

Rescue Racing Typhoon

AGANA, Guam (AP) — A Japanese merchant vessel raced a typhoon across the Pacific today in an attempt to rescue crew members from a U.S. B-52 bomber which crashed into the ocean.

The Ariake was expected to arrive at the crash scene, 300 miles west of here about the same time the center of tropical storm Rita is due near the area, the Air Force said.

Four crewmen had been sighted by sunset Friday, bobbing in individual yellow life

rafts in the 10-foot waves. All were alive, but the Air Force had no comment on their condition. Two other crewmen have not been located by the seven aircraft circling the area.

The fleet weather typhoon warning center said Rita was generating winds of 50 miles per hour, with gusts to 125 m.p.h.

The big bomber — a Stratofortress Model G — went down about one hour after taking off from Andersen Air Force Base.

The plane, which was packing 30 tons of conventional bombs destined for an undisclosed target in Vietnam, reported some trouble just before going down, the Air Force said.

There has been no comment on the nature of the reported trouble.

All of the crewmen ejected before the plane crashed, but the bomber apparently sank, the Air Force said.

It was the eighth time in the Indochina war that one of the mammoth bombers has been lost to non-hostile causes.

The Air Force said at least one of the crewmen was in radio contact with circling search aircraft.

The crew is believed to be on temporary assignment from a mainland base, but the Air Force has refused to say where the crew came from, and crew members have not been identified.

The Air Force also declined to say whether any B52 missions have been canceled following the crash.

The Coast Guard cutter Basswood also headed for the rescue area, but was due to arrive several hours after the Ariake.

Court Spurns Delegate Spat

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court has declined to enter the Democratic party's fight over the seating of delegates to its national convention, leaving it to the delegates to battle it out in Miami Beach.

By a 6-3 vote in a rare special session Friday night, the court stayed a lower federal court order that would have required 10 California delegates to Sen. George McGovern, giving him a strong boost toward a first-ballot nomination as a Democratic candidate for president.

With the convention opening Monday, the court said, it was no time to examine the fight over the seating of delegates to its national convention, leaving it to the delegates to battle it out in Miami Beach.

In a century and a half of American history, the court said, the national political parties themselves have settled controversies over the seating of delegates to their conventions.

In a strong dissenting opinion, Justice Thurgood Marshall said the action of the convention Credentials Committee in unseating 10 California delegates was unconstitutional.

Marshall said the committee's action was unconstitutional because it violated the party's national constitution, which gave all delegates the right to participate in the machinery to elect the President of the United States.

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State Election Left in Doubt

HARTFORD (AP) — Both plan developed by Yale Law date. Republicans and Democrats said Friday Connecticut is officially without a legislative reapportionment plan in a new U.S. Supreme Court action.

And scheduled General Assembly elections are just five months away.

Justice Thurgood Marshall said on the advice of Kilian, a Republican lawyer after he denied a Republican party motion that would have settled the redistricting issue for the fall election.

The Republicans asked Marshall to clarify a previous high court ruling by ordering that November's legislative elections be held under a 1971 plan favored by the GOP.

The 1971 plan was ruled unconstitutional by a three-judge federal panel, but the U.S. Supreme Court, ruling on a GOP appeal, stayed the lower court decision.

State Atty. Gen. Robert Killian, a Democrat, then concluded that in the absence of Supreme Court clarification of the stay order, Connecticut has no legal reapportionment plan.

"My motion was for clarification," said Republican State Chairman J. Brian Gaffney, "and he (Marshall) refused to clarify. It's unbelievable."

"We don't have a plan. My original interpretation and that of the lawyers was that the original stay order put the 1971 plan into effect."

Democratic State Chairman John Bailey, in Miami for his party's national convention, was unavailable for comment.

For their part, the Democrats claim Republicans have refused to seriously negotiate on a legislative reapportionment plan outside the courts.

Satter, lawyer for the Democrats, said the Republicans have not negotiated in earnest because they felt the Supreme Court would allow the 1971 plan to be used this fall.

He said Marshall's denial of the GOP motion now "raises the real possibility" that the chairmen of the Democratic and Republican parties will reach an agreement on a reapportionment plan.

