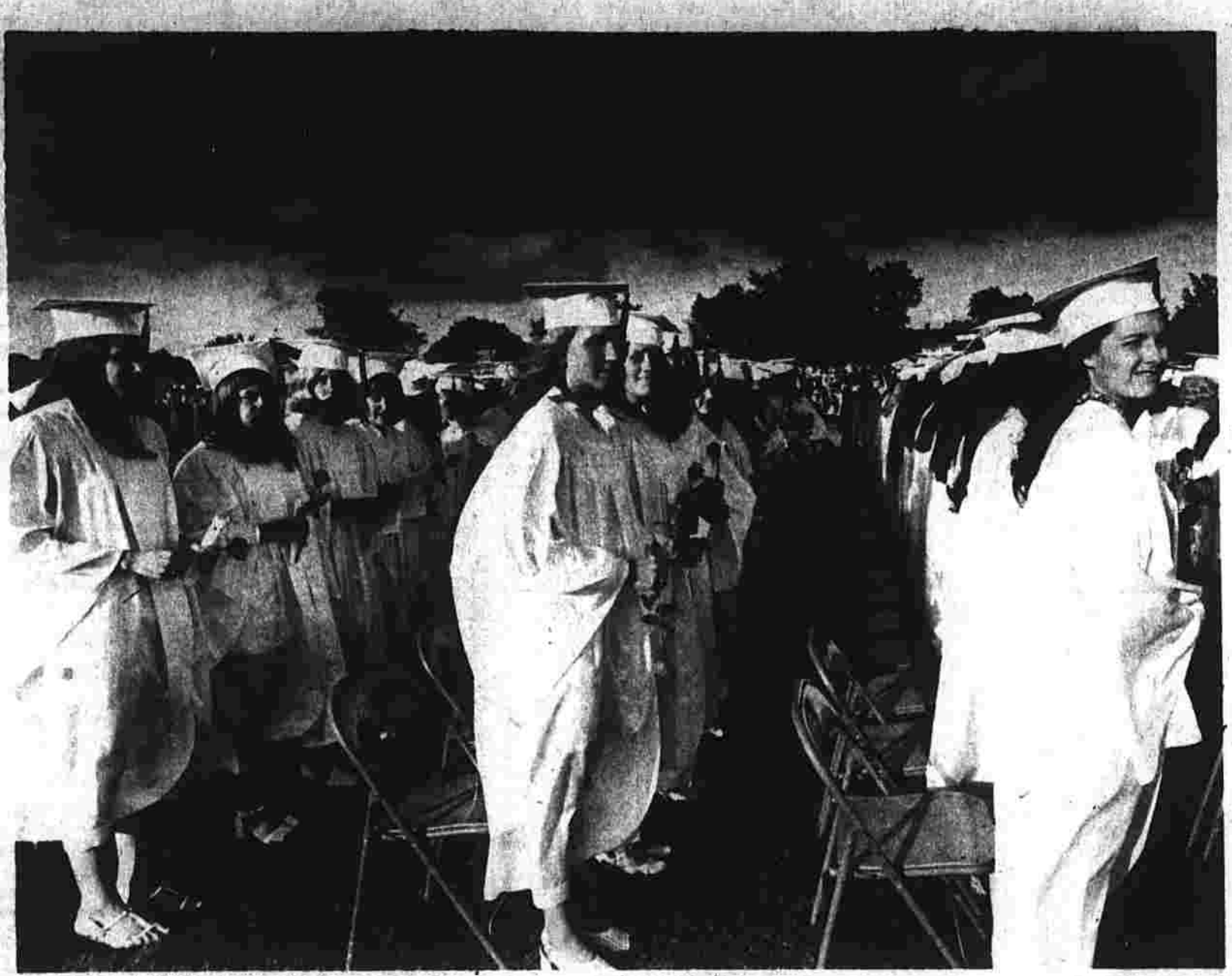

BALOGON (AP) — North Vietnam is trying to circumvent the mining of its harbors and rivers by unloading supplies from Chinese ships anchored offshore and bringing them inland aboard barges. WASHINGTON (AP) — Food prices dropped last month but substantial increases in clothing and transportation contributed to the largest rise in overall living costs in the month, the government reported today. The Bureau of Labor Statistics said its consumer price index, measuring typical family spending, rose three-tenths of one per cent in May to 124.7. This means it cost \$12.47 in May on the average for every \$10 worth of goods and services in the base period five years ago. 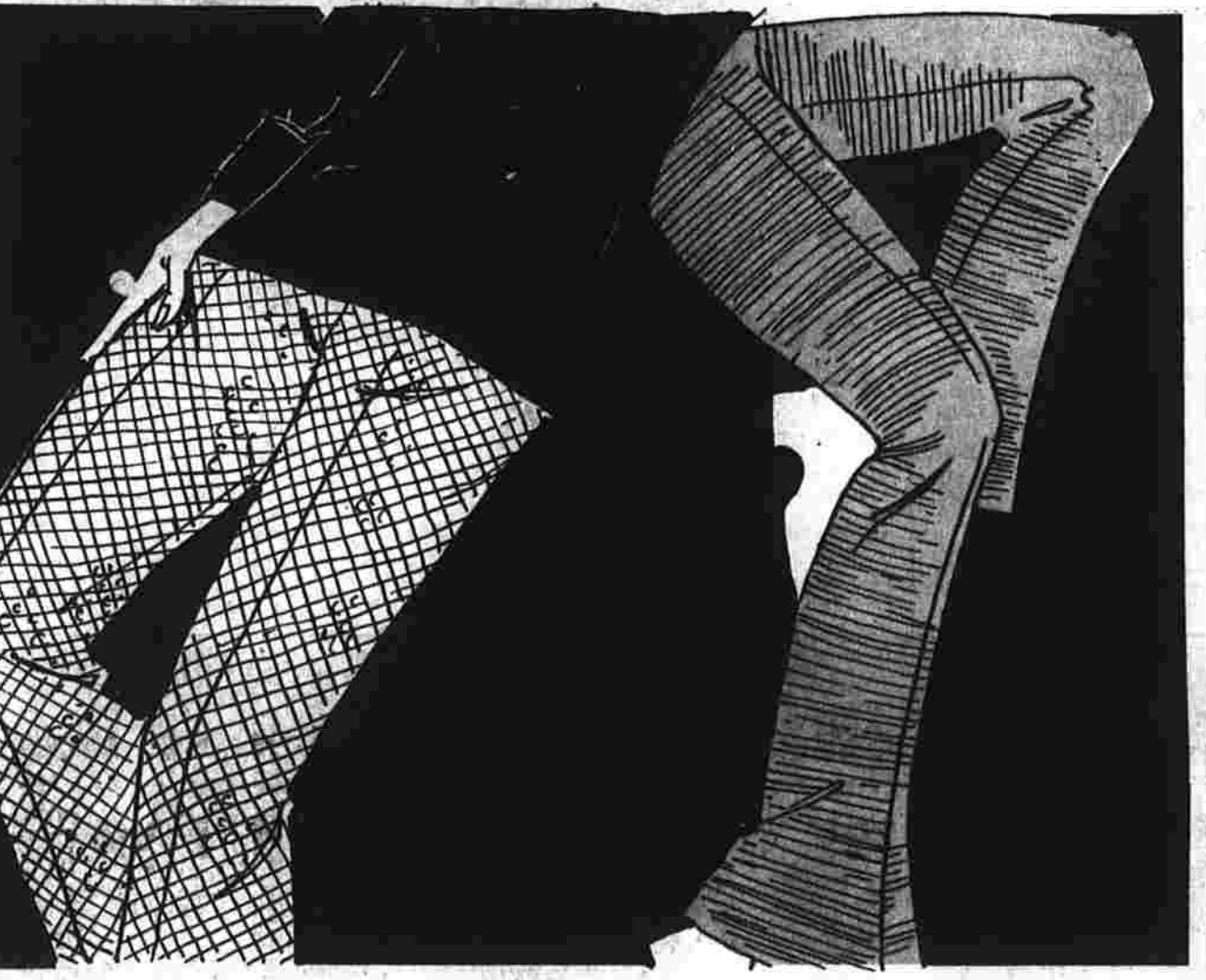

Israeli Stage Reprisal Attack

TEL AVIV (AP) — Israeli air and ground forces entered Lebanon in a reprisal raid today and captured senior Syrian and Lebanese army officers, the Israeli command announced. Israeli warplanes and artillery pounded Arab guerrilla camps on the slopes of the mountain chain in the eastern corner of the Lebanese-Israeli border, a spokesman said. The Israeli raiders captured three colonels and two lieutenant colonels of the Syrian army forces and a Lebanese captain, the state radio reported. It was the first time that senior Arab officers have been reported captured in clashes and raids on the Israeli-Lebanese frontier since the 1967 war. Witnesses in southern Lebanon reported Israeli planes raided three villages, killing and wounding an unknown number of people. The planes struck at Hama, Adra, and Meis al-Jebel with bombs and rockets, villagers reported. The raid occurred about 15 hours after the Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine claimed responsibility for two attacks on the border Tuesday. Four Israelis, two of them soldiers, were wounded. The Popular Front, previously had claimed responsibility for the Tel Aviv airport massacre May 30 in which 25 persons were killed.

