Neighbors at Odds

Grouchy Mrs. Baxter, an apartment dweller, had two reasons for cooking cabbage so often. First, she liked cabbage. Second, she liked to waft the cooking odors out of her open kitchen door, into the apartment of the new neighbors across the hall.

When the neighbors finally halted her into court, Mrs. Baxter insisted she had a right to cook whatever and however she pleased.

But the court ruled that she was guilty of causing a nuisance, by maliciously inflicting discomfort on others. Psychologists tell us that hostility grows as living space shrinks. One of the law's touchier tasks is to mediate between neighbors at odds. And, as the above case indicates, evil intent may make the big difference in court.

This is shown even more clearly by the law's changing attitudes toward spite fences. Such fences, erected deliberately to block off the daylight from a neighbor's house, used to be tolerated as a lawful exercise of property rights.

But now they are forbidden almost everywhere. A court commented, in condemning a spite fence 11 feet high: "The right to enjoy the sunshine is a natural one, and no man can shut out the light of heaven for no better reason than to gratify his malice toward his neighbor."

Nevertheless, when we choose to live in an urban environment, we are also choosing the reasonable degree of vexation that goes with it.

In another case, a family had a ventilating fan that blew cooking smells out of their kitchen, in the general direction of the house next door.

But this time, when the neighbors went to court to complain, the judge took due note of the fact that the houses were 27 feet apart. At this distance, he said, the degree of annoyance was too slight to awaken the law's disapproval.

The judge said he would not interfere "without some evidence that the cooking odors were revolting to a point beyond the effect of ordinary neighborhood exhalations."

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Stones Sell Tickets Using New Method

NEW YORK (AP) — The Rolling Stones concerts in New York, three of them, at Madison Square Garden, are using a different ticket selling system.

People wanting tickets mail in a postcard, between certain dates, and when the cards are received, a firm of certified public accountants selects some of them at random. These are put through a computer, which is supposed to throw out ones with the same handwriting. Tickets will be assigned on a first drawn-best seat basis.

Official notification cards will be mailed to the names drawn and those persons can pick up their tickets within a three period written on their cards. All persons notified will be entitled to buy a maximum of four tickets. All tickets, regardless of location, will be \$6.50.

This is all supposed to eliminate long waits at the box office, riots during the long waits and reduce ticket scalping by not allowing blocks of tickets to be bought.

Smith Gets Broader Role

In a realignment of the senior technical functions at United Aircraft Corp., effective Aug. 1, Arthur E. Smith of Manchester, chairman of the executive committee, will assume senior executive responsibilities for the operations of United Aircraft Research Laboratories.

The realignment is because of the July 31 retirement of Eric Martin, UAC's vice chairman. Martin, a nationally known pioneer in aerospace technology, has been with the corporation for more than 40 years—joining Hamilton Standard in 1931.

Since 1960, he has had overall executive responsibility for advanced technical activities carried out by the corporation's divisions, subsidiaries and its Research Laboratories. In the realignment of functions, Dr. Russell G. Meyerand, director of research, will report directly to Smith.

Charles E. Kearns Jr., who has been serving as vice president for research, will assume a new corporate vice presidency. Also to report directly to Smith, he will direct the affairs of a technical activities group assigned to corporate headquarters, a function now assigned to Martin.

Need a Doctor?

The Manchester Medical Association would like to offer the following suggestions as to how persons new to the community or without a physician can obtain the services of a physician.

A. BEFORE AN ACUTE PROBLEM ARISES: 1. Remember that only some of the physicians listed in the telephone directory are primary medical physicians (the first of doctor to see patients).

2. If you cannot make contact with a physician in this manner, call the Hartford County Medical Association at 285-5425. Ask them for the names of primary medical doctors or pediatricians in Manchester.

3. If the physician you call in this manner is unable to accept you as a patient, ask his secretary to suggest the names of other physicians who he believes can take you. If they cannot, remember that: (see B.)

B. IN AN ACUTE SITUATION WHEN YOU HAVE NO PHYSICIAN: 1. Call the Manchester Memorial Hospital emergency room and explain your problem to the clerk or nurse on duty.