House Speaker William Gaffney, in an interview, lambasted Killian's action as a "political decision."

He said that there will be no legislative elections in November, but at a special election after the death of their national candidate.

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Six U.S. Fliers Lost in Raids Over Red Lands

SAIGON (AP) — U.S. Navy jets from carriers in the Tonkin Gulf set huge fires in the U.S. Command announced today the loss of three of America's fastest jets over North Vietnam with all six crewmen missing.

U.S. officials warned of a new threat by Soviet-built MIG21 interceptors that shot down two of the three Air Force F4 Phantoms reported lost.

In South Vietnam, North Vietnamese forces began their second week of artillery attacks against the old imperial capital of Hue, 30 miles to the north, a South Vietnamese counter-offensive continued to encounter stiff resistance on the southern and eastern edges of Quang Tri City.

A 7th Fleet communique said waves of Navy jets destroyed 15 buildings at the He Dan Do La treatment point 38 miles east of Haiphong, and that pilots reported setting four large sustained fires in the attack.

The Navy said it was an "all-out effort" that resulted in heavy damage to North Vietnamese supply and transportation systems.

In reports delayed by search and rescue operations that proved unsuccessful, the U.S. Command said two Air Force F4 Phantoms were shot down by MIG21 interceptors Wednesday while accompanying fighter-bombers on raids 30 and 40 miles northeast of Hanoi.

All four crewmen were reported missing.

Huge Marijuana Cache Seized

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Mixup at Mystic Governors Differ

MYSTIC, Conn. (AP) — New England's governors differ on whether a state government should aid legal-assistance groups that may turn around and sue the state.

The question of states funding legal-aid programs was brought up by Connecticut Gov. Thomas J. Meskill during an afternoon session with reporters at the New England Governors' Conference.

Meskill's opposition to the practice, which already has led to a fight in the courts, won the support of Gov. Dean C. Davis of Vermont but Rhode Island Gov. Frank Licht disagreed.

Meskill Opposition

Legal challenges are beneficial because they often have "brought to public notice problems of interest to the people of our state," Licht said.

Meskill recently barred the use of state funds for lawsuits against the state. His decision, however, is being challenged in court.

Meskill, however, characterized state funding of legal-aid programs that originate suits against the state as "using the taxpayers' money to sue the state funds to legal-aid programs."

