today is behind closed doors.  
 If you were to have walked  
 the streets of Jerusalem any-

 and first Pentecost, looking for  
 the Christian Church, you would  
 have found it in seclusion, be-  
 hind locked doors.  
 There was only one way to get  
 into it, and that was to raise  
 the tone of the inner life, so  
 that they were inwardly a

 result of the institutional changes within  
 the party. The new "reform" rules

 primaries undermines the power of those  
 motivated by party loyalty and in-

# Reaching the Young and Old Alike

By BETTY BYDER (Herald Reporter)

Manchester has taken a giant step in its efforts to fill the needs of its youth and its retired citizens as well.

Through the Community YWCA of the Hartford Region YWCA, under its "Reach Out" Program, it extended a helping hand—aid found young and old alike eager to grasp it.

The Community "Y" located at the Roberton School and the Mayfair Gardens housing project for the retired, all in the North End of Manchester, proved to be an ideal spot from which to launch this program. Bennet Junior High is also involved.

One of the unique features in the programs designed for the young, is that they are offered during the school activity period (study hall) and during the lunch recess. This affords students an opportunity to participate without the concern of bus transportation after school.

**Work Part Time**

Under the direct supervision of Miss Jan Vandervort, executive director of the East Branch, YWCA, two graduate students from the University of Connecticut, School of Social Work, volunteered to work part time in this program as a part of their studies to earn M.A. degrees in social work.

With the cooperation of school officials, a group of 100 young citizens, and the "Y" personnel, the students, Mrs. Barbara Quinn and Miss Eileen Byers, initiated various programs to stimulate interest in ecology, water conservation, and held discussion groups on subject of mutual interest to the participants.

At Bennet Junior High School, some 15 girls joined in the social recreation group or the "Teen Y."

"Some of the girls, who had previously been shy and withdrawn, are now showing considerable interest in themselves as well as others. They are more relaxed and enjoy being part of a group whose discussions cover subjects from pollution to hair styling, and from personal appearance to community projects," Mrs. Byers said.

"It is hoped that other groups will be formed at the school and a greater number of students will find areas of interest they wish to pursue," she added.

At Robertson School, after lunch, some students utilize the time to study in their home-rooms or to know in the library. But for some 20-40 active youngsters, volleyball teams have been formed and games played during this free period.

A newly formed group of sixth graders is planning to study ecology and conservation. They hope to become involved in community-related activities by taking field trips to parks and ponds and become aware of the processes of recycling paper, glass, etc.

The transportation problem seems to be the only drawback to expanding these programs to after-school hours.

"Most of them are held during school hours, but occasionally we have taken field trips, and the volunteers have transported the children to their destinations."

Works Both Ways

The "Reach-Out" Program works both ways. Christmas time, the ladies of the club made trays for the elderly and finger condition would be appreciated.

Mrs. Emma Parker and Mrs. Arline Geddes, president and vice president, respectively, are hopeful more residents will participate. Of the 78 residents at Mayfair Gardens, 30 are active members.

The club has just one major need—a piano to be used for religious services as well as for parties and meetings. Many of the residents play and the donation of a piano in good condition would be appreciated.

Sixth-graders of the Roberton Elementary School saw a demonstration and heard a talk on scuba diving and water safety by Patrick Quinn of Connecticut State Central College, assisted by Kris Bengston. Presentation was part of the Community YWCA's "Reach-Out" Program of which many of the students are members.



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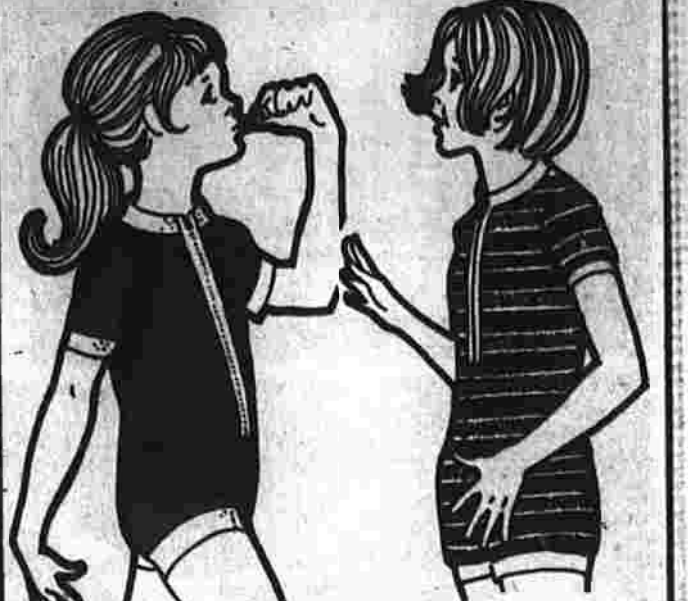