2. The person on duty will confer with the physician on duty and you will either be given the name of a physician before an acute emergency arises, he can obtain a doctor much easier when one is needed in a hurry.

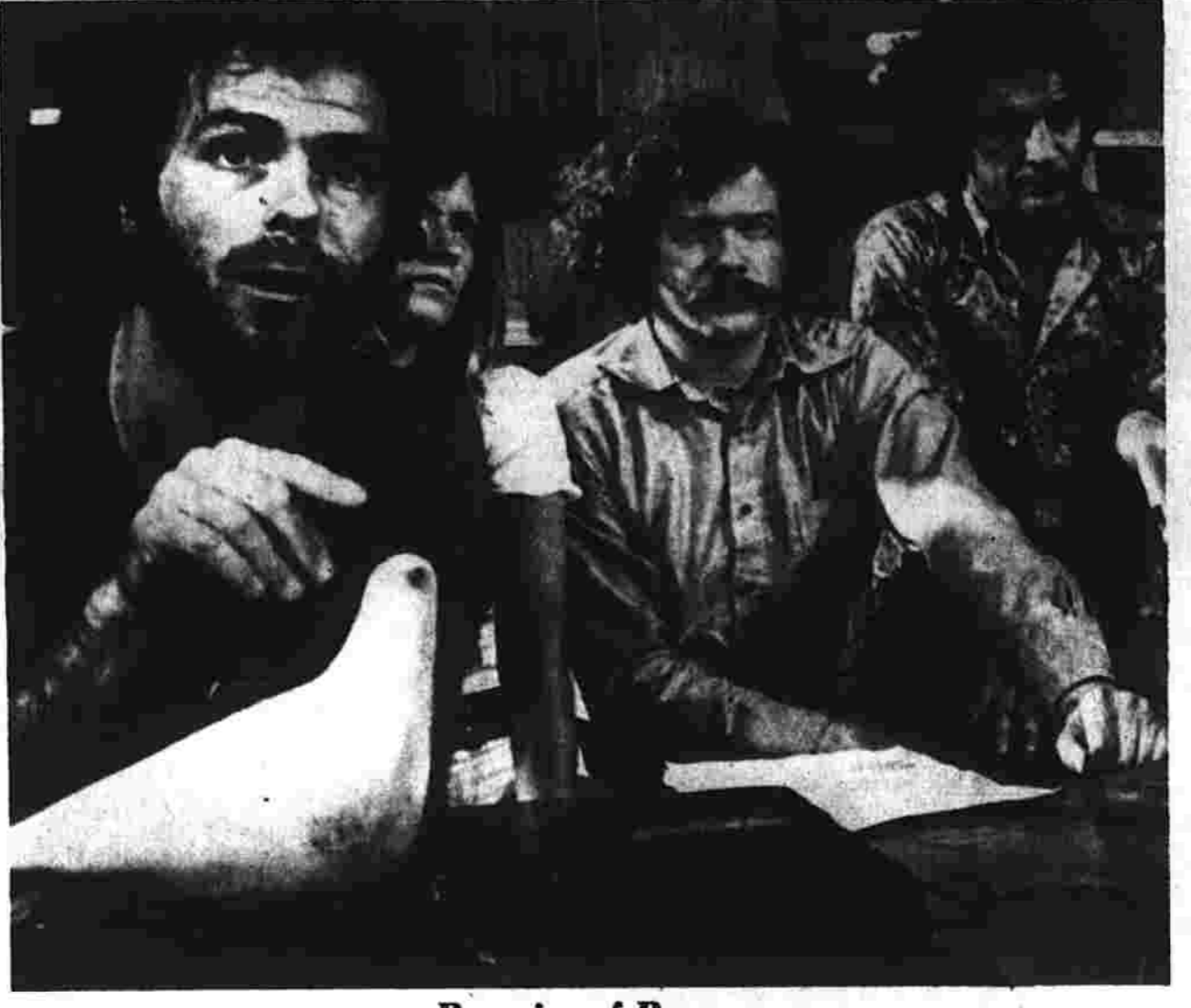

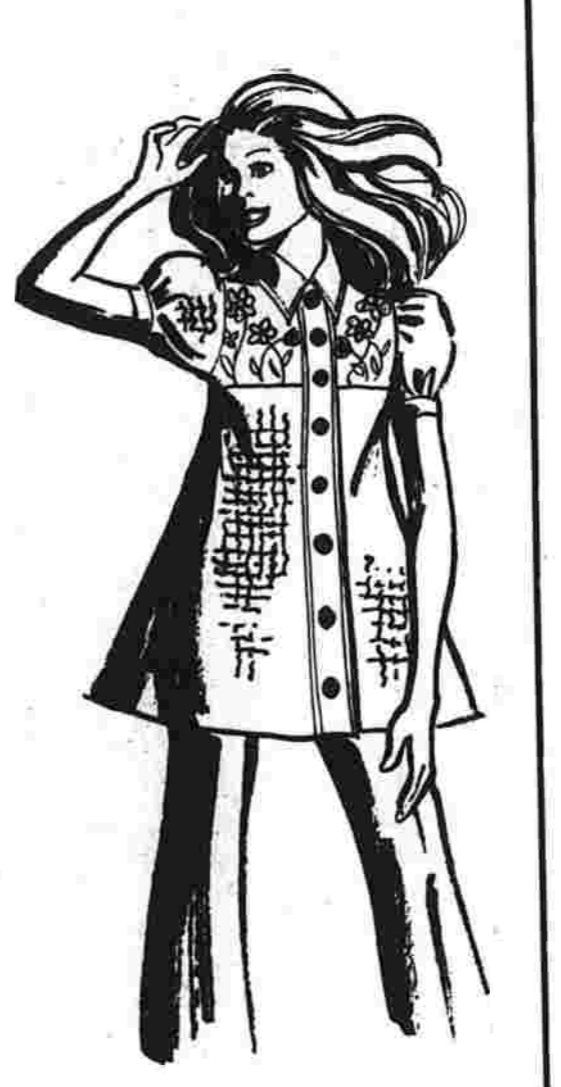

# Liberties Union Challenges Army Surveillance Decision

WASHINGTON (AP) — The soundness of executive actions of an illegal tap cannot, therefore, be challenged in court, the Supreme Court ruled today in a decision that the Justice Dept. has barred a suit against Army surveillance of civilians.

Aryeh Neier, ACLU executive director, said in New York he will base his motion on the fact that the suit was not properly before the courts.

Neier said Rehnquist, a former Justice Department official, should have stepped out of the case because he testified in March 1971 about the suit before a Senate subcommittee.

The ACLU official said Rehnquist told the subcommittee that the suit was not properly before the courts.

Rehnquist was nominated to the Supreme Court by President Nixon last October. He was confirmed and took his seat in January. The freshman Justice voted with the majority Monday to cancel out the suit.

That is, civilians could be shadowed by the military only on direct orders from the president and when necessary to guard against invasion and domestic violence. Another exception would permit surveillance of civilians who applied for jobs with the military.

Burger's majority opinion said the suit was really an attempt to use the courts to probe the Army's intelligence-gathering activities. He said it is the job of Congress, not the courts, to pass judgment on the

The little published, but equally worthy of recognition world competitions are the 21st World Games For the Handicapped—also referred to as the "Wheelchair Olympics." They will take place in Heidelberg July 12. The games feature a number of sports in a wheelchair.

The Munich set is as follows: 20 pfennig 10—wrestling, 25 plus 10—sailing, 30 plus 15—gymnastics, 40 plus 10—tennis, 45 plus 10—table tennis. Each stamp also bears the 6-ring Olympic symbol and "Munich-72" at the bottom.

A unique souvenir sheet also has been issued for the Olympic set. It fits the four values into an over-all aerial view of the Olympic site, much like an architect's rendering of a famous covered stadium in the centerpiece.

Both the Munich and Heidelberg Games issues are available at your local stamp dealer.