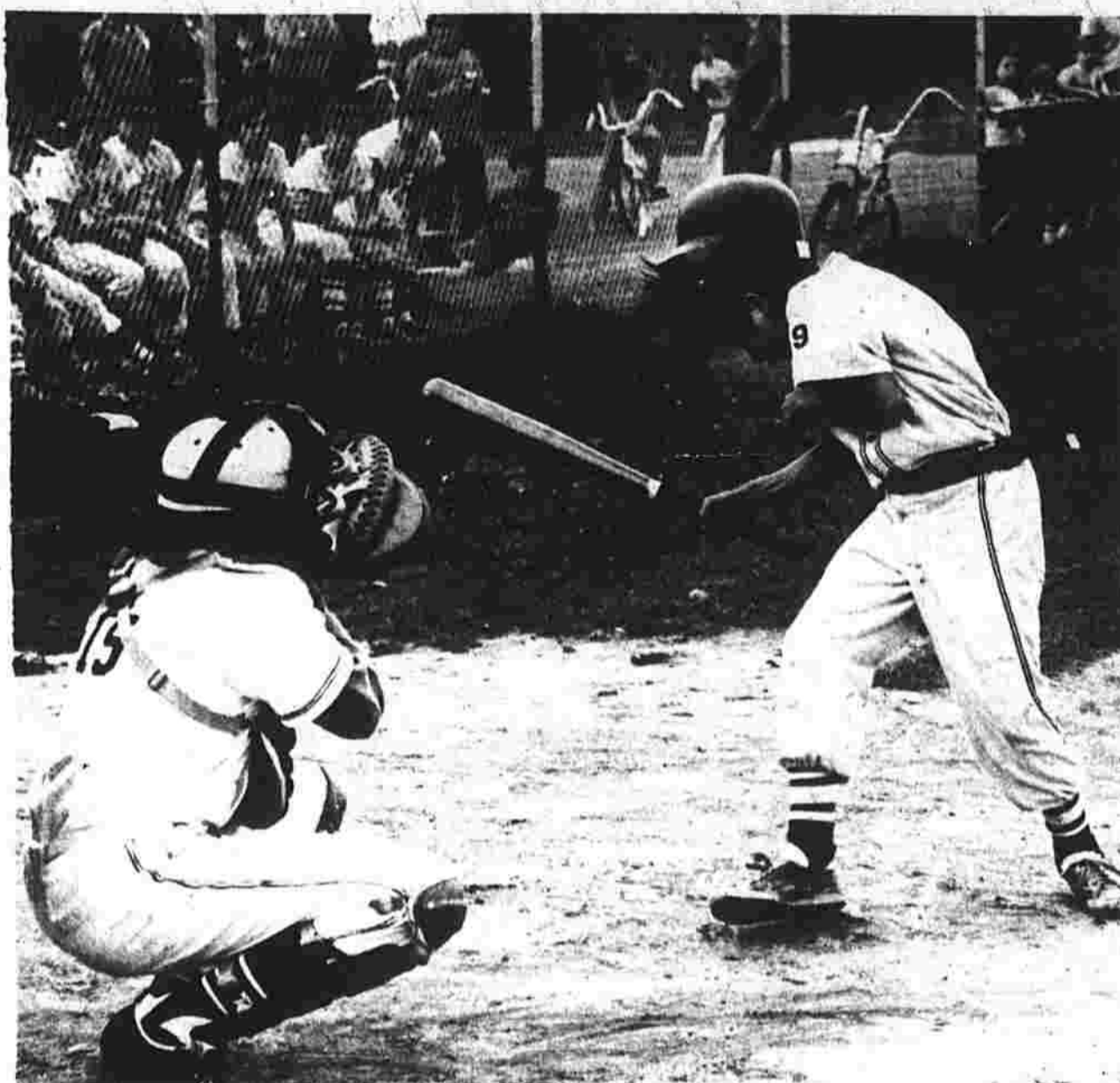

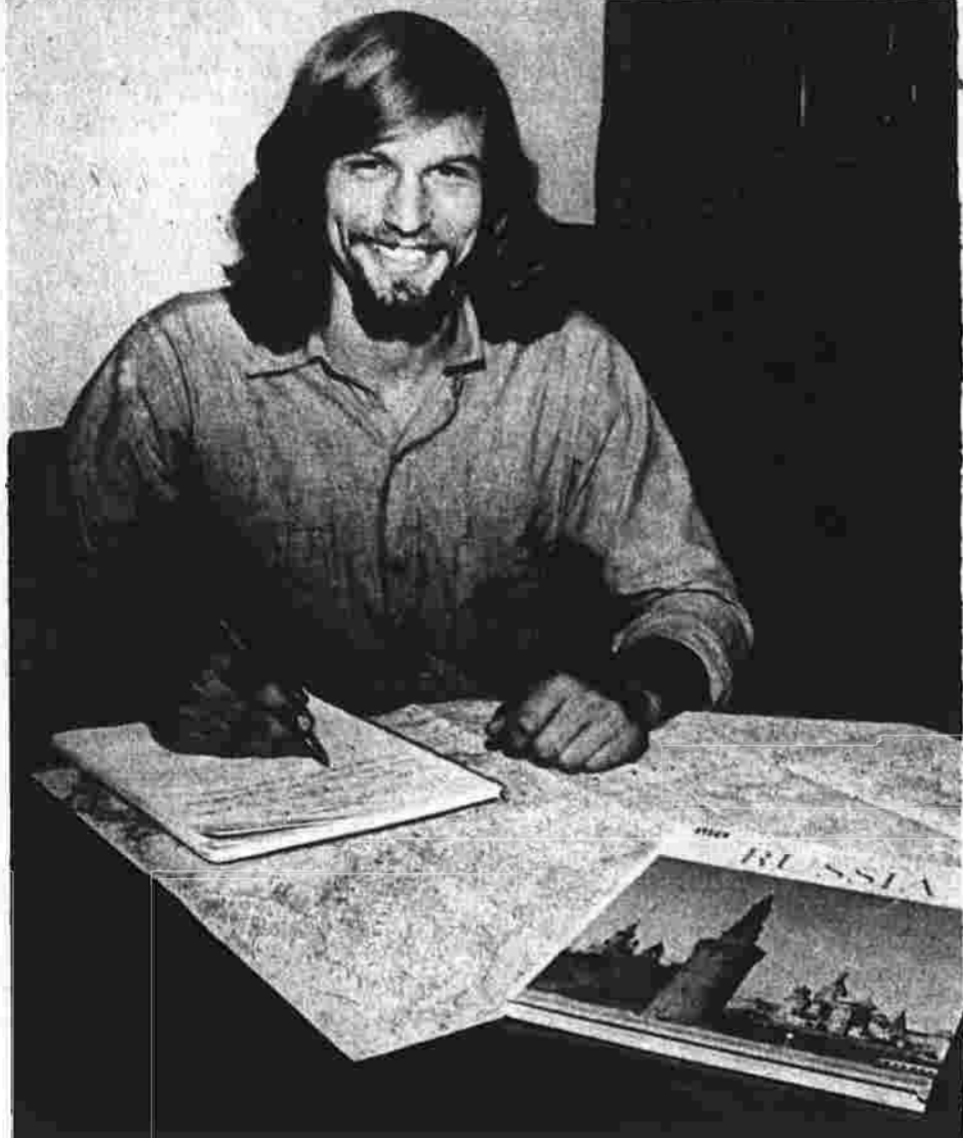

Todd Leventhal To Visit Russia

"East is East and West is West, and never the twain shall meet." Those words by Rudyard Kipling, penned many years ago, may have rung true in the late 1800s, but not so, today.

Tremendous strides have been made to keep the lines of communication between East and West open, and a young Bolton resident will soon be doing his part in this endeavor.

Todd Leventhal, 21-year-old son of Dr. and Mrs. Allan Leventhal of Quarry Rd., departs from Bradley International Airport Monday on the first leg of a 17-hour flight to the Soviet Union.

As a member of the Citizens Exchange Corps, a nonprofit organization which conducts large-scale, non-political educational and cultural exchange visits between American and Soviet citizens of all ages and occupations, Todd will join a sponsored group of 15 to 20 people for the three-week visit.

"I had planned on making the trip alone," Todd said, "but after hearing of the CECC, and realizing that, with a group, plans would be expedited more quickly, I decided to join them."

A graduate of Rockville High School, Todd attended Dartmouth College in Hanover, N.H. for two years, and has been working recently as a carpenter.

A quiet, personable young man, he is anxious to meet Russians in his own age group.

"I am interested in their culture, in living among them, and in getting to know the people," he said.

"The program provides for lectures, and special trips, but you are not treated like a tourist — you more or less make your own way — establish your own friendships," he added.

Todd, who speaks only a few words in Russian, will rely for the most part on the "universal" language, that of friendship, plus a small dictionary with the meanings and pronunciations of Russian words in common usage. To avoid any real complications, interpreters also accompany the group.

"I have done a lot of reading about Russia and also of its desert people, and am hopeful of seeing and visiting them."

"The Russian border separates Iran and Afghanistan, and it would be great to meet the mountain people and visit the tribes on both sides," he said.

In preparation for his visit, Todd read some books, which were recommended by the CECC, about Russia and its people, and also checked some up-to-date maps tracing the itinerary.

"I will also participate in a three-hour pre-flight orientation program held at Kennedy International Airport just prior to departure," Todd said.

"When possible, CECC holds a two-day pre-departure orientation at any of the colleges in New York City, but participants come from all over the United States and may not be in the New York area at the time of orientation, so they have scheduled the three-hour program," he added.

During his visit, Todd will participate in field trips to collective farms, children's camps, schools, factories, film studios, music conservatories, clinics or other institutions.

"The emphasis is on people-to-people communication, and although, when possible, meetings are arranged between Americans and Soviets with mutual interests, it is hoped that participants will use their personal initiative, thereby opening doors to experiences not usually available to foreign visitors," Todd remarked.

There is little doubt that Todd's luggage will meet the weight requirements for overseas flights. Like many of today's young travelers, he plans to pack his knapsack with blue jeans, a few shirts, extra shoes, just the essentials. In Todd's words, "I'm traveling light."