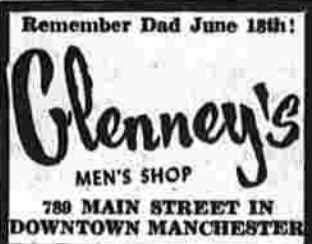

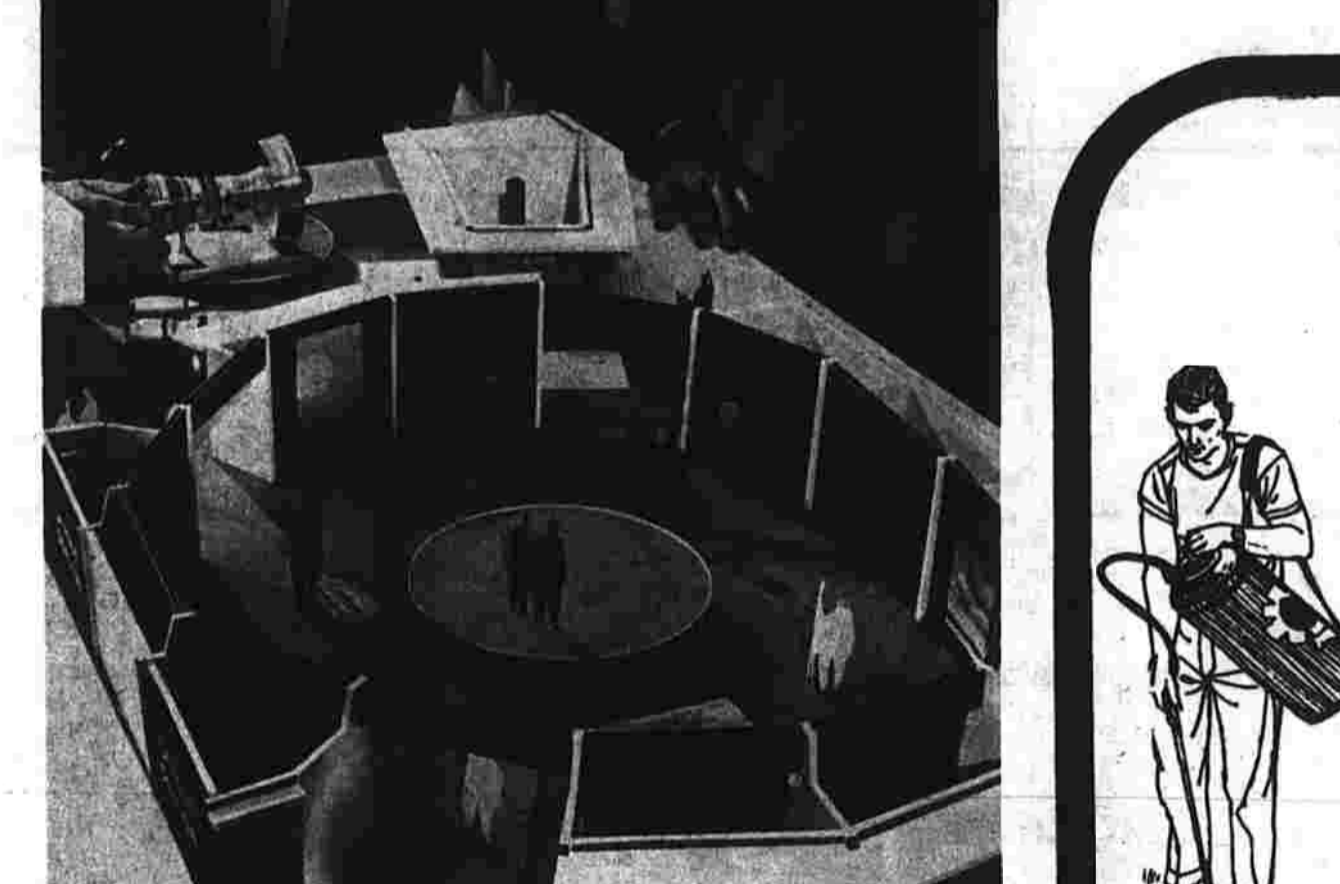