Five pictorial postal cards on the theme "Tourism in the Americas—72" will be issued June 29 by the U.S. Postal Service. Each of the cards has reproductions of scenes frequented by tourists. Three cards are 4 cents for domestic airmail and the other is 15 cents for international airmail.

First-day cancellations of the cards will not occur in the name of a city. Instead the cancellation will be "U.S. Postal Service" to point up the fact that all areas of the country have tourist attractions.

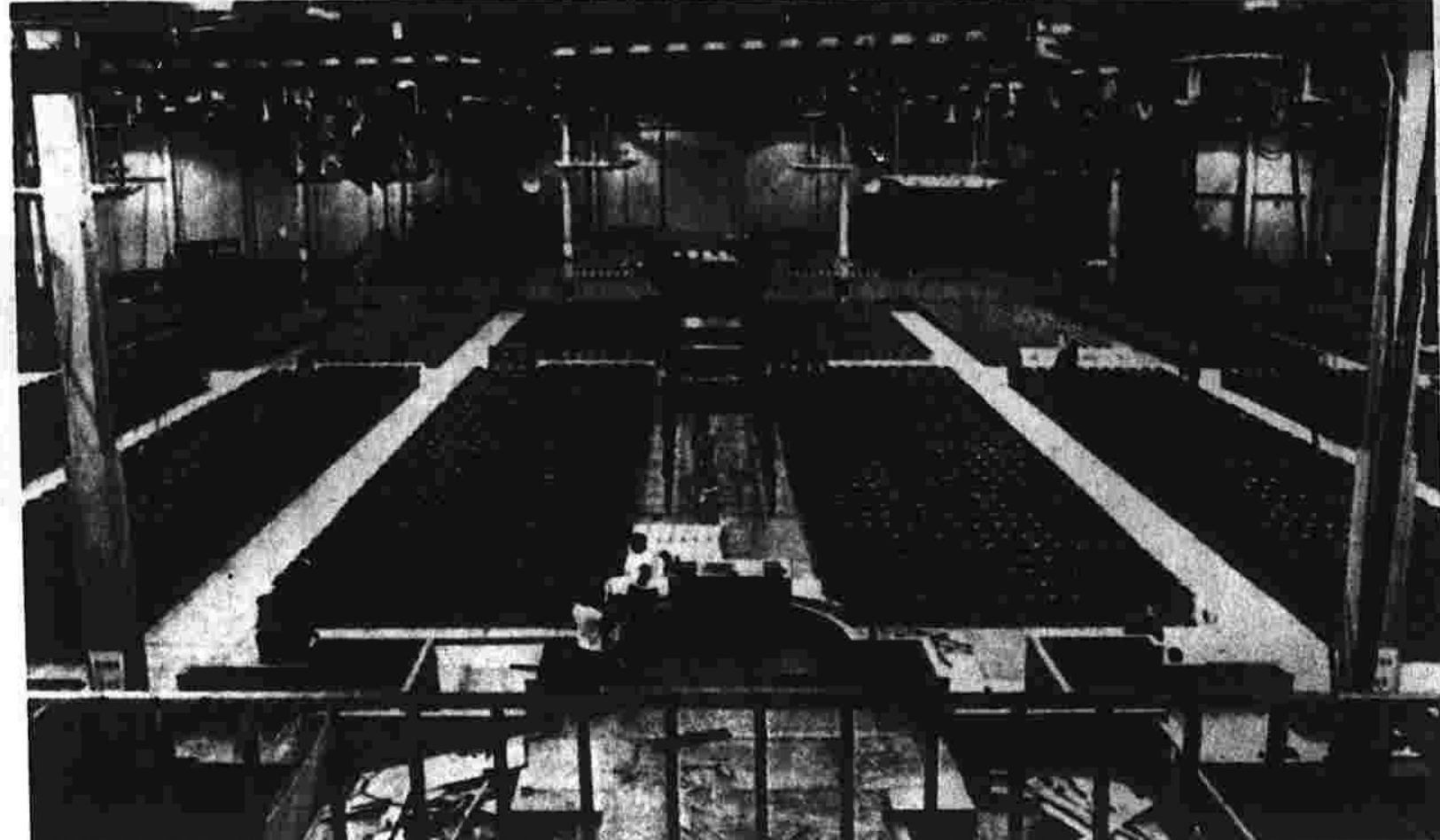

John R. Paul, museum curator, says the animal was killed for fur, and the creature was "not a wolf in the sense of 100 or more years, Paul said."

