What Is Masonry?

Freemasonry is a fraternity of men bound together by vows in morality in public and private life who believe in God and the constitutional right of members to free choice of religion and political persuasion. Masonry, with its dedication to education, morality, brotherly love, nonsectarianism in religion and politics and equal rights, is a steady influence that balances and consolidates the social, religious and political life of America.

In short, Masonry strives to make good men better men.

Its basic tenants are Brotherly Love, Relief (philanthropy) and Truth.

BLUE LODGE

The Blue Lodge (Symbolic Masonry) confers the first three degrees — Entered Apprentice (first degree), Fellowcraft (second degree) and Master Mason (third degree).

There is no higher degree in Masonry than Master Mason. However, a Master Mason may enter the Scottish Rite or York Rite that elaborate basic Masonry principles.

SCOTTISH RITE

The Scottish Rite confers the 4th through 32nd degree in its four bodies: Lodge of Perfection (4 through 14), Council of Princes of Jerusalem (15-16), Chapter of Rose Croix (17-18) and a Consistory of Sublime Princes of the Royal Secret (S.P.R.S.) 19-32).

Any Master Mason in good standing may ask a Scottish Rite friend for a petition or obtain one from a Scottish Rite secretary. He must be judged to be of good moral character, and his election must be unanimous.

YORK RITE

The York Rite consists of nine degrees in addition to Blue Lodge degrees.

York Rite degrees are divided into: Capitular Degrees: Mark Master, Past Master, Most Excellent Master, and Royal Arch Mason, all conferred in a Chapter of Royal Arch Masons.

Cryptic Degrees: Royal Master, Select Master, and Super Excellent Master, all conferred in a Council of Royal and Select Masters.

Chivalric Orders: Order of the Red Cross, Order of the Knights of Malta, and Order of Knights Templar, all conferred in a Commandery of Knights Templar.

Scottish and York Rites are autonomous bodies, but members have in common their membership in the Blue Lodge — and all the moral and philosophical teachings of Masonry that the two rites elaborate.

What's A Shrine Game All About?

On a day that is bitter cold, and the high school or college football players are going through practice the week before a Shrine Bowl Game, someone will inevitably pose the question: "What do they get out of it?"

Steve Sanders, sports writer for the Spartanburg, S.C., Herald, said, "It's certain that they get exposure to college (and pro) scouts and a chance at a scholarship to just about the school of their choice."

(High school seniors form both squads for the Shrine Bowl of the Carolinas, while other Shrine games use college seniors.)

But the players might even say it better:

Ed Marinaro, Cornell's All-American, all-time rusher, said after his visit with patients at the San Francisco Hospital: "If this is the only good thing I do in this life, it will be worth it."

"Some of the biggest, strongest guys will be the gentlest," said Dr. Kirk Ashley of the San Francisco Unit, after six-foot Bernard Jackson, Washington State running back, had comforted three-year-old Loren and got him to stop the tears.

Al DeGogton, Duke tackle and now a noted football color commentator on TV. He played in an East-West game 22 years ago. "You ask me if it (the hospital visit) made us play a little harder? No. It made us play a lot harder. We all went out and played like hell the next day. It happens every year."

High School star end from Dorman High School at Spartanburg, S.C., said: "We visited the Shriners Hospital (Greenville Unit) Sunday, and seeing those little kids just makes you want to do your best."

(There is a Maple Sugar Bowl game played every August at Dartmouth College in Hanover, N.H. It brings together select all-star high school players from Vermont and New Hampshire, and the money raised is divided between the Shrine hospitals at Springfield and Montreal. The sponsoring Shrine Temples are the 13 temples in the Northeast Shrine Association and temples in upper New York State. The Northeast association includes New England temples (like Sphinx) and the temples of Quebec and the Maritime Provinces of Canada.)

When he was a 1960 Football Smoker guest at Manchester Lodge of Masons, Kyle Rote, sportscaster and former New York Giants and Southern Methodist star, said he could never forget the little girl that he "adopted" when he played in the East-West Shrine Game.