Grant Would Fund Study Of Laurel Lake Project

A \$23,000 grant awarded to Manchester by the New England Regional Commission will completely finance studies of new dry Laurel Lake, which the town is considering purchasing for a sanitary landfill area. No town funding is needed for study of the proposed sanitary landfill's environmental impact and ultimate land use, according to Public Works Director William O'Neill. The \$23,000 grant announced yesterday, will come from the regional commission's Solid Waste Management Program. It will pay for testing of sanitary landfill effects on soil and water, and final land use of the town's existing landfill area off O'Neil St. as well as the proposed Laurel Lake site, O'Neill said. "We're right at the threshold of a major sanitary landfill expansion," O'Neill said, "stressing the significance of the \$23,000 study, if carried out, would be made available to other New England communities with waste disposal problems. Alternatives to town purchase of additional sanitary landfill land might be construction of an incinerator (estimated by O'Neill to cost about \$8 million) or participation in a statewide plan for waste disposal. The statewide plan, however, has not yet been started, and the state's Department of Environmental Protection intends to be in a study soon. Negotiations with the Donnan family, owners of the land, have resulted in a tentative purchase price of \$80,000 in lump sum, or \$60,000 a year for ten years. If Laurel Lake is purchased by the town, it would solve the waste disposal problem until the year 2000. Estimates now indicate the existing O'Neil St. area will be full by 1969. There appear to be a lot of 'ifs' in the purchase and grant award, O'Neill said. Use of the \$23,000 grant is contingent upon the Board of Directors' decision to buy, and the land purchase would depend on results of the studies made possible by the grant. The \$23,000 study, if carried out, would be made available to other New England communities with waste disposal problems.

Laird Takes Hard Stance On Costly Arms Package

WASHINGTON (AP) — Defense Secretary Melvin R. Laird has introduced his promise to oppose the Moscow arms curbs if Congress rejects even one item in a costly package of new weapons. Laird, who faces a new round of questioning before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee today, has taken a position sharply different from the soft approach of the White House and State Department. The chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, Adm. Thomas H. Moorer, agreed with Laird's hard line as the two testified Tuesday before the Senate Armed Services Committee. Laird insisted that he must oppose the U.S.-Soviet pact limiting nuclear armaments if Congress rejects funds for developing the Trident submarine, the B1 bomber system, a new cruiser missile or other projects exempt from the accord. Armed Services Chairman John C. Stennis, D-Miss., pressed Laird to define the point at which he would oppose the accord. Surely, he commented, it would not be if only one item were rejected. "Yes, it would," Laird responded. "It would cause me to reassess my position."

Wife Stealing Irks Him

By C. C. MINICHER
KODOK, Southern Sudan (AP) — One way to earn the wrath of the Reth is to steal his wife.

In the last eight years he estimates 50 of them have been stolen.

But the Reth, or divine king of the Shilluk tribe, is more worried about being ritually murdered—a traditional end for any who show weakness in his job.

The present Reth, in his 50s, was angry at the gradual disappearance of his wives, which he blames on the Ananyza rebels, but consoles himself with his remaining 100 wives and his 50 children.

Signs of weakness in western society may mean unwanted early retirement.

Signs of old age or ill health traditionally means death for the Reth.

The Shilluk tribe, bordering the White Nile from Lake No northward to Kaka, numbers anywhere from 120,000 to 200,000 and has traditional religious beliefs of the Nyakang, which depends on two beliefs:

—The immunities in each Reth (king) of Nyakang, who was leader, cultural hero and three king of the Shilluk, one of the Sudan, an area greater than all France.

—The conviction that the Reth must not be allowed to become ill or senile or weak for four this would bring ill health to crops and cattle and eventual death to tribal warriors.

Thus the Reth is killed ceremonially, although exactly how is a matter of speculation and the subject of much folklore. Murder is now a criminal offense under the state.

The present Reth, who has ruled since 1951, told an interviewer he is increasingly worried about his fate.

Outside the high red fence enclosing his modern home of 100 rooms, purportedly armed with pistols as well as highly visible spears, sit quiet.