"We have been briefed on certain items we may need," Todd said, "such as toothpaste, plugs for drains, buttons, and toilet tissue."

"I also plan to bring some paperback books and some records to exchange with new friends I meet."

"Instructions have been given on where and when we are allowed to take pictures. None may be taken at borders, airports, or on the train," he explained, "but I hope to take some of the interior, the buildings, and of course the people."

For many people, a three-week visit to the Soviet Union, meeting new people in a strange land, learning first hand some of their habits, skills, and arts, would suffice.

But not for Todd Leventhal. He has a thirst for knowledge, a straight forward desire to communicate, plus that spirit of adventure prevalent to the young, which in the months ahead will take him to other countries in the world.

"Following my visit to Russia, and after the CECC group departs for home, I plan to remain in Central Asia visiting Iran and Afghanistan for a few months, and then head for Israel where my aunt lives," he said.

His parents, Dr. and Mrs. Leventhal, have mixed emotions about his forthcoming trip — but agree unanimously "it's great."

Mrs. Leventhal, showing some of a mother's emotions, said "I know it will be interesting for him, but I understand they are having a famine in Afghanistan now, and I know that means seeing starving people, many children. This will be hard for Todd."

"He has been to Israel before," Mrs. Leventhal said, "and it will be about the only place we can send mail to him, as he will be traveling most of the time."

"He has always been good about writing, and we will look forward to his letters, because I really don't expect to see him till spring," she said.

Dr. Leventhal, a veterinarian in Bolton, is also very proud of his son.

"He earned all the money for his trip, made all the arrangements, and we are very happy for him."

"It will help him mature, and help him get some of the right answers," he said.

As for sister, Kim, 19, she has no immediate travel plans.

"I have just completed my first year at Bay Path Junior College in Longmeadow, Mass., where I am taking the executive secretarial course," Kim said.

"I have one more year to go," she said, with a grin, "then we'll see about traveling."

For the Leventhals of Bolton, Todd's departure Monday will mark the beginning of a long wait till spring — but for the young man himself — a door has opened — a world awaits.

South Windsor Toomeys Still Fight Town Sewer Easement

One month ago, Mr. and Mrs. Louis Toomey of 393 Benedict Dr. gained recognition when they placed a sign on their property calling attention to their plight. The sign read, "Please let my children have their yard," and the couple promised a fight with the town fathers to keep "what is rightfully ours," they said.

After one month of attending sewer commission meetings, asking questions, retaining a lawyer and circulating a petition for support, the Toomeys are presently where they were one month ago, but the town has had to stand still in the matter.

The town is seeking a portion of the Toomey's property, mainly it is necessary to lay a sewer line which will be gravity fed from the rear portion of the Avery Heights where the couple live, from Diane Dr., to the main line on Avery St. The thinking has not changed. The couple feel the town should not dig up 20 to 30 feet of their wedged-shaped backyard which they say will take away estab-

lished trees on their property, the security of their children in the fenced-in backyard, their garden, and above all, their privacy.

However, Sewer Commission Chairman James Throwe said that he has been informed by the town engineer that, in order for the town to secure all homes from Diane Dr. into the sewer system, the line must go through the Toomey's backyard. He added that the topography of nearby Gold Mine Rd. which was suggested by the Toomeys as a possible other route, does not meet the qualification of a sewer line.

Mrs. Toomey, on the other hand, is not convinced that the town has exhausted all other alternative routes and stated one reason for her disbelief. She said that previously the town engineer had considered her neighbor's property as the only route. The neighbors hired their own engineer who proved that digging the trench on the land would cave in the ground and could be unsafe to the foundation of the home. "If one mis-

take was made, the town could make the same in my case," Mrs. Toomey said.

Throwe indicated that attempts have been made to convince the Toomeys that the same situation would not occur as the placement of the trench is to the rear of the Toomey's property. He said he has requested that the sewer construction crews limit themselves to only 20 feet of the land being considered and would only be taking a 10 foot easement once the pipelines were sunk. The easement is necessary in the event of damage to the pipeline, he said.