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### Getting All Your Due Benefits?

Some students may be losing out on Social Security benefits because they are not aware they are entitled to them.

According to Joseph Mucciaro, manager of the East Hartford Social Security Office, hundreds of students in the area are receiving cash benefits on the work records of deceased parents.

One such case has brought unexpected benefits to Linda White, 19, of 63 Pine St. She is just one of many students receiving Social Security student benefits on their mother's Social Security work record.

Linda, a sophomore at Anna Maria College in Paxton, Mass., plans to use this money to further her education. She is through the summer, since she majored in French and hopes to return to school in the fall. Working part-time at a supermarket as a cashier, she will continue until she can earn up to \$1,600 this year and still receive all her Social Security benefits available, says the office.

Linda's natural mother, Loreta White, died in December 1960. However, because of the nature of the Social Security law at that time, Linda could not qualify for monthly survivor benefits.

Last January, Linda's stepmother, Mary White, died. During the course of the interview, the work record of Linda's natural mother was discussed and it was discovered by Roseanna Garcia, Social Security claims representative, that Linda could qualify for benefits for the past 12 months on her natural mother's work record due to a 1968 change in the Social Security law. That law reduced the length of time needed and credited to a deceased survivor's benefit.

Because of this change, Linda received a large retroactive check representing benefits due from February through December 1971. If all requirements are met, Social Security can pay up to a year's back benefits from the date of filing. Effective January 1972, Linda is receiving benefits on her step-

mother's record, as they are in comes 22 years old, whichever comes sooner. Should she marry while still in school, these benefits will terminate.

Linda's benefits will continue under St. James School. She enjoys reading, sewing some of her own clothes, music, and bike riding.

Mucciaro, commenting on the benefits available, says there still may be some students not receiving these benefits. In many cases, there may be loss of benefits.

Any full-time student, under age 22 not receiving benefits and who has lost a parent who worked under Social Security, should contact the nearest Social Security Office and discuss the matter with a representative.

The East Hartford Office, at 67 Main St., is open Monday through Friday 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

What makes Linda's story unique is the fact that she has received and is receiving benefits on two mother's work records.

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### Social Security Hikes Affect 4,000 in Area

The basic premium rate for the medical insurance part of Medicare will go up from \$5.60 to \$8.80 a month beginning in July, according to Joseph Mucciaro, East Hartford Social Security manager.

This will affect approximately 4,000 people in the Manchester area, Mucciaro noted. The medical insurance part of Medicare helps pay for doctor bills and a variety of other medical expenses for people 65 and over. The program is funded by individual premium matched by the federal government.

The 20-cent increase in the premium in July compares to a 20-cent increase in 1971 and a \$1.30 increase in 1970, Mucciaro said.

The low increase this year reflects savings in the administration of Medicare as well as lower anticipated medical costs because of the Price Commission's guidelines limited physicians' fee increases to an average of 2 1/2 per cent a year.

The 20-cent increase will be reflected in the July 3 social security check. This means that social security checks for people 65 and over, covered under the medical insurance part of Medicare, will be 20 cents less on July 3rd.

## South Windsor Mayor Says Council Can't Call Election On School Housing

In a prepared statement, Mayor Abraham Glassman said today that the Town Council does not have the statutory authority to call a special election or call a special referendum to require that the Board of Education use the Wapping High School annex this fall.

Glassman said that the Town Council has reviewed the legal opinion requested by them from the Town Attorney Thomas Dennis in regard to the legal status and council obligations concerning the petition submitted by more than 1,200 South Windsor residents requesting a townwide referendum to be held to use the Wapping School for a high school annex in September and to locate the recently purchased modular classrooms at the elementary school.