"As a matter of fact," he told his audience at the Manchester Masonic Temple, "we have corresponded for eleven years, and kept closely in contact with one another, and only last week I had an invitation to her wedding. You bet your life I'll be there!"

Jerry Izenberg, sports writer for the Newark (N.J.) Star-Ledger, summed it up this way: "It is a different kind of bowl game, with a very different kind of meaning. In the span of a single afternoon, the kids who play in it (a Shrine game) will do more as human beings than all of the campus orators who are devoted to the extension of their particular pleasure . . . and that goes for virtually all of the college bowl games in America."

"They (the players and the Shriners) will show that giving a damn can be a truly viable gift."



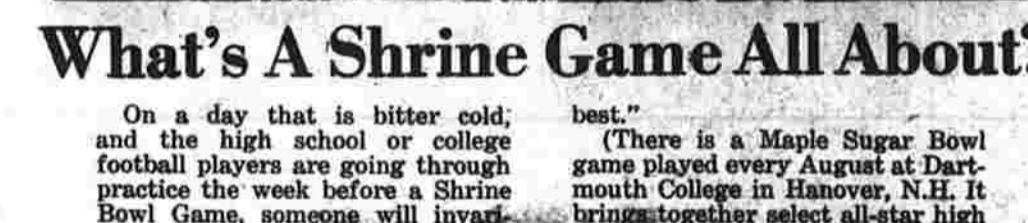

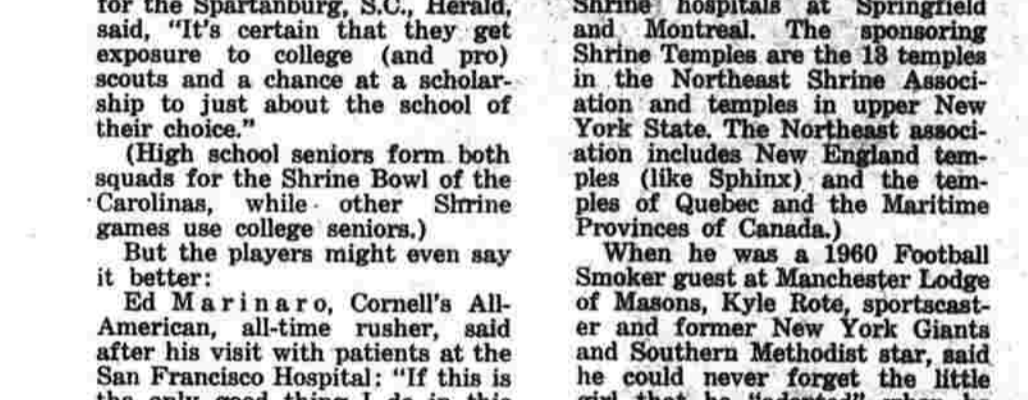

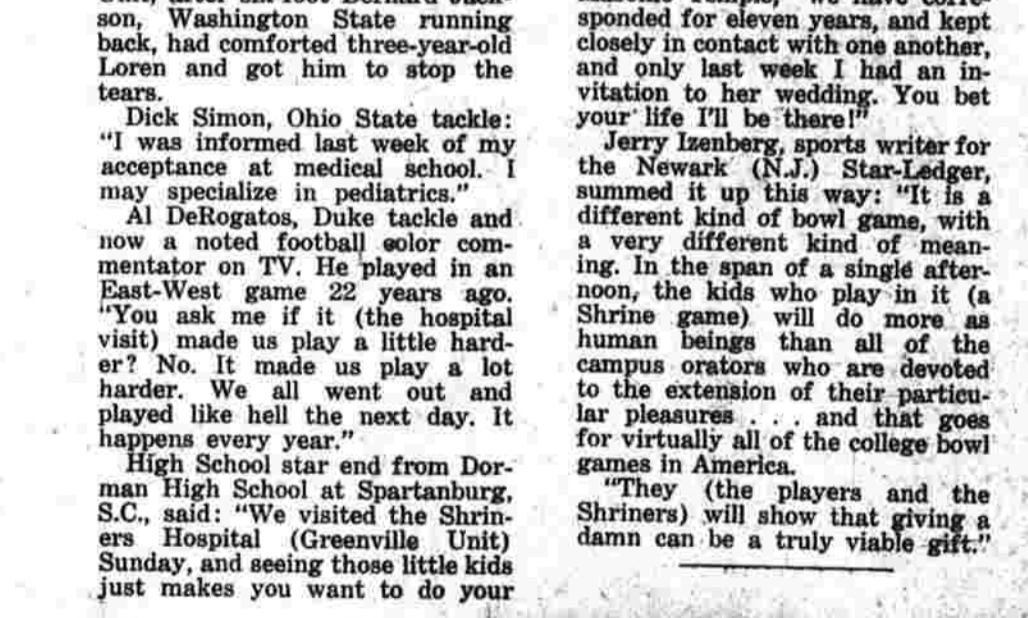

As American As Apple Pie

They are a household word in most of America, these red-headed jolly men who call themselves Shriners. Children know them because of the annual Shrine Circus. Fathers know them because of the East-West and North-South college all-star football games. The disadvantaged know them for the 22 hospitals they run for crippled and burned children.

Anyone who has seen one of their colorful parades never forgets the melange of costumes, clowns, animals, motorcycles and bands.

Anyone who has seen one of their parades is certain never to forget the precision marching corps and the intricate maneuvers of highly trained horses striding in perfect step.

But with the rapidly changing, socially turbulent times, how do they stay? Where does the "Ancient Arabic Order of Nobles of the Mystic Shrine fit into contemporary America?"

"As American as apple pie," the Shrine's own history says, "despite its name." Its membership is as diverse as former Vice President Hubert Humphrey, Eddie Rickensacker, Roy Rogers, former President Harry S. Truman, astronaut Gordon Cooper, the late film star Harold Lloyd, John Wayne, Red Skelton, Sen. Barry Goldwater and many other familiar names.

It supports the government. "It requires a belief in God of all its members. 'As American as apple pie'."

Some believe the Shrine is a religion. It is not, but it does practice quasi-religious rites that are just as secret as the passwords that admit members to official ceremonies and serve as a form of communication understood only by Shriners.