Mrs. Toomey argues that the heavy equipment necessary to do the work could not "possibly stay within the 20 foot easement, but in fact would be on all parts of her land."

Throwe added that he will meet with the Toomey's privately in an effort to answer all their questions and see if the two parties could come to some logical agreement on the sewer line in the very near future.

South Windsor June Building Leads Last Year's

Building permits filed with the Building Inspector's office for the month of June totaled \$487,993 which represents four times the value of permits filed in June last year.

The largest permit was for the \$75,000 three double-unit portable classrooms purchased on the recommendation of the Board of Education to be used to house approximately 150 high school students in the fall.

A clubhouse for the luxury Candlewood Village apartment complex on Ellington Rd. added \$28,968 to the total and another \$37,450 includes 11 additions and alterations to existing homes. Swimming pool construction increased to \$5,000 for eight built-in pools and \$1,375 for three tool sheds.

Town Revises Explosives Law

This week the Town Council approved a revised ordinance regulating the use of explosives in South Windsor. According to Deputy Mayor Robert Smith, licensed users must show proof of liability insurance coverage in the event of an accident: \$200,000 insurance coverage per person; \$300,000 per occurrence and \$100,000 for property damage.

Fines for misuse were raised to \$100 from \$25, with each violation being a separate offense.

In other action this week the council approved an addition to the "Little Red Schoolhouse" on Ellington Rd. which is believed to be the only one room school in the area and was the first schoolhouse in the town. The addition of a cloakroom would cost \$1,400 but, with the help of a nursery school child's grandfather, a retired carpenter, the leases of the South Windsor Cooperative Nursery School feel that room could be completed for \$750 with the town footing one-half of the bill.

The present building has historical value and is owned by the Town of South Windsor with the town's Historical Society having the first option on the building when the Co-op no longer feels the need for the building.

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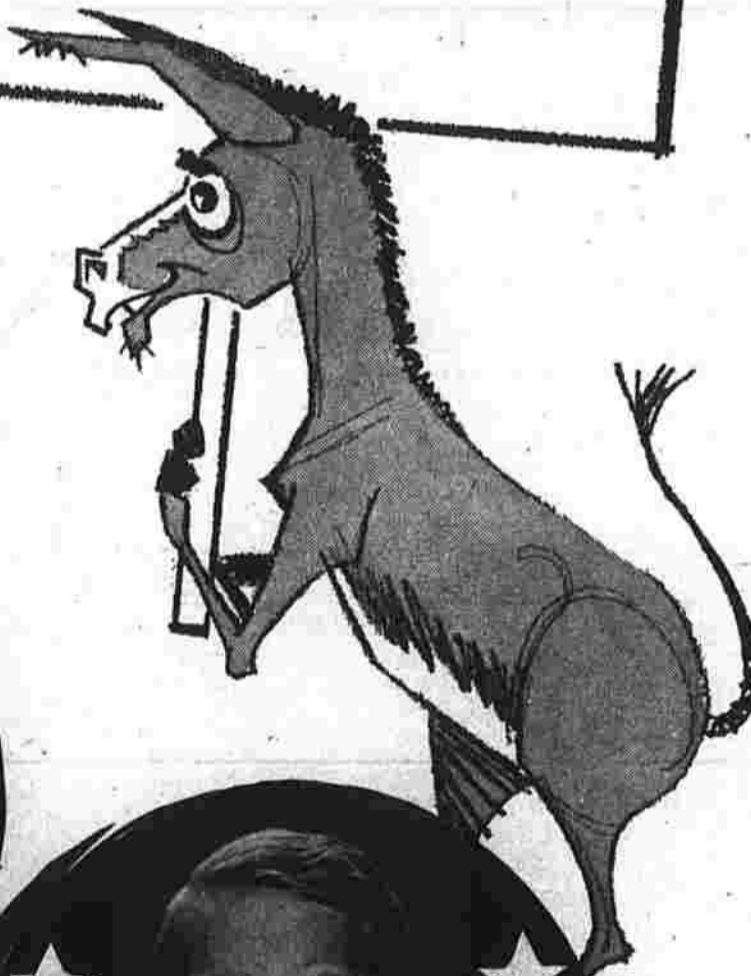

Book Publishers Worried By Demise of Talk Shows.