According to Glassman, Atty. Dennis indicated that Section 10-20 of the General Statutes provides that the conduct of the South Windsor' educational system is a matter exclusively within the province of the Board of Education and, "in performance of its duties, the board is totally independent and may not be directed to by the council or any other municipal authority."

Atty. Dennis also stated that the proposed ordinance calling for action is "no more than an attempt to legislate educational policy" but the final policy-making decision is within the exclusive authority of the board, Glassman said.

The mayor also stated that the town attorney had covered the aspect of an advisory referendum on the "Wapping Plan" and indicated that a recent Connecticut Superior Court decision has ruled that an expenditure of public funds would be illegal since the submitting of an education policy, even on a "straw vote" basis was, according to the court, "a misapplication and waste of public funds."

Dennis specifically pointed out that the statutes do make provision for the expression of public opinion to the Board of Education by allowing voters to petition the Board for a public hearing on any question concerning educational policy. Glassman said that under this statute Section 10-20, upon written petition of one per cent of the voters to the board, the hearing must be held within three weeks after receipt of the petition by the board.

According to Glassman, the June 18th petition will appear on the July 5th Council agenda, and will be held within three weeks after receipt of the petition by the board.

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## South Windsor Piers Being Poured For Portable Rooms

Concrete for piers to support three double-unit portable classrooms is presently being poured behind the high school and classrooms will be ready for occupancy in the fall, School Superintendent Charles Warner said last night.

Universal Structures the firm from whom the town purchased the units for approximately \$78,000 has been having difficulty in completing the work due to the "deluge" which rained over the past week, Warner said.

Last November, a motion was made by board member Cle Decker that the board consider purchasing the modulars to be used at the high school during an interim building program if and when a proposed addition to the high school is approved by voters in a referendum.

Last night Warner indicated that no cost estimates for the proposed addition are known at the present time, but that the Public Building Commission has been requested to present more refined drawings and firm costs on Plan B on or before July 1.

Plan B calls for the linking of the present main corridors of the high school with two or three level academic area. Traffic to the new building will be through ramps, Warner said.

He added that the members of the board, the Town Council and the building commission were met with the architects on May 18 and suggested they work on this plan after three plans were presented for review.

In his report, Warner made a mention of the modulars presented to the town officials and administration as part of Plan B at the May 18 informal session, which at that time, had run the cost estimates of the plan over the \$2.4 million mark. No board member questioned the athletic facility last night.

Earlier in the evening, four reports were made by Warner, Mrs. Nancy Chafin told the board that she had received negative attitudes toward the placement of modulars at the high school level from the town's principals and superintendent. She said she had done an extensive study regarding the advantages and disadvantages of the units and learned that modulars provide additional teaching space, but in a sense added to the problems of overcrowding central core facilities, such as cafeterias, auditoriums and bathroom facilities. She said she learned that the people concerned favored, in most cases, placement of the modulars at elementary schools where students are more controlled through corridors, etc.

She added that in scanning minutes of the South Windsor board meeting since the introduction of modulars at election time, she has not seen where any study on modulars was done by them.

Board Chairman James Arnold acknowledged that no study was made and replied he had never said "they (modulars) were the answer," adding he "personally has not been in favor of using them."

It was reported at the Nov. 23 meeting that Arnold's vote was included in an amendment to the motion to utilize modulars at the high school during an interim building program, and a check this morning verified the report.

## South Windsor Flood Control Project Gets Federal Approval

The Avery Brook flood control project was given the go ahead this week when the United States Soil Conservation Service in Storrs was assigned to work with the town of South Windsor to "plan and protect" the Avery Heights area. Deputy Mayor Robert Smith said yesterday.

Smith said he had received a communication from 1st District (D) that the project authorization was granted to South Windsor and will include the construction of an earthen dam for water retention and flood control as well as the "manufacturing of culvert work in the Avery Heights area," Smith said.

He said no federal funds are available now but that the town officials will be looking into grant applications for financial aid in carrying out the project. He noted that the land acreage involved in the project is 1,229 acres. Smith said there is a possibility that once the project is complete it may be used for a recreation area in the town.