Sitting on a chair on the veranda of his home, the king says "The struggle is there, adding that his advice would be not to murder him or his successors.

Traditional kings and chiefs are banned in the northern part of the Sudan. Africa's largest country at nearly a million square miles, but continue in the south, serving as a vital link between the traditional capital of the Reth, Fluhadh, a few miles upstream from his home at Kodok.

Coronaries Frequent In Young Servicemen

SA FRANCISCO (AP) — Increasing evidence suggests that atherosclerosis—a killer without warning symptoms—may be prevalent to an unusual degree among young American men, a Navy doctor reports.

Standard screening tests for identifying coronary artery disease before the first and often fatal heart attack produce no alarming signals, Lt. Cmdr. Carl J. Pepine told the American Medical Association's military medicine section Tuesday.

A 31-year-old Marine who had served three tours in Vietnam said 60 per cent of his 30 heart attacks during the first 30 months of the still continuing study, he said. None died.

The mean age of all Air Force fliers is 30 years.

Two-thirds of coronary deaths result from a sudden attack, and for most the first and final symptom is sudden death, Pepine said.

He reported on a screening study of 200 Navy men who met the criteria of high fat levels in the blood and a family history of heart disease.

Two risk factors were developed in 40 men. These were a family history of heart disease and a high level of cholesterol without showing symptoms.