By CYNTHIA LOWRY NEW YORK (AP) — Television, often accused of luring the public away from reading, really is one of the best friends of publishers. Authors appear on talk shows and discussion sessions, contribute their expertise and in exchange plug their books.

But publishers are worried now because some of their best showcases are disappearing. David Frost quits at season's end. Dick Cavett may not survive beyond October. The book publishing business is largely concentrated in New York and Johnny Carson has moved to Hollywood. Merv Griffin, already in California, doesn't use authors very often these days. A top program in most publishers' book is NBC's "Today Show."

"Today's" book editor, Jane Murphy, estimates that three or four authors are interviewed weekly.

"Dick Cavett likes authors and almost every one enjoys appearing on 'The Mike Douglas Show' because they are treated well," said one publisher's representative. The other shows are good breaks for the book. But Frost or Carson often get so involved with earlier guests that the author doesn't get on the show after sitting offstage for hours.

Jane Booth, in charge of booking Doubleday authors on shows, recalls with a shudder a couple of nights when Thor Heyerdahl and Jacques Yves Cousteau, both writers of stature, never made it to stage center after long waits. They were not amused.

"Today's" Miss Murphy said that she has recently felt increased pressures from publishers to book their authors on the show and felt it was due to fewer outlets available in New York.

Miss Murphy depends on the publishers' representatives for help in picking authors who would be comfortable on television—ideally as comfortable as Dr. Margaret Mead, Jacqueline Susann and Dr. David Ruben who do very well as their own drum beaters.

With the network outlets diminishing in numbers, the publishers are trying to find some other way of reaching the public by broadcasting. One idea involves using local radio talk shows.

- Adlai E. Stevenson ran for the presidency twice, and lost both times. Who were his vice-presidential running mates?
- Who was the first presidential nominee to make his acceptance speech from the convention hall where he received his nomination?
- In 1964, Senator Barry Goldwater of Arizona was the Republican nominee. Who was his vice-presidential designee?
- WEAF (New York) organized the broadcast of the 1924 Republican convention from Cleveland over a special 12-station, coast-to-coast net-
- An estimated three million people heard Calvin Coolidge nominated.
- In 1940, the Republican convention was telecast by experimental station W2XBS, which was located atop the Empire State Building. There was 150 miles of special wire circuits set up between New York and Philadelphia's Convention Hall. The viewing audience was estimated at 50,000.
- In 1924, WEAF's young announcer, Graham McNamee, who had just begun earning a reputation as a top sports announcer, was assigned the job of covering the first convention radio broadcasts. Millions of Americans sat huddled around loudspeakers or listened with earphones, and McNamee emerged as a national figure.

- The 1924 Democratic convention, which WEAF broadcast direct from New York's Madison Square Garden, ran on for 15 days and 103 ballots before the delegates finally selected John W. Davis.

- Senator John Sparkman of Alabama, 1962; and Senator Estes Kefauver of Tennessee, 1956.
- Franklin D. Roosevelt, in Chicago, in 1932.

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Democrats Plan ABC Telethon

A unique 18½-hour entertain-
ment telethon, presented by the
Democratic National Commit-
tee to raise funds for the Dem-
ocratic Party, will be presented
live on ABC from Saturday at
10 p.m. to Sunday at 5 p.m., and
again on Sunday from 8 to 9
p.m.

More than 100 popular person-
alities from the entertainment
and sports field will appear on
the telethon, either live from
the Hollywood Palace in Los
Angeles or from the Deauville
Hotel in Miami Beach or in pre-
viously taped segments. These
performers will serve as mas-
ters of ceremony of the show,
perform, or make brief appeals
for funds.

The telethon has been de-
scribed by the Democratic Par-
ty as an effort to "save the
two-party system." The Demo-
cratic Party has said it is \$9-
300,000 in debt and will use the
telethon to ask viewers for dona-
tions. The program will not re-
present an appeal for any partic-

ular political candidate, nor for
all Democratic candidates.

Direct appeals for contribu-
tions will be interspersed in
the 18½-hour entertainment spe-
cial. The Democratic National
Committee has established 32
regional telephone centers, em-
ploying 10,000 telephones, to
which calls can be placed by
the public.