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# Pentagon Papers Show 12 Negotiation Tries

WASHINGTON (AP) — Previously undisclosed portions of the so-called Pentagon Papers show at least 12 separate channels were open involving North Vietnam and the United States in an effort to end the Indochina war dating back to June 1, 1964, according to The Washington Post.

In today's edition, the Post reports the contacts involved Henry A. Kissinger in 1967 as well as officials and important private citizens of several governments including France, Canada, and Poland.

The Post account is based on what it described as four diplomatic volumes of a Defense Department history of the war obtained from syndicated columnist Jack Anderson.

Post reporter Murray Marder said the diplomatic portions, which were not included in previous unauthorized versions of the Pentagon Papers, indicated the critical question of who should lead the United States in South Vietnam was the "gut issue" that plagued all of the peace contacts before the Nixon administration took office.

Kissinger, a Harvard professor and consultant to the State Department in 1967 and now President Nixon's national security adviser, became involved through contacts with two Frenchmen, Herbert Marcuse and Raymond Aubrey.

According to the Post, this contact opened in early June, 1967, during a meeting in Paris between Kissinger and Marcovech. The Frenchman brought in Aubrey who was a personal friend of North Vietnamese leader Ho Chi Minh.

The two Frenchmen traveled to Hanoi July 24, 1967, carrying the Pentagon Papers and instructions from Kissinger to meet with Premier Pham Van Dong in what became an indirect contact started in June, 1964.

Kissinger's 1967 role as well as the outlines provided by the Post account of the newest portions of the Pentagon Papers disclose nothing that was not already known publicly. However, the account does provide generally greater detail than released previously.

The Pennsylvania Channel stretched throughout the summer and into the mid-fall of 1967 with the main questions dealing with the U.S. bombing of North Vietnam, Hanoi's military activity in the South and the two sides' positions on establishing some sort of peace negotiations.

In the beginning, the Post said, the papers said the official Hanoi position called for an end to all bombing and attacks against North Vietnam before there could be talks about a diplomatic settlement.

### Bombing Ban Blasted

## War and Weapons Bill Rejected

WASHINGTON (AP) — Backing President Nixon's war and weapons policies, the House has decisively rejected efforts to cut a \$2.3-billion arms bill and to write a war-pullout deadline into it.

It also shut down a proposal to outlaw U.S. bombing of North Vietnamese dams and oil pipelines. The White House has denied reports that U.S. bombing has struck such targets.

In voting Tuesday, amendments to cut \$1.7 billion from weapons projects including the Trident missile submarine, B1 bombers and Safeguard antimissile systems were defeated.

The House voted 284 to 139 to approve and send to the Senate the \$2.3-billion authorization for tanks, missiles, ships, planes and other weapons for the fiscal year starting July 1.

Opponents contended that the President's accelerated Trident and B1 development requests could undermine the U.S.-Soviet strategic-arms-limitation agreement and destroy the confidence of taxpayers who expect bigger weapons cuts because of the accord.

Nixon asked for the Trident and B1 speedup and has argued that rejection would lead to U.S. inferiority by the late 1970s.

He said, "Obviously, we've got the power to blow the Soviets to smithereens. And all we're talking about here is how fine a powder to grind the other pieces of the earth into."

But Rep. Richard H. Imhoff, D-Mo., backed Defense Secretary Melvin R. Laird's position that the \$2.3-billion increase in Trident and B1 development requests "should be scrapped" if Congress does not continue U.S. weapons development, because of the greater number of missiles and submarines given the tested by sizable margins.

**COST PER SERVING - A GOOD GUIDE.**  
 Price is only one guide, and a rather poor one, to the real cost of food. Cost per serving is a far better guide to true value.

Two factors make up cost per serving for you: 1) the total price of the item and 2) the number of servings that you will get. Remember, what is a serving for one person may not be for another. Some people like large servings—others small, depending on preferences and appetites.

To figure the cost per serving, divide the price of the item by the number of servings you will get from it. Frequently the cost per serving is affected more by the number of servings than it is by the price. Therefore, knowing the number of servings you will get is just as important as knowing the price.