The members wear ornate oriental robes, crowns and medals at rituals. The meeting halls, called temples or mosques, carry exotic names like "El Kalif," "Bani Kadam," "Yasak," "Sphinx" and "Zembo," and are often topped by Byzantine domes.

Sphinx Temple of Hartford expects to break ground within a month for its own new mosque of 148 in Farmington, near the new UConn Medical Center.

Its rituals are carefully and colorfully staged with Shriners wearing robes of purple, gold, red and green. Trained makeup men, also Shriners, apply beards and stage makeup to make the participants look like the romantic Arabs of old.

Oriental bands play as the secret pageants are staged in the 172 temples of North America.

Beyond the ritual and parades and clothing is a serious side to the Shrine. It operates 22 hospitals for burned and crippled children through the country.

In New England, there is a crippled children's hospital at Springfield and a burn institute at Boston.

Many millions of dollars are spent annually to operate the Shrine hospitals. An average of \$1,000 is spent for each orthopedic case and over \$10,000 to treat each burned child.

Since the first orthopedic hospital was opened in 1822, more than 145,000 crippled children have received treatment.

Patients are limited to children under 18 from financially disadvantaged homes. Race and religion are not obstacles to admission. There is no charge for hospital care or transportation.

Much of the money raised by Shrine football games and circuses goes into these facilities with more than \$45,000,000 already invested in buildings and another \$10,000,000 allocated for construction. Further appropriations for construction are announced practically every year.

The burn hospitals were developed in the last six years to fill what the Shrine saw as a shortage of facilities to adequately treat burn cases. Each hospital has 20 beds and is equipped with the most advanced burn-treatment facilities.

Before becoming a Shiner, a potential member must complete a series of tests admitting him to each of three Masonic degrees. At each level a new moral lesson is taught.

After becoming a "Master Mason," an aspiring Shiner must then proceed through the rituals of the Scottish or York rites, both of which are affiliated Masonic organizations that confer degrees elaborating basic Masonry principles. There is no higher degree in Masonry than "Master Mason."