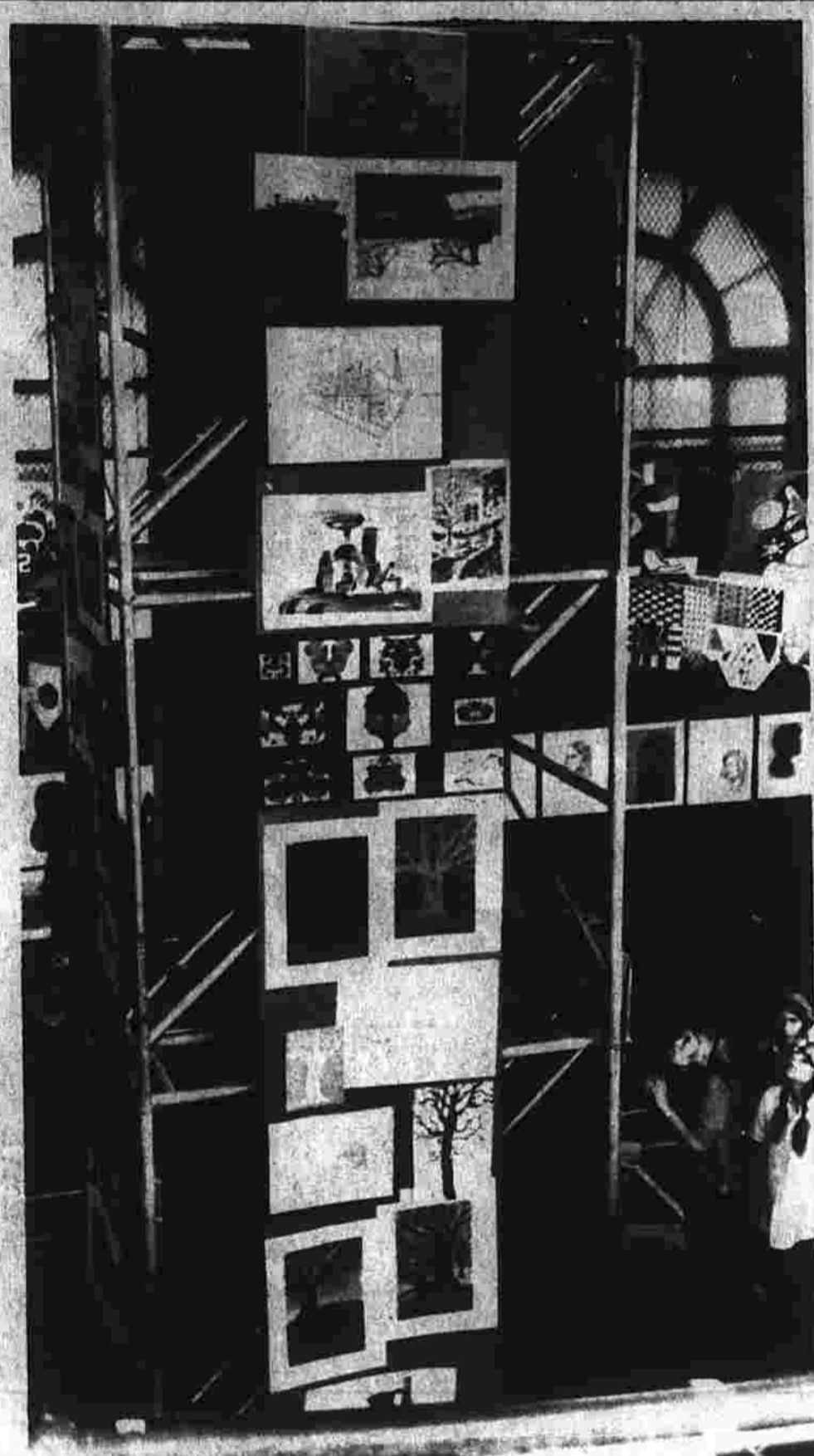

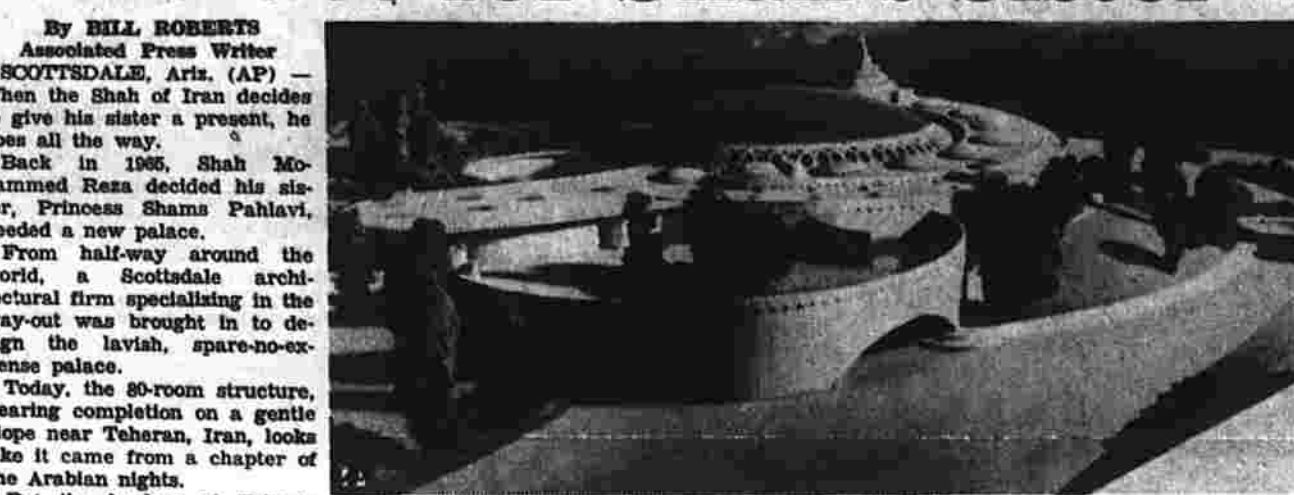

"We are finding it is not limited to cities," Lindsay told the U.S. Conference of Mayors workshop on drug abuse Tuesday.

Committee Wins Appeal Against Daley's Forces

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Democratic National Convention held in Miami Beach last week has issued a call for a "one million Americans" who have a concern about crime in this country and who want to do something about it.

Tolson speculated that because the appeals court did not dismiss the suit, the Credentials Committee might be less inclined to rule against Daley.

Skyscrapers Sprout All Over Los Angeles

By CYNTHIA Z. RAWLINS and cars is so great, the whole downtown area is straining to hold its own.

"I do the same thing in my personal driving," he continues. "I pack the night before and start out early, leaving at night by 20 feet with each additional 10 miles an hour of speed."

But if you must leave then, Hoffman has some hints that can make your trip easier—and safer.

"Leaving right after work usually means driving at dusk," he notes, "and that sometimes means danger. Don't know that objects appear to be further away at dusk than they actually are? You have to allow extra room to react."

He suggests using low beam light during this period. High beams add to the overhead brightness still in the sky, making it difficult for the eyes to distinguish items that reflect small amounts of light from the roadway.

One way to help your eyes is to wear sunglasses. In his car Hoffman carries the usual flashlight, first aid kit, fire extinguisher, tire chains and tools. But his emergency kit also includes a tow chain, fuse flares, an extra fuel tank, blanket and a clean white sheet in a plastic bag.

In addition he carries a small ax and hatchet with spare blades, in case he sees an accident where occupants are trapped. That hatchet could mean the difference between life and death, he explains.