You tell us meat buying most often baffles you. Cost per serving can make it easier. The price per pound may sound enticing, but how much fat or bone is there in the cut actually serve? How many people will that cut actually serve? Determine the number of servings your family will get from a cut of meat and you can figure your cost per serving.

These comparisons may seem difficult at first, but practice at home with newspaper ads to develop your skill. Also use the cost per serving method to choose among the varieties of fresh fruits and vegetables—or to decide which is more economical among the fresh, frozen, canned or dried versions of a product.

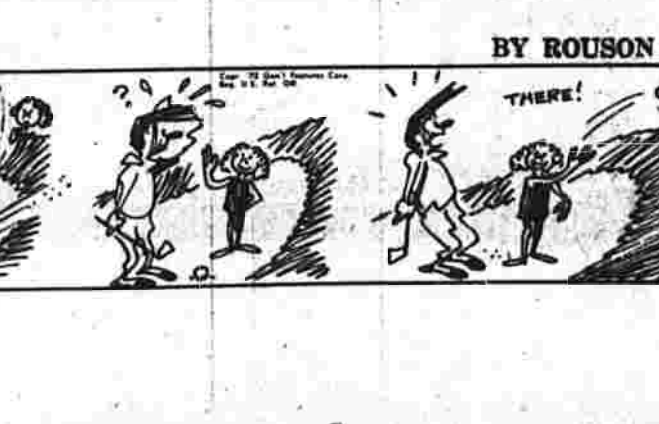

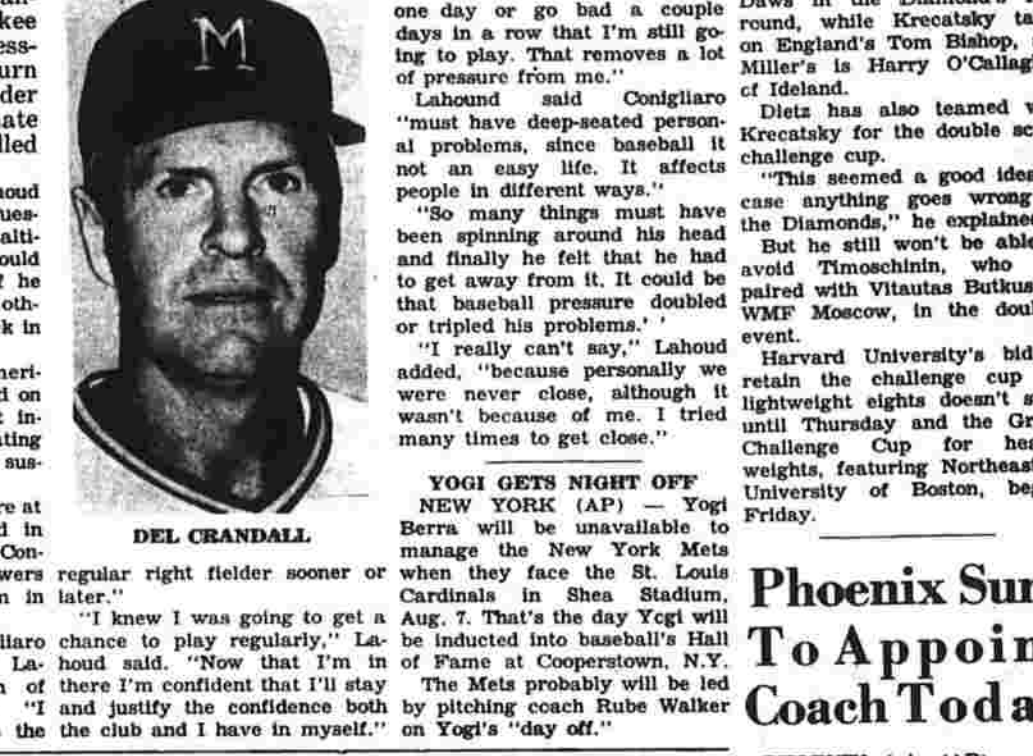