The Shrine was formed in 1872 as a secret society and has "lived" under the mantle of pagantry, ritual and ceremony. Today it has nearly 900,000 members.

It was founded by an actor, Billy Florence, and a Civil War surgeon, Dr. Walter M. Fleming, who, the official history says, "could have earned a good livelihood as a juggler and magician."

Florence stumbled across a vehicle for the new society in Marseille, France, where he was invited to a party given by an Arabian diplomat.

The entertainment was an elaborately staged musical comedy at the end of which guests were initiated into a secret society.

Florence concocted his own version of the ceremony, told Dr. Fleming about it, and the two created the Shrine.

Last year, about 30,000 joined the Shrine, but the 1.7 per cent net increase reflects a large number of deaths and a small number of dropouts.

In the last five years, the average age of Shrine members has dropped from 64 to 58.

The pattern of growth indicates the Shrine is completing a full circle. It was once a largely rural, small-town type of fraternity. Then it was a big-city organization. Now it is moving to the suburbs.

But increasing its membership is something over which the Shrine has little direct control because it must draw from affiliated Masonic orders.

Leaders say they believe Shrinedom is going to do its part in holding the country together, in supporting the government and democracy.

The good the Shrine does at its hospitals can be measured in terms of lives it changes. They are happy and great in number!

The Shrine's long parades will continue as part of their tradition and the faces of children at their circuses will continue to glow.

They will fit in a comfortable niche in the contemporary American puzzle and, they believe, they will go on being "as American as apple pie."

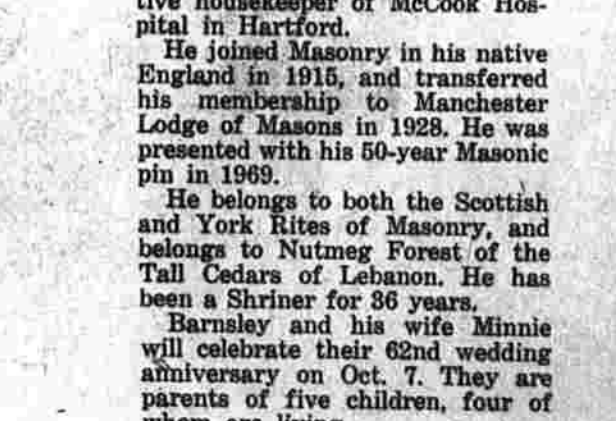

Vibrator Won't Aid Weight Loss

By Lawrence Lamb, M.D. Dear Dr. Lamb—I have read somewhere that it is dangerous to sit too close to the TV and I am concerned because my grandchildren constantly sit in front of the TV set. Is this hard on their eyes? Dear Reader—The American Optometric Assn. recently published a little pamphlet on this and they point out that under proper conditions the TV isn't as much a strain on the eyes as close work such as reading or sewing. Further they say it doesn't hurt the child to sit up close, but he will be better off sitting at a distance of at least five times the width of the screen. This provides a sharper and better defined picture. Normal room lighting and avoiding glare is all right for the lighting conditions and it is good to have the television set in direct line with the light to prevent assuming uncomfortable body positions which can be straining. Children who watch television up close to the TV set are sometimes nearsighted and probably need an eye examination. There has been an eye examination. There has been an eye examination. Miss Blalock, a 26-year-old blue-eyed blonde from Portsmouth, N.H., is the leading money winner on the LPGA tour this year with \$22,886.

In only her fourth year on the tour, she already has won honors as rookie of the year in 1969 and most improved golfer in 1970 and 1971.

Miss Blalock is asking for damages of not less than \$1 million, to be trebled as provided by law. She also seeks \$1 million for compensatory damages and \$1 million for punitive damages.

Erickson said the suspension was taken after Miss Blalock met with the executive committee three times in the last 10 days. He said she was advised suspension was inevitable.

Miss Blalock wasn't available for comment on the matter. Erickson declined to comment on her lawsuit. "We will answer to the complaint at the proper time," he said.
